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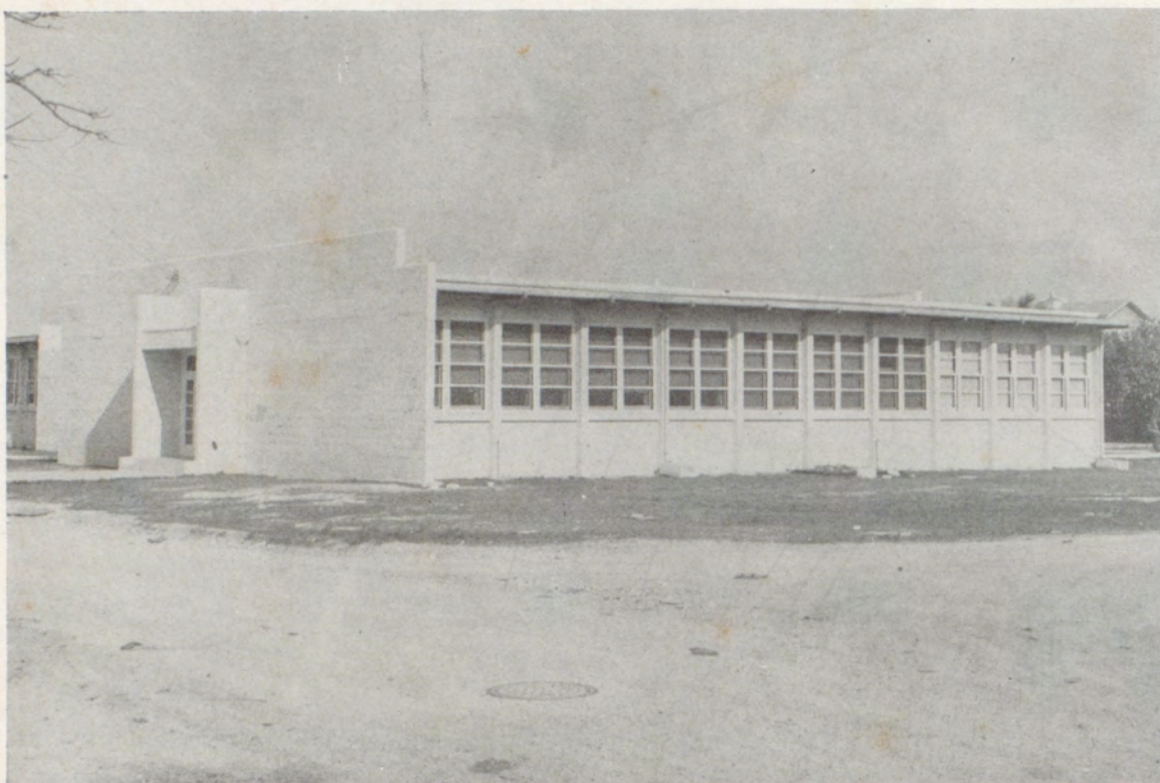

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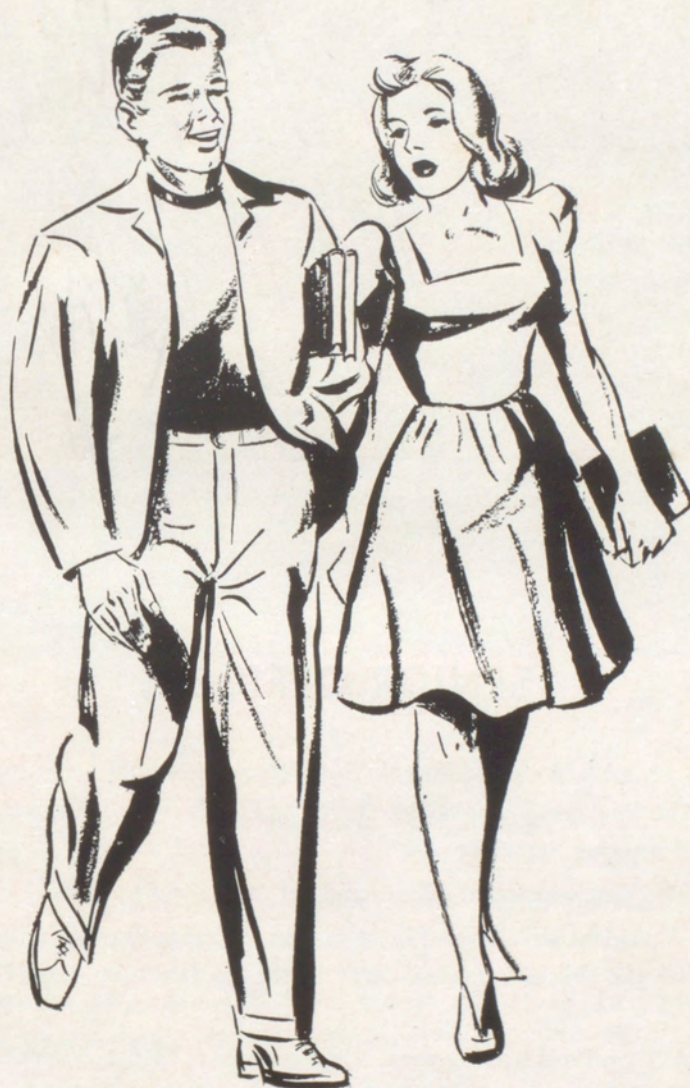

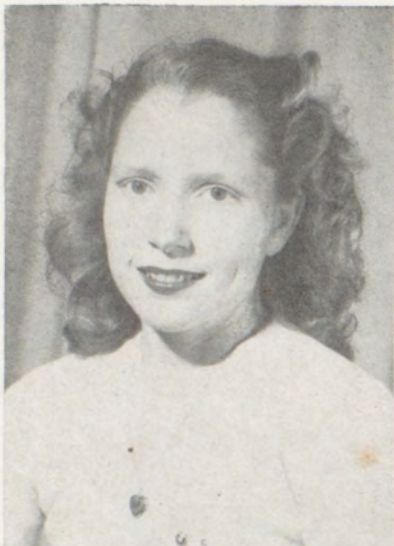

CLASS HISTORY

The most thrilling event of our Junior year was the Junior-Senior Prom, which turned out to be a very gala and enjoyable affair. We had the Gym decorated and called it "Club 46." What a time we had trying to find an orchestra to supply the music!

During our Junior and Senior years, quite a few of our classmates were displaying their talents and abilities in chorus, basketball, Student Council, and running "The Snapper," our school paper.

The last lap in our journey through high school began in September 1946. At last we were dignified Seniors. We were placed under the supervision of Mrs. Thompson, Miss Gardner, and Mrs. Poirier. Never can we reward the great patience and understanding which our Senior sponsors had with us. During this busy year we needed all the help we could get, and they were ever willing to do all they could.

At our first Senior Class meeting the following officers were elected: Forest Arthur, President; Betty Cottrell, Vice-President; Nancy Sterling, Secretary; Betty Spear, Treasurer. We got off to an early start. We ordered our class rings and appointed the annual staff. What a day it was when our rings arrived! It was none other than Friday the thirteenth!

The first event sponsored in our Senior year was the Senior Halloween carnival and dance. This replenished to some extent the somewhat low amount of funds in our treasury.

Later in the year we had Conch Day. It was our turn to make monkeys of the Juniors and to suffer with sunburn for about a week. In rapid succession followed the Senior Play, Junior-Senior Prom, and the Senior sponsored dance at the annex. Next came all the formalities that go with Graduation. That great day was drawing nigh.

At last came the grand finale of our high school career, Graduation Day. With beaming faces we marched up to receive our diplomas. Each one of us at this time was thinking of the years we had spent working our way towards this day. We thought also of the days in the future. Never again can we return to those happy days of the classroom, but we can use the knowledge which has been passed on to us. No man can ever take it from us. It is ours to use and to add to as we go out into this world to begin a new phase of our lives. May we enjoy the future as much as we have the past.

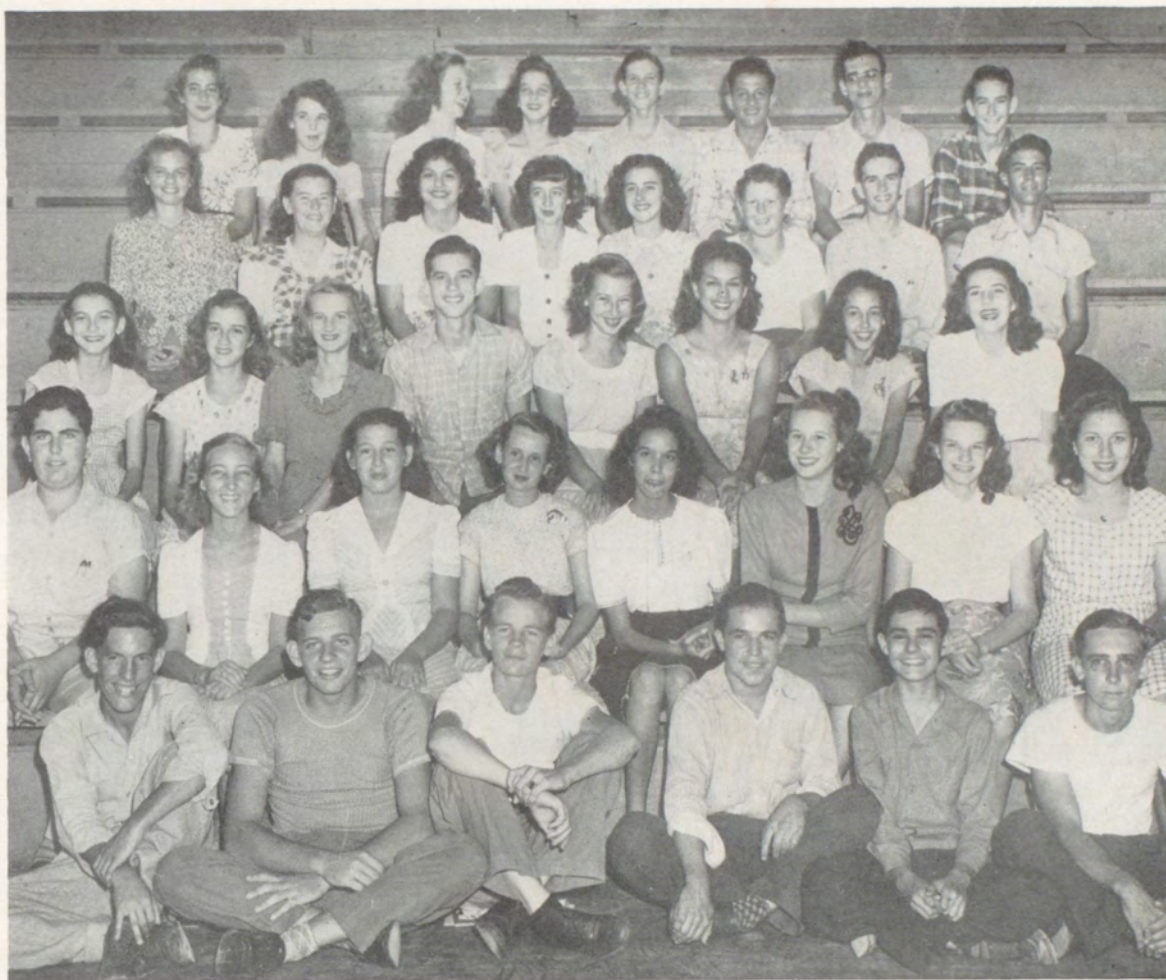

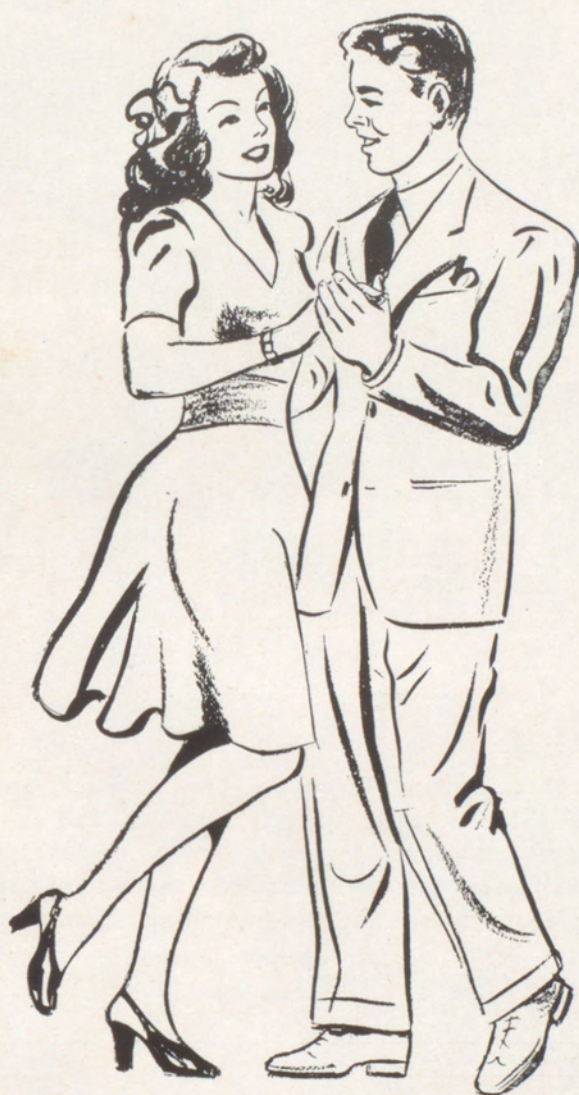

"We the students of the Key West Junior High School, in order to encourage better

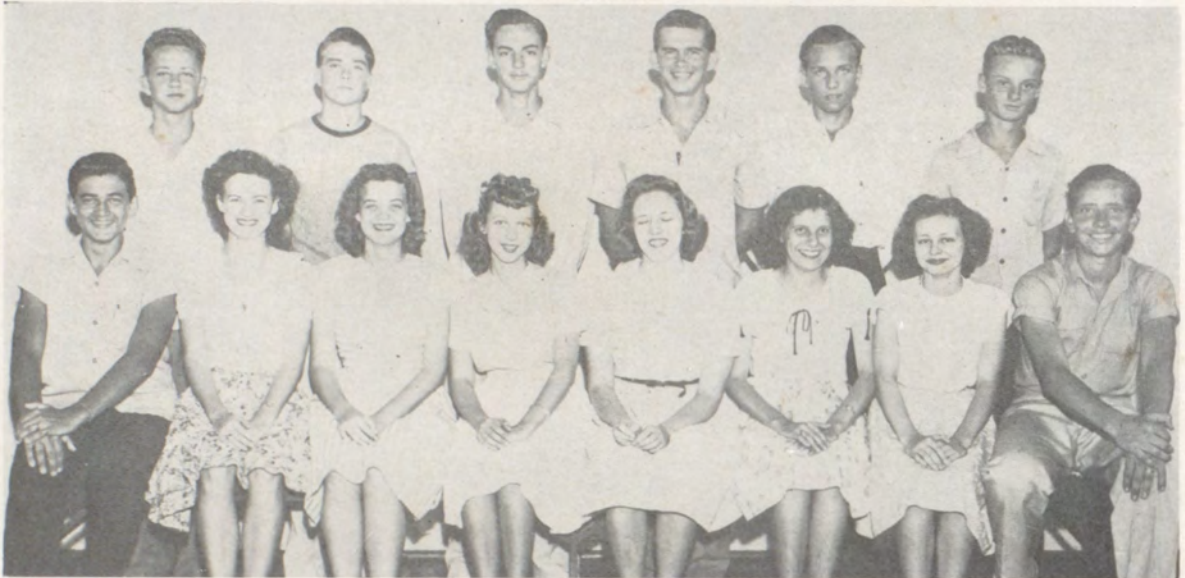

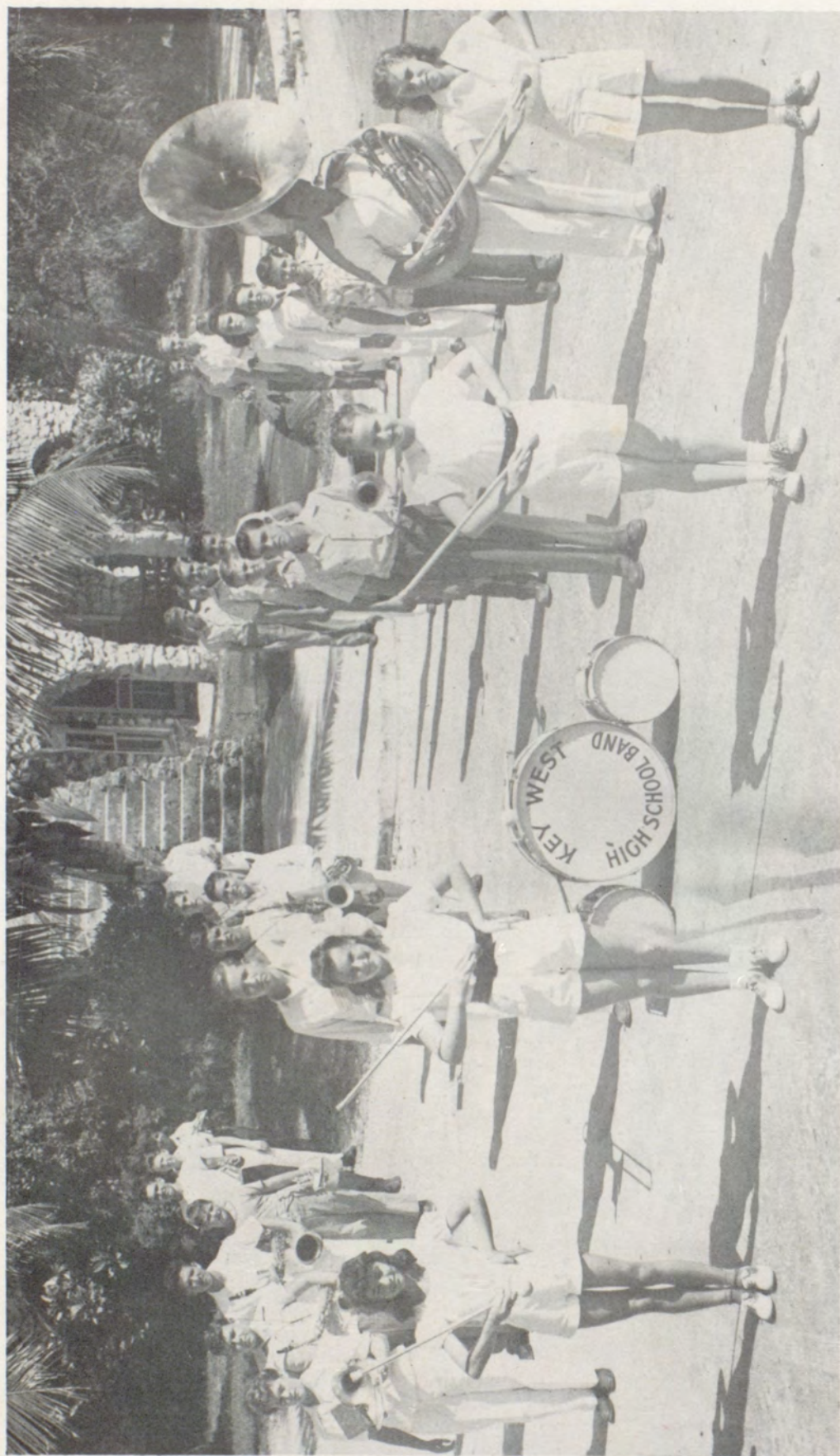

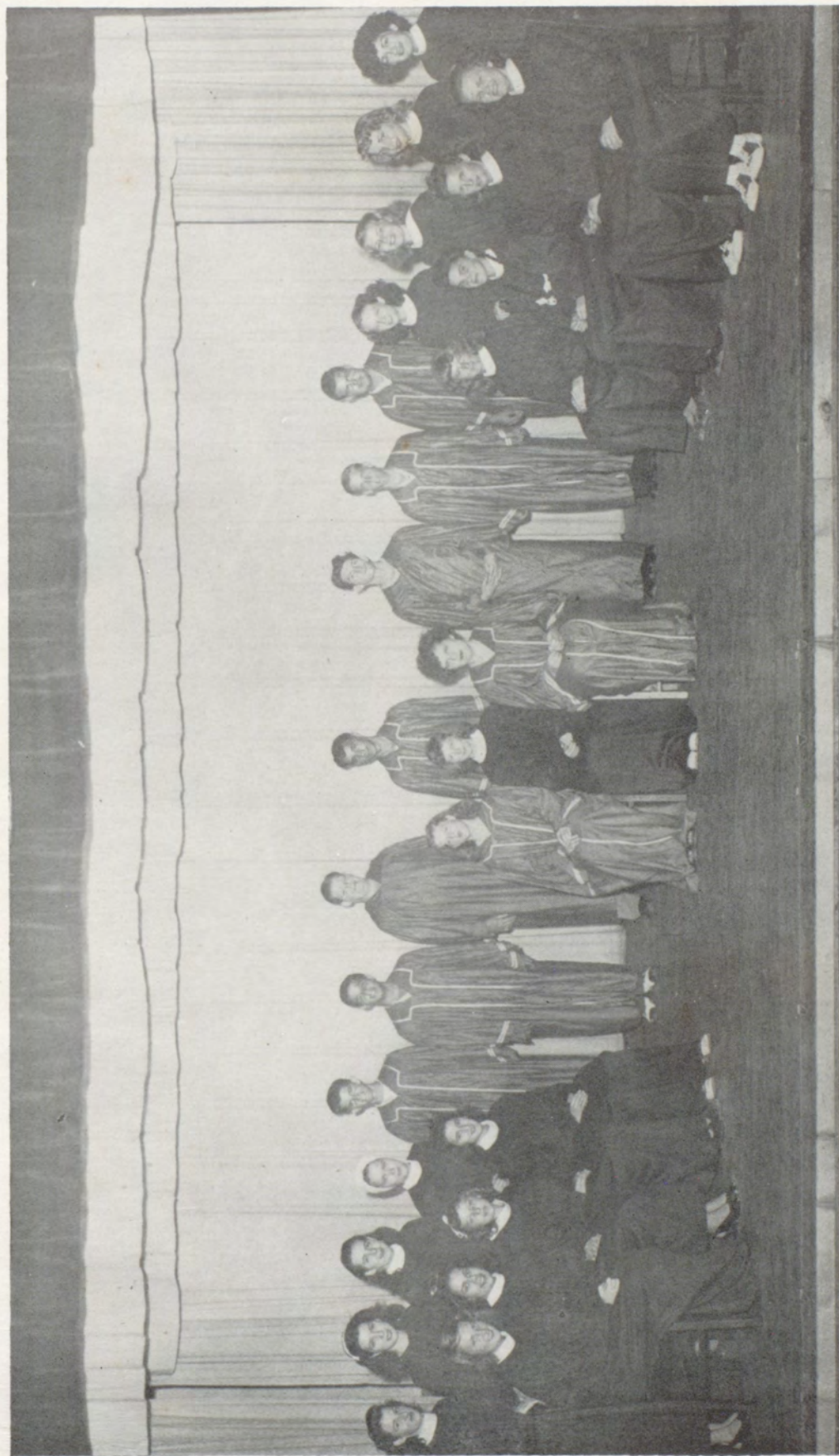
LIBRARY STAFF

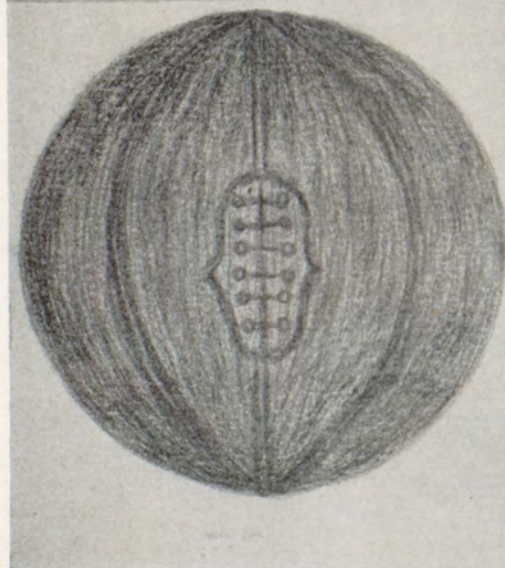
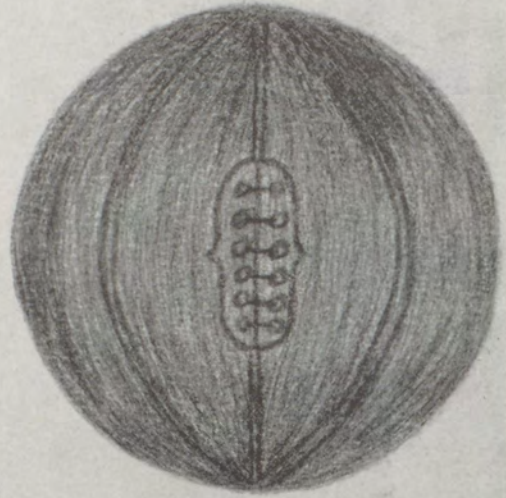

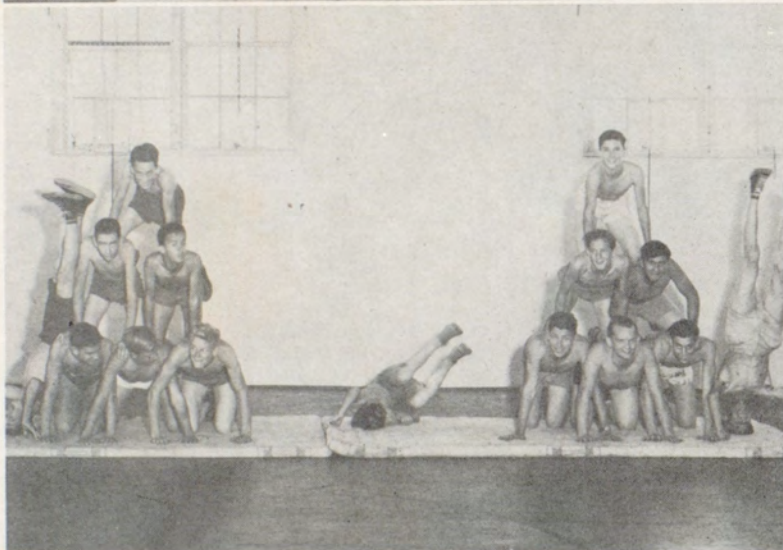
