NEWS OF THE WORLD.

Cholera increasing in India.

Snow fell yesterday at Raleigh, N. C.

M. Waddington, our Ambassador from France, to resign.

Tampa's jail being declared a nuisance, has been torn down and burned.

The Naval Board think \$2,000,000 should be expended on our coast defenses.

Charles Spurgeon, the great London preacher, has withdrawn from the Baptist Communion.

Jacksonville liquor dealers circulating a petition among the people asking the county commissioners of Duval to call a "wet or dry?" election.

Com. B. B. Harmony, chief of the Bureau of Yards and Docks, has prepared his annual report upon the operations of that bureau during the past year. In it, referring to the necessity of a Government Naval Station on the Gulf of Mexico, he says that "Pensacola, although defective in some respects, combines more advantages for a naval station than Key West or any point on the Mississippi river."

FIVE O'CLOCK.

THE SURPLUS IN THE NATIONAL TREASURY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The free trade journals and speakers of the country are terribly alarmed at the "Surplus" in the Treasury, and exercised about how to get rid of it and to stop its farther accumulation. Let us examine for a moment the reasons for the fear in the one case and the anxiety in the other:

In the first place, logically, a surplus, so long as there is a legitimate subject to which the excess of receipts over ordinary expenditures can be and is applied? I leave this question for the alarmists to answer, and will proceed to a short investigation of facts connected with the case.

The N. Y. Commercial Advertiser, of a recent date, contained the following: "Up to Monday evening there was paid in interest, under Secretary Fairchild's recent notice to bondholders anticipating the date of payment, \$1,050,000, and \$260,000 in bonds were purchased, a total of \$1,310,000, equal to about one day's surplus revenue." Such statements find ready endorsers among the free trade journals of our own State, and passing unanswered and uncontradicted, are accepted as true by the mass of readers. Let us see how near this reckless declaration approaches to the truth. \$1,300,000 per day would make \$478,150,000 surplus per year. Now, according to official statistics, the surplus, or excess of receipts over ordinary expenditures (not including unexpected demands upon the Treasury and payments on the public debt) was for the year ending June 30th 1887, \$103,448,000, or about \$345,000 per day, instead of \$1,310,000!

This is but a fair specimen of the false statements continually being made by that class of journalists and demagogues who are engaged in schooling public sentiment for an attack upon the industrial system of

the country, in the interest of British free trade. They would have us believe that the currency of the country is being contracted by hoarding in the vaults of the treasury; while the official returns show that on the 1st of Aug. 1887, there were \$3,842,464 less cash in the Treasury than on the 1st of last March; and \$77,507,180 more in circulation in the hands of the people than on the 1st July 1886!

But suppose we admit that the time has arrived when it is not necessary or even advisable to pay off the public debt as rapidly as we have been doing it:—when should we, in harmony with the general and traditional policy of our government, the genius of our institutions and the spirits of our people, begin a reduction of our revenue receipts? If there is more money collected than is necessary and the people are burdened with grievous taxes; which are the most grievous, the most burdensome, the most restrictive of personal liberty and hence corruptive of public and private morals, and the most expensive in the methods of collection?

We are sure that, if these questions are considered impartially, and not viewed through colored glasses or "jaundiced eyes," all will agree that the Internal Revenue system should be abolished as rapidly as the condition of the country and finances will justify. This system of taxation is vexatious and expensive in the extreme, encourages no industry, adds nothing to the wages of any class of laborers, and is emphatically and purely a war measure, not needed by the exigencies of peace.

As above stated, the surplus for the year ending June 30th 1887 was \$103,448,000. The net Internal revenue receipts for the same period were \$119,000,000; so that unless the ordinary current expenses of the government can be reduced, the Internal Revenue system cannot be abolished immediately, (without revising the tariff so as to supply the deficiency), but it should be put in process, at once, of gradual extinguishment.

The Indian Green Corn Dance.

The great religious services of the year is known as the "buskin season," or green corn dance. Not an Indian eats a grain of corn until after the celebration. The men prepare for this by a system of purification, eating of bitter herbs and taking medicines. This sometimes makes them very sick, but is always rigidly adhered to. On a certain appointed day all the tribe gather together in one place, and a sacrifice of thanksgiving is offered to the Great Father in the burning of a fish, the heart of a deer and an ear of corn. Then the dance begins. There are separate dances for the men and the women, and another dance is participated in by all. In this last dance the inner circle is for the women, the next for the men and the outer one for strangers. These lines are strictly watched, and any unwary stranger who in his curiosity oversteps his line is immediately besieged until he pays \$1 or an equivalent. The dance is kept up during the entire day, and at night, tired and happy, all return to their homes.—*Kansas City Times*.

Turtle Tricks.

Turtles can be tamed and taught tricks. A boy in Brookfield had six of them in a tub filled with a well. He fed them daily, and they soon became used to the little fellow's call. He kept a float on the surface of the water, upon which he placed food. At his call they would in turn crawl upon the float and get a morsel of food, and oftentimes take it from his hand. He taught them to march around the outskirts of the tub, and each one took the same place every time. They would also go around the tub and carry a match in their mouth. Unfortunately a mink visited the tub and killed the turtles.—*Danbury News*.

New City Ordinance.

An ordinance to provide for the examination of all script or warrants on the Treasurer of the City of Key West, issued prior to the first day of November, A. D. 1887, and to punish the receiving of the same, for taxes, licenses or other debts or demands due the City of Key West, before registration.

WHEREAS, there is no record of the quantity of outstanding unpaid city script, or warrants on the Treasurer of said City; and

Whereas, it is necessary that the same should be ascertained before the finances of the city can be put upon a cash basis; and in order that a record of such outstanding script may be made;

Be it enacted by the Aldermen of the City of Key West, Fla., in common council convened:

First: That all persons holding any script or warrants on the Treasurer of the City of Key West, issued prior to the first day of November, A. D. 1887, shall turn the same in to the clerk of said city within six months from the date of the passage of this ordinance, for examination by the Finance Committee, and registration by said clerk.

Second: That when any script or warrants shall be turned in to the clerk, he shall give to the holder of said script or warrant, a receipt in the following form:

"City of Key West, . . . 1887.
Received of . . . for examination by the Finance Committee and registration by the Clerk of the City of Key West, city script or warrant on the Treasurer of said City, number . . . issued to . . . on the . . . day of . . . A. D. . . . for \$. . . which will be returned to the bearer of this receipt, on presentation at the Clerk's Office, after the Fifth Day of May, A. D. 1888.
Clerk."

Upon the receipt of any script, or warrant on the Treasurer, the Clerk shall enter in a register, to be kept for that purpose, the number and date of such script, to whom issued, the amount, and the date when turned in.

Third:—That as soon as all outstanding script is turned in to the Clerk, or before the Fifth Day of May A. D. 1888, the Finance Committee shall examine all script, and see that the same has been duly registered as provided in section two, of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be stamped across the face, registered and signed by the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the City of Key West, which script or warrant, so stamped and signed, shall be returned to the holder of the receipt for said script, on or after the Fifth day of May A. D. 1888.

Fourth:—That no script, or warrant on the Treasurer, issued prior to the First Day of November, A. D. 1887, shall be receivable in payment of city taxes, licenses or any debt or demand of the City of Key West, until the same shall have been duly examined by the Finance Committee, and registered, as heretofore provided.

Fifth:—It shall be the duty of the Clerk of said city to keep a warrant registered in which shall be entered a record of all script, or warrants issued after the First Day of November and said record to contain in proper columns, the number of the script or warrant, the date, to whom payable, amount, and for what purpose.

Sixth:—That no Tax Collector, Marshal, Clerk or other officer of said City of Key West, shall receive any script or warrant, issued prior to the First Day of November, A. D. 1887 in payment of any taxes, licenses or any other debts or demands of said City, unless said script or warrant shall be duly stamped registered, and signed by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, heretofore provided; and any Tax Collector, Clerk, or other officer of said city violating this ordinance, shall upon conviction, be fined not exceeding five hundred dollars.

Seventh:—That all laws or parts of laws, in conflict with this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed.

Passed the Board of Aldermen this 3rd day of November 1887.

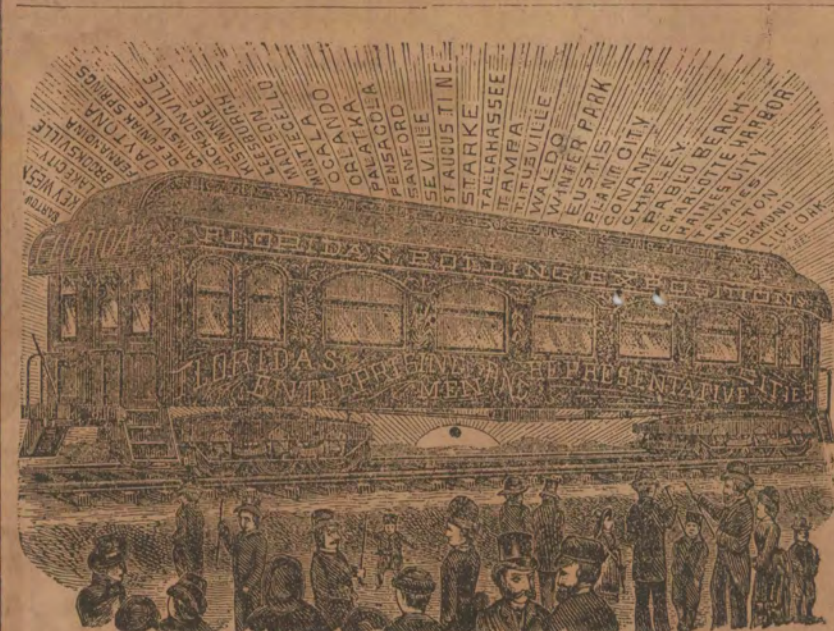
