CIRCUIT COURT REVERSES POLICE JUDGE IN ALL OF GAMBLING CASES APPEALED

Paucity of Evidence and Errors in Complaints The Cause

CITY A WIDE OPEN TOWN?

It Is Hardly Probable That City Police Will Try to Fur- ther Suppress Gambling

The Circuit Court met at ten o'clock yesterday pursuant to adjournment of previous day.

Judge Bethel handed down decisions in the following cases which were argued on Monday by attorneys Louis A. Harris and John G. Sawyer, and City Attorney E. M. Semple.

The case of City of Key West against Fermin Bontacourt, tried for running a gambling house, was forever dismissed it appearing that the affidavit of complaint was insufficient, and the evidence taken at the City Court was not strong enough to sustain a verdict of guilty. The Court handed down a similar decision in the case of the City vs. Juan Alfonso, et al. The Judge stated "I examined these cases pretty thoroughly last night, and am certainly of the opinion that the affidavits of complaint are faulty." In the case of the City vs. Hargrove, et al., the Judge dismissed this case on the ground that the section number being omitted from the affidavit of complaint, the defendant could not have known the precise charge under which he was arraigned before the City Court. In the case of the City vs. Lino Garcia, a "monte" case, the Judge reversed the judgment of the lower court and sent the case back for new trial. The case of the City vs. Willie Carter, et al., the men found in Garcia's house, and who were accused of running the monte game, also be tried anew before Police Justice Curry. In all the gambling cases argued before Judge Bethel, on appeal from the City Court, the judgments have all been reversed, and this is due mainly through the insufficiency of the evidence, and again to the fact that the affidavits of complaint in the first two cases were not specific in their charges.

Immediately after the Judge rendered his decision in the cases mentioned, the jury was called in and took their seats in the box. The Court then proceeded with the trial of George Frau vs. Consumers Ice and Cold Storage Company. This is a case for damages for injuries sustained by Frau due to the latent propensity of a horse to kick, and whether or not the plaintiff was aware of this propensity before the horse committed the act.

W. Hunt Harris and W. H. Malone, Jr., represent the plaintiff, and L. M. Semple and George G. Brooks represent the Consumers Ice and Cold Storage Company. In order to get six jurors agreeable to both sides, the venire of twelve was exhausted. The following men sworn as the jury: Simon Creole; Leroy Vogt, Wilber Bethel, Charles Matthews, Tony Gandolf, William Johns, et al.

The entire day was consumed in taking testimony in this case and the last witness for the plaintiff was examined at four o'clock whereupon the plaintiff rested his case. Court adjourned at 4:15 to meet this morning at 10 o'clock. The defense will introduce their witnesses today and in all probability the case will reach the jury for its decision this evening.

ONE OF MOST IMPORTANT MEETINGS OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE HELD LAST NIGHT

Col. T. J. L. Brown Will Represent Key West In the Halls of Congress and Will Ask Government Of- ficials to Give Key West What Is Needed

A meeting of the Chamber of Commerce which is destined to go down in the history of the organization as one of the most important in its history was held last night. The question which absorbed the attention of the large number of representative citizens present was that of having a representative in Washington to look after the interests of Key West and to work for the city constantly so that the City may receive such aid from the government as is necessary.

It was the unanimous opinion that Col. T. J. L. Brown was best fitted to serve the city in this capacity and he was requested last night to accept the honor. Col. Brown is out of the city at present, but the Chamber of Commerce ordered that a telegram be sent to him last night asking him to return to the city at once to confer with this body.

The message was sent and Col. Brown will be in Key West again this week, and probably will leave on Saturday night for Washington where he will present the claims of Key West to Congress. This city is sadly in need of certain improvements which are under the control of the general government and Col. Brown will present the case of the City of Key West to the proper officials in its true light, asking that the City be given proper recognition.

An especially pleasing feature of the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce last night was the presence of such a large number of representative citizens. Some of the largest tax payers in the county were present and they were unanimous in their approval of the plan to send a man to Washington to represent Key West.

CONCLUSION OF ENLIGHTENING ADDRESS DELIVERED TO OUR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The Journal "Scoops" Every Paper In the United States In Publishing News Concerning the Panama Canal Which Has Not Been Published Heretofore

Answer. In order to answer that I might state that Mr. Seville who had particular charge of the work I have reference to asked for my consent to quarter men and engineers at my house at the Triangular station so that they could continue their investigations at that point. I will say few people know anything of the work done in back of Gatun, and had it not been for a laborer of mine I would not have known of it. But I and two of my Indians went in back of Gatun and saw monuments and asked what was being brought up from there, and the reply was gravel and sand. I don't believe there are twenty people on the canal who know of the work being quietly carried on there back of Gatun, and which has been carried on for the last two years. The engineers know what is going on, but they are carrying out orders, and so does Mr. Goethals know, and he is carrying out orders. Mr. Goethals said: "If I were only free from political interference I might do better work here."

It is known thoroughly in the Republic of Panama, this silt condition of the foundation and its tendency to seep up through the bottom, and it surprises me the amount of ignorance in the United States as to the conditions in Panama. This may be due to the fact that every Congressional party brought down there have been royally entertained and never left the roof of the Panama Railroad. And there is now being prepared in Colon a document that will undoubtedly take 700 closely written pages of foolscap, written at the suggestion of a prominent congressman who came with the last commission to oppose Colonel Goethals to make this a military project, and it is known that the feeling is that if the United States wants to have a military base there, they will have to take the whole country, and on this account the largest property owners there are selling out. Those matters will be brought before Congress by Congressman Sulzer, Henry George and Congressman Sulzer will present in due form the present conditions down there. There is too much humbug down there and too much insincerity.

The engineers here know nothing—they can take a transit level, run a line, tell probably the amount of land within a certain prescribed area, but there are no geologists among them. Yes, there were two geologists sent by the government to examine the land at the Culebra Cut. And yet when they want to do any clearing and find out what a stream will do in time of flood, they call in an Indian bushman. In that country they have no faith in a lock canal. To remedy present conditions, Colonel Goethals told me it would require an excavation of 35 to 40 feet more in the cut. You will understand this when I tell you the tide in the Pacific rises 18 feet and the Atlantic but 18 inches. There is a new tide there every six hours. Vessels come in on high tide and anchor at the city of Panama, and as the tide recedes they are about 100 feet high and dry, and that is the market at low tide. That water will have to be carried down through the cut.

CONSULTING ENGINEER HAZLEHURST SAYS CITY RAILWAY WORK MUST BE HASTENED

Paving Work Is Being held up on Account of the Delay In the Work

OFFICIALS TAKE ACTION

Key West Electric Company Will Be Notified To Get Busy At Once

A meeting of the Board of Public Works was held yesterday morning which adjourned until 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The purpose of this meeting was to hear a report from Consulting Engineer J. N. Hazlehurst, reported to the meeting that the work of paving the streets was being delayed by the Key West Electric Company, which company is taking an unreasonable length of time to do their work. It was stated that the electric company had about forty-five men at work, twenty-one of which belonged to the paving forces and were loaned to the electric company to facilitate and hasten their work by Mr. J. R. Copeland of the paving company. The contention of the City Engineer was that if this force of men took nearly a month to complete the small amount of work which they have already done, how long would it not take them to finish the work in its entirety. The matter is further complicated by the fact that Mr. Copeland of the paving company will be needing his twenty-one men for his own work.

The Board of Public Works will this morning send a communication to the Key West Electric Company notifying them that their work must be hastened far more than is the case at present. The City Engineer says that the whole trouble lies in the fact that the electric company have not a sufficient number of men employed. While the company may find it difficult to get all the men they need here, it is obvious that the men must be secured somewhere so that other public improvements may progress without further interference. Engineer Hazlehurst has advised the Board of Public Works in the matter and those officials will take action at once.

THE MIAMI METROPOLIS IS VERY AMUSING

The following from the Miami Metropolis would make a wooden Indian smile:

"Incorporated in an editorial entitled 'Picking a Candidate to Win' appearing first in The Key West Journal then copied in other corporation owned newspapers of Florida comes the familiar paragraph that was used so sedulously in the interest of Mr. James P. Taliaferro to the effect that being endorsed by the 'leading newspaper of the state,' he was certain to be re-elected. In this instance the reference is to Governor Harrison's great popularity in Florida, which the Key West paper says is proven by the support he is given by a list of influential and distinguished Democrats in Florida too long for publication."

In implying that The Journal is a "corporation owned" newspaper The Metropolis sustains its reputation for getting its information mixed. The people of Key West know that The Journal is not and never was owned or influenced in any degree by any corporation. It is well known in the territory in which this paper circulates that its policy is shaped by the man whose name appears on the mast head as editor, and in Key West, where The Journal is best known, not even its enemies, if it has any, would so much as suggest that it was owned or dominated by a corporation.

The fact of the matter is that The Metropolis was convinced by our article on the presidential situation so far as it applies to the Democratic party, and because it is contrary to what they would like to see, they scurry to cover and attempt to justify themselves by insinuating that The Journal is a corporation owned newspaper when they know that such a charge is absolutely without foundation. If they did not know it, then they were in no position to make remarks and their blunder is without excuse.

The Metropolis is rather free in its references to newspapers which are owned or controlled by what it pleases to term the "interests" and we would advise them to investigate a little more thoroughly before making such assertions. 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"SUN" FIELD IS HARD

One of the Greatest Problems in Baseball.

Some Clubs in Trying to Protect Players Expose Fans in the Stands
—Left Field in Cleveland is Hardest of Them All.

The hardest position to play in the outfield is the "sun" field, and that is not always the same field, nor are all of them equally difficult.

"Sun" field, by the way, is the ball players' name for the field into which the afternoon sun shines on a direct or almost direct line with the home plate, so that the majority of flies hit to that field come to him out of a blazing background.

At the Polo grounds the left field is the "sun" field, although center field is bothered at certain seasons. At American league park the sun interferes with the right fielder.

What is admitted by all to be the worst in the major leagues is left field in Cleveland, although left field at the Polo grounds in New York is "pretty fierce."

The St. Louis American league grounds have everything else beaten, for both right and center fields are bad "sun" fields whenever the weather is clear. Sometimes even the left fielder there is handicapped, too.

The fan probably wonders why ball parks are not planned so that there will be no "sun" field. That can be done easily enough by making a considerable part of the spectators face the sun, and not only face it, but sit in it most of the game, and that is not comfortable on a hot afternoon.

Detroit and Brooklyn have plants laid out that way and the first base side of the covered stands is no more comfortable than open bleachers in July or August.

Detroit's new plant, now being built, is arranged the other way, because the comfort of the fans is more important to the revenue of the game than the convenience of the outfielders.

It is better to have a fly misjudged occasionally even at the cost of a game than to have a large section of the grandstand shunned by persons unless the place is crowded.

Aside from this sun feature, one would think the outfield positions were alike and equally difficult to play. That is far from the truth.

Each position has its peculiarities, and a man who has played one out field position for a number of years often may be at sea for a while in any other field.

The greatest difference is between center field and either of the other two positions. As a rule long flies or drives that go to the center fielder are hit almost squarely by the batsman, and consequently have little "English" to make them curve.

The majority of flies hit to right or left field, however, will curve in their flight, and the fielder must remember instinctively to allow for this curve when running to get under the ball.

The fly which a right handed batsman hits into right field will curve in the opposite direction to the fly which a left handed batsman hits into left field, but when a man changes from right to left field he takes the curve instinct along with him and merely has to remember which field he is in.

The center fielder who changes to right or left field must acquire the habit of expecting every fly to curve, unless it is a straight liner "pulled" squarely by the batsman.

There is not as much difference between outfield positions as there is on the infield, but there is enough so that a player is left in his so-called "natural" position unless it is necessary to change him.

The physical requirements in the outfield are speed, accuracy in judging flies and surety of catch. The mental requirements are much the same as in any other department.

The outfielder must study the batsman and learn in which direction certain men usually hit certain kinds of pitching.

Knowing the catchers' signs, so that he will know just what is being pitched each time, is of great help to the "wise" outfielder in guessing the direction a ball will take the instant he hears the crack of the bat.

Any one who has watched the outfield of a good team on the defense has seen great expanses of ground left unguarded at times and may have wondered at it.

"There's a reason" always, and it is simply the fielder or the captain has figured out by the same law of averages which governs insurance premiums that the man at the bat is almost certain not to hit the ball into the territory left uncovered.

Knowledge of what to do with the ball when one gets it also is a prime requisite in the outfield. Many a game has been lost by an unwise throw to the plate or to the wrong base.

The outfielder must take into consideration the speed of the men on bases, the lead they have when he gets the ball and the state of the game. A play that would be wise under some conditions would be the height of folly under others.

Cornell Runners May Go Abroad.

A movement is on foot among Cornell undergraduates, and it is expected that the alumni will also join it, to make an effort to send the Cornell cross-country team abroad next summer to meet English teams and possibly continental teams about the time of the Olympic games.

GRIF AND CAL IN DUEL

Washington Leader Challenges
Manager of White Sox.

Veterans, Both Managers and Rivals
for Many Years, May Decide
Issue at Chicago Sometime
During Next Summer.

A pitching duel between two battle-scarred veterans of the old war days is a possible feature of some summer afternoon this season at Comiskey's park in Chicago. James J. Callahan, manager of the White Sox, received a formal challenge the other day for such a combat, Clark Griffith, new manager of the Washington team, being the sender. Both these leaders of modern baseball teams were twirlers in the days gone by, both being on the Chicago National league club and both going over to Comiskey's team when the American league expanded.

The pitching days of each have long since passed away, but the friendly rivalry probably will continue when they are old and gray-bearded men. "Grif" in his letter says:

"You are heralded as the great come-back man of baseball. Let's see if you have any nerve. I don't think

you'd dare pitch a game next summer against me. I'll let you pull it off on your own grounds if you're game enough to accept."

Cal's answer to his old mate read like this: "You're a cross old man. The older you get the crosser you are. You hadn't been back in the American league ten minutes before you wanted everything. I'm going to try to live a square and upright life and I don't think it would be fair to an old man to accept a challenge to go out and pitch a game against him. Why, you were an old man on the Chicago Nationals when I first joined the club."

There'll be many a friendly tilt between these two managers next summer when the White Sox and Senators are engaged in games. It'll be stuff that's handed back and forth from the coaching lines and players' benches, and if the fans could hear it they might enjoy it more than the games. There was a time when Griffith and Callahan were the star slabsmen for the old West side team, and some of the tricks they turned did much to advance the game.

Comiskey came into Chicago in 1900 and the year after both these stars went over to his club, Griffith landing the job of manager. In the spring of

1903 Griffith was given to New York as manager and Callahan put in as head of the Six. Since then Griffith has gone back to the National league and Callahan spent five years "semi-proving," and now they are both back in the American league as managers. A game between the Sox and Senators with the old warriors on the slab would be pleasing to the old-time fans of Chicago. Possibly the old "stuff" they put on the ball in former years would be missing, but there would be more wit and trickery in their work than ever.

JENNINGS IS GENEROUS

Allows Many Baseball Stars to
Slip From His Grasp.

Santa Claus of American League Gave
Ira Thomas to Connie Mack and
Jimmy Archer to Chicago—
Many Others Got Away.

The management of the Cincinnati baseball team has always been noted for allowing star players to get away and become most valuable members of other teams in the same circuit. In fact, it used to be a saying in the National league that a player never had the O. K. stamp affixed until he had been released by Cincinnati.

Now it looks as if Hughey Jennings was the Santa Claus of the American league. Certainly Hughey has turned loose more good men than any of his rivals in the circuit. As a starter he gave Ira Thomas to Connie Mack and big Ira has been the mainstay of the Athletics behind the bat ever since, helping to cut two post-season melons. Later on Hughey decided he did not like Jimmy Archer's style behind the bat. He released Jimmy to Buffalo and Frank Chance grabbed him. He has been the one bet as backstop in the National league since that time.

Along about that time Jennings had on his list of recruits a Tri-State league outfielder and a Wisconsin pitcher. The New York Yankees were hard up for players and Jennings kindly consented to let Farrell's club have both men, as he could not figure how either man could strengthen his pennant winning aggregation. These two recruits were Pitcher Jack Warhop and Outfielder Birdie Cree, each of whom has been responsible for many a defeat sustained by Detroit.

A year ago last spring, when the Tigers trained at San Antonio, two of the Detroit recruits were Simmons

and Kirke. The latter was said to be too much impressed with the importance of Mr. Kirke, and had a bad habit of trying to knock the glove off First Baseman Tom Jones even though the latter was standing but a few feet away when Kirke happened to be fielding the ball. He was farmed out to the Tri-State league and recalled toward the end of the 1910 season. He was also carried down south again last spring and then turned over to New Orleans. He hit the ball hard for the Pelicans and helped New Orleans win the pennant. But when it came time to exercise the right to recall Mr. Kirke, Jennings passed him up. The Boston Nationals took him and used him the last few weeks of the season. He played in 20 games for the Rustlers and made 32 hits for 47 bases, taking down an average .360.

George Simmons, the other recruit turned back by Jennings, is now

booked to be the regular second baseman of the New York Americans next season.

Still another hole up in the person of Bob Bescher, the Cincinnati outfielder, who is the champion base runner of the National league. Pitcher George Suggs, Cincinnati's most dependable hurler, is another Detroit discard.

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FOUR
PAIRS
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EXPLORING DEAD SEA CLUE TO BUDDHISM

Scientists Sounding Waters of Oldest Known Lake.

Motives of Expedition Said to Be Purely Scientific—No Elements of Commercialism Entering Into Ultimate Object.

Jerusalem.—An expedition, the purpose of which is thoroughly to explore the Dead sea and its environs under the leadership of Dr. Bruhl of the University of Berlin, has just arrived from Europe and continued to the scene of its future operations.

The motives of the expedition, so it is emphatically averred by Dr. Bruhl, are purely scientific, with absolutely no elements of commercialism entering into its ultimate object.

The work of exploration will consist in the major part of sounding the depth of various sections of the lake as well as analyzing the complex composition of its waters, studying its shores, investigating the nature of the different minerals that are said to abound in that region, exploring, as far as is possible, the channels of the many rivers and hot water streams, apart from the Jordan, which flow into the sea, from both the eastern and western mountain ranges that hem its shores, examining and classifying the varieties of fish that exist in large numbers only in the extreme southeastern section of the lake, which consists mainly of shallows and marshes.

It must be remembered in this connection that it has always been firmly maintained by those who visited the Dead sea and wrote treatises about it long ago that no fish of any kind can make their habitat in any part of it, and this long established belief was disproved only recently by a pleasure party of Americans, long resident in the country, who visited the southern end of the lake and discovered fish.

So it remains for the members of the German expedition to arrive at the causes, which undoubtedly must

be due to varying conditions of chemical composition of the water that make it possible for fish to live in certain sections of the lake and not in others; and, in short, to find out everything about this strange body of water from scientific standpoints that is worth knowing.

What ultimate political or commercial motives, if any, underlie the surface of the enterprise time only can show.

This is by no means the first attempt made to explore the Dead sea region. Lieut. W. F. Lynch of the American navy, as early as the year 1848 spent considerable time in research and exploration of that region at the expense of the American government and at great risk to his person.

Despite the hardships, Lieutenant Lynch was fairly successful in taking measurements as well as soundings of different parts of the lake. According to the lieutenant's narrative, the lake measures some 46 miles from north to south and from 6 to 12 miles east and west. Its total surface area was therefore computed to be 250 square miles. Its greatest depth was 1,300 feet at its northern end, and its shallowest part being at its southern extremity, varies from 5 to 15 feet only.

The lake's depression below the sea level is 1,312 feet and a tropical climate makes its temperature almost unbearable during certain seasons of the year.

Crying Baby Is "Exhibit A."
Buffalo, N. Y.—A crying baby was offered in evidence, and after much argument between opposing counsel was marked for identification as "Exhibit A" in a case brought up in the city court here. The action is for \$1,000 damages, and the baby is produced as the principal evidence for the plaintiff.

"I desire to offer this infant in evidence," was the announcement of one of the attorneys as a woman came behind the rail bearing a bundle in her arms. The attorney for the defense promptly objected.

"Nobody ever heard of such a proceeding," he said.

"I contend that it is perfectly proper to have the child marked for identification," contended the plaintiff's lawyer.

The argument continued for several minutes, the baby holding his own in the noise-making. Finally the court settled the dispute by directing the stenographer to mark the exhibit.

Professor Starr Pries Into Secret of Idol.

Similarity of Works Found in Oriental Temple With Monuments of Central America Is Evidence Religion Existed in America.

Chicago.—After 1,200 years of cross-legged meditation in a heathen temple of Korea, something exciting has happened to the giant stone Buddha of Kyong Ju. The idol has been measured, poked in its sacred ribs, and made the center of a new theory by Prof. Frederick Starr, the University of Chicago anthropologist, who returned recently from a trip of oriental exploration.

In the seated Buddha, which has stared at the eastern sea in comparative neglect for many centuries, Professor Starr believes he has found the masterpiece of an ancient fully developed Korean art, the prototype of the famous bronze Japanese Buddhas of Nara and Kamakura, and traces of sculpture and architecture analogous to that of Yucatan and Central America.

The similarity of the works of art found in the temple with the Buddha to the monuments of Central America and Mexico is declared by Professor Starr to be striking. He will make a careful comparison of the data he has collected in the widely remote places, and he believes his evidence will be the strongest yet produced to prove that Buddhism formerly existed on the American continent.

The Chicago scientist asserted that the examination of the idol was one of the most impressive of his experiences in the Orient. The Buddha is ten feet in height, and sits in a semi-subterranean temple twenty feet in diameter, surrounded by fifteen slabs of stone, each bearing a sculptured figure. The temple crowns a high hill fifteen miles from Kyong Ju, the ancient capital of Silla, one of the three ancient Korean nations, on the eastern side of the southern half of the Korean peninsula. The only living

neighbor of the statue is a solitary monk who inhabits the deserted Buddhist monastery of Suk Kool Am nearby.

Professor Starr and his companion in all his travels, Manuel Gonzales, left the United States Aug. 29, sailing from Seattle on the same vessel with Admiral Togo.

"Japan's problem is to make the Koreans realize that their interests are those of Japan," said Professor Starr. "The Japanese administration is doing well, but the Korean feeling is one of sullen dissatisfaction. The Koreans have a better government and better facilities of every sort than ever before, but the situation still is most difficult."

"The Japanese and Koreans are more closely related than the Koreans and Chinese, yet geographically and culturally the Koreans have been profoundly affected by the Chinese. Korea was a center of illumination 1,200 years ago. The Buddha in the temple near Kyong Ju is a part of this beautiful flower of development where now all is squalor and meanness."

Shared Food With Birds.

Kansas City, Mo.—In front of the Hotel Baltimore a newsboy shivered the other morning. One hand was busy making frequent trips to his mouth with a large "hamburger," from which he was taking hungry sized bites.

"Poor little rat. He must be nearly frozen," a traveling man remarked as he sat in a large leather chair looking out upon the snow and ice.

Just then some snow birds lighted a few feet away. They hopped about as if half frozen. The newsboy tossed them a piece of his sandwich. They pecked at it eagerly. Then he tossed the remainder down and watched the birds peck at it so eagerly.

No. The traveling man didn't go out and give the newsboy a dollar or buy him a new overcoat. He lighted another cigar.

"I'd like to do something for that lad," he remarked. "But it's just too cold to move."

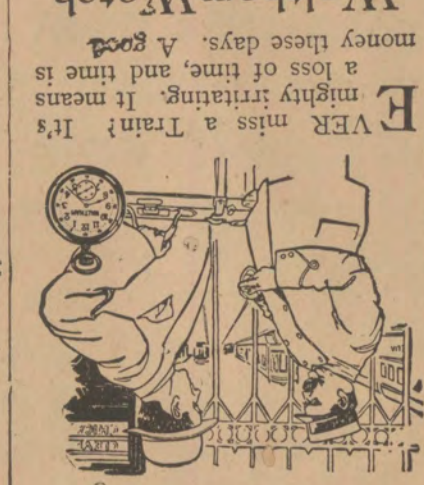

proposition is good. Baltimore, New York and Boston, will get but little of the traffic through the Canal. It will be used to its fullest capacity by vessels from countries of the Orient, England, Germany and France.

Sombody made the remark in Panama "What is the use fortifying the Canal. One ship can only get in there and while in there an hour and a half at Gatun, it could be hammered to pieces." It will not take any ten thousand men to protect the canal.

I cannot see where any benefits are going to be derived by New Orleans, more than she has today, or Galveston, or any other Coast City, than they have at the present time.

New York ships down two-thirds of the goods that go through the Canal Zone today. Panama needs no supplies today and Peru, Bolivia and Chili are supplied by ten vessels monthly all together.
