For Masses.

New York, March 20.—The elimination of waste is what makes possible the success—the dividend bearing success at least—of our large, colossal, capitalized industries. There is absolutely no waste at the mammoth Standard oil refineries at Whiting, Ind., Bayonne, N. J., and Wood River, Ill. It is well-known that the big packing houses in Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Joseph and Indianapolis use everything and turn it into money. The hog-squeal is the only thing they have failed to ship in their refrigerator cars. Some funny people say they use even that, yiz, blows the whistle with it. This is efficiency with a vengeance.

Efficiency is the guiding spirit of this utilitarian age, and this very appropriately has been organized "The American Society for Promoting Efficiency."

With 755 business and professional men from all parts of the country as members, the society's ideas were carried out by "efficiency editing." Of its constitution every instance where a word could be saved in the original draft was pointed upon. JURY FIND "DUTCH" VAN DER PASS GUILTY

But Recommend Him to
Mercy—Judge Harris
Reserves Sentence.

The Criminal Court, Judge W. Hunt, Harris presiding, was occupied all day yesterday, with the case of Frederick Van der Pass, commonly known as "Dutch," charged with robbing J. J. Jefferson, in the Jungletown district some weeks ago. Jefferson, who for two years or more, had worked as a boss carpenter for the F. E. C. Ry., was found by the police sitting down in the street with blood flowing from his face, and bearing other signs of rough handling. He claimed he had been robbed, and the police came to the conclusion that Van der Pass was the aggressor. Later he was arrested in his room in a lodging-house on Duval street. At the preliminary hearing he pleaded not guilty, and was bound over in the sum of \$500.00.

Attorney Lewis Harris was counsel for the defendant and his work on his behalf was brilliant. E. P. Roberts, for the prosecution, also put up a strong case for the state.

The jury retired at 5:15 and did not bring in a verdict until midnight. The verdict read: "We the jury find the prisoner guilty, but recommend him to the mercy of the Court."

Judge Harris reserved sentence.

Attorney Lewis Harris, announced that he will apply for a new trial.

THE BRITISH STRIKE MAY END THIS WEEK

At Least Government and
People Are Generally
Hoping So.

London, March 20.—The government and the people generally are breathing a little easier now because they think there is a possibility of an early adjustment of the dispute between the coal operators and the miners. Premier Asquith introduced the minimum wage bill in the House of Commons today and from all appearances the desire of the Commons was to pass it as speedily as possible. The next step is its introduction to the Lords. It is possible that body will act on it favorably.

Many miners on strike will return to the pits this week, according to the opinion expressed in some quarters, where it is believed that by Monday next operations will be in full swing in the collieries in many parts of the country.

The men's leaders, however, have informed the government that there will be no resumption of work until the minimum wages bill for underground workers has passed through Parliament. In spite of the declaration of the men's leaders, there are indications that the miners are tiring of the strike, particularly in those districts where the prolongation of the contests has made necessary a reduction in the amount of strike pay drawn from the miners' unions. Besides, there is much pressure being brought to bear on the miners by other trades unionists who have been forced out of work by the shortage of coal.

The union's losses have been large. Exclusive of the miner's union, nine other trades unions paid their members, the other day, \$450,000.

Railways and factories are suffering keenly through the coal deficit. Many of the largest factories in Great Britain are either closed down altogether, or working on half time.

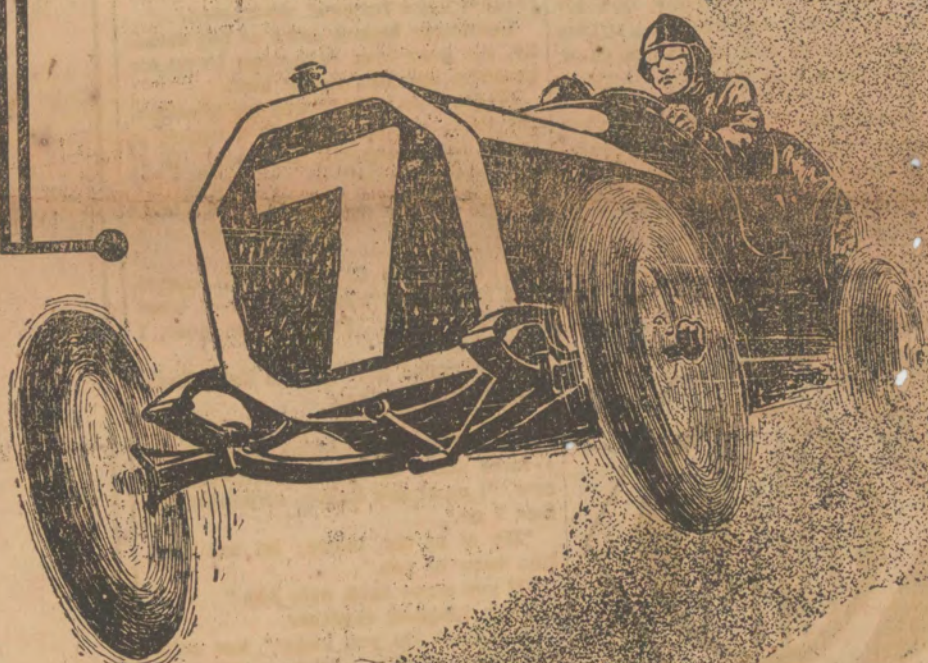

Proper Way to Fit Blouse.

Always begin at the shoulders in fitting a blouse. If the shoulders fit in the proper manner, you need have no fear about the rest of the blouse. Always cut the center front of a bodice on the straight of the material if necessary, it may be taken in very slightly at the waist when being fitted. But if you slope it much the set of the blouse will be wrong, and this is true even when it is to fit a very stout figure.

Eggs With Sauce.

Six neatly poached eggs, six squares of buttered toast, a few drops of anchovy sauce, half a pint of white sauce, two ounces of tarragon and chervil leaves, parsley, chives and watercress. Wash the chives carefully, then pound them together in a mortar, adding to them a few drops of anchovy sauce. Next rub the mixture through a sieve, and add to it the white sauce, stirring it over the fire till both are well mixed. Arrange each egg on a piece of toast, and pour a little sauce over. Serve them neatly arranged on a hot dish.

Roly-Poly.

Roll half a pound of short pastry into a round about a quarter of an inch thick. Spread over it a layer of jam, leaving a margin all around. Wet this edge slightly and then roll by turning the edges in. Press the edges together, then place the roly-poly in a buttered baking dish and bake for fifteen minutes. Serve hot with a hard sauce seasoned with sherry or brandy.

DIET FOR DELICATE CHILD

Food That is Easily Assimilated by Weak Stomach and Gives Sufficient Nourishment.

In caring for a weak child, the important thing is to keep the bowels open. A simple diet is as follows:

Breakfast, dry toast (whole wheat bread preferred) and a codded egg; don't let the white get hard. Dinner the same, and for supper a glass of skimmed milk with a little hot water in it with dry toast, just enough to take the chill off the milk, and get it in the proper condition for a weak stomach. For a school lunch or a little variety we give our girl Dutch rusks. This diet is to eliminate the gas and fermentation, and frequently we give a pinch of soda to keep the stomach sweet.

Never allow a day to pass without a movement of the bowels, and whenever the eyes are red or bloodshot or inflamed, resort to high injection; if you don't understand about the latter a trained nurse should be consulted.

Don't allow candy or sweet stuff of any kind to enter the child's weak stomach. The diet given above seems to be what a weak stomach will take care of and seems to be sufficient nourishment. Get strictly fresh eggs and give plenty of fresh air. You will have to catch and learn what it and what is agreeing with him.

Doctors can assist some, but it is a case of constant care and nursing on your part rather than going to different doctors from time to time. Watch for the red or inflamed eyes, which is a sign of constipation.
