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SPAIN OBJECTS TO MAINE MONUMENT IN CITY OF HAVANA

Spanish Newspapers Say That To Erect A Monument To The Maine Dead Would be Equivalent To Assuming That Spain Was Responsible For Sinking of The Maine

MADRID, Oct. 25.—The newspapers of this city are nearly all protesting at the proposal of Cuba to erect a monument in Havana to the battleship Maine.

The newspapers take the stand that for Cuba to erect such a monument would be equivalent to a show of unfriendliness to Spain. The whole story of the explosion is gone into again by the newspapers. They

declare that Spain had nothing to do with the explosion that sank the American battleship, but for Cuba to erect a monument to the men who lost their lives there is equivalent to assuming that Spain was responsible.

The hope is expressed that Cuba will desist from her intention to erect such a monument.

SWOBODA HAS BEEN EXPELLED

FRENCH AUTHORITIES CONVINCED HE IS A SPY BUT AS THEY ARE NOT ABLE TO FASTEN GUILT ON HIM HAVE EXPELLED HIM FROM FRENCH TERRITORY.

PARIS, Oct. 25.—The police have decided to expel from France Raymond Swoboda, the man who claimed to be an American and who was alleged to be a German spy. He was arrested here April 1 on the charge of setting fire to the French steamer La Touraine, on which he was a passenger, in the transit of that ship from the United States to France.

Swoboda denied that he was a spy and claimed that he was a citizen of the United States and evidence was placed before Secretary of State Bryan at that time by his business associate, R. K. MacLean. The French police seized Swoboda's baggage in which he had many samples and some maps. He explained the possession of these maps that he required them in the mercantile business in which he was engaged.

The French police insisted that they knew that Swoboda was a spy before he left the United States on the La Touraine. He was identified and was declared to have confessed that his real name was Raymond Raff Schwind and that he got

GREASERS ARE STILL BAD MEN

RECOGNITION OF CARRANZA SEEMS TO BETTER ENABLE THEM TO "RECOGNIZE" AMERICANS WHEN THEY SEE THEM — GENERAL FUNSTON ASKS FOR MORE TROOPS.

BROWNSVILLE, Oct. 25.—A band of Mexicans on their side of the border fired across to the American side this afternoon. The object of their attack was a detachment of United States cavalry. The Americans promptly returned the fire and several of the Mexicans were seen to drop, but it is not known if they were killed or just wounded.

The Mexicans fired from a place near a mesquite shop and it is presumed that they were under the influence of the fiery Mexican drink.

ANOTHER SKIRMISH.

BROWNSVILLE, Oct. 25.—Another skirmish between Mexican bandits and American soldiers occurred tonight. The bandits were driven across the river and it is believed several were wounded. One American soldier was wounded.

FUNSTON WANTS MORE TROOPS.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—General Funston, chief of the United States troops on the Mexican border, has been asked to place 100 more troops at the position of Alderman from the Fourth Ward.

FOR SALE.

General Funston says that the Mexicans have not given up the "Plan of San Diego," which proclaimed the annexation of Texas to Mexico, and that in the last five days more Americans had been killed and more property destroyed than since the commencement of the border warfare.

RUSS TAKE POSITIONS.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The Russian forces who are trying to overcome the German offensive against Riga, have recaptured important positions near Eckau. The Germans lost 18,000 men in this offensive which has brought them to within ten miles of the Russian seaport.

FIERCE ATTACKS BY GERMANS BUT REPULSED BY FRENCH

Germans Have Attacked Again Only To Be Driven Back—Believed That Fierce Artillery Duels In Progress Are But Preliminary To Infantry Attack

PARIS, Oct. 25.—The eighth German attack in five days time took place today against the very strong French positions in the Givenchy wood. They were repulsed with large losses.

There are artillery duels along all of the rest of the western line and in some places it is of great intensity.

These engagements are being watched with great interest because they are believed to presage an early infantry attack.

ENGLISH USE ARTILLERY.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Except for artillery duels the British lines in France and Belgium remain quiet. The artillery, however, is kept busy night and day. The British are employing shells of high power which are believed to be working much damage to the German trenches.

It is declared that the German shells lack much of having the destructive power that they did earlier in the war, and this is taken to mean that they are running short of products from which to make munitions.

ROME, Oct. 25.—The Italians continue their advance into Austrian territory in the Isonzo region. Yesterday they occupied Javoreck, east of Plava, in the Aslava mountains.

Two violent attacks by Austrians against the Italian positions at Merzitz were repulsed with heavy losses. The Italians captured 150 prisoners.

The principal attention of the general staff is on San Martino, where a furious fight is in progress, without so far either side having the advantage.

GERMANS DEFEND KILLING OF BRITISH WAR NURSE

BERLIN, Oct. 25.—The Berlin press is showing great indignation over the attacks on the German government by the London papers because of the execution of Miss Edith Cavell.

The German newspapers state that the activities of women hostile to the German cause in the Belgium territory dominated by the Teuton has lately developed to such a degree that energetic and even brutal means were necessary to end them.

Innumerable incidents are related of hostility to the German cause by women of Allied birth, one of the most recent being the killing of two

German soldiers who were tranquilly eating in a Belgian inn by a young and beautiful French girl, 19 years old, who shot them without warning with a revolver.

SLAV-TEUTON STRUGGLE ON

Conflicting Reports of Success From Both Sides—Casualties Are Heavy

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The Germans report that the Russian forces which were landed at Dome Ness, Courland, have been re-embarked. It is considered more probable that they are attacking the rear of the Germans before Riga and that this fact accounts for the Germans failing to make any further advances on that port.

It is unofficially reported today that the Germans are turning to several important points in the northern battle line and that General von Hindenburg is attempting to reach Dvina. He claims to have taken several important Russian positions and to have captured Iloukust. He reports taking nearly 3,000 prisoners.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Colonel Hevia, secretary of government of Cuba, who left here Saturday on the Tenadores, asked concerning the national defense program of the United States, declared that Cuba would follow the example of the United States, and as soon as the latter country began preparations for war, Cuba would do likewise.

FEDERAL GRAND JURY IS NOW PROBING GERMAN SPY WORK

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—A federal grand jury is investigating to what extent, if any, German agents are trying to foment trouble in Mexico. Witnesses are being examined who are believed to be identified with the Huerta and Felly Diaz factions.

There are reports that the Germans are furnishing the capital for the outfitting of expeditions to be used in Mexico by the factions there that are opposed to the newly recognized government in Mexico. These agents are said to be encouraging these factions with the belief that later when Germany disposes of her enemies at home which it is declared will be a fact within a few months, then they can rely on the support of

Germany against the United States. Whether or not there is anything in these reports, and if so, whether the German government is interested in making trouble in Mexico, or whether some Germans are doing these things on their own initiative, are matters which the Federal grand jury is endeavoring to clear up.

RUSSIA TO FLOAT HER BIGGEST LOAN YET

PETROGRAD, Oct. 25.—The minister of finance has been authorized to float foreign loans to the amount of \$1,700,000,000. It is expected that part of the loan will be placed in the United States.

Be sure to speak distinctly and take enough time to avoid running your words together in a hopeless jumble. This completes your task and the Fire Department will do the rest.

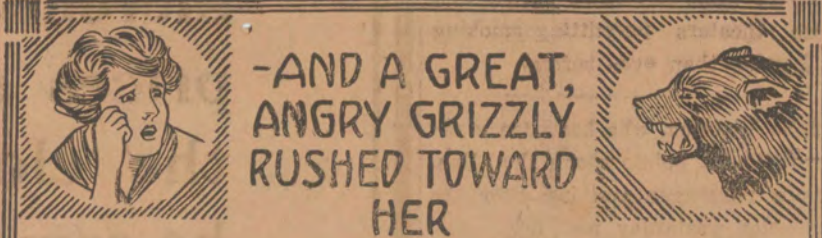

WAR PERVADES OLD LONDON

Social Life of World Metropolis Is Thing of Past Since The War

LONDON, Oct. 25.—"Can you get away from the war in London?" is often asked by Americans in private letters, "or is it everywhere in the forefront?"

In answer it can truthfully be said that it would be a most thoughtless individual who could forget the war in London. While the mourning dresses are not so numerous as in Paris, where it seems as if two-thirds of the women are gowned in black, they are increasing here as the British death roll lengthens. But the war is omnipresent in countless manifestations.

"NO SOCIETY."

There has been no "society," as it is known before the war, for over a year. Even the dinner party and the theater party have passed away, except those of the most informal character. More than half the men in the stalls at the theaters are in khaki and only a few of the ladies with them wear evening gowns.

Incidentally the theaters are one by one putting on revues, the demand being altogether for trivialities and not dramatic excellencies, as a relief from the strain. The men on leave or those about to start for the front care only for amusement of the lightest character and go only where they can smoke. As a result there are more revues and more theaters permitting smoking in London than ever before.

INSTRUCTIONS AS TO HOW TO USE FIRE ALARM BOXES.

If you have't a key for the box, there is located in the neighborhood of each box, a quantity of keys. By raising your voice with the cry of "Fire," you should in a short time attract the attention of some one who has a key.

Insert key in the key hole and turn to the right. This will open the outside door. You will then find in front of you, inside of the box, a hook. Pull this hook down once and when it is as far down as it will go, remove your hand. This completes the performance. Under no conditions pull the hook down the second time as it is absolutely unnecessary and nothing is to be accomplished by so doing.

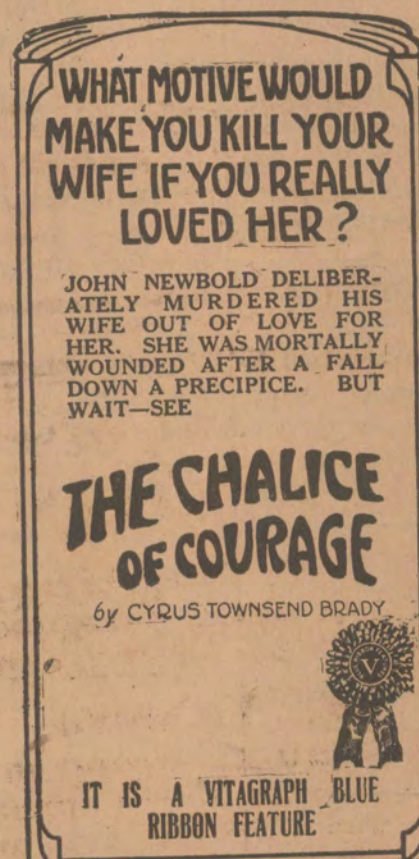
