ANOTHER SCHEDULE ON THE CAR LINE

County Road Cars Run to Town via White Street Then to Division

The Key West Electric Company announces that on Saturday evening, April 27th, the old schedules will be resumed temporarily. Cars will run as they did before there was any interference by the new track work.

Belt cars will run out to car barn and be known as the Duval car or the Rocky Road car. Persons going to County Road car from belt line will transfer at the old transfer corner at Division and White Streets. This schedule will be effective Saturday night and Sunday only.

Monday morning, April 29th, there will be another change on account of the beginning of the new track work on Division Street. Cars will run from the Havana-American factory via White Street in town, out Duval to Division via United and Simon Streets, and up Division as far as the work will allow. With this schedule there will be no transfers issued at any point.

FINAL RALLY OF THE CAMPAIGN WAS HELD LAST NIGHT--LARGE CROWD IN ATTENDANCE

E. E. Ingraham Spoke In Favor of S. M. Sparkman and J. Ed. O'Brien--E. M. Semple Spoke In His Own Behalf--Leon Roberts Spoke

The final rally of the campaign which comes to a close today was held at the corner of Margaret and Fleming Sts. last night. Mr. E. E. Ingraham opened the meeting and spoke in favor of the candidates of S. M. Sparkman for Congressman from this district and J. Ed. O'Brien for Congressman at Large. He explained that he was not speaking in the interests of these candidates but in the interests of Key West. He then proceeded to show why the election of these gentlemen was for the best interests of this city.

Mr. Leon Roberts, candidate for County Supervisor, spoke for a few minutes presenting his claims for the office and asking the support of all the voters.

Mr. Ingraham then called on Mr. E. M. Semple, candidate for Governor. Mr. Semple stated that he had not intended speaking, but since he had been called upon he would give a real heart to heart talk. He spoke of his opponents as being all good Democrats and fine gentlemen and he had nothing to say against them personally, but felt that he had a right to criticize their public records. He referred to Gibbons plan of selling the State lands and using the proceeds to build good roads. Mr. Semple asked what good these good roads would do Key West. He said Milton's theory of draining the everglades and using the land for the cultivation of sugar cane was impractical because competent engineers had stated that not more than 10 percent of the land could be drained, and that only at an expense of millions of dollars. He said he agreed in some respects with Watson's theory on roads but did not believe convicts should be worked on the road, but should be placed on the state farm of 15,000 acres which has been purchased by the State, where they would not be in competition with free labor. He stated that Trammell had tried to defeat the Key West railroad bill, and that he is unloyal to his present office as Attorney General because he is using his time in seeking another; that he has not been in his office for three months, but has drawn his salary regularly from the State. Mr. Semple's remarks were liberally applauded.

The meeting was the most enthusiastic of the campaign. The Light Guard Band furnished music for the occasion.

CONTINUE SEARCH FOR MISSING MEN

Hat Found Near Woman Key Thought to be That of Francisco Pineda

Relatives are frantic with grief and friends feel the deepest anxiety over the disappearance of Marcelino Ramirez, Francisco Pineda, Jose Alvarez and Francisco Romero who on Sunday morning left South Beach in a twelve foot skiff boat to go out a short distance on a fishing trip. The men stated when they left their homes that they would be back for breakfast, which was then two or three hours away. They did not return Sunday night and becoming alarmed, their relatives sent searching parties out yesterday morning. Yesterday afternoon, Henry Pierce and Cleveland Niles returned in a small launch after searching for some hours bringing with them a hat and an oar which they had picked up near Woman Key. It was believed that the hat belonged to Francisco Pineda, but Mrs. Pineda when shown the hat last night said that she did not recognize it.

It is feared that the men have been lost. One man claims to have seen them yesterday opposite the Martello tower, some distance out, and later he noticed that they had disappeared but paid no attention to the circumstance at the time. The revenue cutter Forward will go out this morning and make a thorough search for the men or their bodies. Relatives and friends of the missing men cling desperately to the hope that they are alive and that they will be found.

The families of these men are in a distressing frame of mind and their grief is pitiful. It is sincerely hoped that the Forward will find the men alive.

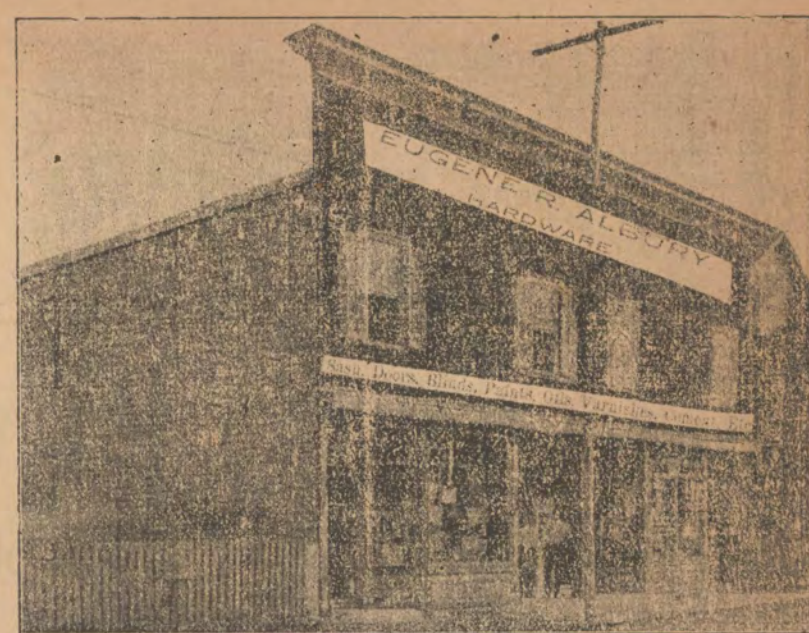

Fletcher Endorses Oscar Underwood

Washington, D. C., April 29.--The following is exact copy of an interview given to the press at Washington Saturday night by Senator Duncan U. Fletcher:

"I have no hesitation in saying that Hon. Oscar Underwood is my choice," the senator said. "Irrespective of where he comes from he is the best equipped man thus far suggested, in my judgement, for that high office. He has all the qualifications and he has demonstrated his capacity for leadership, patriotism, and qualifications generally.

"Mr. Wilson is a man of learning and abilities of the highest order, but it seems to me he ignores or treats too indifferently the tariff issue and the trust question. When I read what he is reported to have said regarding these matters, I no longer wonder that he is popular in Pennsylvania and carried New Jersey. The democracy needs Underwood, the country needs him. It would be wise for the democracy to nominate him. The country would elect him."

A PROCLAMATION

TO THE VOTERS OF THE STATE OF FLORIDA:

WHEREAS, It has become necessary that the Railroad Commission of your state have conferred upon it sufficient powers to enable it to successfully control the common carriers and to require service that is reasonable and adequate; and

WHEREAS, It is likewise necessary that the State of Florida now do its full duty in the control of corporations and the protection of its people against unscrupulous speculators; and

WHEREAS, We must abolish the iniquitous convict lease system and employ our prisoners in some more humane way; and

WHEREAS, The people are also confronted with the necessity for providing a government that is more by and of home people and for home people; and

WHEREAS, The State stands to lose heavily unless we undertake and carry through an adequate program of interior development for the benefit of all sections alike; and

WHEREAS, We are confronted by a grave problem in the great project of draining the everglades; and

WHEREAS, We are all for good roads.

NOW, I, CROMWELL GIBBONS, do proclaim that I favor granting more power to our railroad commission to enable it to make and enforce reasonable rates, tariffs and improvements to road and rolling stock; that I favor laws that will restrict the operations of corporations, protect investors against unsound stock and bond issues and protect innocent purchasers of Florida lands against fakers and unscrupulous speculators; that I favor the abolition of the convict lease system and the gradual organization of the prisoners into a self-sustaining road building force; that I shall do all in my power to extend and develop the principles of home government in its strictest sense; that I favor the organization of bureaus of publicity and immigration to serve all parts of the state that cry for development; that I favor draining the Everglades; but not at the expense of all the counties of the state and in a manner which permits the lands to fall into the hands of speculators.

AND I CALL UPON THE VOTERS OF THE STATE to manifest their approval of my stand on these important questions by going to the polls next Tuesday and voting to make me their governor; promising that, if elected, I will give my best efforts to conservative and businesslike administration of their affairs for a period of four years and then returning to my law practice; and promising further that I will not on the morning of my election begin campaigning for the higher position of United States Senator.
