TEXTILE INDUSTRY TIED UP BY STRIKE

12 Cotton Mills Employing 13,000 Operatives Close Plant

New Bedford, Mass., July 17.—Practically the entire textile industry in the city of New Bedford was tied up when the loomfixers and other employees walked out in sympathy with the striking weavers. Twelve cotton mills, employing 13,000 operatives were closed.

The textile employees were strengthened by the strike of the number of workers in other trades belonging to the union organization known as the Industrial Workers of the World, which is decidedly anarchistic in its tenets and practices.

The weavers went on strike several days ago against the adoption of a new method of grading cotton cloth in the manufacture of which they were employed. They assert that under the new grading their wages are cut.

It is feared that unless an agreement is reached soon the lamentable scenes of Lawrence last fall may be reenacted here. Most of the mill operatives are foreigners.

LANDLADY INHERITS \$250,000.

Jamaica, N. Y., July 17.—When Edwin A. Dodd, a bachelor, died here on June 5, of last year, bequeathing his estate to his landlady, it was not known that he left much property. The state appraiser has just estimated his estate at nearly \$250,000.

McCOMBS WILL DIRECT CAMPAIGN FOR WILSON

Young New Yorker Will Not Make Appointments Until he Sees Wilson

Chicago, July 17.—William F. McCombs, of New York, Gov. Wilson's choice, was elected chairman of the democratic national committee, and was empowered to appoint a committee of not fewer than nine members to take active charge of the democratic presidential nominee's campaign. Mr. McCombs also was authorized to select a national treasurer and such other officers as he may see fit, including possibly a vice chairman and, after consulting with Gov. Wilson, to name the location of the headquarters. Mr. McCombs said he thought the principal headquarters would be in New York.

"But I am not going to appoint anybody or select any place until I confer with Gov. Wilson," he added.

HARRY ENGLER FINED.

Harry Engler was tried in criminal court yesterday for striking a small boy with a whip. Engler claimed that he was striking at the mule which the boy was driving, and that if he did hit the boy, it was unintentional. He claimed that the wagon drawn by the mule had been driven into his horse, and the horse injured by the shafts. He was fined \$5 and costs.

MELVIN VANIMAN'S BODY RECOVERED

Together With Frederick Almas in Ocean Off Atlantic City

Atlantic City, N. J., July 17.—The bodies of Melvin Vaniman and Frederick Almas were recovered from the waters of the ocean off Atlantic City.

Vaniman was the builder of the ill-fated \$250,000 dirigible airship Akron, with which he planned to cross the Atlantic ocean. Almas was one of the members of his crew at the time of the explosion which wrecked the great craft.

The Akron exploded during a trip a half mile off the boardwalk on the morning of July 2. All on board were killed. They were Melvin Vaniman, his brother, Calvin Vaniman, Frederick Almas, Walter Guest and Geo. Brilliant.

The body of Calvin Vaniman was recovered the day of the accident but the others were buried in the wreckage of the aircraft beneath eighteen feet of water after the half-mile drop from the sky. Guest's body was found last week. The body of Brilliant is still missing.

DOCTOR WAS CONVICTED BEFORE CRIMINAL COURT

Doctor Greenoble Was Found Guilty of Practising Here Illegally

Doctor Arthur Greenoble was found guilty of practising illegally yesterday in criminal court. The specific charge against the doctor was that he had no license or diploma permitting him to engage in the practice of medicine. His attorneys asked for a new trial and the judge allowed them until Friday to take the necessary steps.

Dr. Greenoble has been practising here for some little time and it is said that he has benefitted several people whom he has treated. On the other hand, there is said to be one case which he treated in which the patient did not fare off so fortunately. The trial created considerable interest and quite a crowd of spectators gathered in the court room to hear the testimony.

153 HOMES WON BY WORKMEN.

(From Havana Post)

The state raffled 153 homes for workmen on Sunday. They were distributed among 1,186 persons, who had applied for them. The drawing was made in the same way as are the numbers in the national lottery, and was presided over by the secretary of agriculture and Governor Asbert.

The homes for workmen are built by the state and delivered on the installment plan to the persons who draw them, the payments being the same as rent.

GERMANY PURCHASES BIG MILITARY BALLOON

Pays \$125,000 For The World's Greatest Non-Rigid Airship

Berlin, July 17.—The German army purchased for military purposes the new Siemens Shuckart dirigible balloon, the world's greatest non-rigid airship.

The selection of this airship by the army came as a surprise as it was considered practically settled that the new Zeppelin dirigible, Victoria Luise, would be acquired. Even the price had been fixed, the amount being placed at \$125,000.

The Victoria Luise made a flight from Berlin to Hamburg Sunday carrying fourteen persons, including a well known meteorologist. She left the capital at 12:13 p. m. Saturday, arrived in Hamburg at 9:45 Sunday morning. The route was roundabout, 125 of the 342 miles being over the open sea.

NEW ARONOVITZ BUILDING SETS A PACE FOR BUSINESS HOUSES

Progressive Duval Street Merchant Has a Structure That is a Credit to The City—Handsome Pressed Brick Front of Latest Architectural Design

The most modern and up-to-date business building to be erected in the city of Key West is now nearing completion, and very soon it will be opened to the public, filled with the latest goods just from the northern markets. This is the building being built by Mr. D. Aronovitz, one of the city's most progressive merchants. It means something to a city to have a block of the type that Mr. Aronovitz is building, and this new structure sets a pace for business houses that will hereafter be built on the island.

The new Aronovitz building, now nearing completion, measures fifty by seventy-five feet, and is two stories high. It is built of the latest and most improved concrete, and has a handsome pressed brick front. The front is really a thing of beauty, and embodies the latest architectural designs for finely built fronts. The building is built after the approved fire-proof specifications, and is really a lasting monument to the industry and enterprise of Mr. Aronovitz.

The first floor of the new building will be occupied by the department store of Mr. Aronovitz and the departments will be ideally arranged. The second floor will be divided into two rooms, the largest room, 75 by

32 feet, will be specially designed and fitted up for a public hall, and will be specially adapted for dancing and other amusement purposes.

A beautifully designed balcony will run the full length across the front of the building, and there will be an unusually large and sumptuous appointed balcony running the entire length of the building across the back part. Connected with the main new building, from the rear balcony, will be an elegantly appointed roof garden. The entire business building, roof garden and all accessory rooms will be fitted up with the latest and most approved systems of gas and electric lighting apparatus.

The new Aronovitz building will be completed within two weeks now, and immediately upon its completion Mr. Aronovitz will open with a new stock of goods, specially selected for the late summer and early fall trade. The upper story will be rented to some of the city's fraternal organizations; already several parties are considering the location, it being ideally located for such purposes. The new building will doubtless be the first of a number of modern structures to be built at an early date.

CITY HEALTH DEPT. TO WAGE WAR ON RATS

Communication From City Health Officer Emphasizes Importance of War

Key West, Fla., July 16, 1912. To the Citizens of Key West:

At a special meeting of the city council, held yesterday, this office was authorized to start a crusade on rats and mice, and a bonus of five cents will be paid for each rat delivered, dead or alive, to the city jailer at the city jail, and one cent for each mouse. Bubonic plague made its appearance in our neighboring city, Havana, Cuba, recently and while no undue apprehension need be felt about the matter at this time, yet it is imperative that we as a community begin a city-wide movement to free the community of rats at once.

Plague epidemics follow the usual shipping channels and it is customary for the rat population of a place to become afflicted with this disease for months before human cases develop.

Even at this date it is possible that we may have infected rats in our community.

The disease is contracted by inoculation through the bites of fleas from plague infected rats and one case of rat plague is infinitely more dangerous to a community than many human cases.

Plague can only gain a foot hold where there are rats and by destroying these pests we can become immune to this dreaded scourge.

There is no "best" way for killing rats and mice; the various rat poisons sold by druggists and stores in general, are all effective when used according to directions.

Trapping should be resorted to and the cat, the rat's natural enemy, should not be forgotten.

It should be remembered that rats will at once quit your premises if the kitchen refuse is kept in closed receptacles and no food left accessible to them.

The reports from Boston to Galveston have all started killing rats and Key West, having more frequent communication with Havana than any of them, should certainly not delay this urgent work.

BIG MILITARY CAMP IS DESERTED AT ANNISTON

Good Health Prevailed During Encampment—Other Troops Now on Site

Anniston, Ala., July 17.—Only the remnants of the regular army were in camp Pettus Monday and the national maneuver site had a somewhat deserted look. The second period of the maneuvers opened Tuesday, and members of the national guard regiments from Georgia, Florida and Alabama arrived during the day.

Announcement was made that during the period just ended excellent health prevailed among the soldiers. Out of approximately 5,000 men encamped here only three now are in the hospital.

GELERY CITY VOTES FOR BRICK ROADS

Progressive Sanford Will Build Twenty-two Miles of Brick Roads

Sanford, Fla., July 17.—That Sanford and environs will remain in the front ranks of the progressive cities of Florida was again demonstrated by the results of the election in this special road and bridge district which was held last Saturday for the purpose of endorsing a bond issue amounting to \$200,000, the money to be used to construct twenty-two miles of brick roads, leading to the city's rich farm lands.

The campaign has been a quiet and thorough one, the committees went about their work in a systematic manner with the result that very few dissenting voices were heard in the matter, the results in Sanford were 224 for good roads and 37 against good roads. Paola showed six for and three against; Lake Mary went 12 for and 4 against. Six votes were thrown out as improperly marked. Out of 315 possible votes, 274 were polled and 224 of these were in favor of good roads.

The victory is one of the most overwhelming ever witnessed in this district and Sanford proposes to set a pace in development and progress that will cause competitive cities to adopt something other than hot air as a material to keep in her class.

SITUATION IN HAVANA IN HAND SAYS TAYLOR

Attorney Arrived From Quarantined City Monday Night on Mascotte

Attorney H. H. Taylor accompanied by his wife and son returned from Havana Monday night on the Mascotte, after having been held up in that city several days as a result of the quarantine which was then in force. Mr. Taylor stated last night that no uneasiness is felt in Havana, as the health officials there, both American and Cuban have the situation well in hand and there is practically no danger of a spread of the disease, under present conditions. He stated that he felt no uneasiness whatever while in Havana, except an anxiety to return home.

Mr. Taylor speaks in the highest terms of the American and Cuban health officials in Havana, and states that they show every consideration to passengers who are detained there.

ITALIANS CAPTURE LAST OF THE FORTIFIED TOWNS

Routed Turks And Arab Allies After One of Bitterest Fights of War

Rome, July 17.—It was officially announced here that General Garioni, in command of the Italian forces in Tripoli, had captured the city of Sidi Ali. The battle took place early Sunday morning.

The Turks and Arabs put up a strong defense and it was only after a bitter fight that the Italian forces drove them out. The Italian artillery was especially effective. The Turks and Arabs are reported to have suffered "enormous losses."

Sidi Ali was the last one of the chain of fortified towns held by the Turkish and Arab allies and its loss is a severe blow.

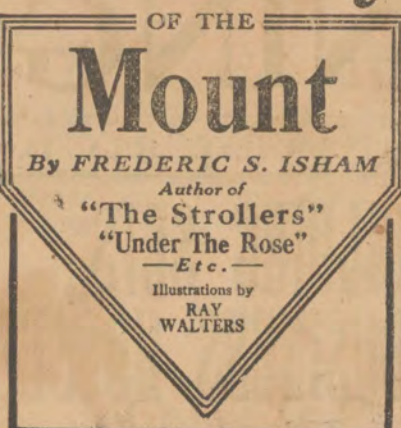

IN REPLY TO A SNEAKING ATTACK

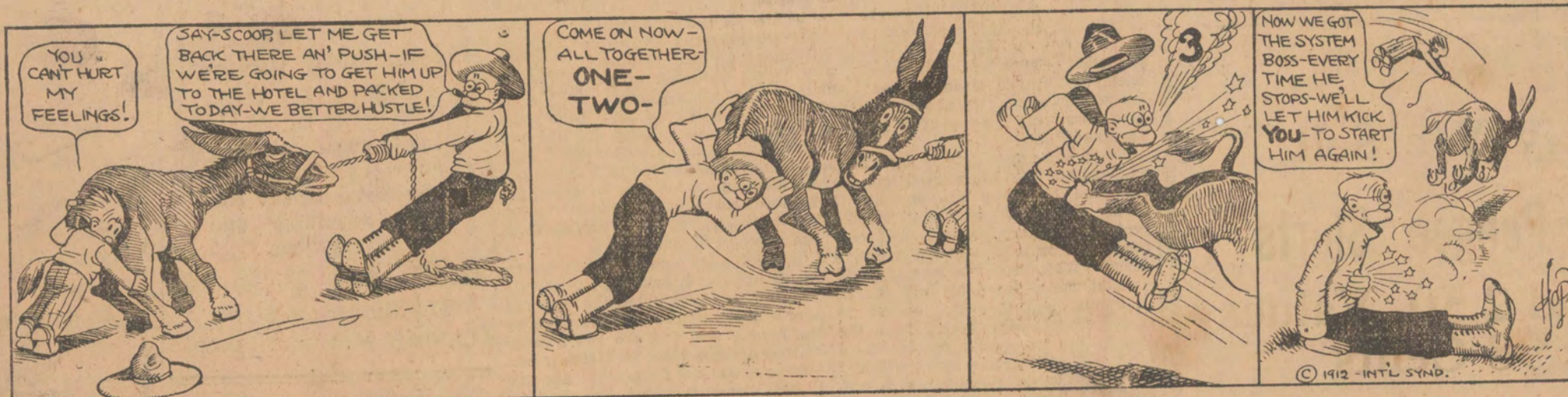

"Unsettled," answered Uncle Peter when she got back, and then there was an embarrassing silence.

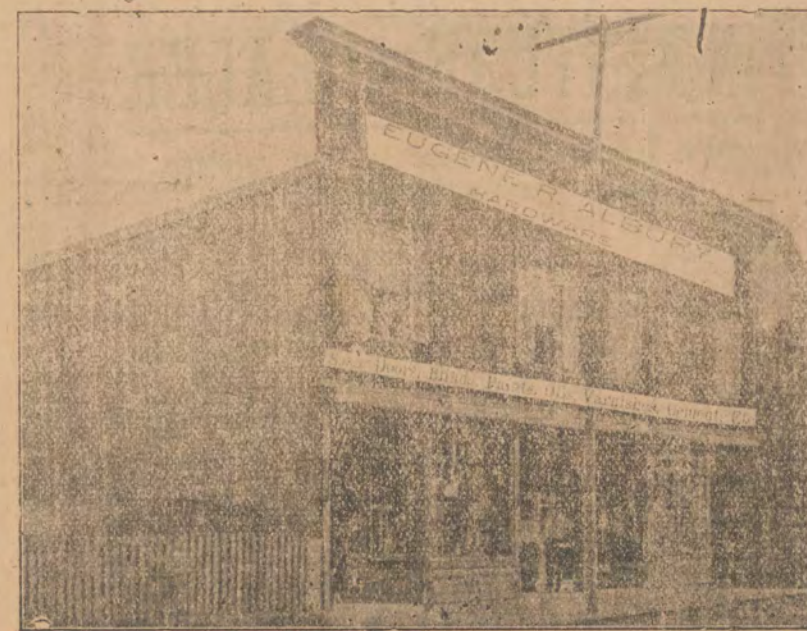
To try to hold a polite conversation on a Bubble in full flight is very much like trying to repeat the Declaration of Independence while falling out the seventh-story window.

Mince finely one pound of liver and a little more than half a pound of bacon. To this add salt and pepper to taste, one tablespoonful of minced parsley and one onion which has been chopped fine and fried; the beaten yolk of one egg and the white of two eggs, stiffly beaten. Line a buttered baking dish with cracker crumbs, glaze the top with the remaining yolk of egg, and bake until done, about 45 minutes.

Banana Salad
Slice bananas in half, pour over them a cream dressing made by directions below; sprinkle over this ground peanuts and serve on lettuce leaves.

Cream dressing: 1-2 teaspoonful of salt, 1-2 teaspoonful of mustard, 1 teaspoonful melted butter, 2 tablespoonfuls of sugar, 1 tablespoonful of flour, 1-4 cup of vinegar, 1 cup of sweet milk, 1 egg. Mix salt, mustard, butter and sugar, whipped eggs; add flour, sweet milk and lastly the vinegar. Cook in double boiler till smooth and thick.

IN THE MARKET.
Tony Tselentis, manager of the fruit stand at the corner of Duval and Caroline streets, will have a fresh shipment of green string beans and cabbages on the market this morning. The beans retail at 15c a quart and the cabbages at 5, 10 and 15c per head. He is offering water-melons at 5c and up, and cantaloupes at 5c. The season for melons is about over, and it is very doubtful if there will be any further shipments received in the city.

The meat market at 221 Duval street has made a great reduction in the retail price of meat, and is offering the best steaks from Florida cattle at 20c a pound and from west-cattle at 30c a pound. Nothing but the pure white meat of the chicken is used, and a thirty-five cent can is equal in weight of actual meat to a small sized chicken. 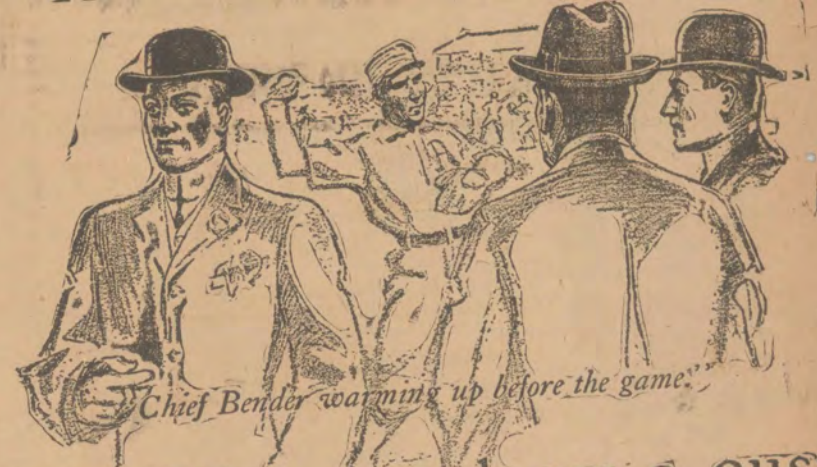

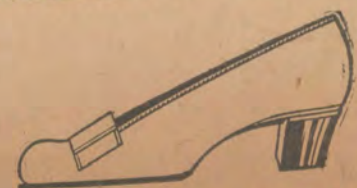
