ROOSEVELT FORCES DEFEATED BY TAFT AGAIN YESTERDAY

Credential Committee is Reporting all Contests in Favor of Taft--Fourth Roll Call Gives Taft One Hundred and Forty One Majority

TEDDY ROOSEVELT MAY START ANOTHER CONVENTION

Leaders Say if Taft is Nominated by "Fraud Delegates" Theodore Roosevelt Will Call Another Convention at Which he Will be Nominated

Chicago, Ill., June 21.—The Roosevelt forces met their fourth defeat on the floor of the national convention here this afternoon by a vote of 605 to 464 on the contested delegates reported by the credentials committee. The convention had previously voted to table the Hadley resolution, which would have prevented any of the contested delegates voting on any of the cases reported by the credentials committee by a vote of 563 to 499, but the fourth roll call today showed Taft a steady gainer.

Convention Opens 12:26 p. m. After four days of what has practically amounted to a deadlock, the convention opened at 12:26 p. m., and began actual work. After a short prayer, a report from the credentials committee on the contested delegates of the ninth district of Alabama was read. All of the delegates from this district were given to Taft by the committee and by a vote of 605 to 464 the delegates were seated in the convention.

Credentials Committee Works All Night

Daylight this morning found the credentials committee still working on the contests. The work continued all through the day and at adjournment tonight all the contests had been decided except two, those of Washington and Texas. All contests reported so far have been awarded to Taft.

No Signs of Bolt.

Notwithstanding the sweeping victory of the Taft forces so far no sign of a bolt is apparent from the Roosevelt forces as threatened in Roosevelt's statement to the press last night.

Betting Favors Taft.

The fourth day opened with Taft a strong favorite for renomination with the possibility of a third candidate as a second choice in the betting, and Col. Roosevelt out of the race as far as the present convention is concerned.

Slowest Convention in History.

Ordinarily in national convention procedure a candidate for president would have been named yesterday, the third day, and the only business remaining for the convention today would be the selection of a vice presidential candidate and adjournment. Now, as the program runs, the full report of the credentials committee may require vote by individual delegates. The report of committee on rules may provoke an extended debate, and the subject of the platform may take considerable time.

May Close Today.

If the convention actually gets down to business this week it will be late Saturday, unless there is a decision to adjourn sessions until next week. Every effort today was directed towards closing up Saturday afternoon and night.

May Be Another Convention.

Roosevelt's leaders said here tonight that if a candidate is nominated with votes of "fraud delegates," Roosevelt will call another convention at which he will be nominated.

WILSON IN NEW YORK CONFERS WITH BOSSES

Arrived in Gotham Thursday Night for Conference With Democratic Leaders

New York, June 21.—Gov. Woodrow Wilson is in New York today to a series of conferences with political leaders from this and nearby states. His aim is to forward his interests as a candidate for the presidential nomination at the Baltimore convention.

Gov. Wilson arrived last night, and his first conference was with up-state democratic leaders. State Senator Franklin D. Roosevelt and Thomas Mott Osborne were with the governor soon after his arrival, and it was said that several other prominent democrats from up the state were expected to call upon him later by invitation. Friends of the governor thought it likely, too, that he would see Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany hall, before leaving the city.

Other visitors expected, it was said, were several delegates from Connecticut.

\$800 OFFERED FOR TAMPA MURDERER

Governor Gilchrist Asked to Add Five Hundred to This Amount

Tampa, June 21.—The murder of Manuel Perez, the lunch stand man, who was killed at his place near the docks of the Southern Steamship Company some weeks ago, remains a mystery, despite the fact that officers have been diligently working on the case. Several hundred dollars in rewards have been offered, and it may be possible that this will cause a clue to be dug up.

Shortly after the murder Chief of Police Woodward was authorized to offer a reward of \$800 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the murderer. Yesterday, at a special meeting of the county commissioners this matter was taken up also, and the board offered a reward of \$500, making a total reward of \$800.

Perez was assaulted by some one while in his place of business. He was killed with a piece of iron pipe, the head of the dead man being practically knocked into a pulp. After committing the crime the place was robbed. The murderer successfully hid all clues. Perez was found by switchmen who heard the groans of the dying man.

A. Nistal, Spanish vice-consul, has written to Governor Gilchrist through Attorney McKay, asking him to add \$500 to the amount already put up by the county commissioners and the Spanish government, who are back of the reward offered through Chief Woodward. There are good prospects that the request will be granted, in which event the assassin will be worth \$1,500 to the man who informs on him.

LAFOLLETTE'S PLATFORM SUITS SAMUEL COMBERS

Senator Has Submitted Draft of Platform to Committee on Resolutions

Chicago, Ill., June 20.—Senator LaFollette has submitted to the committee on resolutions of the republican national committee a complete draft of a platform embodying his views on national legislation.

One plank of the platform referring to injunctions is said to meet the approval of Samuel Combers, president of the American Federation of Labor. This plank would prohibit the granting of injunctions in cases arising out of labor disputes when such injunction would not apply in no labor dispute existed.

The Aldrich currency plan is opposed, and candidates would be pledged to prevent the federal government from going to the aid of "high finance," but to aid such banks as extend a genuine preference to strictly commercial business, "and to the millions of real producers who depend upon those banks." The plank favors "a carefully worked out and scientific emergency currency."

A federal trades commission is favored to take over many of the functions now exercised by the courts to investigate the cost of productions, trusts and other combinations of capital and control issues of bonds and stocks. The plank criticizes the attitude of the supreme court, which, it says, "makes it plain that any act on the part of the executive or legislative branch of the government giving countenance to trusts or combinations will be confiscated as an approval of the thousands of millions of water stocks and bonds issues and will fasten them forever upon the people."

ANOTHER BRIGADIER GENERAL CAPTURED

Marines Ask For Reinforcements And Get Plenty in Short Time

Santiago de Cuba, June 21.—Lieutenant Montese Oca, of the local guerrilla corps, captured the self-styled brigadier general, Ferrin Vera, who had his commission as such signed by General Yonet. He carried a revolver of a German make and a saber, which were seized.

Leader Zaldívar Captured. Lieut. Col. Consuegra reports the capture at Sango of the leader Zaldívar and also that "Major" Romero and 32 men have surrendered to him.

Marines Get Reinforcements. The commander of the American detachment at Cuero asked for reinforcements by wireless from the naval station at Guantanamo, alleging that his detachment was surrounded by a large rebel band.

The message was intercepted by the wireless apparatus installed at General Montegudo's headquarters, and he immediately ordered Lieut. Espino and twenty men to proceed by water to aid the Americans. The party left on the cutter Yara, but when they arrived at Cuero they found the battleship Mississippi had already arrived and was landing forces. Lieut. Espino, also, landed his men, and made a thorough search of the surrounding country, but failed to find any trace of the rebels.

Lieut. Espino later returned to Santiago, but as the American commander insisted in his call for reinforcements, General Montegudo ordered him and thirty men to return to Cuero. Another search was made, but the enemy had evidently made good its escape.

The American officers and men complimented Lieut. Espino on the thorough manner in which they had scoured the country, going so many hours without food.

A passenger arriving here yesterday evening stated to a representative of the Journal, that the reported death of Estenoz was apparently started for a purpose, as he had positive knowledge that Estenoz had been in Havana for nearly two weeks, and was organizing revolutionary forces there.

J. F. Clarke and J. Lee Kirby-Smith, who had heard of the proposed meeting, extended and expressed to the women present their hearty approval of the organization of such a league in Jacksonville and pledged their hearty support. Cuttings from various interesting articles were read and discussed.

Baltimore, June 21.—That William J. Bryan will still fight Judge Parker as temporary chairman of the national convention, was evidenced here today in a telegram received from Mr. Bryan protesting against Parker and stating that he would be in Baltimore Sunday to personally conduct the fight.

Advance Guard Arriving.

The advance guard of the convention is arriving here on every train, and setting up headquarters in various parts of the city. Proposed planks to the platform are coming in from many sources. The delegates from both the Philippines and Porto Rico arrived here yesterday, and immediately began their fight to get the independence of both territories admitted as a plank in the platform.

Anti-Wilsons Receive Shock.

Hundreds of decorators have converted the streets into long avenues of color. Mingled with the colors, red, white and blue of the convention were the orange and black of Maryland. The anti-Wilsons were shocked when they first arrived in the city, thinking that the orange and black which are also Princeton's colors, were put up in honor of Wilson. It was later explained that they were the Maryland state colors, and not intended for any candidate.

Watterson Makes Plea.

A telegram received by Chairman Mack of the national democratic committee from Henry Watterson of Louisville, Ky., makes a plea for Judge Harmon in the democratic ranks, and issues a warning against any struggle within the party, pointing out the fight now on at Chicago as a result of such a struggle.

All of the presidential candidates have headquarters open today and their managers are busily completing plans for the coming campaign. None of the aspirants are so confident as to leave any stone unturned or wire unpulled that would be of assistance in getting the nomination. The managers of the candidates are very confident in talking with representatives of the press, and each is certain that his man will be chosen on the first ballot. With this sublime trust in the convention, they are also "keeping their powder dry."

It is estimated that about a quarter of a million people have a hankering to see the workings of the democratic convention, as about that many applications for tickets have been received. As there are only about 10,000 seats available, they will be about 250,000 disappointed people. As each and every applicant for a ticket is a man without whom the democratic candidate—

Mack Talks. "There will be neither steam roller nor big stick in Baltimore," declared Norman E. Mack, national chairman of the party.

On the question of presidential nomination, Chairman Mack, said: "I have no candidate. I have not declared myself for any man, and I shall not. Several months ago I declared that any democratic candidate among the eminent men in the field, progressive or otherwise, can win for progressive or otherwise, can win for the presidency next November, and since the recent disgraceful fight between the republican candidates, am more convinced than ever that democratic victory is assured. Clark, Wilson, Underwood, Harmon, Gaynor or any of a half dozen dark horses that have been named can and will lead the democratic party to victory."

The democratic committee on credentials has little to do. The dispute between the Philippine delegates and the Illinois quarrel are the only contests that it will have to decide.

Tomorrow is expected to witness a real inrush of delegates and from that time on until Monday every train and boat into Baltimore will be loaded to its capacity.

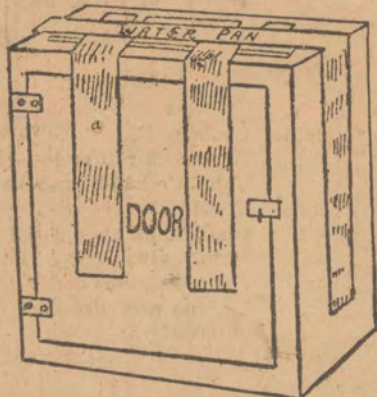

KEEPING FOOD WITHOUT ICE

Refrigerator That Will Do the Work May Be Operated for Comparatively Little.

To keep butter and milk cool take a box 12 inches deep, 24 inches long and 24 inches wide, make a door secured by two hinges and a hasp, tack two or three thicknesses of burlap on the outside, making allowance for the door; after setting the box on end set on the top a deep vessel filled with water and in the basin put strips of burlap or woolen goods about three inches in width and of sufficient length to reach well down the sides of the box. Secure the strips to the bottom of the basin by a weight;



shelves may be placed in the box. Set outside the house where the winds can pass over the box. The cooling resulting from the rapid evaporation of the water reduces the temperature within the box. The hotter it is outside and the harder the winds blow, the cooler it will be inside the box, as long as the pan is kept full of water.

PROPER PLACING OF PIANO

Decided Difference in Tone Will Be Found if Simple Precautions Are Preserved.

The proper placing of an upright piano in a room of moderate size is to turn it at right angles to the side wall, leaving room between the keyboard and the opposite wall for the player. Then stand a table, if possible an old-fashioned mahogany one with folding leaf which can be turned up against the back of the piano. There must, of course, be some drapery to cover the unpainted back of the piano. A piece of good-looking tapestry, brocaded silk, embroidered crepe, or even of cretonne, draped loosely over the top and back, but not laid in set folds, would be suitable. On the table stand a plant, a bit of pottery, a brass candlestick or possibly a lamp.

From a musical standpoint the piano is placed in the best position, for the notes are free instead of muffled.

Paper or Tint?

The choice between papered and tinted walls is largely a matter of personal taste, according to the Ladies' Home Journal. A plain tint in a good color is always in good taste, but there are, of course, more varied effects to be had from paper. Two-toned papers in inconspicuous figures or stripes, or merely a mottled surface giving the appearance of the texture of material, are charming. Then there are imitations of grass cloths, burlaps, etc., all giving the general effect of a plain wall with the added decorative value which texture can supply.

Prune Jelly.

Half a box of gelatin, half pound prunes, one cup sugar, juice of half a lemon, water. Soak the gelatin in a little cold water. Cook the prunes until soft in rather more water than will cover them; then take out the prunes, and to the liquid add the gelatin, sugar, juice of lemon and hot water enough to make one quart of liquid; let it come to a boil, after which strain. Remove the stones of the prunes, cut fruit into pieces, put it into the liquid, and heat, after which put into a mold. To be eaten with whipped cream.—Mary J. Hall.

Egg Paste.

The white of a raw egg is the most satisfactory of pastes. Papers used for covering down jam will hold securely and be quite air-tight if brushed over on the inside with white of egg. White of egg is also useful for mending glass or china ornaments, but, of course, it will not stand water. Still, it is not always necessary that a cement should do this, and white of egg has the merit of being quite imperceptible when dry.

"Wave Spitter" is Latest. Elmer Stricklett, inventor of the "spitball," has a "wave spitter" to fool the big league batters. The "wave spitter" is a ball which breaks in at least two different directions on its way to the batter. It has more speed than the ordinary "spitter."

Stricklett "lost" his arm several years ago when he was in the majors, and was sent to the minors. When he perfected the spitball he went back to Brooklyn and was a leading National league pitcher several seasons.

The "wave spitter" is said by experts to be more effective against scientific batters than bushers, and is expected to make Stricklett famous again.

A SUPPOSITION.

We believe every man ought, so long as he can, uphold the hands of those in authority, and more especially those officers around whom custom and universal usage have cast a halo of righteousness, so to speak. But we believe just as strongly that when a public officer, it matters not whether he be a judge on the supreme bench or a magistrate's bailiff, oversteps the rules by which he is supposed to be governed, he should be forced to give an account of what he has done to those who maintain his office and make his position possible. Judges of the people are supposed to have received their commissions from that divine Creator whom we all worship and adore, and in dispensing judgment they MUST be governed by the rules laid down by that same divine Creator, or else the judgment which they have attempted to dispense becomes unjust. When that great divine Being said, in giving his instructions to the judges who would be appointed to judge the people, "They shall judge the people with JUST judgement," He meant exactly what He said. And when he further commanded that: "Whosoever will not do the law * * * let judgement be executed SPEEDILY upon him, whether it be unto death * * * or to imprisonment," He gave no command that justifies a judge of the people continuing a criminal's case until another time. The word SPEEDILY certainly does not imply that God, in His all wise judgement, ever meant that circuit judges should allow murderers to lie in jail until conditions or circumstances, over which the judge has no control, have changed. On the contrary, the judge sitting in judgement has a direct command from that first and greatest of all judges, to "Let judgement be executed SPEEDILY * * * whether it be unto death * * * or to imprisonment." We do not care to comment upon the position of the judge who disobeys this command; rather we prefer to place the case just as it is before the people of Monroe county, and let them draw their own conclusions, so that, in case a judge of this people should ever so far forget his duty as to fail in letting judgement be executed SPEEDILY upon him that has broken the law, the people of Monroe county will be in better position to think intelligently upon the matter.

We will suppose, for argument's sake, however, that a judge of this county should be forced to the necessity of trying a citizen of this town. And we will suppose, for argument's sake also, that because of the illness of a member of the accused's family, the judge decides not to judge the accused SPEEDILY, but continues the case until another time. That supposition is entirely plausible, and we trust that it will be admitted, purely for the argument's sake. There were two men accused of crimes almost identically the same; but the second man is a stranger within the city's gates. His attorneys make a plea to have the case against him continued until another time, on the grounds that certain witnesses for the defense are not within reach at the time, and upon the further ground that a certain distinguished lawyer, who was to have been here to defend the accused, has not arrived. The stranger's plea for a continuance is refused.

This case is given to illustrate the supposition which we are making, purely that and nothing more. We will suppose that the same judge sits in both cases. He has continued the case of the citizen of the city; he has refused to continue the case of the stranger within the city's gates. The reasons that are supposed to have been submitted by the attorneys in both cases have been given, in order that the people may judge which were the better reasons. In giving His commands to the judges of the people, God said, "Thou shalt not respect the person of the poor, nor honour the person of the mighty; but in righteousness shalt thou judge thy neighbor." And He said further, in charging the judges of the people "And I charged your judges at that time, saying: Hear the causes between your brethren, and judge righteously between every man and his brother, and the STRANGER that is with him."

Now, to state the case in just a few words, the supposition which we have drawn is this: Two men are in jail accused of murder, and each case appears to be about as bad as the other. One man is a citizen of the city in which the cases are supposed to be tried, while the other is a stranger there. The citizen of the city gets a continuance of his case, on the grounds that a member of his family is ill; the stranger is refused a continuance, although he has submitted as reasons for asking that his case be continued, the fact that two witnesses whom he believes could help him in his trial are not here, and furthermore that an able attorney whom he should like to have connected with his case could not be had at the present time. So we ask how, in the light of the two commands, "Whosoever will not do the law, let judgement be executed SPEEDILY upon him," and "Hear the causes between your brethren and judge righteously between every man and his brother, and the STRANGER that is with him," could a judge of the people continue one case and refuse to continue the other?

IDEAL TRAINING CAMP

Managers of Big League Teams Differ on Question.

Some Like Quiet Places Where There Is Little to Divert Attention of Players From Their Work—Others Favor Big Cities.

What constitutes an ideal training camp for big league baseball teams? Big league managers and players differ in their opinions. Some like the quiet places, where there is nothing to take the thoughts of the players off their work. Others like the big towns, where there are diversions to break the monotony of training. Some also prefer the big towns because more money is taken in at the gate. Some managers like to change every year, so their players will get a change of scene. Many prefer a spot where the athletes may imbibe freely of mineral waters.

In the latter class are the managers of at least five—Fred Clarke of Pittsburgh, Bill Dahlen of Brooklyn, "Red" Dootin of Philadelphia and Jimmy McAleer of Boston. Of the five, all but New York have picked Hot Springs, while the Giants have trained at Marlin, Texas, for several seasons. The fact that the Giants and Pirates have been contenders for the pennant

the time they have trained at health resorts speaks well for their system.

The Boston and Chicago Americans are the two clubs that have made circus trips of their training tours. Comiskey several times took his squad to the coast and once to Mexico, while the Red Sox twice went to California. Neither team obtained good results.

In the opinion of Nap Lajoie, a training camp combining the good qualities of Alexandria, La., and Macon, Ga., would be the ideal place. Alexandria has the climate, the water and the hotel, but it lacks population and a good baseball diamond. The latter fault could be rectified, however, by the sending of a groundkeeper ahead of the team to get things in shape. But the town is small and lacks amusements. Consequently the players got mighty tired of it in a week or so, and their work seemed unusually onerous, especially as Manager McGuire was a stickler for that old old-style plan of having the players walk some eight miles a day in addition to their double workout. Again, it was a case of "all going out and nothing coming in," as the gate receipts at Alexandria were practically nothing.

Now, Macon has an even better climate—that is, from a training standpoint—in that it does not get so extremely warm. Macon also is a much larger city, but unfortunately it lacks as good a hotel as is wanted by the big league clubs who insist on the best.

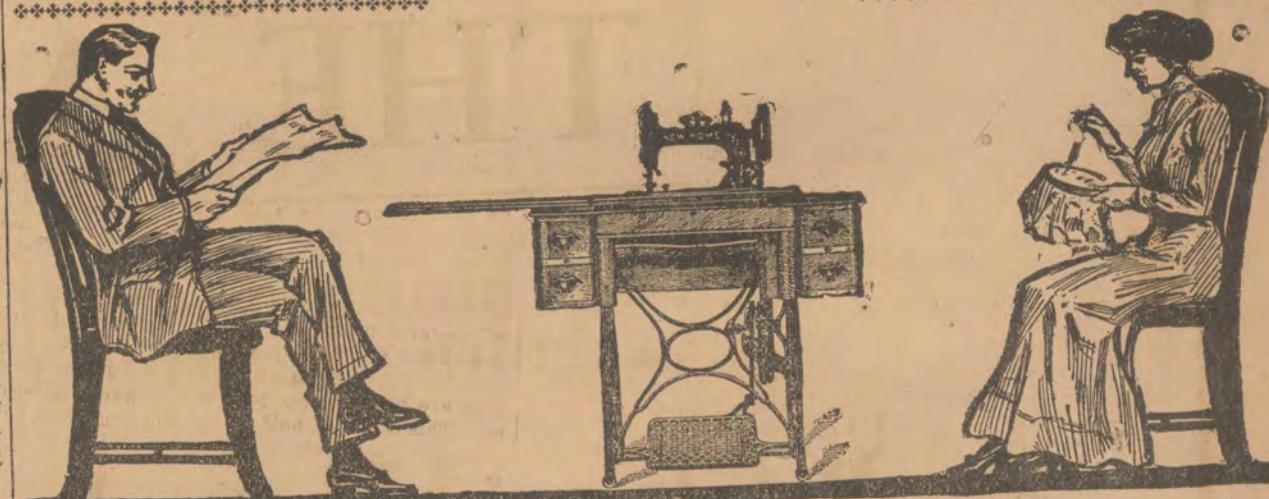

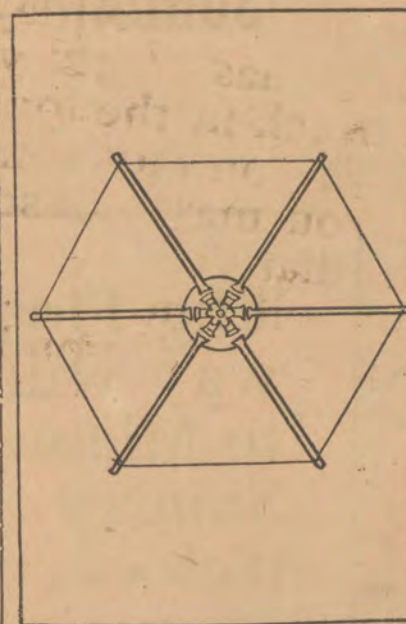

NEW KITE FRAME INVENTED

Ribs Radiate From Circular Disk of Sheet Metal Acting as Center-piece—Will Last Long.

A kite frame which eliminates the lopsidedness that spoils the flight of many kites has been patented by a Wisconsin man. A circular disk of sheet metal acts as a center-piece.



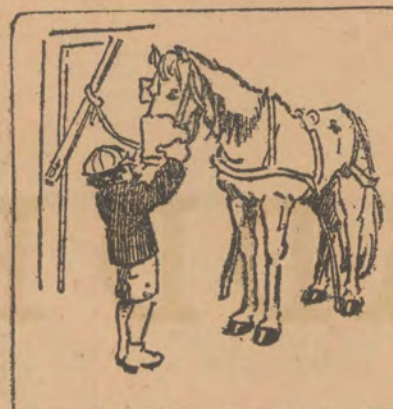
Substantial Kite Frame.

Around the edge of this are spaced loops, and in the middle is a circle of sockets in line with the loops. Half a dozen sticks, all the same length, form the ribs of the frame, which is made by thrusting one end of the sticks through the loops and into the sockets. This gives a firm frame with every rib of exactly the same length and guarantees regular, even flying for the kite. The frame can be covered with either muslin or paper and is so substantially made that it will outlast many coverings, even if they be of the stoutest materials.

FLAGS FLYING HALF MAST

Custom Long Ago Passed From Purely Military Usage to Public Life of All Kinds.

Perhaps you have noticed that whenever a prominent person dies, especially if he is connected with the government, the flags on public buildings are hoisted only part of the way up. This is called half mast. Did you ever stop to think what connection there could be between a flag that was not properly hoisted and the death of a great man?

Ever since flags were used in war it has been the custom to have the flag of the superior or conquering nation above that of the inferior or vanquished. When an army found itself hopelessly beaten it hauled its flag down far enough for the flag of the victors to be placed above it on the same pole. This was a token not only of submission, but of respect. In those days when a famous soldier died flags were lowered out of respect to his memory. The custom long ago passed from purely military usage to public life of all kinds, the flag flying at half mast being a sign that the dead man was worthy of universal respect. The space left above it is for the flag of the great conqueror of all, the Angel of Death.

TINIEST TRAVELER IN ARMY

Miss Julia Kitts, Daughter of Lieutenant of Infantry, Has Record as Globe Trotter.

The United States army can now probably claim the world's juvenile traveling record by virtue of the globe trotting of Miss Julia D. Kitts, daughter of Lieut. William P. Kitts, Twenty-first United States Infantry.

Incidentally her record sheds a strong light upon the mutations of the army officer and the frequent recurrence of "moving day," says the Army and Navy Journal.

The child was born at Fort Lincoln, N. D., April 29, 1904, and was the first baby born at that post. Within three weeks she had traveled 452 miles; within two months, 1,250 miles; within six months, 3,750 miles, and within one year, 13,300 miles. In this short time the baby had traveled from North Dakota to Minnesota, to the Atlantic coast, to San Francisco, and thence across the Pacific to the Philippines.

It took her only two years more to add 17,000 miles to her record, making the total distance covered in three years, 32,200 miles, or an average of more than 10,000 miles a year. She has kept on going, and at present has more than 46,000 miles to her credit. This youthful tourist, who could put to shame Phineas Fogg, Jules Verne's traveling hero, has nearly completed her second tour of foreign service with the regiment.

COW IS CURIOUSLY MARKED

Alderney Holstein, on Whose Side There Appears Profile Bust of Humorist, Mark Twain.

This curiously-marked cow was born on the farm of Mr. Walker, near Alberts, Pa. It is an Alderney Holstein cow, on whose side there appears the profile bust of the great humorist. The colors of the cow are white and dark brown. As the months have passed the Twain bust has become more and more distinct, until today it stands out so plainly that the

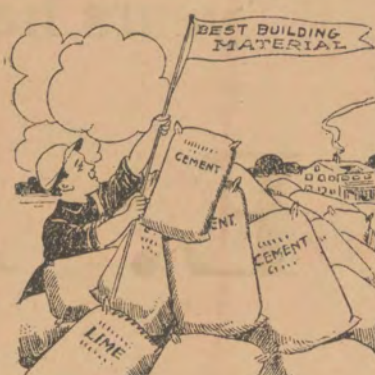

WHY MILK WILL TURN SOUR

Reason is That Fluid Contains Small Microbe That Makes an Acid From the Sugar.

Perhaps you have often wondered why it is that if you let milk stand for a short time, especially in warm weather, it will turn sour and become unfit to use in your tea or coffee, but if it is boiled and then sealed up in some sort of airtight can or jar it will keep for any length of time in any weather.

Many persons believe that a thunderstorm will turn milk sour, and if you ask them what the thunder, which is nothing but noise, can do to the milk you will find that they have no idea, but they just know it is so. So there!

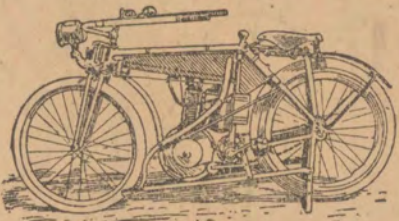
The reason that milk turns sour is that it contains a small microbe that makes an acid from the sugar in the milk. When the milk is boiled these microbes are killed and the acid is never developed. Warm air, and even electricity in the air, is very favorable to the rapid growth of these microbes, which are really a sort of plant, and all plants flourish in warmth.

The acid which is made by these microbes in the milk is called lactic acid, and if the milk is good and clean it is none the worse for turning sour, although it is not just the thing to put in tea. For some persons sour milk is a much more wholesome drink than sweet milk and is recommended by some doctors for the cure of certain diseases. There is a famous Chinese statesman who believes he will live to be one hundred and fifty because he drinks so much sour milk every day.

MOTORCYCLE DEVICE IS NEW

Stand Patented by Eastern Inventor Designed to Eliminate Most of Jar Usually Felt.

A motorcycle stand, raised and lowered by means of a hand lever, has been patented by an inventor of Chatham, Mass. It is shown attached to a high loop-frame old-style machine, the saddle of which has been brought low enough for the rider to stand over it, with his feet on the ground. After starting the engine, the rider presses forward on the hand lever, thus throwing the stand in its inoperative position.

Home-Made Black Ink.

If you want a deep-black ink that will hold its color and will not unexpectedly separate into its ingredients follow the directions, which are:

Mix one ounce tannic acid, one-half drachm pyrogalllic acid, one ounce lactate of iron, one ounce sulphate of iron, one-half drachm pyoktannia, one ounce tartaric acid and six pints of warm water; shake the mixture well to dissolve, and then set aside for a few days, giving it an occasional shaking. Then strain the mixture through cotton wool and add one and one-half ounces of fresh mucilage. You will find the ink will run smoothly, write

a deep black and will copy easily.

Oyster Soup.

Pour one quart of boiling water into a skillet; then one quart of good rich milk; stir in one teaspoon of rolled cracker crumbs, seasoned with pepper and salt to taste. When all come to a boil add one quart of good fresh oysters; stir well so as to keep from scorching; then add a piece of good sweet butter, about the size of an egg; let it boil up once; then remove from fire immediately; dish up and send to table.

Curry of Rice.

Try this as a change from hash. Grind all cold meat scraps as for hash. Cook the rice, and a few minutes before meal time make some rich gravy from meat stock, or else some white sauce. Heat the ground meat in this, seasoning with salt, pepper and sage or savory. Pile the meat in a mound in the center of the platter, and surround by the rice. This is pronounced delicious, and is relished by all.
