

NEW TRAFFIC ORDINANCE INTRODUCED AT MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL LAST NIGHT

Passed On 1st Reading—
Sidewalk Ordinance Was
Read Second Time

TAX MATTERS CONSIDERED

Proposition By Duke Sarson
To Refund Waterworks
Bonds Was Turned Down

A regular meeting of the City Council was held last night with president C. F. Kemp in the chair and the following members present: P. H. Ladd, E. E. Ingraham, Wm. B. Curry, Wm. M. Pinder, J. R. Valdez, C. W. Lowe. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Hon. W. Hunt Harris addressed the board relative to the high assessment of the personal property of The Key West Electric Co. for 1911 which was \$120,000. Manager Donald Stewart of the company also addressed the Board. Tax Assessor R. E. McIntock stated that he had made a thorough investigation of the matter and was of the opinion that the assessment was too high, recommending that it be placed at \$75,000. The suggestion was adopted by the Council on motion duly seconded and carried. The assessments of Mrs. Parks and T. H. Saunders were also reduced on recommendation of the assessor.

A communication was received from E. Chavez requesting permission to erect a store room at the rear of his premises on Duval St. As the latter did not state what material was to be used, and it was assumed that wood was meant, the request was refused.

Councilman E. E. Ingraham introduced an ordinance providing for the regulation of traffic which was passed on its first reading. Councilman Ingraham also introduced an ordinance providing for deposits of all public money coming into the hands of the Treasurer and other City officials and prescribing the method of designating deposits for such funds and regulating the terms and conditions on which such funds shall be deposited. This ordinance passed on its first reading.

The sidewalk ordinance was placed on its second reading but did not pass. It was referred to the ordinance committee which will meet with the City Attorney for a further discussion of the ordinance.

On motion duly seconded and carried it was ordered that all special police employed during the Celebration be paid \$2 a day for their work.

A motion was carried that the Board of Public Works be instructed to see that the track of the street railway company on Margaret St. be placed in the proper place.

Mr. Duke Sarson made a proposition to the Council to refund certain waterworks bonds for a commission of 3 1/2 per cent. The proposition was rejected. The Council decided that whenever it became desirable to refund the bonds bids would be called for by advertisement.

The meeting then adjourned.

ASHE-JOHNSON BOUT COMES OFF TONIGHT

2 Clever Welterweights
Will Meet in Scheduled
15 Round Bout

The overshadowing topic in sporting circles today will be the 15 round bout which is to be pulled off tonight at Odd Fellows Hall between Kid Ashe, the local champion welterweight, and Young Johnson of Chicago, also a clever welterweight. Both men finished training yesterday and will rest up today except for a little light exercise. Opinion is somewhat divided as to the outcome of the fight as the few who have seen both men in action declare that they are equally matched. It is expected that both men weigh in at about 155 pounds in their fighting togs.

Ashe, who is admitted to be the fastest and cleverest man of his weight in the city will go into the bout tonight with the intention of maintaining the supremacy of Key West. On the other hand, Johnson is equally determined to carry off the honors for the Windy City. Both men have the greatest confidence in themselves and it is really difficult for the fans to get a line on the winner. Present indications are that nothing short of the bout tonight will indicate which is the best man of the two.

Both Ashe and Johnson are splendid physical specimens, both are filled with all the fire and enthusiasm of youth both are in the fighting game because they love the sport. It naturally follows that the bout tonight will be a battle royal for pugilistic supremacy. Kid Ashe is well known here and much is expected of him. Johnson, while he is a stranger, has very favorably impressed those who have seen him work out. Unless the signs are all wrong, the bout tonight will be one of the best ever witnessed in this city.

MACHINE FOR SAWING ROCK WILL OPERATE

Will Be Used at Night on Street Work of the Key West Electric Co.

A machine for sawing rock which was brought to the corner of Duval and Caroline Streets last night excited much curiosity. The machine, which operates a saw four feet in diameter by means of an electric dynamo will be used to saw through the rock along side the tracks of the street railway so as to make place for the concrete foundation for the new and heavier rails which are being laid. The machine was tried out yesterday afternoon and sawed through a strip of rock 18 inches long and 15 inches thick in fifty seconds.

When the machine was started last night the gear chain snapped which stopped operations for the night. Contractor W. W. Ward who is in charge of this work stated last night that the machine will be of great assistance in the work if a chain can be secured which will withstand the tremendous strain placed upon it. This machine will only be operated at night when traffic will not be interfered with.

DURLACHER MADE ADDRESS

Talked Interestingly Of The
Canal Zone And The Great
Panama Canal

A called meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held last night at which time a fair crowd was present. President J. B. Maloney presided.

Mr. J. F. Durlacher, prominently known in and about the Canal Zone as Don Eduardo Morgan, addressed the Chamber of Commerce last night in a lengthy speech. He is of the opinion that Key West will benefit mostly by manufacture of the raw material here, and advises that what we need is a publicity bureau to induce outside capitalists to start factories here.

In describing how he received the cognomen of Don Eduardo Mr. Morgan said:

I was sent by Mr. Mendoza, President of the Republic of Panama to Mr. Marsh to see if he would make the same statement to me that he was accused of having made "that he would forward the protest to the State Department declaring the National Assembly unconstitutional should they elect any other than Samuel Lewis President of the Republic, and he reiterated the statement to me. On the strength of which a cable was sent to the Associated Press resulting in President Taft calling Minister Herman to Beverly and assuring him that Mr. Marshall was acting entirely without the knowledge or consent of the administration, and that he would be recalled for indiscretion. The being the man all the timber in the Darien Country, to which I replied that the man who was his choice for President of the Panama Republic represented those interests who had those concessions and he knew better than I. In the after discussion in the Panama Journal I was always called then "Buenos Aires Morgan" or "Don Eduardo Morgan." The Panama Journal is hostile to the Liberal Party, and in future in referring to me they give the people to understand that Durlacher was not my name, but that Don Eduardo Morgan was more apt, and I have never been able to rid myself of it.

At the conclusion of Mr. Durlacher's address a resolution of thanks was adopted in appreciation of his interest.

A resolution was passed thanking Pilot Oscar Clifton who recently brought two warships into the harbor each drawing 28 feet of water. These were the deepest draught ships ever brought into this harbor and as it had been considered impossible by many, Pilot Clifton's feat not only did credit to his own ability and knowledge of these waters, but was a great advertisement for Key West's harbor.

GIVE HIM A ROUSING VOTE

Mon. W. Hunt Harris, Judge of the Criminal Court is a candidate for delegate to the National Democratic convention which will nominate a candidate for president on the Democratic ticket. It is easy to be his friend then, because that is just the condition that friendship loves; it is far more difficult to be his friend when he is prosperous and seems to have no need of us.

It may seem that this friendship in adversity is a very noble thing; certainly there may be much beauty, much tender self-sacrifice and loving service in its manifestation. But let us not flatter ourselves too easily.

The trouble of a friend makes its appeal to our vanity; we feel that we are needed, and this is always a gratifying knowledge; we feel that we are of importance and that is over a pleasure to our self-esteem. But when everything is well with our friend, apparently he has what he wants and is independent of us. Naturally, that is a time when shams of friendship flourish, for their aim is to get and not to give; true friendship's aim is to get by giving.

Of course the difference in our friend's condition is really only superficial; he truly needs our friendship always, as much in prosperity as in trouble. But we are disconcerted by appearances; if we ever draw away from him, cool toward him, it is when he is in the sunshine, not when the clouds are around him. His prosperity may alienate us; his trouble calls us back to him. And this fact should cause us a very limited pride. Our attitude in his prosperity is the real test.

We may therefore say that a man's prosperity is the greatest trial of his friends—that is, of his true friends.

It ought to be true that friendship shares the joys as well as the sorrows of life, but in the case of the joys the sharing is more difficult. It is not difficult to go about seeking pleasure together, to travel, to have a good time together; it is not difficult to share each other's love of art or music or literature or science. Comradeship in these things may become very close, very stimulating and satisfying; but mere comradeship, good fellowship is not quite enough for friendship.

Can we be truly glad when our friend is doing better than we are in any one of these pursuits, when he succeeds, while, perhaps, we are doing poorly, when he wins applause that is denied us? Is it not easy to think that his success is a little beyond measure and ours is a little below? Or if fortune comes to him as it has never come to us; if riches are poured into his hands, so that he can gain whatever money will purchase and do whatever he has a mind to; is it then so easy to remain his loyal and devoted friend, assuming that we are far above any desire to sponge upon his wealth? Can we bring ourselves, in proper spirit, to accept his help instead of having the proud joy of giving help? Are we not liable to imagine an air of superiority in him?

Our very self-respect renders us sensitive, quick to be hurt, apt to imagine that his prosperity has changed our friend for the worst. It may be possible that it has; which proves that he never needed our friendship more. For prosperity is the supreme test of a man, because its tendency is to enervate and weaken; adversity rouses and rallies all that is strongest in us.

Selfishly, we like our friend to be worse off than we are; to be in need of our better natures. The good things cling to us; it is merely a perversion of our better natures. The good things in us may so easily be wrongly employed. The true friendship, because the more unselfish, may be shown when our friend does not appear to need us, when he can give to us rather than we to him. It is not always more blessed to give than to receive; sometimes the position is reversed. Besides which there are more ways of giving than one, and the prosperous friend may really be in sore want of our sympathy, our tender affection and counsel; he may also long for our acceptance of that which it will be a joy to him to expend upon us. To give nobly is a very fine thing; it is an equally fine thing to accept nobly.

It is easy to be true to our friend when he is in trouble, when he is down, when others fly from him, when others despise and neglect him. The response to such a call is one of friendship's deepest joys. But in times when we can do nothing for him, when he makes no claim upon us, when he is in the sunshine and all things go well with him—it is then that the sifting of our friendship comes. If we can pass the test of his prosperity we need not be much afraid of his adversity. This is what is meant to be his friend through thick and thin.

Dark Tailored Suits.

The tailor suit is without doubt the necessity of the moment, and although these are now to be seen in dark shades, a redeeming touch of color generally relieves the somber effect which they give, while it lies with the milliner to add the crowning of brightness and chic to the toilette.

The pin striped velveteens are frequently to be seen in tailor costumes, but velveteen may be considered rather an expensive material for coats and skirts, as it rubs so easily that it soon assumes a woe-begone appearance—and, surely, nothing looks half so shabby as a worn and tumbled velveteen. For the woman who has many costumes, of course, a frock of this kind is a delightful addition to her wardrobe, although the fact that cheap, ready-made coats and skirts are to be obtained in this material will rather prevent it becoming adopted by those in quest of novelty.

TAKING CARE OF JEWELRY

Should Always Be Cleaned at Regular Intervals—Best Methods of Proceeding.

Provide yourself with an old toothbrush and a soft brush such as jewelers use, a bottle of grain alcohol and a box of jewelers' sawdust. You will also need a soft cloth, a piece of plain chamois thoroughly impregnated with rouge powder. A few additional small bits of chamois are also necessary for polishing. Then provide two dishes of lukewarm suds, made with fine white soap, and your outfit is complete.

First work on your plain, bright gold jewelry, or other material, which requires a high polish. Rub gently but thoroughly with the rouge chamois until you bring it up to a brilliant polish. Next select the gold articles, which look most difficult to you, put them in the suds and scour thoroughly with the toothbrush. Practically all the dirt should come off in this process.

When completed, rinse in a second suds to clean still better. Then dip in alcohol and give a further brushing. Then dry carefully on a soft cloth and drop into the sawdust and rub about until they show a bright luster. With the jeweler's brush remove every particle of sawdust and give the articles the degree of polish they ought to have, using the soft brush and the plain chamois for this purpose. The rouge chamois is the highest polisher, but it can be used only before an article has been washed, because it leaves rouge powder on the jewelry.

All precious stones, except the pearl, will be beautiful after such a cleaning, nor will it dim the brilliancy of semi-precious stones, or even of common glass imitations. It will enhance their brilliance.

Silver jewelry that looks black will come out of this process with a fine white luster and gold will be returned to its original richness. Sterling silver jewelry can also be cleaned with remarkable ease by boiling in sal soda water.

Home-Made Brooches.

The peculiarity of the side frill or lapel that needs a pin to hold it in place has brought about the use of many ornamental brooches. One of the newest of these is made of gold braid with colored beads for the center. And any girl can make such a brooch. Disks of gold braid sewed together and centered with jewels or beads of desirable colorings make up easily. All sorts of shapes are given them and often pendants are added to tarnished gold buttons, of passementerie ornaments or of beads or jewels. The brooches have strong safety pins sewed on at the back.

PERSONAL PARAGRAPHS

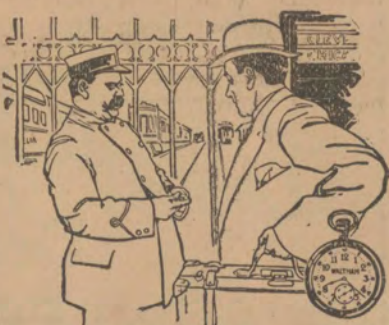
