

KEY WESTERS ARE NATURAL RESCUERS

Former Resident Keeps Up Good Work In New England Waters

Many people in Key West remember Capt. P. L. Cosgrove who commanded the Hibiscus when she was the local lighthouse tender. Capt. Cosgrove is now commander of the tender Azalea with headquarters at New Bedford, Mass., in what is known as the 2nd Lighthouse district. In the Lighthouse Service Bulletin for February occurs this passage:

"Philip L. Cosgrove, master, and the officers and crew of the lighthouse tender Azalea, have been commended for saving the schooner Rescue, which grounded on Hyannis Flats, Mass., on December 29, 1911. Upon sighting the signals of distress the tender proceeded out to the Rescue and towed the boat to Hyannis Harbor. It is reported that but for the timely arrival of the Azalea the schooner would have pounded to pieces and the crew probably drowned."

It would appear as if Providence had specially selected Key Westers to do rescue work on the high seas. There is no port in the world, perhaps, where there are more wreckers than in Key West.

And in connection with the rescue by Capt. Cosgrove noted above, there occurred at Key West a couple of weeks ago a rescue almost identical. It was when the lighthouse tender Mangrove, returning from Tortugas, sighted the distressed schooner Otis. As chronicled in this paper, the Mangrove came to the assistance of the Otis, then at the mercy of wind and wave, and towed her into this port. The Otis is now lying out about half a mile from Taylor's wharf.

When in Key West, Capt. Cosgrove besides commanding the Hibiscus, also captained the Laurel and the Mangrove. His father, Capt. P. L. Cosgrove, still resides here and he will be glad to learn that his son, up in the Lighthouse district, is doing so well the work that seems to be a specialty of Key West.

At this juncture—at the psychological moment so to speak—there arrived Rees Gabriel of Des Moines, where the Commission form of government has been tried out for several years, to the satisfaction of everybody but the grafters. The introductions over, Mr. Gabriel said: "Being a newspaper man you know that we citizens of Iowa's proud capital swear by our city like every true Athenian swore by Athens. Oh, no, I wouldn't say we have no graft, but it is nothing like it was in the old days of wards and aldermen. You know we call Des Moines 'The City of Certainties'—meaning we deliver the goods. And another slogan we have is 'Des Moines Does Things.' We will have an election in the spring and it is dollars to doughnuts that Commission will be indorsed over-

back to the old order of things, for there have been more improvements in the five years past than in the fifty preceding."

JOSE MIGUEL GOMEZ ON THE EVE OF RESIGNING AS THE PRESIDENT OF CUBA

Evidently He Fears That Crisis Is At Hand Owing To Result Of Cuban Supreme Court Decision Which Protects Spanish Sympathizers

Reports from Havana are to the effect that Jose Miguel Gomez has under serious consideration handing in his resignation as President of Cuba. At least, Senator Espinosa his adviser admits as much.

Senator Espinosa was quoted by La Ultima Hora as follows: "It is not true, as has been stated that I am carrying in my pocket the resignation of the president of the republic. If the president resigns he will send his resignation to congress, not to me."

"The facts in the case are these: A few days ago General Gomez said to a few of his intimate friends, of whom I was one, that he proposed to resign in view of the turn which political affairs were taking and the wide separation among the elements of the Liberal party."

"In view of this attitude of the president, the gravity of which every one will understand, I called a meeting of several intimate friends of the president in my residence. We made up our minds to do everything in our power to induce the president to change his intention about resigning and at the same time to use our best endeavors to bring about a better understanding among the elements of the Liberal party."

"These endeavors of ours are still going on, and it can be stated that I am convinced that owing to the progress which is being made as a result of our work, we will induce the pres-

ident, if we have not already done so, to change his intention about resigning."

Washington, Feb. 27.—Another crisis in Cuban affairs apparently is at hand. Reports from the island indicate that the unrest temporarily quieted by Secretary Knox' recent note of warning, is about to break out anew as a result of the Cuban supreme court decision invalidating the law ousting the office holders who were Spanish sympathizers during the revolution.

Literal execution of the court's decree would involve the reinstatement of a large number of displaced office holders and dismissal of the so-called Veterans who were put in their places. With this in prospect, the leaders of the Veterans Association are said to be in an ugly humor and if they should attempt to resist the decree, serious trouble would ensue.

The "Veterans" who are both numerous and powerful, abated their demands for complete expulsion from government position of all Spanish sympathizers only under pressure of the implied threat of American intervention contained in Secretary Knox' note informing the Gomez administration that the United States would insist upon the maintenance of a republican government in Cuba.

Developments are being awaited with keen interest in official circles here. It is believed that the situation will tax the resources of President Gomez to the utmost.

EXPRESS COMPANIES MAY GET GOOD CHECK

Become Law They Certainly Will Howl

Washington, D. C., Feb. 27.—Gardner of Maine, today introduced a bill, under which the government would take over the properties of the express companies and operate them as a part of the postal service, extending the service to the rural delivery.

The bill states that the probable cost of taking over the properties to be as follows:

Real property, \$14,032,189; equipment, \$7,351,405; materials and supplies, \$138,210; advance payments on contracts, \$5,836,666; and franchises, good will, etc., \$1,877,369, making a total of \$39,165,819.

While the balance sheets of the companies show other assets of nearly \$150,000,000, Senator Gardner argues that these are not intended to express service and might be retained by the corporations without impairing its value.

BIGGEST ENGINE ON ATLANTIC COAST

Engine Number sixty six came in over the Florida East Coast Railway yesterday morning, and was quite a sight for every one who had never seen the big engines known as the Pacific type. The engine has three pairs of big drivers, making six drivers, with three pairs of pony trucks. The engine is of the make nicknamed the "Monkey Motion" engine, on account of all the gearing being on the outside. The engine is known as the Walschaert make, and it is the first time the big engine has come down the East Coast railway.

RELIGIOUS FREEDOM IN RUSSIA TOO!

Salvation Army Is Now Admitted To Realms Of The Czar

St. Petersburg, Feb. 27.—A hearing was granted yesterday to representatives of the Salvation Army by the premier, and the government order recently passed by the council of ministers, excluding the Salvation army from Russia and prohibiting all meetings under penalty of arrest and imprisonment, was revoked.

It is understood that the Czar favors the restoration of the Salvation army to full rights, despite the bitter opposition of M. Sabin, the procurator of the holy synod. It is alleged that the army has a strong influence with the laboring classes, and that the acceptance of its tenets precludes the likelihood of affiliation with the socialists and anarchists. "Belief in a future life prevents men from attaching too great importance to this life, and the more Salvation Army members there are in Russia the fewer the nihilists and socialists there will be to threaten the throne," is the way the matter is put by a leading St. Petersburg newspaper.

The army was banned from St. Petersburg despite assurances given by Mr. Stolypin to General Booth, when the latter was here a year ago, that the organization would be welcomed.

The army from Russia was based on the allegation that the organization amounted in practice to a perpetual breach of the law governing public meetings, because the precise topic of each gathering could not be defined in advance, nor could spontaneous orations be suppressed except by police action.

COMPARTMENTS IN THE BAG

One of the Newest and Most Welcome
of the Many Recent Fads
of Fashion.

If you once have owned a fourfold bag you will never again be without one. Into the separate compartments can go buttons, hooks and eyes, thread and sewing utensils and a small piece of work, and there is no wild hunting for the article needed as in a one-piece bag.

These bags may be made in any size, but a convenient size is made from a yard and three-quarters of five-inch flowered ribbon with colored satin edges. Cut the ribbon into four strips of equal length, double each strip and overcast the edges together to form a small bag. Turn in the top to the depth of an inch for the heading and run with a double line of sewing.

Use two yards of number one baby satin ribbon for a drawstring, cutting in separate yard pieces. Rip the stitches on the outside of the casing between the line of sewing, and run the drawstring through the outside of each of the four bags, tying the ends in a fluffy bow. Start the other drawstrings at the opposite end with two bags to each side and run around the four, using the inner side of the casing. Tie ends in a bow.

To keep the bags from sliding on the drawstring, tack the two on each side together, running a stitch or two in the trill just above the casing. This makes them draw easily on one string.

ROOSEVELT IS IN THE RING

Teddy Roosevelt has made President Taft most unhappy by his statement that he will accept the Republican nomination for President if it is offered him. If the Democrats nominate Judson Harmon for President he will win in a walk and it now seems probable that he will be the nominee.

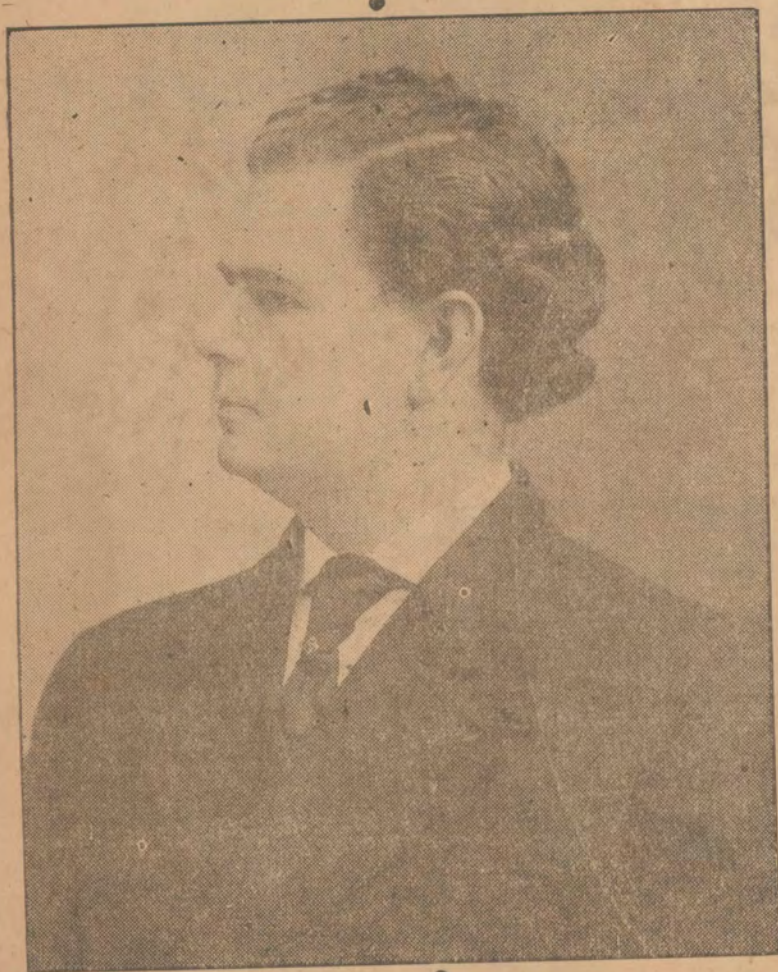

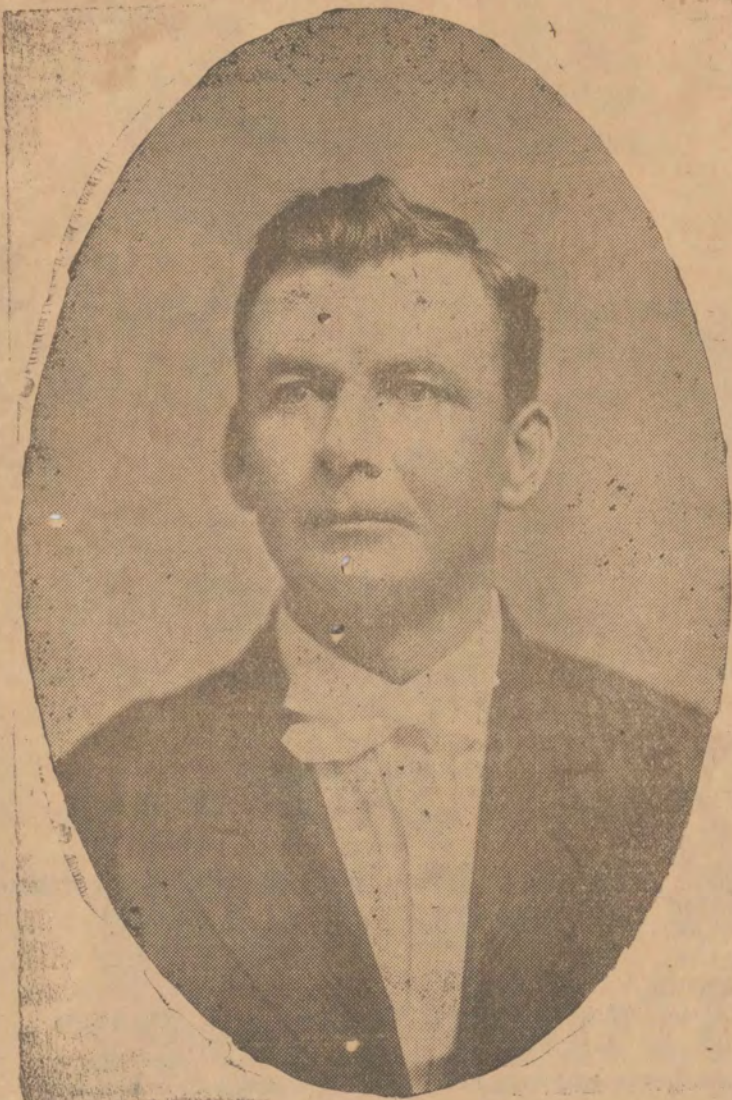

FEW ABLE MANAGERS

Only Six Qualify as Being Successful Leaders.

So Much Depends on Financial End of Baseball Venture That Any Chieftain Keeping Team in Lead is Valuable Asset.

What salary is a successful major league baseball manager worth? The question is a common one, and the answer most commonly given is: "All he can get." That is about as near as one can express it in figures.

So much of the financial success of a baseball venture depends upon the showing of the team, which is the concrete representative of the venture, that any manager who can keep a team in the race for the championship of his league is worth a great deal to the baseball promoter. In these days even a tail-end team is not necessarily a financial loser. If it plays 77 games at home before

crowds made small by lack of interest in its efforts, it must be remembered that the same tail-end team plays 77 games away from home each season and gets on the average a shade better than 40 per cent. of the receipts of the games.

But the big money in baseball is made by the "winners" — the champions and the near champions who are in the race all or most all of the season. Consequently every club owner wants a winner, some of them for sportmanlike as well as financial reasons; others of them merely for the coin. To get a winning ball team a club owner must get a successful manager. There is no other way. A promoter can spend money with both hands seven days a week for seven years, buying and developing ball players, and never get his team out of eighth place at the end of the season. Unless the club owner has a manager possessed of the peculiar qualifications demanded by the club, he cannot expect a winning team.

If it were possible to corral 12 or 15 stars of the present day into one team, handled by an inexperienced, incompetent manager, that aggregate of stars would stand small chance in a major league pennant race. A clever, brainy manager with a good team of average players is a better investment financially than a lot of managerless stars would be.

The supply of managers is so scarce that those who have made good beyond doubt can command almost any figure they ask for. The practice is becoming more and more common of cutting the manager in on the profits. This can be done either as a stockholder, as in the case of Frank Chance, of the Cubs, and Connie Mack, of the Athletics, or by making the manager's contract call for a certain percentage

of the profits in addition to a stated salary, as in the case of Hugh Jennings, of the Detroit club.

Taking a glance at the managerial field as it stands today, there appears to be only five major league managers who can be included without qualification in the successful class. They are Frank Chance, Fred Clarke and John McGraw, in the National league, and Connie Mack and Hugh Jennings in the American league.
