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THE REPUBLICAN CONVENTION HAS BUT FOUR MINUTES SESSION

Only Business Done was Prayer and Motion for Recess

BRYAN GETS ONLY CHEERS

Chairman Root Gets Cold Reception From Gallery When He Takes Chair

(Special to The Journal)
Chicago, June 20.—Exactly four minutes, from 12:02 to 12:06 p. m. was the duration of the opening session of the third day of the republican convention here today. The immense crowds, estimated at over fourteen thousand, who had fought their way into the hall after an hour or more in line, had only to go out again. The only business done at the short session was the prayers and a motion by Watson of Indiana to be in recess until 4 p. m. The ostensible reason for the recess was the fact that the credentials committee, at work upon the contests affecting the personnel of the convention, had only fairly begun work.

Bryan Gets Only Applause.
The only welcoming applause this morning was for Wm. Jennings Bryan, who is reporting the convention for a number of newspapers. When Mr. Bryan took his seat in the press section, the cry of "speech" rang out above the fierce din of hand clapping and stamping of feet from the gallery. The arrival of Chairman Root was scarcely noticed by the gallery, and little applause from the assembled delegates.

Appropriate Prayers.
Immediately on the calling of the convention together and to securing order, Rev. Father Dean Walter Summer of the Cathedral made the following appropriate prayer: "In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, Amen." "Almighty God look down, we beseech thee, and bless the convention here assembled. Grant unto its members self-restraint, cool judgment and all the wisdom that their deliberations may insure to the nation's civic right, industrial peace and social justice, that all men may have an abundance of life and the mind to serve thee in Godly living, maintaining the sanctity of the home, and the integrity of the nation, Amen."

Recess Taken.
Watson, the floor leader of the Taft forces, obtained recognition immediately after the prayers, explaining that the credentials committee was not ready to report, and moved that a recess be taken until four o'clock. The motion prevailed.

Roosevelt Makes Statement.
Immediately after the morning adjournment Roosevelt and Senator Dixon had a conference at the conclusion of which the following statement was made to the press: "We will not recognize the legality of the so-called republican convention until it purges itself of the 78 stolen delegates enumerated in Governor Hadley's motion of yesterday."

Rumor Denied.
It was rumored here today that Roosevelt had released his delegates, but this was emphatically denied by Senator Dixon, who said: "Colonel Roosevelt could not release the delegates from the states in which direct primaries have been held if he wanted to." Ex-Governor Post, who was responsible for the statement that the delegates had been released, said later in the day that he had been mistaken.

Flinn Will Resign.
William Flinn, the new national committeeman from Pennsylvania, and Roosevelt's chief lieutenant in the nomination fight confirmed early this afternoon the rumored report that after an all night conference with the Roosevelt leaders, that he had decided to quit the national committee. He said: "I am done with that committee, that's all there is to it."

Root Permanent Chairman.
The committee on permanent organization voted this morning by a vote of 22 to 7 to make the temporary organization permanent. This means that Chairman Root will keep the chair.

New Evidence Introduced.
The Roosevelt members of the credential committee, acting under the suggestion of Colonel Roosevelt, returned to the meeting this afternoon under revised rules, and won their chief points, namely to secure introduction of new evidence and greater time for debate.

Meeting Adjourned.
The meeting was again called to order at four o'clock, but the credentials committee was not yet ready to report, and on motion the meeting adjourned until tomorrow.

TWO DEMOCRATIC DARK HORSES ARE "BOOMED"

Mayor Gaynor and Governor Foss are Discussed as Possible Candidates

Baltimore, June 20.—Two "dark horses" booms for the democratic presidential nomination were informally discussed here today by national committeemen. The talk centered about Mayor Gaynor, of New York, and Eugene Foss, of Massachusetts. Whether the movement in behalf of Mayor Gaynor is being encouraged by Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany hall, could not be learned here, but those directing the candidacy of Governor Wilson said they had been informed that leader Murphy was of the opinion that New York should make no choice for president until after the Chicago convention.

The movement for Governor Foss was launched by Frank Hendrick, of New York, who said that the governor's name might not be taken up until the second ballot. Mr. Hendrick said that Governor Foss's platform was the immediate reduction of the tariff and reciprocity with Canada.

National Committeeman Sullivan, of Illinois, said he had not heard that the Illinois delegates were trying to secure the vice-presidency for Illinois. Mr. Sullivan remarked in the presence of other committeemen today:

"Illinois delegates will vote as a unit and continue to vote throughout the convention. We are for Clark."

"Will you vote for Clark after the first ballot?"

"I may be dead then and I'm not going to tell what we will do," answered Mr. Sullivan.

Secretary Woodson received word today that some contests would be filed from Rhode Island. The notification gave no details.

NEW BOAT BETWEEN JACKSONVILLE AND MIAMI.

Miami, June 20.—Next Tuesday Max Zapf will establish a freight run between Miami and Jacksonville by putting into service the Echo, a strong power boat that has just been completed for the purpose.

The boat was launched yesterday. It is 58 feet in length, has an 18-foot beam, and a mean draft of about four feet. It is fitted with a large Buffalo engine and will make about eight miles an hour.

The boat will carry sixty tons and will be commanded by Captain John Stelzer. Plans have been made to leave next Tuesday on the first trip and if successful, trips will be made three times every month.

TAMPA TO CUT INSURANCE RATES.

Tampa, June 20.—An important meeting of the Tampa Retail Dealers association will be held Thursday night at the board of trade rooms, when the matter of insurance rates will be taken up. Action may be taken requesting the council to rush the passage of the new building code, thus relieving the city of the burden of high premiums. According to the report to be rendered by the fire chief there was \$419,000 in insurance premiums paid by Tampa people for \$34,000 loss during the fiscal year closing May 31. The record that was made by the fire department is a most creditable one, and it seems that the insurance companies should reduce the insurance rates.

CHAIRMAN SELECTED.

Baltimore, Md., June 20.—At a meeting to the National democratic committee here this afternoon, Judge Alton B. Parker was selected as temporary chairman of the convention, which convenes here next Monday.

EIGHT HOUR BILL MADE LAW BY TAFT

President Signs Bill Limiting Govt. Employees to Eight Hours a Day

Washington, June 20.—President Taft affixed his signature today to the bill limiting to eight hours daily the service performed by all laborers employed by the government and the measure becomes a law.

An executive order issued by the president exempts from the provisions of the statute the contracts for work on the Panama canal until January 1, 1915, the date set for its completion.

The passage of the law marks the end of a long fight by union labor throughout the United States. There was much criticism of the government for working its laborers more than eight hours a day when a large part of the commercial houses of the country have adopted the eight hour principle.

DOUBLE MURDER AT OCALA.

Ocala, June 20.—At his home near Lake Bryant yesterday, A. W. Fort, better known as "Mann", shot and instantly killed his wife, after killing John Brooken.

Fort surrendered to the officers without any resistance. He takes the matter very quietly. His preliminary trial will be held this afternoon before Judge Bell, beginning at four o'clock.

Fort says that he had been informed that his wife and Brooken were too intimate; that he watched them yesterday and found them in a compromising position; that when they found they were discovered, Brooken made an attempt to escape; finding he could not be turned on Fort, who shot him twice inflicting wounds from which he died in a few minutes. Fort then emptied two or three barrels of his gun into the woman with the same fatal result.

Fort is about forty years of age. He held a position for some years with the Ocala House wine rooms, and is well known in Ocala. His wife was about ten years younger.

Brooken was also well known in Ocala. His parents live a few miles south of the city. Both Fort and Brooken were in the employ of the Carney Investment Company.

TRAFFIC ORDINANCE PASSED LAST NIGHT

Lease on the Foot of Margaret Street to Build a Sponge Market is Given, and Other Important Business Transacted

An important meeting of the city council was held last night at the city hall. All members were present with the exception of President Kemp, the chair being filled by Councilman F. H. Ladd.

The minutes of the last previous meeting of the council were read and approved, after which a communication from the Key West Electric Co., requesting that the assessment on their personal property stand at the present figure of \$75,000, was read and laid over for consideration. Also communications from the P. & O. S. Co., Wm. Curry's Sons Co., S. S. Co., Louis Porter and Dr. S. W. D. Mrs. Louise Porter and Dr. S. W. D. Light, protesting against an increased assessment on their various holdings, were read and laid over for future consideration.

A communication from the board of public works replying to the council's communication of the 7th instant, relative to curbing being set on Division street and the filling in of James street, was read and ordered filed.

Councilman E. E. Ingraham then presented an important petition signed by one hundred and fifty citizens, asking for a lease of the foot of Margaret street for the purpose of constructing and erecting a permanent building to be used as a sponge market, and being allowed to collect the usual fees until the cost of the building had been collected, after which the building would become the property of the city.

MASS MEETING TONIGHT.

There will be a mass meeting at the city hall tonight at eight o'clock for the purpose of making definite plans and arrangements to celebrate the Fourth of July. The meeting will be of interest to every one, so don't fail to attend.

Tampa, June 20.—Officers from the sheriff's office last night raided a gambling house on Fortune street, between Tampa and Franklin sts., arresting seventeen men and securing a large sum of money and gambling paraphernalia. The gamblers were operating in a large cold storage plant that had not been used in some time. After counting the money gathered in by officers last night, Chief Deputy L. W. Lesley found a total of \$271.75 in paper and silver.

Bonds aggregating \$2500 was fixed for the appearance of the gamblers at the next term of criminal court. The bond was arranged readily during the day.

LAKELAND WILL BUILD CHURCH IN ONE DAY.

Lakeland, June 20.—One of the most absorbing questions up before our people today is the matter of building a church in Dixie Land, a suburb of Lakeland, in one day. The pastor of the First church, who is the originator of the scheme, is very enthusiastic over the question, and says that everything looks favorable to the end that the building will be erected according to the ideas set forth in the beginning. Bishop Morris of Leesburg, who will preside at the next annual conference, promises to be present on the 27th and drive to the first nail in the construction at 6 o'clock in the morning, and when the building is completed will hold service in the afternoon.

BUBONIC PLAGUE HAS APPEARED IN SAN JUAN

Dracaded Disease, Imported From Trinidad Causes Five Deaths Since Friday

San Juan, P. R., June 20.—Bubonic plague has made its appearance in San Juan, twelve cases having been reported since last Friday. There have already been five deaths.

The disease is supposed to have been brought from Trinidad or some other West Indian island where it is reported to be epidemic. The prognosis of the disease is high, showing it to be of virulent form.

The sanitary authorities have adopted rigid measures to stamp out the epidemic in this port and prevent its spread to other parts of the island. The authorities declare they have the situation under control.

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Rebel Leader Supposed to be Dead is Reported Mighty Lively Corpse

LACOSTA GIVES INTERVIEW

Says Rebels Only Want the Repeal of the Morua Law More Marines Landed

Santiago de Cuba, June 19.—That Estenoz is not dead or that his ghost won't down was apparently demonstrated today by a telegram received by Governor Manduley from the mayor of Guantanamo. The telegram stated that Estenoz with 140 men had passed through the pasture of the Barrio Lajas farm on the way to Santa Fe.

The day produced the usual complement of reports, including one that the American sugar mill Confluente had been burned. General Montegudo denied the report and said that such stories were deliberately manufactured by foreigners and bad Cubans for the purpose of injuring the government.

Several skirmishes were reported in various places in the zone inhabited by the rebels, but none of them were of any importance. Less than a half dozen casualties have been reported on the side of the negroes. One attack by the rebels was made on the village of Sampra. Two attempts were made on the town but the volunteers repulsed them. The only casualty on either side was one horse killed. It belonged to the rebels.

The volunteers who are stationed in this city are disgusted with the special distinction shown the rebel leaders Surin and Lacoste, and others who they declare should be treated as prisoners.

The volunteers believe the government is playing politics and that the authorities are doing all that they can to obtain a pardon for the rebel leaders for the purpose of obtaining the votes of the negroes.

Lacoste Gives Interview.

Lacoste, the rebel leader who gave himself up several days ago and is now receiving every attention in the military hospital gave out an interview today. He denied that it was the intention of the Independent Colored party to bring about the intervention of the American government and said they wanted only the repeal of the Morua law.

No Race War Either.

He reiterated that it was not the intention of the negroes to start a race war and asserted that this has been demonstrated by the fact that no crimes had been committed against the white element. Regarding the demands which had been made on the owners of plantations by rebel leaders in the Yateras region, he said that none of these demands were ever paid and that none of the threatened property had been destroyed.

A well-authenticated report has reached here that the rebels have burned buildings belonging to the Pompo Manganese company. This is an American property.

Forty more marines commanded by Captain A. S. Williams arrived on a special train from Guantanamo last night to re-enforce the garrison at the Firmesa mines, the property of the Juragua iron company. A horse belonging to the company was stolen last night and a threat has been made that the buildings will be burned tonight.

Colonel Lejeune stated today that the health of the American marines landed in Cuba was excellent. He said that he expected 200 more marines soon from the battleship Nebraska. The total number of marines landed up to the present is 1,200.

ELLIS DELIVERS THE SLEEP PUNCH.

Before a small but enthusiastic crowd of fight fans last night, Kid Ellis won the scheduled ten round bout with Battling (?) Curley by a clean knockout in the second round.

Ellis, who claims the light weight championship of the South, stood in no danger of losing his title at any time during the few minutes' fighting. In the beginning of the second round Curley began to show the white feather, and it was only a matter of a few minutes until Ellis delivered the sleep punch.

Ramon Gonzalez died of heart failure yesterday morning at ten o'clock at his home on Southard street. Sr. Gonzales was a Porto Rican by birth, but spent a number of years in Cuba, after which he moved to this city. The deceased leaves a wife, a daughter and a host of friends among the Cuban colony, among whom he was highly respected and loved.

THE TOUCH OF SYMPATHY.

"Someone has touched me," said the Christ. "Someone has touched me," may we all feel now and then. We do not lie side by side. We are not squares, but circles—only a segment of ourselves touching a segment of another self. There is the touch which cheers our souls and thrills us with thought of victory. We are good soldiers all, and as we fight in doubtful issue how good it is to touch elbows with others who step steady and brave by our side. We may have fallen, wounded and faint, but as we feel we touched someone who was rising now. His wound is less serious than he thought, and his heart takes hope again. But if he is better, so may we be. The touch of the spirit of a brave man heals.

Then there is the gentle touch of sympathy. Sympathy is the sense of loneliness with our fellows, as envy is the sense of alienation. Sympathy is fellowship of feeling, a suffering together. Pity regards its object as weak and as inferior. Pity is condescension. Sympathy is equality of suffering. When we truly sympathize we are leveled and think of nothing in our fellows except the fact of a common experience which brings us together in a kindred closeness which seems divine. And after such a touch we never wholly separate, we are neighbors no matter where we live. We are not genuinely sympathetic unless we can recall an experience in common with that of one with whom we try to sympathize. "Every sympathy is a memory." The touch of sympathy is the most divine of any output of the soul of which we are conscious. It is love, brotherhood, sacrifice, all condensed and combined. Sympathy traverses any space, removes all distinctions, and brings those who suffer together in one blended, bleeding heart of mutualized grief. There never was a time when the touch of sympathy was more universal, more sincere, and more full of intelligent sacrifice than now.—J. Herndon Garnett.

BE FRIENDLY.

Church friendships are cemented and reinforced by methods apart from what is done by the pastor. Far too much is exacted as to calling and visiting from the minister in the ordinary congregation. The preparation of two sermons a week, of a prayer meeting address and the supervision to some extent of the Sunday school and young people's societies tax the energies of the minister to the utmost. In a large city congregation the minister does well if once a year he can make the round of the homes in the parish. Distances here are formidable and his time is preoccupied by demands undreamed of and little understood by the business men who occupy the pews who look up to the pulpit ancy that its occupants has an easy time compared to their own. His calls must often be perfunctory and he may be pardoned if he occasionally feels relieved when the family at whose door he rings a bell is absent and a bit of pasteboard may stand in his stead and economize his time.

In the country, the minister's visits are often regarded as a treat and compliment by those on whom they were made, and he is invited and positively pressed to remain for a meal. In city or country the minister does his best. What is imperative is that the people shall foster a spirit of friendliness, informally dropping in upon one another and learning to be good neighbors. Mingling in church work is more than ever important when so many outside claims absorb us and life seems so full and crowded that we scarcely note its progress as it hurries by.—Christian Intelligencer.

WOMAN'S FUTURE.

The woman of the future as we see her will devote herself to the part time job for which there is no pecuniary reward. She will marry and fulfill all her home duties toward husband and children. She will have perhaps three or four hours of leisure daily. She will devote this time neither to private work nor private pleasures, but to the interests of the community. She will work for the school board and the health department. She will study the milk supply of her town and investigate the water supply. The civic organizations for the care of neglected, destitute and delinquent children will naturally fall into her hands. Just as she first taught housekeeping to the man of the cave she will now teach it to the man of the world. One of the inborn characteristics of women, a characteristic not possessed by men, is the ability to make life livable and therefore happy. This ability may be applied just as successfully to the life of the community as to the life of the individual.—William Hard in "The Women of Tomorrow."

WHO IS DENIED "PERSONAL LIBERTY"?

The liquor men have much to say about the "personal liberty of an American citizen," but how about the personal liberty of the boys and girls who are to be the future citizens—the hundreds and thousands of children who are deprived of their right to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," through the liquor evil, and who receive their education on the street, to be promoted later to the reform schools and state prisons. Even if the saloon paid every cent of the cost these institutions bring upon the tax-payers, it could not transform these mentally warped and morally perverted children who were reared in homes that are held in the remorseless clutches of the whisky trust.—Ex.

SOME THOUGHTS ON JUSTICE.

When the present term of court convened, two men were in the county jail, each one awaiting trial on a charge of murder, and to the general public one case seemed as aggravated as the other. The grand jury brought in a verdict of murder against each of the men, and there was seemingly no reason why each of them should not be tried at the present term of court. The way in which the grand jury had been empaneled was attacked by attorneys for one of the men, and an attempt made to have the indictment quashed; failing in that, an impassioned appeal was made by the silver-tongued attorney for the defense, in an effort to have the case continued until another time, and so strong was that appeal that tears were freely shed in the little court-room—even the presiding judge, it was stated, was moved to tears. That appeal to the weaker side of human nature won, and the man for whom the appeal had been made, was allowed to go untried until some future time. Not only was his case continued, but a motion was made and argued to permit him the liberties he had enjoyed before he committed his crime and it is believed by some members of the bar that the presiding judge will grant him bail. Fortunate is that man accused of crime, if he can secure the services of an attorney who can move the presiding judge to tears! Fortunate is the criminal who finds himself up before a court whose presiding officer is tender-hearted and easily moved!

The other man accused of murder, and against whom a true bill was found by the grand jury, also, will very probably be tried before the present court has adjourned. A motion was made by his attorney to have his case continued; but that motion was overruled by the court and the day for the trial of the accused man has been set. A second motion was made by his attorney to have his case continued, the continuance of the case mentioned above was called to the attention of the court, with a request that both criminals be dealt with alike, but the supposed cause for a tear-moving appeal was lacking, and simple argument submitted, but to no avail. It would seem that reason and logic have lost their place in the court room, and sentiment has become the ruling passion. We are frank to confess that we think, and we believe the majority of the people of Monroe county think both men ought to have been tried at this time; but if one man is going to be allowed to go untried until another court convenes, then both ought to have the same leniency extended them. The crimes of which the men stand accused are much the same, the verdicts rendered by the grand jury are identical, and there is no difference in the punishment prescribed, should both be found guilty as indicted. So why this seeming partiality? Why is one criminal's trial postponed while the other's is not? We believe in fair play always, and when a man's life and liberty are at stake, we believe he should be extended the same benefits of extended time as other men, who are accused of crimes identical with his own.

Physical Exercise

Of Great Value
to Many
Morbid Persons

THE common-sense point of view, it seems to me, is that as far as the working people, under present conditions, are able to benefit from gymnastic exercises, just so far they are valuable to them. That, of course, applies to any other class of people as well. All of which simply means that to a vast number of working people it is a matter of minor importance or of utter indifference because their principal need is for industrial conditions which are safe, and for higher wages and shorter hours, which would give them opportunity for mental and moral education as well as physical.

To educate oneself in any way means the expenditure of energy, and one must not only have the energy to expend, but must also have enough good sleep and happy leisure, which is not active, in order to replace the energy used in work and active play.

If the question is whether the large part of working class women have these things, the answer must be that they do not.

The object of expending energy is in the hope of getting something one wants; one's living, one's health, some one or other form of happiness; if the struggle of life is too hard, then the lessened energy is used to secure the greatest instinctive desire, one's bare existence, and often there is not enough energy for that.

To use a part of that small and precious fund in active play appeals, I think, very little to the working class, that is, to that part of it which expends most of its energy in making a living. They crave something to relax the nervous tension, something which is "done to them" without much effort on their part. Hence it is that there is so much drinking, loafing in cheap theaters and so many vices of various kinds.

However, I would not in any way undervalue the usefulness of physical exercises for the many persons who are enabled by them to throw off morbid conditions and to pull themselves out of anemic conditions and get fresh starts in life.

The only objection, I should think, is the tendency to make them into a fad, and to give the impression that, given gymnastics, we have cured the sorrows of the world. In other words, we must not put the cart before the horse, but remember that poverty and ignorance are the real evils to be coped with and we can have no real health while we have these. Anything, however, that will strengthen us for the time being to play whatever part we have to play in the world must be counted as useful.

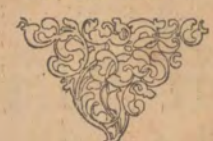

SOME SCOTCH RECIPES

FAVORITE DISHES IN THE LAND OF THE THISTLE.

Broths and Soups Seem to Be Especially Favored—For Stewed Oxtail—Just How to Brander a Steak.

The following recipes come from a Scotch housewife who says they are favorites in the land of the thistle, her own family having used them for many years. Scotch housewives take special pride in the preparation of wholesome broths and soups, one of the famous ones being "cockle leekie." Any fowl, teal (tender), youthful or middle aged, may be used, but if one does not possess a fowl, beef may take its place, though the dish will not be so delicate in flavor. For four quarts of soup use two or three pounds of meat, eight or nine large leeks and pepper and salt to taste. Wash the leeks thoroughly and if they are old scald them for a few minutes in boiling water. Take off the roots and part of the heads and cut them into pieces of about an inch in length. Put the meat and half of the leeks into the pot, and allow these to simmer gently for about half an hour; add the remaining leeks and boil them for three or even four hours. Skim carefully and season to taste with salt and pepper.

For stewed oxtail cut the tail at the joints, discarding one or two pieces at the extreme points. Put them into a stewpan with just enough water to cover them. When the water begins to boil, remove the scum on top and add a sliced onion and two carrots. After covering let the meat simmer gently for two and a half hours. Melt an ounce of butter in a little pan, stir in gently half an ounce of flour and some of the strained liquid from the meat. Allow this to boil for five or ten minutes. Add a tablespoonful of catsup and a little lemon juice. After browning it slightly pour the sauce over the tails, which should be arranged with the vegetables on a dish. Serve at once.

To broil, or in Scotch parlance, to "brander," a steak in Scotch style, have the "brander," or gridiron, very hot and the fire clear and bright. A little salt sprinkled over the fire will keep down the flame. When the brander is hot rub it all over with a piece of suet. This prevents the steak from sticking. Cut the skin that lies along the edge of the steak in several places and flatten slightly with a rolling pin. Lay it on the gridiron and turn it every half minute with steak tongs. With a double gridiron it is of course unnecessary to use the tongs, but in shifting the meat about while on the gridiron steak tongs are useful, and not as familiar as they should be.

among American housewives who too often use a fork for the purpose. A fork should never be put into the meat while it is cooking. Have ready a very hot dish and when the steak has been turned for ten minutes lift it up and slip it on the hot dish. Put on a cover and set it into a Dutch oven. Let it stand for ten minutes. Lacking a Dutch oven, the American housewife will have to content herself with her up-to-date gas range. The steak is then lifted on to the hot gridiron and turned for five minutes more. Serve on a hot platter after spreading lightly with butter. Americans, as they like their steaks rare, will select a very thick steak if they desire to cook it in Scotch style.

Butter and Cheese.

Good butter has no strong odor. It is of an even, golden yellow and has a fine grain; if slick it has not been properly handled. It should never be marbled in appearance. If there is too great proportion of moisture present the butter breaks easily. In this case the purchaser pays for the water. Cheese should be of good color, depending on the variety, and of fine grain. The cheese with large air cells is usually not of the best quality; if the fat separates from the body of the cheese rapidly it usually indicates the addition of foreign fat.

Potato Balls.

Take equal parts of cold boiled potatoes and raw ones. Peel and grate the raw and squeeze out through cloth; now grate the boiled potatoes and mix with the raw; add salt, flour enough to form in balls; have ready little squares of bread, browned in butter; take two heaping tablespoons of potatoes and put two or three squares of bread in center; now form in balls with hands; drop in boiling salted water and boil fifteen minutes. Good with any kind of gravy and meat.

Salade D'Anchois.

Fillet the required quantity of anchovies, cut each fillet into two, lengthwise, and arrange in lattice fashion on small glass dishes, garnish with quarters or slices of hard-cooked eggs and capers, pour over a little olive oil, sprinkle with chopped chives or parsley and serve.

Young Cook's Guide.

A good rule for a young housekeeper in cooking vegetables is that all vegetables that grow above the ground should be put on to cook in boiling water; all that grow below the ground, except new potatoes, in cold water.

To Serve With Pancakes.

Lemon juice and powdered sugar are delicious with feathery wheat pancakes. It is said that the Kaiser is especially attached to this dish.

MORE POLICE FOR TAMPA

Looking to the increasing of the efficiency of the Tampa police department and the better protection of Tampa's citizens, the police committee of the city council has under consideration some important changes in the present arrangements at the police station. These will include the keeping of a reserve force of policemen on hand at all times for the purpose of answering special calls where serious trouble is threatened, or for the protection of firemen while working at any large fire that may occur here. The changes will also include an increase in the pay of patrolmen, but at the same time they will be called upon to pay for their own uniforms. Other changes will include more private quarters for the chief of police, increasing the facilities of the municipal court, and, probably, an increase in the number of men employed on the force. — Tampa Tribune.
