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REVOLUTION IN CUBA IS BROKEN REBEL CHIEF FLEEING FOR LIFE

General Estenez on Foot With Only Sixty Barefoot, Half Starved Followers is Closely Pursued by Government Troops

MINISTER BEAUPRE GIVES STATEMENT TO PRESS

Telling Real Attitude of the United States Towards Cuba and Cautioning Cubans Not to Put Any Faith in Many Rumors Published by the Press

Havana, June 15.—The news that Yvonet, the general in chief of the negro forces, had passed Ti Abajo with only sixty men who were dismounted and barefooted, reached the Cuban government yesterday in a telegram from General Montegudo. The telegram stated that the forces of Yvonet were completely demoralized.

Other telegraphic advices from the general headquarters of the army indicated that the main body of the negroes which formerly numbered several hundred men, had been split into many bands which were fleeing in every direction before the government troops, escaping from one federal body only to run into another. Reports of many surrenders under the immunity offer of General Montegudo were received yesterday.

Gomez May Not Go. Miguel Mariano Gomez, son of the president, may not take the field after all with the company which he is raising at his father's and friends' expense. The reports that the uprising is about over and the difficulty in obtaining horses is said to be the cause of the possible abandoning of the enterprise.

The United States Minister Beaupre, instructed by Washington, gave the following statement to the Cuban press yesterday:

American Legation, Havana, June 14, 1912. "Under instructions from the government of the United States, the legation gives notice that no credence should be attached to reports as to the policy or action of the United States except only authentic official statements by the department of state or by the legation.

"On March 13, the president of the United States called special attention to the bad effect of unauthorized promulgation of false rumors. The occasion for now reverting to the subject is due to the story being circulated in Havana and elsewhere, to the effect that the president is planning to send a representative to Cuba in connection with questions between the Cuban government and the insurgents.

"Although the policy of the United States has from the very first been made absolutely clear, so indisputable is the circulation of malicious and unfounded rumors that it may be worth while once again to state that only measures of precaution and of ordinary protection of American life and property have been taken, measures irrespective of the special relations of the United States and Cuba and unrelated to the possibility of intervention. These measures do not relieve Cuba of its obligation fully to protect foreign life and property, although they have been recognized as greatly strengthening the hand of the Cuban government. Indeed the spirit of these measures has been well called a 'preventive policy'—a policy of giving Cuba every opportunity to vindicate its national position.

"As was officially stated by the secretary of state on June 10:

"The United States is not contemplating intervention in Cuba but hopes and believes the Cuban government will by prompt and active measures, be able to suppress the insurrection."

SEAMEN THREATEN NATION WIDE STRIKE

It is Predicted That 100,000 Seamen Will Strike if French Jackies Man Ship

Paris, June 15.—A nation wide strike of seamen which will affect over 100,000 sailors is seriously threatened as the result of the decision of M. Deicasse, minister of marine, to man ocean steamers with enlisted men of the French navy as strikebreakers.

The secretary of the National Seamen's Union sent dispatches to the local union officers at all French ports today to have their men ready to strike tomorrow in case an effort was made to man the French Line steamer La France with bluejackets tomorrow.

The steamer La France is still tied up at her dock, in Havre, her mails having been forwarded to New York by German vessels via Cherbourg. An attempt will be made to get La Provence away tomorrow.

DEMOCRATIC HEADQUARTERS OPENED AT BALTIMORE.

Baltimore, Md., June 15.—Chairman Mack came to Baltimore tonight and after officially opening the headquarters of the democratic committee at the Belvedere, made an inspection of the convention hall. The national chairman was accompanied today by national committeeman Roger Sullivan.

"It is the best convention hall I have ever seen," said the chairman, "and I have seen many, both democratic and republican. The credit should go to Robert Craffe, chairman of the committee on arrangements. He has made this possible for the delegates and their friends."

Chairman Mack said tonight that the question of the temporary chairman was still unsettled, saying:

"We have talked about Judge Parker, Senator O'Gorman, Ollie James, Senator Kern, and others for temporary presiding officer, and that is as far as we have got. As for the permanent chairmanship, that is a matter for the committee on permanent organization."

"What about the presidential candidates?" he was asked.

"I can say this: There will be no conference on the presidential candidate until after the Chicago convention," declared Chairman Mack, who added that the principal plank at the Baltimore convention would be the tariff, the high cost of living, and the trusts.

Chairman Mack denied the report that he would resign from the chairmanship of the national committee. Cardinal Gibbons, it was announced tonight, will deliver the invocation at the opening of the convention.

GERMANS' VISIT ENDED.

New York, June 15.—Admiral Von Reuber Paschwitz, with the three fighting ships of the German imperial navy, which have been lying in American waters for ten days, passed out of New York harbor today after a visit which will be memorable on both sides of the Atlantic. The great dreadnought cruiser Moltke, one of the swiftest warships in the world, with the smaller cruiser Stettin, after leaving the escort of United States battleships which accompanied them out to sea, steamed direct for Germany, while the cruiser Bremen, which is stationed in American waters, left for the south.

The commander of the German squadron and his officers had but one word of description for the strenuous days of entertainment through which they have passed in New York—"overwhelming."

Both American and German participants agree that the visit has tended to strengthen the feeling of good will between the two nations.

The scene as the squadron passed out to sea was impressive. In a single column, the Louisiana leading, the combined fleet steamed down the bay and into the open ocean at Sandy Hook. There the American ships halted and allowed the Germans to pass.

Washington, June 15.—Charging that President Taft had misused the \$25,000 traveling expense fund voted yearly by congress, Chairman Fitzgerald of the house appropriations committee, today bitterly attacked the president during consideration of the sundry civil appropriation bill.

He declared the president on his recent western trip had mulcted the newspaper and secret service men in spite of protests, to bolster up his depleted funds.

"It is deplorable," he said, "to have to state these facts to the house and the country."

Mr. Fitzgerald declared, however, that he would vote for the item, which eventually was adopted, 78 to 55. He said facetiously that he believed it would "pay the democratic party and the country if the president traveled the year round." He then referred directly to the president's western trip.

"The pro-rata cost of each person was figured out and every newspaper man was requested to pay \$1,500 to pay for his expenses. Out of the fund for the suppression of counterfeiting and the protection of the president of the United States \$4,500 was taken to defray the expenses upon the train of three employees of the secret service, against the protest of the acting chief of the secret service."

Former Speaker Cannon, Representative Gillette, of Massachusetts, and Representative Shirley, of Kentucky, democrat, argued that it was necessary that the president see the country and the country see the president. Representative Page, of North Carolina, democrat, who offered the amendment striking out the appropriation, declared the money was being voted in order to enable "gatherings at county fairs to elect exhibit 'A' as their president of the United States."

NAVAL MILITIA WILL MAKE ANOTHER START.

The Naval Militia will make another start for Miami at daylight on Monday morning with their boat the Mackenzie. All damages to the boat that were sustained by the accident on their previous start have been repaired by members of the engineers division, and a trial run, of several hours duration, was given the boat yesterday afternoon. Everything was found to be in perfect working order, as the little boat was put through her several paces. A great deal of credit is due the militia as all repairs were made by members of the organization, who have shown considerable skill and ability.

THREE BIG SHIPS HELD BY ONE COOK

Steamers Brazos, Comanche and Comal, Were All Late in Getting Away.

OILER STARTS SCRAP

He Hit the Man Who Prepared the Food and Two Labor Unions Were Then Involved Which Delayed Sailings Several Hours.

New York.—A cook of the steamer Brazos made an effort to defend himself the other afternoon against the charges of an oiler of the Firemen's union that he did not know how to cook. The last argument of men of the sea, coastwise or otherwise, is a scrap, and the oiler and the fireman had it. The cook got the worst of it and the skipper of the Brazos decided to leave the fireman behind.

The fireman appealed to his union, and all hands on three ships under the same management, the Brazos, the Comanche and the Comal, decided to back up the aggressive fireman. They said the cooks had not been treating any of them properly anyhow.

The Comanche was the only ship that got out of dock at the foot of Spring street with all her force of eighteen firemen. They refused, however, to work until they received assurances that the oiler would be taken back. She sailed promptly at 1 p. m. and got as far as Liberty Island. The skipper told of his plight by wireless and H. H. Raymond, head of the line, got busy trying to straighten out the trouble. The Atlantic Coast Seamen's union, which has general control of the subsidiary unions of coastwise seafarers, also got in the game, having a contract with the lines to furnish firemen who would stick.

The firemen of the Brazos and the Comal deserted their ships at the pier and stood by awaiting the result of negotiations between the representatives of the unions and Mr. Raymond.

who had volunteered to arbitrate the trouble. A tug with Marine Superintendent Rockwell went down to the Comanche, whose firemen had an independent grievance against a cook on their ship, and there was an earnest talk between the union representatives, Mr. Rockwell, the skipper of the ship, and the aggrieved fireman. Mr. Raymond wanted to get the three boats away, with their passengers and freight, and finally did after they had been held up more than four hours.

The oiler was taken back pending investigation of the case against the cook. The cook's union will make an effort to adjust its troubles with the firemen's union meanwhile.

Count as Master of Kennels.
Pueblo, Colo.—Pueblo is probably the only city in the country which can boast of a member of the nobility for a dog handler. Count Von Bulow of Germany, well known in many sections of the United States and particularly in this city, who returned here a short time ago strictly "on his uppers," has just been tendered the position of master of the kennels in Pueblo.

During the last four or five years Von Bulow, claiming to be a real count, has been identified with some remarkable performances of various descriptions.

His most noteworthy accomplishment occurred three years ago when, it is alleged, he persuaded a Pueblo woman, Mrs. Christina Plummer, who had \$300,000 in the bank, to marry him. Von Bulow, it is said, spent the money, his wife deserted him, then died, and he is back in Pueblo after an absence of two years.

Ends Own Life at 80 Years.
Chicago.—Charles Stein, for 30 years a manufacturer in Milwaukee, and a brother of former Superior Judge Philip Stein, shot and killed himself the other day at the Hyde Park Rest Cure, where he had gone for medical treatment. He was eighty years old. Suicide is attributed to ill health.

BROADWAY'S LURE LEADS TO GRIEF

Atlanta Waiter's Desire to See the Great White Way Results in Trouble.

Mount Vernon, N. Y.—A sudden desire to see the great white way and to live for a short time like a millionaire, led George Kaul, who was arrested here late the other night by Police Lieutenant Silverstein, it is alleged, to loot the trunks, containing \$29,500 worth of jewelry, belonging to Sol Gilsey in Atlanta, on April 17. Such was the confession made by Kaul to Lieutenant Silverstein. Kaul, who was a waiter in the Piedmont hotel, Atlanta, Ga., where Gilsey lived when in that

city, had visions of affluence and chorus ladies when he learned what Mr. Gilsey had in his trunks.

After several hours of cross-examination by Silverstein, Kaul broke down and confessed that he, with George Wren and George Roddy, all employed in the Piedmont hotel, had plotted the robbery and had divided the jewels.

"I have worked hard at my life," Kaul, "and I welcomed the chance to come to New York and see Broadway and have some fun with the chorus girls. I wanted to live like a millionaire, if it was only for a week. I know Mr. Gilsey had a lot of jewelry and the temptation was too much for me. That's all."

Kaul was traced to New York, where he was lost. Silverstein located him at the home of his cousin, Arthur Von Gastel, at 161 Eleventh avenue, Mount Vernon. He was remanded without bail.

WIRELESS ROUTS A LEOPARD

Operator on Steamer Saves His Life by Frantically Pounding on the Key.

New York.—Another use for wireless has been discovered by James Pickrell, operator on board the steamship Vasari the other day.

Among the cargo of the Vasari was a leopard. About 400 miles southeast of Sandy Hook, the Vasari ran into a terrific gale, and during it the leopard escaped from its cage.

Mr. Pickrell was at his key on the upper deck with the door ajar, when he glanced out and saw a pair of gleaming eyes. Without asking leave the leopard came into the room.

"I did not know what to do," said Pickrell. "I had no weapon of any

kind. The beast stood there and looked me over, and I could see he was getting ready to have some fun with me. Accidentally my hand fell on the key and there was a flash. Pickrell sounded the alarm, and, after an hour's chase all over the vessel, the leopard was cornered and taken back to its cage, but not until some of the crew had been scratched.

Victim of Outrage Had Been Ill and Was Lying in Bed While Husband Was Absent—Intruders Searched the Premises.

Chicago.—Bound hand and foot, gagged and left to meet her death on a blazing bed by robbers who had entered her home, Mrs. W. H. Starr of 5901 Prairie avenue saved her life by her presence of mind.

As the flames, which had been started by the burglars, mounted higher she rolled over upon the burning bedding. The pressure of her body quenched the flames, but not until her hands had been severely burned and her nightgown ignited. She was found, hysterical from fright and suffering, by her husband, Dr. W. H. Starr, upon his return from a call upon a patient half an hour after her harrowing experience.

Police of the Fifth street police station started a search for two men who were described to them by Mrs. Starr. One of the men resembled a man who had been employed by a manufacturer of window screens to measure the window in the Starr flat. He was short and stocky, while the other robber was 6 feet tall.

Mrs. Starr had been ill and was lying in bed while her husband was absent. At 7:30 o'clock the burglars entered the flat. First came the tall man, who got in through a window, seized Mrs. Starr, bound her and gagged her, and then admitted the shorter robber.

After the second man had entered the two removed the gag and de-

manded that Mrs. Starr tell them where she kept her money. They accomplished the demand with threats of torturing her, but in vain. She insisted that she did not have any money of her own and that she did not know where her husband's was kept.

The intruders then made a search on their own account, replacing the gag and leaving her helpless on the bed. They succeeded in finding a pocketbook which contained between \$5 and \$6 and jewelry valued at \$160. Then the men returned to the room in which Mrs. Starr was lying and renewed their threats, but without success in intimidating her. They finally abandoned their effort and left, one of them setting fire to the bed upon which Mrs. Starr lay as he went out.

Mrs. Starr's successful struggle to quench the flames and the return of her husband followed.

Wants to Dress as Woman.

Atlanta, Ga.—From a prominent South Georgian, who lives in Ware county, Controller General William A. Wright has just received a letter expressing a desire to wear woman's attire, and asking permission to do so.

"I have very much the appearance of a woman, and when dressed as such and wearing long hair I look a perfect figure of a female and would not be noticed as being a man. I wish to adopt this attire because it is more suitable for me than male attire."

"It's the queerest letter I ever received," said General Wright. He withholds the name out of deference to the man's family.

Tiny Fish Tie Up Steel Mills.

Gary, Ind.—Thousands of tiny fish driven by the heavy sea on Lake Michigan choked the intake pipes supplying the steel mills with water the other day and forced the shut-down of three blast furnaces until the water pipes could be cleared. When the mains were opened they were packed like sardines in a box with a wriggling mass of fresh water herring. Men with shovels were required to remove the fish before the blast furnace could be started again.

MINE RATS SWARM OUT AFTER FOOD

Suspension of Work in the Anthracite Region Leaves Them Without Kind Friends

Wilkesbarre, Pa.—The suspension of mining in the anthracite region the past several weeks has brought about a plague of rats in most of the mining towns. Rats are to be seen everywhere. They have overrun the cellars and outbuildings in the towns of Warrior Run and Sugar Notch. When the mines are working the rats, which are of great size, make their home in the underground workings. The miners make pets of them and feed them from their palls.

The average miner is superstitious enough to believe that if the rats re-

main in the workings there is no danger of an accident. Instinct seems to tell the rat when a fall of roof is threatened, and he takes his departure. When the collieries were shut down and the miners no longer brought their dinner pails into the workings, the rodents were left without food. Hunger compelled them to make their way to the surface. Reaching the top of the earth, they made their way into cellars and outhouses. Their coming was unexpected, and they devoured everything in the larders the first night. Then they invaded chicken coops, and did not hesitate to attack the biggest chickens in the flock. In a hennery at Warrior Run the rats killed a 12-pound rooster

IN A SWIFT AUTO PLUNDERS AT WILL

Man in "Grey Ghost" Is Terror of Southern California Foothill Cities.

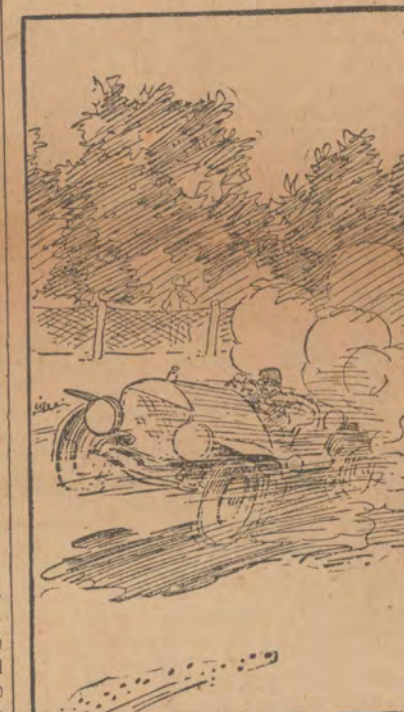
"BURNS UP ROADS"

Mysterious Pirate Sweeps About Night After Night Robbing as His Fancy Dictates—Valuables or Trifles Appeal to Him Alike.

Los Angeles, Cal.—"Grey Ghost," a low-slung racing car, with its goggled, supposed owner at the wheel, and with the exhaust roaring and thundering a protest from its powerful engines, has been sweeping through Glendora and surrounding towns upon a piratical mission that has spread terror in its wake.

Along foothill boulevards, the stretch of well-paved road that leads from Los Angeles through Glendora, the pirate car and its owner have sped night after night upon marauding expeditions. It is only when the car is out on the boulevards, where other cars are wending their way to and from the little cities near the foothills, that the "Grey Ghost" is let loose with all its speed. Then it flashes by other automobiles, giving the occupants a moving-picture view of a swift-speeding car with a driver huddled behind the wheel, a mere blur of a human being, whizzing on.

Seven times the "auto pirate" and his gray streak of a car have been seen by orange growers who live along the boulevard. That he is the one who is committing the various depredations which have aroused residents along the mountain road has been made certain by traces that he has left after bold crimes. The men who have seen the driver of the "Grey Ghost" say he handles his car with all the skill of a professional racing driver, and that he evidently knows

every turn of the roads in the surrounding country.

Evidence that the "Grey Ghost's" owner does not care what he takes and is as willing to commit a petty theft as a daring burglary of consequence, is shown by the fact that on one occasion he went so far as to steal a drilling machine belonging to a ranchman, who owns a place at Grand avenue and Foothill boulevard. The tracks of the automobile tires showed plainly where the "auto pirate" had hitched the machine to the back of his car, and then sped away.

One of the strange features in connection with the case is the fact that the "auto pirate" seems to know every crook and turn in the roads leading in and about Glendora, Covina, Duarte, Monrovia, Claremont and other towns. When shooting his car along over the smooth highways he never seems to hesitate at a turn or slow down for a railroad crossing or bridge.

Tramp Runs Mansion.

Leavenworth, Kan.—When the Cheever house on Miami street was opened the other day it was found a tramp had taken possession. The house is richly furnished, and during the absence of the owner, Mrs. B. H. Cheever, had been without a tenant except the tramp.

He had slept on the spotless linen in the massive brass beds, washed his hands in marble basins, waltzed with his brogans on the Oriental rugs, eaten from silver plate and drunk from cut glass goblets. Cans of imported dainties were robbed of their contents and cobwebbed bottles were taken from their musty hiding places in the cellar bins.

Six Fractures in Ten Years.

Marshalltown, Ia.—To fall six times in ten years and suffer that number of fractures is the peculiar record of accidents established by Mrs. Sarah A. Wheldon, eighty-one years old, of this city. Recently she fell and received a compound fracture of both bones of the right arm.

Owing to her age her condition is critical.

POLE AND LINEMAN CRASH TO EARTH

Former Snaps With Man at Work Upon It—Latter Is Badly Hurt.

Boston.—Working at the top of a 30-foot pole on East street, Melrose, James A. Doherty of 222 Kilton street, Dorchester, was badly hurt the other day when the pole snapped off close to the ground, threw him across a high voltage trolley wire and then crashed with him to the street.

At the Melrose hospital it was found that he was in a critical condition. He has concussion of the brain, a broken leg and hip and bad burns from the trolley wire.

Doherty is a lineman. Wires at the top of the pole needed repairing and he had climbed up, digging his steel

spurs into the wood, until he was just below the wires. He looped around the pole the swing which linemen use to hold themselves in place. The ends caught in his belt, he leaned back against the strap, pulled out a pair of pincers and set to work.

The pole swayed in the wind, but there was no warning that it would break until Doherty heard a splintering sound below. Then the pole lurched over against his body and he realized that he was falling.

Down to the street Doherty crashed, the pole and its tangle of wires falling upon him. He struck on his right side. His head hit the ground also and he was made unconscious. Quick work was made of getting him from the wires and the splintered pole. Those who saw the accident wondered how he could have escaped instant death.

TRIES TO KILL PHYSICIAN

Drunk and Half-Crazed Muncie (Ind.) Man Challenges Doctor, Then Attempts Murder.

Muncie, Ind.—Rendered temporarily insane by grief and laboring under the belief that his wife's recent death was due to the failure of the physician to do all he could for her, Lowell Reed, 42 years old, a machinist, the other night, while hundreds of people were passing along the principal business street, shot three times with a revolver at Dr. Hamilton T. Franks, a

TEDDY OR TAFT—WHICH?

Interest now centers in Chicago. The eyes of the entire country are turned to the Windy City, watching the developments from day to day, in the struggle between William Howard Taft, president of the United States and Ex-President Theodore Roosevelt, the said struggle being for the republican nomination for president. The country seems pretty evenly divided on the question as to which of the two men should receive the nomination; but when the convention has adjourned and the national campaign has begun, we believe that jolly old William Howard Taft will be the republican standard bearer.

The fabric of soft and washable sort is to be preferred for all three garments to a stiff material, wash silks, unstiffened batiste and pongee supplying about the best materials. For the traveling waist the pongee in natural color, a rich tan or pale gold, would be useful and effective. The dressy waist could be of the batiste or of a fine lawn with a dainty lace and hand run tucks, and there could be a negligee blouse in the wash silk for tired moments and very informal occasions. The last, in fact, could do duty as a wrapper, that is, serve instead of one, for it cannot be expected that there will be room in the suit case for all the comforts of the toilet.

The comfortable little bodice shown in the illustration is one of the newest models offered for hot weather wear, and a very young woman might wear it while traveling with perfect propriety, as a good throat and arms are its chief requirements. There are some lovely wash silks striped with the new dress colors, and while rather of the negligee species such little bodices, made up in this manner, would be very effective with a wool suit on a hot day. If the silk is of a very stylish sort, too, it would be a good idea to hem a bias of it for a hat scarf, and a proper hat for this would be one of

HOME MADE BUTTONS

SOME LITTLE TIPS THAT WILL BE FOUND HELPFUL.

The Story of the Button Has No End When the Quick Eye Can Grasp the Little Touches on the Expensive Gown.

This season is surely a button season, and if you care not to give your order for molds to be covered, you can make your own quite easily.

Do not make the mistake of cutting the circular piece to cover the wooden form too large. This makes a needless bulk on the under side of the button and prevent a flat, well-adjusted mold in trimming.

Cut the pieces from a pasteboard pattern all at one snip of the scissors. Then begin with a wooden form. After gathering the circular piece, slip it over the button, draw up the thread and sew across with a few stitches. If possible, attach immediately to the dress with the same thread.

Satin buttons, velvet, linen, lace over silk and embroidered buttons are as stylish as fashion.

Have you priced hand-embroidered buttons? Well, sit right down, sister, and make your own. After covering with silk, take coarse silk and cross in either two or three diagonals. Knot at the center, and then from this point weave over and under the radiating lines until a spider-web effect is obtained. The stitch is quite like that which we used in our renaissance lace work years ago.

Gold and colored net over silk gives a very good imitation of embroidery. Lace with a flower pattern can be applied with the blossom in the center of the button. A touch of colored thread over white applique lace adds wonderfully.

Cretonne-covered buttons are good; Irish lace roses sewed on linen-covered buttons can be easily made. Indeed, the story of the button has no end when a quick eye can grasp the little touches that are apparent on expensive gowns, and the clever hand can apply the hints in one's own sewing room.

WALKING COSTUME IN BROWN

This Pretty Model Is of Venetian Cloth, With Black Satin Used for the Trimming.

This is of nut brown Venetian cloth with trimmings of black satin. The skirt is cut narrow at the foot, where it is trimmed at each side by two straps of satin headed by buttons.

The coat is semi-fitting and also has straps at the sides and to form fasten-



ing below the satin collar; the wrists are trimmed to match.

Materials required: 4½ yards 46 inches wide, ½ yard satin 20 inches wide, 4 yards silk or satin for lining coat, 1½ dozen buttons.

STILL ONE-SIDED EFFECTS

The Season's Styles Show Trimming on One Side Only, Both in Dresses and Bodices.

The artistic, unbalanced decoration of a gown was given full recognition last year and is enjoying an emphatic favor for the spring and summer. When a view of the styles is taken, the one-sided trimming is very noticeable.

Bodices are draped on one side and plain on the other. They show materials that are distinctly different on the two sides of the blouse, and buttons, braid, lace frills, embroidered revers and platings are used on one side to balance trimming of an entirely different nature on the other.

In the sashes and girdles the one-sided effects receive decided favor. In the front and back these sashes, that are used on the majority of models, are knotted, tied or folded at one side.

Skirts are draped upon one side under a strip; rows of buttons, with simulated buttonholes, are found on a skirt. The one-sided, slashed effect on the bottom of the skirt is one of the features that many tailored suits are observing.

The idea is to depart from the symmetrical balanced trimming. A glimpse at accepted styles will prove the beauty of the one-sided decorations.

HINTS FOR NEEDLEWOMAN

Little Suggestions That Will Prove Helpful to Woman Who Does Her Own Sewing.

When your thread persists in knotting, unthread your needle and thread it from the other end. It will cease to trouble you.

In selecting draperies for windows do not neglect to look at the fascinating cotton goods in the dress departments. The mercerized fabrics as well as the volles lend themselves admirably to this purpose.

To save the top of a stocking from being torn out by the supporters' fastening, attach a small brass ring to a piece of tape and sew the tape to the stockings. Clasp the supporters through the rings, using rings that will allow them to slip through.

Make generous seams under and over the arms, and generous hems on the closing at the back. Make the buttonholes in a fly, and thus the goods is not damaged, and the waist can be widened as well as lengthened if necessary. Have plenty of tucks in the little skirts, and turn in the ends of the belt, stitching with a fine needle and a fine thread.

RED KID BOOTS IN VOGUE

Fiery Colored Footwear Will Be Worn With White Suits, According to Dictates of Fashion.

A new fashion note, apropos of the popularity of white goods this spring and summer, was noted in the factory of a maker of women's high-grade shoes, where we saw a large number of red kid button boots being prepared for shipment.

Upon inquiry we learned that these red kid boots were intended for wear with white suits and gowns at fashionable country and seashore resorts as a change from white footwear, it being evident to milady of fashion that she must have footwear that will take her out of the ordinary humdrum of fashion.

Her white suit or gown will have a touch of red trimming to complete the combination of a white dress and red boots.—Shoe Retailer.

Folding Motor Bonnets.

Among purely English importations there are the most adorable little bonnet that can be folded up and laid out flat in a suit case, taking up no room at all. They are designed specially for the automobile, though they might well have daped on Gretna Green. They are made of the finest weave soft straw. One is old blue, edged with old green and has a strip of flowered embroidery stretched across the front and little bunchy bow things over each ear.

SOME PRETTY SHADES

MATERIALS IN VARIETY TO SUIT ANY TASTE.

Soft Glow of Candle Under Bright Shade Adds Wonderful Atmosphere of Home Feeling to Any Room—Easily Made.

If one is not the happy possessor of bedrooms in the form of candlesticks, it is a consolation to know that most beautiful candleholders may be purchased at prices to suit all purses. Simple, inexpensive ones may be had in china, wood, glass, and metal, and even the old brass ones may be found at the antique shops.

As to the shades, which is the chief theme of this article, these may be of

such a variety of materials that any taste may be suited. There are the paper shades, one color cut out in fanciful design and pasted over another plain form, the shades of crepe paper, dainty wall paper, cretonne in panels, the perforated brass shades, the bead-trimmed shades of silk, and the stenciled and embroidered shades such as are shown here. All of these are proper and fitting if tastefully made and used in the right surroundings.

The designs here given are made of linen, lawn, or silk, and ornamented with hand embroidery. All of these measure about four inches from top to bottom, and as they consist of more than half of a circle, they flare gracefully, as seen in the illustrations. After the embroidery is finished, the shade is sewn up in a small neat seam, which is carefully pressed, and then it is ready for the frame, which consists of a spring clamp clasping the candle, and from which rises an adjustable standard supporting a circle.

lar flanged crown upon which the shade rests. A foundation of medium weight paper should be made on the exact lines of the shade and adjusted to the frame before the embroidered shade is put on.

The first shade is a neat little empire design with a script initial. The edges are buttonholed in scallops, and the embroidery is all in white in eyelet and French work. Instead of all white, the design may be in any one delicate shade if preferred, and in doing the embroidery it is well to remember not to carry threads from one figure to another on the wrong side, as all such imperfections will show when the candle is lighted.

The second shade is more elaborate in design, and is entirely in eyelet work except for the buttonholed edges. The embroidery should be done in the same color as the linen, whether white or colored, and the fine stranded cotton is especially suitable for this work.

The stranded cotton is also good for the Wallachian shade, No. 3, and it is

well to work with two strands in the needle instead of one. This design may be carried out in any shades liked.

The soft glow of the candle under a pretty, bright shade, adds a wonderful atmosphere of home feeling and content to any room, and if one does not care to spend much time in making the shades, very dainty ones may be quickly evolved from crepe paper.

A Baby Accessory.

Infant washstand sets recently imported from Germany and arranged upon small-sized stands of white enameled iron similar to those used in hospital wards, are of glazed surfaced cream-tinted pottery fetchingly decorated with Dutch babies in various attitudes. The six in these sets include a novel wash basin of oblong shape and very unusual depth and this is divided into two equal-sized compartments, one for the cold and the other for the tepid water. Attached by a nickel chain to one arm of the stand is a small thermometer, with which to test the heat of the warm water.

Care of Nails.

The nails should always show that they are well cared for. Carefully manicured nails are indicative of neatness; they should be manicured at least once a week and polished and the cuticle loosened frequently. The equipment costs little and the money is certainly well expended.

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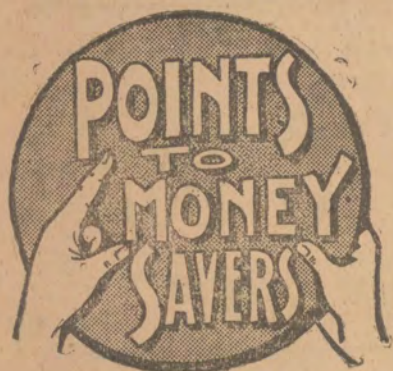

NEW ENGLAND BOILED DINNER

Fine Recipe for Preparation of This Wholesome and Appetizing Dish.

Rinse meat in cold water, tie or skewer into shape, cover with cold water and heat slowly to boiling point; remove scum and simmer until tender, about four hours for a piece weighing five pounds, the time depending upon the cut of the meat. Remove from water, keep hot and cook potatoes and turnips in the liquid. These should be pared and the potatoes left whole. The turnips should be sliced crosswise. Cook the carrots, cabbage, beets, etc., apart in some of the corn beef water, allowing one hour for the boiling of the pared carrots, one hour for the washed cabbage and one hour for new beets, four hours for old.

Serve on a very large platter, the meat in the center, the vegetables grouped about it. Garnish sparingly with parsley.

But the possibilities do not end here—there are remaining, besides many other dishes adapted to these cuts—made from the heart, liver and kidneys of the beef creature. When using kidneys always soak over night to remove the strong flavor.—National Food Magazine.

HOW TO HAVE AIRY KITCHEN

Problem Is a Simple One and This Solution Will Appeal to Housekeeper.

We have solved the problem of how to have an airy kitchen in summer in this way. Remove both sashes and tack wire netting from top to bottom outside of window space so the blinds

may be closed over it or windows put in in case of stormy weather. (Wire netting may be found in various widths at a good hardware store). The circulation of air thus afforded through the top of the room gives great relief to the head of one obliged to spend much time near the cook stove. Remove shades entirely or roll to the top of windows. If the sink or work-table be placed where the morning or evening sun shines in the eyes of the worker, blinds or curtain should be adjusted for the time to keep out the sun. Then at night by leaving the outside doors open and hooking screens the kitchen will be cool by morning.—Harper's Bazar.

SOME TIPS ON CAKE MAKING

Valuable Suggestions That Will Help Housewife Along Road to Success.

Have the tins greased, the oven hot and everything ready before beginning to mix the cake, as delay in getting it baking when it is once mixed is dangerous. Many cooks prefer lard to butter for greasing the tins, as the butter is apt to blacken the cake.

Beating eggs and butter makes them light, but beating flour makes it tough. This is why flour should always be added to a cake last, and as lightly as possible. In adding the whipped whites of eggs, as in macarons, fold them in lightly so as not to break the air cells.

When a cake cracks open as it rises it is a sign that too much flour has been used. If it rises in a cone in the center, the oven is too hot. In filling cake-tins you should let the mixture be a trifle higher on the sides than in the middle.

HOW TO COOK BACON

NEED NOT ALWAYS BE SERVED IN SAME OLD WAY.

Should Be Thoroughly Chilled Before Frying to Get Best Results—Various Nice Ways of Serving as Breakfast Dish.

There is a proper and an improper way to cook bacon. One unfortunately sees too much of the latter. Baked on a rack or a broiler, it is considered more wholesome than when it is fried, but most of the trouble with fried bacon lies not in the fact that it is fried, but rather in the way it is fried. It is too often sent to the table either half cooked and floating in grease, or else it is dried-up and half burned.

To fry bacon ideally, it should, after it has been cut into thin slices, be placed on ice to become thoroughly chilled. The pan must be very hot, so that the bacon curls into little rolls as soon as the pan is shaken. Fry it thoroughly, but not long enough to harden it.

Bacon baked as follows is free from grease: Cut it into thin slices and place them on a rack such as is used for roasting meat or upon a gridiron placed over a dripping pan. Have the oven very hot and let the slices remain in it until they are crisp and brown.

The following is a unique way of broiling bacon: Cut it into thin slices as usual, place cracked ice over them, and let them stand in this way until they are chilled. After broiling the

on the ice. In a moment or two put back on the fire, and broil them on the other side until done. The sudden change of temperature is believed to improve bacon.

There are many nice ways of serving bacon as a breakfast dish. Tomatoes fried with bacon are a favorite dish in many English households. Cut the tomatoes in slices, season with salt and pepper, and, if preferred, dip in egg and bread crumbs before frying.

A catsup gravy is very nice when fried in bacon. Pour off the superfluous grease after frying, add a little catsup mixed with water and thicken with flour, if necessary. About a quarter of a cupful of water is added to half a cupful of catsup.

Fried bacon with cream gravy makes a nice breakfast dish in spring, with corn bread. After cooking the bacon free it from superfluous grease. Add a little flour and milk to the drippings that remain, cook the sauce on top of the stove and pour it over the bacon.

Another way to prepare this dish is to soak the bacon in cold milk for 20 minutes before cooking, afterward dipping the slices in flour and frying in a very hot greased frying pan. The soaking in milk gives a fine flavor to the bacon and the flour, and the flour insures a crisp crust. Shake the pan well while cooking, and after browning thoroughly on both sides remove the bacon. Pour off superfluous grease and place the slices on rough brown paper to absorb any fat that may adhere to the outside. Stir into the frying pan one or two tablespoonfuls of flour, gradually adding the milk the

bacon was soaked in, and season with salt and pepper. When the sauce is thick pour it over the bacon and serve at once.

Put in a buttered pudding dish boiled macaroni in layers with minced ham. Season the ham with a little mustard or finely chopped onion. Beat one egg and mix with one cup of milk, pour over all and bake in a quick oven for 10 minutes.

Boil separately until tender a unit dozen French carrots, a turnip and an onion. Mash thoroughly and mix with a cupful cooked lentils drained perfectly dry. Season with minced parsley, salt and pepper, and a beaten egg and bread crumbs to bind together. Form into croquettes, cutlet shaped, dip into beaten egg, roll in fine crumbs and fry in deep fat. Garnish with parsley and serve hot. A little curry powder may be added to the seasoning if desired.

Closing the House.
Before closing the house for the summer see that the brasswork has been thoroughly polished.

Wrap it with newspapers. It can then be uncovered upon your return, and need but little or no rubbing to brighten it up again.

Coat all the plumbing pipes with a good nickel polish, letting it remain during your absence. The pipes will not rust and will be bright and clean when the polish is removed.

A Spotted Parasol.
A light colored sunshade which had been spotted with rain and sea water revived under this treatment: The parasol was wet equally and thoroughly, allowed to dry open, and it came out equally pretty in tint, if not prettier than before. A summer silk can sometimes be restored to usefulness in the same way.

When Making Quilts.

It is an impossibility to successfully wash quilts without having the cotton filling become matted and lumpy.

If the cotton batting is covered with cheesecloth and tied before the final covering is knotted over the cotton, the latter may be removed at any time and washed.

Afterward it may be replaced and knotted, making the quilt perfectly new again.

Asparagus in Carrot Rings.

Boil the asparagus tender in salted water, drain it and put three or four pieces in a ring that you have cut out of cooked carrot. Lay it on a dish. Sprinkle it over with a few green peas and lastly with some French dressing.
