Crowds Gather at Quebec.

Quebec, July 17.—Today marked the gathering in this city of the advance guard of the tremendous throng which will next week welcome the Prince of Wales to Canada and celebrate the tercentenary of the momentous battle between the French and the British on the plains of Abraham. The hotels and residences of the city will be wholly inadequate to entertaining the crowds and thousands will spend the week in the "tent cities" which have sprung up in the vicinity of Quebec. Every effort has been made to make the pageant and other festivities the most noteworthy of their kind ever held in America. Preliminary exercises will be held on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, but the great events of the tercentenary celebration will follow the arrival of the Prince of Wales on Monday.

Dancing was enjoyed by many of the guests until the small hours of morning had passed, and refreshments were served continuously in the cafe, in the saloon or on the porches at the will of the guests.

Before dispersing the guests voted Mr. Cordero a gallant host, and at the instance of several of the guests the "boys" gave him three cheers, and then three cheers again, and then three times three. Special cars were furnished for the guests and they were run long after the regular cars had gone in for the night.

The boys who gather on the street corners have never been taught that they must respect the rights of others. They are frequently into vicious mischief and often have hairbreadth escapes. They jump on and off moving street cars, play tag around swiftly moving vehicles and court danger in hundreds of other ways. In pelting each other with rocks they are not at all careful who they hit. They race through flower gardens and do not hesitate to abuse the owner who protests. The boys are not wholly to blame for their viciousness. The fault lies with the older folks who fail to hold them in check.

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The city is set a good example by planting palm trees in front of the city hall. Small palm trees may be obtained on any of the keys and we often wondered why there are so few seen in the city.

Power for Montana Mines.

Boston, July 16.—Various financial and mining interests, including Senator Clark, H. H. Rogers, Ex-Governor Hauser and others, who represent the Missouri River Power Co., have arranged with the Stone & Webster Engineering Corporation, of Boston, for the development of the immense water power resources in the canyons of the Upper Missouri River in Montana on a scale exceeding anything that has yet been attempted there. The plans provide ultimately for the transformation of 50,000 horse power into electrical energy by means of two dams, and the bulk of this power will be furnished the mines in the Butte and Helena districts.

It is estimated that the construction work planned will cost \$3,000,000, and it will be done in two stages. The first is in connection with a 20,000 horse power dam at Hauser Lake, 60 miles from Butte. This work will begin immediately. Subsequently it is planned to build an immense new dam nearly one-half a mile long and 110 feet in height together with a 30,000 horse power hydro-electric plant at Wolf Creek, a few miles above Hauser Lake. From this plant high tension transmission lines will deliver power to Butte and Helena.

This is believed to be the largest project of the kind undertaken since interest in big developments began to lag over a year ago.

Local as well as general interest attaches to this undertaking from the fact that The Key West Electric Company is operated by Stone & Webster.

Power for Montana Mines.

Boston, July 16.—Various financial and mining interests, including Senator Clark, H. H. Rogers, Ex-Governor Hauser and others, who represent the Missouri River Power Co., have arranged with the Stone & Webster Engineering Corporation, of Boston, for the development of the immense water power resources in the canyons of the Upper Missouri River in Montana on a scale exceeding anything that has yet been attempted there. The plans provide ultimately for the transformation of 50,000 horse power into electrical energy by means of two dams, and the bulk of this power will be furnished the mines in the Butte and Helena districts.

It is estimated that the construction work planned will cost \$3,000,000, and it will be done in two stages. The first is in connection with a 20,000 horse power dam at Hauser Lake, 60 miles from Butte. This work will begin immediately.

Subsequently it is planned to build an immense new dam nearly one-half a mile long and 110 feet in height together with a 30,000 horse power hydro-electric plant at Wolf Creek, a few miles above Hauser Lake. From this plant high tension transmission lines will deliver power to Butte and Helena.

This is believed to be the largest project of the kind undertaken since interest in big developments began to lag over a year ago.

Local as well as general interest attaches to this undertaking from the fact that The Key West Electric Company is operated by Stone & Webster.

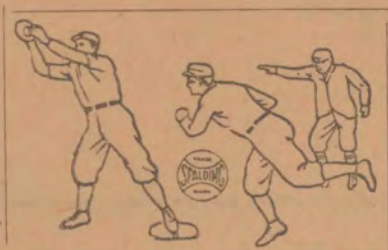
