MR. CURRY DIES SUDDENLY

Robert Curry, whose home was at the corner of Francis and Eaton streets, died on board the schooner Lulu B. while near Russell's Key, at 10:30 o'clock Sunday night. Mr. Curry apparently was in good health prior to his death. Captain Flournoy Palacios of the Lulu B. as soon as possible, had the body taken to Key West, for transportation to Key West. The remains arrived at Lowe's dock at about 1:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. A coroner's jury that death resulted from cerebral hemorrhage. Mr. Curry was 55 years of age. After the inquest Benjamin Lopez, the undertaker, removed the body to the home of the deceased. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon. Interment will be in the City Cemetery.

Every road east of Chicago north of the Chesapeake and Ohio and south of the Canadian border, is affected by the demand, and also the Grand Trunk of Canada. It is whispered that sympathy with the men in the above territories is spreading among engineers in southern territory.

KEY WEST MUST HAVE PORTION OF MAINE AS MONUMENT TO OUR DEAD

Ben Leigh Takes the Initiative in the Movement to Crystallize This Idea Into Something Worthy of Their Sublime Valor and Glorious Death

Immediately after learning that Uncle Sam intended sinking all that now remains of that noble battleship, the Maine, Mr. Ben Leigh, who is a close personal friend of Hon. Frank Clark, Congressman from the second district of Florida, and whose father was a schoolmate of Mr. Clark's, wrote Mr. Clark asking him to assist Key West in getting a portion of the wreck. The correspondence to date follows:

Your letter received and I, too, regret the fact that we did not meet in Key West.

I have carefully noted the contents of your letter, which I have forwarded to Col. Sparkman, who represents your district most ably. You may rest assured that Col. Your letter to the Hon. Frank Clark, bearing date the 12th instant, has been turned over to me owing to the fact that you reside in Key West which is in the district represented by me in Congress. I note what you say regarding the disposition of the wreck of the Maine and your suggestion that a portion of it could be used to serve as a monument to the brave sailor lads who lost their lives when she was destroyed, some three hundred of which are buried in Key West.

The application for this should be made to the Secretary of the Navy and I would suggest that you write him upon the subject. I have already done so and will acquaint him with the application. I will also see him in person and urge upon him the importance of the project.

NEW YORK POLICE CAPTURE BAD MAN

The robber drove up in a taxicab in broad daylight, and committed the crime in the sight of hundreds of people. It happened in the heart of the financial district.

KEY WEST ON THE MAP

Washington, Feb. 26.—Key West, through the medium of the motion picture, is before the Washington world this week. Within the period of a month it is the second Florida city to command the public attention in connection with current events that compel public attention.

Pictures are being shown of the entrance of the first train over the Florida East Coast Railway extension into the "Island City." The film of the occasion is an excellent one but the explanatory note of the Pathe Company is incorrect since it refers to the occasion as a celebration commemorating the building of a railroad 128 miles in length to connect Tampa and Key West. The entrance into Key West of the Congressional Special, which left Washington for that city at 2 p. m., January 19, is a feature. It is probable that this picture will be shown in all the principal Florida cities within the next few weeks.

The above correspondence was turned over to Dr. J. B. Maloney Sunday just before he left for Nassau by Mr. Leigh and Dr. Maloney, as President of the Chamber of Commerce wired the Florida Delegation in Congress in reference to the matter; also Congressman Murray of Massachusetts. Congressman and Dr. Murray are close friends and Mr. Murray replied that a portion of the remains of the Maine might easily be secured by communicating with the Secretary of the Navy. Just who has received the blank application blank for these remains is not yet known, but whoever it is, they no doubt made the application as soon as possible. If any city in the United States is entitled to any of the remains of the Maine that city is Key West and it is quite probable that the Navy Department will recognize our claims.

S. C. LEGISLATURE ADOPTS NEW PLAN

Takes Recess Until May So That Governor's Vagaries Be Balked Effectually

Columbia, S. C., Feb. 26.—(Special to Morning Journal.)
The Legislature of this state has exceeded all precedents and has decided to take recess until some time in May in order that that body may be able to pass all important measures that the governor of the State may veto. Last year Governor Blease vetoed several of the most important measures passed by the general assembly, and this year the members of that body have decided to see that the laws they pass shall become laws, and not subject to the whims of the governor of the State.

CRIME ADDS TO MINER'S TERRORS

Gipsies In English Mining District Commit Mur- ders Wholesale

London, Feb. 26.—The coal mining region of North Staffordshire is in a partial state of terror. Frequent fights occur between strikers and men who persist in working. And to add to the general feeling of unrest, a band of gipsies murdered three people. Posses of citizens, in addition to the regular police authorities, are hunting the vagabonds through every lane and by path.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT TAKES MEASURES

To Cope With Coal Strike If It Assumes Large Proportions

London, Feb. 26.—It is reported in Radical circles that Premier Asquith is determined to have the Government work the coal mines temporarily if the threatened strike materializes. A cabinet committee headed by the Premier today conferred with the mine operators. The latter said they considered the situation as decidedly hopeful. Several thousand Derbyshire miners have already quit work, however. The coal companies are prepared for any emergencies that may arise.

CLEAN UP OR CLEAR OUT

New York, Feb. 26.—The New York State Department of Labor, working in conjunction with a special committee of women of the League for Home Economics, have been after the Chinese laundries so strongly that the Chinese Merchants Association held a meeting last month at which the Chinese laundries were told that they must observe the law or go to jail.

Out of 200 laundries in Manhattan over 25 per cent. had filthy floors and the laundries were also used as sleeping and living rooms. Warrants were issued and many of the Chinese are now on probation, while some have been fined and told that hereafter they clean up or clear out of Manhattan.

Pretty Lace Bonnets



THERE is no doubt now that hats (or rather bonnets) made of lace will be a leading feature in head-wear for children during the coming spring. Already, those who create the styles for the public's acceptance, or rejection, have made many beautiful bonnets and bonnet-like hats, with such good success, that they will be sure to sell. They appeal to the mothers from the standpoint of beauty and utility, and more than all, from that of economy. The majority are made of narrow val lace and those of other laces as a rule will show good wearing qualities.

These pretty head coverings are made in nearly every case on a wire frame which is faced with shirred silk or chiffon. But sometimes the brim facing is also of lace. Ribbons in silk or velvet are used with them. Many small flowers, too, add to their beauty. They are set in prim and quaint fashion about the crown, or in one or two little bouquets on the brim. Forget-me-nots, June roses, moss-rose buds, small daisies and blossoms of fruit trees re-

main the favored posies for little folks. Small field flowers look well with the heavier laces.

There is really a great amount of work on children's millinery, but it is not of the most difficult character. The pretty hats of lace shown here are not beyond the skill of the mother who makes her children's dresses. The wire frame must be bought from the millinery shop or the department store and covered with mull of silk before the lace and facing are put on. Usually the finished hat looks considerably larger than the frame.

Val and cluny laces are the favorites. Quite a number of novelty laces have been brought out, but are not more attractive than those we have had heretofore.

White and pale colors make up nearly all the bonnets so that a choice of colors is easy enough. Very thin silks, chiffons and laces, are used for facings. Wide, soft ribbons or narrow velvet ribbons are chosen, with small flowers for trimming.

Lace and the most gorgeous of brocades threaded with gold and silver and worked in flowers of wool or silk, or both, make up the most handsome of evening gowns. But beaded net is also used, with a softening note of old lace on the shoulders.

UTILIZING THE SOILED SHOE

Days of Usefulness May Be Extended
If Article Is Not Too
Far Gone.

Here are a couple of hints for the girl whose dress allowance has to go a long way:

White kid shoes which are too soiled to wear and which are still of a good shape may be renewed for evening wear by painting them with gold paint. Do this carefully and smoothly and the shoes will look like new.

In some cases even soiled satin slippers may be successfully treated in this way.

White kid shoes may also be dyed a fast black by applying the following mixture to them: Five cents' worth of gallic acid and five cents' worth of sulphate of iron.

Put the sulphate of iron in just as much water as is required to dissolve it, no more, and apply this to the shoes. Let it dry, then dissolve the gallic acid in a very little water and apply this. When dry the shoes should be a good black color. Great care must be taken in using these chemicals, and after they have been used the surplus quantity should be thrown away.

For the Wee One.

During the winter months a warm wrapper to slip over the baby when he is being taken from one room to another is a necessity. A very pretty one may be made of nun's veiling in pink or blue, with an underlining of thin wadding and batiste. The dainty little garment might be embroidered or scalloped round the edge and would prove a pretty present for baby and also a most useful one.

The wrapper should be large enough to slip on easily, for nothing jars a child's nerves more than to be forced into a coat that is too small, and if the wrap takes the form of cape it is equally necessary that it be large enough to envelop the little form when, as in this case, warmth is the object to be secured.

Dainty Lace Caps.

Lace caps are much in vogue for young girls. It takes the dainty coiffure of the maid to produce the proper effect when the caps are worn, and the bits of vanity are hardly suitable for women of years. All sorts of old lace are being utilized in the manufacture of the caps, the latter being especially desirable for theater wear. They are often finished with sprays of tiny pink rosebuds, and fit closely over the hair.

Blouses With Silk Suits.

Hand tucked tulle blouses are worn with silk suits. They are made quite simple, trimmed only with tulle or net labots or plisses.
