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ADJOURNED MEETING COUNCIL LAST NIGHT

Francis St. Cemetery Gate Will be Kept Open From 10 a. m. to 6 p. m.

An adjourned meeting of the City Council was held last night at City Hall, the meeting having adjourned from last Thursday night. Those present were: President C. F. Kemp, Councilmen F. H. Ladd, E. E. Ingraham, W. B. Curry, Wm. R. Pinder and J. R. Valdez.

The regular bills for June were read, and on motion duly carried were ordered paid subject to the approval of the several committees. On motion duly carried, the chairman of the cemetery committee was instructed to notify the city sexton to keep the Francis street gate to the cemetery open from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. daily.

The city attorney read communications and telegrams received from Farnson and Co. of Chicago relative to the refunding bonds, and asked the council to ratify them, which was done.

A communication was read from Mrs. Emmeline Hayes through her attorney, Lancelot Lester, requesting permission to erect a frame building on Caroline street. Permission was not granted as same did not conform to the fire limit regulations. The meeting then adjourned.

TAMPA BOX FACTORY WAS DESTROYED—\$40,000 LOSS

Plant Was an Entire Loss But Steps Has Been Taken to Rebuild at Once

Tampa, July 22.—The sawmill plant of the Tampa Box Factory at 21st street, and between 1st and 2nd avenues, was totally destroyed by fire Saturday afternoon. Little remains of the \$40,000 outfit but the blank outer walls, which are of concrete construction. With the building was destroyed the power plant which operated the machinery in the factory proper. Insurance to amount of \$27,000 was carried. Steps were taken at once to install electric power, so that the factory can resume operations this week. It happened that the company had some six months' supply of cedar saved for box making and the loss of the mill will not hold up work. The mill will be rebuilt at once.

LIGHTS OWN FUNERAL PYRE.

Chilton, Wis., July 22.—Upon a funeral pyre of pine knots and branches which he had lighted, John Perle, the last of a branch of Pottawatamie Indians who formerly lived near here, took his life Sunday evening. The Indian was ninety years old. People living in the vicinity saw flames arising near the Indian's cabin. They found the aged man on the blazing pine burned nearly to cinders.

RETAIL BUSINESS IS BOOMING ALONG

Dry Goods Merchants Are Buying Larger Stocks This Season

It seems to be a self evident fact that when merchants buy large stocks of goods it must be because they have good reason to believe to know, in fact, that they can readily dispose of them. Key West merchants this summer are buying larger stocks than ever before, and these buying excursions are only undertaken after a careful study of conditions and the situation locally as it actually exists. Therefore, when the business men of the city begin to lay in large stocks of goods it is a fairly certain indication that money is going to circulate freely for a few months at least.

It is about time for the cigar business, which has been a little off this year, for various reasons, to pick up in anticipation of the holiday trade. The merchants are doubtless figuring on a much improved cigar business, and this would explain the heavy stocks being purchased.

WORK COMPLETED BY CIRCUIT JUDGES AND REPORT IS MADE TO GOVERNOR GILCHRIST

Judge Whitfield, Hon. W. A. Blount and Hon. Charles M. Cooper Appointed Committee to Investigate Systems of Pleading and Procedure

Tallahassee, July 22.—The conference of the circuit judges of Florida called together by the governor made suggestions and recommendations as to the amendment of laws so as to minimize their technicalities, completed their work and made report to the governor. The report to the governor follows:

To His Excellency, Albert W. Gilchrist, Governor of the State of Florida:

Sir: Your Excellency invited the circuit judges of the state to meet at the state capital to confer together with reference to proposing or recommending remedies to any defects in the administration of the law and draft bills to meet such defects and report the same to the governor.

We have the honor to report that the following circuit judges met in the senate chamber: Judges Malone, Call, Willis, Wolfe, Price, Bullock, Perkins and Whitney. In order that the conference might be effectively and systematically conducted, organization was effected by selecting Judge Malone to preside over the deliberations and Judge Price to keep record of the result of the matters agreed upon.

We first exchanged and compared various details of practice in our respective circuits, with a view to adopting from one another details of unwritten practice that would be calculated to result beneficially to practice. We then discussed systems of pleading and practice, and it appearing that a commission composed of Judge Whitfield, Hon. W. A. Blount and Hon. Charles M. Cooper has been appointed to investigate the various systems of pleading and procedure and that said commission is now working in pursuance of the object of their appointment, we did not deem it advisable or necessary to further consider the subject in advance of the report of said commission. MICHIGAN TAKES A CHANCE WITH TEDDY

By Almost Unanimous Vote Divorced Themselves From The G. O. P.

Jackson, Mich., July 20.—Michigan progressives divorced themselves absolutely from the republican party in their state convention here today. By almost unanimous vote the delegates went on record as favoring the placing of an entire ticket, both state and national, in the field. A few instructed delegates voted against the move in order to record the sentiment of their home counties, but explained to the convention that they were for separation from the old party.

Delegates to the national progressive convention in Chicago, Pres. Roosevelt's committee and a member of the national committee were chosen today. At the time of the adjournment of the day session the convention adjourned indefinitely.

SEVEN-EIGHTHS OF THE CANAL NOW COMPLETED

At Present Rate Big Ditch Will be Ready For Opening January 1, 1915

Washington, July 22.—More than seven-eighths of the excavation work on the Panama canal has been completed. On June 1st, according to the canal record, 22,052,815 cubic yards, or less than one-eighth of the total amount of earth and rock to be taken out of the canal route, remained to be excavated. At the rate the great steam shovels are working this certainly can be done in time to have the water ready for opening on schedule January 1, 1915.

Washington, July 22.—Royal E. Cabell, commissioner of internal revenue predicted that if the Peters bill permitting every employee of a cigar factory, to use twenty-one cigars a week, untaxed, becomes a law, the government will lose \$3,000,000 a year in revenue. He also predicts that the cost of collecting the cigar revenue will be increased enormously.

The Peters bill passed the house Tuesday. It attempts to restore to the 130,000 cigar makers in the country a practice that is said to have prevailed in the trade for more than 100 years, the granting of free "smokers" to all employees in limited numbers.

On September 1 last Commissioner Cabell issued an order requiring the discontinuance of the practice. Seven thousand cigar makers at Tampa, blaming the manufacturers, promptly struck. Three days later they returned to work on an agreement that the manufacturers would help secure the reversal of the order. The Peters bill is the result of the joint efforts of the manufacturers and the organized cigar makers.

"Any legislation which attempts to permit taxed goods to be taken out of bonded premises is vicious in principle and opens the way to great frauds," said Mr. Cabell. "If this bill becomes a law I predict that within a very few years we will have frauds in the revenue that will be even greater than the frauds of the whiskey ring."

FALLS FROM TRAIN, LAUGHS.

Omaha, Neb., July 22.—Reed Fairbanks, the three-year-old son of L. R. Fairbanks, of Salt Lake City, fell from the window of a fast moving Union Pacific train. When the train was stopped a brakeman hurried back and found Fairbanks, Jr., sitting in the middle of the track and chuckling.

CITY HEALTH DEPT. TO WAGE WAR ON RATS

Communication From City Health Officer Emphasizes Importance of War

Key West, Fla., July 16, 1912. To the Citizens of Key West: At a special meeting of the city council, held yesterday, this office was authorized to start a crusade on rats and mice, and a bonus of five cents will be paid for each rat delivered, dead or alive, to the city jailer at the city jail, and one cent for each mouse. Bubonic plague made its appearance in our neighboring city, Havana, Cuba, recently and while no undue apprehension need be felt about the matter, at this time, yet it is imperative that we as a community begin a city-wide movement to free the community of rats at once.

Plague epidemics follow the usual shipping channels and it is customary for the rat population of a place to become afflicted with this disease for months before human cases develop. Even at this date it is possible that we may have infected rats in our community.

The disease is contracted by inoculation through the bites of fleas from plague infected rats and one case of rat plague is infinitely more dangerous to a community than many human cases.

Plague can only gain a foothold where there are rats and by destroying these pests we can become immune to this dreaded scourge. There is no "best" way for killing rats and mice; the various rat poisons sold by druggists and stores in general, are all effective when used according to directions.

Trapping should be resorted to and the cat, the rat's natural enemy, should not be forgotten. It should be remembered that rats will at once quit your premises if the kitchen refuse is kept in closed receptacles and no food left accessible to them.

The seaports from Boston to Galveston have all started killing rats and Key West, having more frequent communication with Havana than any of them, should certainly not delay this urgent work.

COL. TOOMER SUEING BANK FOR DAMAGES

Says Bank Caused Levy Against Property Worth \$100,000 For Small Debt

Jacksonville, July 22.—Suit was filed Saturday afternoon in the Circuit Court by W. M. Toomer for \$10,000 damages against the Fourth National Bank of this city. Mr. Toomer also filed suit for \$40,000 damages against the United Grocery Co. of this city.

It is understood Mr. Toomer claims the bank was responsible for "an oppressive and excessive levy against his property valued at over \$100,000, for a \$7,000 debt."

The same allegation is made against the United Grocery Co. for a debt said to be less than \$3,000.

Suit for \$20,000 damages was also filed against the Fourth National Bank by W. M. Toomer, Jr., who alleges an illegal levy was made by the bank on his automobile, a roadster, and the bank is also sued for the value of the car, \$3,000.

The Journal is in receipt of a letter from Mr. Louis Lewis, junior member of the firm of A. Louis and Son in which he states that he expects to return to Key West in about ten days. JAPAN AND RUSSIA NOT MAKING PEACE TREATY

Formal Denial Reaches State Department From Embassy in Tokio

Washington, July 22.—Formal denial of the published statement that a treaty between Japan and Russia expected to define their respective interests in Manchuria and Mongolia was about to be signed at St. Petersburg has reached the state department from the American embassy at Tokio.

Unofficial opinion is expressed here that even if a treaty is in incubation it might be found to be nothing more than an agreement between the two powers not to interfere with one another in certain definite zones and such an agreement would have no binding force upon any other nation.

Here is a picture of "Oberst," a dog who has been to the South Pole, with his best friend, Oscar Wisting. Both were members of the Amundsen expedition. When the five men of that expedition set out on the final march for the pole, they were accompanied by fifty-two dogs and had sledges and provisions for four months. Eleven of the dogs survived the whole journey and returned safely to Framheim, the base camp. "Oberst" ("Colonel") was the oldest and biggest of the pack.

WHERE EAST AND WEST MEET



This picture shows the boundary stone on the Trans-Siberian railway in the Ural mountains which was erected not long ago. On one side of the stone is painted, in Russian characters, "Europe," and on the other side "Asia." The picture was taken in somewhat novel circumstances, the operator being on the footplate of the engine of the east-bound Trans-Siberian express, two of his friends holding on to him in order to maintain him in position as the train was rushing along at full speed.

Apocryph of Washington's birthday George M. Cohan, the comedian, said at a dinner at the Players' club in New York:

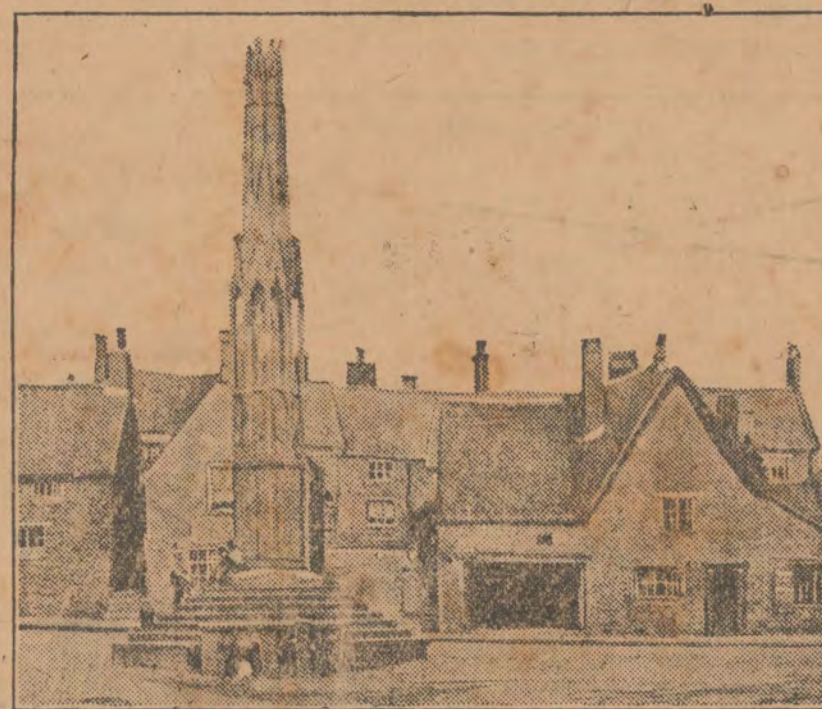
"All actors, alas, have not the veracity of George Washington. I know an actor—and his name isn't Washington—who was so hard up during the zero weather of last month that he came near suicide."

Memorial to Queen Eleanor



Of the fifteen crosses erected by Edward I. of England to the memory of his queen, Eleanor, but three now remain, and the handsomest and best preserved of these is that at Geddington, here pictured. When Eleanor died at Harby, not far from Lincoln, Edward brought her body back to London and at every place where the procession halted for the night he caused a memorial cross to be built. The Geddington cross is divided into three stories. Of these the first is solid and between the shafts, on a curved face, it is carved with beautiful diaper work of roses, and with six shields displaying the arms of England and the queen's arms of Castile, Leon and Ponthieu, which she had inherited in right of her mother. Above this is the arched story containing the sculptured figures of the queen, planned to face the supporting shafts of the canopies above. The canopies are surmounted by crocketed gables, and behind them is a tier of pinnacles similarly decorated. The third story is composed of a cluster of plain pinnacles topped with small gables crocketed and decorated.

A SENSATIONAL PREDICTION.

The public mind has been lulled into a feeling of security as to the threatened visitation of the bubonic plague by the reports that have come to us through the newspapers of conditions in Cuba and Porto Rico, and we have been led to believe that the dread disease was about at an end in both islands.

It is plain, however, that the health authorities do not share the feelings of the public.

A doctor belonging to the medical corps of the surveyor-general who has just returned from Porto Rico, has given out an interview to a New York newspaper in which he is represented as saying that he believed the plague was going round the world, and that it was a mere question of time till it would reach New York; that there was no visible way in which it could be kept out.

This doctor dwelt upon the vital importance of preventing the landing of rats from ships that enter from plague-infected ports; but he did not elucidate upon the feasible means of such prevention.

The general impression was created by the tenor of the doctor's remarks that the federal authorities were decidedly alarmed at the outlook and urged the pre-eminent importance of continuing the warfare upon the rats.—Tampa Times.

THE PARK AS NECESSARY AS EVER.

Some months ago, the vital necessity of a City Park for the children and grown ups of Key West was duly impressed on the voters. It was brought out very plainly that this city stands in need of a breathing place in which all could enjoy themselves as their fancies dictated. A bond election was held and the voters sanctioned the purchase of a tract of land to be used as a park.

So far as we know, that land resembles a park now just about as much as it did when purchased by the city. In fact, the subject of a city park seems to have been cast aside and well nigh forgotten. Be that as it may, the NECESSITY is just as great now as ever. Owing to the peculiar conditions which exist here, different from those of any other city in the United States, a park is a necessity, when in many cities it would be a luxury. The children of the city have no public playground. No place where they can romp and frolic without the danger of being chased away by property owners who object. The children are the first consideration, but also must be considered the grown ups.

Key West is mainly, and almost entirely, a manufacturing city. Thousands of men are employed in cigar factories every day in the year, and on account of the nature of their work all windows cannot be thrown open as in some other lines of manufacturing. All day they breathe a tobacco laden atmosphere, and when their day's labor is over they naturally feel depressed, and feel a longing for a change of air and scenery. They want to get out in the open where they can inhale a plentiful supply of pure and invigorating air. If you do not believe these men want and need fresh air and an hour or two of leisure in the open, then go down on the wharves any evening and you will see scores of men who are employed in cigar factories, drinking in the pure air of Heaven with as much enjoyment as does the thirsty traveller experience when he finds a bubbling spring of cold water.

The Journal would like to see steps taken toward the improvement of the land purchased by the city, so that it can be of some benefit to the people at large.

THE PANAMA CANAL AND KEY WEST

Work on the Panama Canal is progressing rapidly. It seems certain now that the big ditch across the backbone of the continent connecting the two great oceans will be opened for commerce by January 1st, 1915, but little more than two years distant. What effect is the opening of the canal going to have on the future of Key West? Will it mean the development of Key West into one of the great sea ports of the country? Will it mean the city of fifty thousand predicted by Mr. Henry M. Flagler? That all remains to be seen.

Meanwhile, every seaport city along the Gulf and Atlantic coasts, from Galveston to Boston, is making preparations of one kind or another in anticipation of the business which may come their way. A number of cities expect to make a strong fight for the canal business, and they have been laying their lines carefully for quite a long time.

No one city will get all of the canal business, but later developments will show that some one city is going to do the major portion of the business. Two factors will determine largely which city gets the business—nearness to the canal, and dock facilities. It is obvious that the city making a bid for this business must have deep water.

What has Key West done looking toward securing the canal trade? What is Key West doing today? What is Key West GOING TO DO? Inasmuch as we have done little or nothing up to this time, the question as to what we are going to do looms up as being vastly important. With all the natural advantages in our favor, we have out competing sisters cities outdistanced, provided we make the necessary preparations to handle the business if it comes our way.

Key West is by all odds the nearest American port to the Panama Canal. We have a good harbor and deep water, and reliable assurance that we are to have even deeper water. We offer the nearest railroad facilities to shippers from Central and South America. With these great advantages to start with, almost any city would see to it that nothing else was lacking. Will Key West do that?

One of the great drawbacks here, the greatest we might say, is our lack of docking facilities. Our inability to handle such commerce as will pour through the canal. This is a drawback which, unless it is eliminated, will lose us the canal business. Will Key West be prepared in 1915?

Even now the government is investigating the Gulf and Atlantic ports with the view of ascertaining which ports are prepared to handle the large volume of business from Panama, and which are preparing to secure those facilities which they lack. The opening of the Panama Canal is pregnant with importance to Key West. Either we will become one of the really great ports of the country, or we will remain always what we are today. Which shall it be?

Rules Jefferson Lived By

The hundred and sixty-eighth anniversary of the birth of Thomas Jefferson was celebrated with a big banquet in Indianapolis April 13. In this connection Jefferson's ten rules of life, which follow, will be of interest:

1. Never put off till tomorrow what you can do today.
2. Never trouble another for what you can do yourself.
3. Never spend money before you have it.
4. Never buy what you do not want because it is cheap; it will be dear to you.
5. Pride costs us more than hunger, thirst and cold.
6. We never repent of having eaten too little.
7. Nothing is troublesome that we do willingly.
8. How much pain have cost us the evils which have never happened.
9. Take things away by their smooth handle.
10. When angry, count ten before you speak; if very angry, a hundred.

Here are some of the great principles of government advocated by Mr. Jefferson in his first inaugural address, March 4, 1801:

Equal and exact justice to all men, of whatever state of persuasion, religious or political.

Peace, commerce and honest friendship with all nations, entangling alliances with none.

The support of the state governments in all their rights as the most

competent administrations for our domestic concerns and the surest bulwarks against anti-republican tendencies.

The preservation of the general government in its whole constitutional vigor, as the sheet anchor of our peace at home and safety abroad.

A jealous care of the right of election by the people.

A mild and safe corrective of abuses which are lopped by the sword of revolution, where peaceable remedies are unprovided.

Absolute acquiescence in the decisions of the majority, the vital principles of republics, from which there is no appeal but to force the vital principle and immediate parent of despotism.

A well disciplined militia, our best reliance and for the first moments of war until regulars may relieve them.

The supremacy of the civil over the military authority—economy in the public expense, that labor may be lightly burdened.

The honest payment of our debts and sacred preservation of the public faith.

The diffusion of information and arraignment of all abuses at the bar of public reason.

Freedom of religion, freedom of the press, and freedom of person under the protection of habeas corpus.

Trial by juries impartially elected.

"These principles form the bright constellation which has gone before us, and guided our steps through an age of revolution and reformation. The wisdom of our sages and blood of our heroes have been devoted to their attainment; they should be the creed of our political faith; the text of civic instruction; the touchstone by which to try the service of those we trust; and should we wander from them in moments of error or of alarm, let us hasten to retrace our steps and to regain the road which alone leads to peace, liberty and safety."

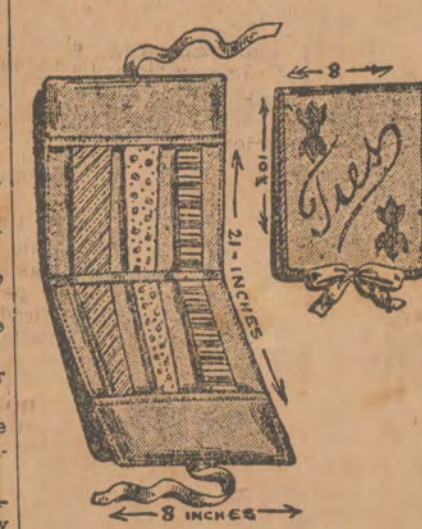

GIFT MAN WILL APPRECIATE

Practical Case for His Ties Is Something Which He Will Always Welcome.

A practical case for ties always forms an acceptable gift for a man, and in our sketch may be seen a capital article for this purpose and one also that is simple and easy to make. It can be carried out in art linen or art serge, and lined with soft silk and bound with narrow ribbon or edged with a silk cord.

The material may be cut entirely in one piece measuring 27 inches in length by 8 inches in width. After this piece of material has been lined



with soft silk the ends for a distance of three inches are turned over and sewn down at the edges so that they form two pockets, into which the ends of the ties may be slipped in the manner shown in the sketch. Across the center at the point where the case folds together, a band of elastic is sewn, and in the first instance the ties are placed under this band and afterwards the ends tucked into the pockets.

Ribbon strings are attached by which the case may be secured when closed, and the word "ties" is worked across the front and the remaining space filled up with the conventional design shown in the sketch on the left hand side, which illustrates the case closed.

The case may be stiffened with thin cardboard sewn in between the lining and the cover, and scored across with a sharp penknife at the point where it folds together.

GREAT SECRET OF MILLINERY

Hat Should Be Expression of the Temperament of the Wearer, Then All Is Well.

It falls to the lot of the modern woman to choose and design her own hats if she so wishes and yet to be entirely up to date. It only needs the original idea, and that together with effect constitutes smart millinery.

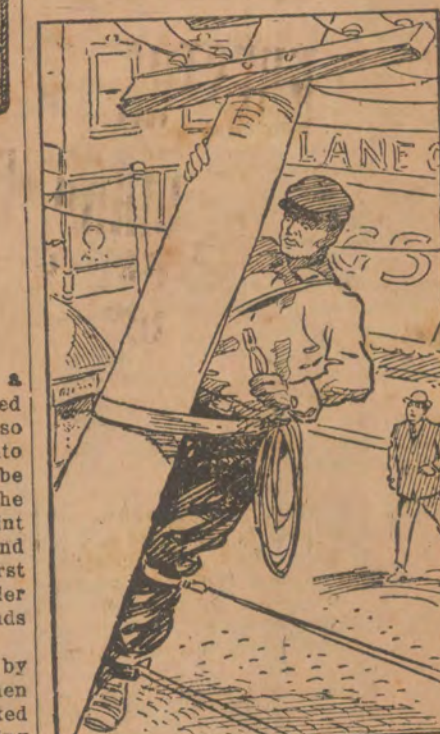
POLE AND LINEMAN CRASH TO EARTH

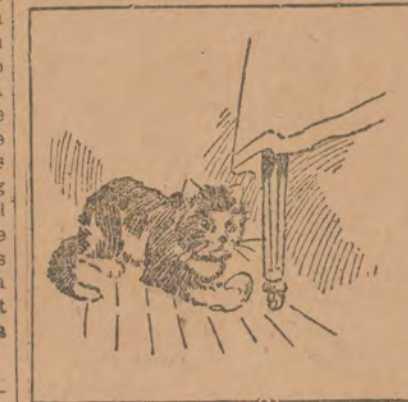
A Bulge in His Middle.

MONKEY USED IN HERALDRY

A list of the animals having a place in heraldry would embrace not only all the well known beasts, but many weird and impossible creatures, such as unicorns, griffins and dragons. But so far as is known, there is but one instance of the monkey's admission into the select circle.

Three monkeys figure in the Lelander coat-of-arms. They stand with plain collar, chained. The motto is "Crom-a-boc," which means "To Victory." This device was adopted in the year 1816 by John Fitzthomas Fitzgerald, and an interesting story attaches thereto.

It appears that when the earl of Lelander was an infant he formed one of the residents of Woodstock, now pertaining to the Marlborough family. There was a fire in the castle, and in the ensuing confusion the child was overlooked. When he was remembered, those who dashed for the nursery found it in flames. The child was, however, soon found in one of the towers, clasped in the arms of a big ape, which, with considerable courage had fought its way through the smoke and flames in order to rescue its young friend. It had carried the child to the top of one of the towers, which, its intelligence told it, was the safest place in the burning structure.

In recognition of this act of devotion the earl, when he attained manhood, actually discarded the family coat-of-arms and adopted the monkeys for his crest, and the family has retained it to this day.

SWAN BANQUET FOR HUNTERS

One of the most prolific writers on natural history in eastern England, entertained the other day, at his home, this house, Yarmouth, at a swan banquet, all the veteran wildfowlers and punt gunners who for years have made a happy hunting ground of Breydon Water, the vast tidal estuary near Yarmouth, which has yielded more bird trophies to the collector than any similar expanse of mud flats along the east coast. The royal bird that graced the board had been shot on the wing, and weighed 21 pounds. It was roasted, being enveloped in a dough crust three inches thick, from which it emerged brown and luscious, after three and a half hours in the oven. A poem composed in its honor by the donor of the feast was read, as the great bird was brought to the table. The guests ranged up to octogenarians, and after a royal repast, many tales were told of prowess with the swivel gun. The story which capped the lot told of 150 birds which fell to a single discharge of one of these weapons from a punt.

FAMOUS WELL OF BEERSHEBA



At Beersheba, in Palestine, are two circular wells of fine, pure water, one of which is known as Abraham's well. Beersheba means, "Well of Oath," or "Seven Wells," and according to one story the place received its name because of the alliance formed here between Abraham and Abimelech, king of Gerar, which was ratified by a gift of seven ewe lambs from Abraham to Abimelech as a witness of the fact that the well was dug by Abraham.

SEA DEVILS ARE MONSTERS

Monster, sea devils are frequently caught in the gulf waters off the coast of Texas. These fish sometimes weigh as much as 3,500 pounds. They are ferocious in appearance and are possessed of wonderful strength. The method of catching them is to throw a harpoon into their body and when they have pulled the boat around for some time and begin to get exhausted, to finish them by means of a few rifle bullets. Many thrilling encounters with these giant fish have been had and not infrequently the daring portsmen have had narrow escapes from being carried far to sea. While they do not in any way resemble the devil fish they are frequently given that misnomer.

INVENTION OF LITHOGRAPHY

Benefelder, a Bavarian playwright, seeking a means of duplicating sketches cheaply, experimented with a porous stone which lay at hand. He drew upon it with a greasy ink, then moistened the stone with water, and then dabbed greasy ink all over it. The water kept the ink from adhering to any part of the stone except where he had first drawn. Putting the stone into a press with a sheet of paper, he obtained a reproduction of his drawing. Thus was lithography invented. Ink-lag rollers quickly replaced his oily roller, and of late aluminum is used in place of stone.

SACRED CATTLE FOR BEEF

There are nearly 2,500 sacred cattle of India on the ranches near Pierce and Port Lavaca, Tex., and elsewhere throughout the state of Oklahoma. A strange looking creature, indeed, is the sacred cow. Its distinctive characteristic is a huge hump at its shoulders, an unusually prominent "dewlap" and large, drooping ears. While the original importation of the humped Zebu cattle has grown to a remarkable degree, nevertheless the most interest is attached to the crossing of the type with our domestic cattle. It has been found that the cross-breeds remain relatively free from ticks while other stock in the same pastures would be literally covered with these pests, which cause the dreaded "Texas fever," necessitating the frequent quarantining of the whole southwestern cattle district. The Brahman cross-bred cattle appear likewise to be less affected by other parasites and pestiferous insects, such as mosquitoes, hornflies, gadflies, etc., and to withstand better the warm, dry climate and other semi-tropical conditions present in the gulf section of the United States than do the native cattle. It is also claimed that they make a grade of beef superior to that of the native cattle. Englishmen in India long ago learned that the sacred cattle make excellent beef, the hump, which sometimes reaches a weight of 54 pounds, being especially prized.

About 30 years ago a number of the sacred cattle were introduced in Texas and crossed with native cattle, but as the original strain gradually deteriorated, the department of agriculture was requested by A. P. Borden to make a further importation of Indian cattle for the Pierce ranch with a view of restoring this strain of blood. The secretary granted him this permit, but on account of the very dangerous live stock diseases prevailing in India the department required the strictest possible precautions to prevent the introduction of any of these contagions. Not only were the animals purchased inspected by a representative of the department in India, but also on their arrival here. It was during one of these examinations in quarantine that it was discovered that three of the zebus were infected with surra. These were promptly killed and burned. Subsequent examinations showed others to be infected with the disease—probably carried by flies and mosquitoes—and these were promptly killed. On November 14, 1906, the secretary of agriculture released the animals—33 in number—from quarantine, as the last seven series of test were successively negative and as killing frosts had already occurred, resulting in the disappearance of all flies and mosquitoes.

While the majority of sacred cattle on exhibition in circuses and zoological gardens are of the smaller breeds, weighing about two hundred and fifty pounds and standing not higher than three feet, the types of Indian cattle selected for this importation were of the larger breeds, standing as high as six feet and weighing up to 1,860 pounds.

ABRAHAM'S OAK, PALESTINE



Many pilgrims to that part of Palestine connected with the history of Abraham visit the tree here pictured. It is known as Abraham's oak and is evidently so ancient that the natives find no difficulty in believing the legend that the patriarch sat under the shade of its boughs.

BIGGEST BABY IN WORLD

James Adolph Cody, of Mount Tiry, Ga., is believed to be the biggest baby in the world. At birth he was just an ordinarily big baby, but when about two months old he began growing in size and flesh and kept steadily at it until now, at the age of three years, he is classed among the wonderful babies in the world. If he keeps on growing until he attains manhood he will be a giant. He weighs 115 pounds and measures 44 inches in height, with arms extending he measures 43 inches from the tips of fingers across the shoulders. Other measurements are: Bust, 38 inches; waist, 29 inches; hips, 45 inches; thigh, 25 inches; length of foot, 7 1/2 inches; strength is well in keeping with his size and his appetite is more like that of a big healthy farmer than a three-year-old child. He rides horseback and is fond of the automobile.

NOTHING LIVES IN DEAD SEA

The Dead Sea, in Syria is so called because nothing can live in its waters. Owing to its density fish could not sink in it, and some of its salts are powerful antiseptics, fatal to any form of life. The salt of the ocean is nearly all common table salt.
