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"UNSINKABLE SHIP A DREAM"---FLETCHER PAVING ESTIMATES WERE ORDERED PAID

UNITED STATES SENATOR FROM FLORIDA TAKING PART IN TITANIC INVESTIGATION

Sen. Fletcher Thinks Life
Boats Carried to High
Above Water Line

AGAINST NORTHERN ROUTE

Florida Statesman Says Un-
sinkable Ship Is Dream and
Iceberg Reality

Washington, May 8.—Senator Fletcher is taking a very keen interest in the investigation of the Titanic disaster by the sub-committee of the committee on commerce, he having been named as one of the senators to conduct this investigation.

Questioned as to what he thought the developments from this investigation would point to as the probable action of congress, he said that although the hearings had not been completed, sufficient has been shown up to the present time to indicate the importance of legislation and international agreements and regulations covering navigation on the high seas which would insure the following things:

1. Life boats and life saving apparatus sufficient to take care of every person, both passengers and crew in cases of collision, fire or catastrophes like the one under consideration.

2. Radio-communication such as will make certain of there always being on duty a competent operator, who will be compelled to give and receive warnings and distress signals in preference to all other matter and obliging all passenger vessels to be equipped with wireless apparatus and two or more competent operators.

"When it is borne in mind that the life boats on the Titanic were loaded from the decks about 70 feet above the water, it is seen why there was hesitation about getting in them by passengers. It may be that improvements in loading and handling devices will be accomplished.

"Whether search lights would be useful is yet in doubt. Running a ship 21 knots an hour in the ice region in the face of warnings of ice ahead is inexcusable and providing only 14 life boats, each with a capacity of 60 or 65 people, (but not practicable to load that number and lower them 70 feet) and four collapsible boats, each with a capacity of 30 or 35 and two surf boats with somewhat less capacity, to take care of twenty-five hundred people in an emergency is absurd.

"The track of the ship across the North Atlantic should be altered and precautions should be specified in regulations with penalties, so as to minimize the possibilities of such awful occurrences in future.

"We may just as well make up our minds that the unsinkable ship, fit for business, is a dream. The irresistible iceberg is a reality.

"We can help to avoid disaster and we can increase the chances of relief.

"The committee will have recommendations to make which the investigation will show as most important."

YOUNG MAN AT SARATOGA ACCIDENTALLY KILLED

Load Of Shot Struck Him
In The Throat And Almost
Severed Head

Sarasota, Fla., May 8.—Paul Drymon, the seventeen year old son of Zach Drymon, of Little Sarasota Key was accidentally shot and instantly killed this afternoon by Kit Mahone, a boy friend. The Mahone boy and S. T. Sigel, of Elkins, W. Va., were fishing from an anchored boat when the Drymon boy came along side in another boat and entered into conversation.

Mahone was holding a shotgun in his hands which was accidentally discharged, the load of shot striking Drymon in the throat, almost severing his head from the body. The Drymon family were among the first settlers on Sarasota Bay and the beautiful Oaks on the Zach Drymon homestead on Little Sarasota Key will be remembered by all who are familiar with Sarasota Bay.

UNKNOWN SAILOR SHOT IN HAVANA YESTERDAY.

Havana, May 8.—An unknown sailor was shot here today while sitting on the dock. It is rumored that the bullet was a stray one and came from a crowd of excitable strikers who were on the dock. The Ward liner Saratoga brought men here to break the strike, but they have not been used up to now. It is said the strike-breakers declare they will join the strikers rather than work against them. A report is current that the employees of the city electric power and lighting plant have struck in sympathy with the strikers. This is denied but the strikers say, "Wait until tomorrow."

FLOYD ALLEN WORE AN ARMORED JACKET

"It Don't take but mighty
Little of the right stuff
to Turn Bullets"

Wytheville, Va., May 8.—"It don't take but mighty little of the right stuff to turn bullets," was one of Floyd Allen's first remarks to his guard after his capture at the Hillsville courthouse shooting on March 14. Witnesses at his trial today testified that was his retort when his guard expressed surprise that the old mountaineer had not been wounded until after he had left the court room where a judge, prosecutor, sheriff, juror and bystander had been killed.

In the prosecution's attempt to show that Allen came prepared for the shooting and wore a steel or iron breast-plate, witnesses testified that at least a dozen shots were fired at Allen by men only a few feet away and that none took effect.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 8.—Americanizing and Christianizing the millions coming into this country from various parts of the world each year is one of the church's problems today, according to the report of the home mission and church extension board made to the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The report states: "One-half of the people of the United States are foreign born or of foreign parentage. Thirty-three of the largest cities of the Union are more foreign than American in population."

TOOMER ADDRESSED VOTERS LAST NIGHT

Large Crowd Listened to
Candidate For Congress-
man-at-Large

Col. W. M. Toomer of Jacksonville, candidate for Congressman-at-large from Florida addressed the voters last night at the corner of Duval and Fleming streets. Col. Toomer was introduced by Hon. John M. Warren as "one of Florida's most distinguished citizens."

Col. Toomer stated that he was not in Key West for the purpose of answering the accusations of Claude L'Engle, but that if the latter persisted in attacking him as he has been doing lately, he would reply to him if it cost him his race for congress. He spoke of the many natural advantages possessed by Key West and stated that he had been greatly surprised to learn that the military post at Key West was so small and he believed this post should have a larger naval station on account of its exceptional strategic position. He gave as his opinion that the opening of the Panama Canal would make Key West one of the South's greatest sea ports; that all perishable freight, mail, etc., coming through the canal would pass through the port of Key West by reason of the fact that it is the most southern railway terminal in the United States and aside from the fact of being the nearest American port to the canal, it offered the closest railroad connections. He touched on the tariff and also said that he was the only candidate among the six in the first primary who advocated the establishment of a National Health Bureau in Washington. He stated that the advantage Key West would derive from this bureau would lie in the fact that only a high government official could enforce a quarantine here, and that rival cities could not bring any influence to bear which would cause a quarantine to be enforced.

Quite a large crowd heard Col. Toomer last night and he made a favorable impression. The Light Guard Band furnished music for the occasion.

NERVE SPECIALIST IS WITH RICHESON

Dr. Briggs Will Make A
Report to Governor Foss
Some Time Today

Boston, May 8.—In case the petition of Clarence V. T. Richeson, for clemency is referred to the executive council by Gov. Foss, the hearing will be private. This has been definitely settled, it was stated today. No notice has been sent to the members of the council as to whether the governor would refer the Richeson case to that body next Wednesday. The former clergyman is sentenced to be executed during the week beginning May 19 for murdering Avis Linnell.

Dr. Lloyd V. Briggs, a nerve specialist and insanity expert of this city, has been examining Richeson during the past week for Gov. Foss. At the governor's office it was stated that Dr. Briggs would submit a report tomorrow.

WOMEN WANT RIGHTS.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 8.—The women of the Methodist church today presented a petition to the general conference demanding that women be granted the right to sit as delegates in the conference and that they be eligible for ordination as ministers. The demand is made that women be placed on an equal footing with men in the church.

JOHNSON-FLYNN FIGHT WILL BRING \$150,000

Price Of Seats Will Range
From Twenty-Five To
Ten Dollars

Chicago, May 8.—That the gate of the Johnson-Flynn fight will bring the promoters \$150,000 was the statement of Jack Curley just before leaving Chicago for Las Vegas with Jim Flynn. Details of the seating at the arena have been worked out, according to Curley, and the prices to be charged range from \$25 to \$10. Unlike the Reno fight, there will be no \$50 seats and there will be no \$5 seats. Every seat will be reserved. The \$10 variety will be those farthest from the arena. The arena is to be modeled after that built for the championship go at Reno. It will seat approximately 10,000 people.

OFFICIAL REPORT OF REGULAR MEETING HELD BY THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

* RESCUERS OF FLOOD VICTIMS WERE DROWNED.

Opelousas, La., May 8.—Eighteen persons were drowned in a motor boat yesterday in an accident near here. The boat capsized while it was on a mission of rescuing people who had been marooned by the flood. The Mississippi levee has broken on to Crescent City, and the water is increasing hourly. The levee at Saint Sophia is forty feet high, but it broke yesterday and a large district is inundated. Rescue boats have seen persons on top of houses and in the tops of trees in the marooned districts but were unable to rescue them at the time. Flood refugees are pouring in from all directions.

MILITIA OFFICERS ARE HIGH PRIVATES

Have Been Formed in com-
panies at Instruction
School for Drills

St. Augustine, May 8.—The commissioned officers of the National Guard of Florida are camping in the Ancient City for a few weeks' instruction. General Foster had made all arrangements and everything was in readiness when they arrived.

The officers are arranged in three companies and are drilled the same as privates. Military science is taught thoroughly, and the first three nights will be devoted to map maneuvers, the war game being played on large maps, drawn to an accurate scale and small pieces of colored cardboard, representing companies and regiments and indicating the infantry, cavalry, etc.

During the afternoon the men will spend their time in the country topography and map drawing. The work to be taken up while in camp includes care of rifles, duties of the soldier, formation of companies, camp policing, sanitary, etc.

Col. Blanding is commanding officer of the camp.

THAW MAKING DESPERATE EFFORTS FOR FREEDOM

Has Been In The Hospital For
The Criminal Insane For
Over Four Years

New York, N. Y., May 8.—Harry Kendall Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, will be given another hearing to question into his mental condition today. "I am feeling badly," Thaw declared, "and added that he weighs 184 pounds "with his shoes off." The inquiry today results from a writ of habeas corpus sworn out by Thaw's aged mother, who has never despaired of securing the release of her son.

The attempt to secure Thaw's release from the asylum for the criminal insane at Matteawan, where he has been held a prisoner for over four years, was given a staggering blow at the very outset by the testimony of Dr. J. W. Russell, Matteawan's new head, who swore that "Thaw is still of unsound mind and has not recovered." It is believed that Thaw, his mother and counsel anticipated a different verdict.

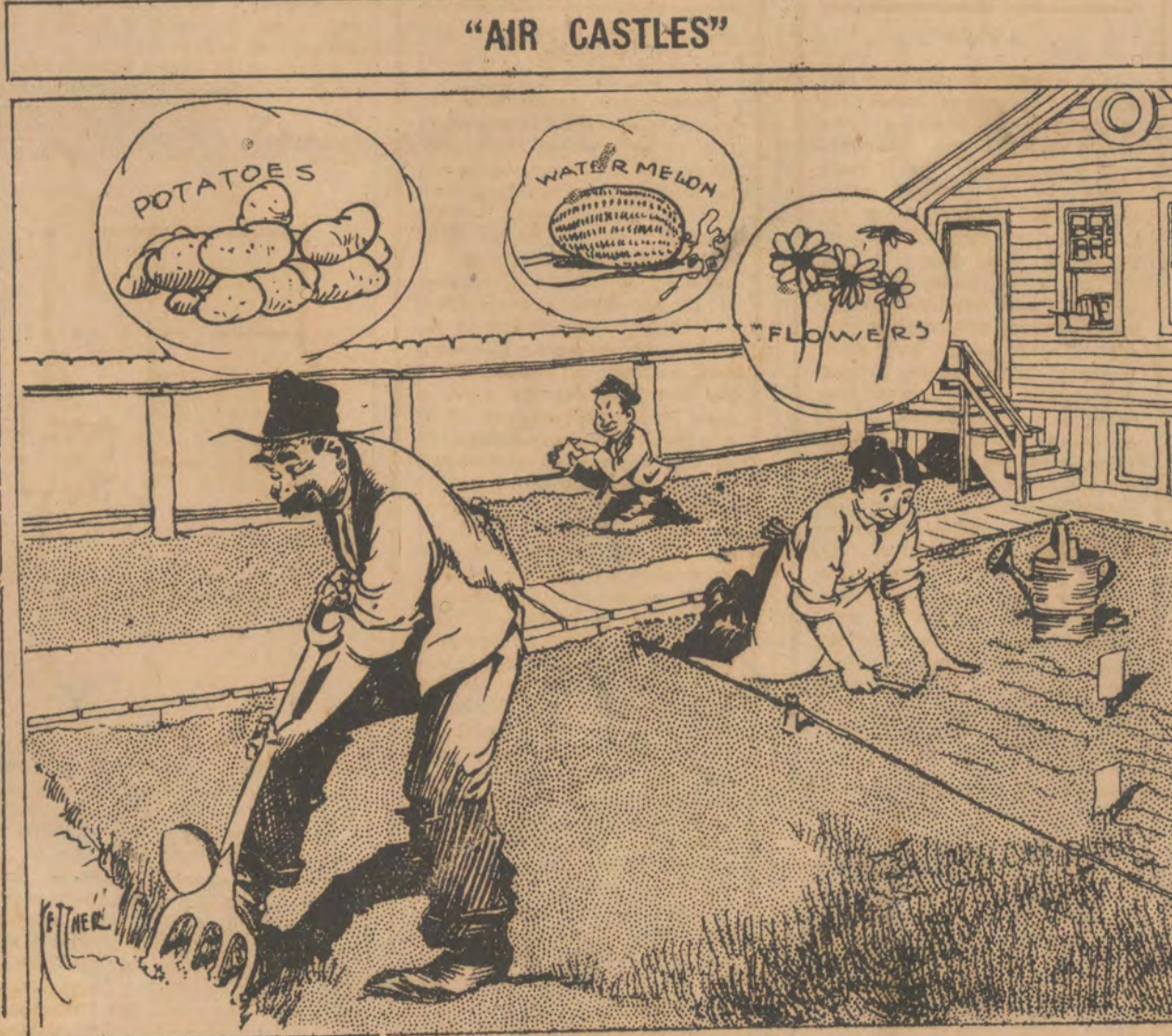

GRANT'S OLD-TIME WAR HOME

Located in New Jersey and Likely to Be Destroyed—Hero's Visits Remembered by Old Timers.

In the city of Burlington, N. J., which boasts of more colonial history to the square yard than any other spot in New Jersey, there is one historic site not colonial that is just now drawing the attention of visitors because of the significant part it played in the national events of 50 years ago. This building is the little ivy-covered cottage, famous as the residence of Gen. U. S. Grant, and recognized by history as a potent factor in saving the life of the hero of the Civil war and the future president of the United States from death at the hands of the assassins who had planned to slay him on the night Booth shot President Lincoln.

General Grant's family was domiciled here during and for some time after the Civil war. General Grant was to have been a member of Lincoln's theater party on the evening of the assassination, but at the last moment, tired and anxious about his family, he left Washington for Burlington. He had gone no farther than Philadelphia when news reached him of the attack upon the president, and he at once returned to the capital city. He afterward learned that the Lincoln assassins had plotted to take his own life and but for his trip to Burlington undoubtedly would have succeeded.

It was on his return from a battlefield during a lull in the campaign that General Grant received tribute here which he is said to have appreciated more than all the laurels and triumphs which came in his life later. Dusty, begrimed, looking anything but the commander of the Federal armies and accompanied by a single staff officer, Grant alighted from the train at the Burlington station. A few boys recognized him first and followed as he walked down Broad street toward his home on Wood street.

One of these boys, who was John G. Sholl, now a Burlington business man, tells of this incident. As Grant and his aid neared a mansion at the corner of Wood and Broad streets, Mrs. Kinsey, aged wife of Judge Kinsey of a family famous in the courts of both New Jersey and New York, stepped on the high porch. Supported by her daughter, she waved a silk American flag as General Grant passed below.

The frown passed from General Grant's face, a smile flitted over his countenance and he doffed his hat in answer to the pretty salute. "I am proud to hold my country's emblem over the head of its most noble defender," said the patriotic old lady.

and Grant is declared to have cherished the words as among the choicest ever spoken in his praise.

The Grant cottage is a pretty little two-story structure situated on the east side of Wood street, midway between High and Broad streets. On the high street side of the block, almost opposite, is a building in which the colonial legislature of New Jersey met and where Washington is said to have had temporary headquarters during the Revolution.

Burlingtonians recall many stories of General Grant's life there. Shortly after his return from the war, according to one of the stories, there was an amusing incident in which a servant from a neighboring residence and the general figured. There was a knock at the front door of the Grant home early one morning and a servant returned to the breakfast table with a report that a young woman wished to see the general.

General Grant went to the door. The girl, apron drawn into a hood over her head, stood upon the veranda. "I wanted to see General Grant," she said.

"Yes, I'm the general," said Grant. The maid, who had expected to see a giant in stature, looked her amazement; then she stammered: "I—I just wanted to see you, general, so I could say I had seen you!"

MIXING RICE AND BEANS.

"When rice and beans are eaten at the same meal, must the rice be retained in the stomach till the beans are ready to pass out?" a subscriber asks the editor of a health magazine. The answer, "Not necessarily." It is necessarily incomplete and unsatisfactory to one who wishes to know whether the monodiet theory so much emphasized in these Hints is as important as it must be if the arguments in its support are well founded. The correct answer to the question can be definitely determined by eating a meal of beans and rice and withdrawing the contents of the stomach two hours afterwards, when it will be found that the beans and the rice are so well mixed that to separate them would be a much greater tax upon the stomach, if that were possible, than to retain the rice three hours instead of one, whatever the effect of that may be. Scientific investigation requires reasons for all phenomena, but the practical application of the monodiet is easily determined by experience.

FOOD VS. MEDICINE.

Dr. F. Magendie, the celebrated French physician, says, in one of his published lectures: "When I was chief physician at Hotel Dieu hospital, Paris, some 3,500 patients passed through my hands during a year. Before my term expired I tried the experiment of giving one-half of the patients that were then present no medicine at all; the rest the usual medical treatment. The former were given, instead, only what is known as 'food and simple remedies,' and, to my unbounded surprise, they all got well—not a single death; while among those receiving medical treatment the customary number of deaths occurred. A second trial yielded a like result, and I was converted. Ever since I have given but little medicine to my patients." This is the practice of most sanitariums now, and especially of the tuberculosis sanitariums, in which food is the essential treatment. While it is not probable that medicines will be entirely eliminated, diet will be the chief means of cure in all cases in the future, as it now is in diabetes, rheumatism, consumption, Bright's disease and others.

COLORING MATTER IN GREEN PEAS.

It was recently demonstrated at an exposition in New York that an coloring matter is contained in a can of green peas to dye a handkerchief a deep copper color. It is not illegal to use certain dyeing and preserving materials in canned foods if they are labeled as the law requires. Appeal to the eye and sense of taste are not to be ignored, but so long as people prefer denatured flour and denatured rice because they look prettier and bright green canned goods because they look prettier it is impossible to have good nutrition with good health. It should be possible to get unpolished rice anywhere cheaper than the polished, and it should be possible to buy entire wheat anywhere, but merchants can not afford to keep such choice foods because there is little demand for them, owing to the lack of such knowledge as is daily supplied in these Hints. It would be easy now to form in this city a club who could purchase the best food for themselves at reduced prices or arrange with a grocer who would gladly keep such food if he knew of the demand.

"COLDS."

It is a well demonstrated fact that when one has fasted for several days, reducing the weight below the standard and eliminating the waste matter in the system which supports all disease, it is impossible to contract a cold. Therefore the germ is not the cause of colds, although specific germs (with certain other conditions) differentiate cold, typhoid, pneumonia and other diseases. If the system is overloaded with waste matter, produced by wrong diet, bad mental conditions and defective elimination, resulting from defective action of the skin, kidneys, lungs, liver, bad diet, insufficient exercise, bad mental conditions—all interrelated—"cold," typhoid, pneumonia, or other disease, is established when vitality is lowered beyond the point of successful resistance, but the essential fundamental cause of germ diseases is defective nutrition, with lowered resistance and certain other contributory factors.

GAINS FROM IMPROVED NUTRITION.

Remarkable results have followed improvement in the nutrition of children of the public schools of Cleveland, by caring for the teeth and teaching them how to eat properly, for six months. Tests showed that memory had been improved 111 per cent. in one instance; power of spontaneous association, 84 per cent.; association by opposites, 48 per cent.; quickness and accuracy of perception, 22 per cent.; an average improvement in mental capacity of 52 per cent. Persons in middle life do not improve so remarkably by improving nutrition but there is invariably an improvement in working capacity when the general nutrition is improved, especially by saving vitality commonly expended in excessive mixing of incompatible foods. The case of a man at Economy, Ind., has been mentioned, who had decided to give up his general store, but after becoming adapted to a regime advocated in the Hints organized a bank and was elected its president and now conducts the store while performing the duties of bank officer and Sunday School superintendent; also that of a man past seventy, at Aurora, Ill., who having sold his store and retired from business, is again in business, the leader in his line. Many such cases could be cited.

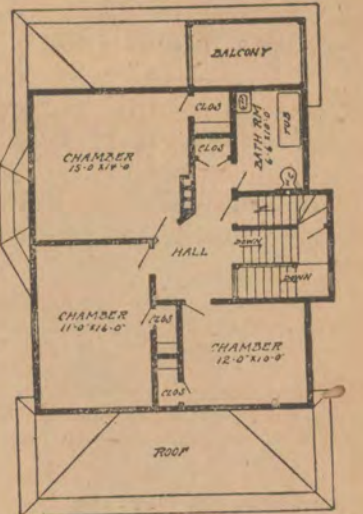
The most economical house to build and to occupy afterward is nearly square, of medium size, full two stories in height, with a good, deep cellar and an attic big enough to act as a buffer against heat in summer and cold in winter. Such houses give more room according to the size of the foundation and roof than any other design.

The house here illustrated is typical of this style. It is 31 feet wide by 38 feet from front to rear—proportions that work to good advantage. There are certain geometrical combinations that work to a disadvantage in a square house, but are easily overcome when you add a few feet to the length.

One of the difficulties is the stairway, which interferes with the proper laying-out of the rooms in every short house. Stairways in dwelling-houses have caused more gray hairs, and sent more architects to early graves, than any other feature in house building. There was a time when a rough ladder fashioned with an ax answered the purpose: It was made with the trunks of two trees for sides, and sections of smaller trees for rounds. There was a hole through the upper floor and usually an effort was made to place the opening where the roof was high enough so you could miss hitting the knots on the rafters with your head. From that time to this, stairways have grown in complexity until we think we have them about perfect.

This plan provides a projection which holds about half of the stair

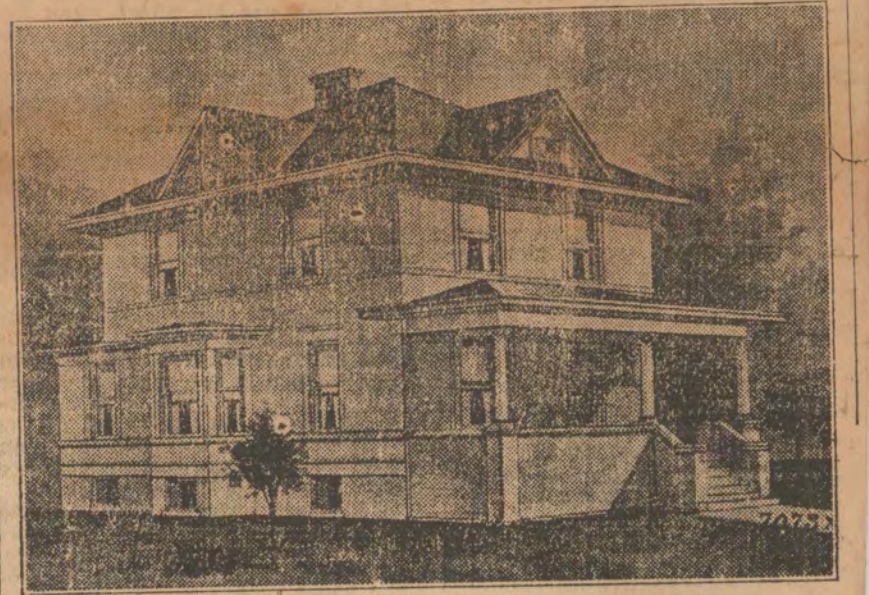
Makers of hot water heating plants and hot air furnaces are in very close competition. Improvements are being added every year, until both systems seem to be about as near perfect as human ingenuity can make them. A hot air furnace big enough to heat this house comfortably in zero weather can be installed for about \$125. A hot water heating system will cost

more, the difference depending largely on the kind of radiators and the extra attachments; probably \$250 would be the minimum, and \$500 would be rather extravagant. The hot water plant will use a little less coal, because hot water is a better medium through which to convey heat. While no accurate estimate can be given without figuring the actual amount of heating surface and cubic air space, on general principles it may be said that, taking five years together, the cost of one system is about the same as the other.

There are arguments in favor of both systems for houses of this size.



landings. The projection also offers an excuse to work in four windows for light and for general effect. The lighting of a modern stairway is another recent improvement on anything that former generations were familiar with.

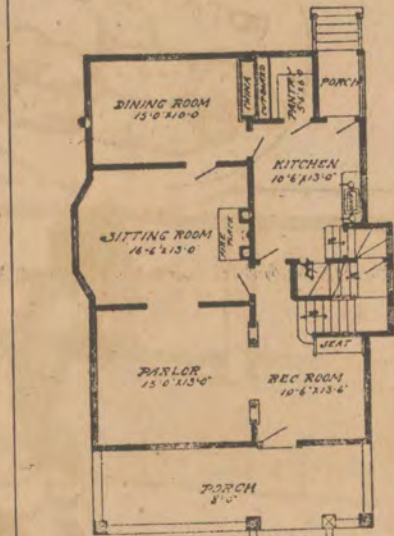
This arrangement is a combination affair going up from the kitchen and from the front hall, and down from the kitchen to the cellar. On the second floor the going up to the attic and down stairs is equally good. The stairway looks well, and it is very convenient and satisfactory.

A house built in this manner has another advantage, and that is in heating. It is so compact that from one to five tons of coal per year may be saved, as compared with the amount

With hot air you can get the fresh, pure air from outside, and send it into every corner of the house. My belief is that families using hot air furnaces are properly installed enjoy better health than those who use hot water for heating; but, unfortunately a great many hot air furnaces are arranged to take the air from inside the house. This loses the most valuable asset that should ordinarily be placed to the credit of the hot air space. However, either system should embrace a thorough plan for constantly changing the air in the rooms through ventilating flues. But, I am sorry to say, this is a subject the American people have paid very little attention to. It is destined to occupy our attention more as years go on and we learn more about the germ theory of disease. It is not necessary to mention steam heating for a small dwelling. The economy of steam comes in when we have a larger building to heat.

I like to plan houses like this, because they are so thoroughly complete when properly built, as they should be from cellar to attic, with all the essentials carefully worked out. It is just as important to balance up all the mechanical features of a house as it is to look to and adjust all the parts of a machine. Mechanics have more to do with our comfort and health than most of us realize. A small fire in the cellar may be made to supply hot water to the laundry tubs, to the kitchen and to the bathroom, so we can have hot water to use at any hour of the day or night. I often think that to accept the many modern improvements in our houses without due precision.

I want to call attention to the up-balcony in the rear of the bathroom. Since carpets have been abolished and all good houses have hardwood floors, rugs have become very fashionable. It seems necessary to have them cleaned once a week or once a month according to the amount of service required of them; and this upper balcony facilitates the work of cleaning. The rugs may be carried out and laid in the sun, and swept on the floor whipped over the balcony railing, much easier than to carry them down to the yard. It is another contrivance to save work and promote sanitation.

Under this house is a splendid cellar that is as light as some of the best rooms in houses built a dozen years ago, when small, narrow windows were in fashion. In a basement like this you can place a modern heating apparatus that will take care of the temperature in the coldest weather; and the attention required will not worry a person more than a few minutes twice a day.

The GREATEST PLAY I EVER SAW

AS TOLD TO
Hugh S. Fullerton
BY HERMAN SCHAEFER.

Outfielder Washington Americans.
Former Second Baseman Detroit.
Considered One of the Smart-
est Men in Baseball.

The greatest play I ever saw was a double play that Charlie O'Leary, Rossman and I made. I don't mind telling it or claiming that it was the greatest, because my part of the play was only to start it, so I am not making myself out to be the hero of it.

In fact, if I had started it straight it wouldn't have been so great.

The play was made either in the fourteenth or the fifteenth inning of the game between Detroit and Philadelphia on September 30, 1907, which finally ended in a seventeen inning tie by a score of 9 to 9.

That was a wonderful game in many respects. Both teams were hitting hard and scoring often, but as often as we scored they scored the same number of runs. Half a dozen times we thought we had the game in hand, and each time they tied it up and we had to fight to keep them from winning out.

In the inning that the play was made it looked as if the Athletics had grabbed the game at last. They had men on first and third and one out. I don't recall who was at bat, but I think it was Harry Davis. We were, of course, playing the middle distance, to try either for a double play, or for the man at the bat, the first and third basemen playing in and the second baseman playing in shortstop playing muddling deep just inside the line. The ball was hit between me and Rossman, hit so hard that I couldn't get squarely in front of it; it went entirely past me so that I had turned and was moving with the ball, my back toward the plate. I could have thrown to first and retired the runner there, but that would have given them the score and the game; I hadn't a chance to throw to the plate and all I could do was to try for the double play. I scooped the ball and while running snapped it back to second base, or rather toward second. O'Leary was on the bag and the ball was at least five feet wide. To leave the base meant to lose the play. He fell toward the ball, keeping one foot on the bag, and stretching, he caught it, forcing the runner there. When I looked he was rolling over, half rising, and from that position he whipped the ball toward first base. He was almost lying down when he made the throw and the ball went wide to first, so wide that I didn't think Rossman had a chance to get it. Ross kept up his end by diving outward with his foot on the sack, and spearing the ball with his mitt while he lay stretched out on the ground.

I don't think I ever saw a play affect a crowd as that one did. The people had expected the Athletics to win out and were yelling as loudly as they could. They yelled more when the ball was hit. But as Rossman speared that ball the crowd was as quiet as a tomb. The people just sat and looked at each other for a minute—and then they broke loose and yelled for five minutes. They still were yelling when we came to bat in the next inning, and every time either O'Leary or Rossman turned around they cheered, and they cheered us all—even the Dutchman—when darkness finally ended the game.

LOSS BY FIRE.

The month of January gave the year 1912 a bad start in the matter of fire loss, the total contribution to the ash-heap in the United States and Canada amounting to \$35,653,450, compared with \$21,922,450 for January a year ago and \$15,175,400 for January, 1910. The Equitable fire in New York city is set down for \$3,000,000 in the exhibit, which is not a heavy estimate. There was another heavy fire loss in New York city, that of the terminal warehouses, involving a destruction of \$1,100,000. There were thirty-five fires during the month in which there was a loss of \$200,000 or over. The abnormally cold weather made the liability to fires greater than usual, on account of the over-taxing of heating arrangements and the difficulty of using extinguishing apparatus to advantage. Underwriters say that the number of fires of suspicious origin is increasing, a concomitant of poor business conditions. The work of detectives in exposing the ring of professional fire-bugs in Chicago and other western cities last summer, did much good. What is needed is more vigilance in hunting down criminals of this type as well as greater precautions against accidental fires.

Advertising Talks.

BY THE AL. MAN.

TO THE MERCHANTS OF THE CITY OF KEY WEST:

GENTLEMEN:
I believe I may state as a fact, one which every one of you will concede to be true, that advertising, when properly done, pays and pays well. There are, of course, several ways in which one may advertise, and several different mediums through which the merchant may push his publicity campaign. 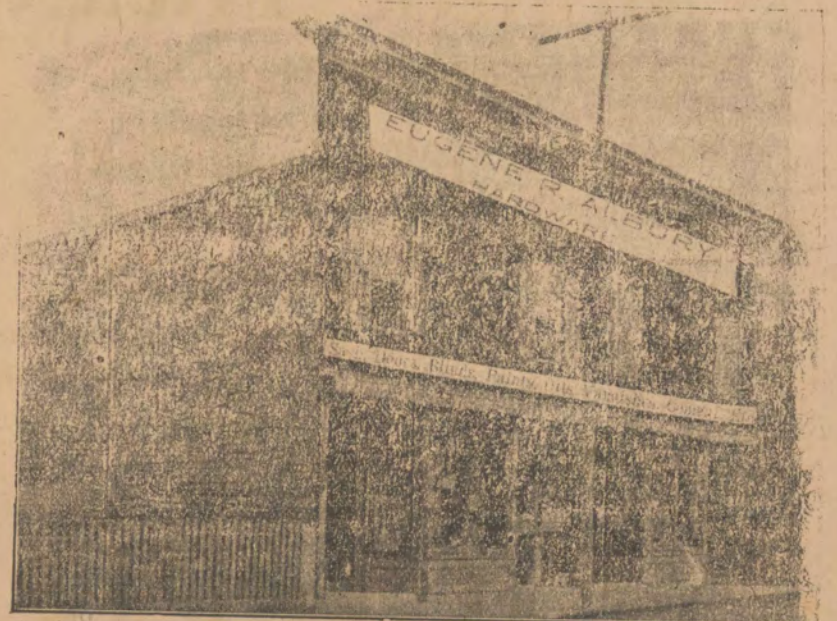

Titanic Pictures Coming
