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ALL REPUBLICAN DELEGATES HAVE BEEN ELECTED AND FIGHT IS ON

Neither Roosevelt Nor Taft Have Sufficient Number to Win on First Ballot, But Taft Has a Considerable Advantage Over Colonel Roosevelt

BUT TEDDY IS CONTESTING EVERYTHING IN SIGHT

"Dark Horse" in Republican Party Not Given Serious Consideration—Contest Between Roosevelt and Taft Will Be Bitterest Ever Known

Chicago, Ill., June 7.—With all delegates to the national convention of the Republican party chosen, and the executive committee assembled here to decide the contests embracing some 230 delegates, the situation is shaping up for the national convention.

Neither Taft nor Roosevelt has sufficient number of delegates pledged to win out on the first ballot, although Taft lacks but eight, Roosevelt needs sixty-six. The determination of the various contests will likely make a big change in the standings of the two leading contestants.

As for Taft's managers, they claim the President has enough and to spare to assure his nomination on the first ballot. Roosevelt's managers are equally confident.

FERRARA GAVE INTERVIEW TO JOURNAL LAST NIGHT

Journal Reporter First American Newspaper Man to Interview Prominent Cuban on Arrival

NOT ON A SECRET MISSION TO WASHINGTON

Leading New York Paper Telegraphed Here Yesterday That Ferrara Was Enroute to Washington On a Secret Mission For His Country

Hon. Orestes Ferrara, Speaker of the Cuban House of Representatives, was an arrival yesterday afternoon on the Mascotte from Havana and gave his first interview to an American newspaper to a representative of The Journal who was present to meet the distinguished visitor. Mr. Ferrara was not inclined to discuss his trip much, but on being informed by The Journal representative that much significance was attached to his departure from Cuba at this time, Mr. Ferrara talked freely and frankly. He stated that he was not on a secret mission for his government, and that, furthermore, Washington was not his destination. He seemed somewhat embarrassed at being interviewed by an American newspaper man before he had fairly lost sight of his native land, but smilingly congratulated The Journal reporter on what he termed his "American enterprise." Mr. Ferrara stated that his destination was New York, and that he was going there on private business; that his departure from Cuba at this time had no bearing whatever on the unfortunate conditions existing in the Republic and that he very much regretted that the impression had been spread abroad that he was on a secret mission to Washington.

Mr. Ferrara, who by the way, is a most courteous and genial gentleman, expressed profound regret at the turmoil into which his country had been thrown, but believed that the Cuban government will be amply able to come with the situation. He stated that the white people of Cuba, and many of the colored population, are loyal to the government and that the revolt will be crushed just as soon as the Cuban government can fully organize its forces.

Mr. Ferrara was accompanied by Mrs. Ferrara who listened silently throughout the interview and evinced much amusement at the persistence of the "Americano."

A telegram was received here yesterday by the local representative of a leading New York newspaper stating that Speaker Ferrara was enroute to Washington on a secret mission for his government, and asking that some statement be secured from the gentleman. It so happened that The Journal had the "inside track" on the great New York paper and the representative of the latter was deprived of the privilege of an interview with Speaker Ferrara.

However, The Journal reporter generously imparted his information to the representative of the New York paper and that paper will this morning give the real purpose of Mr. Ferrara's visit to the United States as stated in his exclusive interview given to The Journal.

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CUBA MUST SUPPRESS REBELLION OR UNITED STATES TO TAKE HAND

President Gomez Has Issued a Proclamation to the Cuban People Asking Them to Arm Themselves And Assist In Crushing the Rebellion

UNCLE SAM MAY TAKE COMMAND OF CUBAN ARMY

United States Wants to See Cuban Government Control The Situation But Will Not Stand For Any Further Delay Before American Troops Occupy Island

FRANK CLARKSEEMS TO HAVE BEEN RIGHT

Three Suits Have Been Entered Against Everglades Land Companies

(From Jacksonville Metropolis.) Three suits have been filed in the United States Circuit Court here asking for receivers for the Everglades Plantation Company, the Miami Everglades Land Company and the Lauderdale Realty Company. The suits were all brought by purchasers of land, most of whom reside in the Middle West.

It is alleged that all of these companies are controlled by the Security Underwriters' Corporation, composed of New York capitalists. Another allegation of importance is that the purchase funds have not been used according to agreement in digging canals, building roads and making other improvements; but have been used to improve other properties controlled by the same controlling corporation.

It is alleged in the complaint against the Miami company that the corporation owns 17,000 acres of land and is indebted by several outstanding notes totalling \$42,520, and is being sued by residents of Missouri and Kansas. The Plantation company is alleged to own 10,000 acres of land and to be in debt by notes in the sum of \$132,814. The Lauderdale case is brought by a stockholder of the company, who is a resident of this state, for the benefit of all concerned.

L'ENGLE CLAIMS A MAJORITY OF 9,000

Frank Clark Beat Sam Hilburn for Congress Just 382 Votes

Jacksonville, Fla., June 7.—By the close majority of 382, pleasingly larger, however, than was rumored earlier, Congressman Frank Clark was declared re-elected by the Second congressional district executive committee after one of the hardest campaigns ever waged in this district. S. J. Hilburn, of Palatka, was Congressman Clark's opponent and made a hard fight upon him.

For congressman-at-large Claude L'Engle claims a total majority of 9,000 over W. M. Toomer.

(Friday's El Mundo.) The Cuban minister in Washington has wired the Secretary of State as follows:

"I have been courteously informed that the President of the United States has decided to send four battleships to the harbors in Oriente province in order to land forces for the protection of American property, without taking part in the hostilities. But the President hopes that the Cuban government will soon be able to put an end to the revolt, or the United States will find themselves obliged to take part in the rebellion."

President Gomez has issued a proclamation to the Cuban people. He appeals to the patriotism of the Cubans and in the name of civilization asks them to arm themselves in order to help him crush the enemies of his country, who so far have displayed nothing but barbarism and vandalism by their outrages against the honor of Cuban homes. He appeals to the Cuban people in the name of those who battled so heroically and so freely gave their blood in the long-drawn campaign for Cuban independence. He expects Congress will appropriate the necessary amount for him to equip the whole population if need be, so as to be able in a rapid campaign to vanquish the men who have plunged the island into this revolution.

The Mayor of Marti, Matanzas, reports that citizens of that town have contributed an amount sufficient to arm ten men for the protection of the town.

The Mayor of Havana has been on a trip of inspection through the farm settlements of his district and reports everything quiet.

El Mundo was informed by a prominent American that if the Cuban government did not succeed in putting down the rebellion in a short time, it was the purpose of the United States to occupy all the towns in Cuba and place the Cuban army under its command. It is not, however, the purpose of the United States to again assume control of the island.

The person to whom we are indebted for the above information is a man of great prominence in Cuba.

Santiago, June 6.—Colonel Marti and Captain Montes left yesterday for Calimera on the S. S. Hatuey. They are under instructions from General Montenegro to confer with the commandant of the naval station and ascertain the number of troops in the judgment of the American officer, will be necessary to protect American property there, in order that American troops now doing this duty may be replaced by a force of Cuban troops of like size. Up to the present time, the American force is not larger than was the Cuban force stationed there before the Americans took charge.

ARTMAN SAYS ATLANTA IS THE PRIZE WINNER

Mr. L. P. Artman, who owns and helps operate the Linotype machine, which does the composition work for the local daily papers, returned yesterday morning from a trip through the South and West. Mr. Artman visited St. Louis, Nashville, Chattanooga, Atlanta and Jacksonville, spending about two weeks with his sister in St. Louis. Mr. Artman states that he found all of these hustling cities, but that Atlanta takes the prize. He refers to Atlanta as the "New York of the South" and says it is the most progressive city in the Southland. He says that he cannot say too much in praise of Atlanta, and the uniform courtesy of its people. Everyone there is an Atlanta "Booster" and working hard for Atlanta.

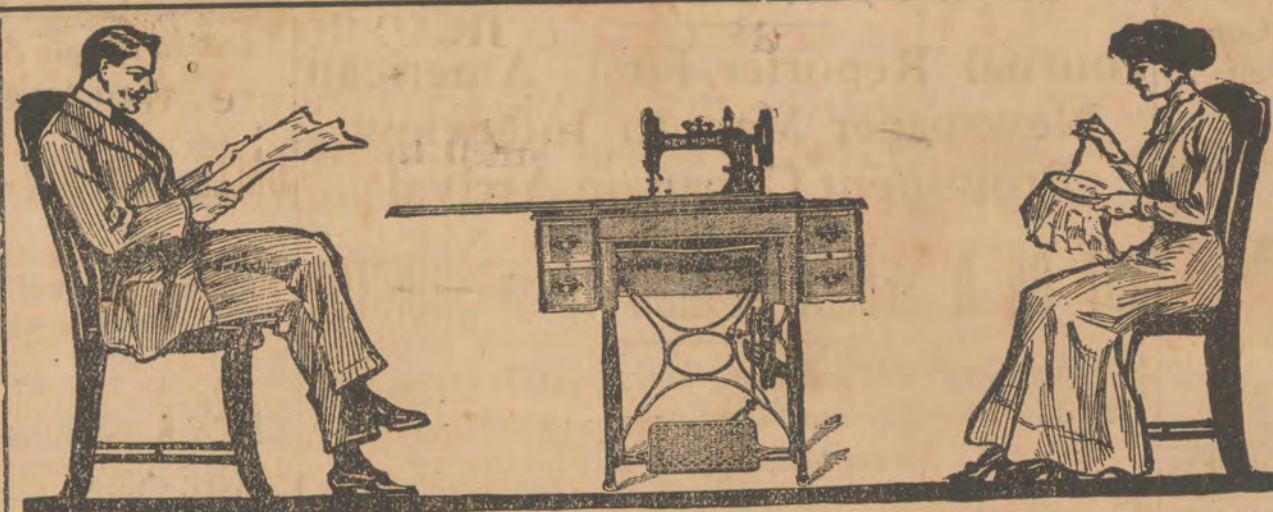

THE CUBAN SITUATION.

At this distance, conditions in Cuba appear rather gloomy. News from the trouble zone is scarce and it is feared that the rebels are stronger than was at first supposed. The action of the American government seems to indicate that they have reliable information from Cuba which shows the situation there to be a serious one. The landing of the American troops in Cuba and the despatch of American warships to a Cuban port indicates that our government considers it necessary to intervene in order to preserve peace, as well as to protect foreign lives and property. While we would like to see Cuba suppress the present revolt without outside assistance, we are of the opinion that unless the Cuban government immediately institutes a rapid and vigorous campaign against the rebels, intervention by the United States will be imperative. May "Cuba Libre" win out against their enemies.

To give an idea of what that income is, in dollars and cents and time, it is estimated that Rockefeller has an income of \$1.90 2-3 a second; \$114.40 a minute; \$6,863.97 an hour; \$164,735.31 a day, and \$1,158,846.15 a week.

CHARLES JENSON MET WITH ACCIDENT

Shoulder Dislocated and Collar Bone Broken by Fall Yesterday
