

New West. May 23. 1862

Dearest Friends

I have been in Camp all day. I came off duty this morning, and it looked so much for rain. I did not go out. Beside I had a visitor who just left at 2 o'clock. I then took a nap and was awakened by the Church bells ringing for 4 o'clock church. So I wrote I can write a letter yet before supper, although I have no idea when the mail will leave.

Your letter of the 11th was duly recd. The news continues glorious. Mrs. Pies behaved beautifully, but you need not mind her. I told Pies, and he felt mad at her. She is continually complaining of him in her letters. He is too good a man for her, by a hundred per cent. Just keep those shells until he gets home. I took another trip last week up on the reef. We caught one turtle that weighed 460 pounds, over 100 turtle eggs, any quantity of fish, while I gathered a lot of beautiful shells.

A member of our Company being sick I am doing duty with my company, although two days last week I was compelled to do that of a Field officer. Our Colonel and Chaplain are both in the Hospital - the Chaplain is very sick. The Lieut Col or Adjutant

Came out this week. Of the ten Captains but 4 are for duty. While the Officers are so unfortunate, the men are improving. My men are in fine order. But one, (Gardner) in the Hospital and he is convalescent. As for myself I never enjoyed better health. The people here tell me I look like a native. You can imagine when I tell you I was on duty 3 day last week two days as Field Officer of day and one day in Provost Guard.

A change has taken place in our Brigade since my last. One Regiment, the 9th A I has been sent to Pensacola to reinforce Gen Arnold. Gen Butler sent here for the whole available force, but Gen Brannen refused to let us go. Therefore I see little hope of us getting away from here before the war closes. Unless Gen Hunter finds something for us to do in the vicinity of Charleston. As this is the most healthy spot in the Department I feel but little inclination to leave it unless we go into active service. Besides we are pretty well acquainted here now. Yesterday I received a splendid notice file, having upon it the enclosed note. So you will see we make friends wherever we go. I have a number of acquaintances here I value very highly. While I am writing one of my men come in and informed me that the "Baltic" is in, so a Mail will go North in a day or two. Also a prize captured by the Bainbridge, loaded with 700 bales of Cotton.

The Union Men of town here are incensed at the opinion of Judge Marvin the U S Judge here who has decided that the prize steamer Circassian is an English vessel, and has ordered her to be released. She was caught by the Steamer Somerset under English Colors. There is no doubt but what she intended running the blockade. This Judge Marvin is a double faced individual, whose secret proclivities cannot be concealed. All his decisions lean toward them. Union men receive little mercy at his hands ^{in the state of salvage} when before him. No men of war, should send prizes here to be adjudicated, if there exists the least possible loophole for them to escape. The U S District Attorney refused to practice under him because he decided to allow Wine Bethel, a noted secessionist, a member of Convention that declared the State out of the Union, to practice.

Supper will soon be ready and I must
hurry up. I enclose for you benefit a couple
orders. They will give you an idea of things
in general. A couple of my boys were out
fishing today and caught 32 crawfish - the
same as lobsters. They are fine, and my boys
are cooking me a fine mess of them for supper.
I wish you had a couple. I am sure you
would look at them if you did not look
at them.

Do not be alarmed Mother. I take
the best care of myself. Besides I have a
young lady that will take care of me when I
get too lazy to do it myself. So I am well
prepared. Just take care of yourselves at home
and I will be all right in this region. Could
you send me your photographs. I would like to
have them all. If we remain here all summer
I will try and get a furlough in July or August
for a couple of weeks. Tell John Youngman
I have read his Gazette for several weeks.
I will send Annie a box of shells by the Boston
Remember me to Grandmother and all
friends. Write soon and often. Love
your son
