ISLAND CITY BANK SELLS LAST BONDS

Last Of Issue Of \$192,000
Sold By Local Bank
Last Wednesday.

Bonds issued by the City of Key West to the amount of \$192,000 for paving and sewerage and purchased by the Island City National Bank at par have all been disposed of by the local bank, the last lot of \$63,000 worth having been sold Wednesday. It is not thought that the Island City Bank made any money out of this deal, or but very little at any rate, but officials of the bank are much pleased over the prestige which the engineering of a deal of this calibre gives the bank.

It will be remembered that at the time the Board of Public Works called for bids on the bonds, but one bid was offered which could be accepted under the City Charter, that instrument requiring that bonds be sold at not less than par. This bid was rejected. The local bank then took the matter up and submitted their proposition which was accepted, the actual work of paving following later.

COAL MINERS MAY COME TO TERMS SOON

Situation in England Is Not So Acute As Some Days Ago

New York, Mar. 14.—Despatches to the coal operators who are in accord with the Pennsylvania and the Philadelphia Reading Railroads say that a justment of the pending international coal strike may come within a week.

The English situation, the dispatches say, is not quite as serious as it was yesterday.

Satisfactory progress has been made this morning at the conference between striking coal miners and owners, under auspices of government officials.

Premier Asquith at noon expressed gratification with the conference trend. It seemed to point to a way to peace in the coal strike.

As a consequence of the strike the distress which has been caused throughout England, Scotland and Wales from the strike is growing acute, more particularly in Wales. In that country, practically the whole life of the people depends upon the output of the coal mines.

In the city of Cardiff alone, the chief constant reports 700 families in immediate need of relief, and in all the mining towns, now that the strike is any that the strike has been out down for the miners' union, there will be need of coal unless the settlement of the dispute is reached at once.

The men on the railroads and those connected with other industries are now being discharged daily by hundreds, the notices to quit which were given them when the coal strike began now are resounding.

In Germany the strike situation in some aspects, is more threatening than in England.

At Hamburg, where fighting occurred between the strikers and the police yesterday, large reinforcements of police have arrived. During the night the strikers repeatedly bombarded the police, escorting the non-striking, throwing bottles and stones from the upper windows of the house as they passed along the streets. A large body of strikers also demolished a number of gas lamps in the town, and many of the merchants were forced to barricade their stores. Order has been restored in the town today.

As regards the United States nothing definite can be learned. However, unless things are adjusted by April 1, the English situation may have a duplicate there.

CHINA IS ORIGINAL JAPAN IS IMITATIVE

So Says Much Travelled Visitor To Key West at Jefferson Yesterday.

One of the most accomplished and cosmopolitan visitors that ever came to Key West was at the Jefferson last night, a person of Rev. M. J. Savage, D. D., formerly pastor of the Unitarian Church, corner Park Avenue and 34th street, New York. This is Dr. Savage's first visit to Key West, and he is accompanied by his wife. The Doctor, through ill-health, was forced to give up his charge in New York, and for the past six years he has done little but travel. But let him speak for himself.

"I have not been long enough in Key West to form any opinion of your city," he said. We came down from Palm Beach this evening. Yesterday we had the pleasure of spending some time with Mr. Flagler, the creator of this Wonderful Florida East Coast Ry., and the magician who touched the entire Florida east coast into life and made it the Fairyland of the world.

To say I was surprised at your wonderful Sea Going railway is to express it feebly. Mrs. Savage and I have been almost everywhere, but we never saw anything in the engineering world comparable to it.

We are just completing our trip around the world. We left New York a year and a half ago. Went across the Atlantic, and travelled through Europe, where we spent three months. London, Paris, Berlin, Vienna—we saw them all. We even ventured into the realms of the Sultan—saw Constantinople with its Mosques and the beautiful Bosphorus. We toured through Greece, Sicily, Tunis; saw Algiers; went up the Nile and viewed the Pyramids, the Sphinx, and the ruins of Thebes and Karnak.

We saw the sacred land of Palestine, and journeyed to Damascus, on the road to which Saul, the persecutor, met the Lord and was transformed into Paul, the aggressive Christian.

After leaving the Holy Land we went through the wonderful Suez Canal—and to summarize, travelled through India, Ceylon, Burmah, the Malay States and Java, and stopped off at Singapore, Hong Kong, Manila, Tien Tsin, Peking, Port Arthur, Tokyo, Yokahama, thence across to Honolulu, and the broad Pacific to our dear land of the Stars and Stripes.

"What impressed us most during our travels?" said Dr. Savage, in answer to an inquiry. "Well, I should say China. A wonderful country. A wonderful people. There is much talk before the reading public of every nation in the world. Let me tell you—and I speak with the deepest conviction. Whatever Japan knows, she borrowed from China. The Japanese are imitators; the Chinese are creators. Chinese honor is, as a has been one of the admirable characteristics of this wonderful people.

As a word I would say, with emphasis, that of the nations would only keep their hands off China, China would work out her own destiny with consummate credit to herself."

Dr. and Mrs. Savage go over to Havana today, and will tour through Cuba.
