GENERAL ESTENOZ IS DEAD AND BODY BURIED IN CAVE

Rebels, Who Surrender Themselves, State That
Rebel Leader Succumbed to Wounds Received in
Fight With Col. Valiente on June 13th

AMERICAN MARINES MAY HAVE BIG BATTLE SHORTLY

Report Says That Fifteen Hundred Rebels Are Prepar-
ing to Attack American Marines at El Cuero—
Minor Skirmishes Reported

Santiago de Cuba, June 18.—Evaristo Estenoz, leader of the negro insurrectos, was reported to be dead and buried in a cave, to have led a band in a fight with federalists under Major Figueroa, and to have written a letter to Consul Holaday threatening dire things unless the Americans intervened in the situation.

Several rebels who gave themselves up today and were brought here, declared that Evaristo Estenoz was dead. They said that he succumbed to the wounds he received in the fight with Valiente on the 13th and was buried in a cave. General Montegudo will probably send a detachment of troops to the place in an attempt to verify the report. One of the men says he knows the location of the cave and is willing to act as guide.

The total of the rebels who have taken advantage of General Montegudo's offer of clemency and surrendered, was given today as 384. This includes the 150 who are reported to have surrendered to Colonel Valiente, but have not arrived here. There are three more days in which the negroes can take advantage of Montegudo's offer.

Persons arriving here from Palma Soriano state that the proprietor of the sugar mill Hatillo has received a warning from the rebel chief Antomarchi stating that he will burn the property. The letter has been sent to General Montegudo.

The commander of the federal forces at San Luis has received a message from the rebel chief Tito Fernandez, stating that he desires to take advantage of the Montegudo amnesty. He was notified that he would be allowed clemency provided he came in with his party.

Ross E. Holaday, American consul here, has received another letter purporting to be signed by Estenoz. It accuses the federal troops of committing the crimes ascribed to the negroes. It alleged that at Ramon de las Yaguez the troops burned 120 houses of persons who were not involved in the uprising. In another instance the writer says that the federalists killed a father and two of his children less than ten years old and outraged several girls.

The letter offers to prove the assertions made provided the Americans will send a representative to the woods to confer with him.

Estenoz, if he wrote the letter, declares that he will not treat with any one but the Americans under any circumstances, because he considers the Cuban government unreliable.

Estenoz informs the consul that it is the intention of General Montegudo to order several of his men to burn a few American properties for the purpose of laying the blame on the rebels and cause the Americans to be enraged at the negroes.

The writer states that the rebels will never lay down their arms until they obtain what they want. He calls on the United States for justice saying that the American authorities during the last intervention recognized their party and should, therefore, not permit the present government to abuse the race.

The writer concludes with the statement that it was his intention to start a race war and it was still against his desire, but that he will be compelled to do so if the federal troops do not cease their present tactics.

A report that the rebels were 1,500 strong at El Cuero and preparing to attack the American marines who are camped about the mines there, was not verified.

Lacoste, the paralytic negro leader, who was brought in yesterday, is attended at the hospital by two white nurses. His family is allowed to be with him.

Several skirmishes were reported to the general headquarters during the day. As usual the casualties were given in vague terms and there were no reports of federal dead or injured. Major Figueroa reported a short fight on the Gaityare farm on Sunday with a group of negroes which he dispersed. He says: "We took a loaded pack horse carrying documents and other effects, arms, munitions, nineteen horses, and we also caused some casualties."

Major Sanguily reports that his troops fought a band commanded by a negro named Zapata who styles himself a brigadier general. The "general" was the only one of his party to be killed, according to the report.

NAVAL MILITIA HAVE GOOD TIME ON CRUISE

Play Ball at Marathon And Are
Beaten by the Husky
Railroaders

The first cruise of the local Naval Militia ended yesterday afternoon at five o'clock, when their little boat, the Mackenzie, tied up to the government dock.

The Mackenzie left here at daylight on Monday morning with thirty-four members of the Naval Militia on board, en route to Miami, but owing to the blower on the forced draft working badly, they put into Boot Key harbor to make repairs. During the several hours required by the engineers division to make the repairs, the deck division was given liberty, and several of the members went to Marathon, where they arranged for a ball game to be played on the following afternoon. It was then decided to give up the proposed trip to Miami, and remain at Boot Key, where the officials of the extension camp extended them every courtesy. On Tuesday morning a short cruise was made in the neighborhood waters for the purpose of testing the blower. Everything proved to be in excellent working condition and they returned to Boot Key at noon, where liberty was given again. The ball game in the afternoon was pulled off according to schedule, and ended in a victory for the railroaders who won by a score of 7 to 5. In the evening Ray Navarro, Frank Curry and Harry Sawyer, who had been granted special leave, left for Miami.

Yesterday morning, the supply of provisions being nearly exhausted, it was decided to return to Key West. The start was made at 11:30 a. m. and completed here without accident.

The mayor of Songo reports that he has been able to attend to the refugees up to the present time, but that the town's funds are exhausted and suffering is likely to result unless help comes.

GOVERNOR HADLEY SHOWS UP AS THE REPUBLICANS DARK HORSE

Is Given Cheer After Cheer and Hailed as Next
President--Roosevelt Forces Fail to Unseat Taft
Delegates--Motion Debated Three Hours

WILDEST SCENES ATTENDED CONVENTION YESTERDAY

Roosevelt Delegates Form Procession and March Round
and Round the Hall Causing Wildest Excitement--
Convention Adjourned at 5:30 p. m.

Chicago, Ill., June 19.—The greatest interest and excitement attended the republican national convention here today. The convention assembled at 11:15 a. m., and soon afterwards took up the Governor Hadley motion to oust ninety-two Taft delegates and seat an equal number of Roosevelt delegates. The motion was debated three hours and finally lost by a vote of 564 to 510. During the debate Governor Hadley of Missouri was given cheer after cheer and hailed as the next president. The first demonstration of the convention followed the defeat of the motion, when the Roosevelt delegates formed into a procession and marched round and round the hall. All semblance of order was lost and the pandemonium reigned for forty-five minutes. It is the opinion of many well known politicians here that it is impossible for either Roosevelt or Taft to be nominated, and that a dark horse will come in. Governor Hadley of Missouri is receiving a big boom, and it is possible that his name before the convention as the only man who can lead the party to victory.

GREAT BRITAIN MAY PROTEST CANAL BILL

Adamson Bill Which Has
Been Passed by the House
May Effect Treaty Rights

London, June 18.—Sir Edward Grey made a statement in the house of commons this afternoon that Great Britain was watching closely the progress of American legislation regarding the Panama canal toll interests.

Sir Edward is especially interested in the Adamson bill which passed the American house of representatives yesterday. The Adamson bill provides that American vessels engaged in the coastwise trade shall be exempt from tolls in passing through the canal.

Sir Edward said that until the bill had been finally passed he would not be able to estimate the extent to which British treaty rights were affected. He said that he was unaware that there was any precedent in respect to other international waterways for such a law and intimated that Great Britain might protest against discrimination.

NEW YORK DELEGATES WILL NAME NOMINEE

Ninety Votes From New
York Will Control Democratic Convention

Baltimore, Md., June 19.—Who will get New York's vote in the national convention of the democratic party is the question being asked most, with the big gathering less than a week off. Wilson's friends are claiming that the state which is such a close neighbor, both geographically and in business interests with that of which he is governor, will certainly give its support to him. Champ Clark's supporters say the speaker of the house is sure to get the lion's share of the ninety votes which the Empire state will cast. One of the members of the national committee who has been in New York for several days, made the statement today that the Missourian is gathering strength each day and that, in his opinion, the New York delegation, as well as that of Illinois, which is pledged to Clark, will be found in the Clark column on the first ballot.

But the Gaynor boom has to be reckoned with. While the Clark forces are standing pat for the two-thirds majority rule, the Wilson and Harmon men would rather see the convention nominate with just a majority. There will be a strong opposition to any attempt to abrogate the two-thirds rule at this convention, although such an attempt is anticipated. Col. John T. MANY DAINTY DISHES

ALL SORTS OF GOOD THINGS TO SELECT FROM.

Hanoverian Steaks as the Principal Material for Dinner—Nut Brown Bread Almost as Good as Cake—Coffee Parfait.

Hanoverian steaks are little hamburger steaks, broiled and well seasoned. Over them is poured at serving time the following sauce: Brown in one tablespoon of butter one-half cup of finely chopped onion and cook five minutes. Add four tomatoes, cut in pieces, or one cup of canned tomato. Season with salt and pepper and add one-half teaspoon of sugar. Cook for ten minutes.

Nut brown bread is a delicious adjunct to the five o'clock tea, and is quite rich enough to be used in place of cake. It slices very thin and may be made into sandwiches with cream cheese. To make it, use two cups of sour milk, one-half cup of molasses in which has been dissolved one large teaspoon of soda; one-half cup of sugar, three cups of whole wheat flour, one teaspoon salt. Mix thoroughly and add one cup of walnut meats cut in small pieces, but not chopped, over which has been sprinkled one teaspoon of sifted flour. Pour into a bread pan and bake in a slow oven for one hour.

Sugared strips are made when making the rhubarb pie for dinner. Roll out the left-over paste, cut in two even pieces, spread one with jam, lay the other strip over, sprinkle with granulated sugar, cut in finger lengths and brown in a hot oven. The sugar will melt and caramelize. These are also nice with afternoon tea.

Coffee Parfait.—Boil one cup of water with one cup of sugar until it will spin a thread. Pour slowly over the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs, and when cold add one pint of cream, whipped stiff, one-half cup of very strong, black coffee and one-half teaspoon of vanilla. Put in a covered mold, pack in ice and salt and let stand for four hours.

White Nut Cake.—Cream together one-third cup of butter, one cup of sugar. Add one-half cup of sweet milk, two cups of flour, two teaspoons of baking powder. Beat thoroughly, then add one cup of walnut meats cut

in small pieces and dusted with one teaspoon of flour, and at the last fold in the stiffly beaten whites of three eggs. Bake in a square pan in a slow oven for one hour. Cover with boiled icing and decorate with halves of walnut meats.

Risotto.—Parboil for ten minutes one cup of rice. Drain, blanch with water and let drain again. Put two tablespoons of butter in a frying pan, trim in the rice, add two tablespoons of chopped onion, one cup of thick tomatoes, one and one-half teaspoons of salt, a little paprika and two and one-half cups of water. Cover and let cook slowly until the rice is tender and the water absorbed. Take up on a hot serving dish, sprinkle over one-half cup of grated cheese, stir with fork and serve very hot.

Curried Eggs.—Hard boil three eggs. Make a white sauce of one tablespoon of butter, one of flour and one cup of milk. Stir till thick and smooth, add one-half teaspoon of salt and one-half teaspoon of curry powder. Cut the eggs in eighths and add to the sauce and pour over slices of toast.

How to Clean Oil Lamp Burner.
Cut up some little potatoes in an old kettle with water and put in the lamp burners and let boil with the potatoes all morning or longer if they are very black. This will cook the black off the burners. Then take an old tooth brush, then put in hot soap water before they dried, and a large chicken feather is nice to clean where you cannot use a brush. I have cleaned my lamp burners this way for years. After they are clean they look like new burners. This is an old recipe that I read about twenty years ago in a household paper.—Exchange.

Cream of Asparagus Soup.
For this the canned article may be used. Drain the liquor into a sauce pan and save. Cut off the tips and save these, rub the stocks through a coarse sieve, heat the can liquor in a double boiler with three cups of milk, blend two tablespoonfuls of flour with two tablespoonfuls of cooking oil or butter and pour the heated milk upon it. Return to boiler and cook until smooth and creamy; add the asparagus pulp and heat again, then add the seasoning and the tips.

Crumb Cakes.
For three people: One cup of crumbs

Take of burnt alum one teaspoonful, the same of burnt borax, put in a dish or bowl with one teaspoonful of white sugar, the same of boiling water; grate ½ nutmeg into this and let cool; bottle and shake before using. Dose—give one teaspoonful three times daily.

Tape for Hems.
The use of tape for hems for children's yokes where they are closed makes a very neat finish, as there are no bulging double edges, and it makes the yoke stronger where the hooks and eyes or buttons are attached.

Bacon Curls and Corn Fritters.
Cut breakfast bacon in very thin slices and remove rind. Place in a hot pan and during the cooking shape in curls, using a knife and fork for this. Drain on white paper.

PLEA FOR MORE BOILED MEAT
Average Housekeeper Is Inclined to Boil Little Value of This Method of Cooking.

If you scorn boiled beef, either through ignorance of its nutritive value or because the cheaper cuts may be used, here is enlightenment: One of the most eminent physicians of Carlsbad says boiling is by far the best way to cook meats.

That it is most economical, since no part of its juices are lost, and that flank, a cheap cut, is one of the best pieces for boiling, every good housekeeper knows.

The family with small income or even average income should use boiled meats instead of expensive steaks as one of the first steps toward reducing the cost of living, and it can be done without robbing the table of needed nourishment.

Recipe for Boiled Beef.—Two pounds and a half for small family, or five pounds for medium, should be selected, the beef removed from butcher's paper at once, then wiped. The membrane is then removed, the meat shaped, stuffed, tied and then skewered. Cover with a cloth, place in kettle, cover with boiling water, bring to boiling point and cook just below the boiling point five or six hours until tender. Simmered beef would be a more correct term than boiled beef, but it is ordinarily known as boiled beef.

Season with salt one-half hour before serving. Reserve liquor for mak-

ing gravies and soups. Boiled beef should have a rich well seasoned gravy served with it.

HOUSEHOLD QUESTIONS

Stains may be removed from the zinc tops of kitchen tables with vinegar.

Potato balls which are sauted in butter after being boiled are delicious. They should be served with a generous sprinkling of minced parsley.

When making baked or boiled custard the milk to be used should be scalded and set aside to cool. Then make the custard in the ordinary way and it will be perfectly smooth.

If one cupful of vinegar is put with the water in which colored table cloths are washed it will prevent the color from running. Iron when still damp and they will look equal to new.

To make string beans or cabbage tender in cooking them and also to shorten the time required for cooking the latter vegetable add a pinch of baking soda to the water in which they are boiled. This, used judiciously, makes the vegetables as fresh and tender as when they came from the garden.

New Kind of Syrup.

To make syrup that epicures can not tell from genuine maple syrup boil a dozen dark corncobs in a gallon of water for two hours; strain the liquid, measure, take twice as much granulated sugar, juice of one-half lemon or a tablespoon strong vinegar (to keep syrup from turning back to sugar); boil five minutes.

In making the above or plain sugar syrup, it is not necessary to add vinegar or lemon juice if the ingredients are put together when cold and stirred occasionally (not boiled).—Home Department in National Magazine.

until soft. Drain off the water and add the tomato pulp, drained of extra juice, and one-half cupful of grated cheese. Season highly with paprika and add salt to taste. Fill the tomato cases with the mixture, sprinkle tops with bread crumbs, add a nut of butter to each and bake half an hour.

Sweet Muffins.
One-half cupful of butter rubbed to a cream. One-half cupful of sugar stirred into the butter. Add two well beaten eggs, stir and mix thoroughly. Add one cupful of sweet milk, three and three-quarters of a cupful of winter wheat flour. Three rounded teaspoonfuls of baking powder should be sifted into the flour after measuring, and the flour and the baking powder sifted together into the muffin mixture. Bake in gem pans about twenty minutes.

Baked Halibut Steaks.

Trim the steaks, lay them on a roasting pan and for two pounds use one cup of cream, one teaspoonful of flour, one tablespoonful of butter, one teaspoonful of salt and one teaspoonful of pepper. Dredge the steaks with the flour, add the seasoning and dot with the butter, then pour over the cream and bake fifteen minutes in a quick oven.

Keeps Skillets and Griddles Like New.

Every housewife knows that every iron or steel utensil will become a solid mass of burned grease on the outside and sometimes on the inside. To clean them place them in a hot fire until they are redhot or until white ashes form over them. Remove and when cold wash and you have a new skillet or griddle.

Salt will remove a fresh ink stain from a carpet.

Fish is very unwholesome when not well cooked, as well as unpalatable.

When making meringue use granulated sugar in preference to powdered sugar.

Salmon which is to be fed to an invalid should be wrapped in greased paper and lightly broiled.

Window glass should not be cleansed with soap, as this treatment renders the glass cloudy. A little borax or household ammonia may be added to warm water.

An excellent substitute for cloths in window washing is an old newspaper or a chamouis skin, which should be wrung from the water and passed rapidly over the glass.

To remove a rusty screw, apply a hot iron to its head for a few minutes and then remove it in the usual way with a screw driver. The screw will then come out easily.

Both water and chamouis should be clean and the water should be changed as often as it becomes cloudy. A soft cloth moistened in alcohol and rubbed on glass adds luster to it.

If you would preserve the appearance of the wooden utensils in the kitchen always remember to wash them directly after they are used, because if grease and dirt are allowed to soak in it may be impossible to remove them.

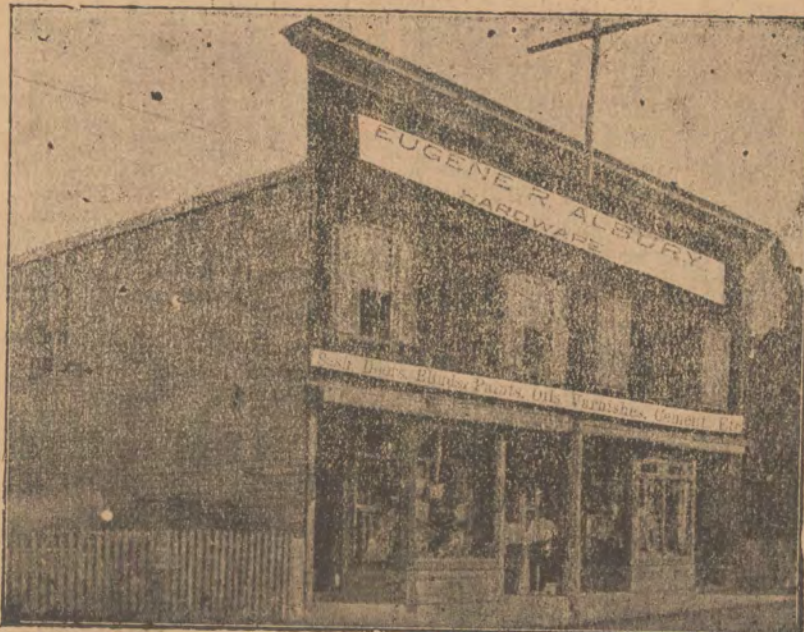

NOTED FLORIDA CITY

St. Augustine Was Once an Indian Village.

First Colony Established by French Huguenots in 1564 Was Razed by the Spaniards and Its Inhabitants Killed.

St. Augustine, Fla.—Four centuries ago an Indian town known as Seloy stood on the site of what is now St. Augustine. On Easter Sunday, 1512, Ponce de Leon, Spanish explorer, landed there in search of the "Fountain of Youth." After he and his men had floundered through the sandy swamps of the vicinity and tramped among the scrub palmetto, bathed in every stream, pool and mudhole they came across, without success, they embarked and the Indian village remained unmolested by white men for more than fifty years.

A colony of French Huguenots landed at the same point in 1564, but soon moved on to the St. John's river. The news of their arrival reached Phillip II. of Spain, and upon realizing the full import of the message—that a colony of Protestants was settling in his new world domain—he dispatched Pedro Menendez to exterminate them.

This second group of invading Spaniards landed at the same Indian village on August 25, 1565, and because that was St. Augustine's day upon the church calendar they gave the place its present name. St. Augustine is consequently the oldest permanent settlement of Europeans within the territory of the United States. The Huguenot settlement was not permanent for the reason that Menendez and his men destroyed their fort and massacred the inhabitants.

The first fort was built in octagonal form and was constructed of the trunks of pine trees. It was named San Juan de Pinos (St. John of the

pine). An engraving of the fort shows it was in this shape when Sir Francis Drake attacked St. Augustine in 1586. The fort was again attacked in 1665 by John Davis, freebooter and buccaneer. The people fled to the woods while Davis pillaged the town. Later the fort was rebuilt and named Fort Marion, now the property of the federal government, and maintained chiefly as an interesting antique. Thousands of persons visit it annually.

In its early life St. Augustine was the most cosmopolitan city in the land and all because of a mixed colony of Minorcans, Italians, Greeks and natives of southern European countries brought to the state in 1769 as laborers for an indigo plantation owned by English capitalists. They settled in New Smyrna, but soon rebelled against their English employers. That probably was the first organized labor strike in North America.

Moving to St. Augustine, where they were allotted land and given protection, the indigo plantation workers intermarried with the Spanish and English residents and their descendants form a large proportion of the population of the present city.

In 1821 the United States paid Spain \$5,000,000 for the territory of Florida and General Andrew Jackson became its first governor.

Indian, pirate, Spaniard, British invader—each in turn has scourged the town, but after the passing of each it has arisen better than before, changed, but each time improved in character. From the Indian village of Seloy, through four centuries of battle and change to the quaint old town with its foreign airs, St. Augustine has become a fashionable winter resort.

Pulpit Bar to Legacy.

Boulder, Colo.—The \$50,000 will of the late John L. Church, wealthy cattleman, has been filed for probate in the county court. This will include a \$10,000 cash bequest to his wife and \$5,000 to Mrs. A. J. Whiting, a niece. The remainder is to be divided among grand-nieces and grand-nephews after Mrs. Church's death. A peculiar provision of the will is that the nephews forfeit their shares if they become ministers of the gospel. Mr. Church had no deep-rooted feeling against the clergy, but wanted the boys to follow business careers.

Chinese Kill 3,000.

Calcutta.—The latest version of the fighting between the Chinese and Tibetans, which comes from Gyangze, is that Lhasa is besieged and is burning. Two thousand Chinese with Maxim guns mowed down 3,000 Tibetans, including many women and children.

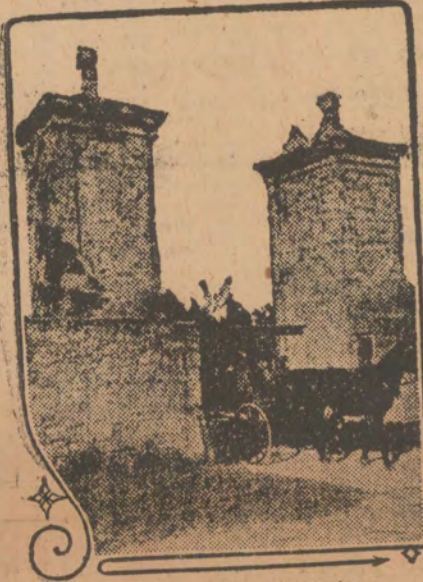

The same statute was re-enacted by Henry IV., but all attempts to coerce Englishmen into giving up football were hopeless tasks.—London Chronicle.

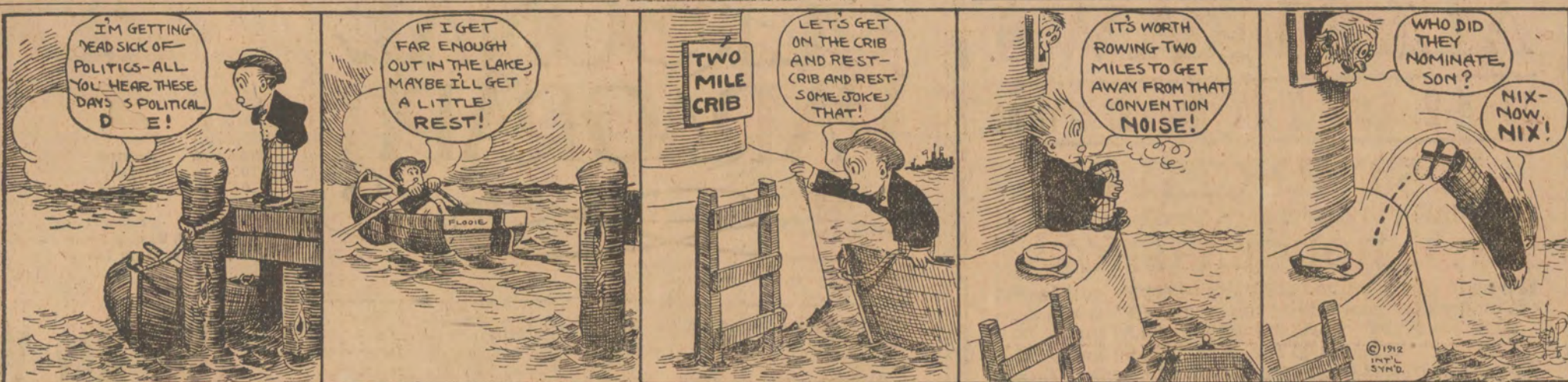

Scoop Couldn't Get Away From That NOISE

CARE OF REFRIGERATOR

SHOULD BE THOROUGHLY WASH-ED OUT TWICE A WEEK.

Cleanliness Is Important in Keeping Food Untainted by Various Odors—Ammonia Water Is Best for Washing the Box.

Twice a week at least take out all food and wash the box with strong ammonia water. Don't use soap except when things have been spilled. Work quickly, using hot water and wringing the cloth out well. Wash removable shelves at the sink, keeping the door of the ice box closed. Care must be taken that particles of food are not pushed into the crevices and allowed to remain. Sometimes a lining of galvanized tin becomes dark looking. This is dirt. It should be scrubbed off thoroughly at the beginning of the season with scouring soap or powder, and if the box is looked after systematically it will not appear again.

Food spilled by chance at any time must be washed up at once.

Flush the drain pipes at least every other day. Remember the ice often deposits soil. Use boiling water for this. Buy a brush like those employed for baby bottles, but with longer handle, that will extend down the drain pipe. Between applications of boiling water use the brush. You will be amazed at the dirt it collects. Put ammonia or sal soda in the water and pour it from a utensil with a small mouth like a teakettle. Use two quarts, at least.

Don't use wooden or tin dishes for

putting away food. Both create odors. If possible, have a set of common earthenware dishes solely for icebox use. Keep butter and milk in separate compartments. Otherwise keep them tightly covered. Both absorb odors quickly.

Don't put foods wrapped in paper in the icebox. Paper gives out a pungent odor.

Always close the door of an icebox as quickly as possible. Take out all that will be needed in the preparation of a meal at one time, if you can. Figure on what is wanted before opening the door. It will save ice.

Many housekeepers advise keeping a lump of charcoal in the icebox all the time to purify it and absorb odors. If the box is kept clean by regular washings, the right dishes used, and care exercised in shortening the stay of strong-smelling vegetables in it uncovered, there will be no odors to absorb.

Puree of Split Peas.

One cupful of split peas, two cupfuls of water (for soaking), two tablespoonfuls of butter, two teaspoonfuls of salt, pepper to taste, water as needed. Soak the peas in two cupfuls of water over night. In the afternoon pour off any remaining water and measure the peas. They will increase to more than twice their bulk; measure and add same amount of water. Cover and set on slow fire to simmer for at least three hours. They must be soft, so they can be run through fruit press. Now add butter and seasoning to strained pulp and serve as soon as all has boiled up once. Standing thickens this soup; so if it has to stand and gets too thick, add a little more water. Serve with croutons or bread-fingers.

Salad Eggs.

Put a layer of cream or Neufchatel cheese into a tablespoon and hollow the center. Fill with chopped celery mixed with mayonnaise and cover with more cheese, rounding it over like an egg. Slip the cheese off on to a cup of lettuce leaves. If the celery is sliced crosswise in thin slices it will be better than when chopped. Very large stalks must be split to convenient size before slicing. In making a delicate salad one can afford time to prepare the materials just right.

French Omelet.

Beat four eggs lightly, whites and yolks together. Add four tablespoonfuls of cream, a teaspoonful of salt and paprika or white pepper. Put a teaspoonful of butter on a clean hot omelet pan and turn in the eggs. Pick up the cooked eggs from the center with a fork, allowing the uncooked to run under. Continue until the entire mixture is soft and creamy. Place over a hot fire to set and brown. Fold and turn out on a hot platter.

Chocolate Sauce.

Take one cupful of milk, two tablespoonfuls of grated chocolate, three tablespoonfuls of sugar, one teaspoonful of cornstarch and one teaspoonful of vanilla. Combine all the dry ingredients. Moisten with the milk to form a paste. Heat the remainder of the milk, stir in the paste and let boil until it thickens. Add flavor, then cool, beating from time to time as it cools.

Beet Relish.

One quart boiled chopped beets, one quart raw cabbage, one cup grated horseradish, one-half cup granulated

sugar, one tablespoon of salt, one teaspoon of black pepper, pinch of cayenne. Cover with vinegar and keep from air.

When You Want a White Dress.

To take the color entirely out of a cotton dress, after it has become somewhat faded, boil the dress in cream of tartar water. A perfectly white dress results.

Improved Form of Lighting.

A new kind of light has been developed in France for use in light-houses, where the use of electric lamps presents some disadvantages. The lamp in question has a number of filaments mounted somewhat after the fashion of the fibers of an incandescent gas mantle. In this way a very strong light is secured which, moreover, has the desirable property of being very uniform in all parts of the circumference. According to recent trials, the new type of lamp gave twenty times as much light as a Welch burned and required very little attention. The lamp is particularly adapted for shore lighthouses, which are easily placed in communication with electric light mains.

Inventions of Esquimaux.

A collection of Esquimaux inventions, now on exhibition at the Affiliated Colleges, San Francisco, substantiates the claim that the Esquimaux is the most able inventor and skilled engineer among uncivilized people. In support of this the collection includes the first form of the oil heater and cook stove, water-tight boat, arch used for building purposes, and waterproof overcoats, as well as the most perfect types ever developed of the fish spear, spear thrower and harpoon. The smoking pipes form a link with Asia and their carvings with prehistoric Europe.

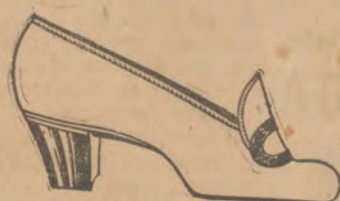
