Hon. Jefferson B. Browne addressed the meeting as did also a number of others. Mayor Fogarty, who was present, replied, stating that he had worked night and day and done everything which his conscience had told him was right. Said the Mayor: "I have not touched my mother's home, nor my own place. I have left them in the same condition that the storm left them. I have devoted all my time and energy to that which I conscientiously believed would work for the greatest good for the entire city."

The Mayor's remarks were greeted by enthusiastic applause.

Captain Towles states that Monday's hurricane was not felt at Fort Myers, nor at any point in Lee county.

The new steamer recently purchased by Capt. Towles to ply between this city and Fort Myers will arrive in port in a few days. This steamer will carry both freight and passengers, and together with the three-masted schooner, also belonging to Capt. Towles, will furnish ample shipping accommodations between this city and Fort Myers and the lower west coast towns of the State.

As Fort Myers is the nearest railroad point to this city on the west coast the steamer line will no doubt prove very popular.

TELEPHONE OFFICIALS HERE

Arrive in City Bringing Crew of Workmen With Them.

T. L. Ingram of Atlanta, General Superintendent of Construction, and E. R. Crews, of Savannah, Superintendent of Plant Department, two officials of the Southern Bell telephone Co., arrived in the city early this morning on the S. S. Miami bringing with them a crew of twenty-five telephone repairmen, and active operators will begin at once to rebuild the plant here which suffered much damage from the hurricane. To a Journal representative this morning, Mr. Ingram stated that he had brought an ample crew of workmen to push the reconstruction work as rapidly as possible, and while it is vague at this time to state the exact date the local telephone service will be resumed no expense will be spared to have the plant in working order at the very earliest date.

Monday's storm wrought particular destruction to this plant, nearly all the cableways and poles having been blown down, necessitating the construction of entirely new lines. Most of the wreckage has already been cleared by local manager Atkins under the direction of Supt. Andrews.

The re-establishment of the telephone service will be a great convenience to the commercial interests of the city.

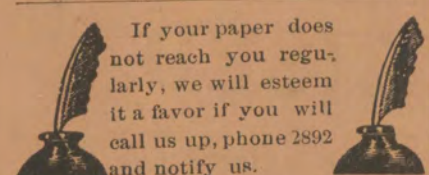

WIFE CONFESSES.

Guilt of Howard Little Thought to Be Established.

Bluefield, W. Va.—The guilt of Howard Little, who was arrested about a week ago, charged with the murder of "Aunt Betsy" Justis, Geo. A. Meadows and wife and three children, seems now to be established beyond a reasonable doubt.

His wife confessed to having washed his bloody clothing the day after the murder, and in her affidavit she says also that he left their home about dark on the night of the murder and returned the next morning with his clothes all bloody and torn and said that he would kill her if she told anything about his condition.

He borrowed a 32-caliber revolver a few days before the crime was committed, and returned it on the following Wednesday with two chambers empty. The body of George Meadows was exhumed, and two bullets taken from it by Drs. Richardson and White, were almost identical with the balls taken from shells belonging to the weapon Little had borrowed.

DEATH OF JUDGE TURNER.

Prominent Georgian Numbered With Those of the Departed.

Eatonton, Ga.—Judge Joseph Sidney Turner died at his home in this place after a lingering illness of several months.

His illness began last winter, when he underwent a surgical operation. From this he never successfully rallied.

Judge Turner occupied a number of positions of trust and importance, and at the time of his death was chairman of the Georgia state prison commission.

He was born at Turnwold plantation, December 19, 1861.

His parents were Colonel William Addison and Louisa Dennis Turner. His father was editor of The Countryman, the only newspaper ever published on a farm, and it was upon this paper that Joel Chandler Harris began his career as an apprentice.

TROLLEY CAR TURNED TURTLE.

Two Persons Killed and Eight Injured, Three Probably Fatally.

Pittsburg, Pa.—Two men were killed and eight other passengers seriously injured, three of them probably fatally, in a trolley car accident here.

The accident occurred in the fashionable district of the East End on the trolley car of the Pittsburg and West Virginia Railway Company, which was on this line was rounding a corner at a fair rate of speed, one of the axles broke. The car swerved around and upset, the dead and injured being caught in the wreckage.

All the victims were passengers.

NO MARKED CHANGE.

Cotton Crop Condition for the Month of September.

New Orleans.—Taking the cotton belt as a whole, there has been no marked change, and the change, if any, has been toward further deterioration, according to the Times-Democrat's cotton crop bulletin for the month of September.

Continuing the bulletin says: "The storm of September 20 did great damage in the districts, which came within its sweep. Picking has made rapid progress and there is generally an abundance of labor for this purpose. Farmers seem disposed to sell at current prices, at least enough to pay their debts, but a considerable part of the crop is likely to be held for an advance later on. The boll weevil has wrought havoc in certain sections, but the intense heat minimized the loss from this pest."

Hospital For Tech School.

Atlanta.—Mrs. Joseph Brown Whitehead has given the first money to the building of a hospital at the Georgia School of Technology. She has given \$5,000, and has the privilege of naming the building, which will be called the Joseph Brown Whitehead hospital, in memory of her husband, the late Joseph Brown Whitehead. This gift makes possible the beginning at once of the work on the building.

Town Almost Destroyed.

Black Lick, Pa.—Fire resulting from a lamp explosion licked up the greater portion of this town, one of the busiest in Indiana county. The flames gained such headway that dynamite had to be used to blow up the buildings in the path of the flames to prevent further destruction. A score of business houses have been wiped out. The population is 2,000.

Pays Death Penalty.

Athens, Ga.—Will Hawkins, colored, paid the penalty of wife murder in the county jail. The hanging was in private, and was witnessed by only a few persons. Hawkins maintained an indifference to the end. His last few days were spent in reading his Bible.

Typos Favor Sanitarium.

Atlanta.—At the regular monthly meeting of the Atlanta Typographical Union, No. 48, resolutions were passed endorsing the establishment of a tuberculosis sanitarium in Atlanta.

TAMMANY CONTROL

Justice Gaynor Named For Mayor of Greater New York.

WAS UNANIMOUS VOTE

Tammany Cohorts Were So Strong That They Easily Overrode Opposition Faction, Headed by State Senator Patrick McCarren.

New York.—Justice William Jay Gaynor, of the New York state supreme court, was nominated for mayor of Greater New York by the democratic city convention.

The nomination was made with a great demonstration of enthusiasm, and by a unanimous vote. Tammany had its own way, which initiates the democratic campaign for the control of the city government for the next four years. Of the 1,679 delegates represented, Tammany had control, to all intents and purposes, of almost the entire representation of the boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx, mustering 918 votes.

The Tammany cohorts were so strong that they overrode with ease the opposition faction headed by State Senator Patrick H. McCarren, of Brooklyn, who hoped to secure the renomination of Comptroller Metz, of that borough. The convention nominated for this office, Robert M. Moore, president of the Commercial Trust company, the Tammany selection.

In the mayoralty fight, Justice Gaynor's chief opponent will be Otto T. Bannard, president of the New York Trust company, who was nominated by the republicans a few days ago, and who has some assurances of support from the fusionists. There yet remains the possibility that the Independence League will make the contest a triangular one by naming a separate ticket.

The platform adopted by the democratic convention dealt broadly with national, state and municipal questions, denouncing the recent tariff legislation, and objecting to any legislative interference in local affairs by the state legislature.

SPANISH VICTORY.

All Madrid Celebrating Occupation of Mt. Gurugu.

Madrid.—The main stronghold of the Moors was captured by the Spanish troops when Mount Gurugu was successfully stormed by General Marina's army, according to dispatches from Melilla.

The Spanish standard now floats from the top of the mountain fastnesses, from which the Spanish troops had been so long harassed and which the Riff tribesmen had come to believe to be invulnerable. The Spanish losses in the engagement are reported as insignificant, while the Moors are said to have lost heavily and to have been completely routed.

Madrid is preparing to celebrate the victory, which is considered to have virtually ended the war.

Moors Make Desperate Assault.

Madrid.—A dispatch from Melilla says that the Moors made a desperate attack on the Spanish force which drove the tribesmen from their stronghold on Mount Gurugu in a final effort to save their forces from rout. The Spanish troops were in readiness, however, and the Moors were repulsed with the loss of but two soldiers.

BRYANS CELEBRATE.

Prominent Democrats Attend Silver Wedding Anniversary.

New York.—Many prominent democrats in the east received invitations to attend the silver wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. William Jennings Bryan at Lincoln. Upon the invitations were engraved the words, "No presents."

Plot Against King Peter's Life?

Vienna.—A plot against the life of King Peter, of Serbia, in which many army officers were concerned, and having for its ultimate object the removal of the present dynasty and the placing of a British prince upon the throne, has been discovered, according to reports received here.

Dying Man Fought Friends.

Chattanooga, Tenn.—A telephone message from Rising Fawn, Ga., states that Dr. E. P. Nicholson, of Valley Head, has been poisoned by taking a spoonful of poison by mistake for cough syrup. He died in terrible agony. He fought all within his reach like a madman. He was 74 years old.

Was Friend to Johnson.

Nashville.—News reached here of the death at Shelbyville of Joseph H. Thompson, one of the closest friends and advisers of President Johnson during the famous impeachment trial. Thompson was 77 years old and was formerly consul to the island of St. Thomas.

Jeffries Will Fight.

Paris.—According to Auto, a sporting newspaper, James J. Jeffries has made the announcement that he will probably fight Jack Johnson for the heavyweight championship on April 10 or 11 at San Francisco.
