CITY COMMISSIONER ON GAS TRENCHES

Street Commissioner Fulford Going Over Streets Worked In By Gas Co.

The Gas Company has turned over the work of leveling and rolling the trenches where it has laid pipe to the City Public Works Department and the City's experienced Road Commissioner, Chief Fulford, with water sprinklers, hose cart, and steam roller is carefully going over such streets leaving them in a better condition even than they were before. The surplus excavation is being used to fill in depressions in the streets in places, other than those excavated by the Gas Company, to improve them.

The Gas Company has always furnished the citizens of Key West with ample facilities for crossings in the way of bridges over sidewalks and streets, and a generous supply of red lanterns as danger signals. It is to their credit that up to date there has been no accidents, but as they have not quite completed they are knocking wood.

The work has increased in speed two hundred per cent during the past six weeks.

OFFICIAL REPORT SHOWS OVER 2,000 LOST IN WRECK OF TITANIC ON MONDAY MORNING

Total Number Saved Is Only 700—Scout Cruisers Are Trying to Find Out How Many Lives Were Lost—Congress Will Investigate This Disaster.

New York, April 17.—The Camperdown wireless station at Halifax reports "We are now in communication with the Carpathia, and can announce officially that the Titanic struck an enormous iceberg and sunk with over 2,000 lost and 700 survivors."

The attention of the Camperdown station was at once called to the obvious error in figures which would make the total lost and survivors at 2,700, whereas the total number of passengers and crew is 2,200. The reply to this inquiry was:

"The Marconi station reports that nothing authentic regarding list is known on the Carpathia, but steamer Franconia in relaying messages from

the Carpathia says that the total number of saved is only 700. There is no list of missing on the Cunarder, and only a rough estimate of her total passenger list. There were probably more than 2,200 on the ship as quite a number boarded her at Cherbourg."

The scout cruisers Salem and Chester are trying to get in communication with the Carpathia and will relay the list of third class passengers when convenient to the Carpathia.

Washington, April 17.—A resolution was introduced in the House today calling for a comprehensive investigation of the Titanic disaster, was ordered favorably reported and was adopted without further discussion.

Washington, D. C., April 17.—President Taft yesterday authorized exportation of 150 rifles and 50,000 rounds of ammunition for arming American citizens in the Cuadalaajara, Mexico, district, in response to an appeal from the American counsel there.

The president consented to the exportation of 400 hundred rifles and 120,000 cartridges and a large mass of miscellaneous gun parts for the Mexican government.

FIRST WORLD WIDE MEETING OF MASONS

An International Conference Will be Held In Washington in Oct.

Washington, April 17.—For the first time in the history of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry of the United States there will be an international conference of the supreme councils of the world in the western hemisphere in October. The conference will be held in this city, which is the seat of the southern jurisdiction, the mother council of the world, and the local bodies are already beginning preparations for it.

This will be the second international council ever held, the first one having been in Brussels a good many years ago. I had been the desire of James D. Richardson, sovereign grand commander of the southern jurisdiction, to have the conference held in the new House of the Temple, now being erected at Sixteenth and S street northwest, but it seems doubtful at this time if that desire can be realized. Work on the new temple, which is to cost about \$1,250,000 is being carried on as rapidly as substantial construction and artistic requirements will permit. It will be when completed the handsomest as well as the most expensive symbolical building in the world.

McIntosh, owner of a turpentine still at Bowling Green, was in turn shot by pursuers, died this morning at the county jail. Arline's murder of McIntosh was brutal and unprovoked. McIntosh had gone to the negro quarters after hearing that Arline had beaten and shot a negro. He reproved the fellow, who answered with a shot that passed through his employer's head, killing him instantly. Then Arline fled.

FADS IN ENGAGEMENT RINGS

While Nearly All Are Diamond Solitaires, Some Persons Prefer Variety in Shape and Settings.

A jeweler says that ninety-nine out of every hundred engagement rings bought from him are diamond solitaires. These are plainly set in a narrow band of gold with raised effect and only differ from one another in the size and purity of the stone.

Occasionally a man wants something different. Sometimes it will be the birthstone of his fiancée. Other men will have a ring, the name of each stone representing a letter of the name.

Square engagement rings are in favor just now. A solitaire diamond of this shape has small diamonds set in the sides of the ring itself.

Another engagement ring fancy among couples that like to defy superstition, is a big, deep-toned opal set with 13 diamonds. Colored stones are not especially popular for engagement rings, but if the fiancée has a fancy for a special stone, as an emerald, turquoise, ruby or opal, it is often chosen, sometimes alone, usually surrounded by diamonds.

When an engagement ring must be inexpensive it is a pretty sentiment to choose a moonstone, which is supposed to bring good luck. These are pretty, set in flagee silver around a good-sized oval stone.

The marking of an engagement ring varies with the sentiment of the lover. Usually it is nothing more than the initials of the man and girl connected by the word "to" and followed by the date.

If a man is engaged to a girl who is critical he should offer several engagement rings from which to choose. However much this girl may be in love, she finds it hard to endure a ring she dislikes.
