SALOON ORDINANCE PASSED ON IT'S FINAL READING AT COUNCIL MEETING LAST NIGHT

Amended So That Saloons Will Close From 11 p. m. Until 5 o'clock a. m.

A NEW SUNDAY ORDINANCE

In All Probability Moving Picture Shows Will Be Allowed To Run On Sunday

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last night with all members present. President Kemp presiding. After a minor correction to the minutes they were adopted. A communication was read from Mr. E. R. Curry, Secretary of the fire department asking that two dozen chairs be purchased and that the report of the Chief of the fire department be published in pamphlet form. The latter was referred to the printing committee and the Council stated that the fire department was welcome to the use of City Hall at all times for the meetings where plenty of chairs were provided. A communication from the Mercedes Hospital was read calling attention to the good work they are doing and stating that their support was being cut down by the prohibition of moving pictures on Sunday night. They asked that this ordinance be amended. At this time a petition was read signed by over 200 citizens that the ordinance prohibiting moving pictures on Sunday be amended. Mr. Frank Fleitas addressed the Council on this subject and was asked by Councilman Kemp how much benefit was derived from Sunday night shows by various organizations. He stated that on one Sunday in the month the proceeds went to the San Carlos public school and on another Sunday in the same month the proceeds went to the Mercedes Hospital. He stated further that the net proceeds from the performances was sometimes as high as \$200, but averaged \$80. He also said that the amusement company only kept about \$12 which was to pay the cost of lighting. The other two Sundays of the month were for the benefit of the amusement company. It was ordered that the City Attorney draft a new ordinance covering Sunday amusements.

At this time, a telegram was received and read from Hon. E. M. Semple from Jacksonville stating that an important engagement prevented his presence at the meeting. The vote on the calling for a new ordinance covering Sunday amusements was as follows: W. B. Curry, Yes; Wm. M. Brooks, No; P. H. Ladd, Yes; Chas. W. Lowe, No; J. B. Valdez, Yes; E. E. Ingram, Yes; C. F. Kemp, Yes. A petition from residents on Grinnell Street was read asking that street be paved between Caroline and Fleming Sts. The petition was placed on file. The ordinance raising the salary of the City waterworks engineer to \$1500 a year was passed on the final reading. An ordinance regulating the hours of sale of liquor was read and passed on final reading. Attorney Geo. G. Brooks, representing the liquor dealers of the city addressed the Council outlining the high license paid by the saloon keepers and making amendment to the ordinance allowing them to close at 5 a. m. instead of 8 a. m. as originally planned. After much discussion this amendment was adopted. Mr. Brooks also asked the Council not to ensure saloons which paid \$1500 a year license for the various sins of the "oldest" which paid only \$250 a year with the privilege of selling liquor at any and all times. Rev. Darlington of the Congregational Church stated that while the saloon keepers paid \$1500 a year to pull the citizens of Key West down, he was paid \$1200 a year to try and lift them up, and therefore he opposed the amendment offered or suggested by Mr. Brooks. The amendment carried.

The action of Police Judge Curry in fining W. S. Smith for attempting to pass liquor into the city jail was sustained by the Council. Judge Curry stated however, that he was considering re-opening the case and suspending sentence for a year.

A resolution was passed requesting the Board of Public Works to see immediately to the repair of a covered ditch on Grinnell street.

A number of complaints were reported regarding the manner in which the gas company is filling in their trenches, and the matter was referred to the Board of Public Works.

Frank Albury, a disabled fireman, was ordered paid ten dollars a month. The building committee was given authority to have minor repairs made at City Hall.

Councilman Ladd stated that two months ago it was ordered that the taxes on the Gregory property on Duval street for improvements be cancelled. As this was not done, it was ordered last night that a warrant for \$7.20 be made out payable to whoever had been paying these taxes. This property was swept by fire a few years ago and has never been rebuilt.

Councilman Chas. Lowe read a communication from Fireman Sam Collins calling attention to the poor condition of the city's hose. The City Auditor was instructed to call for estimates on 500 feet of new hose.

Councilman Ladd at this time called attention to the new ordinance now on file. Councilman Ingram called attention to the request of the L. C. A. for lights in their park on Duval street. It was ordered that a communication be addressed to the ladies advising them that owing to the present financial condition of the city nothing could be done at this time, but on July 1st it was expected that a gas service could be rendered, at which time they would probably be given lights. The meeting then adjourned with the understanding that a social meeting would be held next Thursday night at City Hall at 7:30 p. m.

CAPT. OF TITANIC DESTROYED HIMSELF.

GALLANT OFFICER STOOD ON THE BRIDGE OF HIS SHIP AND BLEW HIS BRAINS OUT

As Scores Of Men, Women and Children Sank To Their Death All Around Him, The Captain of The Titanic Calmly Stood Upon The Bridge And Sent A Bullet Crashing Through His Brain.

REPORTED THAT MAJOR ARCHIBALD BUIIT KILLED ASTOR

But This Is Probably The Fevered Imagination of Some Newspaper Men. Chief Engineer of the Titanic Could Not Have Thought of Censure to Follow So Committed Suicide Before Great Liner Sank Beneath the Waves

New York, Apr. 17.—The steamship Carpathia, bearing even hundreds and seventy-five survivors of the ill-fated ocean liner "Titanic" arrived here tonight at 9:35 o'clock. Tremendous crowds greeted the ship on her arrival, and a cordon of police was necessary to keep in check the great crowd of curiosity seekers. This city was wild with excitement immediately following the news of the arrival of the Carpathia, and in a few minutes thousands of people had gathered to get the first authentic news of the greatest disaster in marine history.

The Carpathia docked at 9:35 tonight and a corps of doctors and nurses were immediately rushed aboard as it has been reported that "on one hundred to three hundred people" aboard the ship needed immediate medical attention. It appeared developed that this report was somewhat exaggerated, as less than one hundred needed medical attention.

Reliable information received from the survivors is to the effect that Captain Smith, in command of the Titanic, committed suicide on the bridge of his ship by shooting himself through the

head when he saw that his ship was sinking and that it was impossible to save hundreds of his passengers. Passengers state in the history of the world, no greater heroism is known than displayed by Captain Smith in the moment of disaster. The Chief Engineer of the ship, equally as brave as his Captain, refused to live after his ship had met disaster, and sent a bullet crashing through his brain.

Italians aboard the ship made a rush for the life boats and three of them were shot and killed. The men passengers made an absolute sacrifice and would not budge from the decks of the ship until the women were saved. The attempt of the Italians to make their way to safety was checked by a hail of bullets.

According to passengers, the Titanic sank with 2,330 passengers and crew. As there are 772 survivors, this indicates that 1,558 lives were lost in the disaster, which is worse than was at first suspected.

Passengers arriving on the Carpathia tonight made statements of the collision, rescue etc., and condemned inefficient equipment on the Titanic to make off the maximum number of passengers carried.

All the passengers arriving here tonight were loud in their praise of the treatment accorded them aboard the Carpathia after their rescue.

COL. CROMWELL GIBBONS, CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR, GIVES OUT HIS FULL PLATFORM

Genial Militia Officer Will Be In Key West Shortly To Address Voters.

CONDEMNS CONVICT LEASE

Believes In Amendment Of State Primary Law Too Much Money Being Spent

The voters of Florida are called upon to decide many grave questions at the spring primaries. It is my desire that every man shall know exactly where I stand on these issues. I hope to be able to address gatherings in all the principal communities. Those whom I cannot reach personally must be reached through the columns of the local newspapers. Those whom I will meet personally will be in better position to judge for themselves from having read and considered my platform. With this in view, I have prepared a short synopsis of the sixteen cardinal reforms and principles embodied in my platform for publication in every newspaper of the State. I ask the people of Florida to make their governor as the measure of their approval of my stand on these questions.

PLATFORM.

First—Extended and increased powers to the Railroad Commission, which will insure the utmost rights for the shippers and which will guarantee proper and equitable rates.

Second—The convict lease system of Florida is a brutalizing one. I am in favor of its abolishment and the placing of the convicts on the public highways of the state. Florida needs more good roads, and I believe that they can be best secured by working our convicts thereon. Also the state has no right to profit by the misfortune of its citizens. The actual labor to maintain the support of the convict is still the state is entitled. Any profit should be set aside for the benefit of the family of the convict. Because we should punish the criminal is no reason why his family should suffer. On the contrary they should be protected and supported by the labor of the convict, and thus the state will be relieved of the possibility of the family being a public charge.

Third—To re-establish the rule of the people and to meet conditions that confront us today. I am in favor of the initiative, referendum and recall.

The initiative means that the people shall, by petition or otherwise, make their desires known to their law-making bodies. The referendum means that all laws passed by lawmaking bodies shall be referred direct to the people before they become operative. At an election called for that purpose, the people can vote for or against laws passed by their representative and a majority vote for or against a law adopts it or rejects it. The recall means that at any election, special or regular, the people may by ballot determine whether or not a public servant whose term has not expired is still acceptable to them, and a majority vote for or against him determines whether or not that servant shall stay in office or be recalled.

Fourth—In favor additional laws for the control of trusts.

Fifth—There should be stringent laws governing all corporations authorized to do business in Florida, thus protecting purchasers of securities offered by such corporations.

Sixth—Florida has suffered greatly through the operations of irresponsible land companies. I, therefore, favor strict laws, governing land and colonization companies in order to protect alike the investors and settlers and the reliable dealers.

Seventh—The drainage of the lands known as the everglades by the state on a safe, scientific and business basis that will insure drainage and reclamation; and that the same shall be drained and saved for its people and not permitted to go into the hands of speculators. If the state is to be responsible for the drainage and reclamation of the swamp and overflowed lands, purchasers of un reclaimed land should be fully advised at the time, and should not be

sold to prospective settlers until the same have been made permanently inhabitable and tillable.

Eighth—The establishment of an immigration bureau for the purpose of developing impartially all sections of the state. Florida possesses a vast territory of inhabitable and tillable lands distributed throughout the state, and I believe it should establish and determine to have an immigration bureau that will aid and assist all sections for the development and colonization of these properties. We should lend our efforts impartially to all sections and protect every honest investor and settler by providing that he receives what is represented when sold to him.

Ninth—The organization of a state tax equalization board by which taxes of the people shall be uniformly regulated and the state shall receive justly its proper returns from all property holders.

Tenth—Amendment of the primary election laws of the state. We should provide for a more thorough publicity of campaign contributions and expenditures and regulate and limit the amount that legally shall be expended by the candidates for office, state and county, and for what purpose said expenditure shall be authorized.

Eleventh—Legislation that will improve and extend our free public school system, providing every opportunity throughout the state for the education of our children.

Twelfth—Continuation of local option and strict enforcement in every county of the local option laws of the state.

Thirteenth—The increased efficiency of the National Guard and Naval Militia of Florida by state and municipal aid.

Fourteenth—Legislation extending and increasing the powers of municipal and county governments, thus giving the people absolutely home government.

Fifteenth—The conservation of our natural resources under control of the state.

Sixteenth—A conservative and progressive business administration of the state giving complete publicity at all times of its affairs.

These declarations cover the issues which are of most interest and importance to our people at this time. My record as a public servant should be sufficient to insure the justice and wisdom of my stand on any question of importance which shall arise later. I have always and consistently been on the side of the people as a whole as my record will show. I stand for a conservative, business administration of the affairs of the State of Florida. If elected, I shall undertake to perform my part of a great work as thoroughly and patiently as if engaged in the management of a vast business enterprise of my own. Under such an administration Florida should move rapidly forward on all lines of progress and the full measure of prosperity which our diversified resources promise should be realized.
