GOVERNMENT APPEARS TO HAVE ABSOLUTE CONTROL IN CUBA

Eleven Men Hanged by Estenoz for Committing Outrages on Some White Women

REBELS ARE NOT AFRAID OF UNCLE SAM

Are Strongly Entrenched and Confident That Federal Troops Cannot Rout Them From Their Present Position--Rebel Leaders Claiming White Recruits

Havana, May 31.—The reports concerning the burning of a part of the buildings of the Spanish-American Iron company were conflicting. The Post was unable to confirm the news to the extent that part of the property loss was small, the property consisting mostly of wooden buildings of little value. La Prensa stated last night, however, that the negroes had destroyed the carpenter shop, the stables, the offices, kitchens and engine houses. The government announced that three houses were burned. General Montenegro telegraphed late last night that only a carpenter shop had been burned.

La Prensa also stated that American troops had been landed at Daiquiri, but this is almost certainly untrue. The American legation stated that it had no such advice. The department of government officially denied the landing of American troops. The Cuban gunboat Hantey landed Cuban troops at Daiquiri and it is probable that the rumor started from this source.

Few Details.

Few details about the Daiquiri affair were obtainable last night. There was no indication of the number of negroes who took part in the raid or whether there had been a fight between them and the government forces. General Montenegro wired that a few shots had been fired but gave no details.

Rumors of Engagement.

There were constant rumors yesterday that the army had attacked Estenoz and Yvonet, but they could not be confirmed.

Fight Expected.

The fact that no engagement of importance was reported yesterday caused much conjecture. Veterans who had fought the Spaniards on the same hills where the negroes are reported to be entrenched, were inclined to believe that the government

did not care to attack until the full force of General Montenegro's reinforcements arrived. It was generally understood, however, that General Montenegro had ordered hostilities suspended until he could take personal charge.

Rebels Position Strong.

The supposed position of the rebels is asserted to be extraordinarily strong. In the same position with Yvonet, the military leader, of the present uprising, veterans assert that 2,000 Cubans stood off two columns of Spanish troops, amounting altogether to 15,000 men, on July 27, 1897. The veterans assert that the Spaniards tried for five days and a half to dislodge them, but finally had to give up the endeavor and left the Cubans in possession. Conditions in that part of the country, they say, have not yet improved. There are no highways in that district and the one railroad which has been built is too far away to be of great advantage to the government forces.

Chaparra Not Attacked.

There were instant rumors yesterday that an attack had been made on the Las Delicias sugar mill, one of the three mills managed by General Menocal, who telegraphed to the government last night issuing a denial.

Estenoz Hangs Eleven.

A correspondent of the newspaper El Dia states that eleven have been hanged by Estenoz on account of an outrage which they committed on several white women of a family near Palma Soriano. The correspondent asserted that the negroes left the women naked in a field. He asserts that when Estenoz heard of this he detailed sixty of his men to bring the guilty ones to camp. When they were brought in a drumhead court martial was held and they were sentenced to be executed at once. They were strung up before the rest of the camp.

Lightening Proves Fatal

Philadelphia, May 31.—A bolt of lightning caused a train wreck today in which one man was killed, another was fatally injured and three were less seriously hurt. The accident is almost unparalleled in the annals of railroadings.

The train, a Baltimore and Ohio freight, was running at ordinary speed between Philadelphia and Chester when the accident occurred. The engine was overturned, the cars piling up in a heap.

Conductor Edwards was crushed to death in the wreckage, dying instantly. Engineer McCullum was fatally injured and three trainmen caught in the wreckage, suffering less serious injuries.

The trainmen say that they were running through an electric storm when the crash came. There was a blinding flash accompanied by an instantaneous and tremendous detonation. The train seemed to buckle and pile up in a heap. They then lost consciousness.

A DEEP WATER PORT.

The Havana Post notes the arrival of the Atlantic fleet in Key West and says the Key West merchants are glad of the opportunity to rake in a few extra shekels. We believe the merchants of this city, as well as of all other cities are always willing to "rake in shekels" whenever shekels are to be raked in, but the greatest satisfaction to Key West in the arrival of the Atlantic fleet is the demonstration to the navy department and to the balance of the country that Key West is really a deep water port. We are glad of the opportunity to prove that our harbor is fully capable of sheltering the largest fleet in the American navy, and the entire navy for that matter. We are not looking for shekels so much as we are for recognition of our port facilities.

KILLED HIMSELF TO KEEP FROM TELLING ON FATHER

Arthur Shelhorn's Father was Charged With Burglary in Montana

Missoula, Mont., May 30.—Because he did not wish to be a witness against a father, under indictment on a charge of burglary, Arthur Shelhorn, aged eleven years, committed suicide yesterday just before the arrival of the deputy sheriff with a subpoena. The boy locked himself in a bedroom with his five-year-old brother and shot himself through the head.

EXPERIMENTING WITH PAPER BAGS BURNED

Woman was Roasting Meat in Paper Bag and Badly Injured

Marinette, Wis., May 30.—Unfamiliar with the use of paper cooking bags, Mrs. Joseph Michels of Escanaba was experimenting with one a roast of pork in the paper bag and was about to open the oven of a gas explosion, when she was painfully, though not seriously, burned. Other residents in the flat thought there was a fire in the Michels' apartment and turned on all the water taps. Before they were turned off the flat had been flooded.

Crushed Into Grandstand

Seattle, Wash., May 31.—J. C. Turpin, an aviator making a flight at a Memorial day exhibition here today, crashed into the grandstand, killing one person and injuring fifteen others, one of them fatally. Turpin escaped with minor injuries. The accident happened as Turpin began his flight. The aeroplane was wheeled out of the hangar at the further end of the field shortly after 2 o'clock. After testing his leavers and the engine Turpin seated himself and sped down the field towards the grandstand.

The aeroplane rose gradually, speeding rapidly. It was seen that Turpin was having trouble with his control and when only a short distance from the stand the machine veered and shot straight for the crowd.

The throng was too horrified to move and the aeroplane crashed directly into the spectators. No one within range escaped without injuries. Turpin was shot upward from his seat and landed in the upper tier. He was knocked unconscious, but not seriously hurt. The aeroplane was badly smashed.

Arms May Be Restricted

Washington, May 31.—Under the new neutrality law President Taft may restrict the admission of American arms and ammunition into Cuba similarly to the prohibition exercised in the case of the Mexican rebels. It is held here, however, that the enforcement of such an exclusion cordon of American warships around Cuba to inspect foreign vessels thus preventing the Cuban rebels from receiving arms from other West Indian countries.

Spanish Vender Murdered

Tampa, May 21.—Manuel Perez, a Spaniard who kept a little stand near the west end of the Southern Steamship docks, was murdered last night about 9:30 o'clock, presumably by two men.

They used a piece of iron about two and a half feet long, such as is used for shifting freight on the docks and with it crushed Perez's head in frightful shape.

Did Not Get Much.

Robbery is believed to have been the cause for the crash till has been emptied. It is not likely that the men got much for their crime. Perez bought the place of Manuel Banzas, who runs a similar establishment at the foot of Franklin street, a few weeks ago. He paid \$100 down and was to pay \$500 more in instalments of \$10 a week, but had not been able to make the full payments the last two weeks, probably a few dollars represented his entire savings.

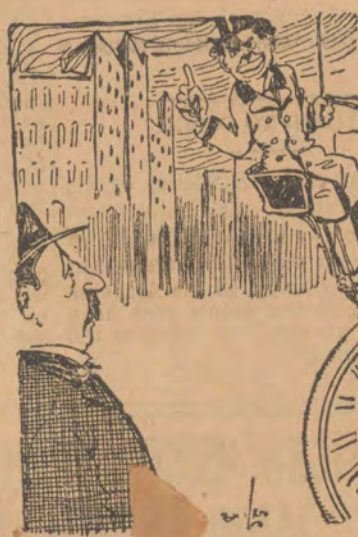

The Right Man In the Right Place

Key West is just now realizing the advantage of having a special representative at the centers of influence to attend to its interest. Since the recent Oversea Railroad Celebration, which he so successfully conducted, and which resulted in bringing to Key West greater attention than any previous undertaking of the sort, Col. T. J. L. Brown has been on duty at Washington as the representative of the business men of the Island City.

With his accustomed energy, Colonel Brown has already proved his value to the city, and, in a recent instance, secured, through his personal efforts and influence, an increase of \$40,000 in an appropriation made for the improvement of the naval station at Key West. The bill, as originally reported, carried an appropriation of only \$10,000 for this purpose, but Colonel Brown, refusing to yield to discouragement, went to work to secure more. He succeeded in having the appropriation increased to \$50,000 and the expenditure of this sum will prove of great benefit to Key West and also materially increase the efficiency of the naval station there.

Colonel Brown is doing the same sort of telling work for Key West that he once did for Tampa and our only regret in the fact of his association with the bustling influences of our sister city is that she has his services while we have not. However, Colonel Brown is always Tampa's friend and he is doubtless of much assistance to the members of Congress from this State in securing recognition for our many needs.

Not only does Colonel Brown's service at Washington redound to the credit and advantage of all Florida, but it is of direct and special benefit to the city which is progressive enough and wide awake enough to have such an able man "on the job."

POLITICAL HISTORY.

This month bids fair to be an eventful one in the political history of the United States. Both the great political parties of the nation will hold conventions this month to name candidates for the presidency, and it is generally conceded that the success of either party depends on the man nominated for this high office. It now appears that Theodore Roosevelt will be the Republican nominee for President. The Democratic situation is a little more complicated. The South places its faith in Underwood, while another faction of the party hopes to win with Harmon. It is not at all improbable that Bryan will be the Democratic nominee, and in that event the Democratic party will go down to certain defeat.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

(By E. O. SELLERS, Director of Evening Department, The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

LESSON FOR JUNE 2

HYPOCRISY AND SINCERITY.

GOLDEN TEXT.—"Take heed that you do not your righteousness before men, to be seen of them; else ye have no reward with your Father which is in Heaven."—Matt. 6:1.

Someone has called attention to the "butts" of God as recorded in the Scriptures, showing that they always lead to something good and contrasts them with those of men that are always the introduction to some derogatory remark. In something resembling this the words of Jesus, "Take heed," are tremendous with import.

Doing was the greatest thing in the Jewish religion that Jesus came to set aside which he established his new kingdom. It is easy for a man to try to do for himself in order to merit God's favor. It is hard to let God do for us and we to accept his finished work.

In this lesson there is one inclusive word and three illustrations. This word is the word "righteousness" substituted in the Revised Version for the word "alms" in verse one. The three lines of application or illustrations used are, first, that we shall make our righteousness secure by so doing our alms as not to be seen of men; second, that in the saying of our prayers we shall not, like the hypocrites, desire to be seen of men, and third, that in the keeping of our fasts and our vigils we do them, not, as do hypocrites, that the multitudes may observe and comment thereon.

is retained and hence the first illustration has to do with our "doing of alms" i. e., our relations to men about us, our rightness. The doing of alms has no fundamental connection with any question of honesty between man and man. The doing of alms according to the strict interpretation of civil law is no part of duty. There is no reason why the business man should give away his earnings provided he is just in his dealings and does not defraud in his transactions. Yet we do see men making great gifts and benefactions to the cause of philanthropy. Why? Jesus lays bare the secret when he says, "that they may have the glory of men."

Next Jesus takes up the subject of prayer. Again our attention is drawn to the fact that the exercise of prayer has but little to do with our relations to men. True it is these relations must be right before we can come to God acceptably but prayer is to be directed to God and not to man. Apart from our belief in God, why should we pray? Commercial or other inter-relationships do not require prayer, why then pray? The keen blade of Jesus' logic again reveals the innermost secret, "that they may be seen of men," and such an idea of righteousness is repugnant in the kingdom of Jesus.

We now come to the third illustration, the keeping of fasts. Fasting does not and never has appealed to the natural man. Naturally it is repugnant and distasteful and yet we see men making a show of fasting and imposing a like burden upon others, why? "That they may be seen of men." Is there, then, no place for, nor ministry in fasting? Certainly there is. True fasting, however, consists in foregoing and abstaining for the "glory of God."

God the Final Judge.

It is a sad fact that much of our Lenten fasting and of our abstinence upon Fridays is that it shall be seen of men and not because of any real appreciation of the underlying need or sense of the principles of fasting. This lesson is a great warning that if we condition our righteousness upon the approval of man it will have no reward whatever of God. The ostentatious or unctious display of philanthropy will receive its reward from men and weigh its night.

Followed through this lesson applies to all the walks of life. For illustration, to adulterate food for gain and yet appear active in church for the upbuilding of a reputation. This falseness is the sin that lies back of graft and corruption and that allows America to have "the worst governed cities in the world."

It is quite noticeable that there is not a single personal pronoun in this model prayer. It begins with God, leads us through his dealings with man and back once more to him to whom all glory belongs.

In the lesson Jesus shows us the difference between their righteousness and the righteousness which he is demanding of the subject of his kingdom. The motive which must govern is the glory, not of man but of God, not man's approval but the approval of God. In verse two the word "alms"

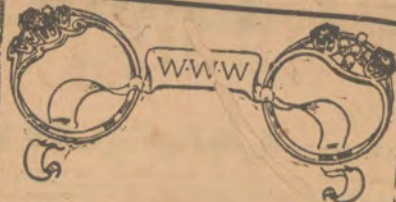

Possibly the same queries were made then that would be made now, as to the mysterious disappearance of a person, and among others this question would be asked, "In whose company was he last seen?" Our text tells us, and the answer presents to us a fact that is of practical interest and which we will consider. He was last seen walking with God.

Can a Man Walk With God? Why not? Is not a man created in the image and likeness of God, in righteousness and true holiness? Although the features of this common likeness are battered out of recognition, yet the purpose of man's creation that he should hold the closest fellowship with God remains, and if, recognizing his marred condition he comes in penitence to God as David came, he will be received as one after God's own heart and walk close with him.

As to the fact of walking with God, we have, first, the case in question. Then we have the clear statement that Noah walked with God. Near the end of the Old Testament we have the statement that certain priests walked with God in peace and equity. The Psalmist said, "Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for thou art with me." If we believe that, then the fourth person in the furnace, in which the three Hebrew children were cast was the Son of God, again do we have men walking with God, for Enoch said, "I see four men loose, walking in the fire." All through the centuries men and women have walked with God, and no picture of touching elbows or linking arms is too strong to express the contact. Walking with God is the Christian's goal, and he sings:

So shall my walk be close with God,
Calm and serene my frame;
So purer light shall mark the road
That leads me to the Lamb.

Walking with God involves separation from the world, a negative result. It then involves congeniality in personal qualities. "Can two walk together unless they be agreed?" In the case of man walking with God, the qualities in God must indicate the mutual qualities, and those which man may possess are holiness, mercy, love, the spirit of self-sacrifice, and love.

Enoch Walked With God 300 Years. Walking with God implies prolonged and constant companionship with him, and in the case before us, the walk continued for 300 years. When Jesus called his disciples he said, "Follow me," meaning that he would have his disciples attach themselves closely to his person, and at the end of his ministry he commended those who were then with him.

We cannot ask unselfishly, is this walk for man's benefit? It implies mutual conferring of benefits. A natural consequence of walking with God will be close intimacy without any suggestion of offensive familiarity. God holds trusts with his people. Christ and his people have common secrets; all that is Christ's belongs to his followers. How sweet it is to have God take us into his confidence, and reveal to us the depths of his love for us!

In the case of Enoch we have a suggestion that a prolonged walk with God will result in something better than any communion to be realized on earth. Enoch was translated, and God took him to himself and redeemed as he was by the blood of Christ yet to be shed for him, he had blessings in God's presence greater than those of angels. Walking with God is a prophecy of heavenly translation.
