COMPLETE SERVICE RESUMED BY K.W.E. CO.

New Arrangement Will
be much more Conven-
ient Than Formerly

All reconstruction of track having been completed and the concrete having had the required length of time to set, the Key West Electric Company will this morning resume the operation of cars over the entire line.

The service given will be somewhat changed from that given before the track work was commenced, the schedule being so arranged as to give a very much improved service, particularly to those people who work in the cigar factories or reside in the County Road section, and desire to travel between that district and the downtown section.

The schedule will be somewhat similar to the one which has been in effect during the past two weeks, in that cars will start at the car barn and run down Duval street and around the loop and out County road via White street without transfer.

In conjunction with this service a transfer car will be operated, running from the corner of Division and White streets to the car barn, meeting every car in each direction at Division and White streets. The service on the County road line will be very greatly improved over the schedule which was formerly in force, as instead of the twenty-four minute headway which was formerly maintained after 6 p. m., the car will be run all day and evening on a twelve minute headway; and the last car will arrive at the Havana-American factory from town at 10:54 p. m. instead of 10:36 p. m. as formerly. Under the new schedule no transfers will be issued at the car barn, the only transfer point being the corner of Division and White streets.

It is believed that this new service will prove a very great convenience to the patrons of the car line, particularly to those who are employed or reside in the outlying districts.

FORT LAUDERDALE WILL BUILD ANEW

Recent Fire Has Not Dis-
couraged Citizens, They
are Going to Work

(From Miami Metropolis.)
Fort Lauderdale is planning to spend \$40,000 on street and sewers and as the result of the big fire last Saturday night, which almost swept away the entire city, the summer months will witness much activity in all lines of business.

Mr. J. L. Billingsley visited Fort Lauderdale last night and attended a special meeting of the city council there. It was called for the discussion of raising money to make extensive improvements. The bond issue was proposed and it was found that \$40,000 could be raised for the building of streets and sewers, and other improvements.

Mr. Billingsley was seen this morning by a Metropolis reporter. He is the vice-president of the Wheeler Mercantile Company, a heavy loser in the recent fire. He said that already elaborate plans are being made and active work commenced towards the rebuilding of the city. He is very enthusiastic over the prospects and in discussing the matter this morning said: "The fire means to Fort Lauderdale what the Jacksonville fire meant to that place, and I believe the ultimate result will be equally as beneficial."

"Property in Fort Lauderdale is worth more today, in my opinion, than ever before. It is of course a hard blow, but such misfortunes as this develop true manhood, the real men making good and the less sincere falling by the wayside in the struggle. Fort Lauderdale has the gamiest little band of citizens that ever put a shoulder to the wheel, and they will pull together in rebuilding the town, every man working in harmony and doing his full duty."

FREDERICK BEACH IS INDICTED FOR ASSAULT

It Is Charged That He Slashed
His Wife's Throat Danger-
ously Last Winter

Aikkon, S. C., June 6.—Frederick O. Beach, of New York, a winter resident here, was indicted today by the county grand jury, on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

The charges are the result of a mysterious attack on Mrs. Beach on the night of Feb. 21, last, when her throat was slashed with a knife. Later a warrant for the arrest of Beach was issued.

KEY WEST TOO "SLOW" FOR BASEBALL GAME SUNDAY

Miami Fans Greatly Disap-
pointed On Account of our
"Rube" Laws

Manager Harvey Payne of the Miami Military Association received a wire this afternoon from the manager of the Key West baseball team, stating that a game could not be played there Sunday as has been arranged on account of the law against Sunday baseball. A game between Miami and Key West had been planned for Sunday and many will be disappointed. However, those going on the excursion will have the opportunity to see the United States warships and other sights of the island city.—Miami Metropolis.

MOONSHINERS AND OFFICERS FIGHT

Two Men were killed and
Three wounded in Bat-
tle Which Ensued

Jenkins, Ky., June 6.—Two men were killed and three wounded in a battle between a posse of officers and operators of a big "blind tiger" in the mountain section near here early this morning. Deputy Sheriff Pollock was the only officer killed. The other dead man was a member of the gang.

Four of the members of the gang, a "blind tiger" surrendered and have been placed in jail here. They will face not only charges of violating the excise law, but other charges as well.

The battle in the mountains began at daylight when the officers attempted to surprise the men at the resort and continued for more than an hour.

PROSPECTS OF BIG BATTLE YET REMOTE

Federals and Rebels In
Mexico are Playing hide
and Seek

Chihuahua, Mex., June 6.—Reinforcements were sent south from here today to support the vanguard of the rebels under Col. Antonio Rojas at Santa Rosalia, 46 miles north of Jiminez, the federal base.

Persistent reports are to the effect that General Huerta has moved his federal forces a considerable distance north of Jiminez, and indications are that the rebel cavalry may be moved southward to harass him, as he has sent most of his cavalry on a flank movement west of this city.

Infantry and artillery alone remain in Huerta's columns, and the rebels may take advantage of the arrangement by sending bands of mounted men into the vicinity now held by the federals.

Prospects of a big engagement at Bachimba, 40 miles south of here, between the main bodies of the two armies are as yet remote, though skirmishing is expected at any time in the intervening stretch between the two camps, as cavalry of both sides are dashing about on a series of scout movements.

FOR LIFE INSURANCE HUSBAND KILLED WIFE

Such was the Verdict of the

was caused by strychnine adminis-
tered by her husband, Jesse Al-
bright.

Mrs. Albright carried considerable
life insurance and had been buried
several days before suspicion was
aroused, which caused the body to be
exhumed and examined.

REGULAR MEETING HELD BY CITY COUNCIL AT CITY HALL LAST NIGHT

Appointment of Wetmore as Waterworks Engineer
Confirmed--Request Made for Ordinance Permit-
ting Moving Picture Shows on Sunday

STANDARD WEIGHTS AND MEASURES ARE COMING

New Fire Hose Tested and Found Satisfactory--Complaint
Made of Water Standing in the Streets--Councilman
Curry Employs Referendum in Ward

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last night at City Hall with Councilman F. H. Ladd in the chair. All other councilmen were present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

A communication was read from Lance Lester calling attention to the setting of the curb on Division St. between Simonton and Duval Sts. He stated that on the Northwest side the curbing was being set along the fence lines and on the other side of the street there was a very wide sidewalk. Mr. Lester addressed the board and asked that the matter be looked into. He also read a letter from Hon. E. M. Semple who stated that the matter could be held up by the Board of Public Works until a true line could be determined. The petitioner suggested that a mean line be struck giving a 27 foot street and a 7 foot sidewalk on each side. Councilman Curry moved that a communication on the subject be sent the board of public works.

A communication was read from Theo. Bilberry, genl. waterworks engineer requesting a 15 days leave of absence dated from June 15. Request granted.

A communication from Major Wolfe was read stating that as the local militia company was unable to hold a carnival this year that the city appropriate a small amount of money to help defray the expenses of the company's trip to the coming state encampment. The matter was laid on the table until the next meeting.

A communication from the Consumers Ice Company requesting to lay water pipe from the corner of James and Grinnell Sts. down Grinnell St. to Southard and Angela was referred to the Board of Public Works.

A communication was read from Henrique Chavez asking permission to erect an annex to a building on Duval St., annex to be wooden frame with galvanized sheeting and tin roof. Permission granted under supervision of building committee.

A request from Richard Harris to move a house boat to the foot of Simonton St., for bathing purposes was granted.

A communication was read signed by a number of prominent Cuban ladies asking that an ordinance allowing moving pictures and sacred music on Sunday be passed was read. Councilman Wm. B. Curry asked that action be deferred until another meeting. He stated that he had employed the referendum in his ward (third ward) having employed a man to make a house to house canvass. The result of this canvass so far is that 85 are opposed, 106 in favor of and 42 indifferent about such an ordinance. Three or four were entirely non-committal. Councilman Curry's method is worthy of special note inasmuch as it is the first time that the referendum has been employed in Key West. If the third ward (Key West's "Old Reliable ward") feels as the vote indi-

cates, it is safe to say that moving pictures and sacred concerts will shortly be permitted on Sundays in this city.

Bids for erecting a bath house at the foot of Petronia St., were opened and the privilege let to Hamilton Pinder which agrees to pay the city a rental of \$3 a month.

Councilman Pinder read a rough draft of a petition being circulated for the erection of a sponge market at the foot of Margaret St., the structure to be erected by the sponge buyers of the city, they to collect wharfage fees etc., until the building was paid for, after which the building would become the property of the city together with the fees attached.

Bids for coal were opened and the contract awarded to the Porter Dock Co., at \$5.65 a ton delivered. The bid of Taylor & Co. was \$5.95.

Walterson and Cates were the only bidders on the City's horse-shoeing work, bids being: new shoes 40c and resoling 20c.

No bids were received for making repairs on the roof of the city hall tower and the building committee was ordered to proceed with the repairs.

Councilman Lowe reported that the new hose had been received and tested and found to be first class.

It was proposed that a filing cabinet for the City Clerk's office be purchased.

Sam'l Collins driver in No. 1 Station of the fire department asked for the same pay as allowed other drivers mentioning his 12 years service. Matter laid on table.

Councilman Lowe asked that an additional \$10 a month be allowed the engineer at No. 1 station for taking care of the old No. 1 engine which has been placed in commission again. Councilman Curry stated in emphatic language that there was no necessity for this increase and the motion was lost.

Councilman Ladd called attention to the insurance on the waterworks boilers requiring inspection every three months, which has not been done. Clerk was instructed to investigate the matter and cancel policy and demand a rebate.

There was some discussion pertaining to the standing of water in various parts of the city, especially on Margaret St., and it was decided to instruct the Board of Public Works to allow part of the material excavated of the streets to be used in filling the sidewalks. They will also be instructed to have Sawyer's Lane filled in.

The Mayor's appointment of Carol Wetmore as City Waterworks Engineer on May 1st was affirmed by the Council.

Councilman Pinder stated that a set of standard weights and measures was enroute to Key West and wanted to know whether he or the chief of police should have charge of these.

The Clerk was instructed to advertise the fact that the tax books would be open for inspection in his office for ten days.

adopted this afternoon, giving Har-

Baltimore.

GENEROUS ACT OF A TEXAS DOCTOR

Provides for Family of Man
Who Perhaps Fatally
Stabbed Him

Goree, Tex., June 6.—With an ex-
pressed wish that the family of the
man who assaulted and stabbed him
be provided for, Dr. J. R. Smith, a
wealthy land owner of Sunday, Tex.,
attacked on Saturday last by S. M.
Lyle, lies in a critical condition in a
Fort Worth hospital today. An op-
eration will be performed with a
hope of saving his life.

When Dr. Smith regained con-
sciousness Monday he ordered pro-
visions sent to the family of Lyle,
who is in jail.

The physician requested that in
case of his death or long illness, ar-
rangements should be made to care
for the family of his assailant, who
was a tenant on one of his farms.
The assault followed a dispute
over a rental contract.

PUBLIC OPINION AFFECTS RIOTING

Press and Socialist Leaders
Unite In Protest Against
Disorders

Brussels, June 6.—The force of
public opinion has now been exerted
to arrest the wave of sanguinary
rioting, destruction of property and
sacking of churches, which spread
over the country as an expression of
Socialist resentment of the govern-
ment's victory at the polls Sunday.

Today the press united in urging
the people to abstain from violence.
M. Vandervelde and M. Denis, the
Socialist leaders, appealed to their
followers to refrain from rioting,
and if the general strike is not cal-
led it is believed that the disorders
will die out.

The clerical press urges the re-
pression of the manifestation, and
insists that the victory of the cler-
icals is a victory for the party of or-
der and national prosperity.

Lockwood, was testified by Bert Franklin, under cross-examination in Darrow's trial for alleged jury bribery in connection with the McNamara cases. Franklin said Darrow himself gave him this information. The evidence on the part of Franklin, given under cross-examination this morning, came as a distinct surprise and shock to the defense. Darrow colored as he heard Franklin say that he (Darrow) had given him this information.

TITANIC DISASTER HAD EFFECT ON OLYMPIC TEAM

Subscriptions For Special Steamer for Team Struck Up Afterward

New York, June 6.—The Titanic disaster had a marked influence on the amount of funds subscribed for the benefit of the American Olympic team. So says James E. Sullivan, the American commissioner, in a statement made public here today. In the midst of the subscription work Mr. Sullivan pointed out, the Titanic sank, and a sudden check in the inflow of money was noted. Fortunately, Robert M. Thompson advanced \$1,500 towards defraying the expenses of the trip to Stockholm, otherwise, Mr. Sullivan says, it "looked as though plans for special steamer would have to be given up."

WILL CARRY OUT PLANS OF WRIGHT

Famous Aviator Who Recently Died Had Great Plans in Store

New York, June 6.—Unless the wishes of Orville Wright are overruled by the board of directors of the Wright Company, the secret plans of the late Wilbur Wright to make aerial navigation as safe and practical as travel by an ocean liner or a railway passenger train will be carried out by Orville Wright and Alexander Ogilvie, the English aviator, who assisted Orville Wright last fall in making experiments at Kill Devil Hill, N. C., with a motorless glider.

This fact became known yesterday when it was announced at the offices of the Wright Company here that A. E. Barnes, secretary and treasurer of the company, had been summoned to Dayton for a conference with Orville Wright.

For years Orville and Wilbur Wright have worked to develop other devices necessary for the perfection of the aeroplane which it is known they both considered of as great, if not greater, importance than the principal of automatic control.

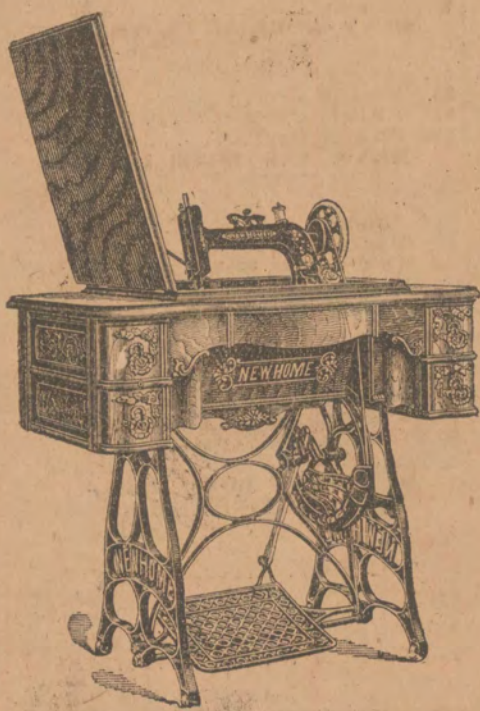

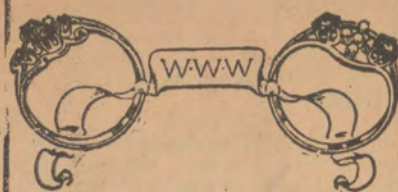

THE LORIMER BATTLE TO BE FOUGHT AGAIN

The Gentleman from Illinois is Having a Strenuous Time of It

Washington, D. C., June 6.—With Senator Lorimer of Illinois holding conferences with friends and organizing his defense, and Senator Kern of Indiana ready to open the fight against him with a speech in the senate late today, attention was focused upon the noted election case which will likely be the principal topic considered in the senate for the next two weeks and possibly may prolong congress' session.

Senators Lea and Kenyon, who, with Kern, are the minority of the Lorimer investigating committee holding that Lorimer's election was brought about by corruption, are ready to join in the fight against the majority report, which completely exonerates Lorimer.

The whole question of the validity of Lorimer's election is the principal consideration before the senate, but an important feature which promises to precipitate the fight and first test of strength is the contention that Lorimer's case is "res judicata," or was once decided by senate and cannot be reopened.
