HENRY PINDER CUT HIMSELF LAST NIGHT

Suffering from Nervous Breakdown Multitilted Himself Badly

Henry Pinder, an old and respected citizen of this city last night badly mutilated himself with a bread knife after having suffered for some days with a nervous affection. Mr. Pinder cut himself last night shortly after nine o'clock. Dr. Warren was immediately summoned and dressed the wounds which were very painful. He cut his throat, the back of his neck and cut himself promiscuously in other parts of the body. Policeman Wm. Fagan went to the house, 1107 Southard street and took the injured man in charge, taking him to the County Jail for safe keeping. It appearing that he was not in his right mind. When placed in the County Jail, Mr. Pinder was bleeding profusely, and the officer and a newspaper man who accompanied him immediately sought medical assistance, the wounded man having swooned in the arms of the men supporting him. Dr. Wm. R. Warren came over to the County Jail and stitched the wounds anew and at an early hour this morning the patient was in as good condition as could be expected.

ORDINANCE NO. 6, COUNCIL SERIES.

An Ordinance to Amend Ordinance No. 34, Council Series, being an Ordinance creating the office of Engineer in charge of the Water Works Plant, defining his duties and fixing his compensation.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Key West, in regular session convened:

Section 1. That Section 3. of Ordinance No. 34, Council Series, be amended to read as follows: "The compensation of the Engineer of the Water Works Plant shall be Fifteen Hundred Dollars per year, payable monthly.

Section 2.—All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This Ordinance shall take effect on May 1st 1912, after its passage, approval and publication.

ARRESTED FOR BUYING SHIRTS.

BIG BATTLESHIPS WILL STAND IN READINESS

New Hampshire and Nebraska Will Stop Here Enroute To New Orleans.

The battleships New Hampshire and Nebraska have been ordered to New Orleans, presumably to be in readiness should the situation in Mexico demand immediate intervention to protect American lives and interests.

According to a letter received by Admiral Young from the Captain of the New Hampshire, that ship enroute to New Orleans will arrive off the bar sometime this morning to await the arrival of the Nebraska, which is expected momentarily. Pilot Oscar Clifton has been notified to be in readiness to bring the ships in.

The situation in Mexico is again straining the relations between this country and Mexico, and American intervention is very probable.

WESTERN UNION WILL REMODEL OFFICE.

J. P. Edwards, Special Agent, L. H. Bech, Divisional Plant Supt., and L. B. Thompson, Electrical Engineer, all of the Western Union Telegraph Co. with headquarters in Atlanta, arrived in the city yesterday morning with a complete set of plans for the remodeling of the local office.

TORPEDO BOAT FOR USE OF NAVAL MILITIA HERE.

Arrived Yesterday Morning, But Has Not Been Turned Over To Militia Yet.

The torpedo boat Mackenzie arrived here yesterday morning in tow of the tug Uncas. It is generally understood that the Mackenzie has been sent here for the use of the Naval Militia, but Lieut. Comdr. Geo. B. Graham, when questioned regarding the boat, disclaimed all knowledge of her with the exception of a little correspondence several weeks ago regarding some boat, at that time in Charleston, which might be available for the use of the Naval Militia.

The Mackenzie is a trim little craft, but much too small for the needs of the local organization, which has 143 officers and men. She will probably serve the purpose, however, until a more suitable boat can be provided.

ORDINANCE NO. 47, COUNCIL SERIES

An Ordinance to regulate the sale of Spirituous Vinous and Malt Liquors and fixing a penalty for violations thereof.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Key West in regular session convened:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or Corporation, or for any Club whether incorporated or unincorporated or for the officers, agents or servants of any such Club or Corporation to sell any spirituous, vinous or Malt liquors or any preparation composed wholly or in part of such liquors, between the hours of eleven p. m. and five a. m. on any day, except that no such liquors shall be sold between the hours of eleven p. m. on Saturdays and five a. m. on the following Monday.

Section 2. Any person, or the member of any firm, or the officers, agents or servants of any Club or Corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of Section 1, hereof shall, upon conviction before the Municipal Court be punished by a fine not exceeding \$250.00 or by imprisonment in the City Jail for a period of not more than 60 days.

Section 3. All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its passage, approval and publication.

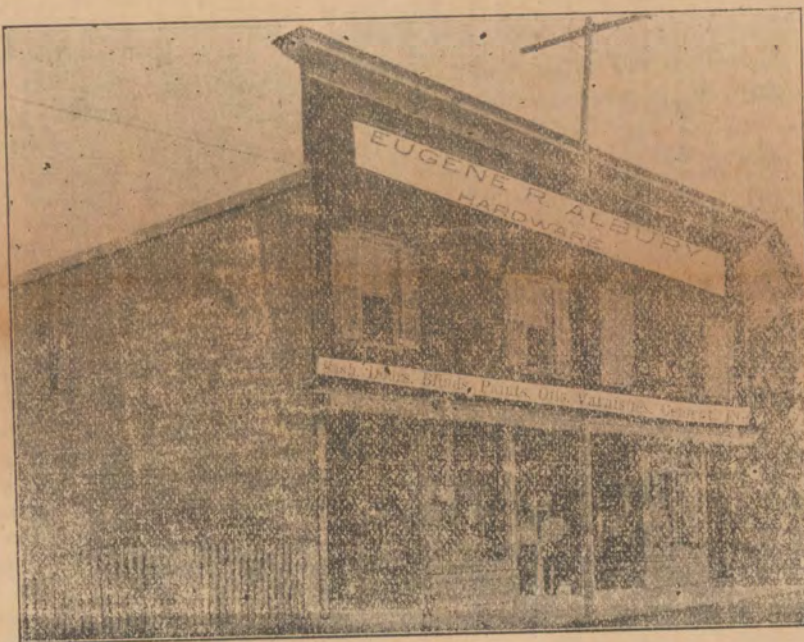

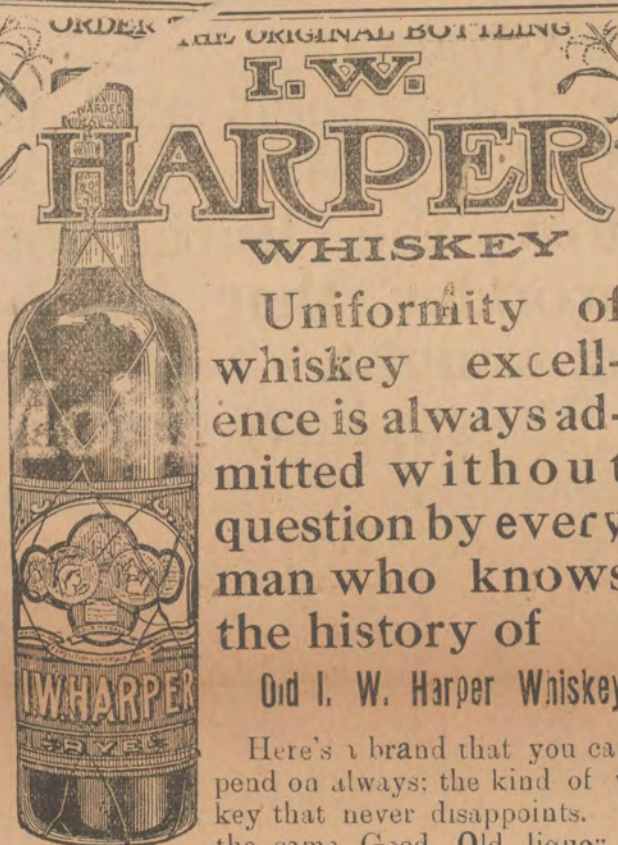

RECALLS BUSY CANAL DAYS

Quaint Phases of an Old Canal Boatman's Many Unique Experiences Up the Schuylkill Valley.

Auburn, Pa.—Boating on the Schuylkill canal continued this winter for a longer period than some of the very oldest canal boatmen can remember. At least this is what Capt. Henry Reppert, a retired boatman, says, and he ought to know, for he served 40 years as a boatman, and cultivated some peculiar traits. He recalls incidents that occurred on the Schuylkill canal when there were 1,200 boats plying between Port Clinton and Philadelphia, and when 3,600 men earned a living.

Good as boatmen, towpath walkers and assistants; while today there are only 38 boats in service on this, one of the few canals in this state still used for freight purposes.

Although Capt. Reppert was not then employed as a canal boatman, he easily remembers when, in 1849, the first steam barge called "Experiment," came all the way from Wilmington, Del., through the Delaware river, and thence plying through the waters of the Schuylkill to the coal regions, carrying on the return trip 115 tons of coal. He remembers when the first large steam barge, known in 1852 as the Daniel P. Shenfelder, was built at Reading and carried coal down the Schuylkill into the Union canal, and finally found its course all the way to Albany, N. Y. This boat had a capacity of 152 tons.

He also recalls the packet boats that carried passengers from Reading to Philadelphia and return. They left Reading at 4 o'clock every morning and arrived in Philadelphia at 6 o'clock in the evening. There was a relay of horses every 10 or 12 miles. The boats were known as the Planet and the Swan. A year later, in 1847, other packet boats were put in service, carrying both freight and passengers.

When Capt. Reppert started his life as a tow-path trotter, the smaller canal boats were still in use—boats 10 feet wide, 40 feet long and carrying from 25 to 30 tons.
