SIXTY-NINE MINE VICTIMS TAKEN OUT

King and Queen of Eng-
land are at the Scene of
the Disaster

Connisbraugh, England, July 11.—The bodies of 69 victims of a series of explosions in Cadeby colliery Tuesday morning, have been brought to the surface and it is feared that a further search in the mine will increase the death toll to 80.

Of the killed thirty were mine workers, and the others were men who went into the pit to rescue those enmeshed.

The first explosion occurred early Tuesday morning, and was followed by an explosion at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, resulting in the collapse of the roof and overwhelming of the rescue brigade.

The king and queen visited the scene of the accident tonight. A accumulation of gas, which ignited by the firing of a shot, is believed to have been the cause of the disaster.

MEXICAN FEDERALS EXECUTE AN EDITOR

Victorious Army Has Ex-
ecuted a Number of
Rebel Sympathizers

Mexico City, July 11.—According to a report reaching here today, General Huerta, commanding the victorious federal army in the state of Chihuahua, has executed a number of rebel sympathizers. Among the number was the editor of the newspaper El Monitor.

The question of extending a general amnesty for the rebel general Pascual Orozco and his followers, was discussed by the cabinet of President Madero today. It was stated as likely that a general proclamation of amnesty would be issued when General Huerta makes his formal entry into the city of Chihuahua, now occupied by his troops.

The rebellion in the state of Morelos also shows signs of breaking up. According to an official announcement issued here today 200 Zapatistas have already surrendered to General Robles at Cuatla.

UNLUCKY NUMBER OF DIVORCE REASONS

Chicago Woman Alleges
Thirteen Different Acts
of Cruelty

Chicago, Ill., July 11.—Thirteen varieties of abuse were inflicted upon Mrs. Florence W. Overshiner by her husband before she rebelled and sought a divorce, according to a bill filed by her in the superior court.

The defendant in the case, Ellsworth B. Overshiner, is said to have a large business that yields him \$50,000 a year. He lives generously. Mrs. Overshiner asks \$300 a month alimony and the custody of her son.

Among the charges made by Mrs. Overshiner in her bill is that in addition to entertaining chorus girls lavishly her husband abused her.

Among specific acts of cruelty mentioned are that her husband—
Smothered her with a pillow,
nearly causing her to suffocate.
Threatened to throw carbolic acid in her face.

Knocked her against a hall tree.
Choked her.
Struck her with a pair of shears.
Hit her in the face with a wash cloth.

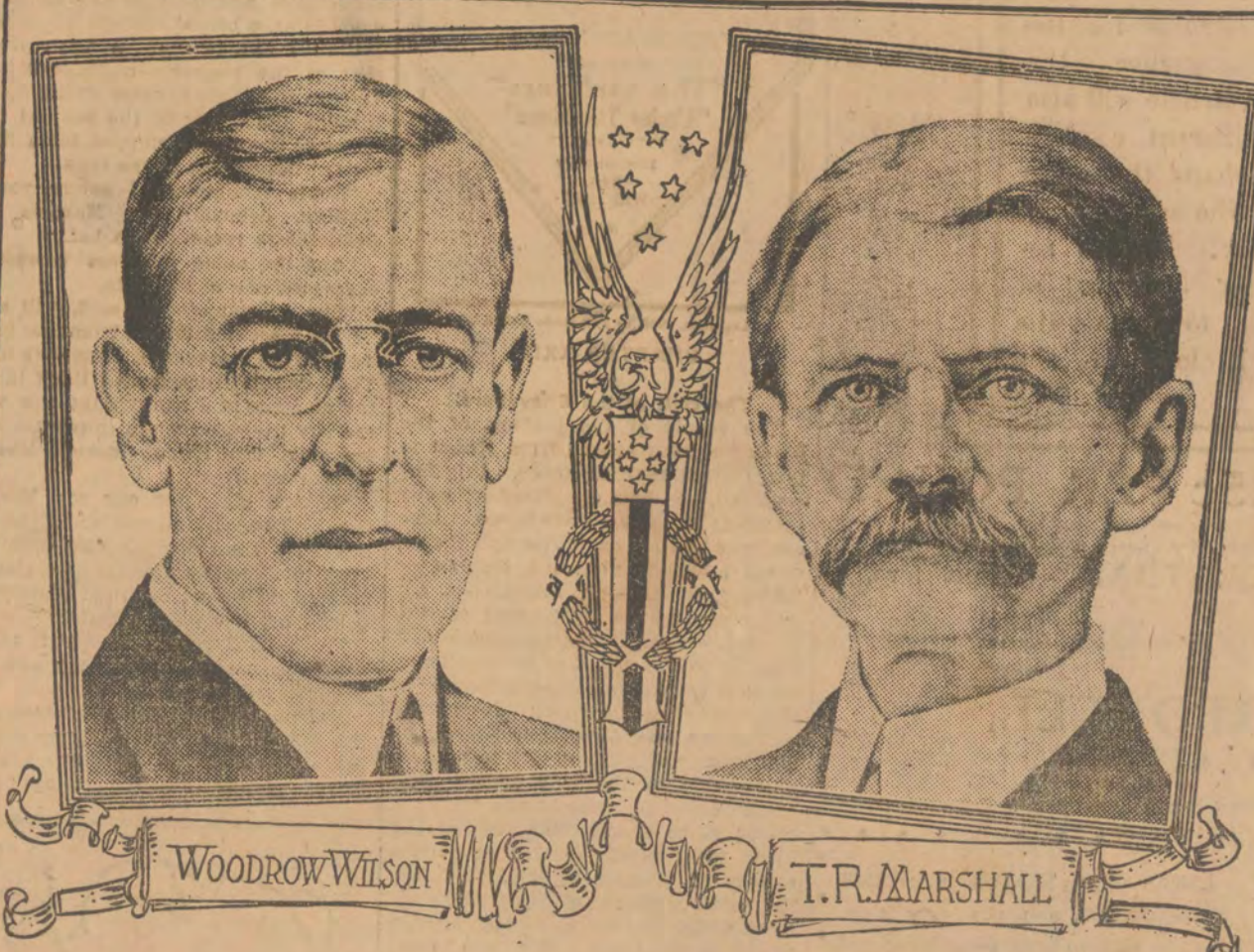
Blacked her eye.
Cut her in the face.
Struck her with a plate.
Pierced her shoulder with a fork.
Shook her.
Beat her.
Threatened her life.

The Overshiners were married Jan. 25, 1905, and the trouble between the two came first before the courts April 19, when Overshiner obtained an injunction before Judge McDonald, alleging that Mrs. Overshiner was about to leave the state with their son, E. Channing Overshiner. The boy was turned over to his father by Mrs. Overshiner, after the injunction was served, upon his promise to return him the next day, the bill alleges.

The boy was not returned, and he is still in the custody of his father, Mrs. Overshiner alleges.

Prior to the separation of the two, about April 1, they occupied an apartment at No. 4652 Sheridan road the household expenses being about \$500 a month, according to the bill.

Within the last two years Mrs. Overshiner has entertained chorus girls and other women, it is charged and in connection with this allegation says that she fears to reveal the names of the women or the places visited because her husband may attempt to destroy the evidence.

DOCUMENTS FOUND ON THE BODY OF ESTENOZ CLEAR PRES. GOMES

Disprove Charges That Were Made That Gomes Had
Plotted With Estenoz to Start the Uprising in Cuba
—Handwriting Identified

(From Havana Post.)
Documents found on the body of Evaristo Estenoz at his death and positively identified yesterday by four handwriting experts as having been written by the rebel leader, apparently disprove all the charges which have been made by enemies of President Gomez that he plotted with Estenoz to start the uprising in Cuba.

There were two documents found. One was addressed to Secretary Knox of the American state department, in the form of a cable sent through the American consul at Santiago de Cuba. It is a long statement of charges against the Gomez government and especially against the federal troops whom he accused of many atrocities. It declared that President Gomez was purposely sowing the seeds of discord between the whites and negroes and was misrepresenting facts in the hopes of obtaining the sympathy of white Americans and distracting attention from the faults of his own army. It finally asked that the American government send a committee of investigation to Cuba to ascertain that the facts were as he represented them.

The second document is in answer to the proclamation issued by President Gomez calling the country to arms to put down the uprising. Estenoz declared that everything President Gomez said in his proclamation was false, that the Independent Colored party was a peaceful body until President Gomez removed every possible opportunity for it to exist legally. He said that the president had deliberately and without cause conducted a veritable persecution against the negroes in Cuba, denying them the civil rights for which they had fought the same as the white Cubans.

The Estenoz documents were examined by four handwriting experts in the presence of Dr. Ignacio Ramirez, secretary of the president, and various newspaper men. The writing was compared carefully with authentic copies of letters written by the dead rebel leader and there was no doubt expressed by the experts as to the authenticity of the documents found on Estenoz. Notary O. Farrill certified to the declarations of the experts.

QUARANTINE TOOK CITY OF HAVANA BY SURPRISE

Forty Persons Had Bought
Tickets For Oliveate But
Bouldn't Leave

Havana, July 11.—The establishment of a quarantine in Florida against Cuban ports and the arrival of Dr. H. R. von Emdorf to look after the interests of the United States here were the most important developments in the plague situation yesterday. There were no new cases or suspicious cases. Cincinco Men dez, who has the only case of the plague which has developed in Cuba, continued to improve yesterday. He passed another day without fever. Hopes are now entertained for his recovery.

The sudden decision to place a quarantine against passengers bound to Florida ports caught many persons who were on the point of leaving Havana. Forty persons had bought tickets for the Oliveate and about twenty for the Miami. To get to the United States by way of Florida now it will be necessary for them to go to Triscornia and remain there seven days before sailing. The Ward line steamer was allowed to sail with all her passengers and there are no other restrictions on New Orleans boats.

The Key West soldier boys will break camp at Black Point tomorrow and board the train for home after a most successful encampment.

CUBAN REBEL LEADER AGAIN ELUDES TROOPS

Yvonet Escapes After Federals
Had Him Entirely Sur-
rounded

Havana, July 11.—Pedro Yvonet the only important rebel leader still in the field appeared yesterday at Vinculo near Guantanamo. He was accompanied by a small body of men. He did no damage. This news was contained in a dispatch from Guantanamo received after midnight this morning.

Yvonet is declared to have tried to surrender to the commander of the American marines stationed at the Soledad sugar mill, because he fears he will be killed if he surrenders to the Cuban soldiers. Government forces were sent after him from Guantanamo yesterday.

The appearance of Yvonet near Guantanamo proves that he has again given the government forces the slip. They were positive they had a corner around him from which there was not the slightest possibility of escape. It is the third time he has slipped through their lines.

TAFT TO RUN DESPITE REQUEST

Washington, July 11.—The scheme of republican progressives holding office to circulate a petition asking President Taft to retire as nominee of the party for the presidency has practically been abandoned. It was described by one federal officeholder today as a "dash in the pan."

ANOTHER AVIATION VICTIM IN FRANCE

Rene Bedel, French Avia-
tor Dashed to Death
Before Thousands

Chalons-sur-Marne, France, July 11.—Several thousands of French soldiers drawn up for manoeuvres here this morning saw Rene Bedel, an experienced French aviator, dashed to his death.

Bedel was making a cross-country flight and was about to descend when the accident occurred.

The machine approached the earth in a swift glide but the flyer apparently failed to take notice of a telephone pole in his path. The machine struck the pole and was smashed to pieces.

Bedel was buried beneath his motor before the eyes of the horrified onlookers. His body was so badly crushed that it was hardly recognizable.

JACK LONDON BEFORE THE MAST AS SAILOR

From Baltimore Around
the Horn and Now in
Straits of Fuca

Tacoma, Wash., July 9.—The ship Aryan, 178 days from Baltimore with coal for Seattle, arrived in the Straits of Fuca last night. Her crew includes Jack London, novelist, and wife.

To satisfy his ambition to round the horn in a square rigged clipper Jack London and his wife, with a Japanese servant, signed up for a voyage in February. They left Baltimore March 1 on the Aryan. Jack London signed the ship's formula as third mate and his wife as stewardess. The Jap was one of the crew. London was to get \$35 and Mrs. London \$15.

The novelist said before he sailed that after unloading at Seattle they would probably get orders to go to Honolulu to load sugar for the Atlantic coast. The Straits of Fuca are north of Washington and south of Vancouver island, leading from the Pacific ocean to the gulf of Georgia. The straits form a part of the boundary between the United States and Canada.

MIAMI IS PROUD OF CUSTOMS RECEIPTS

Claims Fourth Place in
State Following Key West
And Pensacola

Miami, July 11.—Duties and fees amounting to \$16,000 were collected at the port of Miami during the year just closed by Revenue Collector H. T. Ferris. While figures for other ports are not available as yet, it is believed that this amount of collection gives Miami the fourth rank in the cities of the state doing a trading business with foreign ports. Key West, Tampa, and Pensacola are the cities that doubtless outrank us, but it is believed that Jacksonville will fall behind the record made by this port, as her water traffic is largely with the coast cities of our own country and hence her freight receipts are not dutiable. Barring the tobacco shipments from Cuba to Key West and Tampa those ports would lose a large part of their income and Miami would stand out still more prominently as an importing city.

TURKO-ITALIAN WAR STILL DRAGS ALONG

Italian Troops Win Vic-
tory Over Arab Troops
Under Turk Officers

Rome Italy, July 11.—Dispatches from Tripoli tell of a splendid victory won by the Italian troops at Maratrah, 120 miles east of Tripoli city and in the interior. The battle was fought yesterday and resulted in a complete victory for the Italians. The Arabs who opposed them, and who were commanded by Turkish officers, leaving more than 100 dead on the field and double that number of wounded. The Italians' loss was nine killed and 121 wounded.

The march of the Italian forces toward the interior has been hotly contested by the mixed armies of Turks and Arabs, but the Italians have been uniformly successful and continue their advance, with the object of subjugating the entire Tripolitan territory. Extension of the railway line to afford quick transportation of ammunition, guns and food supplies is keeping pace with the advance. Fortifications are being erected at various interior points and garrisons and thus the rear of the advancing army is made safe from attack by large bodies.

SPREADING GUARDS AGAINST PLAGUE

Bubonic Plague Has Now
Appeared in Ports Along
Caribbean Sea

Washington, July 11.—The public health service continues to spread its guard lines against the bubonic plague, which has now appeared in ports along the Caribbean sea.

From many cities along the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic coast, officers report that state and local authorities are establishing examinations of arrivals to ward off the carrying of the plague, and every precaution is being taken as protection against the plague spreading to the United States.

One new fatality is reported from San Juan, Porto Rico.

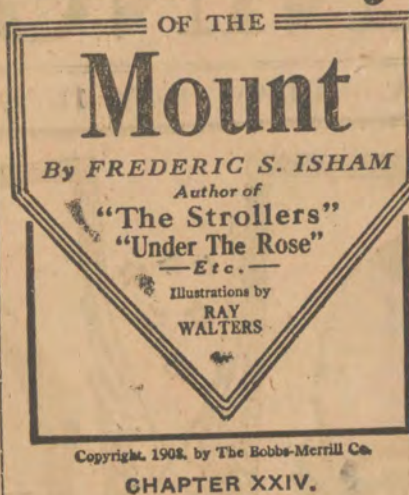

APPLY THE PRESSURE AND GAMBLING WILL STOP.

A prominent citizen of Key West, one who is entirely opposed to the operation of gambling houses, in the course of conversation a few days ago remarked that he believed that if a secret poll were taken, a majority of the people of this city would favor the operation of gambling houses and gambling games. The probability is that this gentleman was so thoroughly disgusted with the flagrant manner in which this evil is flaunted in the face of the people, that he spoke hastily.

A majority of the people of Key West do not favor gambling. More than that, a full three-quarters of them are absolutely opposed to it, and in giving this percentage we refer to men only. All of our ladies are bitterly opposed to gambling, and they are a force to be reckoned with. We say all, because we would blush to admit that there was even one who favored that which has wrecked so many homes in this city alone.

The fact of the matter is this: The strength of the gambling element is only apparent. They are able to maintain their gaming places because they are ever on the alert to fortify themselves in every possible way, while the mass of the people look on and deplore present conditions but are not active in suppressing them.

The police have assumed a "what's the use" attitude, and are practically marking time. They tell you, and with some reason, that they cannot convict the men they arrest, that no evidence they have been able to secure seems sufficient to secure a conviction for gambling. The Journal happens to know that the law, as it has been explained to us, favors the gambler largely, BUT—

If there is an officer in this city or county who is really desirous of stamping out this evil, he can do it WITHOUT any convictions by the courts. Every man in this city is morally certain that gambling is going on in a promiscuous fashion. He can point out the gambling houses to you and he KNOWS in his mind, just as he knows that some day he must die, that these places are violating the law. But the technicalities of the law are protecting the gambler in his lair and he continues to ply his "trade" with impunity, in open and insolent defiance of the law. But if this officer, or officers, will raid these places every time they feel certain that games are in progress, raid them every week, every day if necessary, IT WON'T MAKE ANY DIFFERENCE WHETHER THERE IS EVER A CONVICTION OR NOT. The gambling houses will not be able to stand the gaff, and all their ill-gotten gains will be used up in an effort to stay out of the clutches of the law.

Gambling CAN be stopped, and it WILL be stopped when the proper pressure is applied.

SHOULD PROVIDE FIRE ESCAPES.

In connection with the suggestion of one of our citizens, The Journal believes that steps should be taken to compel owners of buildings to provide some means of escape in the event of fire. The fatal fire of last week has brought this thought home strongly to most of us, and the time to provide against any further occurrences of like nature is right NOW. Such a law would of course not apply to private residences, but it should apply to all hotels, rooming houses and places where people congregate, which includes all places of amusement. Every building of this nature, or used for these purposes, over one story in height should be provided with fire escapes. Even wooden stairways on the outside would be better than none.

Fire, as most of us well know is a serious proposition, and when human life is involved we cannot be too painstaking.
