STEVEDORES STRIKE IN HAVANA HARBOR

Seven Ocean Steamships Unable to Leave Docks Account of Trouble

Havana, May 4.—A general strike of the stevedores, launchmen, dock clerks and workers and coast shipping sailors began in the Havana harbor last night. Shipping was completely tied up and seven large steamers remained inactive throughout the night with little prospect of being able to move today.

The strike became effective when the time came for the night shift to go to work. Government officials, including President Gomez, had tried all day to bring the steamship and launch owners to a working agreement with the unions. Their efforts were unsuccessful.

ITALIANS WIN FROM TURKS IN HOT FIGHT

The Turks Left Three Hundred "Dead Ones" Before They Gave Up

Paris, May 4.—Dispatches received here from Italy tonight state that General Resio, the Italian commander, captured the Turkish position at Lebda yesterday. It is described as a brilliant victory, the Turks resisting fiercely. They did not give up the fight as hopeless until 300 of their number had been killed. The Italians lost eight men killed and fifty-seven wounded.

FLOYD ALLEN IS ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Threatened to Kill Prosecuting Attorney If He Was Convicted

Wytheville, Va., May 4.—Testimony extremely damaging to Floyd Allen, the first of the Allen clan to face a judge for the Hillsville murders, was adduced at the resumption of the trial here this morning. Witnesses declared that Allen, who was about to be tried for another crime when the tragedy occurred in the Carroll county courthouse, fired the first shot.

Another testified that he heard Floyd Allen declare that if he was convicted in Hillsville he would make it his personal business to kill Prosecuting Attorney Foster. Foster was one of the first men to be killed in the Hillsville shooting.

London, May 4.—The British inquiry into the causes of the Titanic disaster, which was begun yesterday before a commission headed by Lord Mersey, will pursue the lines followed by the United States senate inquiry. Sir Rufus Daniels, attorney general, is conducting the investigation on behalf of the crown. The surviving members of the crew have been subpoenaed to testify before the commission. They returned to England on the steamer Lapland.

LAUNCH PARTY HAS VERY NARROW ESCAPE

Launch Ghost Drifted Aimlessly About For More Than 24 Hours

Messrs. R. DeKoven, Geo. Cleare, Chester Lowe and Leon had quite a thrilling experience last week. They left here a week ago Saturday night on the launch Ghost intending to return the following Thursday. The engine broke down at noon Sunday about 45 miles from Key West. Not being able to repair the break the launch drifted Sunday and Sunday night and until noon Monday when they were picked up by a schooner in charge of Captain Hamilton. The weather was stormy and the little craft rolled and plunged in a manner which caused the occupants to believe that their time to live was limited. Sighting a sail about noon Monday they fired thirty shots from a rifle and waved a white cloth until the schooner's attention was attracted. They were then picked up and towed to Oyster Bay near Lostman's river. Repairing the damage to the engine they left there Monday night and after being out a short time they upset their cylinder oil and were once more up against it to keep the engine from going hot on them. As necessity is the mother of invention they used a pound and a half of butter and some kerosene and used this as a lubricant until they reached Marco on Tuesday. Chester Lowe left the launch here and will return to Key West on some other boat. The launch left Marco for Key West Thursday morning and ran aground in the narrows Friday morning where they stuck for quite a while. The "Ghost" arrived in Key West yesterday afternoon, the passengers thoroughly disgusted with life on the briny deep and tickled to death to get back to "little old Key West."

INTERVENTION IS WANTED BY PANAMA

Political Leaders In the Little Republic Cannot Control People

Panama, May 4.—The "organization known as the "Union Patriotic," with the leaders of both the Liberal and Conservative parties, has asked the United States to intervene in the Panama presidential election to be held this fall.

It is desired that the United States mount guard over the polls in the manner that it did in 1908 when Dr. Pablo Arosemena was elected president, to insure that the election be conducted fairly. It is stated that passions are running high and that the political leaders are unable to control the situation. Dr. Arosemena stated that the Panama government would welcome intervention by the United States.

Funeral of Indian Prince



The funeral of an Indian prince of high rank is an imposing ceremony. Last fall the maharajah of Cooch Behar died in England, and his body was cremated there. But not long ago his ashes, which had been conveyed to India by his son and successor, were carried on an elephant in procession through Cooch Behar and then to the palace, where they were interred.

ONE EGG WORTH \$1,500 LARGEST OF SPIDER WEBS

An egg of the great auk, or gare-
fowl, a bird now extinct, was sold at
auction in London for a sum equiva-
lent to \$1,500. Not all great auk's eggs
are alike. In length they vary from
four and one-eighth inches to five
inches. The greater number found
have a white ground, but others are of
various shades of buff. In some cases
the markings are spots, shown in
blotches or lines.

It is said that no living auk has been
seen since 1844. The birds were ex-
terminated by the ruthless traffic in
their eggs and skins, although their
numbers were greatly reduced by their
wholesale slaughter for food. Many
misconceptions have survived as to the
great auk, which for years has been
regarded as a sort of fabled bird, like
the roc or the dodo. In size the crea-
ture did not differ much from the tame
goose, and its title of "great" was given
to it to distinguish it from the small-
er, or razor billed auk. The most re-
markable characteristic of the great
auk was its inability to fly. Its wings
were scarcely more than fins, which
aided the bird in swimming.

The largest spider web in the world
was spun not by a spider, but by hu-
man hands. It stands on the lawn of
a Chicago man's country home, and is
of such tremendous size as to startle
the passerby when he first sees it. The
creator of this interesting oddity con-
ceived the idea of attempting to see
how nearly an actual spider's web
could be reproduced with rope. Se-
lecting two immense trees on the lawn
of his home, he spun between them
this spider's web, 40x60 feet, which is
so strong that a man may easily climb
to the center or top of it. The web
faces the main thoroughfare passing
the house, and is one of the most
fascinating country ground decorations
ever seen. The spinner could not
attain the minuteness of the actual
spider's web, but came so near to it
that the illusion is almost perfect.
The uniqueness of the undertaking
catches and fascinates every eye that
sees it.

WORLD'S SMALLEST REPUBLIC

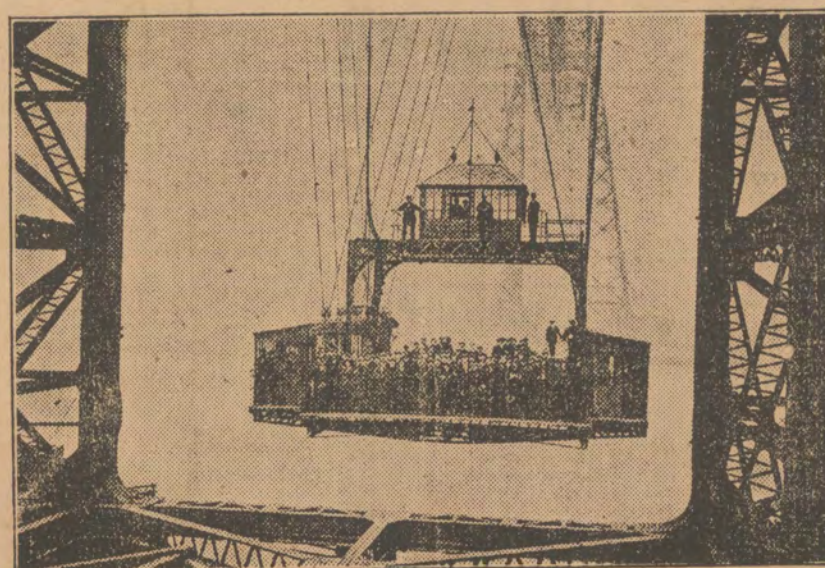
The smallest republic in the world,
without contradiction, is that of Trav-
olara, a little island situated about a
dozen kilometers (seven and one-half
miles) from Sardinia. It is a little
more than a mile in length, and has a
population of 55. The sovereignty of
the island was accorded in 1836 by
King Charles Albert to the Bartoloni
family. Up to 1882 Paul I. reigned
peaceably over his little island king-
dom, but at his death the islanders
proclaimed a republic. By the consti-
tution of the republic the president
is elected for ten years.

WOMAN'S ARM IN TREE

Adam Fowler, storekeeper of Clif-
ton Heights, Pa., shook out a fine
Christmas tree to sell to a woman
customer. As he did so the arm of a
woman, amputated above the elbow,
dropped out of the branches. The
tree came to Fowler from Maine, and
the probability is either that this arm
is the product of a legitimate amputa-
tion, but carelessly buried in the
Maine woods, or a part of some trag-
edy victim. The arm was well pre-
served and apparently was amputated
recently.

Not satisfied with the feats by
which he has won the title of "Hand-
cuff King," says Popular Mechanics,
this man recently dropped from a
height of 98 feet into the harbor at
Sydney, Australia, with his hands
manacled behind his back and his
eyes blindfolded. A year or so ago his
"star" feat was making his escape
from a bag in which he was placed,
both hands and feet manacled, and
thrown into the water. He also took
to aeroplaning in 1910 and that year
won the Australian league prize of
\$7,000, in a spectacular flight.

Aerial Ferry in England



The new transporter bridge or aerial ferry across the River Tees at Mid-
dlebrough, England, was opened not long ago, being the third of its kind in
that country. It has a length of 850 feet and an extreme height of 225 feet.
The traveling car, 44 by 39 feet in size, accommodates 500 passengers and six
vehicles. It is suspended from a cable which is operated by electric power.
The trip across the river takes only two minutes.

Unless we have been looking through very rosy glasses, we think we can perceive a very marked improvement in the physical aspect of Key West during the past year. Leaves All Behind.

The disciples were poor in both this world's goods and one of them, Matthew, adds that the happy ones are those who are poor in spirit also. They knew the meaning of hunger and of privation and were ready to learn of him. Jesus is not so much in this illustration trying to give us a picture of the hereafter, of the future life as he is to show the results of our living in this present life. He shows us plainly that there are different states over there and that these states are the result of our conduct in the life we now live. Riches are a temptation, a temptation to gain fraudulently.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR MAY 5.

POVERTY AND RICHES.

LESSON TEXT—Lk. 6:20-26 and 14:13-31.
GOLDEN TEXT—"A man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things he possesseth."—Luke 12:15.

Last week we were studying the fundamental principles of this new kingdom Jesus came to establish. Today our study presents another of his seeming paradoxes, viz., the blessedness or the happiness of poverty, hunger and persecution. Spoken primarily to the twelve, Jesus intended these words for all the people—present and prospective. Jesus is distinctly the poor man's friend. He knew the meaning of hunger and thirst, of weeping and mourning, and so contrasts the joy that shall be to these "happy ones" with the "woe" that shall come to those who from out of their joy and their abundance fail to respond to the needs of mankind.

What It Is and Why.
The last half of the lesson is intended to illustrate the teachings of the first. Let us look at the illustration. "A certain rich man." He was not of sufficient importance even to mention his name. How few rich men ever succeed in really perpetuating their names. Not one succeeds in any measure he emulates the life and teachings of Jesus. How few monuments really perpetuate names. Character alone is what lives. This rich man, however, did not lose out simply because he was a rich man. Verse 25 tells us why he was in anguish. His life had been that of a selfish seeker and he had had his reward. Now conditions have changed. Once clothed in purple and faring sumptuously, now he is the beggar. Ignoring the cry of need at his gate now he is compelled to make his cry afar off.

"A certain beggar named Lazarus." It is better to be a beggar vainly seeking a few crumbs and to rest in Abraham's bosom than to live in luxurious ease, ignoring the cry of the needy and to live in hell hereafter. Lazarus did not gain glory hereafter because he was a beggar, but rather because of his character. Angels announced the coming of the Son of Man, angels welcomed the returning of this son of mankind. Which of the two, Dives or Lazarus, really enjoyed

INDIANS AT POISON SPRINGS

Many Fighting Redskins Engaged in Civil War—Sometimes One Tribe Arrayed Against Another.

Many Indians were in the armies operating in Missouri, Arkansas and northern Louisiana in the Civil war. Enlistment was begun by the Confederates in the early days of hostilities, but not all the red nations would consent to fight against the Union. Thus tribes were arrayed against one another. One instance of an engagement between Indians of a victorious Confederate army and three regiments of Union soldiers is told by William Ramey, a resident of Chicago. On April 18, 1864, was fought the battle of Poison Springs, Ark., by part of Gen. Frederick Steele's expedition, of which Mr. Ramey tells as follows: "When General Banks was carrying on his Red River campaign in the spring of 1864 General Steele was coming up with a reinforcing corps. The 18th Iowa regiment, in which I

was a private of Company G, was a part of this corps. Before we got to Camden, Ark., which was held by the Union army, we learned that General Banks had been defeated by the combined forces of Generals Kirby Smith, Price and Marmaduke.

"The 18th Iowa was sent out soon after we reached the camp at Camden. A forage train was on its way back to camp after making collections out in the country, and we were sent to reinforce the guard of two colored regiments. We started out in the afternoon and by night we had come up to the train of wagons and had gone into camp near by. We could see why we had been sent out. Through the night there came the gleam of camp fires, where the rebel soldiers of General Smith's army were cooking supper. They had defeated General Banks and were going to chase us through Arkansas.

"I don't know why they did not capture us all. There were only three regiments. That night we were left in peace and the next morning the negro regiments formed and moved the train about three-quarters of a mile from the camp on the way to Camden. Then an ambushed rebel battery opened on us and we fought there about two hours.

"My company was thrown out into the woods on the skirmish line and we retreated slowly as the Confederates advanced. When the order came for all the regiments to fall back we had lost eight or ten killed and twenty-five or thirty wounded. We had been paralleling a ravine through which flowed a stream and in which the 'poison spring' was hidden. The enemy was beyond the ravine. As we fell back we passed beyond an open clearing and formed behind the rail fence that bordered the road at the farther side of the field, which was perhaps twelve acres in extent. Then we saw the Indians coming.

"Both the armies were well supplied with Indian troops, though ours were more civilized than the rebels. I'd rather fight ten white men than one Indian. You never know what he's going to do. The Indians won't stay in line, either on the march or on the field. Some of them will go scouting if they are marching, and in battle they scatter so that you can't shoot at them with much exactness. They were all over that clearing.

"We let them come up within good shooting distance before we opened from behind the fence, and then we had about six hours' good fighting. Before it was over there were bullet holes through my cap and my clothing, but I was not hit. We shot whenever there was anything to aim at, and we could always tell if we had made a hit. An Indian was sure to throw up his hands and yell when he was struck. We could see plenty of the hands going up into the air. That kept up until dark, and by that time we had moved back up a hill and started for Camden. We made the distance before midnight, and then the whole army retreated toward Little Rock with Smith and Price hard at our heels."
