CUPID ARRIVED ON EXCURSION TRAIN

His Nibs With the Bow
and Arrows Beat the F.
E. C. out of one Fare

Employees of the Florida East Coast Railway are always very careful to see that no passenger rides free on any of the company's trains. They are "on the job" as much as are the employees of any other railroad, but the conductor on the excursion special which arrived in this city from Miami Sunday was outdone. He brought one passenger who did not buy a ticket. Among the seven hundred passengers from the Magic City was Dan Cupid, and with his customary disregard of all rules and regulations, he "beat" his way to Key West.

Among the happy crowd of excursionists was Miss Grace Dexter of West Palm Beach, and Mr. Frank J. Springer, of Boynton, Fla. Six hundred and ninety-eight of the excursionists came down here to see Key West and the fleet of battleships in the harbor, but the other two came to see a minister. Immediately upon the arrival of the train yesterday Miss Dexter and Mr. Springer looked up Rev. T. H. Sistrunk of Memorial church. A few moments later the minister had performed the marriage ceremony and was congratulating Mr. and Mrs. Springer, while Dan Cupid sauntered down to the depot and winked derisively at the conductor of the excursion special.

LEAVES CONVENT TO WED CAVALRYMAN

St. Louis, June 10.—Miss Emily Clifton, daughter of wealthy and prominent St. Louisians, who entered a convent ten months ago with the intention of devoting her life to the duties of a nun, was married at her home here today, to Lieut. Elkin L. Franklin, of the Thirtieth cavalry, U. S. A., stationed at Fort Riley, Kans.

Miss Clifton is the only Catholic in her family. Her mother died several years ago, and Emily was placed in the Sacred Heart convent in St. Louis. After Miss Clifton left the St. Louis convent she took little interest in social affairs, and last July she startled her family and acquaintances with the announcement she had decided to become a nun.

Being a graduate of the Sacred Heart convent in St. Louis she selected a convent of that order at Rochester, N. Y., in which to enter the sisterhood.

Last November she made a trip to Leavenworth, Kans., and there met Lieutenant Franklin.

MADE FINE RECORD.

The Florida-Cuba Special, the Seaboard Air Line railway's fast train between New York and Florida, made a remarkable record during May, having arrived in Jacksonville on time for thirty-one consecutive days. Thirty-one trips of more than 1,000 miles each brings the total mileage up to more than 35,000 miles. The record has perhaps, few parallels in the railroad world of the country and the officials of the Seaboard are being congratulated on the performance of their crack flyer.—Times-Union.

BERGER IS AFTER FEDERAL JUDGE

Washington, June 10.—Representative Berger, the socialist member of the house of representatives, today began impeachment proceedings against Federal Judge Hansford of Seattle, who recently deprived Leonard Olson of his citizenship because it is alleged, Olson was a socialist.

Berger charged Hansford with "high crimes and misdemeanors and a long series of corrupt and unlawful decisions, and being a habitual drunkard."

Berger asked that the judiciary committee of the house make an investigation of the affair. The department of justice is assisting Olson in an effort to have Hansford's decision reopened.

The house adopted Berger's resolution directing the house judiciary committee to make an investigation of the charges against Hansford.

EVERYTHING IS COMPARATIVELY QUIET

Greatest Battle Yet Reported Was
With Force of Thirty Men Under
Brigadier General

AMERICAN WARSHIPS IN HARBOR OF HAVANA

Not Much Change in the Cuban in the Cuban Situation But it is Expected That the United States Will Order Another Intervention Within a Few Days

Santiago de Cuba, June 10.—The fifty marines who were guarding the mines at El Cuero, were ordered today to go to El Cuero and join the fifty marines stationed there. Ten more marines of another company will be brought by the surveying ship Eagle to take the place of the marines sent from El Cuero. This movement was ordered because it is believed El Cuero is in a much more exposed position than El Cuero.

Gunboat Off Coast.
An American gunboat has been ordered to take station off Siboney, while another will remain in this harbor.

Solace Arrives.
The American hospital ship Solace arrived at the Guantanamo naval station today according to telegrams received here tonight. Dr. M. F. Gates is the chief physician in charge.

Calls on Montecarlo.
Commander George G. Mitchell, of the gunboat Paducah called on General Montecarlo today. The visit was simply one of courtesy. Some comment had been caused because Commander Mitchell called on Governor Manduley and did not call on General Montecarlo, who under martial law is the official head of the province.

Twenty Negroes Surrender.
The report has reached here that twenty negroes have given themselves up at Soledad, taking advantage of the offer of clemency of General Montecarlo to negroes who surrender within five days.

On Yvonne's Trail.
Captain Iglesias is still reported hot after Yvonne, and hopes are high at general headquarters that news of his capture or death will arrive at any minute. The reports that he has been wounded and is in full flight toward Sagua de Tanamo are strong.

Nearly Wiped Out Band.
Commander Castillo in reporting his fight of Saturday says:

"Amplifying my telegram of yesterday I can assure you that the casualties to the enemy were over 20. The negroes were under the command of Brigadier General Chano Martinez. He had only thirty men.

Saved a Cow.
"Last night I surprised the camp under Lacoste just as the enemy were about to slaughter a cow. I seized a revolver and a standard of the Independent Colored Party and turned the cow loose."

More Marines Land.
The supply ship Colgoa landed more marines today to protect the Juragua iron mines, which are American property.

Arrests at Placetas.
Placetas, June 10.—Two negroes have been arrested here charged with conspiracy against the government.

Tanamo Reported Burned.
Guantanamo, June 9.—The gunboat Nashville, which has been stationed at Nipe Bay, has been ordered to proceed to Sagua de Tanamo, which is reported to have been burned. No information confirmatory of the report has been received.

Yvonne Bound There.
Sagua de Tanamo is the place which the negro leader Yvonne is supposed to be trying to reach, with Captain Iglesias close on his heels.

CORPORATION TAKES MUCH INCREASED

Tallahassee, Fla., June 10.—The state board for assessing for taxation property of railroad, telegraph, express and sleeping car companies, has been in session for several days, making investigations of these properties for assessment for the following or ensuing year. This board is composed of the comptroller, treasurer and attorney-general.

Yesterday was set aside for hearing representatives of these various companies as to the reasonableness or unreasonableness of assessments imposed upon their respective companies, most of which were represented at said hearing. Taking the above properties as a whole, the raise in valuation made by the board was about \$1,000,000.

Eighteen aliens were admitted into the country yesterday in United States court.

ONE TERM OF SIX YEARS PRESIDENT

House Committee Orders a
Favorable Report On
This Resolution

Washington, June 10.—The house judiciary committee has ordered a favorable report on the resolution proposing a constitutional amendment fixing the president's term at six years and making the president ineligible to succeed himself.

A similar resolution has been favorably reported in the senate and efforts will be made in both houses to force the issue to a vote before adjournment.

UNION CUBANA HELD MEETING SUNDAY

Are not in Sympathy with
Estenoz or His Move-
ment in Cuba

A meeting of Union Cubana, a local organization of colored Cubans, was held last night at their meeting place on Whitehead street. The meeting was also attended by many prominent white Cubans of the city. It had been rumored that members of this society had been contributing to the colored rebels in Cuba, and the meeting was called for the purpose of emphatically denying these rumors. One member it had been said had sent a certain sum of money to the rebels, it being known that he had this amount of money on deposit in one of the local banks. This member brought his bank book to the meeting and proved that the money had not been touched. He also stated that he would arrange his account so that no amount might be drawn by him except the signatures of three other men be attached to the check, one of this number to be Sr. A. D. Carrasco.

Several colored speakers were heard and the opinion was expressed that only the more ignorant portion of the colored Cuban population had joined Estenoz.

Several prominent white Cubans addressed the meeting and stated that they were certain that the colored Cubans of Key West were not in sympathy with Estenoz or his movement. Among these speakers was the Cuban consul.

WOMAN FATAALLY MANGLED.

Mary Elmer, a negro woman from Edenfield, one of the excursionists to Ocala on the Seaboard, was pushed off one of the platforms while the train was nearing Edenfield last night. The train ran over her, cutting off both legs below the knees. She was brought back to Ocala and put in charge of the physician for the road, but she was nearly dead when he reached her, and died a few minutes later.

FLORIDA LEADS.

NEWSPAPER MEN DO NOT HAVE TO TELL

Milwaukee, Wis., June 10.—The question whether a newspaper reporter can be required to reveal under oath the source of information on which he bases a newspaper article came up before Judge Turner yesterday. Judge Turner ruled in effect that a newspaper man's confidence is inviolable.

John Killilea, who had caused a reporter to come into circuit court, requested the court to require a reporter on oath to reveal the names of the persons from whom he had obtained information which was used in a news article. Killilea said the publication of the article during the pendency of the case tended to prejudice the jury and that statements made in the review of the history of the condemnation proceedings were incorrect and evidently supplied to the reporter by persons interested in the case.

Judge Turner decided that he had no power to require the reporter to be sworn or examined unless the reporter volunteered.

LEPERS STRIKE IN LAND OF RISING SUN

Want their Daily Spending
Change Increased to
one cent a day

Tokio, Japan, June 10.—Japan, like the rest of the world, is suffering from an epidemic of strikes. The latest takes the unusual form of a strike of lepers.

Recently the inmates at the Kamayama hospital, which was founded and is conducted by a society of French monks, demanded an increase in their pocket money allowance to one cent a day, and on the refusal of the father superintendent they struck work and over a hundred escaped from the hospital by climbing over the wall. They were subsequently recaptured by the local police and conducted to the care of the monks.

The costs of the establishment are paid by voluntary subscriptions and by the sale of the produce of the hospital garden. The patients receive no payment for their services, beyond their board, lodging and medical attendance and a small sum for pocket money, which is calculated at the rate of half a cent a day.

Boston, Mass., June 10.—Brig. Gen. S. P. Jocelyn, U. S. A., retired, who returned from the Azores on the Canopic today, asked of the newspaper men first of all "How is the political situation among the republicans?"

He was told of the battle between Roosevelt and Taft.

"Well," he remarked, "if you put T. R. on the ticket and a yellow dog on the other it's me for the yellow dog all the time."

OFFICERS TRANSFERRED.

Washington, June 10.—Rear Admiral Lucien Young, commandant of the Key West naval station, and Rear Admiral J. M. Helm, commandant of the Charleston, S. C., navy yard, have been ordered to exchange places.

MEXICAN BANDITS UP AGAINST PROPOSITION

Guadalajara, Mex., June 10.—A force of Mexican bandits went up against the wrong proposition today when they attacked the camp of the Cinco Minas Mining company, a New York corporation.

The mine guards under American direction poured such a heavy fire into the invaders that they were glad to turn around and run for their lives. Two bandits were killed and several were wounded on both sides. The rumples are now pursuing the bandits.

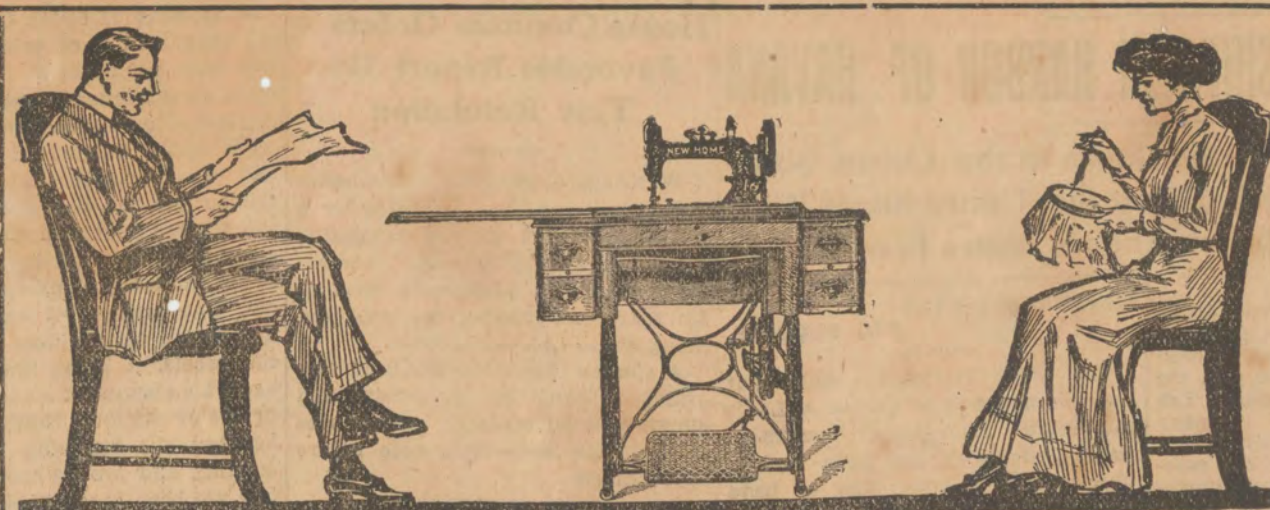

THE "SIZE" OF KEY WEST.

Visitors to Key West often go away with a wrong impression of the size of this city. Many cities in the South cover two and three times the area of Key West but have no larger population. For various reasons the population of this city is somewhat congested, but were it spread out as is the case in other Florida cities the impression created would be far different. On account of natural conditions, Key West is destined to become another Manhattan island, but on a much smaller scale, of course.

A SIDEWALK EPIDEMIC.

An epidemic is raging in this city at present which is certain to improve the general appearance of Key West considerably—the sidewalk epidemic. In all parts of the city new sidewalks are being laid, wider than we have had before—AND THEY ARE UNIFORM. Formerly, one man would have a brick sidewalk, another concrete, another none at all, and so on. Now we are to have sidewalks of uniform size and material. It is easy to imagine the improvement in the general appearance of the city.

THE GUN THAT ISN'T LOADED.

If a history were written of the tragedies caused by the gun "that wasn't loaded," it would be a revelation to most of us. The shocking tragedy which occurred here yesterday morning when a baby boy was killed by his brother who didn't know the gun "was loaded" is a fair sample of many that have preceded it. Children should not be allowed to play with firearms whether they are loaded or not. Guns are dangerous playthings in the hands of men, and in the hands of children the danger is heightened.

KEY WEST NEEDS THAT HOTEL.

The Journal is not acquainted with the efforts being made by the committee appointed to bring Eastern capital here to erect a large and modern hotel on South Beach. In view of the importance of this hotel to Key West, we feel certain that the committee is leaving no stone unturned to complete the necessary arrangements. 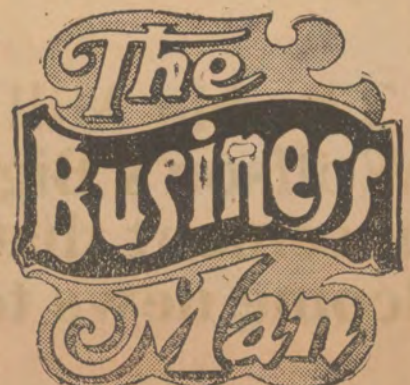

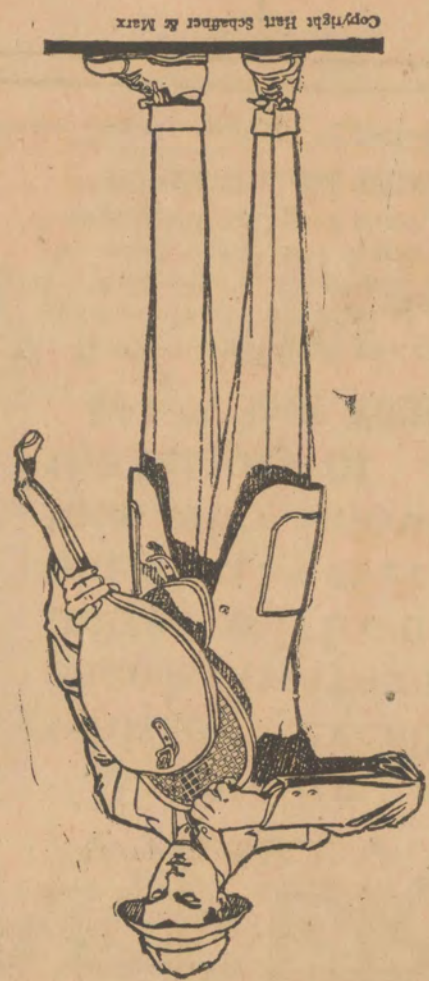

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DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

COLORING MATTER IN GREEN PEAS.

It was recently demonstrated at an exposition in New York that enough coloring matter is contained in a can of green peas to dye a handkerchief a deep copper color. It is not illegal to use certain dyeing and preserving materials in canned foods if they are labeled as the law requires. Appeal to the eye and sense of taste are not to be ignored, but so long as people prefer denatured flour and denatured rice because they look prettier and bright green canned goods because they look prettier it is impossible to have good nutrition with good health.

It should be possible to get unpollished rice anywhere cheaper than the polished, and it should be possible to buy entire wheat anywhere, but merchants can not afford to keep such choice foods because there is little demand for them, owing to the lack of such knowledge as is daily supplied in these hints.

It would be easy now to form in this city a club who could purchase the best food for themselves at reduced prices or arrange with a grocer who would gladly keep such food if he knew of the demand.

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DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

EGGS, MEAT AND MILK SHOULD NOT BE EATEN TOGETHER BY CONSUMPTIVES.

Dr. David R. Lyman holds that eggs are not necessary in the diet of the tuberculosis patient. This we think should be apparent from the fact that there is nothing in eggs which can not be obtained better in the average case from milk, which, however, should not be taken in its sweet form, in which the curd of cow's milk is extremely indigestible for the adult. The whole milk should be converted into buttermilk, in which the curd is so broken up as to be much more easily digested. The purpose in feeding the tubercular person is to furnish the amount of fat, albumen and carbohydrate that can be assimilated, in the form requiring the expenditure of the least energy for digestion and assimilation, and with the least risk of leaving an indigestible and unassimilable remnant, especially of eggs, meat or milk. Albumen uncoagulated by high temperature as in uncooked eggs, milk and raw meat, is much more easily assimilated than that of bread or baked beans or boiled or fried eggs, and the fat of eggs and milk is much more easily assimilated than beef fat or of pork or roasted peanuts, but the mixture of eggs and milk with beefsteak or even bread, as is customary in the ordinary feeding of the tuberculous, is a violation of a fundamental principle of the monodiet and is counter to the suggestion in the circular of information on the feeding of the tuberculous issued by the State of Illinois—that as far as possible those foods should be eaten at the same meal that digest in about the same time.
