WILL ISSUE BONDS TO POSTAL BANKS

Depositors Must File Their
Applications Before or
By June 1st

Of the interest to the many depositors in the local branch of the Postal Savings Bank is the announcement by the Federal Government, of Postal Savings bonds, drawing interest of 2 1/2 per cent per annum.

These bonds constitute the safest investment in the world, being backed by the Government of the United States, and will prove a boon to the small investors as well as the large. The bonds are to be issued in the denominations of \$20, \$100 and \$500. No bonds will be issued to others than depositors in the Postal Savings Banks, and only funds deposited in these banks may be converted into Postal Savings bonds.

The bonds are exempt from all taxes and duties of the United States, as well as from taxation in any form by or under any state.

Applications for the conversion of deposits into bonds on July 1, 1912, must be received on or before June 1, 1912, by the postmaster at the depository office where the certificates were issued.

ANTHONY J. PENT DIED AT HIS HOME LAST NIGHT

Said To Have Been The First
White Child Born On The
Island of Key West

Anthony J. Pent, aged 88 years, 10 months and 7 days, died last night at 8 o'clock at his home, 1119 Petronia St. The funeral will be held this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from Memorial Church, Rev. T. H. Sittrunk officiating. The interment will be in the City Cemetery under the direction of undertaker Benj. Lopez.

Anthony J. Pent is said to have been the first white child born on the island of Key West, the date of his birth being July 9th, 1825. He was 38 years old when the Civil War broke out. During his long life he lived to see many great changes in this country.

CONGRESS IS RUSHING TO GO TO CONVENTION

Lawmakers May After All
Decide to Adjourn For
About Two Weeks

Washington, May 14.—Plans for the expedition of legislation to allow congress to adjourn prior to the national conventions were considered by the leaders in both houses today.

"According to our program we will be able to adjourn June 15," said Chairman Underwood tonight.

The senate leaders were unable to reach definite conclusions, but some of the senators expressed the opinion that June 15 is out of the question.

TROOPS COMING HOME.

Washington, May 16.—An army transport will sail from Manila today with the Second Cavalry and the Nineteenth Infantry on board.

Instead of waiting until the 15th of September to complete the withdrawal of infantry and cavalry regiments from the Philippines, as originally proposed under the reorganization plans, the last of those coming home will be embarked a month from today, when the Sixth and Ninth Infantry will sail from Manila.

THE DESPERATE ACT OF A JEALOUS WIFE

Mrs. Swilley Committed
Suicide By Drinking Poi-
son In Jacksonville

The Times-Union of Wednesday has the following article concerning the rash act of a jealous and despondent wife:

"See that girl over there. She is the best sweetheart I ever had," is said to have been the statement of Hampton Swilley to his wife at the Orsich Farm last Sunday evening, and his disappearance from the home of W. F. Harvey, 233 Winter street, on the same day, is believed to have brought such pangs of despair to the heart of Mrs. Beatrice Swilley that she sought a solace in suicide early Tuesday morning. The night before when the husband did not return home at a reasonable time, she is said to have taken a quantity of laudanum. The attention of a physician, who was summoned immediately, foiled this attempt and the despondent woman is said to have slept until early Tuesday.

Her suicidal intentions then are said to be borne out by the fact of her handing her hostess a letter to her husband just before she entered her room. Mr. and Mrs. Harvey gave the matter their attention and the first attempt at suicide was foiled.

But Tuesday morning she got up early and went out to the Dunlop Pharmacy, corner of Riverside avenue and Forest street, where she secured seven and a half grains of strychnine. She swallowed this and a short while later she was found in a dying condition.

SIX AND EIGHT PER CENT. WATERWORKS AND FIRE PROTECTION BONDS WILL BE RETIRED

Will Make New Issue of Refunding Bonds Amount-
ing to \$129,400 and Bearing Interest at Rate of 5 per
cent Per Annum—Farson To Refund Bonds

NEW TRAFFIC ORDINANCE DISCUSSED LAST NIGHT

Dumping of Trash at Foot of Margaret Street Said to be a Public Nuisance—Residents of William Street Wanted to Know Why Their Street Was Not Paved

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last night at City Hall. The meeting was called to order at 8:40 with Councilman Chas. W. Lowe in the chair. Those present besides the chairman were Councilmen W. M. Pinder, J. R. Valdez, E. E. Ingraham and W. B. Curry. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved.

A petition was read from residents on William St., which was also a protest, calling attention to a former petition and stating that at that time the Council had promised to pave William St. next, that the Grinnell St. petition had come in later and that the street had been paved. Councilman Ingraham explained the Council's position in the matter by stating that the city only had money enough to pave two blocks, and there for had paved Grinnell St. He stated further that two petitions had been received prior to the William St. petition, one from the residents of Eaton St. and the other from Whitehead St. asking that these streets be paved, and that the Council could handle neither. On motion duly carried it was decided to inform the petitioners that as soon as the Board of Public Works collects sufficient money, William St. and other streets will be paved.

A petition was read from the residents of the fifth precinct requesting that the No. 1 fire engine which is now in commission again, be stationed in the fifth precinct as a protection against fire. On motion this petition was referred to the fire committee.

A communication was read from Hamilton Pinder asking to lease the

foot of Petronia St. for the purpose of erecting a bath house on the beach. The Clerk was instructed to call for bids on the lease of the foot of this street for the purpose mentioned.

Several communications and telegrams were read by the auditor from D. M. Farson of Chicago in which he offers to refund the present 6 and 8 per cent water-works and fire protection bonds at par value for a commission of one and one-half per cent.

City Attorney Semple read a resolution providing that an issue of refunding bonds amounting to \$129,400 bearing 5 per cent interest per annum be issued, retiring the old six and eight per cent bonds. It was moved that this resolution be adopted. Mr. Semple then read a resolution that the D. M. Farson proposition be accepted. The resolution was adopted.

Councilman Lowe, chairman of the fire committee reported that No. 1 engine was in excellent condition again and ready for use.

Councilman Ingraham called attention to the rubbish being dumped at the foot of Margaret St. and said it was a public nuisance. Councilman Pinder, chairman of the sanitary committee said he would investigate the matter at once.

There was some discussion about a new traffic ordinance being written. On motion, it was decided that suggestions from hack drivers and others interested would be accepted. The new ordinance would cover cab stands, speed, lights etc. After some further discussion the meeting adjourned.

Sponsor For Battleship
Texas, Her Father, Roosevelt
And Taft Mixed Up

Washington, D. C., May 16.—Secretary Meyer this afternoon made public correspondence between himself and Governor Colquitt of Texas showing it was the governor who requested the designation of Miss Claudia Tyson, daughter of Cecil Lyon, republican national committee man from that state to act as sponsor at the launching of the battleship Texas on May 18.

The letters were made public following statements printed this morning to the effect that the navy department had selected Miss Lyon and that the action of her father in deserting the Taft cause for the Roosevelt campaign had brought on a social crisis in the administration. Secretary Meyer also said that it was his intention, despite the published statement to the contrary, to attend the launching of the Texas at Newport News, Va., next week.

The reason for going before the Supreme Court was the need of hurrying matters, and as Chairman Price is also a judge he is disqualified from acting.

Gibbons will ask Judge Call, of Jacksonville, for a mandamus. Prominent men here regret that the Supreme Court failed to hand down an opinion on that very point today as a precedent is needed.

Another reason for not first bringing action in a circuit court is the likelihood of an appeal which might prevent or hold up the record of the primary and invalidate the first primary returns.

SHIPS WILL TAKE NINE HOURS LONGER TO CROSS

Steamship Companies of New
York and Liverpool Reach
Agreement

New York, May 16.—Nine hours longer will be required by steamers to cross the Atlantic on the new course of travel agreed on by the various steamship companies in New York and Liverpool. This is the second change in the route since the loss of the Titanic. At the first change the distance was sixty miles farther south and this course was decided on April 19. The last course will be seventy miles still farther south, and will make the trip much longer. The changes have been made on account of icebergs being reported many miles farther south than they have been seen since records have been taken. This change will assure greater safety for the passengers and will be of great benefit to the steamship companies.

FIGHTING MACHINES.

It is a half century since Ericsson's Monitor was launched. We have just passed the anniversary of that event. It was an evolution in the art of naval armament which at the time seemed to promise a permanent change in theory and practice. What the Monitor did for us in the crisis which it was designed to meet is matter of history, says the Boston Post. That low-lying, vicious craft was perhaps the salvation of our navy. But what a change in the years that have since elapsed! The Monitor type has gone to the scrap heap, and the massive, towering, stupendous dreadnought has taken its place. Torpedoboats have come in, followed by torpedo destroyers. And the range of naval operations has been extended. Every maritime nation has equipped itself with submarines, and the very latest is a submarine that can fight above the water and descend with safety after delivering the fire of its battery. Under the water and above the land in the air the power of destruction is extending. What is the end of this development of the means of devastation? Logically, is it not the establishment of universal peace as an international duty?

What is needed by most men who have passed middle age is more physical exercise. Their younger days have as a rule constituted a period of physical activity. If their occupations have not supplied sufficient activity they have danced or rowed or ridden horseback or run races, or in some way found a method of providing a considerable amount of exercise, and this has developed a surplus of reserve energy which is maintained while continuing this activity; but after they have grown into middle life, and through the press of business or an inclination to yield to the temptation to give more of their time to some other sort of pleasure, they neglect the physical exercise they have been accustomed to, and as a consequence this reserve force is drawn upon to meet the requirements of an active intellectual force, and in a few years this becomes exhausted and death is the natural result.

THEORY AND PRACTICE.
Delay has been encountered in establishing the school of journalism provided for in the will of the late Joseph Pulitzer, because of the inability of the executors and the Columbia university authorities to agree upon proper methods of instruction, says the Cincinnati Times-Star. The former favor severely practical training, while the latter would lay greater stress upon the teaching of underlying theories. It is known that Mr. Pulitzer wished to have theory and practice combined, but unfortunately he said nothing as to the proportion of each in the combination. He left that problem to be worked out by others. While it will have to be admitted that there would have been little real progress in this world of ours had it not been for the theorists, most persons will be inclined to the belief that an ounce of practice is worth a pound of theory in most of the activities of life. Especially would this be the case with a school of journalism. There it is proposed to educate young men for newspaper careers. That they should be taught something of the fundamental theories of journalism there can be no doubt, but unless they were also taught a great deal of the practical side of newspaper work no careers would be waiting for them. The average editor may admire fine theories immensely, but in practice he likes experienced men on his staff.

Surprise is frequently expressed because there are so many school children who are bad spellers, but there is a substantial reason for it. In Kansas very few of a short list of words were spelled correctly by 112 school and college students. Now these pupils are not taught the way their fathers and mothers were, says the Boston Globe. Under the old public school system there were spelling bees in the schools and the pupils took pride in excelling. Under the spelling bee system children between the ages of eight and twelve can acquire quite a large vocabulary by the practice of spelling words of several syllables. The rising generation is full of poor spellers, but it is not their fault, for little attention is paid to that accomplishment. It would be well for all teachers to put their pupils through a course of spelling every few days, and also to teach them to read aloud. Reading, writing and spelling should go hand in hand. Those lacking these accomplishments are not far removed from the illiterate class.

COLORING MATTER IN GREEN PEAS.

It was recently demonstrated at an exposition in New York that enough coloring matter is contained in a can of green peas to dye a handkerchief a deep copper color. It is not illegal to use certain dyeing and preserving materials in canned foods if they are labeled as the law requires. Appeal to the eye and sense of taste are not to be ignored, but so long as people prefer denatured flour and denatured rice because they look prettier and bright green canned goods because they look prettier it is impossible to have good nutrition with good health. It should be possible to get unpollished rice anywhere cheaper than the polished, and it should be possible to buy entire wheat anywhere, but merchants can not afford to keep such choice foods because there is little demand for them, owing to the lack of such knowledge as is daily supplied in these hints. It would be easy now to form in this city a club who could purchase the best food for themselves at reduced prices or arrange with a grocer who would gladly keep such food if he knew of the demand.
