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FIFTEEN NEGROES WERE KILLED IN BATTLE AT EL COBRE YESTERDAY

Several Skirmishes and an Engagement at El Cobre
Add Fifteen Names to the Rebels Death List
Decisive Battle Expected Hourly

AMERICAN FAMILIES REPORTED TO BE UNPROTECTED

Marines Landed to Protect American Mines—Race War Feared at Santiago de Cuba—Loyalty of the Negroes Joining Volunteers is Doubtful Very Much

Santiago de Cuba, June 12.—An engagement at El Cobre in which a large number of negroes are reported to have lost their lives, and several small skirmishes resulting in some fifteen deaths among the negroes, were the chief developments in Oriente today. The mayor of Santiago has gone to El Cobre to help identify the bodies.

The attack on the main body of rebels under Yvonet is expected hourly. He is believed to be surrounded. Lieutenant Consuegra reported today that he had arrived at Cayá Mambi and that Lieutenant Rodríguez, chief of the station at Sagua de Tanamo, had telephoned him that Yvonet with 400 men was very near. Lieutenant Consuegra added that he had received other advice regarding the whereabouts of Yvonet and believed that he would locate him quickly and force an engagement. In the meanwhile, Captain Iglesias is rapidly advancing from the interior and it is hoped that the two bodies of federal troops will be able to trap the rebel leader.

Secretary García Kahly and Colonel Martí have returned here from Guantanamo. Secretary Kahly expressed himself as pleased with conditions as he had found them. Fifty-six American marines were landed today at Felton to protect the mines belonging to Americans there.

Eight American families at Bayate are reported without protection. They are said to be worn out keeping guard night and day. It is said that they are fired on nightly from the dense forests.

Considerable comment has been caused here by the report that a guerrilla who had cut off the ears of one of the negroes killed in a fight, had been shot by order of his troop commander.

The feeling between the whites and negroes is so bitter here that it is feared that there may occur a clash between them at any time. The government, however, has taken every possible precaution to guard against an uprising.

Major Figueroa has reported to General Montenegro that the so-called "Brigadier General" Curruno was attacked yesterday and that three negroes were killed and four were taken prisoner. The four prisoners tried to escape and were also killed.

Captain Estrada has telegraphed General Montenegro that Corporal Rodríguez had found a negro revolver wounded near Arroyo Blanco. As his band was escorting the negro to town they were attacked by a negro band. The wounded negro and two of his attacking party were killed.

Major Collazo has reported to these headquarters from Santa Clara province, that a band of forty men under his command encountered a band of ten or twelve men in the Santa Amalia farm yesterday. Four men were killed and guns and machines were captured.

General Mendietta telegraphed that a group of federal soldiers under Sergeant Latoro surprised and killed five negroes near San Luis.

General Menocal has received a telegram from President Gomez accepting his services and telling him to begin the organization of his forces as quickly as possible.

A commission headed by the mayor of Santiago called on General Montenegro and expressed the fear that the government was making a mistake in arming negroes who wished to join the volunteers. The general replied that he did not doubt the loyalty of the negroes to whom he was supplying arms.

MIAMI IS CLEARING OUT THE GAMBLERS

Alleged Gamblers are Nabbed by Sheriff While in Their Room

Warrant was issued for Eugene Porter this morning by Sheriff Dan Hardie as the result of a raid made last night about 10 o'clock on the notorious gambling house at the corner of Ninth street and Avenue D.

Sheriff Hardie had received letters from mothers and wives of men who were frequenting the den, asking him to use his best efforts to put the establishment out of existence, and after observing things for a while, last night decided to put an end to it.

Shortly before 9 o'clock Sheriff Hardie went up Avenue D to the neighborhood of Ninth street. Stopping beneath the awning of the building across from the Porter bicycle shop, he waited and watched. When he believed the time to be ripe for the raid he approached the door of the bicycle shop, and upon seeing a dark figure inside, demanded entrance.

On reaching the interior of the first floor, he found a young boy named Masters, acting as lookout. Knowing there was a push button he kept close watch on the boy and gave him no opportunity to give the alarm.

The sheriff then proceeded to the rear of the building, which is separated with a partition and then divided again. To the right he noticed the push button and while attempting to enter the passageway that led up stairs, he heard the men coming down.

As one of the company, the sheriff mingled with the men, remembering with remarkable accuracy each and every name, and it was not until the front door was reached, that they found out the identity of the visitor.

The sheriff had his men, but he wanted to explore the rooms where the game was played. Ascending the stairway he noticed the windows had been boarded up to keep all light from shining out.

In this room Sheriff Hardie found tables, booze, cards, fans, and everything that is needed to complete such an establishment. Trap doors and additional partitions served as barricades and everything was fixed up for the business.

Looking over the collection of gambling paraphernalia this morning, the sheriff exclaimed: "They certainly weren't holding a prayer-meeting anyway."

Sheriff Hardie has known of the existence of the establishment for several weeks, but the owners had arranged everything so tricky that it was hard for him to get in the right position to obtain the evidence needed to make the arrests.—Miami Metropolis.

Note—It is a shame that our officers do not do something in this direction. The columns of this paper have been open to the sheriff of this county for a long time for the purpose of telling the people of the many arrests and convictions he has made of the gambling element of this city during his term of office, but he is silent as a clam. NAVY PREPARING FOR A LONG STAY OF BATTLESHIPS IN THE WATERS

Collier Hector Loading at Hampton Roads Will Sail Monday for Key West—Collier Celtic Will Sail From Boston in a Few Days for Guantanamo

GUNBOAT PETREL HAS SAILED UNDER SEALED ORDERS

Destination is Thought to be Key West—American Consul in Santa Clara Reports Conditions Serious—There Will be no More Ships Sent to Havana Cuba

Washington, June 12.—The rumors that the Cuban government fostered the present insurrection for its political effect continue to circulate here. It is impossible to find any official confirmation, however.

Officers of the navy department declared today that the policing of Cuba would be a long task. They consider that the American warships are assured of a long stay in Cuban waters and will furnish a coal supply adequate for many weeks.

The collier Hector will leave Hampton Roads for Key West today. The collier Celtic will sail from Boston in a few days, probably being despatched direct to Guantanamo.

The gunboat Petrel sailed from New Orleans under sealed orders today. It is considered likely that she is on her way to Guantanamo, although she may stop at Key West.

Dispatches from the American legation in Havana today were optimistic. Minister Beaupre thinks the uprising in Oriente will be short-lived. He also informs the state department that General Yvonet, the negro leader, with 700 men is reported to be surrounded near Sagua de Tanamo.

According to information reaching the state department, disturbances continue in Santa Clara province. The American consul there reports that conditions are serious.

The Guantanamo and Western railroad reports that the negroes have burned the railroad station, stores and dwellings at Carrera and the town of Palmar.

The American marines are apparently having an effect in preventing outrages and quieting the situation. The advice from estates on which they are doing guard duty report that everything is peaceful.

The American Fruit Company's representative at Salma complains that the Cuban government is making no effort to protect their property.

It is reported that the gunboat Nashville has landed machines at Woodford for the protection of the Spanish-American Iron company's property there.

The absence of fresh outbreaks in Havana has convinced the state department that the measures already taken in sending warships and warships will be sufficient to show the Cubans that it is the purpose of the United States government to maintain order. It has been decided to send no additional naval forces to Cuba unless unexpected developments arise.

The navy department plans to keep in touch with the Cuban situation by wireless. Dispatches from the ships at Havana and eastern Cuba will be received by the stations in the United States and forwarded to Washington.

The first division of the Atlantic fleet, which has been held at Hampton Roads, will now resume the interrupted maneuvers. Admiral Flske will remain at Key West with two warships in case of emergency.

MURMURS OF REVOLUTION HAVE REACHED KEY WEST

Cuban Negro Shot in Foot Yesterday Afternoon By Loyal Malatto

Evaristo Alfonso, a Cuban cigar maker, shot Disdiero Sola, a colored Cuban, who is also a cigar maker, in the left foot yesterday afternoon about 2:30 in front of the Cortez Cigar factory, where both men are employed.

The trouble between the two men is a result of the revolution in Cuba, and is said to have been brewing for several days. It seems that Alfonso, who is said to be a mulatto, had taken a stand for the administration in Cuba, and was being severely criticized by several of the colored Cuban colony in this city, among whom was Sola.

At a preliminary hearing before Judge Gunn yesterday afternoon the testimony of the two men differed very widely. Alfonso claiming that Sola attempted to cut him with a razor, and that he shot in self-defense, while Sola claims that Alfonso so was fully ten feet away from him when he pulled his gun, and that he (Sola) had no weapon of any kind on him. Sam Collins, who arrested Alfonso, testified that he had found a razor near the place where the shooting occurred.

Alfonso was bound over to criminal court under a bond of \$250.

MANY CITIES SUFFER FROM HEAVY RAINS

Damage to Florida's Crops Will Exceed Half Million Dollars

Information received by The Tribune from its correspondents in various sections of South Florida indicate that the continued down pour of rain and the high water which had resulted, has damaged crops and other interests not less than half a million dollars.

In many places much land that was thought to have been thoroughly drained is inundated, drowning out crops of tender vegetables and making the land unworkable. Even higher land that is ordinarily dry and needs irrigation to be productive, is wet and unworkable.

In the Fort Myers section and in Pinellas there is much damage reported. The lakes of Polk county are reported to be rising, their levels being several inches above the usual water line.

Railroad Beds Crumble. The continued downpour is causing great expense to the railroads in the territory and in some instances the section gangs are unable to cope with the crumbling roadbeds.

The Fort Myers division of the Atlantic Coast Line is in bad condition between Punta Gorda and Fort Myers, while the Charlotte Harbor & Northern has a hole in it between Mulberry and Arcadia. By combining the two roads, Boca Grande people are able to get to Tampa, coming to Arcadia by Charlotte Harbor and transferring there to the Coast Line.

Roads to the north are not reporting so much damage although in the immediate vicinity of Tampa the roadbeds are being carefully inspected several times a day.—Tampa Tribune.

It is as a babe, a newborn babe lying still in a cradle, that I picture her.

And what is she like, this little girl, I wonder; this little girl who means so much to him; so dear to me? Does she lie there plump or puny, brown or lily-fair, serene or wailful? And the cot she lies in, is it lace-bedecked, beribboned, hung with curtains of fair white dimity? Or stands it bare and rudely fashioned of the twopenny banana box?

But be she pauper or princess, I will not cavil. In memory of that other babe born in the stable, that other babe worshiped of princes, I welcome the daughter-in-law of the palace, of the barn.

Yet these things are but trifles. I, too, am the worldly mother. For, princess or pauper, I would have my son's wife well-born. I would have her forebears people of honor, of refinement. I would have this, although I know that each new generation brings a new opportunity. Humanity is a compound and not a mixture. The elements fused together yield an issue strange and unaccountable. While there is life there is surely hope! And yet—and yet—O little unknown daughter-in-law, may you have been discreet in your choice of parents! May you, at least, have found a mother who loves you; indeed, it is the common, foolish wont of mothers. May you have found a father who is a gentleman to you, whatever he be called otherwise!

But the little girl in her cradle has already arranged her past. Blameless or sinful, it is already there. What use is it for me to speculate? What use is it for me to think of her at all? I throw she never thinks of me. She never thinks of her possessions that I guard so carefully; the silver tea service at the bank in its soft tissue wrappings; the family's sole diamond ring. She does not think of such things; she does not care. Yet could I show them to her, she would gurggle joyously. In her baby eyes their shine and sparkle would seem fair.

And perchance when she doth realize her treasures she will no longer prize them. For my son's wife may be an artist, deeming crude valuables distinctive of the loathed Philistine; or a learned lady despising gauds and baubles; or a little socialist, happily certain that in universal earthware lies the cure of human ill. Yes; methinks my son's wife will be a socialist. Daughter-in-law, I will respect your scruples; I will admire your noble discontent. You shall meet the silver tea service; you shall sell it, and print therefrom pamphlets, many pamphlets, to reform the wicked plutocrat.

But although my son's wife may deem silver teapots worthless, although she may consider pearls more fitly cast before swine, yet there is one possession I am guarding that she will hold very precious, one belonging that awaits her for which she will surely care.

Then, it is of this that I shall tell her, this one thing of importance. I prate of silver services when I should describe my son. Tall I see him for his years, his two years; as he plays on the sward before me; tall and exceedingly sturdy. His eyes are brown, but his hair curls goldenly. (Little girl, are you not glad with me that his hair curls goldenly?) Strong he is, and merry. When he hurts himself he cries but seldom. Rarely is he vexed. What else is there to tell about him? Ah, see, he runs towards me with his arms outstretched.

But perchance my unknown daughter-in-law will feel that filial piety concerns her not. Perchance she may resent it. And yet it is a desirable quality. All the things that I have told her are desirable qualities; they should tend to make a happy wife. For two years this son hath brought his mother more happiness than she had ever known. Is it not, then, probable that he will one day bring joy unto his wife? Little daughter-in-law, I pray that my son may give to you as great a peace, as great a comfort as he hath given me. I pray, although in truth the prayer is more for my son's sake than for yours, since you are yet a stranger to me—Oh, may my son come unto his wife as unspotted as he came to me. May he be pure in heart when he enters upon his second birth, the birth of the new dual life! May he always, and whatever befall him, never cease in seeing God!

KEY WEST'S FUTURE.

There was a time, and not so long ago, when things moved sedately along in Key West, and all was well. Before the coming of the parallel lines of steel across the water between this city and Knights Key, the people of this little island were content to let things move along in their own quiet way. But things have changed now. The first blast of a locomotive's whistle on Trumbo awoke the island city from its long sleep; and in that first dawn of the city's awakening, prospects looked bright from Key West. Thousands of people who had never been here before came to see the city; magazines and metropolitan newspapers devoted pages of space to "the nearest American port to Panama." Key West was the talk of the nation, and it looked as if the march of progress could not be checked. But, viewed in the cold light of the after-dawn the facts are that it has been checked. Six months ago we were going to have a big hotel ready for this winter's tourists—what are the prospects for that hotel now? Everywhere men talked of the Greater Key West, the city that was to be built after the railroad came. But what are those same men talking now?

It is mighty easy to talk—to tell how things ought to be done and all that, but it is an entirely different matter when one comes to DO things. The thing that is wrong in Key West is just this: There is not the concerted action that is necessary when things are going to be done. It's all right to talk—a certain amount of that is essential, but then we must do something more than talk. If we are going to make of Key West what it was hoped would be made a few months ago, we are going to have to GET BUSY doing it or the opportunity will have passed, and the second state of what promises to be an important center will be worse than the first.

There is one peculiarity about a good per cent of the business men of this city. They KNOCK Key West at every opportunity offered them; walk into their place of business and begin to talk about the prospects here and they immediately begin to hammer away. And the really astonishing thing about it is that there are numbers of men here who are doing that very thing every day. Why they do it, or what benefit they think their city will derive from it, I can't imagine; but nevertheless they do it. If a city is good enough for a man to live in and carry on his business in, it ought to be good enough for him to boost and boost every time an opportunity is presented. And if the opportunity doesn't present itself often enough, go out and make opportunities to boost it.

Key West is all right. The possibilities are here, and opportunity is knocking at the city's gates. But what we need is about half a dozen men with life enough in them to interest about half a million dollars for Key West. We need that much money for building hotels and other things here and we need it this fall. If we had a Chamber of Commerce that would go after things as it ought, this city would have the outside walls of a skyscraper hotel completed right now. In other cities the Chamber of Commerce DOES THINGS. The Secretary has some life in him and he is backed up by the business men of the city. If Key West ever gets anything, it matters not what it is, she is going to have to do the same thing other cities do—GO AFTER IT.

Now, what are we going to do? Are we going back into our long sleep, or are we going to grasp the opportunities as they present themselves and GO AFTER THINGS?

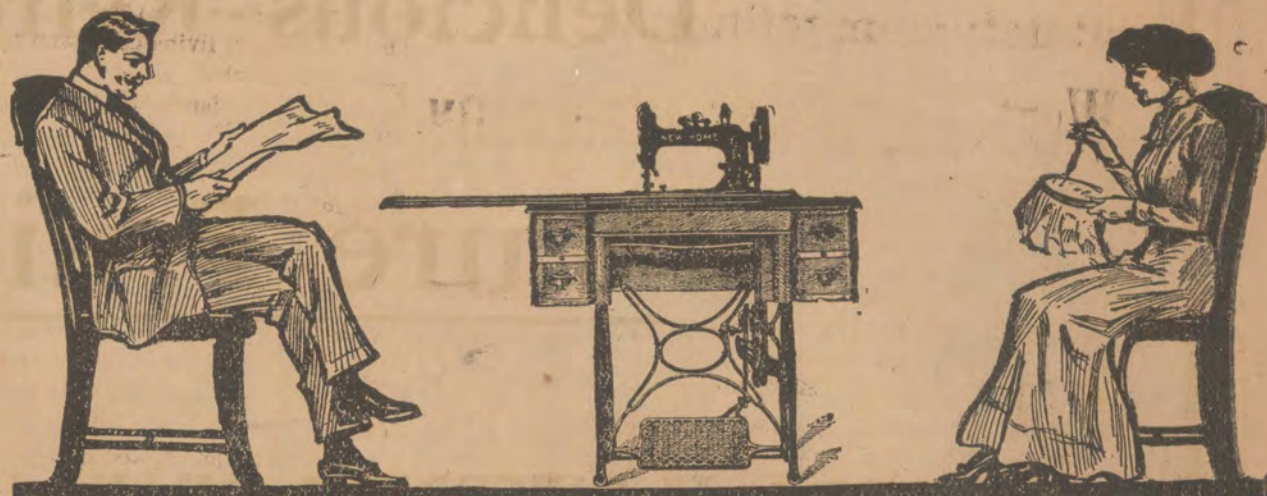

Wage Earners

Should Seek
Largest Income
From Labor

By CHARLES L. BAINE

NO ORDINARY wage earner can save enough to escape from the wage-earning class. If by the ordinary wage earner we mean the average wage earner then we are dealing with a general average wage of considerably less than \$12 per week for the fifty-two weeks in the year.

The present cost of bare necessities of life prohibits the saving of any considerable amount from the meager wages of the average wage earner. Certainly he cannot save enough in his prime to maintain himself in his old age. This would be true of those without family responsibilities, while average wage earner with a family to support can save nothing at all unless the standard of living of the family is reduced to meet advancing living costs, and then only a small sum which a brief sickness will absorb.

It is the families of the wage earners that populate the country. Wealthy families are not usually noted for large numbers of children. The wage earner's family must be supported before there can be any saving for the future, and when that is done there can be little or nothing left. Our large savings bank deposits as a rule belong to persons who are not in the wage-earning class.

Some wage earners follow trades that are highly skilled and exceptionally well paid. It is possible for some of these to save a portion of their wages, but it should be noted that these are extraordinary wage earners, and even among these none of them may hope to escape the wage earning class by saving alone.

A young man asked a prominent American statesman how to acquire riches, and the answer was: "Put yourself in a position to profit by the labor of other people."

The wage earner who escapes from the wage-earning class does this. His savings are used as the basis of speculation or investment, which, if successful, yields him a profit on the labor of other people.

If the wage earner builds himself a home he is gratifying the home-owning instinct, but if he couples with it a tenement to rent he is developing the desire of the capitalist to profit by the labor of other people.

It is well for the ordinary wage earner to be prudent and to save what he can, but not with the idea of escaping thereby from the wage-earning class, lest his wings be singed by the flame.

The ordinary wage earner will do well to give more effort to improve the condition of the wage-earning class through trade union work and less to an attempt to escape from the wage-earning class by an unsuccessful imitation of the methods of capital.

All wage earners should seek the largest income from their own labor rather than to seek to profit by the labor of their fellows.

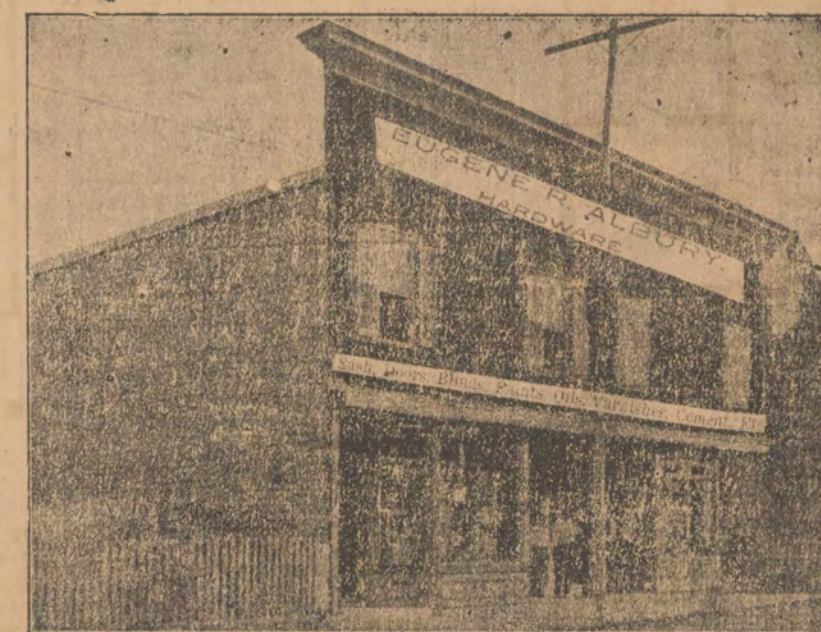

IDEAS FOR HOME BUILDERS

BY WM. A. RADFORD.

There are perhaps more square houses built in the Middle West than houses of any other style or design. By "square houses" is meant houses with plain, straight sides and square corners, in which the width nearly or quite equals the length. "Rectilinear," perhaps, would be a more accurate term, but that does not convey an impression of the square appearance that such houses have.

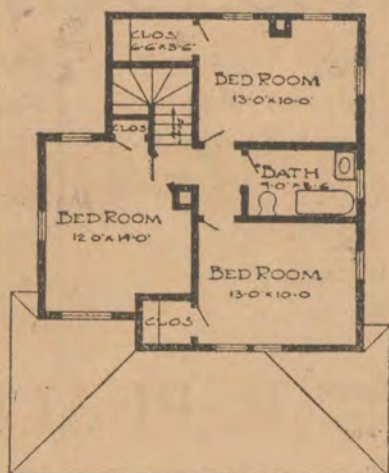
Economy in building and economy in heating, both have their influence. Houses of the "square" type range from 22 by 28 feet to 30 by 36 feet in size, and they contain from six to eight rooms—seldom less than six and seldom more than eight. They are built either full two stories, with an attic; or like this one, with some of the windows elevated above the eaves to admit light to the upper rooms.

This particular house is one of six rooms, 26 feet wide and about 27 feet 6 inches from front to rear. It is a very economical house to build. It is all plain, straight work, except the dormer windows; and these are as plain as they can be and still look well.

Such houses are so easily built that a great many of them are put up in country places without architectural plans; but that is, generally speaking, a mistake. Good working drawings are so cheap nowadays that no one can afford to take chances on haphazard work. You can always recognize houses that have been built after the ideas of a local carpenter, just the same as you can spot a suit of homemade clothes by the amateur expression that smiles at you when you see them. They may contain the best of material put together in a good, solid way; but when the job is done, it lacks the stamp of finished excellence

in building a house it pays to investigate the new things, both by reading and by observation. You can always find a new house that contains some of the fashionable ideas, ideas that are popular, the ideas that up-to-date architects like to work into their designs. Some of these are very attractive and add very much to the appearance of a house, while others are simply suitable to go with certain combinations. The owner is the one most vitally interested; but a little advice from a successful architect goes a long way, and lasts a long time afterwards. You don't build a house every year. It pays to be careful.

Long years of experience in building medium-priced houses has demonstrated a few facts that everyone

should know. For the health of the family, you must have good drainage, sufficient ventilation, and an abundance of sunshine. In the face of modern invention, every new house should be piped for gas and for hot and cold water, and wired for electricity. Every house should contain provision for comfortable, easy heating; and every house should have a good bathroom. These things are essential, both for health and for comfort; to neglect them means to regret it as long as you live in the house. Other things

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The building of small cottage houses has lately assumed the dignity of an art. Adjacent to large cities are suburbs that may be reached by surface trolley roads; and in the vicinity of all the larger cities are outlying residence sections where steam roads make a specialty of carrying city workers back and forth at very low fares.

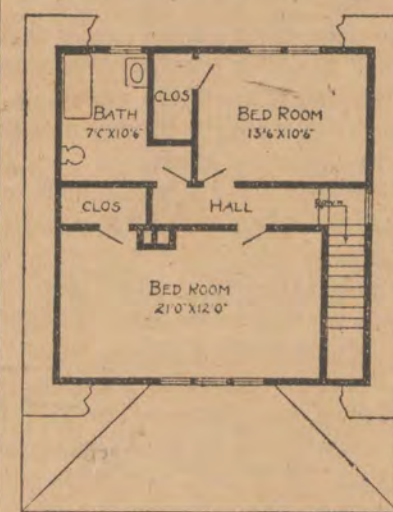
Usually the prices of suburban lots range from \$400 to \$1,500, including sidewalks and sewers. There are lots for more money, and there are lots for less money than these figures stipulate; but they are not in active demand. You can't get something for nothing; and when the price is exorbitant, sales are few. Prices vary a great deal in different parts of the country. There are suburbs where \$1,000 lots have all the civic improvements, including gas and pavement; while in other places you are lucky if you get a good-sized lot having sewer connection with the privilege of building your own roadways and sidewalks. But for those who are tired of living in cramped, badly ventilated quarters in the city, there is suburban relief if they are willing to put up with a few minor inconveniences in exchange for the greater comforts of pure air, bright sunshine, a lovely garden with beautiful flowers, and which is better than all the rest—an opportunity to secure perfect health.

The two little cottages represented were designed especially for newly married people who wish to commence life under the best social conditions open to them on a salary such as the ordinary clerk or office man receives.

The first cottage is a little square box of a house, 25 feet 6 inches in

jection from the dining room adds a great deal to the appearance, whether it is used for a seat, or for a built-in sideboard. It is useful and looks well in either capacity. This little cottage is supposed to have a good cellar and a hot-air furnace for heating. It is so small that the grate in the living room and the range in the kitchen will keep it comfortable, except during the colder winter months, so that the coal bill will not be very heavy.

The living room is a fine, big, attractive room. It is worth very careful attention at the stairway end. There are possibilities of building a comfortable cozy nook under the turn of the stair, with a hood over it which will add greatly to its appearance as well as its comfort. A seat placed by

the side of an open stair is draughty unless protected in some way. You don't want a door to shut off the draught, because you wouldn't like the looks of it, and because one great value of an open stair is the service it renders in the way of ventilation. There is always a current of air going up or down. The air goes up when the air in the living room is warmer than the air upstairs, and this may

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One of the most economical six-room cottages ever built is represented in this design. It is 20 feet in width by 38 feet in length, with both porches built into the main frame. The layout of the rooms is well liked by most people; in fact, it is a very popular house, both for looks and for convenience, besides making a very cozy, comfortable home at a moderate cost.

On the first floor we have a good living room, 12 feet square, and a splendid dining room several feet larger. The living room is entirely shut off from the other part of the house—which is considered a great advantage by some housekeepers.

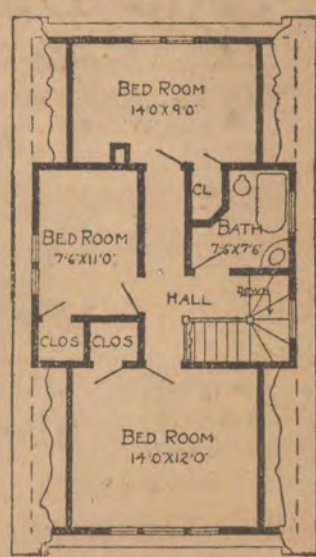
Economy also is adhered to in building the stair. The cheapest way to get upstairs is to build the steps between two partitions; and it is a very satisfactory arrangement, too, especially where you can have a window at bottom and another at the top for light, as we have in this case.

It will be noticed that economy is the prevailing idea all through the house—not parsimony, but pure, simple, straightforward economy. In the first place it is a straight-sided, right-angled plan, high enough at the side for the first story only, the upper rooms being made entirely in the roof. Of course the curb in the roof is necessary; in fact, that is the principal difference in the outside dimensions from the ordinary cottage roof. This house would be too small above for anything but an attic without the curb or gambrel in the roof.

The prevailing fashion at present is to have plenty of windows, and it is a good fashion. Nothing adds more to the comfort of a house than to have

burlap or some tufted material; if tufted, it should match the cushion on the seat; and as to colors, it should also match the carpet or rug on the floor. The tufted material may reach clear to the ceiling, or it may reach only to the picture molding.

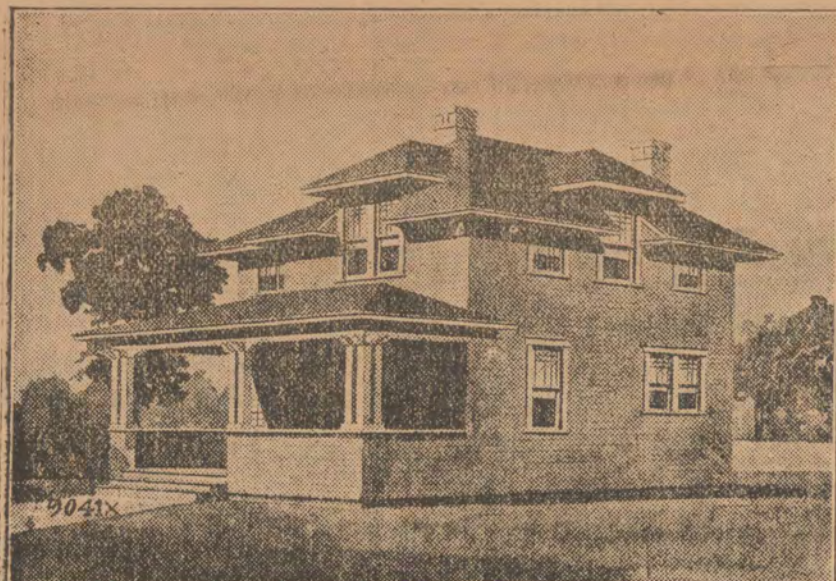
A very neat, cozy arrangement is to have a wide shelf above the seat, about six feet from the floor. Then you carry the tufted material up to the shelf, and across underneath, to a neat finish on the outer edge. Above the shelf have cupboards fitted with doors and shelves for books. The only chair in this little room then should be one of those step-ladder chairs that open up when you want to



Second Floor Plan.

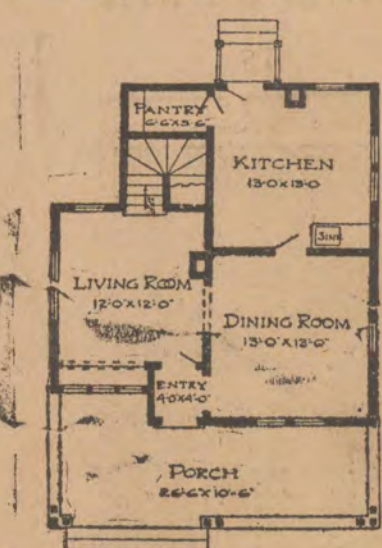
climb up to reach something overhead.

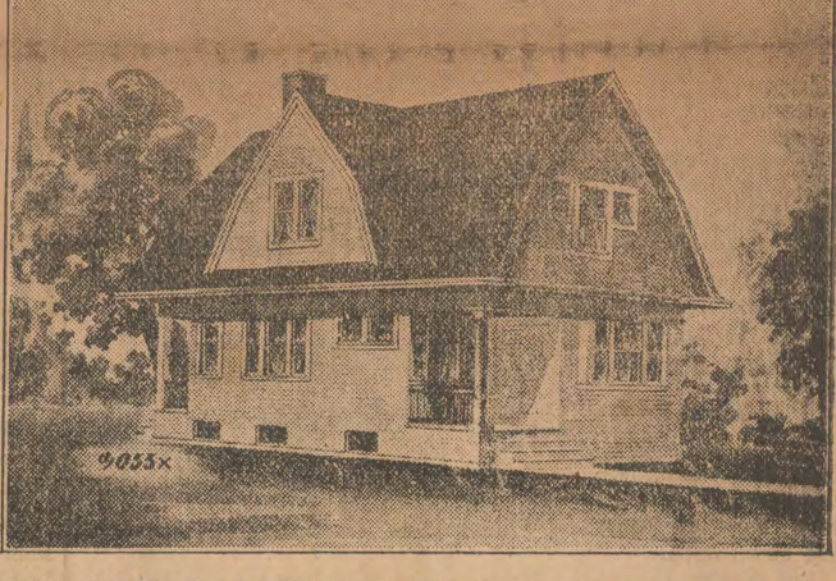

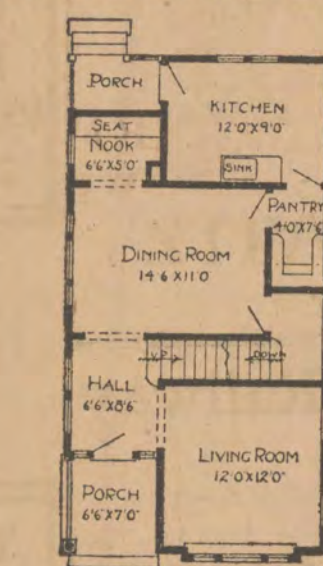
First Floor Plan.

The undersigned and such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them as stockholders, do hereby associate themselves together for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the laws of Florida, in accordance with this proposed charter, and hereby adopt these articles of incorporation.

ARTICLE 1.

The name of this corporation shall be KEY WEST WHARF & COAL COMPANY, and its principal place of business shall be in the City of Key West, County of Monroe, State of Florida, but it may establish branches in other places in the United States, or foreign countries, whenever and wherever deemed necessary or expedient.

ARTICLE 2.

The general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted by said corporation shall be to buy, sell and convey, purchase, acquire, hold, charter, lease, mortgage, hypothecate, repair, remodel, rebuild and otherwise own, manage, and dispose of wharves and wharf property, warehouses, docks, tanks and storage facilities of every kind steamships, sailing vessels and other floating property and other real and personal property including chattels and choses in action; to dispatch, load, unload, disburse and act as agent for all kinds of vessels but not to use the said means of transportation for the purpose of doing the business of a common carrier, and to receive profits and tolls therefrom; to insure storage and warehouse receipts; to do a general sponge business in all its branches to conduct and carry on a general brokerage, shipping and commission business in and about any and all the matters and things herein, including a custom house brokerage business; to handle, care, receive and dispose of consignments of vessels and any other personal property; to conduct a wholesale and retail coal, water, lumber, naval stores, and general merchandise business; to buy, sell, own, mortgage, lease, and pledge lands within the State of Florida or elsewhere; to advance and loan money upon securities of land, personal property, commercial paper, steamships,

sailing vessels, cargoes, materials from vessels and upon other floating property in the purchase, sale, management and disposition of real estate in the State of Florida and elsewhere; to take and hold real and personal estate in trust, to borrow money and secure the same and to secure moneys otherwise owing by mortgages, deeds, bonds, or other obligations therefor; to improve real estate by building, constructing thereon or removing thereto stores, residences, warehouses, docks, wharves, mills, factories or structures of any kind whatsoever; to have such improvements constructed by contract or to make and erect them otherwise and to purchase or manufacture all materials therefor and market the surplus; to issue bonds or other obligations of the corporation in payment of property purchased or acquired by it or for any other lawful object in or about this business; to act as attorney in fact, agent, broker or factor for any person, firm or corporation in any part of the world and generally to do any or all acts and things which may be beneficial or profitable to the corporation or which may be necessary and expedient to accomplish the objects and purposes of the corporation and to do any and all things usual or incident to corporations organized under the laws of the State of Florida.

CONTESTED DELEGATES SWINGING TO PRES. TAFT

Taft Gets One Hundred Contested Delegates--Roosevelt Gets One

Chicago, June 12.—The Taft steam roller, the converted Roosevelt crusher, proceeded on its relentless way today and when the evening fell over the room in convention hall where the republican national committee is hearing contests, the Taft column totalled exactly 100 of the 222 contested delegates. The Roosevelt column received its first accession, the total now standing at 1.

The Taft managers are jubilant declaring that the election of their candidate on the first ballot is assured. They assert that they will win just as many of the 120 remaining contested delegates as they want. They will probably allow a few of the contests to be decided in favor of Roosevelt to soften his chagrin in a measure and try to make it appear that the steam roller is not altogether a juggernaut. They pointed out facetiously today that Roosevelt was a 100 to 1 shot.

The contested 18 votes from Kentucky were decided today, Taft getting 17 and Roosevelt 1. This is Roosevelt's first victory. Taft has already won all the contests in Arkansas, Florida, Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, and Indiana.

OLYMPIC RUNNERS CHOSEN.

New York, June 12.—Ten distance runners who will represent the United States in the Olympic games at Stockholm were the first athletes passed by the Olympic selection committee, which met here today.
