AT 5:23 YESTERDAY AFTERNOON THE ILL FATED MAINE SANK TO LAST RESTING PLACE

Battleships Fired Salute Of
21 Guns As She Disap-
peared Beneath Waves.

MOST SOLEMN OCCASION

Cuban Gunboats And Fleet Of
Excursion Steamers Attend-
ed The Funeral.

(Special To The Journal.)

Havana, Cuba, March 16.—At 5:23 this afternoon, the hull of the ill-fated Maine was sunk beneath the waves, finding a final resting place in 1,000 fathoms of water. The watery sepulture took place three miles out of Havana Harbor to the North.

On the stroke of two this afternoon, the U. S. Naval tug Osceola towed the wrecked battleship out of the harbor, with the guiding tugs on each side holding her in position. Following came the North Carolina and the Birmingham, the Cuban gunboat Hatuey with President Gomez on board and two other Cuban gunboats besides a great number of excursion boats, all with flags flying at half mast.

The sea was thronged with people, as was also the Maleson drive on the sea wall side. Great as the crowds were they remained almost perfectly still, impressed with the solemnity of the occasion. Out past Cabanas Fortress and Morro Castle moved the procession of ships. When the sea swell was felt the poor old Maine pitched and rolled ominously, and so it was almost impossible to proceed any faster than at a snail's pace.

At 4:30 the North Carolina blew three blasts of her whistle signifying that the three mile limit had been reached, which was shown by the range finder. This signal was answered by the Birmingham and the tugs, and all was ready for the last act of the drama. At about 4:50 the sea valves of the Maine were opened. No signs of sinking were perceptible for the first twenty minutes, but from then on it was plain that the forward end of the hull was gradually being submerged. Plunging about in a heavy sea, each dip allowed more and more water to break over her deck, and finally, with one last plunge she never recovered herself, and with stern rising high in the air she slipped from sight, carrying down with her a large American flag still flying from its staff. A funeral march was played during the Maine's last moments, and as she sank beneath the sea, broadsides were fired by the North Carolina and Birmingham, while the bugles sounded "taps," the saddest of all bugle calls. A salute of 21 guns then marked the end of the Maine. It was a most impressive and never-to-be-forgotten scene.

COL. CROMWELL GIBBONS Candidate For GOVERNOR OF FLORIDA

The voters of Florida are called upon to decide many grave issues at the spring primaries. It is my desire that every man shall know exactly where I stand on these questions. I hope to be able to address gatherings in all the principal communities. Those whom I cannot reach personally must be touched through the columns of the local newspapers. Those whom I will meet personally will be in better position to judge for themselves from having read and considered my platform. With this in view, I have prepared a short synopsis of the sixteen cardinal reforms and principles embodied in my platform for publication in every newspaper of the state. I ask the people of Florida to make me their governor as the measure of their approval of my stand on these questions:

PLATFORM.

First—Extended and increased powers to the Railroad Commission, which will insure the utmost rigors for the shippers and which will guarantee proper and equitable rates.

Second—The Convict Lease System of Florida is a brutalizing one. I am in favor of its abolishment and the placing of the convicts on the public highways of the State. Florida needs more good roads, and I believe that they can be best secured by working out the convicts thereon. Also the State has no right to profit by the misfortunes of its citizens. The actual labor to maintain the support of the convict is all the State is entitled to. Any profit should be set aside for the benefit of the family of the convict. Because we should punish the criminal is no reason why his family should suffer. On the contrary they should be protected and supported by the labor of the convict and thus the State will be relieved of the possibility of the family being a public charge.

Third—To re-establish the rule of the people and to meet conditions that confront us today, I am in favor of the initiative, referendum and recall.

The initiative means that the people shall, by petition or otherwise make their desires known to their lawmaking bodies. The referendum means that all laws passed by lawmaking bodies shall be referred direct to the people before they become operative. At an election called for that purpose the people can vote for or against laws passed by their representative and a majority vote for or against a law adopts it or rejects it. The recall means that at any election, special or regular, the people may by ballot, determine whether or not a public servant whose term has not expired is still acceptable to them, and a majority vote for or against him determines whether or not that servant shall stay in office or be recalled.

Fourth—I favor additional laws for the control of trusts.

Fifth—There should be stringent laws governing all corporations authorized to do business in Florida, thus protecting purchasers of securities offered by such corporations.

Sixth—Florida has suffered greatly through the operations of irresponsible land companies. I, therefore, favor strict laws governing land and colonization companies in order to protect alike the investors and settlers and the reliable dealers.

Seventh—The drainage of the lands known as the Everglades by the State on a safe scientific and business basis.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Rev. S. Kay Darlington, pastor of the Congregational Church had a narrow escape from death or permanent injury, early yesterday morning when he was struck by lightning.

During the height of the unusually severe electrical and rain storm, Mr. Darlington got up to close the shutters to keep the rain out. The moment he reached the window there came a most peculiarly brilliant flash of lightning, and Mr. Darlington fell heavily to the floor and remained for sometime unconscious. Dr. J. B. Maloney was summoned and soon revived the reverend gentleman.

It is thought that there will remain any permanent effects of the shock he sustained.

that will insure drainage and reclamation; and that the same shall be drained and sold for its people, and not permitted to go into the hands of speculators. The State is to be responsible for the drainage and reclamation of the swamp and overflowed lands, purchasers of un reclaimed lands should be fully advised at the time and should not be sold to prospective settlers until the same have been made permanently inhabitable and tillable.

Eighth—The establishment of an Immigration Bureau for the purpose of developing impartially all sections of the State. Florida possesses a vast territory of inhabitable and tillable lands distributed throughout the State, and I believe it should establish and determine to have an immigration bureau that will aid and assist all sections for the development and colonization of these properties. We should lend our efforts impartially to all sections and protect every honest investor and settler by providing that he receives what is represented when sold to him.

Ninth—The organization of a State tax equalization board by which taxes of the people shall be uniformly regulated and the State shall receive justly its proper returns from all property holders.

Tenth—Amendment of the primary election laws of the State. We should provide for a more thorough publicity of campaign contributions and expenditures, and regulate and limit the amount that legally shall be expended by candidates for office—state and county—and for what purpose said expenditure shall be authorized.

Eleventh—Legislation that will improve and extend our free public school system, providing every opportunity throughout the State for the education of our children.

Twelfth—Continuation of local option and a strict enforcement in every county of the local option laws of the State.

Thirteenth—The increased efficiency of the National Guard and Naval Militia of Florida by State and Municipal aid.

Fourteenth—Legislation extending and increasing the powers of municipal and county governments, thus giving the people absolutely home government.

Fifteenth—The conservation of our natural resources under the control of the State.

Sixteenth—A conservative and progressive business administration of the State giving complete publicity at all times of its affairs.

These declarations cover the issues which are of most interest and importance to our people at this time. My record as a public servant should be sufficient to insure the justice and wisdom of my stand on any question of importance which shall arise later. I have always and consistently been on the side of the people as a whole, as my record will show. I stand for a conservative business administration of the affairs of the State of Florida. If elected I shall undertake to perform my part of great work as thoroughly and patiently as if engaged in the management of a vast business enterprise of my own. Under such an administration Florida should move rapidly forward in all lines of progress, and the full measure of prosperity which our diversified resources promise should be realized.

Help Not Hinder Governor Harmon In His Race For The Nomination.

HOPE OF DEMOCRAT PARTY

The Only Man In the Party
Who Can Carry Indiana,
Ohio and New York

Washington, March 16.—Harmon stock here continues to improve, and this despite the fact that he has been denominated the original trust buster by Atlee Pomerene, Senator from Harmon's own state. Said Senator Pomerene:

"During the time that Governor Harmon was attorney-general, congress appropriated, I can't give the exact figures, but my recollection is it was from \$25,000 to \$50,000 a year, for him to investigate and prosecute trust violations together with other business of that department. Wickersham has been given from \$200,000 to \$500,000.

A Corporate interests in Ohio, especially the railroads have no love for Harmon. When attorney-general under Cleveland Mr. Harmon raised the tax valuation of the railroads in that state all the way from ten to thirty per cent. The big roads, such as the Pennsylvania, Big Four, Lake Shore and Michigan Southern, Ry's., Lake Erie and Western, Clover Leaf, Baltimore and Ohio and Hooking Valley Ry's were the hardest hit. The valuations still remain and the directors and stockholders have never forgiven Judson Harmon for this. Notwithstanding this Mr. Harmon polled a tremendous vote in his race for the governorship.

Robert B. Gordon who has charge in the national capital of Mr. Harmon's campaign very emphatically denied that Gov. Harmon, Underwood of Alabama and Champ Clark constitute a trinity to oppose Gov. Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey."

Said Mr. Gordon:

"The persistency with which this charge is made might suggest to a disinterested person that the men who are conducting Gov. Wilson's canvass are piqued by reason of the growing popularity of some of his opponents. If there exist a conspiracy, such as indicated by these frequent outbursts, I am unaware of it.

"Once and for all, I desire to emphasize that Gov. Harmon as a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, is only responding to the desire of a vast number of Democrats in all sections of the United States, who believe him to be the strongest candidate that the party can nominate. He is making a dignified and manly contest, and believes that his opponents have the same right. Furthermore, he is grateful for the kind words that have been printed by many newspapers and spoken by friends in the interest of his candidacy.

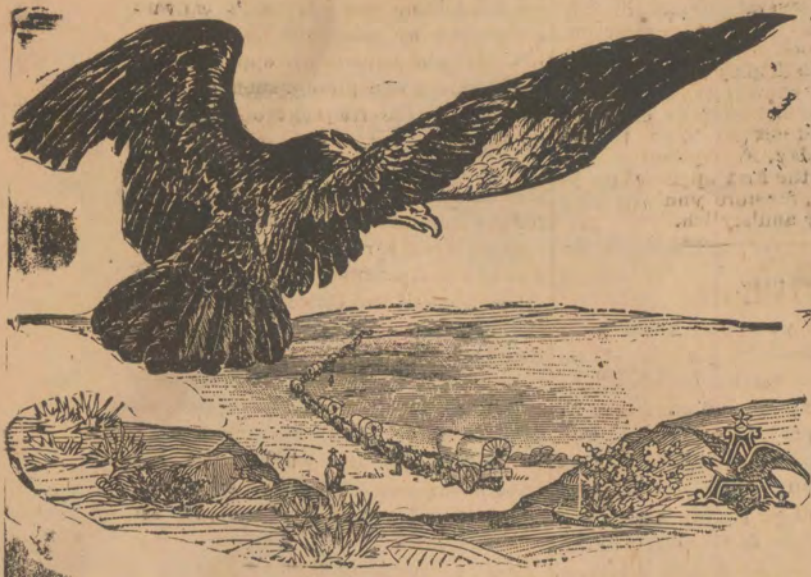
