TAFT A WET NURSE ROOSEVELT WORSE

So Says Temporary Chair-
man of National Prohi-
bition Convention

Atlantic City, N. J., July 11.—The eleventh prohibition convention met here, but has progressed little beyond the preliminaries to organization.

Indications of a strong under current of insurgency were apparent, forecasting a fight by some of the more progressive and aggressive delegates in the coming campaign.

The feature of the day, Wednesday, was the address of Temporary Chairman Howard, of Rochester, who roundly denounced Taft and Roosevelt and the republican and democratic parties generally. He claimed that the prohibitionists were the real progressives in politics.

His characterization of Taft as "wet nurse to the saloons" brought forth many "amens" and his declaration that Roosevelt was the "least desirable" of all the candidates, caused a prolonged demonstration. Of Woodrow Wilson he said:

"He is a good man, perhaps, but we have had 'good men' in the white house before, and they have gone out with the country more saturated with rum than when they went in."

MANUFACTURING GAS.

The manufacture of gas has been begun at Key West, Fla., by the Key West Gas Co., for which a plant was completed recently. Dressed as a mechanic, Mayor J. N. Fogarty of Key West, started the operation of the machinery, and because of the deep interest he has shown in the providing of gas for Key West, the gas stove in his residence was the first in the city to be placed in service.—Industrial Index.

German Makes Aviation Record. Leipzig, Germany.—The German aviator, Schirmer, established a record in duration of time in the air with his passengers. His machine remained aloft 33 minutes and 42 seconds.

Heiress Not Allowed Entry. San Francisco.—Nine year old Adella Ginger, heiress to millions and orphaned niece of Antonio Ramirez, Gustaveau coffee king, was refused entry here yesterday by immigration officials because her uncle could not produce legal proof of his guardianship.

Policeman Turns Banker. Chicago.—Lieutenant John Dawney has resigned from the police force to become a banker. During his 23 years service on the department he has accumulated a fortune of more than 100,000 by investments in real estate. He is to become head of the Dauphin Park bank after Aug. 1.

Famous Frigate Abandoned. Washington.—The frigate Constellation, Truxton's gallant old ship which cleaned the Atlantic of French privateers and struck the colors of many a hostile craft in the war of 1812, lies on Newport, R. I., with bottom in a state of decay. Many patriotic societies are pressing the navy department to see to it that she is preserved.

Mother and Daughter Wed. Chicago.—A mother and daughter were brides in a double wedding at Geneva, Ill., today. The parent bride was Mrs. Helen Bullis of Aurora, 32 years old, who was married to Claud Bolight of Davenport, Ia. At the same time Ida Bullis, Mrs. Bullis' 16-year old daughter was married to John Jensen, 23 years old, also of Davenport.

Double Suicide in Lake. Waukegan, Ill.—The bodies of James G. Smith, and his wife were found in the lake yesterday with their limbs bound together and all the evidence pointing to a double suicide. Smith was a pioneer real estate operator and made a fortune. Then he began investing in mining projects. Soon he lost all his wealth. The last piece of property to go was his home. The old couple were seen walking to the lake shore. There they are supposed to have bound their arms together with cords and handkerchiefs and waded out where the water was sufficiently deep to drown them.

The gas which is being manufactured in the plant just completed at Key West, Fla., is of a more profitable variety than that produced at Chicago and Baltimore.—Industrial Index.

CROSLAND COMPANY IS TO BUILD BIG WAREHOUSE

Will be the Largest Between
Jacksonville and Key West
—Cost \$12,000

Miami, July 12.—The largest warehouse on the Florida east coast between Jacksonville and Key West will be built by the Crosland company in this city, work on the concrete piers having already begun. The plans, drawn by Architect Geller, provide for a building that will contain nearly 150,000 cubic feet of storage space. The two floors of the warehouse with its surrounding platforms and dock will contain nearly 30,000 square feet. The total cost of the docks and warehouse will be close to 12,000.

DEMOCRATS LINE UP STRONG FOR WILSON

Clark and Underwood both
to Have Conferences
With Nominee

Sea Girt, N. J., July 12.—Governor Woodrow Wilson announced today that he had set aside three hours of Saturday afternoon to be devoted to a conference with Speaker Champ Clark, who is coming here from Washington to have a long talk with the governor, supposedly in reference to the campaign which Wilson is to make for the presidency.

Representative Underwood of Alabama, floor leader in the house of representatives, will, it is understood, come next week to have a conference with the governor.

The coming here of these two men who were Wilson's rivals at Baltimore for the presidential nomination, and have since assured him of their heartiest cooperation, will entirely dispel all talk of coolness between them and the successful candidate.

Meteorite Hits Mountain.

Reno, Nev.—A prospector on Mount Como writes from Rayton that the part of the mountain where he and others were located was terribly shaken by the striking of the earth by a meteorite on the afternoon of July 4 just before sunset. The meteorite imbedded itself in the mountain side and left little trace except volumes of dense sulphurous fumes and a cloud of dust that did not dissipate for an hour. The shaking of the earth was accompanied by a sharp reverberation. This news is supposed to solve the mystery of a distant rumbling heard in this city late on the afternoon of the Fourth.

BUILD BIGGEST WARSHIP AND QUIT SAYS TILLMAN

Beat the World and Then
Turn to Other and More
Useful Expenditures

Washington, July 12.—Senator Tillman today sought to launch in the senate a movement to have the United States build the best battleship the world can ever construct, and then withdraw from the international race for big battleships, turning attention to "other and more useful expenditures."

To quote the senator these are: "Good roads, controlling the floods in the Mississippi valley and draining the swamps in the south and irrigating the arid lands in the west."

His resolution calling upon the naval affairs committee to investigate the feasibility of the project, was delayed by the Lorimer case.

Carter Has "Charmed" Life.

Philadelphia.—William E. Carter, the Titanic wreck survivor who sustained a fractured skull while playing polo at the Bryn Mawr Country Club several weeks ago, has so far recovered as to permit of his removal to the summer home of the Carters at Chelsea. The young athlete who rowed away from the sinking ship with J. Bruce Ismay has had a second miraculous escape from death within three months. Mrs. Carter, his mother, said: "It does seem that Willie has a charmed existence. It will be a long time before he is able to be out again, but the physicians are of the opinion that he will mend more rapidly at the shore."

"STOLE" A DEPUTY SHERIFF.

"NEAR BEER" GOING OUT OF BUSINESS IN GEORGIA

Alexander-Tippins Substitute
for "Near Beer" Bill
Passes House

Atlanta, July 12.—The Alexander-Tippins substitute for the famous "near beer" bill, one of the most drastic prohibition measures in the history of the state, was adopted today by the house of the general assembly by a vote of 129 to 42.

Supporters of the measure in the house express confidence that it will meet with little opposition in the senate. The vote by which the measure was adopted today also was sufficient to pass the bill in the event that it should be vetoed by Gov. Brown.

As adopted by the house, the Alexander-Tippins bill prohibits the sale of beverages containing more than one-half of one per cent of alcohol anywhere in the state of Georgia. In addition to this provision, which was aimed at the "near beer" saloons, stringent measures are provided which practically will put the ban on locker clubs of every description throughout the state.

ALARMING INCREASE OF SUICIDE IN COUNTRY

Statistics Show An Increase
of 2 Per Cent Over That
of 1910

New York, July 12.—Figures collected by statistical experts show that suicide is increasing at a rapid rate throughout the United States. Reports from sixteen cities show a general rate of 19.6 per 100,000 of population of suicide cases for 1911, as against 17.7 per 100,000 population in 1910.

These statistics show that the largest percentage of suicides in any one city is that of San Diego, Cal., where in 1911 the percentage of suicides was 59.9 per 100,000.

SENSATION IN CAMP OF SECOND REGIMENT

Capt. Max Moritz Will be
Tried for Violation of 2
Articles of War

(From the Times-Union)

A genuine sensation was sprung in the Black Point camp of the Second regiment of infantry, National Guard of Florida yesterday, when Capt. Max Moritz, Company F, of Tampa was placed under arrest and ordered before a general courtmartial to be tried on charges of disrespect and of interfering with the command of Lieut. Col. George A. Nash, of Ocala, the commanding officer of the regiment.

Capt. Moritz is specifically charged with a violation of the 20 and 21st articles of war, which are as follows: "Article 20. Any officer or soldier who behaves himself with disrespect toward his commanding officer shall be punished as a courtmartial may direct."

"Article 21. Any officer or soldier who, on any pretense whatsoever, strikes his superior officer, or draws or lifts up any weapon, or offers any violence against him, being in the execution of his office, or disobeys any lawful command of his superior officer, shall suffer death, or such other punishment as a courtmartial may direct."

The trouble it is alleged grew out of Col. Nash's repeated remonstrance to Capt. Moritz, who is the commanding officer of Company F, for allowing an enlisted man of his command to wear the uniform of an officer at ceremonies and official duties, as well as otherwise exercising the authority of a commissioned officer in the National Guard of Florida.

KANSAS CONGRESSMAN WANTS PURE FABRIC BILL

Is a Good Thing and Is Almost as Necessary as Pure Food Law

Washington, July 12.—A "pure fabrics bill" the first of its kind to be brought before the congress of the United States, has been introduced in the house of representatives by Representative Burdock of Kansas.

The bill, if enacted into law, would require the labelling of all cloth so that purchasers might know whether they were buying wool, shoddy, silk or cotton.

Mr. Burdock claims that such a law is as necessary to the people, to prevent fraud, as was the passage of the pure food law in behalf of the people.

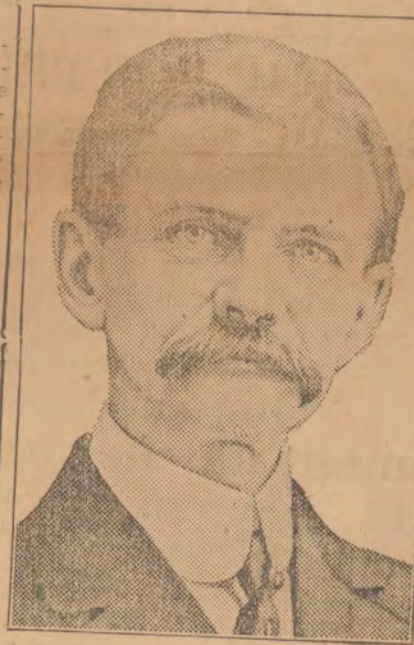

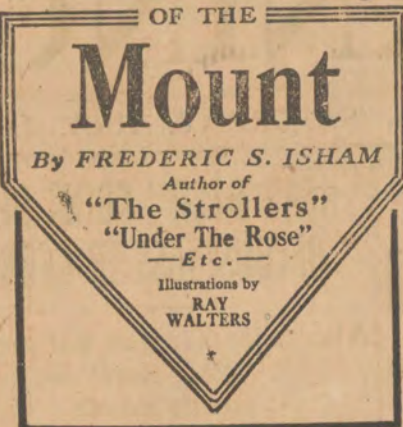

FREAKS OF FASHION.

"Fashion" means very little to the ordinary man. If a woman appears well dressed in a man's eyes, he doesn't care a continental whether her clothes are the last word in style, or whether they are style of fifty years ago. Appearance is what counts with the men. Not so with women. They must follow the "style" no matter how atrocious it may be, or even uncomfortable.

Now we realize perfectly that we are wading out into deep waters when we presume to discuss style, but we are prompted to make a few remarks because of the latest freak of fashion which it is understood is soon to appear. This freak will be called the "shackle" gown, and one thing to be said for it is that it is fittingly named. "Shackle" describes it exactly. To fully appreciate what the shackle gown is, we must go back a long, long time ago, fully a year ago, when the sheath gown made its appearance, one of the few gowns the style-makers have ever turned out which really interested the male population. Following the sheath gown came the hobble skirt, an instrument of torture, possessing neither grace nor beauty, which required the services of several people before it could be put on. But now comes the shackle and backs the hobble right off the map. We suppose it will be necessary to pour a person into the shackle, place roller skates on their feet and have some one pull them along by a string.

We have grave misgivings about this "shackle" gown, but we will await its coming with considerable interest.

A LITTLE MORE ABOUT GAMBLING.

A gentleman was in the city yesterday, is here today, in fact, who had something to say in a general way about the effect produced by gambling in any city, and incidentally in Key West. This gentleman came to Key West some months ago and spent several days here. He was taken all over the city and visited a number of cigar factories. He learned that the average cigarmaker makes very good wages, and many of the men who work in factories make wages that would be an inducement to any man.

This gentleman stated yesterday that his observation was that many men who make good wages do not live as comfortably as they could. Men, who according to the wages they draw should have all the necessities and many of the luxuries. And he naturally drifts to the conclusion that the men who make high wages and do not live comfortably must contribute a considerable portion of their labor to the gambling houses.

Now this is not altogether a correct view of the situation, but it shows how quick the stranger is to learn that there are many gambling houses OPERATING here. The situation here doesn't please this man because he says that while we have a good city with a bright future, too much of our money which should be in LEGITIMATE circulation is switched to other channels.

The gambling house proprietor will tell you that he is helping the town by causing money to circulate—and he tells you that as though he really believed it himself. Money DOES circulate around a gambling table and by the time it is through circulating, the bulk of it has circulated into the pocket of the proprietor. Now, do you believe that he is going to risk that money again in a game of chance? Well, not exactly. Next day when your wife and children are hungry and you are broke, the gambling house proprietor will be riding behind a fast horse, or perhaps in an automobile or otherwise enjoying himself in a legitimate manner, AT YOUR EXPENSE. He is having a good time and he is SPENDING YOUR MONEY. Did you ever think of it that way?

Aside from the injury to the individual gambler, the prevalence of this evil is a black eye for this or any other city. Key West can never be a truly progressive city until the seriousness of this vice is understood and appreciated. No city with a reputation as a "wide open town" can ever expect to attract large and legitimate business interests, and it is the latter that Key West WANTS and NEEDS.

MARSE HENRY DIES HARD.

Col. Henry Watterson, the aged and able editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal, is a hard fighter and dies hard. It is well known that the Louisville editor was bitterly opposed to Wilson's campaign for the democratic nomination and hurled editorial broadsides after broadsides at the New Jersey governor before the convention. Now that Wilson has been declared the nominee, Colonel Watterson will support him, but how hard it is for him is shown by the following characteristic paragraph taken from one of his editorials in the Courier-Journal.

"In a contest between three tickets headed respectively by Taft, Roosevelt and the Devil, the Courier-Journal being a daily newspaper and unable to take to the woods, would perforce be obliged to support his Satanic Majesty."

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR JULY 14.

THE SEED IN FOUR KINDS OF SOIL.

LESSON TEXT—Mark 4:1-21.
GOLDEN TEXT—"Receive with meekness the implanted word which is able to save your souls." James 1:21.

Jesus tells us plainly why he taught so much by means of parables (Matt. 13:10-13) viz., to teach the truth to those who sought it, and to hide it from those who refused to receive it. The truth had to be taught, hence the parable, that those to whom it was given to know the mysteries of the kingdom might know and understand but that to the others it might be hidden (Mark 4:11-12). We have in this lesson one of the best known of the master's many parables. Like all the rest Jesus draws his picture from the common experiences of life. Jesus uses the fields, the home, etc., while Paul in his preaching and teaching draws from the city, the army, the markets, etc. We have in this picture the seed, the sower and the soil. We must turn to the parable accounts in Luke and Matthew to get the full and the complete picture.

What is the seed? Luke records that Jesus told the disciples that the seed is the word of God (Luke 8:11). Mark also tells us practically the same thing in v. 14 of the lesson. A great

deal is being made today of seed selection and some wonderful results have been obtained. How much more important for us who deal with immortal souls that we select the best, viz., the word of God.

Sought Not Adulation.

Next the sower (v. 4). Notice he went forth not to S-O-A-R, nor is it recorded that he was S-O-R-E. He did not have a grudge nor did he enter into his work that he might receive the adulation of men (Matt. 6:2).

It is however the soil that seems to be most emphasized in this lesson, both in the direct teaching and also in the explanation of the parable. There are four kinds of soil and it is also very significant the manner by which the seed came into contact with each kind of soil. "Some fell by the wayside." The path was well trodden, the ground was preoccupied, e. g., used for other purposes rather than to yield a harvest. It was hard to be broken and hence it was an easy matter for the birds of the air (Satan v. 15) soon to pluck it away. We need to remember that if men receive with meekness the implanted word there will be of course no such opportunity for the evil one. The trouble is that in this case the word was not implanted. Thus it is that one-fourth of the seed is lost. That the result is a deplorable one is shown in Heb. 2:14.

The seed in this case fell "by" the wayside, in the next it fell "on" the rocky ground. The first is the picture of the heedless, this is a picture of the superficial ones. Oh for a time they did run well, they even received the word with gladness (v. 16) but they had no stability; they lacked the element of persistence; their surroundings were superficial, there was no chance for the seed to get a real grip upon their lives.
