

MANAGER OF THE PAVING COMPANY TAKES EXCEPTION TO EDITORIAL IN THE JOURNAL

Mr. Copeland States That His Company Is Doing
Everything Possible To Give Key West Good
Pavements With Least Inconvenience

The following letter which explains
itself was received by the Editor of
the Journal yesterday:

Feb. 17, 1912.
Editor Key West Journal,
City.

Dear Sir:
We notice an editorial in your paper
of today headed: "Dangers in Con-
dition of Thoroughfares", in which
you say "the conditions of streets for
some time has been terrible".

Now while we know that you do not
wish to criticize unjustly any one of
the Companies doing this work, we
feel called upon to correct the impres-
sion which is made by your editorial,
for that part of the work (brick and
asphalt paving) which is being done
by our Company. We have endeav-
ored at all times to do our work under
the direction of your Resident En-
gineer, and in such manner as would
least inconvenience the public, and while it
is impossible at all times not to inter-
fere with traffic, we claim that we have
on this work as good, careful and com-
petent men as can be had anywhere,
and that in no instance have we block-
ed traffic where it was not absolutely
necessary to do so, and especially your
Fire Department, which we endeavor
at all times to look out for. While we
have lights and barricades in several
places, there is not a closed street on
our work, where in a case of emer-
gency your fire department cannot
serve.

We would be glad in deed to have
you investigate our statements, as to
our part of the work, and if you find

them correct, give us credit for our ef-
forts to give Key West as good a pave-
ment as it is possible to obtain, and to
the least possible inconvenience to
your citizens.

While the above letter does not alter
the fact that portions of our streets are
in a very bad condition and even dan-
gerous condition, this paper does not
intend to say that the paving company
is responsible. A representative of
The Journal interviewed Mr. Copeland
yesterday evening and was given the
assurance that any street in the city
which has been blocked off by them
may be used by the fire department at
any time if the Fire Chief thinks it
necessary. The barriers closing these
streets are light and may be broken
down easily. Any damage done to the
paving work on these streets as a result
of fire apparatus running over them
will be repaired at the expense of the
paving company says Mr. Copeland.
In other words, Mr. Copeland states
that his company desires to do their
work in Key West as satisfactorily
as possible and they are willing to in-
tigate any inconvenience which their
work may cause as far as lies in their
power.

CONSTRUCTION WORK TO BE SUBSTANTIAL

Key West Electric Co. Re-
laying Track With Most
Durable Material

The substantial character of the im-
provements being made by the street
car company here has excited the in-
terest of the citizens of and the visitors
to Key West. So far as is known, no
heavier rails have been laid by any
street railroad system than those going
down on the streets of this city. De-
tailed mention of these rails was made
in this paper yesterday.

According to W. G. Langford, fore-
man of the gang working on Duval
street, an innovation contributing still
further to the strength general effi-
ciency and smooth running of cars, will
be introduced along Duval street south-
wards. Instead of wooden ties steel
ones be used and the rails will be
laid on concrete stringers. The ties
are being made out of the old rails
which have been replaced by the new
110 pounders. Out at the street car
yard, at the head of Simonton street
and south beach, the old rails are being
cut into lengths of 6 feet, 2 inches.

The way this is done is interesting.
First a man with a cold chisel places
the tool against the rail at the point
where the rail is to be broken. A man
with a sledge strikes this chisel some-
what blows in a straight line over web,
flange and base. The rail is then
placed in a large vise, which it grips
with a tenacity proportionate to the
leverage furnished by two men who
place crowbars in the vise and work it
on the principle of a jack. A few
turns are all that is necessary to frac-
ture the rail which is then ready to be
placed in position. It is obvious that
such ties will not require to be re-
placed by others after the lapse of a
few years as is the case with wooden
ties. Only one thing can affect them
and that is electrolysis and it is not
probable that any fugitive electric
current will get to them as is so often
the case with more widely spaced com-
munities.

The mixer for the concrete will
probably be bought down town from
the street car company's yard on
Monday, and commence turning out
the concrete for the stringers which
as in the case of the rails will not need
renewal even should the line be in
running order a century from now.
In no city of this country or any other
has a street railway been rebuilt with
more durable material than the Key
West street railway.

BIOLOGICAL STATION AT DUCK KEY PROBABLE

Influential Officials at Wash-
ington Look Upon This
Location With Favor

Some encouraging reports have been
received from Washington recently
relative to the establishment of a
government biological station at Duck
Key, Fla., which is about 55 miles
from Key West. This island which
is a little over one mile in length, has
a beautiful sand beach on one side and
a fine harbor on the other. In fact,
on the harbor side of the island there
are 3 feet of water less than twenty
feet from the shore. Old fishermen
in these waters claim that Duck Key
is the best fishing ground along the
entire line of the Florida Keys. The
Key is just three and a half miles West
of Long Key Fishing Camp, a resort
which has already become famous
among followers of the rod and reel.
The government could select no better
place than Duck Key for a biological
station on the entire Gulf coast.

MARVIN ALBURY INJURED

Marvin Albury, son of Benjamin Al-
burey of Carous lane, was knocked off
his bicycle yesterday morning by a
mule attached to an ice wagon driven
by George Wells. He was badly in-
jured.

The boy was making the turn at
William street going to Southard street
and the ice wagon was coming off
Southard when mule and bicycle colli-
ded without warning.

The driver immediately got off his
wagon, picked up little Albury, and
carried him to his father's house. Dr.
Light was summoned and found that no
bones were broken, but he could not
determine the extent of his internal
injuries if any. The boy is resting as
comfortably as could be expected. No
blame can be attached to the driver of
the ice wagon. He stopped as quickly
as he could.

WRECKERS ARE GRANTED LICENSE IN KEY WEST

This Is The Only Place In the
Country Where Wrecking
Is Licensed

The release of the British S. S. Ariel,
yesterday, on payment of \$22,000—or
rather the guaranty thereof—naturally
brought up the subject of salvage and
wrecking and Mr. Julius Otto, the
United States Commissioner who
is usually competent to discuss such
questions, spoke interestingly thereon
to the Journal representative.

"I wonder," said Mr. Otto, "how
many people are aware that this dis-
trict known as the Southern District
of Florida, is the only region in the
whole world where licenses are granted
to wreckers. The Act of Congress
granting such licenses to those who go
out to succor vessels in distress, was
passed on Feb. 3, 1847. In no other
part of this country, and in no other
country in the world is there such a
thing as a licensed wrecker. In other
places anybody who has a boat can
help a ship in distress, and demand
what remuneration he may think
proper in return for such service.
Here in the Southern District of
Florida the man who goes into the
business of a wrecker must show to
the satisfaction of the United States
District Court that he possesses the
knowledge and experience requisite
to such work, and that his craft is sea
worthy and adapted to its prosecution.
When all this is proven to the court's
satisfaction he may be granted a li-
cense."

To this district, also, belongs the
distinction of having judges who wrote
more on the subject of salvage, and
made more awards than any other
Courts. Judge William Marvin, away
back in 1858, published a work on this
subject which is still standard, entitled
"A Treatise on the Law of Wreck and
Salvage". This work is most compre-
hensive, and covers the entire field so
minutely that after the lapse of over
half a century it still stands out as a
beacon of information.

Judge J. W. Locke has made more
salvage awards than any other judge
and they seem to have been satisfac-
tory to all parties concerned."

GAS COMPANY LABORERS WILL PROBABLY SETTLE THEIR DIFFICULTIES AMICABLY

Gang of Men Went on Strike Yesterday Causing Some
Little Excitement for a Time—Indications are That
the Trouble Will Be Settled and Work Resumed

and shovels, who resisted this attempt
to take his gang off the work until he
was overpowered by numbers. Mr.
Marty has been with the Gas Com-
pany since the work began and has
proven himself efficient in his work.

There is a definite rumor that they
expect to get higher wages than they
agreed to work for, but no demands
have been made on the Gas Company
as to wages, nor have any other com-
plaints been made to the manage-
ment.

The wages now being paid by the
Gas Company here are the same as
those paid by the Street Railroad Com-
pany and by the Paving Contractors,
which is higher than paid in the
North.

The Gas Company is willing to listen
to any reasonable demands about their
foreman and no doubt an amicable ad-
justment of such complaints will be
promptly arrived at.

The American workers, pipe layers,
and service men continued with their
work as also a few of the Italians. The
labor performed by the Italians up to
the present time has been perfectly
satisfactory, and their action is prob-
ably due to their excitable tempera-
ment under a strange foreman.

There is some talk about their will-
ingness to return to work Monday morn-
ing under a foreman of their own na-
tionality.

Mayor Fogarty met the men on the
street and later took the matter up
with the Gas Co.

In the middle of November the Gas
Company imported twenty five Ital-
ians to work on their gas mains sys-
tem. They were employed in Phila-
delphia and their fare paid to Key
West.

The wages agreed upon were less
than the standard price paid in Key
West of 19c per hour, and on their ar-
rival here the Gas Company, consid-
ering it was the proper thing, paid them
the standard wages of 15c per hour.

Within the last four weeks two more
groups of twenty five each have been
imported to expedite the work, not
being able to get sufficient local labor.
These were also engaged in Philadel-
phia at the rate of 10c per hour, as this
price had been established as the fair
amount to meet local conditions. The
men were notified of this before they
came and some of the original pay
rolls were shown the men by the Pa-
roy Construction Company who were
responsible for furnishing the labor.

The recent arrivals, on the resig-
nation of one of the Italian foremen, also
a recent arrival, were put in charge of
an American until another Italian fore-
man familiar with the work could be
obtained to fill his place. These labor-
ers resented the manner in which
they were spoken to and left their
work in a body. They went to the
other two gangs and compelled them
to do likewise.

They then attacked the local fore-
man in charge of his gang with picks

IS THIS COOL ENOUGH?

This winter has been the coldest—
for some parts of the country at least—
that the United States and Canada has
experienced since the establishment of
the Weather Bureau. Here are some
temperatures recorded on official ther-
mometers during the recent cold
spell. At Cook, Minn. 56 below zero;
at dozen of places in Canada tempera-
tures from 50 below down were regis-
tered. It was 23 below at St. Paul.

Norfolk, Neb. it was 39 below and at
Omaha 33 below. In Texas the tem-
perature ranged from 10 below in
Panhandle towns to 18 above along the
Gulf. Snow fell for the first time in
15 years at Galveston, Beaumont,
Houston and San Antonio. It was 40
below at Washingtonville, N. Y.,
while at Adirondack points the mercury
dropped to 29, 28, 31, 31, 40 and 46 below
zero. Bolivar, N. Y., registered 27 be-
low, and Hornell 24 below.

Contrast these frigid temperatures
with Key West's 58 and 59 above.

We consider the effort to buy a public office detestable and dishonest beyond words, and so far as The Journal is concerned, we would cheerfully expose any candidate against whom we might prove charges of this nature.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By Rev. William Evans, D. D., Director Bible Course
Moody Bible Institute, Chicago.

LESSON FOR FEBRUARY 18.

MINISTRY OF JOHN THE BAPTIST.

LESSON TEXT—Mark 1:1-8; Luke 3:1-20.
MEMORY VERSES—Luke 3:3, 9 or 19, 17.
GOLDEN TEXT—Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.—Matt. 3:2.

The story of John the Baptist's ministry, opening as it does with a prophetic reference, connects the Old and the New Testaments, showing the New to be the fulfillment of the Old. Thus we say: The Old is in the New contained; the New is in the Old explained; the Old is in the New concealed; the New is in the Old revealed. Christ is the theme and unifier of both Testaments. If he had not been coming, the Old would not have been written; if he had not come, the New would not have been written.

What a strange impression this fiery preacher of the wilderness, John, must have made upon his hearers! His dress, as his message, bore the marks of the wild. Strange, is it not, that such a one should be chosen to prepare the way for the Messiah? We might have chosen a different instrument—a well dressed, polished, eloquent, silver-tongued orator.

The Baptist's message had its basis in the word of God—"The word of God came unto John in the wilderness." That is where every pulpit message ought to come from. The business of the preacher and teacher of Christ is not to invent a gospel, but to proclaim one already provided. The Bible is the final critic of the message.

John's ministry was preparatory; it looked forward to the coming of something better. Just as John himself gave way to Christ, so his message of repentance made room for faith in Christ. John baptized with water unto repentance. The Baptist's ministry went no farther than that. Jesus Christ turned the water of John's baptism into steam by the fire of the Holy Ghost. John prepared; Jesus regenerated.

The necessity for repentance cannot be overlooked in this lesson. In a sense, it is the first step into the Kingdom. Both John and Jesus began their ministry with a call to repentance.

Repentance is clearly defined in this lesson as a turning from a life of sin to a life of righteousness. There are three elements in repentance: First, the intellect is involved—it is a change of mind or viewpoint; second, the emotions are involved—it means to have a care regarding the thing in question, so we find the words "sigh," "grief," substituted for repentance; third, the will plays a prominent part in repentance, for there is included in the word the idea of an after-thought, resulting in a change in one's course of action. Repentance is not only a heart broken for sin, but also from sin.

That this is John's meaning of repentance is clear from his exhortation to those who asked him the meaning of his call to repentance—exact no more than that which is appointed you; do violence to no man, neither accuse any falsely; bring forth, therefore, fruits worthy of repentance. A little boy was once asked the meaning of repentance. He replied: "It means being sorry enough for a thing so as not to do it again."

John preached the wrath to come. Evidently he believed in future punishment. He did not believe that the desire to escape future punishment was sufficient or the best reason why men should receive Jesus Christ. And it may be that no man really becomes a Christian who seeks to be one only that he may escape the results of his sin. We are saved that we may glorify God in the life that now is as well as to be delivered from the wrath to come. He who does not serve Christ here will not dwell with him in heaven.

The fact of wrath and future punishment is not an invention of modern theology. Christ believed in it and taught it when he referred to the "worm that dieth not, and the fire that is not quenched," and pictured the ungodly being cast into "everlasting fire." We should have to blot out a large part of the Bible if we were to blot out all the Scriptures which teach future retribution for sin. When we consider the fearful atrocities perpetrated upon the sons of men, the frightful iniquities practiced upon helpless women and children, and then see the ease and luxury and splendor in which the perpetrators of these crimes live, we would be very sorry to be assured that there is no future retribution for the perpetrators of such deeds. Give the justice of heaven the same degree of common sense consideration that you give to the justice of earth, and somewhere in the other world you must place a penitentiary.

John's preaching drew the crowds, and so will the preaching and teaching of the Gospel today, when proclaimed by men as consecrated to their mission as John the Baptist was to his. The crowd have not tired of the Gospel, but only of the average preacher of the Gospel. The messenger, and not the message, is at fault. The hearts of men with all their needs, as well as the Gospel of Christ with all its power, is the same today as when Christ walked upon the earth. John was a bold preacher, and a study of his life shows us that he died because of his bold rebuke of Herod's sin.

INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON FOR FEBRUARY 11.

THE BOY JESUS IN THE TEMPLE.

LESSON TEXT—Luke 2:40-52.
GOLDEN TEXT—"How is it that ye sought me? Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business."—Luke 2:49.
MEMORY VERSES—40, 47.

This lesson is the one solitary instance recorded in the strangely sealed thirty years of the Master's life. Here is an illustration of what is meant by the inspiration of election—only those things that were of vital and redemptive importance in the life of Jesus are recorded. John says, "Many other signs truly did Jesus which are not written in this book: But these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name." For this reason, we should value every word that is written.

The lesson furnishes a model in character building for the youth. Jesus is the example, and the model boy. Jesus was a real boy. He ate, drank, played, grew, asked questions, just as other boys do.

His character, like all other character building, was a growth: "He increased in wisdom and stature." No character is instantaneous; it is the work of growth and of years, indeed, of a lifetime. An icicle is formed drop by drop. Character is formed by single words and acts. A mushroom may grow in a night, but surely not the character of a man. Just as words and sentences are formed by means of the single letters of the alphabet, so words, thoughts, deeds, actions, looks, motives—these are the alphabet from which we spell character. Sow a thought, and reap a word; sow a word, and reap an act; sow an act, and reap a habit; sow a habit, and reap a character; sow a character, and reap a destiny.

Christ's character was developed in the home. He had a Christian home—the greatest gift of God this side of heaven. What chance has many a child today to build character in a home where the parents know not God, never read the Bible, never pray, never go to church? If for no other reason, parents should become Christians for their children's sake. If our children are lost, we parents are to blame, unless we have set before them the example of a Christian life.

As a boy Christ was obedient to his parents. This was a manly thing. Parents are in the place of God to the child: God cannot be everywhere, so he made parents. The first commandment on the second table is obedience to parents, and it is the first commandment with a promise. The apron strings of the mother may become the reins of government of the nation. We must obey before we can command.

The character of Jesus was developed in the church also. His parents were churchgoers, and they had cultivated that habit in the child. In speaking of Jesus as a churchgoer, Luke says that "as his custom was, he went into the synagogue." What great thoughts must have come to the mind of Christ as he visited the temple! What dormant potentialities were aroused as he sat and listened to the exposition of God's word! Humanly speaking, Christ owed a great deal in the development of his character to his attendance at the temple. Can a symmetrical character be produced outside of the church and religion? We think not; certainly the best character cannot be produced in one who ignores these. In spite of all her failures, the church is the best institution in the world today for the building of character. We do our children a great wrong when we deprive them of the privileges of the church.

But Jesus was also a member of the Bible school—the teaching part of the church. This is evident from the fact that the instruction received was in answering and asking questions. No doubt many of the Scripture passages quoted by him were learned in the Jewish Bible school.

The boy Jesus was an interested as well as an interesting scholar in the school. He was no mere visitor. He came with a well prepared lesson, and that indicated that he had studied the lesson at home under the instruction of his parents. What a lesson for parents today!

Have you ever considered how many great and noble men the Sunday school of our land have been instrumental in producing? Did you ever think how many of the most influential men of the world today give their time to Sunday school work, thereby recognizing the power that their own early training in the Sunday school had been in their lives?

Consider the great characters that have played upon the stage of American history—or the history of the world over for that matter—and you will find that a great part, if not the greatest part of the credit for the splendid characters possessed by these noble men and women is to be given to religion and the church.

"For what are men better than sheep or goats that nourish a blind life within the brain; if knowing God, they lift not hands of prayer? Both for themselves and those who call them friend?"

ILLINI COACH IS DISPUTED BY PLAYER



Otto Seiler, Who Takes Exceptions to Views Expressed by Coach Huff.

Otto E. Seiler, Illinois' famous drop kicker, recently came out in the "Illinois Magazine" in strong opposition to the views of Coach George Huff regarding summer baseball. Seiler, speaking from the athlete's viewpoint, is absolutely opposed to the professional idea. He says:

"With due respect to George Huff, I do not believe the failure of the universities to enforce the present rule constitutes any argument that the rule should be changed so that men will henceforth be protected by a law or regulation in doing what has been a violation of the rule. The real question is, 'shall we have professional or amateur athletics at our universities?' Let the authorities make examples of the men who violate rules. I believe amateur athletics belong within college competition, and should stay there."

PLAYER SOLD FOR \$5 BILL

New Manager of New York Highlanders Brought Low Price During Close Race at Columbus.

Harry Wolverton, recently chosen to manage the New York Highlanders in 1912, was once sold for \$5 by John F. Mulligan, now inspector of the waterworks plant at Muskogee, Okla. If newspaper reports are correct, it cost Frank R. Farrell many times a five to secure his new manager's release from the Pacific Coast league. In the summer of 1897, according to Mulligan, Wolverton was signed by the Columbus team of the Tri-State league, where he finished the season.



At that time the semi-professionals had a strong league in Columbus and there was a hard race on for the championship.

Mulligan was captain of one of the teams. After considerable trouble over a small salary Harry Wolverton signed a contract with Mulligan to finish the season with him. Wolverton was only a medium class player at that time, but was quick to learn. As the semi-pro season drew to its close it developed into a fight for the pennant between the Eclipse team and the Bryce nine, while the Easterns, captained by Mulligan, were considered out of the race.

Bob Quinn, manager of the Eclipse team, wanted Wolverton to patch up his team for the championship race and offered Mulligan \$5 for him for the rest of the season. The contract was accepted and Wolverton went to play with the Eclipse team, which later, however, lost the pennant.

Wolverton was born in Mount Vernon, Ohio. He went to the majors in 1899, joining the Chicago Nationals, and later was transferred to Philadelphia. He jumped to Washington when the war with the American league was in progress, but later returned to Philadelphia and was traded to Boston. He was sold to the Williamsport team of the Tri-State league, where as manager he produced two pennant-winning teams, and then went to Oakland in the Pacific Coast league.

Olympic Prizes.
The prizes for the Olympic games to be held in Stockholm, Sweden, next year are to be of no very great intrinsic value, but are somewhat elaborate, and consist of diplomas, bronze statuary, medals and cups. The honor of winning an event is looked upon as the chief essential and the prizes are a secondary consideration.

South Wales Cricket Team Strong.
The South Wales cricket team, which is scheduled to play the Marylebone Cricket Club of England a series of games, will be composed of several of the best players of the United Kingdom. Six players who visited England in 1909 will again be on the team.

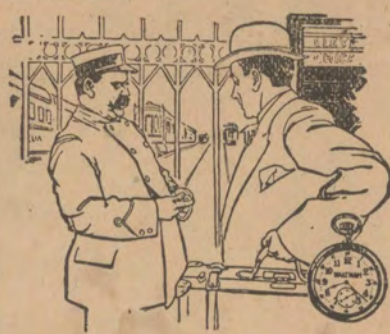
James Curry opened a new meat market last night on Fleming St. between Duval and Simonton Sts. Mr. Curry has been in this business for several years and understands it thoroughly.
