

Key West Ravaged By Appalling Storm

HURRICANE OF TERRIBLE INTENSITY, THE MOST SEVERE IN HISTORY OF THE CITY, LEAVES TOLL OF DESTRUCTION IN ITS WAKE

SHIPPING INTERESTS SUFFER TO GREAT EXTENT FROM STORM'S RAVAGES

Decidedly the severest, most prolonged and destructive storm in the history of the city of Key West is past, and, it is hoped, is forever gone.

Every home in the city was damaged, from the extent of a few dollars on up into thousands. Industries suffered severely. Business houses were all injured in one way and another and many of the proprietors sustained enormous losses. The tobacco factories were heaviest losers. The damage in the amber leaf alone representing in the neighborhood of a million dollars. Shipping interests are paralyzed.

The cigar factories of the city may not resume operation under two to four weeks. The strike of the cigarmakers was settled, and the men were ready to return to work, but as a result of the storm they will remain idle for a few more weeks, and be deprived of the \$65,000 weekly pay roll.

Practically all the pretty trees, for which Key West is justly famous, were uprooted or torn to shreds by the winds.

Through the alertness of Mayor Allan B. Cleare and his board of city councilmen, the city is being cleared up at a marvelously rapid rate. The army and navy motor trucks have joined in the service of the city and are helping the other trucks and vehicles remove the branches of fallen trees and other debris that lined the streets at the end of the storm.

The Key West Electric Company performed marvelous work and power and lights are available two or three days ahead of the time calculated upon. The Key West Gas Company doubled their efforts to restore service and soon had the supply of gas sufficient for all purposes. Street car service was resumed about 10 o'clock today and regular schedule is being maintained.

The telephone company rendered valuable service up until the storm put the system clear out of commission. The silvery voice of the girls at the switchboard answered the calls while the lightning flashed, the winds

howled and the thunders roared, and their efficient and fearless service no doubt saved the city much in many ways.

The ice supply was cut off by the plant becoming disabled, but before the storm was over men were at work making repairs, and this afternoon ice was available in any quantity at the plant.

Key West was at the mercy of the elements for seventeen long hours. The Citizen announced the approach of the storm Monday afternoon. It was expected to reach here some time during Monday night; but on account of its traveling very slowly it did not strike the city in full force until late Tuesday afternoon. At 4:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, the storm center came over the southern portion of the Florida Keys, Key West falling directly in its course. The hurricane approached at a velocity of 76 miles an hour, gradually increasing in intensity until the maximum of 120 miles was reached between 12 and 1 o'clock Tuesday night. The greater part of the damage was done between 12 and 3 o'clock a. m.

It is conceded by the weather bureau and oldest citizens as being the most disastrous storm that ever visited the city.

Miraculously small is the casualty list at Key West. Only two deaths are authentically reported. Capt. Pritchard, of Key West, who was on the dredge Grampus when she went down, lost his life by not being able to swim. A young sailor, whose name was given as C. P. L. Hansen, jumped overboard from a subchaser. His body was washed out to sea and has not been recovered.

Since all the homes were damaged more or less, it is found impossible to name all of them in the list below, and some that were badly injured may possibly be omitted, but The Citizen has made an earnest effort to have the list as complete and accurate as was possible under the circumstances.

Decidedly the heaviest losers by the storm in Key West are the cigar factories. Those sustaining the greatest loss were the Havana-American Company and the Sam I. Davis Company.

The Havana-American Company will total a loss of between \$200,000 to a half million in ruined material.

The Davis factory loses heavily in material and the large factory building is wrecked to the extent that a new structure may have to be erected before operation of the factory can be resumed. It is hard to place an estimate on the total loss at the present time, but it will run into hundreds of thousands of dollars. Great sections of the rear of the main brick factory building have fallen out and the roof was practically torn off by the winds.

The Gato factories suffered severe loss, estimated at least at \$75,000 and may reach \$100,000. One thousand barrels of drying tobacco ruined in one stack. Vast quantities of finished goods are soaking wet and worthless. The roof was blown from the two main factories and vast stores of the leaf ready for the workmen utterly ruined.

The Mi Favorita factory loses \$5,000 in damaged material as result of the storm, fully protected by storm insurance. This is the only one, or at least one of the very few, of the local factories to carry storm insurance protection.

The Cortez factory suffered only slight damages and it is thought will be able to resume operation Monday morning.

Armour & Company's goods in storage were damaged, as sales were impossible during the period of the storm. Loss will exceed \$2,000 and more.

Cabrera Bros., wholesale grocers, losses were quite heavy, but were fully covered by storm insurance. Damage at the Consumers Ice Company plant will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

Condition of things at the Key West Box Factory are deplorable. During the strike of the cigarmakers, manufactured goods had piled up there, as there was no one at the factories to receive them had delivery been offered. All the boxes already manufactured, and the plant is full of them, were wet and are now warped so that they are simply ruined. The labels and paper hang in from the boxes as a result of the moisture in the rooms. The sky lights over the system of motors were blown out and the motors flushed. No telling at this time the extent of damage to motors. Hundreds of dollars' worth of leather belting were made worthless by water, and a machine that cost \$2,000 under a place where the roof was blown off, is in bad condition. It will take the box factory a year to get back to what it was before the storm, and \$10,000 would not cover the loss.

The home of Paul Demeritt, Caroline street, was lifted from its foundation and thrown out of posi-

tion about four feet, suffering considerable damage.

The drug store at the corner of Caroline and Duval streets was a heavy loser. The proprietor, Dr. H. Specht, estimates his loss at about \$2,000. All the plate glass windows were crashed in, falling against show cases, accessories and merchandise. All the marble tops of the cream table were smashed. The glass in the windows of the building, owned by C. N. Reio, were completely destroyed at a loss of \$800.

Amusu Theater was completely blown away. Manager Torres is standing up well under his great loss, which he says will go over \$18,000. Some of the material may be salvaged and reduce the actual loss somewhat.

C. Reio, wholesale grocer, loss to stock by water more than \$2,000.

The Reio estate lost heavily on tenant property. Many of the tenant houses were thrown from their foundation, a number badly damaged and a few practically destroyed. \$15,000 would not cover the total loss.

T. A. Lumley, wholesale grocer and packer and man of big business interests in Key West, shared with the others in extensive losses. His tenant property was damaged severely without a single exception. Many of the buildings were thrown from their pillows, some of them removed as far as fifteen feet out of position. His wholesale grocery stock was soaked with water from a lifted roof, with extensive injury difficult to estimate.

Haskel Lebos got off lightly at his store, corner of Simonton and Fleming streets, but says his home, for which he had recently paid \$2,800 went all to pieces.

The garage occupied by Albert Atwell on Division street is completely demolished. The building is a mass of debris, beneath which is crushed an Oldsmobile, owned by A. J. Saunders; a Studebaker, belonging to Roger Farris; Mr. Atwell's Chevrolet; a Ford owned by Albert Frow, and a motorcycle. All are practically ruined. The loss in cars, tools, etc., will reach near \$5,000.

Olivieri's pharmacy, corner Margaret and Fleming streets, was left in awfully bad shape by the water flooding the place. No estimate can be made as to anything near the amount the damage represents, but it will go considerably over a thousand dollars. The building, owned by the Otto estate, suffered considerable damage.

J. and P. Markovitz' store on Division street was drenched by water coming in through the roof. The stock of dress goods and shoes is badly soiled, both upstairs and down. Loss about \$2,000.

The barber shop right across the street from the J. and P. Markovitz store was thrown from its foundation and is "listing" badly. The building is almost a complete wreck.

The pretty store of I. Grossman & Co., on Division street presented

a desolate scene at the end of the big blow and deluge. The glass in the show windows that cost \$1,500 was broken into bits and the goods in the windows blown away. The goods in the store were only slightly damaged.

Wm. Menendez, corner White and Division streets, stock considerably damaged. Home on Vonder street greatly injured, about \$800.

The Armory building, corner Southard and White streets, is shy most of its roof and water is still flowing from the ground floor. Extent of damage not known.

F. Zatarian, grocer, Fleming street, damaged \$25.

J. Salgado, corner Fleming and Grinnell streets, lost \$150 on stock. Building owned by Golden Eagles.

J. M. Varela's furniture store lost heavily. The amount will go over \$4,000. The stock is severely injured by water coming through the roof and windows. Building owned by the Golden Eagles. The damage is great to building.

Richard Peacock's big grocery store did not escape injury. The goods stored on the second and third floors were damaged extensively. Tea to the value of something like \$3,000 was ruined. Other goods damaged will probably aggregate as much as \$7,000 or \$8,000. The building was not injured. The water coming in through the roof caused the damage.

The Key West Drug Company sustained only slight loss. The furniture upstairs, electric sign, etc., injured to extent of about \$250.

D. Aronovitz Department store, suffered more severely than any other place of business on Duval street. Fully \$12,000 is represented in the property damage. Mr. Aronovitz says that he is not discouraged at all, but that the misfortune has created in him a greater impetus to go forward. He says he will put a new front on his store that will be a credit to himself and to the city, one of which the people will be proud. His dwelling at the rear of the store was very much injured, as was also his rental property throughout the city.

Something like \$1,500 is the loss sustained by Frank Holtsberg at corner of Duval and Southard.

One of the windows of the new Woolworth store was smashed and the articles on display therein injured. The floor of the building was flooded from the front. Glass was perhaps the greatest loss.

Kress store windows were nearly all broken in and some goods made unsalvageable. The loss of glass is more than damage to stock.

The window in the J. G. Kantor store was smashed in but goods were saved from serious damage.

The naval store, J. Leibovitz, proprietor, lost all front windows and a large portion of goods in the store was more or less damaged by the gushing winds and water.

All the awnings and sheds on Duval street from Southard toward

Athletic club beach were blown away, with only slight damage to buildings to which they were attached.

The Athletic Club pavilion and club rooms faced the fury of the storm and signs of its ravages are all too visible. It will take a large amount of money to put the property back in good shape again.

On Brisa pavilion collapsed and bath house is almost irreparably shattered by the storm. The loss is enormous.

The county court house is almost a total loss. The building originally cost about \$40,000. It is estimated that a similar building to replace this one would represent an outlay of about \$80,000. The county commissioners, it is understood, say that a new building will be absolutely necessary.

St. Joseph's Pharmacy, corner White and Division streets, owned by Dr. Pintado and L. Gomez sustained damages to the amount of \$500. Windows in the building, owned by Mrs. Maloney, were only slightly damaged.

The little cafe at the corner of Ann and Greene streets, operated by Jeff Knight, is no more. The building was reduced to debris and is a complete loss. It was the property of Mrs. Kate Baldwin. Jeff Knight lost about \$100 in stock.

Mrs. Kate Baldwin's residence on Greene street, opposite the city hall was very much shaken up and blown from its pillows.

The Columbia Steam Laundry will lose considerably in goods on hand ruined by the storm, and the front gable end of the building fell out.

The Key West Investment Company, one of the largest realty holders in the city, sustained slight loss in comparison with property owned. Wm. Cates, local manager of the company, estimates that \$5,000 will cover all losses.

The Key West Electric Company's losses will be greater than was at first supposed. No estimate can as yet be made.

The Key West army barracks faced the fury of the wind and rain, and the damage to property there will be close onto \$100,000, it is said. The sea wall, about 300 yards of it, between the barracks and the air station, disappeared entirely

TROPICAL STORM IS MOVING TOWARD MIDDLE GULF COAST

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—The tropical storm was over north central of the gulf this morning, the weather bureau announces, and is moving slowly northwest.

Hurricane warnings are displayed for the middle gulf coast.

Shipping interests suffered to an alarming degree from the effects of the storm. Wrecks are strewn along the Florida Keys and the Florida East Coast, and it will be several days before reports are available.

The British Admiralty Tanker War Jandoli came into harbor for shelter from the hurricane on Monday night. She dragged anchors during the storm Tuesday, and is now stranded in sixteen feet of water on Crawfish Shoals.

Much inquiry had been made about the Steamer Creole. She is evidently safe. The captain of the War Jandoli reports having been in wireless communication with the Creole since the storm and has picked up messages going from the Creole to wireless stations.

Mallory Line Steamer Comal arrived Monday afternoon and docked at Mallory pier. She was torn away about 10 o'clock that night and driven ashore on the north side of channel on commercial waterfront. She was rammed while thus stranded by U. S. S. Wheeling, making a great hole in her port side above the water line. She is now lightening her cargo. All passengers will continue their voyage to New York by rail to Jacksonville, thence over the Clyde Line.

Steamer Lake Winona is stranded at Tortugas, and has sustained severe damages. Her supercargo arrived today on U. S. S. Subchaser No. 104.

Steamer Point Adams is ashore eastern drydock about one mile east of Sand Key. The main ship channel buoy has been blown nearly two miles west of its proper location, and this steamer en route to Key West port was misguided by the buoy and was grounded. Other vessels were warned by the Point Adams from her stranded position, otherwise, it is stated, that this location would have been piled up with vessels.

Shipping board steamers Luke Duane and Flavel arrived here today. They sustained severe storm damages.

Capt. Lewis, of the Luke Duane, from Mobile to Cuba, reports. Oil Barge Monongohela adrift in the gulf with crew aboard. She was fifteen miles southeast of Sand Key. He also sighted a lone man drifting on a barge, but was unable

to rescue him on account of the rolling seas. It is thought that it may be the sailor who jumped overboard from the subchaser here.

Ward Liner El Mar, from New Orleans to New York, arrived at this port today to ship her cargo.

Tank Ship Fred W. Weller arrived this evening with a number of injured men aboard. One of the men's condition was so serious that he was carried to a local hospital.

Tank Ship A. C. Bedford is ashore off Sombbrero lighthouse.

Several vessels are reported ashore on the Florida reefs between Tortugas and Miami, names not having been obtained.

Army Transport Kilpatrick, from Cologne to New Orleans, loaded with U. S. soldiers(reached this port this afternoon and the men were given shore leave.

All the local waterfront is a vast mass of fishing boats, schooners and small craft, interlocked, standing on ends and in some places stacked more than three deep. People are searching for their boats and scarcely recognize them when they are found.

The Waterwich, a Miami schooner, owned by Ed Lowe, of that city, just off the ways here and was to have sailed for Miami Wednesday, is badly jammed in the crush and damaged to the extent of \$2,500.

Schooner Serafina C, Capt. Piodela, engaged in the bark shipping between Shark River and Key West, is turned turtle in the harbor. The extent of her damage is unknown.

Schooner Drew, a British vessel engaged in Tampa trade, sunk in the outer harbor. Crew rescued.

Schooner Eureka, engaged in clam bouillon trade into Key West wrecked almost beyond repair, is among the vessels stacked at the waterfront.

Dredge Grampus was towed from her moorings in the harbor and swept out to sea. Ten of her crew were rescued alive next day, Capt. Pritchard being the only life lost among them.

Hundreds of small craft are numbered with the missing, the wrecked and destroyed, and it will take several days to get the waterfront straightened out.

WORK ON KEY WEST'S GREAT SUBMARINE BASE STARTS SOON--BIDS CALLED FOR

EDEN

THE HORRIFIC AIRPLANE

A Kansas aviator has been fined \$25 and costs for "disturbing the peace." The offence consisted in flying an airplane within ten feet of the farmhouse roof, to the terror and dismay of the farmer, his family and the livestock.

It will not do to pronounce this, off-hand, an unrighteous judgment, or to subject the farmer to scorn and abuse. It may readily be imagined that, to a family unaccustomed to having airplanes cavorting around, the spectacle of a big machine swooping toward the roof is a trifle disconcerting. An airplane driven by a 400-horsepower engine is not exactly a swallow. At the least, it may knock off a chimney. It may conceivably dive through the roof of the house or barn. And even if nothing suffers harm except the plane and its occupants, nobody wants aviators, propeller blades, batteries, wrenches, fuselages, etc., tumbling all over the place.

But there is the aviator's side of it, too. It is easy to imagine, if this decision stands, what flyers are going to be up against in the future. What height will be considered safe and proper? And will a flyer be arrested and fined whenever, by design or accident, he drops below that level? Will the aviators all be driven, in self-defense, to keep above the clouds, and then be in peril of arrest by every village constable, like speeding automobilists, when they venture down to see where they are?

SHOES FROM FIRST TO LAST

Of course a good last is the first essential in a good shoe, but the next essential is how to make good shoes last. Specialists from the Federal Bureau of Chemistry give this information on the last question:

"Grease or oil should be applied to the shoes whenever the leather begins to get hard or dry. All dust

should first be wiped or washed off. For dress shoes or shoes that are to be polished use castor oil, applying it at night. (Even shoes, it seems, should take their castor oil at bedtime.) In the morning polish the shoes. The oil will darken tan leather, but so will any ordinary polish, and perhaps the latter will not be so good for the leather. Avoid getting any oil on rubber on composition heels or soles. It destroys them."

For heavy work shoes, neatfoot oil, fish oil, tallow, petrolatum or vaseline may be used. If heavier water-proofing is wanted than these oils afford, a dressing excellent for the purpose is:

One-half pound of neutral wool grease (get from drug store.)
One-fourth pound of (heavy) dark petrolatum (get from drug store.)

One-quarter pound of (light) yellow paraffin wax, or nine-tenths of a pound of petrolatum.
One-tenth of a pound of beeswax.
Another good water-proofing dressing can be made by adding beef tallow to any of the oils or greases already mentioned. Harness may be preserved and kept in good condition for a long time if cleaned and oiled according to the instructions for oiling shoes.

In these days some of these home-made remedies which a frivolous world had relegated to the attic are worth dragging out and looking over. Those old-fashioned people who used to take care of their things may have had some sense, after all.

PROFICIENCY IS AIM OF FEDERAL BOARD IN TRAINING SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—The familiar cry of "equal pay for equal work" expresses the ideal towards which the Federal Board for Vocational Education is striving to lead the disabled men taking training. To be just a little more competent than the ordinary man is the best way for the disabled man to be sure of holding down his job, when competition grows severe. In order to secure this proficiency the training given by the board to men handicapped by war injuries is very thorough, whether it be given in the school or in the trade. When placement-training is selected as the appropriate method, the nature and length of the course is determined upon in the light of the man's needs and capabilities. When a trade contains several separate and distinct operations the aim of training being to fit the man as an efficient general workman, his course is arranged in such a way that as soon as he masters one operation he may be transferred to another. The placement officer of the federal board supervises his course, insisting upon the idea that he must be considered a learner rather than a producer. In every case the course, whether given in school or shop must be adapted to the interests and requirements of the disabled man. Instruction must be definitely planned for him, and supervised by agents of the board.

STORY OF NEW EUROPE BEING RECORDED ON STAMP ALBUM PAGES

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 31.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Items of historical interest are being added almost daily to the story of New Europe as told serially on the pages of the stamp album.

Poland's newest contribution to this record is a series of six postage stamps, commemorative of the convocation of the National Diet. Among them is the first stamp portrait of Ignace Paderewski as president of the Polish Republic.

The Lettish government has issued three stamps marking the delivery of Riga from the Bolsheviks. They portray two figures, presumably representing Riga and Lettonia, embracing before the walls of a city.

The seventh centenary of the union of Estonia with Denmark accounts for the issuance of 3,500 specimen stamps, of restricted validity, in the republic of Estonia. They were on sale for three days only. Because of the adoption of a new currency unit in the republic, new stamps are being prepared for distribution and sale.

"German Austria," the residue of the former Austrian Empire, has issued stamps of distinctive design from the state printery at Vienna. President Masaryk's portrait is to appear on a new issue in preparation in Czechoslovakia. Serbia-Croatia, Slavonia, the Rumanian Postal Agency in Constantinople and Armenia have all contributed to this pictorial stamp album record of the recent march of world events.

OPERATORS STOPPED MESSAGES AND SAVED PARIS FROM FAMINE

PARIS, Aug. 31.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Vigilant telegraph operators in the central office here saved Paris from a possible famine during the recent food crisis precipitated by the profiteers.

Following disorders around the central markets where consumers raided the stands, and overthrew them, scattering vegetables, fruit, fish and other food to the ground because of the high prices, a number of commission merchants sent urgent telegrams to producers outside of Paris telling them to hold back their goods till further orders.

Many of the despatches indicated that, owing to a general decline in prices, the merchants were withholding their goods from the market.

The telegrams numbered about one thousand. They had gone past the wickets into the operating rooms, when the operator who was working one of the wires to Brittany noted a batch of them cancelling orders for butter. Now he had paid ten francs for a pound of butter that morning. He consulted with colleagues operating wires leading to fish, vegetable, fruit and other centres and their tables were loaded down with similar telegrams. None of the messages was sent.

In a statement issued last night the government said that it took the responsibility for the action of the telegraphers.

UNDISMAYED KEY WEST IN FINE SPIRIT BEGINS WORK OF RESTORATION

After seventeen long hours of facing fierce winds and enduring continuous and tremendous torrents of rain, Key West comes forth with good cheer, the people turn their backs on the past, and with the dauntless spirit that is characteristic with the people here, set their faces to the future determined upon prettier homes, more beautiful trees and a grander and greater city in the days that are to come.

The people who were here before the storm are here still. What more could a city have to be thankful for? Only two casualties are reported, and but one of them a citizen of Key West. New trees will grow, other homes will be built, business houses will spring up and be improved more beautiful than they were before. Our people will survive the great monetary loss and the near future will bear no earmarks of the great storm that spent its fury upon us this week.

A more optimistic people is not to be found upon the face of the earth. After seventeen hours' tense existence, filled with mental anguish, uneasiness and anxiety, they come

forth with united effort to clear up the city; put things to right, and hasten the return to normal conditions. The spirit manifested by one and all is simply grand. No hesitating; no standing back for the other fellow to do the work. Everybody is working in an admirable way and in complete unison and accord.

There is much praise due certain union organizations in the city, for they showed a fine spirit by laying aside the union regulations in order that all members could join in the work of repairing structures, and rebuilding the city.

People visiting here have been loud in their praise of the marvelous activity and cooperation of the people here in "setting up to house-keeping" again. They say it could not have been done more quickly and as systematically in any city much larger than this.

Key West has lost much in the storm. But we still have our loved ones with us, our hands and our health. We have lost nothing but that can be regained. We have much left to be thankful for; so let's "forget it" and go forward.

HISTORY OF FORMER LOCAL HURRICANES

The hurricane of October 11, 1846, was the most destructive that had visited this community up to that time, and has only been exceeded in fury by that of October 11, 1909, exactly sixty-three years later.

The storm of 1846 attained hurricane force about 2 o'clock in the morning and lasted for several hours.

The Lighthouse on Whitehead Point was totally destroyed and all the members of the keeper's family, seven in number, were lost. Most of the buildings in the city were either destroyed or seriously damaged and many horses and cattle were swept into the sea, or killed by missiles of timber and slate from the surrounding buildings.

The next violent gale occurred on October 19 and 20, 1876. Considerable damage was done to roofs, fences and trees, the vessels in the harbor were more or less injured and there were some cases of shipwreck along the reef.

When the tempest was at its height, especially during the night of the 19, great anxiety prevailed. It was very dark, excepting when the vivid flashes of lightning revealed the devastating processes at work, but the amount of actual damage was less than there was reason to anticipate.

In 1906 a severe storm visited the Florida Keys, playing havoc with the construction work of the extension of the Florida East Coast Railway, but entirely missed Key West. In this storm the lives of 130 employees of the railroad were lost, the camps were blown to shreds and vessel after vessel of costly construction equipment swept into the gulf.

The greatest loss of life was occasioned by the blowing to sea of the houseboats on which the workmen were quartered. Eighty-seven men were picked out of the sea and saved after they had clung to pieces of wreckage for from one to five days. Forty-four were rescued by the Italian steamer Jenny and brought to Key West; twenty-six more were saved by the British steamer Alton and carried to Savannah. Other castaways were picked up and carried to various ports, including New York, Mobile, Galveston, Liverpool, London and Buenos Ayres. As stated before, this storm did no damage at Key West, having passed several miles to the eastward of this city.

The great hurricane of Monday, October 11, 1909, is fresh in the minds of all.

The following is taken from the account of the storm which appeared in The Citizen on the following day:

"The worst disaster that has ever befallen this city occurred Monday morning, when the hurricane swept over the island, reaching the height of its fury at 11:30. A steady velocity of 76 miles an hour was reached and in some of the gusts it no doubt reached over 100 miles.

"Warnings had been issued by the Weather Bureau and the time of the climax of the storm was predicted almost exactly by Observer Doherty, who stated that it would reach its worst about noon.

"A strong wind, accompanied by rain, set in during Sunday night and increased Monday morning until about 9:30, when it assumed the nature of a hurricane. For over three hours the city was swept with unceasing wind and rain. Building after building collapsed before the storm and the air was full of flying debris. That more lives were not lost seems miraculous. Only three lives were lost in the city.

"The shipping interests were great sufferers from the storm. Nearly every dock in the city was greatly damaged, several being almost wholly destroyed.

"Crafts of every kind are jammed together or sunk along the water front. Many boats broke from their moorings and went crashing through other boats and docks."

Several of the largest cigar factories and six churches were among the buildings entirely destroyed, the electric and telephone plants were put out of commission and business was paralyzed for the time being. Great damage was also done to the railroad work.

This storm, while of shorter duration than that of 1846, was of much greater intensity and the property loss was much larger.

As soon as the storm had abated, however, a large force of men, under the supervision of Mayor Fogarty, set to work to clear up the debris in the streets and with the co-operation of all the people order was soon restored.

The destruction of the fishing and sponging vessels and the cigar factories had deprived thousands of their only means of livelihood and it was found necessary to call for outside aid for the immediate relief of the sufferers. This call was responded to sufficiently by the generous people outside to give the temporary relief necessary.

The evening was spent in numerous diversions and some delightful music was rendered by several of the guests. Miss Alice Weatherford favored them with several humorous recitations.

Refreshments were served during the evening, Miss Alice Weatherford presiding at the punch bowl.

The dining room was beautifully decorated with roses and American flags, the centerpiece of the table being a birthday cake enclosed in flags and circles of red, white and blue.

At a late hour the company dispersed wishing Sergt. Ankonus health, wealth and happiness.

**KEY WEST RAVAGED
BY APPALLING STORM**

(Continued from Page One)

during the storm, and not a sign of it is left. Its disappearance is as mysterious as were the antics of the British Tanker Tonawando, which made its way unaided against the wind from Duval street waterfront to the foot of Simonton. It is considered a mystery that such an immense concrete wall could be washed clear away.

The postoffice and customs house building is left in bad shape as a result of the storm and it will take about \$8,000 to put it in good shape again.

The naval hospital roof was blown off and the institution flooded. The patients were rushed into the halls. The building is damaged many thousands of dollars.

The pretty home of Attorney George G. Brooks on North Beach is almost a total wreck. It was a valuable and modern home, and is a complete loss. Estimate was not given out. Mr. Brooks' office also was ravaged by the storm.

The valuable residence of Mrs. E. D. Loper, was blown six feet from its foundation and damaged to the extent of \$9,000. Owner lives in Columbus, Ga.

Losses of The Citizen Publishing Co. were comparatively slight. Some damage was done to news and job stock at The Key West Press, job plant, owned by this company. The linotypes at The Citizen office suffered from the rain through a leaking roof. The total loss will not exceed \$500.

Sections of the roof on the Convent of Mary Immaculate were blown off and the occupants and contents of portions of the building drenched. Damage to roof is principal loss.

The Congregational church is badly damaged. Some of the walls are falling down and the interior is very much injured.

Fleming Street church window were broken in. Damages estimated at from \$800 to \$1,000.

Eli Spencer, shipper of live crawfish, did not lose a penny. Though his new warehouse was built clear out over the water, it stood the storm without any injury whatever.

Norberg Thompson was among the heaviest losers. His turtle shell and warehouse is a complete wreck and his other business interests were hard hit by the storm.

Tony's Ice Cream Parlor did not escape the ravages of the great storm. The place was largely damaged, and putting it back in order will be an item of great expense.

Guy Mendelsohn's place at the beach was utterly ruined and his place on Duval street was damaged extensively.

A. Lucignani's handsome home on United street was badly torn and wrecked by the winds and rains, doing vast injury to the splendid residence.

DAMAGE IN COLORED SECTION

The havoc wrought in the southwestern portion of the city, inhabited by the colored people, was as complete as in the other parts of the city, but owing to the flimsy character of most of the structures damaged the monetary loss is not great. Many persons, however, lost all they had and considering their individual circumstances the loss to them is as keen as to the more opulent. The heaviest losses sustained in this section were among the religious and fraternal bodies.

The A. M. E. Zion church of which Rev. A. L. Higgs is pastor, situated on Whitehead street near Angela, is badly wrecked and will no doubt have to be taken down. This edifice suffered greatly in the last two storms and had just been put into shape again. It is supposed its previous weakened condition made it an easy prey to the elements.

Newman church hall had the front part of it carried away, but the new church building was not damaged.

The most complete wreck in this section is the Masonic hall on Thomas street opposite the County Court House, which is nothing but a pile of debris, the building having succumbed to the first force of the storm. It had only recently been placed in a good condition by the Masonic lodges, and further improvements were in contemplation, so the loss to them is quite keen.

Further up Thomas street the Odd Fellows Hall, a large two story structure erected in 1882, had the first story removed from under it as completely as could be done by any contractor, and the floor of the second story rests on the foundation, the roof and all being intact. It is fortunate that this building fell in this position; had it toppled over on either side it would have demolished the smaller buildings surrounding it. On every side in this locality there is a tangle of fences and the streets are encumbered with wreckage. Further out towards the South Beach, the discomforts of the people were added to by the water rushing up Thomas, Emma and Whitehead as far as Virginia street, many houses were washed from their foundation, and traffic could only be had by means of boats or improvised rafts.

OFFICIAL ORDER

Key West, Fla., Sept. 11, 1919.
To the Citizens of Key West:
We have just passed through the worst storm in the history of our city. We have suffered greatly but we are not discouraged. We intend to get busy at once, clean up and push forward with greater determination than ever before.

Some of our people have suffered the loss of nearly everything they possessed and will necessarily NEED HELP. There are some of us more fortunate than others, and to you I am making direct appeal THAT YOU COME FORWARD AT THIS TIME AND DO YOUR FULL SHARE. I feel sure that this will be sufficient and your big hearts will open and you will do your share.

On account of the electric lighting service being out of commission, our city will be in darkness for a few nights, and I have decided it is best for all concerned that everyone who has no special business be off the streets by 9 p. m.

Through the courtesy of Col. Straub I have sworn in a number of military men as special police, and their orders must be obeyed the same as the regular city police. I appeal to all citizens at this time to assist us in getting everything in good shape as quickly as possible. Anything that may appear wrong to you, report same at once to the Chief of Police or myself. The City Council and Mayor are at your service at all times to assist you in every way possible. Don't fail to call upon us.

MEXICAN MINING LAW OF 1884 IS DECLARED UNCONSTITUTIONAL

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 31.—(Correspondence of The Associated Press)—The mining law of 1884 is unconstitutional and illegally excepts hydrocarbons in the soil and subsoil from the national domain, according to a letter from Jose Vazquez Schiaffino, chief of the petroleum section of the Department of Industry and Commerce, in El Universal. Protest by foreign oil interests against alleged confiscatory oil decrees is based on rights acquired under this law.

In framing the oil law initiative, sent by President Carranza to congress last November for developing Article 27 of the Constitution, Mr. Schiaffino said, his department was impelled by the highest motives and sought to protect vested interests and investments. He asserted that the reading of the transitory provisions of this initiative would show that, in regard to vested interests created by the protection of former laws, only a simple tax was imposed.

With regard to the mining law of 1884, his statement said: "This department has not interpreted capriciously in a thousand different ways Article 27; but in only one way, the revindication of the dominion of the nation over the hydrocarbons of the soil and subsoil and its incorporation into the mining regime which always has been in force in Mexico since the time of the Spanish domination, and from which it was illegally excepted by an unconstitutional law. (The mining law of 1884.)"

ATLANTA GIRL MAKES A RECORD IN RELIEF WORK

Accomplished Job In Three Days Usually Performed In Two Weeks

(Special to The Citizen.)

ATLANTA, Sept. 12.—An Atlanta girl—Miss Fannele Harrison—has been prominently mentioned in the Red Cross reports from Rosnov, in Czecho-Slovakia, where Miss Harrison, a Red Cross worker, recently established a record for relief service in the saving of lives and suffering. In three days Miss Harrison examined 1,000 children, all undernourished to a degree that made their condition critical. The examination was necessary, that each child might receive the proper ration for its condition.

The job was one ordinarily rated at two weeks. Miss Harrison relished the need for speedy action—and supplied it. In three days from the time she started her examinations for the American Relief Administration, the distribution of soup, cocoa, milk and other food began, and the next day all the adults of the suffering little village were crowding Miss Harrison's little kitchen, thanking her and praising her.

In the course of her examinations Miss Harrison had to visit practically every home in the village, most of the children being too weak to attend the schools. She found in about half the homes that the children possessed an average of one garment apiece, so that if one child was able to go to school, the clothing of all had to be "pooled" to send it, while the others spent an enforced vacation at home, wrapped in ragged bed clothing.

12,000,000 PELTS SOLD AT AUCTION IN ST. LOUIS TODAY

Vast Collection of Furs
Valued at More Than
\$15,000,000

(By Associated Press.)

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 12.—More than 12,000,000 pelts, valued at \$15,000,000 will be auctioned at the annual fall sale of the International Fur Exchange here, beginning tomorrow. More than 500 buyers, from all parts of the world, are expected to attend.

Nine thousand Alaskan seal, and 667 blue fox will be sold for the account of the United States, and are expected to bring approximately \$1,000,000. A unique feature will be the sale of 30,000 Russian pony pelts. This is the first time in the exchange's history the latter have been on sale.

The largest lot catalogued is one containing 1,500,000 Russian squirrel. Among the expensive pelts are 8,000 sable, 7,000 Russian sable, and 700 silver fox. The Russian sable alone, it is believed, will bring \$2,000,000, Philip B. Fouke, the auctioneer, said.

Large lots to be sold include: 565,000 muskrat, 230,000 marmot, 310,000 white hare, 150,000 civet cat, 200,000 Australian opossum, 28,000 American opossum, 190,000 ermine, 110,000 Japanese fox, and 600,000 pounds of rabbit skins.

The sale will continue until September 20.

FOURTEEN-YEAR-OLD OCALA GIRL LEAVES HOME UNANNOUNCED

OCALA, Sept. 12.—Alta Watson, aged fourteen years, disappeared from her home in this city recently, presumably going to Tampa. 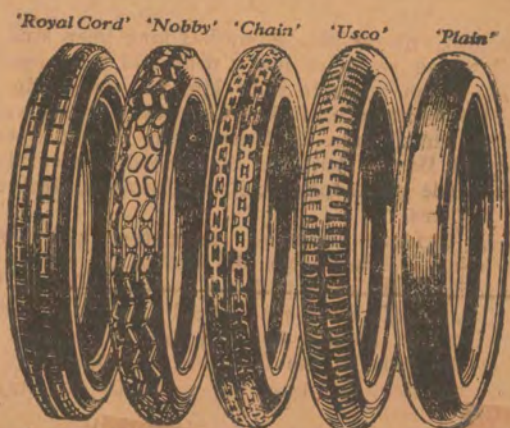

"IN THE DAY'S NEWS"

Few leaders in American educational circles are more widely known than Dr. James H. Kirkland, chancellor of Vanderbilt University, who celebrates his 6th birthday anniversary today. Dr. Kirkland comes of a family that has been conspicuous in religious and educational work for several generations. His early education was received at Wofford College, in his native town of Spartanburg, S. C. After graduating from that institution in 1877 he went abroad for post-graduate study. Upon his return he became professor of Greek and German in his alma mater. The years 1883-86 he spent in further travel and study abroad. His connection with Vanderbilt University dates from 1886, when he became professor of Latin in the Nashville institution. Since 1893 he has been chancellor of the university. EDUCATION--WHAT IS IT?

Long, long ago a blacksmith of New England distinguished himself, not without much ridicule, by advocating a league of nations, to the end that the world might have universal peace. His name was Elihu Burritt, and they called him the "learned blacksmith." He knew fifty languages before he was thirty years old, but, to put the case figuratively, his student's lamp was the forge and his desk was an anvil.

If you are of the sort to feel discouraged now and then because you have not had a college education, remember that many men have achieved success in the intellectual world without the training that is to be had in a college. William Dean Howells, the renowned American author; Jack London, Mark Twain, Arminius Vamberg, the great linguist, author and authority on the Orient—none of these went to college.

Herbert Spencer, whose philosophy has long been studied by college instructors, and whose writings had a profound influence on education, declined the offer of an uncle to send him to Cambridge University. From the age of seventeen until he was twenty-six he was an engineer on the London & Birmingham Railway. But it was Spencer who enriched the theory of Darwin with the doctrine of the survival of the fittest, and his optimistic philosophy was a bulwark against the pessimism of the German thinkers.

Napoleon left Brienne when he was sixteen and always was contemptuous of scholars. Washington did not go to school after he was fifteen, and Franklin's scholastic training ended when he was a lad of seven. Abraham Lincoln did not go to school at all, but, unlike Napoleon, he always regretted that he had not had the advantage of a college course. However, he relished the fact that his course with the International Correspondence Schools was a big asset to the requirements of his life work.
