REMEMBER THE MAINE AT MONROE TONIGHT

First Picture Of Sinking Of Historic Battleship To Be Shown Tonight.

Tonight, Thursday night and Friday night, the greatest moving picture film ever made will be shown at the Monroe Theatre, "The Sinking Of The Maine." This film is 3,000 feet long and shows all of the funeral ceremonies attending the burial of this famous warship. This picture was made by a firm in Havana and is positively the only film showing the actual sinking of the Maine. The opening of the picture is a panoramic view of Havana Harbor with its famous Morro Castle. Then follows a close and accurate view of the efferdium around the wreck of the Maine to raise her to the surface of the water. An interesting incident, that of a man removing the name "Maine" from the bow of the vessel and handing it to General Bixby. The touching spectacle is United States officials presenting guns from the Maine to the people of Cuba. Next is seen the remains of victims of the explosion lying in state in the City Hall of Havana. Following is funeral procession of victims attended by President Gomez, the Mayor of Havana and the City Council, with American officials appointed by the U. S. government to attend the ceremonies, among which are General Bixby, Father Chadwick, former Chaplain of the Maine and members of the diplomatic corps. Then comes a body of Cuban soldiers bearing on their shoulders the remains of the Maine victims and delivering them to Gen. Bixby.

Then comes a panoramic view of the North Carolina, Birmingham, and Cuban revenue cutters. Then is shown the Maine as she is being towed to sea, her deck covered with American Beauty roses, with just three men on board. The bands of the various warships are playing dirges. At a given signal the men on the Maine opened the hatches and the water poured in, the men deserting the ship. The battered hull tilts to one side, takes a final plunge and a wealth of American Beauty roses float to the surface. "Remember the Maine."

RICHESON'S EASTER

Boston, April 9.—The joy of Easter's celebration was reflected to some extent today in the narrow jail where Clarence V. T. Richeson, last Easter the honored and reverend pastor of the Emmanuel Baptist church of Cambridge, awaits execution on May 19 for the murder of Avis Linnell.

Half a dozen Easter lilies and other remembrances were delivered to Richeson, but in no case was the name of the donor made known.

Steps looking toward the commuting of Richeson's sentence to life imprisonment are to be taken this week.

JOHNSON AND SHEA SIGN UP FOR FIGHT

Will Go Fifteen Rounds At Odd Fellows On Night Of April 23rd.

Young Johnson and Jack Shea signed articles last night for a fifteen round bout to be pulled off at Odd Fellows Hall on the night of April 23rd. The agreement is that the winner gets 75 per cent of the gate receipts, the loser 25 percent. Shea wanted to make it forty per cent for the loser, but Johnson would not agree. This would seem to indicate that Shea is not overburdened with confidence in himself; other wise he would have been satisfied with "winner take all."

Johnson is generally admitted to be the cleverest man with the gloves who has yet struck Key West, and fight fans are of the opinion that Shea cannot last more than five or six rounds at the most. However, although Shea has not engaged in any fights here, it is known that he is a tough nut, and Johnson will have to put over a series of choice haymakers in order to win. At the present time, Johnson is an easy favorite, but as the old woman once remarked, "you never can sometimes always tell."

ANOTHER BIG DAY IN SPONGE MARKET

FLOOD MAKES THIRTY THOUSAND HOMELESS

Thirty Drowned, Thousands of Domestic Animals Drowned

St. Louis, April 9.—Thirty thousand persons homeless, 2,000 square miles of country inundated, 30 persons drowned, thousands of domestic animals destroyed and a property loss of at least \$10,000,000—this constitutes the havoc wrought by the floods of the last two weeks in the Mississippi valley. The figures were given out yesterday morning by the engineers of the United States government.

The water is pouring into Arkansas from three new breaks in the levee south of Memphis. Railroad traffic is completely paralyzed. The danger zone moves south hourly.

The flood is practically at a standstill in the upper reaches of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers. The crest of the flood is now exerted on the dikes from the Missouri line southward.

The southern states are bending all their efforts to strengthening their levees, believing they will be able to withstand the flood when the high water arrives.

GILCHRIST REFUSES EXTRADITION FOR

B. Aultman Who Is Charged With Big Swindling Scheme

Chicago, April 9.—Governor Gilchrist, of Florida, refused to allow extradition for B. Aultman, recently indicted in this county, in connection with charges by Miss Elizabeth Hickord, that she was swindled out of \$150,000 of property by him.

Detectives sent to get Aultman returned without him. The governor refused to grant extradition, on the grounds that the purpose was to secure from Aultman certain papers for use in a civil suit.

BOATMAN BAXTER ARRIVES

The four masted schooner Lydia Mae L. Baxter, Captain Hempel which cleared from Baltimore on Sunday March 24th docked at Taylor's Wharf yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock with a cargo of 500,000 bricks consigned to the paving company.

The Baxter was delayed the fore part of the trip by heavy seas and stormy weather. A huge sea breaking over the Port Rail caught First Mate Ebrin off his guard and gave him one of the severest thumpings, he has had in thirty one years experience at sea. He is still suffering from a badly sprained ankle and numerous bruises about the body.

After discharging her cargo here the Baxter will sail for Port Tampa where she will load with phosphate consigned to the American Fertilizer company of Baltimore.

RUFFLE OF THE PETTICOAT

It is Far From Being a Simple Affair and Deserves the Needlewoman's Careful Attention.

Think you that the ruffle of a petticoat is a simple affair unworthy of thought? Then you err grievously, as witness the following: It may be tucked horizontally, with the edge left plain or bordered with lace.

It may be tucked vertically—an unusual and attractive arrangement—with the edge treated as before.

It may have these vertical tucks interspersed with lace or embroidered insertions, in block effect.

It may be a vandylke ruffle, with a narrow hemstitched edge, and vertical tucks running up and down the irregular sections.

It may be scalloped, with a button-holed edge and a flat coin spot in the middle of each scallop. This is especially good for petticoats of flannel or other heavy fabrics.

It may, finally, be only a plain little hemstitched ruffle, demure but serviceable, and extremely easy to make.

So look well to the petticoat ruffle; it has its possibilities, and nothing is too small to engage the attention of the exacting needlewoman.

COVERS FOR SOFA CUSHIONS

Directions for Making Them So They Don't Need Sewing After Pillow Is Put In.

Make almost all sofa cushion covers, so there is no necessity for sewing them on after putting the pillow in. The front for the pillow is the square of the required size. The back is in two pieces, each half about two to three inches wider than half the front square, and with one long edge on each—if possible, the selvage edge. Place these two pieces on the front with outside edges even, selvages overlapping through the center, right sides together, and sew the seam all around the edge. Turn (through the open slit where the selvages come) and finish with a row of stitching on the right side. Make this row of stitching as far from the edge as you like, if you have allowed for it in cutting out, as it gives a nice hem all around the edge of the pillow. The pillow is slipped in through the slit, and if the edges of it have enough overlap it is held perfectly and needs no buttoning or sewing.

Prevent Navel Infection.

A leading veterinarian gives us this means as a sure preventive of navel infection in sheep: Have the bedding perfectly clean, and as soon as the navel cord has been broken saturate the stump of the navel with a 1-500 solution of corrosive sublimate, and then cover with boric acid. Repeat the dressing with boric acid once or twice daily.

UTILIZING THE SOILED SHOE

Days of Usefulness May Be Extended if Article Is Not Too Far Gone.

Here are a couple of hints for the girl whose dress allowance has to go a long way:

White kid shoes which are too soiled to wear and which are still of a good shape may be renewed for evening wear by painting them with gold paint. Do this carefully and smoothly and the shoes will look like new.

In some cases even soiled satin slippers may be successfully treated in this way.

White kid shoes may also be dyed a fast black by applying the following mixture to them: Five cents' worth of gallic acid and five cents' worth of sulphate of iron.

Put the sulphate of iron in just as much water as is required to dissolve it, no more, and apply this to the shoes. Let it dry, then dissolve the gallic acid in a very little water and apply this. When dry the shoes should be a good black color. Great care must be taken in using these chemicals, and after they have been used the surplus quantity should be thrown away.

For the Wee One.

During the winter months a warm wrapper to slip over the baby when he is being taken from one room to another is a necessity. A very pretty one may be made of nun's veiling, in pink or blue, with an underlining of thin wadding and batiste. The dainty little garment might be embroidered or scalloped round the edge and would prove a pretty present for baby and also a most useful one.

The wrapper should be large enough to slip on easily, for nothing jars a child's nerves more than to be forced into a coat that is too small, and if the wrap takes the form of cape it is equally necessary that it be large enough to envelop the little form when, as in this case, warmth is the object to be secured.

Dainty Lace Caps.

Lace caps are much in vogue for young girls. MADE UP FROM OUTWORN HAT

Novel Bag Easily Made From Material After It Has Served Original Purpose.

Carefully preserve the white or light colored Milan, horse hair, Tuscan, chip or Panama hat. If it cannot be made over into headgear for another summer, it certainly can be transformed into a bag for holding handkerchiefs. Simply by flattening out the brim, facing it with a shirring of chiffon of whatever shade is to be the color scheme of the bag, finishing its edge with a quilling of narrow ribbon and then putting a deep, full lining of heavy silk into the crown of the hat.

This lining is made in the usual way with drawstrings at its top, but instead of being tucked backward into the crown, it is drawn upward by supplementary straps of ribbon attached to its sides, and these in turn are joined to the center of the strings or handle attached to two opposite sides of the hat's brim. To make the illusion of the hat more complete, the crown is sometimes trimmed with large bows of ribbon or wreaths of flowers, but its top must always be kept flat so that it may set squarely upon a smooth surface.

Another novel handkerchief bag which will do as a favor for either a man or a girl at a dance may be made from a half yard length of silk.

COMPARTMENTS IN THE BAG

One of the Newest and Most Welcome of the Many Recent Fads of Fashion.

If you once have owned a fourfold bag you will never again be without one. Into the separate compartments can go buttons, hooks and eyes, thread and sewing utensils and a small piece of work, and there is no wild hunting for the article needed as in a one piece bag.

These bags may be made in any size, but a convenient size is made from a yard and three-quarters of five-inch flowered ribbon with colored satin edges. Cut the ribbon into four strips of equal length, double each strip and overcast the edges together to form a small bag. Turn in the top to the depth of an inch for the heading and run with a double line of sewing for a casing.

Use two yards of number one or baby satin ribbon for a drawstring, cutting in separate yard pieces. Rip the stitches on the outside of the casing between the line of sewing, and run the drawstring through the outside of each of the four bags, tying the ends in a fluffy bow. Start the other drawstrings at the opposite end with two bags to each side and run around the four, using the inner side of the casing. Tie the ends in a bow.

To keep the bags from sliding on the drawstring, tack the two on each side together, running a stitch or two in the frill just above the casing. This makes them draw easily on one string.

IN NUN'S VEILING.



For this costume, nun's veiling in a soft shade of gray is used; a front fastening is simulated, but the actual fastening is at back. The vest of tacked spotted net fills in the opening of front, then the joint is covered by a strap of silk carried down a little to the left; buttons and cord loops form a finish; five small tucks are made on the shoulders. The wristbands are also tacked.

Materials required: 1½ yards 40 inches wide, 6 buttons, ¾ yard net 18 inches wide.

RHUBARB IS BEAUTY MAKER

Women Should Eat It the Year Round—Recipe for Jarred Rhubarb.

Rhubarb is such a beauty maker that women should eat it the year round. It acts on the liver and keeps the complexion clear, counteracting all tendency to biliousness.

It behooves girls to lay in a supply of this vegetable during the rather short season that it lasts. By following exactly the directions given the green can be had all through the winter with much less trouble than if forced in the cellar, as is often done.

Buy nice, fresh rhubarb, scrape it carefully, and cut it into small pieces as for pie or stewing. Pack into glass jars, filling rather tightly. Put the jars when filled in a deep dishpan or a vessel taller than the jar, and fill with cold water from the sprigot.

Put on the lids and screw tight under water, remove the jar, wipe the outside dry, and put in a dark, cool closet until ready for use.

Nothing hard about that. Yet if the lids are made airtight the rhubarb keeps perfectly until opened. When ready for cooking pour off the water in the jar, use fresh water, boil until soft, put in sugar to taste, let it dissolve, and no one will guess you are not using the fresh vegetable.

Coiled Fish.

None but fish of good size should be boiled. If the fish is started in cold water and not allowed to boil hard, it will be less likely to fall apart, but the flavor will not be so good. It is best to wrap the fish in a clean cloth and drop it into boiling water well salted. A tablespoonful of vinegar or the juice of a lemon improves the fish. Leave the head on, but remove the fins. Boil very gently until the fish will fall from the bones. Time depends upon species, from eight to ten minutes per pound for thick fish and five minutes for small ones. Boiled fish require considerable seasoning and a rich sauce, or at least melted butter, to accompany them. Besides lemon, onions, carrots, cloves, etc., may be used in the water.

Waxing Buttonholes.

When you are making tailored buttonholes, wax the silk and linen before beginning to sew. Run the linen thread along the edge of the buttonhole while working with the silk and change the silk with every buttonhole.

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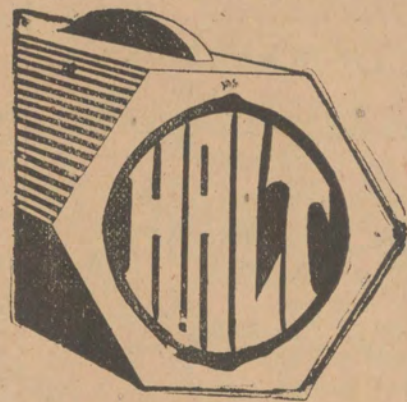
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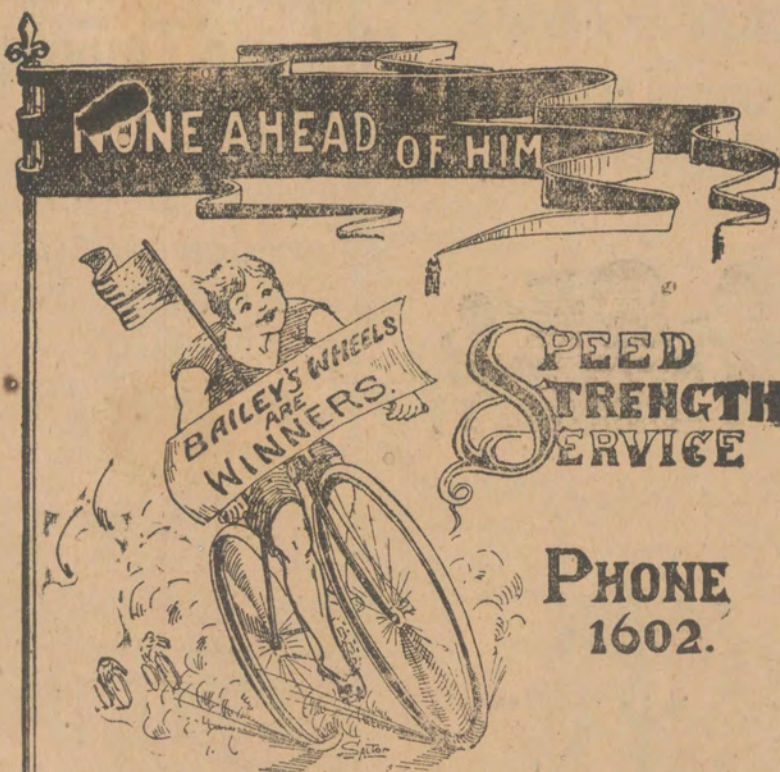
