FLORIDA CONGRESSMEN ARE WORKING TO BRING SOME RELICS OF "MAINE" HERE

Application Blanks Have
Been Sent Here To Be
Properly Filled Out

MAINE HEROES SLEEP HERE

Government Should Not Re-
quire City To Pay Expens-
es Of Transportation

Letters addressed to Dr. J. B. Maloney, president of the Chamber of Commerce were received yesterday in relation to having some relics of the Maine brought to this city. On February 24 Dr. Maloney sent night letters to a number of Congressmen in Washington.

Congressman Wm. F. Murray of Massachusetts acknowledges receipt of the letter and says in part, "I enclose herewith two blanks, one of which I shall be glad to receive from you after it has been properly filled out so that I may present it to the Secretary of the Navy on behalf of yourself and the citizens of Key West."

Senator Duncan U. Fletcher writes that he has taken the matter up with the Secretary of the Navy. He enclosed a clipping from the Washington Herald telling of the large demands for relics from the Maine.

Congressman Sparkman, replying to Dr. Maloney's request that he use his efforts to secure some relics for Key West, stated that he had received a similar request from Mr. Ben Leigh of this city which was laid before the Secretary of the Navy. He also suggested that it would be well if the (Dr. Maloney would act in conjunction with Mr. Leigh in the matter.

The application blanks which have been received here specify that the city getting these relics pay all costs of labor, transportation etc.

LIKES KEY WEST

C. C. Crampton of Danville, Va. was among those who could not get accommodations at the Jefferson last night. Mr. Crampton represents the Armco Mfg. Co. of Greenfield, O. He is down here on business and pleasure combined. He finds business conditions in Florida good.

"From Palm Beach down, there is a well-defined boom," said Mr. Crampton at last I found such. My orders have been splendid between Palm Beach and Key West, and from what I have learned coming down the East Coast I am looking for quite a good business in this town. They tell me that since the railroad was completed into Key West things are going to get a great move on. I don't see why they should not. Hundreds of towns in the United States and Canada owe not only their development, but their very existence to the railroad. I have no doubt but that Key West's population, as Mr. Flagler predicted, will double in 1922.

SEMPLE HAS THE APPLICATION

The application sent here by the Assistant Secretary of the Navy to be filled out requesting that a portion of the remains of the ill-fated battleship Maine be sent to Key West was received by Mr. Chas. J. Curry, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and was turned over to Mr. E. M. Semple to be properly filled out and mailed. Mr. Semple will send the application to the Navy Department in Washington and it is to be hoped that Key West will receive a portion of the ruins of this historic warship.

Florida—Florida Reefs—Southwest Part—Survey Beacons to be shown on charts.

Five beacons which were used as stations while survey work was in progress in this vicinity are still standing and will be shown on charts, as follows:

A white horizontally slatted tripod about 30 feet high. On North Cottrell Key about 1 1/2 miles 2400 40 minutes true (SW. by W. 1/4 W. mag.) from Northwest Passage Lighthouse.

Florida—West Coast—Egmont Key Light station—Intensity of Light to be increased, about May 1, 1912, by changing the illuminant from oil to incandescent oil vapor, increasing the intensity of the fixed white light from about 2,700 to about 15,000 candlepower and of the fixed red sectors from about 675 to about 4,500 candlepower.

Without other change. Florida—West Coast—Aacote Keys Light Station—Characteristics of Light to be changed, and intensity increased, about May 1, 1912, by changing light from flashing red to flashing white, and illuminant from oil to incandescent oil vapor, increasing the intensity of the flashing light from about 4,800 to about 133,000 candlepower, and of the partial eclipse from about 250 to about 5,600 candlepower. The present light is flashing red every 30 seconds; after the change it will be flashing white every 30 seconds, with partial eclipses.

AEROGRAMS OF MUCH VALUE TO SHIPPING

Cruiser Washington Has
Conducted Some Great
Experiments

The value of wireless telegraphy to the marine world has been proven beyond peradventure of a doubt. Since Jack Binns on the Republic sent his famous C. O. D. message, wireless has saved thousands of lives on sea and added to the comfort of thousands more.

Moreover, the functions of wireless have been increased. One use to which, perhaps at no far distant day, it may be put right here in Key West and the lighthouses hereabouts is that of signalling in time of fog.

In France they are already putting this idea into execution.

The minister of public works of France has decided upon the establishment of three wireless fog-signal stations to facilitate navigation at sea during thick or foggy weather. One of the stations is to be established at the "Creach d'Ouessant" light station, the second on the "He de Sein," and the third on "Le Havre" light vessel, 7 miles off Cape La Heve. Each of these stations is to send its own characteristic signal. With the Bellini Tosi compass, which enables the mariner to determine approximately the bearing of the wireless stations, the ship will be able to ascertain its position. (La Nature, July 29, 1911.)

The U. S. S. Washington, which vessel carried Secretary of State Knox from this port to Colon last week, conducted experiments in the vicinity of Nantuxet Shoals light vessel, last year to test the practicability of determining distance in a fog by the difference in time of arrival of signals sent at the same instant by wireless telegraph and by steam fog signal, and by submarine bell. At the temperature on this day sound travels 1,132 feet per second in air, 4,794 feet per second in water, and the wireless signals are transmitted practically instantaneously for moderate distances. The results of the test indicate the possibility of obtaining approximate distances by this method.

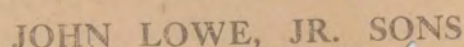

THE MAINE HEROES SHOULD BE HONORED

We understand that there is at present before the Cuban Congress a bill calling for an appropriation of approximately a quarter of a million dollars to erect a monument in Havana Harbor on the spot where the wrecked warship Maine lay, as a token of appreciation of the brave sailor boys who lost their lives there. This generous action on the part of the Cuban people will be highly appreciated in the United States, and it is to be hoped that our own government will honor the Maine's dead in an equally appropriate manner.

A number of the Maine's dead are buried in the city cemetery of Key West. Erected to their memory is a monument purchased by the citizens of this city. It would be but a deserved mark of respect and honor if our government would make a special appropriation to erect a monument in this city such as the Cuban government contemplates, to stand forever as a mark of the Republic's gratitude.

For nearly fourteen years many of those brave sailor lads have been sleeping beneath the sod in Key West, victims of the awful disaster which precipitated the Spanish-American war. It is time that Uncle Sam gave them such recognition as can be given the dead.

A PROFITABLE RUN THROWN UP

The action of the Southern Steamship Company in cutting out Key West as a port of call has created great surprise in this city in view of the fact that the line was doing a big business here and there was no apparent reason for this action. The following from the Miami Metropolis about expresses the sentiment:

As Key West is recognized as one of the most important points along the Atlantic coast, those acquainted with the commercial interests of the city can not understand why the Southern Steamship Company would take their steamer off so profitable a run. The steamers Algiers and Palmer have been making the run and have always done an enormous amount of business.

It is a really remarkable thing that a transportation company should cut out a port where it was doing a large and steadily increasing business, which indicates that there was some powerful reason for it. It is rumored that the Southern Steamship Line has been absorbed by the Mallory Line, though we have had no confirmation of this rumor. If the rumor is true, however, it will not be so difficult to see the reason for this discontinuance of the run here as these competing.

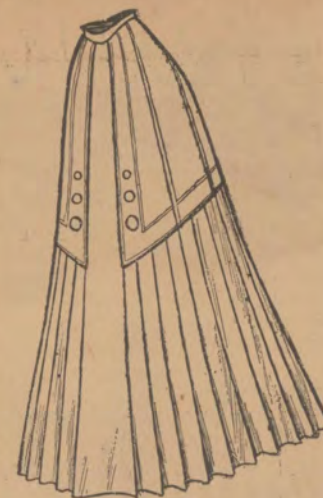

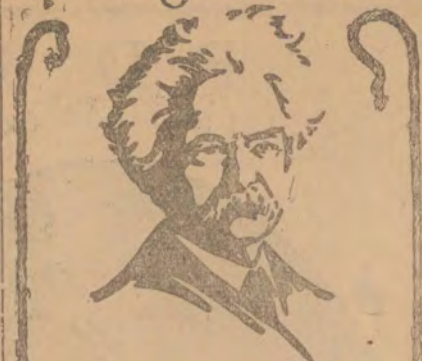

Conceding that all of these left-hand-
