Crude Oil Found Here Is Claim Of Expert

MCREA AGAIN TAKES UP FIGHT AGAINST LEASING SYSTEM

COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE DECLARES PRACTICE ABOMINABLE — LEGISLATION AGAINST SYSTEM TO BE ASKED IN APRIL—GOVERNOR HARDEE FAVORS ABOLITION OF SYSTEM

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 20.—Commissioner of Agriculture McRea again took up the cudgel against the county convict leasing system. The abolition of the system has been sought by McRea in every legislature since he took office.

Letters were mailed from his office to civic and women's organizations throughout the state calling attention to what the commissioner described as "abominable" practice of leasing the county convicts and asking the legislature in April to be urged to halt the practice.

Governor Hardee is known to be favorable to abolition of the system.

WILL BE HERE FOR THREE DAYS' STAY

DIRECTOR OF INTERNATIONAL ROTARY ON OFFICIAL VISIT TO CITY

W. A. BRADEN, OIL EXPERT OF TERRE HAUTE, IND., AFFIRMS OIL FOUND ON CURRY PROPERTY, IN HEART OF CITY, IS FINE QUALITY OF CRUDE LUBRICANT

MR. CURRY DIGS ANOTHER WELL AND OBTAINS WATER

Late yesterday afternoon work was started on the digging of another well at the front of Mr. Curry's premises, at a distance of approximately 35 feet from the well from which oil is being pumped, and at noon today a depth of 24 feet had been reached, and clear, clean water obtained.

H. Collins, a guest at the Casa Marina hotel, and connected with the Kentucky oil fields, visited the well today and gives the statement that the find is crude oil, but that he cannot determine the quantity to be obtained.

No effort has been made by Mr. Curry to dig any further since the work was stopped several days ago, when a flint rock was struck by the driller and after working continually for four hours, the driller made no impression on the rock.

Mr. Curry stated to a representative of The Citizen today that he now feels satisfied that there is oil on his property, but as to the quantity he cannot determine. He is awaiting the arrival of several more oil experts who are expected to arrive here within several days.

A phenomenal strike of oil, is the verdict of an oil expert who has investigated the local oil situation and his opinion goes to strengthen the opinion held by Chas. A. Curry and his associates since the first discovery.

That the pronouncement of the gentleman is having its effect is seen from the crowds of excited people who are gathered about the premises of Mr. Curry, a crowd that does not lessen in numbers at any time of the day. The people are excited over oil and getting the more so with the passing hours.

Verdict of Oil Expert

W. A. Braden, of Terre Haute, Indiana, an oil expert of years standing, and who has experience in the oil fields of Oklahoma, Texas and other fields, stated to The Citizen today:

"This is a phenomenal oil strike in the heart of the city of Key West. Drillers for water on the residence lot of Mr. Charles J. Curry, on Southard street, yesterday struck a fine quality of crude oil after going through 18 feet of coral rock. It is a very fine specimen of crude oil, carrying a very fine quality of lubricants as well as an unusual quantity of kerosene, benzine and gasoline."

This report Mr. Braden has forwarded to his interests and the opinion of the gentleman has been backed up by others knowing the game and products of the oil fields of the nation.

Mr. Curry An Optimist

As stated in The Citizen a few days ago, Mr. Curry at no time has lost faith in his proposition and he has been backed up in this faith by others of the city who have gathered from all sources and remembered instances where people of the city have been forced to discontinue the use of their wells, both new and old, because of the presence of oil in such quantities as to render the water useless. And there are several people in the city who are willing to back Mr. Curry, if necessary, to the limit in order that the discovery on his property may be allowed to take the natural course. In other words, they want the matter settled once and for all as to whether or not there is oil to be had in paying quantities.

They are certain the oil is there and are willing to go after it.

People Becoming Excited

The people of the city who at first scoffed the idea of oil being found here are now becoming imbued with the fact that it is here and are becoming excited over the prospects of Key West becoming one of the oil centers of the country.

Experts from various sections of the country, gathered together at the earliest possible moment, arrived in the city today on the train which came in shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon. Their opinions after investigation will be eagerly sought, for there is hardly a skeptic in the city today over the finding.

Other experts from Washington and government men are expected to arrive in the city as soon as the trains can bring them, it being the idea to have the matter definitely settled as early as possible.

Mr. Curry has such faith in the discovery that he has had a second well started on his property and expects results in a short time.

TEST CASE THIS AFTERNOON AT 3

LEGALITY OF CONCESSIONS TO OPERATE AT CARNIVAL TO BE DECIDED

Bernard Vidal, operator of a candy concession at the carnival grounds, was arrested this afternoon by Chief of Police W. J. Gardner and officers H. Roberts, L. Roberts, W. Shannahan, T. McManaway and C. Niles. Vidal was charged with operating a game of chance.

According to the statement of the officers, Vidal was operating a wheel with 20 numbers on it. On a piece of cloth he had twenty number painted, corresponding with those on the wheel. A person desiring to play placed a dime on the number on the cloth, and was awarded a piece of chewing gum. If his number came out he was given a box of candy.

Any number of persons could play. If all numbers were taken someone was bound to win. If, however, the number coming out was not taken the operator would win all.

The case is in the nature of a test case, and came to trial this afternoon at 3 o'clock before Police Justice T. S. Caro.

The judge ruled in court this afternoon that in his opinion the piece of chewing gum given to purchasers of the numbers rendered the charge of lottery void, as each individual received value for money at the time of the transaction.

Second Assistant Postmaster General Says Experience and Study Have Demonstrated Night Flying is Safe and Practicable

BIRMINGHAM, Feb. 20.—Before many years every important business center of the nation will be connected by air mail routes and transmission of mail between these centers will be by means of air planes flying at night over lighted airways, in the opinion of Paul Henderson, second assistant postmaster general, expressed in an address before Alabama postmasters in conference here. "Experiments and study have demonstrated," Mr. Henderson said, "that night flying is safe and practicable."

There are 576 species of fish in Key West waters, though the varieties run into thousands. The Miami Herald has been printing the pictures of the best known of Key West fish for the past few weeks. This week the Rotarians are celebrating the 18th anniversary of the founding of the first Rotary Club. It was organized in Chicago on February 23, 1906. There are now 1325 Rotary Clubs with a membership of approximately 90,000 in twenty-seven countries. The clubs are organized for the purpose of practicing and spreading the principles of service through the adoption of codes of ethical practices in all lines of business and professions, through work among boys to prepare them for citizenship and through utilizing the service idea in aiding and abetting all worthy causes for the general good of the communities in which the clubs are established.

WHY THE SENATE HAS DETERIORATED

The San Francisco Chronicle declares the "rapid deterioration of the United States Senate" is due to the direct election of United States Senators by the people. The more time passes, and the greater opportunity we have to study the Senates of this country, the more we become convinced that this is true.

The Chronicle says:

"The rapid deterioration of the United States Senate under popular election and the direct primary is now well understood by all and recognized as a very serious national misfortune. It seems to be true that in a growing number of states the direct primary results in the nomination of the candidate with the greatest command of yawp, regardless of qualifications for statesmanship. Sometimes money will beat yawp, but not always. When it does, we at least get more competence, if nothing else. And the weaker the Senate becomes, the more it interferes with what is none of its business."

The analogy the California paper draws between the interference with what is "none of its business" and the weakness of the Senate is most striking. When we had statesmen instead of Newberries, and logicians instead of Reeds and LaFollettes, when we had scholars instead of Vardamans and patriots instead of Borahs, no Senate ever thought of amending the organic law of the Constitution by legislative enactments, which are but the whim and feeling of today. That body today amends the Constitution with statutes, and attempts to enact into legislative compulsion, organic principles which the Constitution says shall not be; and then when the Supreme Court of the land declares both their works unconstitutional, null and void, we hear the demand to lessen the power of the Supreme Court over Congress and its enactments and actions!

There must come a great revival of constitutional knowledge and respect or there must come some other method of choosing Senators; for those chosen by the methods of today are, as the Chronicle declares, too often nominated because of their "greatest command of yawp."—Tampa Tribune.

PRAISE FROM SIR HUBERT

Richard H. Edmonds, editor of the Manufacturers Record, comes to Florida every year and knows the state. Recently in an editorial in his publication headed "Clean Up, Paint Up and Look Up," he makes the following praiseworthy mention of Florida, holding it up as a model in cleanliness and attractiveness:

If every town in the South would imitate most of the towns in Florida, the South would become noted throughout the world for the beauty and charm and cleanliness of its towns.

Cleanliness, it has been said, is next to Godliness. A dirty individual is neither clean spiritually nor mentally. Dirt makes for ruin physically, mentally, morally. This is as true of a town as of an individual. The dirty town, the town full of rubbish, of untidy houses, of muddy streets, of unsanitary conditions, is non-progressive materially, morally and educationally. Neither moral nor material advancement flourish in dirty, unkempt dwellings or in unkempt towns.

If any town or city is ambitious for advancement, or if even a few of its men and women are ready to devote their time and energy to the betterment of the community, the surest way to achieve success is to clean up—make back yards and front yards clean, make streets clean and keep them clean, encourage the people, white and black alike, to beautify their homes and their yards, stimulate a love for and a pride in their homes and in their towns, repair the tumble-down yard fences, paint up, make things as clean outside as they should be inside, and then that community will look up mentally, morally and materially.

No community which does not clean up and paint up, which does not do its best to have clean streets and clean yards, has any right to look up and face the world.

It might be said a dirty town makes a dirty people; a dirty people makes moral and material dirt and decay. It is the duty of all men and women to make their homes and their home towns just as clean and attractive and beautiful as possible. He who falls short in this respect falls short of his duty to God and man, it matters not what else he may do.

DAUGHERTY SAYS "RESPECT THE LAW"

The individual citizen's first duty is to respect the laws of his country himself, Attorney General Daugherty said in an axiomatic statement of the responsibility of the individual citizen for the operation of the courts and the administration of justice, as a part of a message on that subject to the citizens of the United States sent through Rotary International as a part of the observance of the eighteenth anniversary of the founding of the first Rotary Club Sunday. The Attorney General's message added:

"If every citizen did that, then every citizen would appear to have done his full duty and his responsibility for the administration of justice might be considered ended," Mr. Daugherty's statement continued. "There would be little need for law courts."

"All men are not law respecting and law abiding. This condition would appear to imply that the individual citizen's duty extends beyond his own observance of the law. He ought to do something more than set a good example for the other man. The most helpful thing he can do is to make it known that he stands always on the side of the properly constituted law enforcement authorities, municipal, county, state and national. The peace and safety of our country depends upon this attitude of the individual citizen. Constitutional government is possible only by all citizens observing and obeying the laws enacted by the majority."

"Every American owes it to his country, himself and his fellow citizens, to make it known that he pledges himself to uphold the law and all those officials who have been lawfully chosen to administer it."

A TAX ON BACHELORS

Too little attention has been given by social reformers to the tax on bachelors in the federal revenue laws.

They have urged such a tax for years on the ground that it would encourage marriage, reduce the number of unattached females and increase the population.

But the bachelor tax in the revenue laws went through without arousing that enthusiasm which those who had previously advocated it were sure that it would stir up.

Under the law a married man is exempt from tax on an income of \$2,500, while a bachelor is exempt on only \$1,000. If the bachelor has an income of \$2,500 he has to pay on \$1,500, or \$60 a year, while a married man with the same income is untaxed.

But so far has been noted this tax has not increased the number of marriages perceptibly, perhaps because the bachelors thought that single blessedness was worth all that it costs.

The tax amounts to \$48 a year. While the bachelor tax has not encouraged marriage, the tax on childlessness has not increased the number of children. What have the social reformers got to say about it?

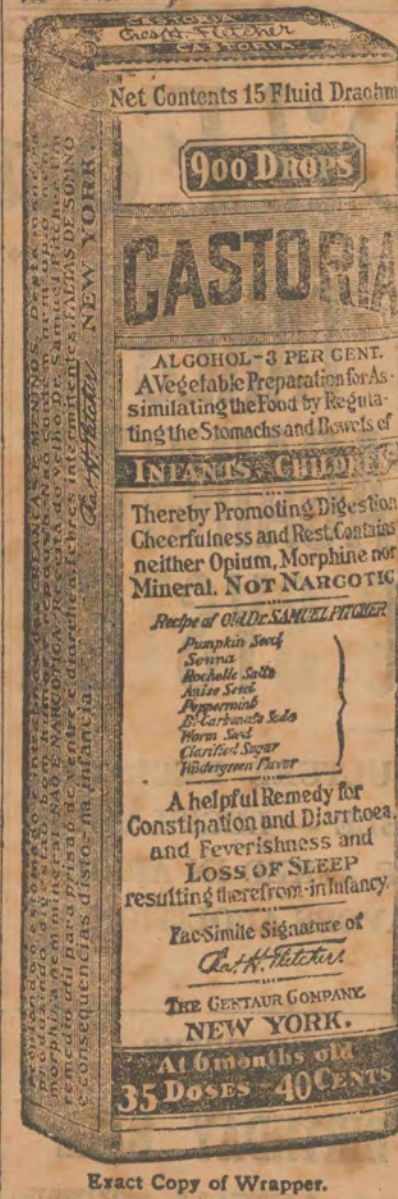

CITIZENSHIP NEARER FOR PORTO RICANS

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Feb. 20.—By a reversal of his previous attitude that 288 citizens of Porto Rico, who declined American citizenship in 1917, were not eligible to become citizens of the United States because they were not foreign citizens and had no allegiance to fore-swear, Federal Judge Odlin has opened the door for their admission to citizenship.

Several of the 288 at different times have made application for citizenship, but in each instance the grant was refused, the court holding that an act of Congress was necessary before citizenship could be granted to them. In the application for citizenship of Justo Adolfo Rauschemplat, counsel pointed out that the naturalization laws provided for the naturalization of "aliens and Porto Ricans," and Rauschemplat was granted citizenship. The court held it was necessary for those of the 288 seeking citizenship to make application in the regular form, await the usual two year period, and pass an examination in court before the final papers could be issued.

When the Jones Act extended citizenship to Porto Rico, it provided that all citizens of Porto Rico would become American citizens unless they declared in the proper court their intention not to accept citizenship.

INCOME TAX IN NUTSHELL

WHO? Single persons who had net income of \$1,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more. Married couples who had net income of \$2,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more.

WHEN? March 15, 1923, is date for filing returns and making first payment.

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.

HOW? Full directions on Form 1040A and Form 1040; also the law and regulations.

WHAT? Four per cent normal tax on taxable income up to \$4,000 in excess of exemption. Eight per cent normal tax on balance of taxable income. Surtax from 1 per cent to 50 per cent on net income over \$6,000 for the year 1922.

INCOME TAX FACTS

NO. 13.

Business expenditures are not always business expenses within the meaning of the income tax law. For example, a merchant may build an addition to his warehouse at the cost of \$100,000. This is a capital expenditure for an addition to his assets. Capital expenditures are not deductible.

Distinction is made between expenditures for an asset and expenditures in connection with an asset. If the merchant should, during the year, spend \$500 for repairs to his warehouse, such as painting the roof or replacing broken windows, he may deduct such amount as a business expense.

Medical, law or other professional books, machinery, tools, implements, or surgical instruments used in his trade, and purchased by a taxpayer, which are of a permanent character, are capital assets and their cost is not allowed as a deduction. A farmer may not deduct the cost of a threshing machine or tractor, these being capital expenditures, but is allowed to deduct the cost of hoes, rakes, and small tools which are used up in course of a year or two in farming operations.

The purchase price of an automobile, even when used wholly for business or professional purposes, is not deductible, but is regarded as investment of capital. The cost of gasoline, repairs, and upkeep of an automobile is deductible if used wholly in business. If used partly for business and partly for pleasure or convenience of the taxpayer and his family, such cost should be apportioned accordingly.

BERLIN PATTERNS AFTER AMERICANS

(By Associated Press)

BERLIN, Feb. 20.—What is known as the "American sport face" is all the rage these days among the young men of Berlin. As a consequence of the fad, whiskers and even the "Kaiser mustache," so popular prior to the war, has been pushed off the boards.

Many young Germans wear a kind of natty "Charley Chaplin" adornment upon their upper lip, and this is known as American too, but the

majority of the fashionably dressed young men in the streets and cafes are smooth shaven. Many of them, so the barbers say shave the first thing in the morning and again late in the day, before starting out for the evening.

Among the workingmen and certain old timers still in the army or government service, a modified "Kaiser's mustache" continues to be worn. There was a time here when nearly all of the old rank officers wore upright mustaches with carefully waxed ends which reached nearly to their eyes. But the mustache of the militaristic points,

in which the individual took marvelous pride, is entirely out of date.

Whiskers, generally speaking, are unpopular excepting in old fashioned circles where some of the aged men continue to wear beards, sip beer daily in their favorite haunts of many years, and smoke the long stemmed "Dutchman's" pipe which years ago was all the go among Germans in the United States.

KEY WEST'S "BACK COUNTRY"

Every now and then we hear somebody say, "Key West can't progress to any great extent because it hasn't any back country."

No back country! Why, the "back country" in Key West is just the sort of "back country" that has made the greatest cities from the dawn of history until today. It is the sort of "back country" that has made New York, with its East and North rivers and New York bay, just what it is at present. Though there is a webwork of railway lines leading into Manhattan Island, which was the old New York City before the formation of Greater New York, yet its greatest asset is the water that surrounds it. So it is with Key West.

Let us see what Key West obtains annually from its "back country," not including the many thousands of dollars that pours into the city because of its ideal position as a shipping center.

In the first place, a "crop" of four million pounds of fish is gathered in that "back country." For some of that fish fishermen receive as high as ten cents a pound, but let us strike an average of six cents a pound. It shows that local fishermen, who sell exclusively to wholesalers, earn \$240,000 in that "back country." There are no available records to show how much retail fishermen earn in that same fertile "field." For that reason there is no way to ascertain the amount of food that is yearly supplied the people of Key West from their "back country." It is safe to say that it mounts up into hundreds of thousands of pounds; it is safe to say also that retail fishermen add tens of thousands of dollars to the \$240,000 earned by fishermen for wholesale houses. Taken all in all—the money earned and the food provided—that "back country" is worth at least \$400,000 yearly in fish alone to the residents of Key West.

But that is not all. The sponge in that "back country" nets between \$250,000 and \$300,000 a year. The average number of boats that fish for sponge is seventy-five, though the number is sometimes as low as twenty-five, and at other times more than a hundred. The reason for that long range of numbers is the same as that which occurs in real back country. A farmer sometimes switches from the raising of potatoes to the raising of corn or some other kind of food. And the spongers' choice of "crop" is as changeable as that of the farmer. When the water is too muddy for sponging, or the market price for the product is low, spongers who so wish can go fishing or crawfishing. Whatever they do, the "back country" provides them with a good living, and in many instances has made them well-to-do.

Just at present, however, spongers are not going in for the "raising" of sideline "crops," because the market for sponge in Key West was never better than it is now. Recently sheepwool sponge have sold for as high as \$8 a bunch, though the average has been about \$6. During the last fortnight there have been many instances of spongers earning, above food and other expenses, as high as \$150 each in three weeks. Of course that amount has been exceptional, though virtually every one of them cleared more than \$100 during the last 30 days.

Spongers who have been in the game from twenty to forty years have told the writer recently that no other time during their experience has the quality of sponge been better than those that were brought to this market on the last trip. The sponge were obtained from the Sideboard Bank, Bamboo Bank and the Spots, which extend to the Newgrounds off Cape Sable. Those are the best sponging grounds along the string of Florida Keys, and all of them (the grounds) are in the vicinity of Bahia Honda.

The sponge are almost perfectly round and, when cleaned, are as soft as silk. They are considered the best in the world, not excepting the varieties found in the Mediterranean.

At present the demand for local sheepwool in New York and Chicago markets is practically unlimited. Key West sponge dealers are sending out sponge as quickly as they can be dried and clipped and packed.

Our "back country" is bountiful. There is still another important "crop" that it provides, and that is crawfish. That industry has been gradually increasing during the last ten years. Up to that time, with the exception of small shipments to a few Florida markets, crawfish caught in local waters either were consumed by residents or looked upon by them merely as "good bait." Now they are packed in cans or shipped alive to all points in the country, adding from \$150,000 to \$200,000 to the sum obtained from our "back country."

While the industry has been growing some local crawfishermen have been earning bank presidents' salaries. Ely Spencer, president of Ely Spencer & Sons, crawfish shippers, gave the writer an idea of some of the amounts that have been earned by men fishing for him. For three months consecutively, three boats, each containing but two men, earned \$1,200 a month each. One man, a soldier, fishing at Fort Taylor, averaged \$1,260 a month for two months. The largest amount, Mr. Spencer declared, that he has paid out, considering the

length of time, was given to two men, who left his crawfish house at 5:30 in the morning and were back at 6 in the evening. They received \$185 for the day's work.

Recently, Mr. Spencer added, there has been a supposed "shortage" in the supply of crawfish. He maintained, however, that the shortage is not in the crawfish, for there are millions of them in local waters, but in the number of crawfishermen. There are few "regulars," he explained; that is, men who stick to crawfishing alone. He used as an illustration the man who earned \$1,260 a month for two months. At the end of that time he quit crawfishing, presumably, Mr. Spencer said, because he had all the money he wanted. The dealer said he could not assign any other reason for the action, because he was ready to buy all the crawfish that were brought to him.

And so it goes, Mr. Spencer concluded, with most of the crawfishermen. When they receive reports of mackerel or kingfish running well, or of high prices being paid for sponge, they discontinue catching crawfish and go sponge or mackerel fishing. In the meantime local crawfish dealers are unable to fill one-half the orders they have on hand.

So Key West, after all, has, as the man-on-the-street may say, a pretty good "back country"—a "back country" that does not need any hoeing or plowing or fertilizing, and which, when the shipping interests are included in the benefits derived from it, is worth a million dollars or more a year to us. Even at that, most of us do not fully appreciate our "back country." It is like our incomparable climate, which visitors go into ecstasies over—we take it for granted.

Let us assume that there is a city of our size elsewhere that has a back country of farming lands that enrich the residents one million dollars a year. It is easy enough for us to surmise how those residents "talk up" their back country; it is easy enough for us to entertain an idea of the boundless pride they take in it. Yet our "back country" is more wonderful than theirs, more wonderful because nature does not have to be coaxed to turn over to us its product. Verily, verily, we should be proud of our "back country."

The credit for putting this city on the map as a fish and crawfish shipping center is due to Norberg Thompson, a young Key Wester. Up to 1913 a fleet of kingfish and mackerel boats, numbering from 75 to 100, used to come from Miami and fish with their base at Spanish Harbor. Now, Spanish Harbor is 129 miles away from Miami and only 30 from Key West. Mr. Thompson says it struck him as absurd that a city more than four times farther away from the fishing grounds than Key West should be used as the point from which to ship the catches made in those waters. The logical shipping point, Mr. Thompson reasoned, was Key West.

His conviction in that regard resulted in his organizing the Thompson Fish Company. He did not have any difficulty in convincing the fishermen that Key West was their logical market. On the question of distance, they took the same view of the matter as a farmer does in market. What farmer would ship his product 129 miles to sell it when he could find a market for it but 30 miles away, with the prices the same at both points? That was the view those fishermen took of Mr. Thompson's offer to buy their kingfish and mackerel. Every one of them marketed his fish with him, and the result was that a quietus was put on Miami as an important fish shipping center.

At the same time Mr. Thompson began to buy kingfish and mackerel he also announced he was in the market for crawfish, which he shipped alive and in cans. He was the first to ship live crawfish to points other than in Florida, for shipments have been made to cities in this state the last twenty-five years or more. At present all of the canned crawfish are consigned to New York City, while the live ones are shipped throughout the country. Before being canned, the crawfish are steamed and the clear, creamy white meat of their tails only put up in pound tins. The demand for both the canned and live crawfish is such Mr. Thompson is seldom able to fill his orders promptly. Especially is that true at present.

But the Thompson Fish Company does not confine its buying to kingfish, mackerel and crawfish. It also is a market for grouper, yellowtail, muttonfish, red snapper and other varieties. Its average yearly shipment of kingfish and mackerel alone totals 2,000,000 pounds, which is larger than that of any other fish house in Key West.

Three years after the Thompson Fish Company was organized Ely Spencer came to Key West and entered the crawfish shipping business. He started on a small scale, but the business increased rapidly, so rapidly, Mr. Spencer says, that his only difficulty most of the time was to obtain enough crawfish. When he arrived here crawfish were selling for seventy-five cents a dozen, and he immediately raised the price to \$1. Three years later another quarter was added to the price, and little more than two years ago the crawfishermen demanded \$1.50 a dozen, and, not obtaining it, went on strike. The strike set back the business considerably, but the dealers con-

tinued to hold out and eventually the men returned to fishing at \$1.25 a dozen.

Mr. Spencer states that the farthest point to which he has shipped live crawfish is San Francisco. They were iced five times during the trip and were still alive when they arrived at their destination. The Middle West, Mr. Spencer says, is his best market.

The Bureau of Fisheries calls the crawfish the spiny lobster, Mr. Thompson ships it as the Key West crawfish, and Mr. Spencer terms it the Florida lobster. Many reports have been received from cities where the crawfish has been introduced stating that it is considered superior to the northern lobster. The tastes are similar, though the flesh of the crawfish is more flaky and creamy.

With what importance the state considers crawfish was demonstrated a few years ago when a law was passed making March, April and May the closed season for that crustacean. At the last session of the legislature the time was changed to March 21 to June 21, as the purpose was to protect crawfish during the spawning season and an investigation had shown that few spawned early in March and many continued to do so for three weeks in June. According to the writer's personal experience and information given him by crawfishermen, a few crawfish are found with spawn practically every month in the year. They are, however, thrown back into the sea by the fishermen, and in the event that one chances to escape their notice the dealers set it at liberty.

Shell Fish Commissioner T. R. Hodges believes that the future of the crawfish as an industry in this state (that is, the part of it comprising the Florida Keys, for it is there only that crawfish abound in Florida waters) is of such potential magnitude it should be fostered by the state. He advocates the establishment of crawfish hatcheries to replenish stocks by artificial propagation. With hatcheries and the strict enforcement of the closed-season law, his opinion is that within a few years the crawfish will be classed among the most important fishing industries in Florida.

The second largest fish dealer in Key West is the R. R. Ricou and Sons Company, which ships an average of 1,000,000 pounds a season. Another important fish dealer is Angel Rios, whose shipments aggregate 700,000 pounds yearly. Mr. Rios ships all his fish to Havana, and during the ten years he has been in Key West he has gradually raised the prices for bottom fish till now he is paying ten cents a pound for red snapper, muttonfish and yellowtail and six cents for other varieties. Before he came here there was no such thing as weighing bottom fish to sell—it was sold by "sight" and not by the pound. In those days one could buy a muttonfish for a quarter that, sold now by the pound, costs twice or three times as much. Besides bottom fish, Mr. Rios also ships kingfish to Havana. He does not handle mackerel or crawfish.

The other 300,000 pounds of fish, making up the average yearly shipment of 4,000,000 pounds, are handled by smaller dealers.

There are 576 species of fish in Key West waters, though the varieties run into the thousands. Of one species alone there are 64 varieties and many others range from 5 to 40 or more. Let us consider the common grunt, which, year in and year out, has been caught more abundantly for local consumption than any other fish and still continues to be the favorite food fish of most residents. While discussing local food fishes, we once heard a Key Wester say:

"Oh, yes, we like pompano and mackerel and kingfish and red snapper and the rest of the higher priced fish, but we always came back to the lowly grunt. Let us assume that the grunt was as scarce as pompano. That fish sells for twenty-five cents a pound, more than is asked for any other fish in Key West. But if the grunt was as scarce as pompano only millionaires would be able to eat grunts."

It was an exaggeration of course, yet it forcibly illustrated the value of the grunt as a local food fish. Here are the varieties of the grunt: Margate fish, gray grunt, sailor's choice, yellow or boar grunt, common grunt, French grunt, tomatate or red mouth, white grunt, porkfish and pigfish.

And here are the varieties of the grouper, which ranks second as the favorite food fish in Key West: Yellow-finned or Dolly Varden, Nassau or criolla, rockhind, redhind or cabrilla, speckled hind or John Paw or polka dot, red grouper, black grouper, gag or ajuaji and scamp or bacalao.

Bacalao is Spanish for codfish, and the reason why the scamp is so called by Cubans and Spaniards is because they cure it and market it as codfish.

The game fish in local waters will be the subject of a special article to be published shortly in The Citizen.

There are more varieties of fish in Key West waters than in any other in the United States, with the exception, of course, of the Florida Keys.

Yes, yes, Key West has a rich "back country." It is worth a million a year now and in years to come will be worth many millions.

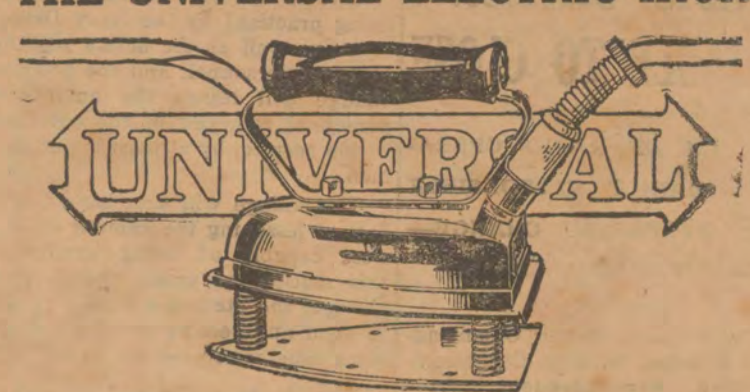

DISTRICT CONTROL RADIO STATION LIABLE TO CLOSE

SHORTAGE OF RADIO OPERATORS MAINLY RESPONSIBLE FOR PROPOSED CHANGE—ECONOMY ALSO A REASON

During a recent visit of Commander J. J. London, Atlantic Coast communication superintendent, from Washington, it was decided to propose to the Bureau the closing of the District Control Radio Station at Key West.

At the present time recommendations are being compiled regarding the changing from duplex to simplex transmission; this change, if carried out, will mean that all personnel will be moved from the head of the island to the Navy Yard, and a complete

reorganization of routine methods of handling traffic will become effective.

The reason for this contemplated change is due to the rigid economy being practised by the Navy Department, as well as the actual shortage of radio personnel, and the proposed change will lessen the number of personnel required in the communication service, by at least six or eight men.

The change will also have the effect of lessening the amount of business capable of being handled at this station, as under the proposed change, the station will not be able to send and receive messages at the same time as at present.

War Veterans

The complement of war veterans in training at Key West to become radio operators was recently augmented by the arrival of Ralph A. Verhine and Jesse E. Keller.

W. A. Riggs, of the War Veterans Bureau, Jacksonville, Fla., arrived yesterday for a conference and inspection of all war veteran trainees for radio operators at Key West.
