

MEYER SAYS JAPAN HAS BEAT OUR TIME

When Strength And Number Of Fighting Ships Is Considered

Washington, Feb. 28.—In what he considered a cogent appeal for more funds for fighting ships, Secretary of the Navy Meyer today again appeared before the house naval affairs committee. He reiterated his former statement that Japan had left the United States behind in number and strength of battle ships.

Mr. Meyer asked also for an appropriation of \$1,000,000 to establish a globe-girdling wireless system, by which the United States warships could keep in constant touch with Washington, with their bases and with each other.

The committee is pledged to economy although appropriations for battle ships have not been acted upon, many members are said to be inclined not to support the caucus which decided against a two battleship program.

The wireless suggestion, it is believed, will not be agreed for reasons of economy.

The secretary told the committee that even with the construction of two battleships a year the United States, in four years would be forced to drop behind Japan in the naval scale. If only one ship a year be built, he said, the country would find itself outstripped by Great Britain, Germany, France and Japan.

As part of the general naval reorganization scheme, Secretary Meyer suggested the abandonment of the navy yards at New York, Boston and Portsmouth. N. H., provided \$24,000,000 could be realized from their sale. The three yards cost the government more than \$116,000,000.

In place of the abandoned yards the new plan contemplates one great yard in Narragansett bay, another at Norfolk, a torpedo station at Charleston and a small yard at Key West. The latter would be in the nature of an auxiliary to the naval base at Guantanamo. The secretary strongly advised the creation of the grade of admiral on the active list, with the creation of two vice admirals.

COUNTLESS SHIPS FLYING EVERY KNOWN FLAG PASS QUITE CLOSE TO KEY WEST

Freighted With The Products Of The Mine The Factory And The Field For Countries Flung Across The Seas To The Earth's End

Key West is an important port. The steamers of at least two great lines—the Mallory and the Peninsular and Oriental touching here every day in the week. Then a veritable fleet of smaller craft—schooners and power boats of every description, besides the government steamers make this their home. A very important port, indeed, is Key West, and increasing in magnitude every week.

But how many of this Island City's inhabitants have any idea, of the incalculable tonnage which ten, twenty or thirty miles out on the Atlantic passes Key West every day. Standing on the top of the lighthouse on Whitehead street, a man with a fairly powerful pair of binoculars or a telescope would be able to make out in clear weather, an almost endless procession of steamers—for steam has practically usurped the place of sails—going north and south. Several days of the week he could descry the powerful Ward line boats ploughing the waves on their way to Havana, or going north to New York. Less frequently he could make out the trim lines of an Atlas liner laden with the fruits and spices of Central and South America. Two or three times a week, from his vantage, the man will see the Morgan Line boats—now operated by the Southern Pacific Ry. Co.—which carry a great deal of manufactured goods, besides dry goods and groceries to New Orleans for distribution through Texas and the west, bringing in return cotton, rice and other produce of the Gulf states.

Then again the steamers of Panama S. S. Line running between New York and the canal zone may be descry quite frequently. With the approaching completion of the Big Ditch the business of this company is greatly increasing, and within the last year orders have been given for an addition to the fleet.

Another line whose steamers come almost within hailing distance of Key West, is the Porto Rico line. They run between New York and Porto Rico ports and their business is on the increase. There is not a sea on the globe that the ships of the Hamburg-American Line do not plow. They have the largest fleet of any company in the world, the white Star Company a close second. Naturally, the Hamburg-American gets into Havana and several of the Central American ports, and on a clear day the man on top of the Whitehead street lighthouse may discern a cream colored H—A boat running between Havana, Kingston, Jamaica and New York.

Another line whose boats may be seen almost any day by the man with the telescope is the United Fruit Company. As the name denotes those vessels are in the fruit trade. Bananas, pineapples, coconuts and other tropic fruits compose the bulk of their freight north bound, which they discharge at Philadelphia, New York, Boston, St. John, N. B. and Halifax, N. S. Southbound they carry manufactured goods from the middle west states. These boats cater to passenger travel also.

In addition to the above, the Atlantic near Key West is daily dotted with the steel tank boats of the Standard Oil, the Gulf Oil Co. and the Gulf Refining Co. Then again ocean vagabonds going into every port of the world looking for cargoes, and flying the British—which 90 per cent of them do—German, Swedish and Norwegian, flags pass every day not so many miles from Key West. Hosts of others whose destinations Rio Janeiro, Buenos Ayres and other South American ports hold their way many miles further out, but keep in touch with Key West by wireless telegraph.

As an instance of the gigantic volume of commerce which is borne past the southernmost city of the United States, it may be mentioned that a man well known in Key West shipping circles counted in one day 183 vessels of every description, steam and sail. How many more were beyond his ken, but which without any exaggeration, may be said to have been in this neighborhood, only the records in the wireless office can say.

What a highway of ocean travel lies almost at our very doors!

At Least Press Of That City Trusts That This Vision May Be True

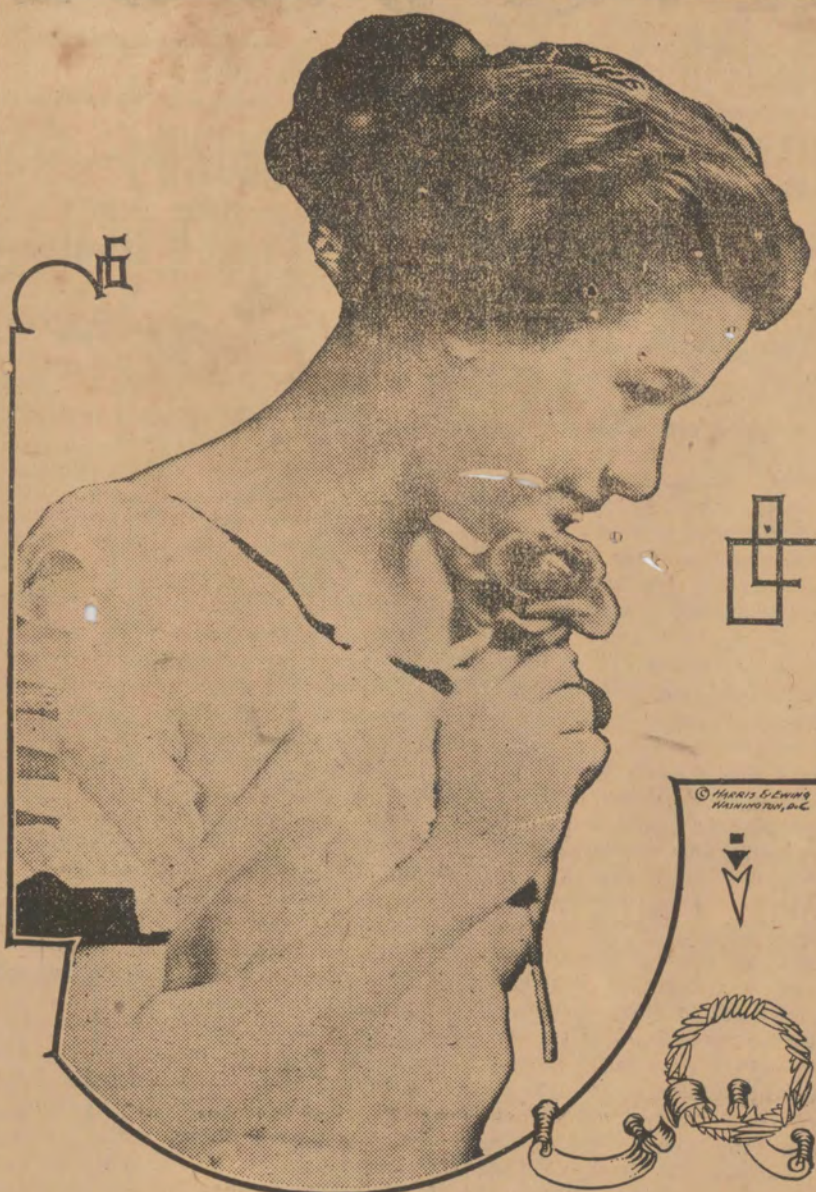

TWO SOLDIERS KILL THEIR AGED HOSTESS

They Are Sentenced to Death by Court Martial for the Unusually Brutal Murder.

SHOW VICTIM'S SKULL

Wanted Money for Their Amusement, and Finding the Old Woman Alone, Beat Her to Death With a Club, After Struggle for Life.

Paris.—Two young soldiers belonging to an infantry regiment have been sentenced to death by the court martial sitting at Le Mans. On the second Sunday in October these men, whose names are Tisseau and Nolot, murdered under extremely shocking circumstances an old farm woman who had treated them in a most hospitable manner.

They wanted money for their amusements, and, arriving about noon at the house they asked the old woman, who was alone, to give them some refreshment, a request with which she willingly complied. As they were eating Mme. Luceau talked to them about her husband, who had fought in the war of 1870, and said that he was expecting the medal for it.

She went to a wardrobe, took from it some documents which she and the veteran treasured, showed them with pride to the two soldiers, and then they spoke of the heroism which had been displayed by the French troops.

So indignant was the colonel who presided at the trial when all this was related that he exclaimed, "So you who were wearing the uniform of the army, had no pity on this poor woman?"

"No," replied Nolot, "the conversation had even made us forget our project, and we were going to leave empty-handed when Tisseau reminded me with a glance that we had to

march." The soldiers shook hands with their hostess as they bade her farewell, a fact which evoked another emphatic protest from the president. Then the narrative of the crime was continued. Nolot said:

"First of all I took the woman's head under my arm and threw her down. She only said, 'I am not rich, but I do not kill me. I will give you everything I have.' She got up and then Tisseau threw her down again and made a sign to me, 'Taking a thick stick, which he held out to me, I said, 'Oh, we must have done with this!' and I struck one blow, which was enough. Then we searched the wardrobe and left with seventeen francs, which we shared as we went along."

"You certainly hit hard," remarked the president, and, undoing a parcel he added, "Look, here are some bits of your victim's skull." The two young soldiers hung their heads and did not utter a word. In the course of the trial it transpired that the two men, whose antecedents were the reverse of respectable and who had been in the habit of bragging about them to their comrades, had previously contemplated the murder of another old woman dwelling in a lonely farmhouse, and also of a wealthy citizen residing at Le Mans, as well as the burglary of a jeweler's establishment at La Fleche, winding up with a plan for the murder of a corporal in their company, with whom they were on friendly terms, in order to obtain possession of his savings bank book, the plan being that they should hide his corpse and spread a report that he had deserted. The verdict of the court martial was unanimous.

WOODROW WILSON'S CONCEPTION OF DUTY

"Now that the Wilson-Harvey-Watterson controversy has been boiled down to its essentials, it is clear that Governor Wilson will let no 'obligation' for political support override his judgment and conception of duty." What is Governor Wilson's "conception of duty"? He took an oath of office as Governor of New Jersey a year ago and since then he has been drawing a salary from the State at the rate of \$833.33 a month. At least two-thirds of his time as Governor he has spent out of the State seeking the Presidential nomination, and the remaining third, spent in the State, has no doubt been given largely to conferences and correspondence having the same end in view. Mr. Wilson became Governor knowing little or nothing about the State, its government and its institutions. If he were to give ten hours a day to his duties, at the end of his three-year term he would be none too well acquainted with the State's affairs. Not only are there many serious problems in the State pressing for solution to-day, but there are the insane asylums, prisons and reformatories, schools for the blind, the deaf and dumb, epileptic village, tuberculosis sanatorium, tenement and factory departments and a number of other departments and institutions in which all the people of the State are interested, which should receive the careful study and attention of the Governor. Is Mr. Wilson living up to his oath of office? Is he giving the people of New Jersey a square deal? His "conception of duty!" He could take Senator Smith's money to be elected Governor, but rejects with press-agency accompaniment, Mr. Ryan's money to be elected President. He rejects Mr. Ryan's money but asks to be pensioned on Andrew Carnegie's. And yet this is the sort of thing that seems to be admired by people of that type of mind who can find sympathetic sentiment in "The News."—The Newark Evening News.

BARE BACKS LASHED IN ZERO WEATHER

Delaware Convicts With Bodies Nearly Nude Tied to Arms of Cross.

Wilmington, Del.—With arms tied to the extended arms of a cross and with backs bared to the zero gale, two men were mercilessly lashed in the courtyard of the county workhouse here today as part payment of the toll the state exacts for their crimes.

John Brewington received 40 lashes with a cat-o-nine-tails, in addition to which he will serve two years in

state's prison for highway robbery. Arthur Johnson received 20 lashes and will serve one year for larceny.

Each wore a heavy blanket wrapped about his neck—but his back was nude. The prisoners' hands were encased in gloves as their extended arms were lashed to the cross—but the winds bit and the snow pelted against their naked backs.

Brewington was whipped first. The back, blue from the cold, shivered and shook as the first blow of the strap fell, cutting nine bloody welts straight across. Ten times the scourge fell, straight down, and 90 livid welts showed on his quivering back. Then the warden changed position for the finish.

Johnson, nude to the waist, stood by all the while, shivering with cold and fright; involuntarily he braced himself as each landed on Brewington's shoulders as though he could feel the pain himself. Then, when Brewington's torture was ended, Johnson was led to the cross, pilloried and lashed.

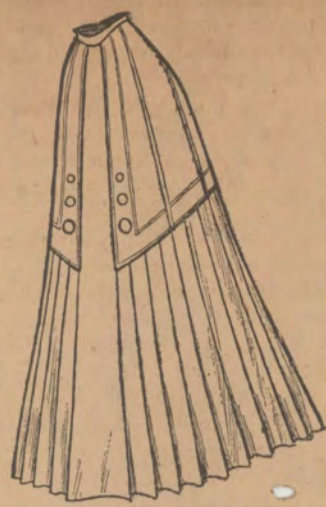

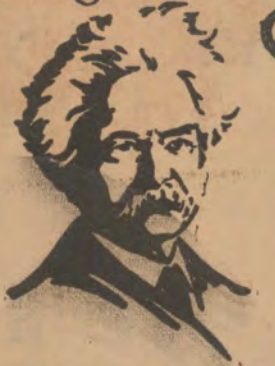
