STRIKE ALONG THE WATERFRONT IN HAVANA GROWS MORE SERIOUS AND TIES UP TRAFFIC

P. & O. Steamer From Key West Forced to land Passengers in Life Boats

TEAMSTERS ALSO ON STRIKE

Business of the Port of Havana Is Practically At a Standstill as Result of Trouble

Havana, May 7.—The general strike situation in the bay of Havana was a complicated last night by the suspension of the ferry service of the Havana Central and United railroads. All of the employees of the three ferryboats joined the stevedores and the wharfmen in their struggle.

Some three hundred additional laborers also joined the strike yesterday. They were employed as workmen on the docks of Casa Blanca, Regia and in the coal deposits. The coastwise steamer employees also quit and seven passenger steamers were tied up to their docks.

The strike of the Havana cartmen went into effect this morning. The cartmen decided to strike two days ago, but as they were bound by an agreement with the commercial organizations not to strike without forty-eight hours notice, the actual suspension of work was delayed until this morning. They will continue to ply their trade about the city, but will not go near the wharves.

The street sweepers' organization was reported last night to have promised the stevedores to join the strike. If they go out they will add several hundred more to the ranks of the strikers.

The bakers have not yet joined the strike, but are expected to go out when the call is made upon them. That they have not been called out already is said to be due to the fear of the leaders of the harbor men that such a movement would lose the strike.

The strike broke all records in one particular yesterday because for the first time in thirty-five years the passengers on the Florida steamers could not land by the regular passenger tugs, but had to come off in small launches. All passenger tugs were tied up on account of the strike. The stevedores declared that they were as anxious as the shippers to end the strike as quickly as possible and in evidence of their attitude offered to furnish the money to pay the cable tolls of the American shipping houses which are waiting for the exchange of letters with their head offices in the United States.

CUBA HAS THE CASH TO PAY OFF DEBTS

Havana, May 7.—Cuba paid \$160,041.08 yesterday on her national debt. Of this amount \$85,000 was due yesterday on the sinking fund of the \$35,000,000 loan and it was promptly met. The \$75,041.08 was due on interest for the same loan. The money was paid in cash to Upm-a and Company, the banking agents in Havana of Speyer Brothers of New York who furnished the \$35,000,000 loan to Cuba. The promptness with which the government is able to meet its indebtedness speaks well for the financial condition of the country as well as for the administration of the affairs of the government. The people of Cuba are justly proud of this condition.

W. M. TOOMER TO SPEAK HERE TONIGHT

Candidate for Congressman At Large will address the voters

Col. W. M. Toomer, according to a telegram received here yesterday, spoke in Miami last night and will arrive in Key West today and address the voters tonight. Col. Toomer is Mr. Claude L'Engle's opponent in the second primary for Congressman at Large. Although L'Engle had a great lead over all his opponents in the first primary, Toomer's race was also remarkable. When the political campaign in Florida opened up, Col. Toomer announced himself as a candidate for congress in the second Congressional district, which district is now represented in congress by Hon. Frank Clark. Later Mr. Toomer withdrew from the race. At the last moment he announced himself as a candidate for Congressman at Large and immediately began a vigorous campaign which terminated in his winning second place in the race and entering the second primary which is to be held on May 28. Col. Toomer will meet as many of the voters as possible today and speak during the evening.

STATE MEDICOS MET IN TAMPA YESTERDAY A. M.

Thirty-ninth Annual Convention of State Medical Men Is Now In Session

Tampa, May 7.—The medical men of the state gathered at the Tampa Bay Hotel this morning at 9 o'clock in their thirty-ninth annual convention. The visitors were greeted by Mayor McKay, who delivered an address of welcome and gave to them the keys of the city. An address of welcome was also given by Dr. J. E. Wallace, who represented the Hillsborough County Medical Society. The addresses were responded to by Dr. A. H. Freeman for the State Medical Society.

"THE CATHOLIC VOTE"—A POPULAR FALLACY

The reign of politics has begun, to last until the votes are counted on November 4. With it arrives the old and time-frayed speculations about the "Catholic vote." "Who is to have it?" "Can it be taken from him, or if the worst comes to the worst, can it be split?" "Who is the 'Mysterious Somebody' who controls it?" These are the questions every politician is asking; that is, every politician who does not really know better, for the fact that any one asks them proves that there is one phase, at least, of political situations concerning which he is lamentably ignorant.

Is there such a thing as a "Catholic vote?" In the theory which worries the political gentlemen there is none. That Catholics have votes like other people, yes; but that these votes are given at any one's bidding to candidates chosen by others than the voters themselves, no. Catholics vote according to their individual convictions. No one dictates to them; no one tries to do so. There are no secret underground or overground wires connecting the Vatican with the American Catholic voter, and no desire on the part of church or clergy to have them. The Catholic idea is to make honest, sane, truth-loving citizens, possessed of a right code of principles—and let the principles, plus God's grace, do the rest. The church influences men through the teachings of Christ and the dispensing of the Sacraments. If they have learned their lessons well, if they have profited by the graces gained, the church can trust them to avoid evil and do good; and, therefore, to vote right, according to their individual convictions, for good men and for wise measures. If they fail to do so, it is not the church's fault. She has no tab on any one in the voting booth. The responsibility is on the voter.

But there is such a thing as the "Catholic vote" in another sense. It is the influence, to which we have already referred, which certainly urges the majority of Catholics to vote with an eye to the moral consequences. The good Catholic feels his responsibility toward his country and his fellow citizens, as well as

Theodore Roosevelt won out over President Taft in the presidential preference primary held in Maryland today, securing sixty-six delegates, one more than is necessary to control the state convention. This means that Roosevelt will have the solid Maryland delegation at the national convention in Chicago. Champ Clark of Missouri was the choice of the Democrats of the state for the Democratic nomination.

Wilson is Leading in Texas.

Houston, May 7.—Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey appears to be the choice of Texas Democrats for the presidency according to returns received from the presidential primary held in this state today. Indications are that Theodore Roosevelt is the choice of the Republicans of Texas.

SOMETHING OF A NOVELTY CHARACTER SHOWN BY DRESS

Inexpensive Lamp Shades May Be Designed From the Ordinary Japanese Lanterns.

An inexpensive, novel and pretty way of making lamp shades, especially for the summer cottages, is to utilize Japanese lanterns. The kind used are the rather large, oval-shaped ones in either a solid color or half one and half another. The upper part to the desired depth is cut off, guided by the small bamboo bands which stiffen and fold it, and is neatly trimmed off. At the top, which is finished by a black wooden band, the wire hanger is removed and in place of it one of two or three supports substituted. One consists of three wires, equidistant around the top, and bent so as to hang over the top of the lamp chimney. Another method is a regular support fitting the top and attached to the lamp at the base of the chimney; or else the lower edge of the shade may be wired and the usual tripod support be used.

I made two like this, using the first mentioned style of hanging just for fun this summer, and the cheerful, red-figured Japanese lily shades made such a hit that all my neighbors made, or had me make, the same things for them.—Harper's Bazar.

The GREATEST PLAY I EVER SAW

AS TOLD TO
Hugh S. Fullerton
BY AL BRIDWELL.

Shortstop of the New York Giants,
and Who is Regarded as One of
the Best Inside Ball Players
in the Country.

The play that always has remained first in my mind was one made by Sandow Mertes when he was playing left field for New York. I have seen more sensational plays, plays that stirred the crowd more, such as the one that Jack Murray made in Pittsburgh in 1909, and others, but Mertes'

play was one that required perfect

timing, fast thinking and wonderful execution.

I was playing with the Cincinnati Reds at the time, in the fall of 1905, and Mertes was playing left field for New York, and the Reds and Giants were hooked up in a hard battle. I think I can give an accurate account of that play, for although it was made six years ago I never have forgotten a move.

The Reds and Giants had fought for seven innings and the score was 2 to 1 in favor of New York, but all through the game we had been getting men on bases and threatening to score, falling short by hard luck or because of some pretty piece of fielding. In the last half of the seventh inning we filled the bases with only one man out, and it looked as if we would grab the game, or at the worst tie it in that round. Joe Kelly, our manager at that time, and one of the most reliable hitters in the business, especially dangerous in a pinch, was at bat. A long fly meant a tied score, and a hit two runs and almost a cinch on the victory.

Joe landed on the ball all right and sent it soaring to fairly deep left field, where Mertes was camped under the ball ready to make the catch. All the runners were holding their bases ready to advance after the catch.

Right there was where Mertes got in his fine work. He figured that the runner on third base had a better chance to score on the catch than he had to throw him out at the plate, as the runner was extremely fast. If he threw home and failed to catch the runner the score would be tied and the men on first and second bases would be on second and third; two out and a hit or error would spill the beans, as another hit would have made the score 4 to 2, which would have meant probable defeat that late in the contest.

Mertes took his position under the ball, standing ready to throw as soon as it hit his hands. But instead of catching the ball on the fly, thereby retiring the batter, as he was expected to do, and then trying to cut off the run at the plate, he let the ball hit the ground, trapped it perfectly as it bounded from the grass and quick as a flash he threw to third base to Devlin, who grabbed the ball, touched the bag, whirled and threw to Gilbert at second base, completing as prettily executed a double play as ever was seen.

The play retired the Reds without a run, and it seemed to take all the heart out of our team. The Giants held their lead and won without any further trouble, capturing a game which but for Mertes' clever work would have been won by the Reds almost to a certainty.

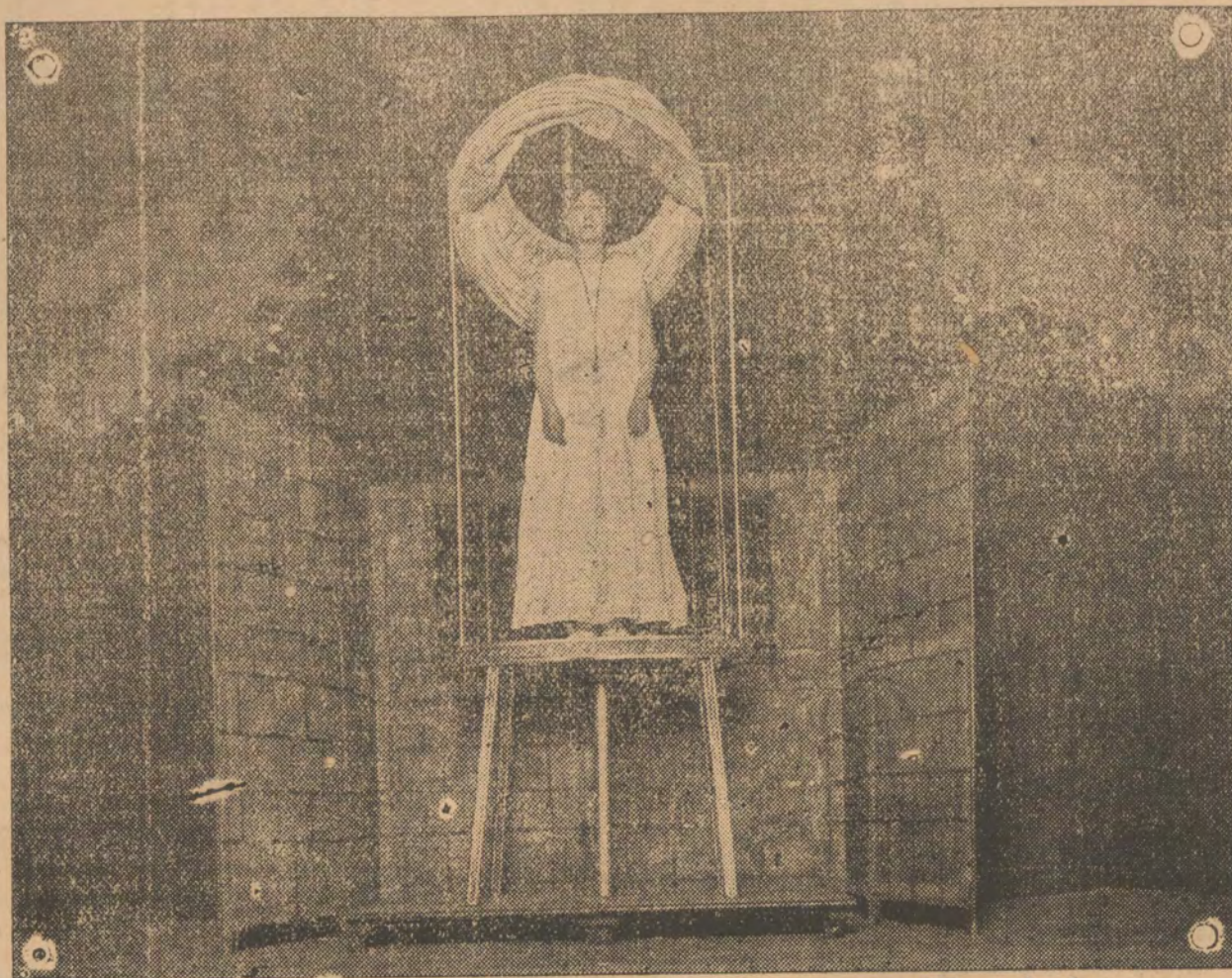

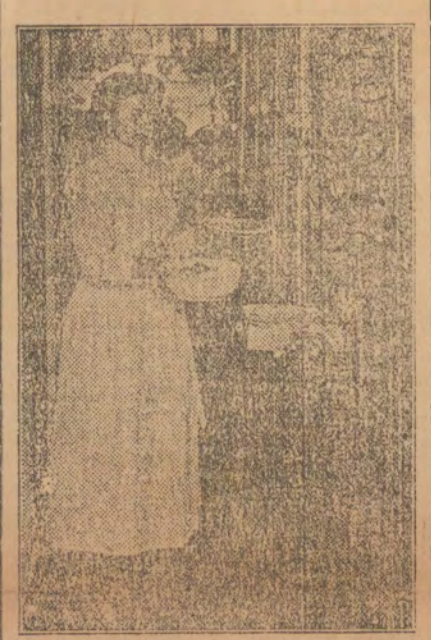

SHOPGIRL GETS \$30,000,000
 Miss Ilona Vardis of Budapest, Hungary, has become a multi-millionaire by an accident that caused the death of an admirer before he had time to change a cuff on which he had scribbled his will as a joke. Ilona was a shopgirl in a fancy store. An elderly man named Kronyi, of shabby appearance, was her constant customer, and often sympathized with her because her work was hard. One day he was more sympathetic than usual, and said:
 "For reward you shall have all my money when I die. I am an old bachelor and have managed to save a bit."
 As the other girls behind the counter laughed at the idea of his having any money to leave he turned down his cheap paper cuff and wrote:
 "I appoint Ilona Vardis my sole heir. After my death she is to inherit all my estate, real and personal."
 Then he signed and dated this impromptu will, laughed heartily at his own little joke, shook hands with Ilona and left the store. While crossing the street just outside the store he narrowly escaped being run down by a car, had a fit from fright and died in a chemist's shop a quarter of an hour after he had scribbled on his cuff.
 It turned out that Kronyi had left more than 60,000,000 gulden (\$30,000,000). Ilona got a lawyer to file her claim to the fortune in the probate court. Kronyi's relatives fought hard to have this last of his will set aside but the judge decided in favor of Ilona. She got the whole estate, but gave one-third of it to Kronyi's brother.



A wonderful toy has been presented by M. Hagnauer, an electrical engineer of Paris, to his little daughter, Jeanine. It consists of a miniature electric train which carries dishes along the passage from the kitchen to the dining room. By touching a button on a circular ivory indicator messages are electrically transmitted to the kitchen for such articles as bread, knives and forks, water, napkins, and other portable requisites. The train, which cost about \$250, can easily carry a load of 24 pounds from the kitchen to the dining room table.

COLORS AND THE BRAIN
 Just as there are hues that soothe the mind through the eyes—green for instance—so there are colors which may after a time so irritate the nerves as even to unbalance the intellect. Blue is said to be a kind of drug in its effect on the brain. It excites the imagination and gives a craving for music and sensation, but it has a reaction that wrecks the nervous system. Yellow in excess sometimes causes hysteria.

 One of the most remarkable workmen in the world is Hananuma Masakichi of Tokio, Japan, who has carved a figure in wood so like himself that when the two are placed side by side it is said to be almost impossible to tell which lives and breathes and which does not.
 By several connoisseurs in art this wooden figure has been pronounced the most perfect human image of man ever made. Masakichi has faithfully reproduced every scar, vein and wrinkle to be seen on his own body. The figure is composed of 20,000 pieces of wood, dovetailed and jointed with such wonderful skill that no seams can be detected. Tiny holes were drilled for the reception of hairs and eyelashes in which no dissimilarity to Masakichi's own can be detected.

The undersigned and such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them as stockholders, do hereby associate themselves together for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the laws of the State of Florida, in accordance with this proposed charter, and hereby adopt these articles of incorporation:

Article 1.
The name of this corporation shall be "Taylor and Company, Inc." and its principal place of business shall be in the city of Key West, county of Monroe, state of Florida, but it may establish branches in other places in the United States, or foreign countries, whenever and wherever deemed necessary or expedient.

Article 2.
The general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted by said corporation shall be to buy, sell and convey, purchase, acquire, hold, charter, lease, mortgage, hypothecate, repair, remodel, rebuild and otherwise own, manage and dispose of wharves and docks, tanks and storage facilities of every kind, steamships, sailing vessels and other floating property and other real and personal property including chattels and choses in action; to dispatch, load, unload, disburse and act as agent for all kinds of vessels but not to use the said means of transportation for the purpose of doing the business or businesses and to receive profits and tolls therefrom; to issue storage and warehouse receipts; to do a general brokerage business in all of its branches; to conduct and carry on a general brokerage, shipping and commission business in and about any and all of the matters and things herein, including a custom-house brokerage business; to handle, care for, receive and dispose of consignments of vessels and any other personal property, to conduct a wholesale and retail coal, water, lumber, naval stores and general merchandise business; to buy, sell, own, mortgage, lease, and pledge lands within the State of Florida or elsewhere; to advance and loan money upon securities of land, personal property, commercial paper, steamships, sailing vessels, cargoes, materials from vessels and upon other floating property; to act as broker, factor or agent in the purchase, sale, management and disposition of real estate in the State of Florida and elsewhere; to take and hold real and personal estates in trust, to borrow money and secure the same and to secure moneys otherwise owing by mortgages, deeds, bonds or other obligations therefor; to improve real estate by building, constructing thereon or removing therefrom stores, residences, warehouses, docks, wharves, mills, factories or structures of any kind whatsoever; to have such improvements constructed by contract, or to make and erect them otherwise and to purchase or manufacture all material therefor and market the surplus; to issue bonds or other obligations of the corporation in payment of property purchased or acquired by it, or for any other lawful object in or about its business; to act as attorney in fact, agent, broker or factor for any person, firm or corporation in any part of the world and generally to do any or all acts and things which may be beneficial or profitable to the corporation or which may be necessary and expedient to accomplish the objects and purposes of the corporation and to do any and all things usual or incident to corporations organized under the laws of the state of Florida.

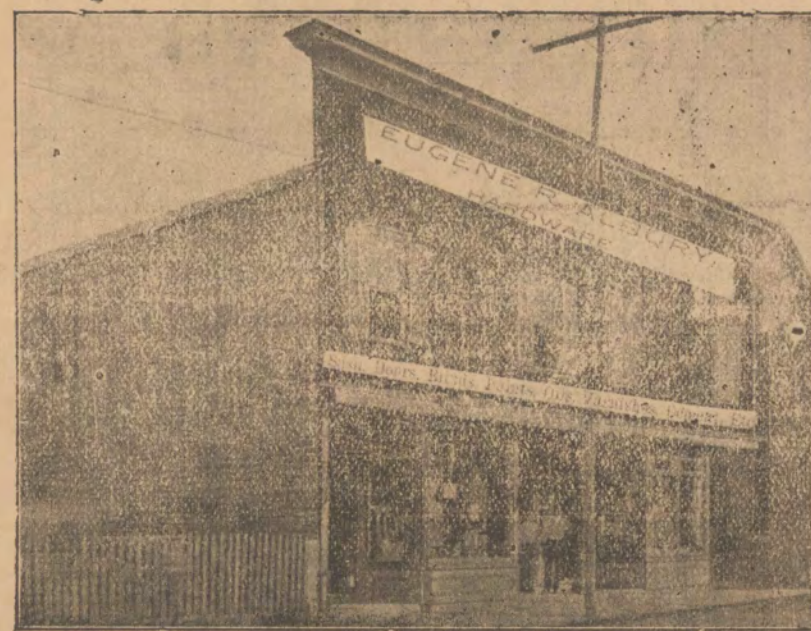

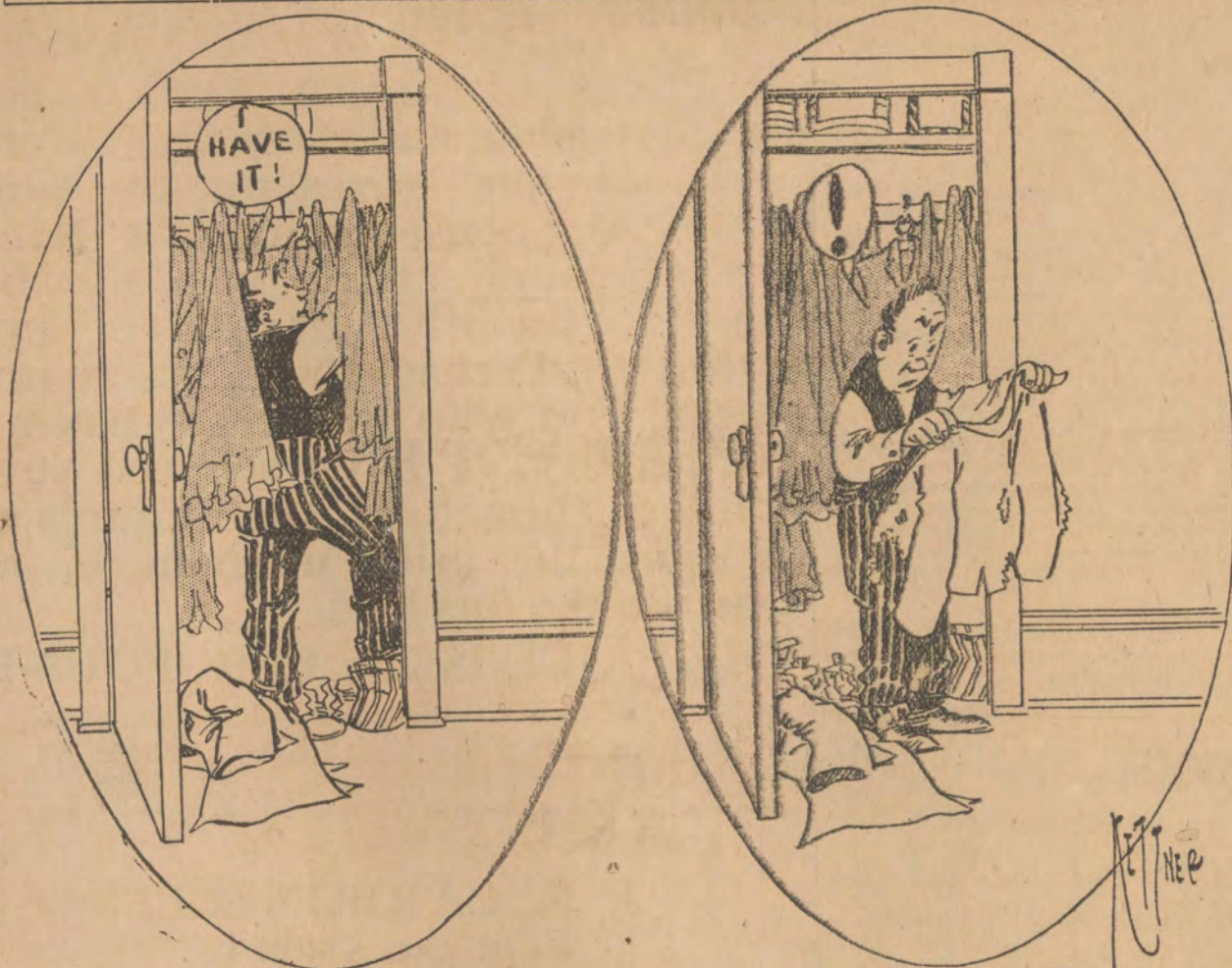

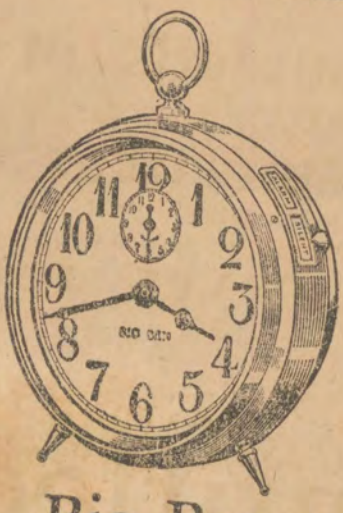
