

CLARK WINS OUT OVER HILBURN SECOND CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT

Probably One of the Closest Races in the Political History of the State of Florida

SHEATS BEATS HOLLOWAY OVER 5,000 VOTES

Claude L'Engle Defeats W. M. Toomer for Congressman at Large by a Safe Majority---Crawford is Elected National Committeeman Over Eugene Mathews

(Special To The Journal By Cable.) Jacksonville, May 30 (10 p. m.)—Returns from the primary elections held Tuesday are still incomplete but are near enough complete to show final results with doubt. W. N. Sheats has defeated W. M. Holloway, the incumbent, for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. His lead on the face of returns tonight is over 5,000 votes. The closest race ever run in this state probably was the contest between Frank Clark and Sam Hilburn. All advices prior to tonight were that the two candidates were nip and tuck and that it was impossible to forecast the outcome. Latest returns received at this hour, however, show that Frank Clark has been nominated over his opponent after one of the most strenuous fights ever waged in the State of Florida. Up until this hour both Clark and Hilburn headquarters claimed victory by a safe majority, but last returns show that Clark has won beyond doubt.

NO BATTLE IN CUBA YESTERDAY AS REPORTED HERE LAST NIGHT

Special Cable to The Journal Shows That Rumor Was Not Founded on Facts--Federals and Rebels Engaged in a Few Skirmishes Yesterday

BUT GREAT BATTLE MAY ENSUE VERY SOON

Estenoz and his Men Have Destroyed a Vast Quantity of Sugar---Declare They Will Not Stop Fighting Until the Moura Law Is Repealed By Govt.

(Special To The Journal By Cable.)

Havana, Cuba., May 30. (9.50 p. m.)—The correspondent of La Prensa at Santiago reports several skirmishes between the government troops and the rebels this afternoon. This report, however, has not yet been confirmed by the government.

Note—A report was in circulation in this city last night that the rebels and government troops had fought a battle and that 300 federals and 600 rebels had been killed. The Journal immediately cabled Havana for a confirmation of this report and the reply was that there had been only a few skirmishes.

Santiago, Cuba., May 30.—A body of insurgents, thought to have been led by General Estenoz or by some of the officers immediately under his direction attacked the Marcos Sanchez plantation near Guantanamo last night and burned 8,000 tons of sugar cane.

They also destroyed many cars on the plantation's private railroad, tore up much track and burned and ruined other property. The property belonging to the American Fidelity company of New York.

Marines Reach Guantanamo. Caimanera, Cuba., May 30.—The United States naval transport Prairie carrying 775 marines reached this port early today. The marines will at once be transferred to Guantanamo

to augment the naval forces now stationed at that point. It is but a few miles from here and they will be at their station before tonight. It is reported here that the insurgents were active last night near Guantanamo and that they attacked and burned a plantation belonging to an American firm. Of course action of this sort would not be taken if it appeared certain that the forces of the Cuban government would be ample to afford protection, but if there appeared a possibility that they would not the state department hints today that American marines and naval officers would be amply justified in taking such steps as might, in their opinion, be necessary. Such steps would be taken whether asked for by President Gomez or not for the state department holds emphatically that it is the duty of the United States government, not only to protect the lives and property of its own citizens, but those of foreign nations as well. 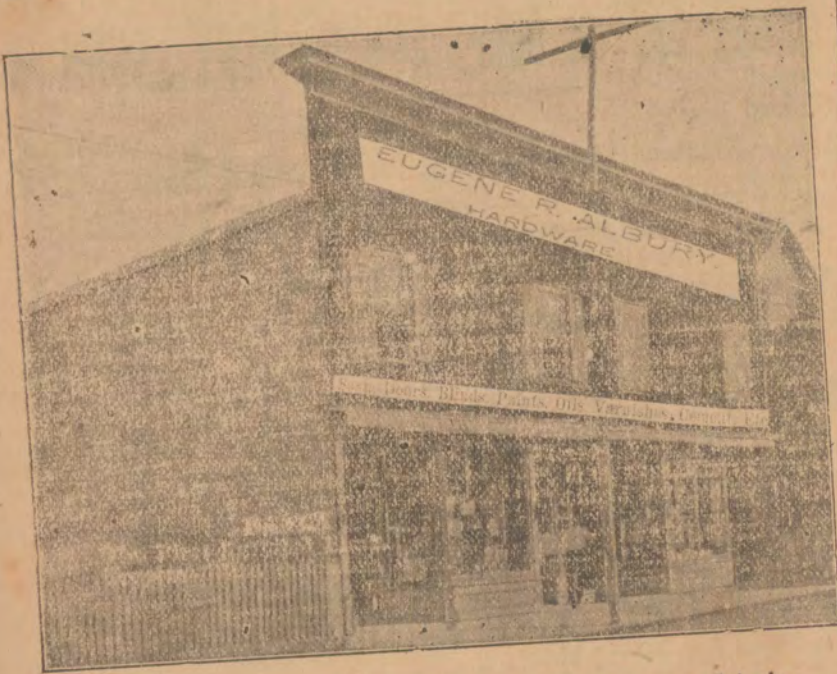

The KITCHEN CABINET

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Helpful hints for the housewife are always welcome. Short cuts in house-keeping do not mean slipshod work. Remember to have the pipes and flues of the furnace well cleaned before housecleaning commences, as much dust is lodged in them.

Begin with the attic, airing all clothes and looking over boxes during the cold days, before the warm days of spring, when the sun and air is needed for clothing in closets.

Don't keep house without several wooden spoons, the small paddle-shaped kind. They are so satisfactory for stirring, as the handles never get hot, and if they are long enough, will not be lost in the boiling hot mixture, if you chance to let go of the handle an instant.

The small brushes that can be purchased in some places at two cents each are so handy to scrub potatoes and celery, also to clean the grater. Have two or three on hand for service.

Let any young mother beware of "the pacifier," so-called; do not harbor it if you love your child. They cause adenoids, mouth breathing, and distort the tooth.

When the first green grass appears in the spring is the time to bleach yellow linen, handkerchiefs and underwear that has become yellow.

Pink dresses that have become faded may have their glory returned by using dark red paper, a piece a foot square, in the rinse water. Strain and use as one does blueing water, and add a little of the color to the starch. When dry, the gown will be as rosy as ever, and will wash once without losing the color.

Put silver pieces that are hard to clean, because of carving, into soapy water in an aluminum kettle and boil for a short while. They will come out bright and shining.

Be careful never to leave rubber straps or any article of rubber near or touching silver, as it causes it to corrode.

USES OF BUTTERMILK.

Buttermilk, according to some authorities, is the cure-all for nearly all diseases. It is certainly a wholesome drink and is agreeable to most palates.

Buttermilk Pie.—To a cupful of buttermilk add two tablespoonfuls of flour and half a cupful of sugar; mix the flour and sugar together, add a beaten egg and a flavoring of lemon extract. Bake in a crust without a cover.

Buttermilk Sweet Cake.—Add a tablespoonful of molasses to a cup of buttermilk, a teaspoonful of soda and three tablespoonfuls of melted lard. Beat an egg and add to the mixture, with spices to taste and flour enough to make a soft dough. Bake in a loaf and cover with a brown sugar frosting.

Steamed Brown Bread.—Take a cupful each of rye meal, Indian meal and graham flour, two cupfuls of buttermilk, three quarters of a teaspoon of soda, one teaspoonful of salt and three-quarters of a cup of molasses. Mix all ingredients together, pour into buttered baking powder cans and steam for three hours. Dry off in the oven, removing the covers from the cans.

Corn Muffins.—Put two cupfuls of cornmeal into a basin, add a cupful of flour, half a cup of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of melted butter and one beaten egg. Add two cupfuls of buttermilk, in which a teaspoon of soda has been dissolved. Mix and put into muffin pans to bake.

Johnny Cake.—Take two cups of buttermilk, one cup of cornmeal, one cup of flour, one-half cup of sugar, two teaspoonfuls of soda and half a teaspoonful of salt. Add the milk to the meal and soak for an hour; add sugar, soda and salt, mix with the flour and pour out in a shallow greased baking pan. Bake in a quick oven.

One of the very best remedies for constipation and inactive liver is buttermilk. Drink a glass every morning before breakfast.

When it is necessary to keep ice in a sickroom, place a flannel cloth over a bowl and tie it securely. Lay the ice in the flannel and cover with another piece. The drip will fall into the bowl and the ice will last for several hours.

Apples and grape fruit are the aristocrats of fruits.

An unsweetened glass of lemonade is a splendid liver tonic, taken on retiring.

When preparing rice, cook enough to be used in several dishes. It will keep and save the time and fuel.

The Man Who Disappeared

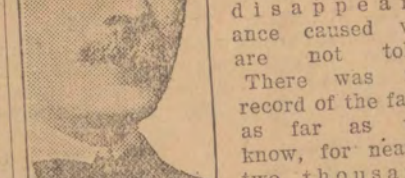

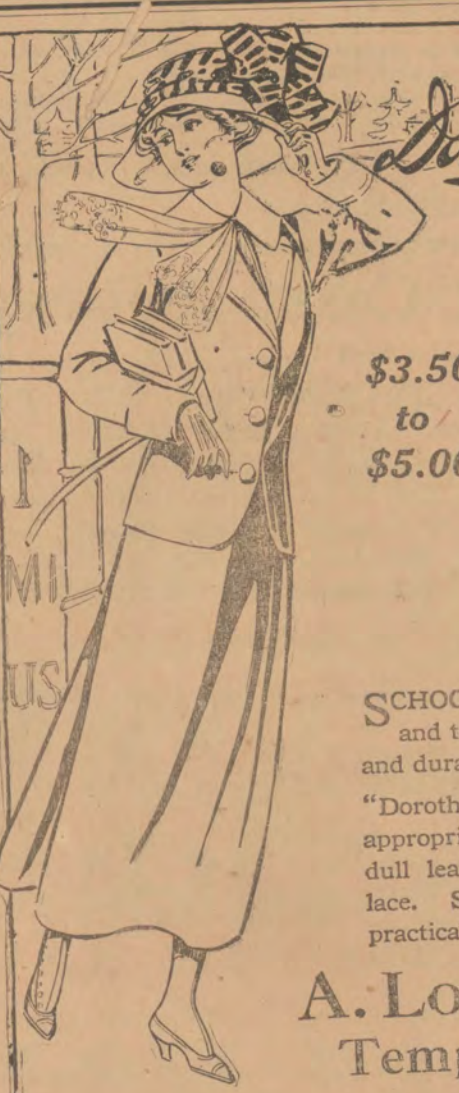
