GENTLEMAN BURGLAR CAUGHT IN NEW YORK

Had Been Operating in Expensive Restaurants and Opera Houses

New York, May 23.—Jewelry and diamonds valued at \$20,000 were found by the police in a safety deposit vault of the Harlem branch of the Colonial Trust Company, which was rented by Bert Curtis, the alleged burglar of the "Beau Brummel" type who was arrested last Sunday.

"I bought that junk from another man," Curtis said as the detectives removed the five packages from the box. "I paid \$500 for the whole bunch of it."

When the police searched the flat occupied by Curtis under the name of Lamont, a woman gave them the key to the safety deposit vault.

In the apartment diamonds and jewelry worth more than \$5,000 were found.

In investigating the career of Curtis detectives found that he had visited the Metropolitan opera house at least one night a week and had spent most of his evenings in the expensive restaurants in Broadway and in the most exclusive hotels.

Several wealthy men and women, including J. Pierpont Morgan, Jr., have reported losses by robbery recently and they have been asked to assist in the identification of the jewelry.

LID WILL BE ON TIGHT WHEN FIGHT COMES OFF

Crowds at the Flynn-Johnson Fight Will Have to Be Orderly

East Las Vegas, N. M., May 23.—No lifting of the lid during the time the crowds are here for the Johnson-Flynn fight will be allowed, according to Mayor Robert J. Taupert. A greatly augmented police force is already being organized to keep order and to see that the gambling laws are not broken.

The mayor announced that he would revoke the license of any hotel or rooming house that attempts to charge exorbitant rates. No fakirs will be allowed to use the streets.

Promoter Curley announced today that the construction of the arena would begin the early part of June.

STEPS TO FORM NEW POLITICAL PARTY

Were Taken at Convention of the National Manufacturers Assn.

New York, May 23.—Steps looking forward to the formation of a new political party were taken at the session of the National Manufacturers Association, John Kirby, Jr., president of the association, spoke in favor of a new party and a committee was named to draft plans and ways and names of inaugurating the new movement. It is expected the committee will present a report tomorrow.

James A. Emery, of Washington, D. C., general consul for the National Council for Industrial Defense of the Manufacturer's Association, reviewed legislation pending in Congress which relates to labor difficulties and injunctions. He said some of the measures being considered "dig deep into the roots of government because they mean that privilege shall be given to some classes in this country that is denied to other classes."

LITTLE PEOPLE QUARREL

Nashville, Tenn., May 23.—Mrs. Katie M. Williams, 18, yesterday filed suit for divorce against Willie P. Williams, 34, alleging desertion and cruel treatment. The wife is 50 inches tall and the husband two inches taller. She charges among other things that he forced her to take part in a local street carnival, in the course of which he struck her.

MRS. PANKHURST FOUND GUILTY

London, England, May 23.—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst the militant suffragette leader and Mr. and Mrs. Bethick Lawrence, joint editors of Votes for Women, were convicted of conspiracy and inciting malicious damage to property and sentenced to nine months imprisonment.

UNION OF METHODIST CHURCHES

Baltimore, Md., May 23.—The United Methodist Church is practically assured but the Southern and Northern branches must blaze the way to the union, is the declaration in substance of the Methodist protest and commission on church union, in asking preference, in session here to continue its existence for another four years.

WOMEN BEING TRIED FOR MURDER OF NINE INFANTS

Was Nurse in Infant Hospital and Charged With Using Oxalic Acid

New York, May 23.—Charged with poisoning nine babies by putting oxalic acid in their milk, Winifred Ankers, a nurse, was placed on trial today before Supreme Justice Schuider in Brooklyn.

The nine children died several months ago in an infant hospital in Brooklyn where the Ankers woman was employed as nurse. The defendant has a baby of her own.

Her counsel claims that the nurse was made the victim by one who did the poisoning and is being "railroaded to prison."

MORGAN OWNS SANTA CLARA?

The most startling feature of "The Life Story of J. Pierpont Morgan," written by Carl Hovey and published by the Sturgis & Walton Company, New York, is the assertion of the author that Mr. Morgan owns the province of Santa Clara, Cuba. The publishers announced yesterday that the work will be on the market Thursday, says an exchange.

The Prosperous Tampa Tribune

The contract for the new Tribune building, which will be located at the corner of Twiggs and Tampa streets, was let yesterday. Contractor B. H. Davidson was the lucky bidder, his bid being the lowest of eight. The contract calls for the completion of the building by September 15, and work will begin on it as soon as the material arrives.—Tampa Tribune.

FIND BOTTOM OF VESUVIUS

London, England, May 23.—Scientists today are discussing the remarkable claim of Professor Malada of the Royal Observatory at Mount Vesuvius and an assistant named Varvazze that they descended 1,000 feet to the floor of the great volcano's crater yesterday.

Professor Malada declared that the trip consumed over nine hours, during which time the two men were nearly overcome with gases.

OFFICIALS AND CITIZENS OF LITTLE ROCK IN ARMED SEARCH FOR MURDEROUS MANIAC

Has Terrorized City for Several Weeks By Bold Robberies—Shot at Woman and Killed Her Baby Daughter—Hysterical Terror Among Women

Little Rock, Ark., May 23.—Municipal police, sheriffs deputies constables and citizens who answered the mayor's proclamation to arm themselves and make strenuous efforts to capture the mysterious prowler who for several weeks has terrorized Little Rock and who early yesterday reached the point of murder in his campaign of crime, were still scouring the byways of this place early today. Scores of homes were searched without avail. Almost every spot to which it was believed possible for the murderer to have gone into hiding and to which it was believed possible for him to have made his way during the night has been carefully combed, every nook and corner being entered.

FORMER KEY WEST NEGRO IS WANTED \$1,000 WORTH

James Dean and Othe's Were Implicated Get Rich Quick Scheme

In the United States court yesterday the case of Henry E. Bryant et al. was again called, and as one of the defendants, James Dean, was not present the case was ordered continued until Wednesday, May 29.

The \$1,000 bond of Dean was ordered estreated at the session of the court the day previous and a capias issued for his arrest, he being supposed to be at present in Kansas City. Dean is a negro minister, and one of the defendants in a case which is being closely followed, as the defendants are to be tried for the alleged use of the mails in a scheme to defraud. Bryant is also a negro, who together with several other negroes, formed the American Patent Manufacturing Company.—Times Union.

Dean resided in Key West some years ago and held a county office.

CONTEMPLATES SENDING WARSHIPS

Washington, May 23.—The negro rebellion in Cuba has caused the state department to consider sending a warship to the eastern end of the island. Reports from the vicinity of Santiago are very disquieting, thousands of negroes being reported under arms and wrought up to a frenzy that may result in horrible massacres.

MUNSEY NOT PRO-MISED ANYTHING

New York, N. Y., May 23.—Frank A. Munsey, the publisher, today authorized a denial of the statement recently published that Roosevelt has promised him the post of ambassador to Great Britain in the event he is elected president. Munsey says he is not working for Roosevelt for personal reward, but because he believes Roosevelt to be the man needed to administer the nation's affairs for the next four years.

RED CLOTHES UNDER BAN

Chicago, May 23.—Red waist coats, scarlet neckties and all other outer garments of blazing hue have been forbidden to employees of one Western railroad while they are on duty. The order, which is right to the police reads:

"No employee shall wear red colored outer garments, as they may be taken for stop signals."

SISTER MARY PAULIN AT REST

Sister Mary Paulin died at 2.10 yesterday morning at the Convent of Mary Immaculate after a several weeks illness. Sister Mary Paulin had been in very poor health for several years and was sent to Key West with the hope that the even climate here might restore her to health. She spent three years in this city and during that time seemed to improve considerably in health until a few weeks ago she became worse and sank gradually until the end came yesterday morning.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 5.30, and last night Sister Mary Paulin was wrapped in the last long sleep, in the peace and quiet of the Convent Cemetery.

NEGRO'S PRESTIGE

Lexington, May 23.—George Minnis, local negro politician and boss blacksmith, who has figured conspicuously in past elections as a controlling power, is tonight a bigger man than ever in colored circles. Sallie P. Hall, a dusky damsel today brought suit against him for \$10,000, alleging breach of promise to marry her. This is the first suit of its kind between negroes of record here, and it is probably the greatest amount for which any negro south of the Ohio river was ever sued on similar grounds.

ALLEN REWARD INCREASED

Roanoke, Va., May 21.—The detectives in charge of the hunt for members of the Allen clan who are under indictment for the Hillsville murders, tonight announced an increase of rewards offered by the State for Sidney Allen and Wesley Edwards. The offer was made on the authority of Governor Mann.

The additional offer puts \$1,500 on the head of Sidney Allen, dead or alive.

Seven hundred and fifty dollars is placed on Wesley Edwards' head dead or alive.

SENATOR CRAINE TO RETIRE

Washington, May 23.—Senator W. Murray Crane, of Massachusetts, will not be a candidate for re-election to the United States Senate before the primaries in his State next autumn, according to a statement made by him today.

LAFOLLETTE SAYS CASH BEHIND TEDDY

Claims Men Close to Wall Street Have Campaign Fund of a Million

Toledo, O., May 23.—Declaring that neither President Taft nor Mr. Roosevelt could be nominated at Chicago, Senator La Follette entered the primary on his own behalf for delegates to the national convention.

In his opening speech delivered at Bowling Green, about 20 miles out of Toledo, Senator La Follette challenged Mr. Roosevelt to make public forthwith a complete list of those who had contributed to his campaign and the amounts they had contributed.

The challenge came coupled with the assertion that three men closely identified with Wall street namely, George W. Perkins and E. H. Gray of the United States Steel Corporation and Dan R. Hanna whose interests in the coal and iron industry are multifarious, had furnished a campaign fund of \$1,000,000 which was being freely spent for the purpose of getting delegates for Mr. Roosevelt.

WON'T PARDON MURDERERS

Atlanta, Ga., May 23.—Governor Brown today turned to the Old Testament injunction to justify his action in refusing to say execution in the five murder cases appealed to him during his present term of office.

"Moreover ye shall take no satisfaction for the life of a murderer which is guilty of death; but he shall surely be put to death. Who-so killeth any person, the murderer shall be put to death by the mouth of witnesses."—Verses 30 and 31, thirty-fifth chapter of Numbers.

BIG FEE TO LAWYERS WHO AIDED MORSE TO LIBERTY

Famous Financier Regaining Health and Will Hundred Thousand Bones

Atlanta, Ga., May 21.—Charles W. Morse will pay \$100,000 to the lawyers who were instrumental in securing his freedom, according to a story printed here today in an afternoon paper.

Attorney Thomas B. Felder, of the law firm of Anderson, Felder, Rountree, who acted in the case in conjunction with a Columbus, Ohio, firm, said after reading the story that the arrangement his firm had with Mr. Morse was confidential and that he did not care to discuss it.

A SOCIAL MEETING

Cincinnati, May 23.—With the example and influence of sixty socially prominent women to blaze the way, Cincinnati is about to start a women's dress reform movement.

At a meeting of the Home Economics Association, the startling fact was disclosed that high school girls are painting their faces, using cosmetics and dressing "as if for a party instead of the school room."

Thereupon the following resolution was offered by the president of the organization, Miss Isabel Neave, and was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved: That as far as possible we standardize our dress along lines of appropriateness, comfort, health and simplicity, in order to set the proper example in this matter."

Some of the things condemned by the association as evils which have fastened on Cincinnati girls and women to an alarming extent are high heels, low-necked waists for street wear, sleeves above the elbow, paints and other cosmetics, veiling and gauze hose for street wear.

TAFT AND TEDDY ARE BEING RIDICULED

By All the World for Their Unseemly Antics Says Senator Stone

Washington, D. C., May 23.—Senator Stone of Missouri, yesterday addressed the Senate on the "Modern Damon and Pythias and Correlated Subjects Pertaining to Current Politics."

He declares that the Taft-Roosevelt controversy was a series of spectacular vaudeville stunts in politics without a parallel in the history of our country and which he sincerely hoped would not be repeated.

He said that the outside world looked aghast and the press and reading public of Europe and the enlightened nations everywhere criticize, cartoon, laugh and taunt. He further declared that the Democratic candidates are conducting themselves with dignity and propriety.

STORY OF THE FILM

The picture opens with an Indian war dance, in which hundreds of Sioux Indians take part. Two prospectors are then shown lost in the desert. The horse of one drops dead, and the rider, half delirious from privation and thirst, starts to drink the last drops of water in his canteen. His companion, Drake, prevents him, urging to conserve it to the last moment. Night falls, and a band of Indians come skulking along. After the camp is asleep they cautiously make their way to the animals and rustle them off. The thundering hoofs awake the emigrants, and when they see what has occurred wild excitement prevails. Anticipating an attack, a volunteer is called for to ride to the settlement for help. All look to the boastful Drake, but he declines the mission in an agony of fear. Myers looks at him disdainfully, and announces that he will undertake the dangerous ride.

One of the few remaining horses is quickly saddled and Myers gallops forth. His trail is taken up by a couple of Indians and a sensational running fight takes place in which Myers kill his pursuers.

In full war paint, mounted on ponies, a couple hundred Indians swoop down on the camp. Circling round and round, in an immense circle, the redskins fire at the emigrants, huddled behind the wagons. As a man next to Drake falls, dying, the coward is terror stricken, and crawling in agonized fear on his stomach he gets out from behind the wagons, and dodging and skulking behind dead horses and Indians, escapes. Ethel sees him, and her scorn is plainly shown as she watches his departure.

Myers reaches the settlement at dawn, and the settlers are soon mounted and riding madly back to the battle field. Cut-backs are given, alternating between the settlers and the emigrants, at various stages of the conflict.

THE DIGNITY OF HARD LABOR.

Apparently there are a large number of people who are under the impression that manual labor is not dignified. Many of those who earn their living by their brawn and muscle are disposed to apologize for their occupations. This shows itself in the number of boys who are sent to school to learn to become eight or ten dollar a week bookkeepers and stenographers when they might be twenty dollar carpenters or brick masons. Of course, the boy who is really adapted to office work may become very successful, but there are large numbers who prefer to remain mediocre office assistants rather than soil their hands by manual labor.

This is an entirely wrong idea and the boys should be taught the dignity of hard labor, should be taught that anything that is honest is honorable, and that a twenty dollar a week mechanic is far better off than a ten dollar a week clerk.

THE HOTEL IS NEEDED.

The proposition of certain capitalists to build a one hundred room hotel in Key West if given concessions are made seems to us to be an excellent opportunity for Key West to secure a large and modern hotel. That we need it was demonstrated beyond question last winter when every hotel and boarding house in the city was filled up and people were turned away. This city cannot afford to turn away visitors when lack of accommodations is the only excuse we can offer. Now is the time to start work on a new hotel so that it will be in readiness for the rush of travel which is certain to come this way again next winter. The Journal believes the Chamber of Commerce can, and will grasp this opportunity while it presents itself.

GOING AT IT RIGHT.

Recent events have shown that there is but one best way to look out for this city's interests in Washington and keep our just claims before the Florida delegation in Congress. We have often been disposed to criticize the seeming lack of interest shown by some of our representatives, but when it is considered that every wide place in the road, in the entire State is reaching out for something, it is small wonder that our representatives overlook us. The proper thing is to be on deck every time the bell rings and remind them that we are on the map, and of the things we need. We have demonstrated that that method gets results.

Wilt Thou be Made Whole?

By Rev. Parley E. Zartmann, D.D., Secretary of Extension Department Moody Bible Institute, Chicago

TEXT—Wilt thou be made whole?—John 5:6.

What else would be the deepest desire of a man who had been sick for 38 years and who had been waiting daily for a long time to have some friend put him into the pool at the time of the moving of the waters? but the question is an arduous one which Jesus asks for the purpose of making the man conscious of his condition, arousing his desire, calling forth the confession of need, and assuring him of the possibility of healing. Thus the Great Physician constantly deals with souls, to convince sinners of their need of healing and to teach Christians that there are still defects in their own lives. In the one case failure of faith prevents healing; in the other, lack of submission prevents wholeness.

The study of the impotent man is interesting from every point of view; and the place at which the healing occurred is significant—Bethesda, meaning house of mercy. The waters of the pool had certain curative properties, but the man of the story was in such a plight that he had no friends to put him into the pool when the water was troubled. It requires no strength of the imagination to suppose that his reply to Jesus not only was full of pathos, but also full of a great longing, for notice the quick response and the great result: "Jesus saith unto him rise, take up thy bed, and walk. And immediately the man was made whole, and took up his bed and walked."

The main point of the story is in v. 24: "Verily, verily, I say unto you, he that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life." This is really the gospel in a sentence, for the supreme purpose of Jesus was to give life and to heal us from all infirmities.

We need not describe eternal life; but it is desirable, glorious and necessary. You cannot take a sin-sick, ruined soul out of this world and inhabit heaven with it in the next. You cannot. There is no such thing after death as a spiritual revolution. God would have to shut you in. The glories of heaven would mean nothing to you, the songs of heaven would be torture to you, and heaven itself a perpetual torment. So, because eternal life is so desirable and is the free gift of God, through Jesus Christ our Lord, the question is pertinent, "Wilt thou be made whole?"

The conditions upon which you are made whole, of passing from death unto life, are knowledge, repentance, belief, obedience. They are so easy that we make them hard and miss the blessing because we do not accept them in their simplicity. Eternal life in such a case is not a gift that we cannot have but that we will not have.

Let us never forget two outstanding things about sin: 1. It defiles. Sin is not manly, and ever since the day when the devil beguiled Adam and Eve the trail of the serpent has wound its way through human nature and through human history, leaving defilement in its wake. 2. Sin destroys. This is an old-fashioned doctrine but as true as it is old. In spite of all that men may say, or hope, or do, the wages of sin is death. Therefore, again the question is pertinent, Wilt thou be made whole?

This old-time story is a parable and a promise, for Jesus Christ still waits to be gracious.

Every place of need may be a Bethesda, and just where you are Jesus stands opposite your need saying, "Wilt thou be made whole?" By every possible way he is pleading, "O Israel, thou has destroyed thyself, but in me is thy help." Thousands of people of every age and clime have found relief, healing and salvation just as the man at the pool found it that day by simple trust.

"Wilt thou be made whole?" That is the question. How often Jesus has had to say, "Ye will not come unto me that ye might have life." What a tragedy when a soul turns away from him and goes out into darkness, despair and death. You can refuse Christ, but how can you?

Let the story teach us three things: The need of prompt response to Christ's words, no thought of failure in the future, and continuous use of the strength which Christ gives. "Seek ye the Lord while he may be found; call ye upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake his way and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return unto the Lord and he will have mercy upon him; and to our God for he will abundantly pardon."

"The Great Physician now is near, The sympathizing Jesus." "Man of Sorrows, what a name For the Son of God who came. Ruined sinners to reclaim. Hallelujah! What a Savior!"
