KILL ENEMIES OF CABBAGE

How New York Carpenter Accidentally Stumbled Onto Means of Getting Rid of Worms.

(By LESLIE F. PAULL, Colorado Agricultural College.)

Cabbages are subject to the attacks of several insects, but especially of the green cabbage worm and the cabbage aphid, for which various spraying mixtures are found to be highly efficacious. However, for the man who likes to make his sauerkraut himself, or to grow a few cabbages for his table there is a simple remedy for these insects which involves very little trouble and for which the remedy is always at hand, and here is the story of its discovery:

A carpenter living in a town in New York was very proud of his little back-lot garden. In it he set several rows of fine cabbages one year. These grew well for a time until he was summoned away from home for a few days. Upon his return he went out to the garden and there beheld a sorry sight. The cabbages which had been his especial pride were honeycombed and contained hundreds of these voracious cabbage worms. His anger was frightful to witness, and his language unfit for publication. He dashed into the house to tell his wife what had happened during his absence, and brand two steaming kettles upon the stove. Grabbing one in each hand he returned to the garden and poured boiling water over every cabbage. Thus his rage was satisfied and the worms punished. The cabbages were a sorry sight, appearing to be pretty thoroughly cooked. But to his great surprise, in the course of a week they began to head up and he had the best cabbages he had ever had.

Briefly, the secret is to pour about a cupful of boiling water into the cabbage just after the inner leaves have begun to curve toward to form the head. The leaves thus cooked dry into a hard exterior, shutting out the worms from the inside and continue to grow from the internal but into a firm solid head.

THE MODERN KITCHEN

MANY INVENTIONS AND LABOR-SAVING DEVICES IN USE.

Large Kitchen is Not by Any Means the Most Ideal—Poor Economy to Stint in the Matter of Furniture.

In some respects our ideas of home making are not very different from those cherished by our ancestors. We build houses today after those designed a century ago and consider ourselves lucky indeed, if we possess furniture that has been handed down from generation to generation.

The kitchen is a notable exception. Housekeepers of a hundred years ago would surely marvel to see the modern kitchen with its many inventions and labor-saving devices.

When planning for an up-to-date kitchen it is well to consider it first from an architectural point of view although the majority of home-makers will have little to say in this matter.

The ideal location for a kitchen, in the country, is on the north, with windows on the east and west. This allows the sun's rays to enter in during part of the day without giving undue heat in summer. The sun is the greatest purifier and destroyer of germs, and its entrance into the kitchen for even a short time, will do much toward improving the sanitary conditions.

For the sake of ventilation windows should be placed on at least two sides so that a cross draft can blow away all odors.

There should be as little wood work as possible in the kitchen, since wood is a harboring place for insects and germs. Where it must be used, it should be of hard wood or pine painted and varnished, the varnish destroying those qualities in paint that are detrimental to health.

The size of a kitchen should be carefully considered. A large kitchen is not by any means the most ideal.

Oilcloth is to be recommended as a kitchen floor covering. The heavy laid linoleum is more durable, but, of course, costs more.

The furniture required for the kitchen will depend largely on the architectural "make-up." It will be poor economy to stint ones self in the matter of kitchen furniture. It is a shortsighted policy not to buy good makes of stoves, refrigerators and the like.

The kitchen table should be a staid piece of furniture on castors, placed in a good light and as far from the stove as possible. There is a variety of kitchen tables on the market, many of them with handy little drawers and various devices for minimizing labor.

There should be at least one comfortable chair in the kitchen, something low without arms that will be found useful and comfortable for shell-ping peas, etc. A stool will also prove a great help to those housewives who are weary with much standing. Washing dishes is a lighter task when seated on a high stool and the back is spared many an ache. A twenty-four inch stool can be purchased for less than a dollar and will be found an excellent investment.

It sometimes happens that a house is built with little regard for pantry room. Where this is the case the kitchen cabinet should come to the rescue. These cleverly designed pieces of furniture not only relieve the congestion, but add to the attractiveness of the kitchen in no small measure.

MAKEUP OF THE COIFFURE MATCH THE HAIR AND EYES

Original Effects Sought After by the Smartest Women Who Set the Fashions of Paris.

Appropriate Touch of Color in the Toilette Adds Immensely to the Appearance.

This year there is little absolute novelty in the matter of hair arrangement to chronicle, yet the changes, though subtle, are none the less potent—a frequent experience as is demonstrated when one puts on an old hat, carefully cherished, even when no distinct change in fashion has taken place.

The most important aspect of the coiffure nowadays is the silhouette it produces, a fact in union with the whole spirit of dress. And this is the first point to be carefully noted, and attained. A low, full effect is the one most generally sought after, and attained quite easily by the use of many clever frames and accessories provided. A decidedly Eastern effect is one of the most desirable features in the new dressings which should not be overlooked by the woman who would be in the van of fashion. In the evening this has its opportunity, and Paris already speaks authoritatively of "Le Grand Mogul."

Then in the arrangement of the long hair a decided vogue may be prophesied for wide, soft plaits and twists, frequently made of well-waved hair, which breaks the formality and throws other lines into those emphasized by the treatment of plaiting or twisting. A chic arrangement takes the form virtually of a chip—non—want of a better word—covered with a very wide, soft plait of waved hair, the effect being of broken lines intertwined, which give different shades and pretty lights, while it is not till close examination that the plait itself is distinguished.

Use of Sand Paper. Keep a piece of sand paper in the machine drawer for rough or blunted needles; a file, too, will quickly smooth a dull machine needle, and scissors may be sharpened on a large needle or the stem of a glass (or piece of glass) by opening and shutting quickly, as if you were trying to cut the glass.

To be becomingly dressed is the desire of every woman worthy of the name, and here I would say one is greatly helped towards this end if in one's toilette a touch of color to match the hair and eyes is introduced. A accentuates one's "points." For example, an ideal dance frock for a lark-haired girl would be a pale-green shot with mauve crepe de soie. This emphasizes the black hair and brown eyes of the wearer.

To the woman with brown hair which has golden lights one recommends the new color, which is of greenish gold. And as hair of this color is frequently accompanied by gray eyes, which almost invariably have a yellowish halo around the iris, this is the color for her.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

Old Dutch Dish of Cabbage.

For one head of cabbage cut very fine allow one large spoonful of pork drippings, one cupful rich sweet cream, one-half cupful vinegar, a scant teaspoonful of sugar and salt and pepper to season. Put the pork drippings into a round bottomed iron pot and when hot add the cream. When boiling stir in slowly the vinegar, then add the cabbage with salt, pepper and sugar. Cook about twenty minutes, but not until the cabbage turns red. If the cabbage dries out before it is tender add a little more milk or water. This is an old Pennsylvania dish.

Washing Lace Curtain.

For one pair of curtains, three parts of soft water, one bar of good soap shaved and put into the water, and let almost boil; then add three table-spoonfuls of coal oil, put in the curtains and boil twenty minutes; rinse in two waters; starch. One table-spoonful pulverized starch, one tea-spoonful gum arabic; pour on three pints of boiling water. Do not let boil. Dry curtains on stretchers or pin on sheets on the floor.

Lemon Tea Cakes.

Rub one-half pound butter in one pound of flour, add one-half pound of fine sifted white sugar, grate in rind of two lemons and squeeze in the juice of one, add two eggs. Mix all well together, roll and cut into desired shapes and bake in a slow oven.

Clingstone Peaches.

In preparing clingstone peaches for canning, if you will cut them around, instead of lengthwise, and then give each end a little twist, the halves will come clear of the stone. Do this before peeling, as after peeling they are too slippery.

Crotonne Cabinets.

The small crotonne-covered cabinet, are becoming very popular. These too, may be placed on the dresser. They are of various sizes and heights and are provided with drawers for handkerchiefs, gloves, neckwear, jewelry, etc. Similar cabinets are also provided for men. These have convenient compartments for collars, handkerchiefs, ties, etc.

Drop Cookies.

One cup of sugar, half cup of butter, three eggs, not beaten; add the eggs one at a time; one teaspoon of vanilla, one cup of walnuts, one cup of raisins, chopped together; one teaspoon of cinnamon, a pinch of cloves and allspice, one teaspoon of soda dissolved in hot water, and enough flour to make stiff batter.

Beat the whites of the eggs with a little powdered sugar and spread over the tops.

To starch black lewis, boil two quarts of wheat bran in six quarts of water for thirty-five minutes. Let it cool and then strain. No soap is necessary where this is used, as it both cleanses and stiffens.

A good way to wash bottles or vinegar cruets is to put crushed eggshells and warm soapy water together in them and shake well. This will clean the glass well and will not scratch it.

To protect your rolling pin and board is absolute cleanliness is to make coverings for them of unbleached muslin, having drawing strings and loops sufficiently strong to hold them when the bags are hung up.

A loaf of bread will keep fresh much longer if placed in a covered stone crock. Wrap in a large cloth to exclude air and keep the crock in a cool place. It is nicer than a tin vessel and much better than keeping the bread in a refrigerator.

To preserve unused yolk of eggs put the yolks in a cup or basin, drop a piece of kitchen paper into cold water, and place over the top of cup or basin. This will prevent the yolks from getting hard and they will keep 10 days.

HONEY IS VERY WHOLESOME

Real Value So Out of Proportion to
Cost It Should Be on Every
Table.

Most suburbanites would keep a few hives of bees if honey values were better understood. Even when the honey must be purchased its real value is so out of proportion to its cost that it should be included among the everyday necessities.

Comparatively few housewives use honey as a substitute for sugar in baking, but managers of large bakeries, always on the alert to find the best and most economical ingredients to use in their productions, value it at its true worth, and use it in making their choicest products, because it provides a variety of flavor. It produces lighter and finer cakes, and those in which it is used have superior keeping qualities.

Honey is in the fat, heat and energy producing class of foods.

Many people who do not keep bees and a few that do consider honey a luxury, when it is freely used it will save enough of either butter or sugar to much more than equal its cost. For example: Have a pitcher of strained honey at hand and as each cake is taken from the griddle pour honey over it and fold like an omelet. The result will be cakes that will be "simply delicious" without the use of butter—and every housewife knows that not cakes call for a great deal of butter when that is used.

Honey has greater sweetening power than sugar and less is needed. In a sponge cake that would call for a cupful of sugar three-fourths of a cupful of honey is sufficient. To make such a cake beat the three-fourths of a cupful of honey with the yolks of three eggs, beat in one cupful of flour, a little at a time, then add four table-spoonful of hot water, and lastly fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the three eggs, with any flavoring desired.
