TAFT FORCES DRAW FIRST BLOOD ELIHU ROOT ELECTED CHAIRMAN

Courage of Roosevelt Delegates Fail at Critical Moment, and Taft's Steam Roller is Given a Clear Roadway

THE PLATFORMS DISAGREE IN MANY PARTICULARS

Roosevelt's Platform Has Already Been Drafted and Approved by the Colonel--Taft is Still Working on His Planks

Chicago, June 18.—The Taft forces drew first blood here today and elected Elihu Root as their temporary chairman. The seemingly courage of the Roosevelt delegates failed at the critical moment and gave Taft's steam-roller a clear roadway. The colonel is not to be balked, however, and is busily reorganizing his forces for the main battle, which he claims he will personally lead on the floor of the house.

Washington, June 18.—President Taft spent a very quiet day, carrying out his regular daily routine, and gave no outward signs of any worry over the Chicago situation whatever. This afternoon he attended the ball game between the Senators and Philadelphia, and was one of the Senators' strongest rooters. He made no comment when the news that his temporary chairman, Elihu Root, had been elected, was given him.

Chicago, June 18.—Both the Taft and Roosevelt drafts of a platform for the republican national convention have been outlined, and both can be put in shape for submission to the committee on resolutions on very short notice.

Most of the work on the Roosevelt declarations was completed prior to Mr. Roosevelt's arrival in Chicago, while the first formal meeting over the Taft pronouncement was held today.

The Roosevelt pronouncement is the result of labors of many of his friends, but principally of his former secretary of the interior, James R. Garfield, Gifford Pinchot, and William Allen White, of Kansas. All the plans have undergone the inspection of Col. Roosevelt himself, and while he has not passed on them finally, he has indicated his formal approval of most of them.

Necessarily the two documents cover the same ground but there is wide divergence in the recommendations.

The tariff occupies a prominent place in both, and both endorse the principle of the tariff commission. Friends of Mr. Roosevelt, however, go to some pains to make it appear that the present tariff board does not come up to requirements. They would have the commission determine not only the cost of production of manufactured articles but would have it undertake to ascertain the share of profits going to labor.

The Taft adherents declare for further revision but would have it wait upon the investigations of the tariff board. They condemn the present efforts of the democratic house of representatives to change this tariff as unwise and unscientific, declaring its result is an unnecessary disturbance of business along undesirable lines. No decision has been reached as to whether there shall be an explicit declaration for a cut in tariff rates, but the indications are that there will be such a declaration regarding articles found by the tariff board on the subject of necessarily high duties. Probably there will be no pronouncement on reciprocity.

There also will be dual declarations in favor of legislation to curb monopoly. The Taft people favor the retention of the Sherman anti-trust law, but would build on it so as to define its operations and at the same time give the general public the benefit of its protecting effect. The Rooseveltians will try the subject along somewhat different lines, especially emphasizing the necessity of regulating the operations of large corporations.

The Roosevelt people will press well to the front the subject of popular government, declaring in favor of all the instruments tending in that direction, whether primary elections, election of United States senators by direct vote, or the initiative, referendum and recall. The fact will be recognized, however, that any of these agencies can be employed only in the government of the states, and in such cases the platform will specifically refer them to the various communities for local determination. A female suffrage plank is one of the new features of the Roosevelt declaration.

The initiative and referendum will not be touched upon by the Taft document, but the recall will be flatly denounced as calculated to undermine the stability of government. A special declaration will be made for the protection of the judiciary and the maintenance of order and the enforcement of law.

FAMOUS SHAKER CASE WILL BE CALLED AGAIN

Will be Tried for Killing an Invalid to Put Her Out of Pain

Kissimmee, June 18.—It is understood that the famous Shaker case, which attracted statewide attention to Kissimmee at the last term of the circuit court here last fall, will again come before the circuit court, which convenes next Tuesday.

The case was one of unusual interest, wherein Egbert Gillett and Elizabeth Sears were charged with poisoning Sadie Marchant at the Shaker colony, near Ashton, last fall. The case terminated in Gillett being held for this term of the court under a bond of \$7,500, which he promptly secured.

To those who are not familiar with the case it might be added that Egbert Gillett and Elizabeth Sears were charged with administering chloroform to Sadie Marchant, last fall, supposed for the purpose of easing her painless exit from the world.

The matter was brought to the notice of the grand jury, but they failed to find a true bill. State's Attorney J. C. Jones then asked that Gillett be held for the grand jury of this term. The case was tried before Judge Price at Titusville, October 24, 1911, and Gillett's bond was fixed at \$7,500, and Elizabeth Sears released. The case as it will come before this term, will no doubt prove interesting.

The platform prepared by President Taft's friends commend his administration in high terms.

DENIES THAT CUBA IS SEEKING A WAR LOAN

Secretary Ramirez Says Ferrara Not in Washington to Negotiate a Loan

Havana, June 18.—Dr. Ramirez denied point blank last night that the Cuban government was seeking a war loan. He specifically declared that Speaker Ferrara is not in Washington on any mission connected with the Cuban republic's finances. He made the statement to the Associated Press. He said:

"It is absolutely false that the government is thinking of making a loan on account of the war. There is in the treasury sufficient funds to pay all the expenses which have been incurred. These expenses as I have affirmed before, are very few for reasons which I have explained on another occasion.

"Sr. Ferrara has stated truthfully that he is not in Washington on any mission connected with finances. This has been published in the newspapers of Washington and the government of the United States knows it.

"This story about the loan is one of the fakes which have been invented here by those who do not do anything but censure the government.

ARMY APPROPRIATION BILL VETOED BY TAFT

Bill Would Oust General Wood From His Office March Fourth

Washington, June 17.—The president today vetoed the army appropriation bill. He returned the bill to congress with a message indicating his disapproval of the legislative provision which would oust Major General Leonard Wood from the office of chief of staff on March 4 next.

In his message the president said: "The army of the United States is far too vital an institution to be made the victim of hasty or imperfect theories of legislation.

"It is well known that the war college and general staff have been for many months engaged in a comprehensive plan of army reorganization. At the present time, therefore, it is especially inappropriate, in my opinion, to force upon the statute books legislation enacted without the usual deliberation and care. I cannot conscientiously surrender the responsibility in shaping such laws with which I am vested under the constitution. I therefore return to your honorable body without my approval the said bill."

CHINESE PREMIER INTENDS TO RESIGN

Disgusted at the Failure of Chinese Loan, and Wants to Withdraw

Peking, June 18.—Premier Tang Shao Yi, premier of the new Chinese republic, declared today that he intended to resign. He is much hurt at the continued failure of the Chinese loan and declares that he has lost the confidence of the foreigners.

Financiers this morning advanced the sum of \$2,100,000 to the government. This amount will tide over immediate exigencies, but is only a drop in the bucket when it is considered that the government is urgently in need of over \$60,000,000.

The attitude of the unpaid troops is becoming more threatening daily. They declare that they will start a serious rebellion unless they receive their money at once. Incipient mutinies have already broken out in several places.

CUBAN REBELS SURRENDERING THEMSELVES BY THE HUNDREDS

To Take Advantage of Amnesty Offered in Proclamation of General Montegudo Which Will Expire on June 22

WOMAN AVIATOR FALLS TO DEATH IN ILLINOIS

Miss Julia Clarke is the Latest Victim Claimed by Aeroplanes

Springfield, Ill., June 18.—Miss Julia Clark, one of the three American women who have obtained fame as aviators, fell to her death while making an exhibit flight here today.

Miss Clark was thrown from her aeroplane while negotiating a quick turn. Her body landed in a tree. Death was practically instantaneous.

Miss Clark was the third American woman to obtain an international aviation pilot's license. The only other two American women so honored are Miss Harriet Quimby and Miss Matilde Moisant.

She first became interested in aviation at the international meet in Chicago last year, when several flyers were killed and injured.

The horror of the accidents at Chicago only heightened her desire to become a flyer and she devoted herself to the craft, obtaining a license a few months later. She was a daring flyer and gave promise of becoming an expert.

QUIETLY MARRIED.

Miss Edna Louise Smith and Mr. N. Henry Gellert were quietly married at seven o'clock last night at the home of Captain and Mrs. J. L. Watrous, on South Beach, Rev. C. T. Stout, of the Episcopal church, officiated, and only the immediate members of the household witnessed the ceremony.

Santiago de Cuba, June 18.—Hundreds of rebels are taking advantage of the proclamation published in the local newspaper several days ago by General Montegudo offering amnesty to all rebels who gave themselves up before June 22. One hundred and fifty negroes surrendered to Col. Valiente today with the understanding that the conditions of the proclamation be carried out.

Major Collazo reports that thirty negroes have given themselves up to him.

The rebels are reported to be completely disorganized and fleeing in every direction and it is generally expected that the revolt is about over and that peace will be restored within a few days.

Captain Yglesias has reported that he found the negroes entrenched in three distinct positions but that he attacked and dislodged them on each occasion. He stated that he killed several and captured several.

Twenty-five negroes are reported as having surrendered in the El Cobre district. These surrenders are due to the proclamations published by General Montegudo.

It is rumored that Secretary Garcia Kohly is here on a purely political mission and that efforts are being made to obtain a pardon for the rebel leaders.

Some Indignation. Indignation is expressed in some quarters at the alleged efforts to obtain pardon for the rebel leaders. The indignant ones believe that the guilty men should be punished.

It is reported here that the government is negotiating with the negro leader Antomarchi, who styles himself a "brigadier general." It is intimated that the government is offering him inducements to surrender.

Songo, June 18.—The cook of General Estenez has given himself up here together with four other negroes who belonged to the Estenez band. The cook asserted that he knew nothing of Estenez having been either wounded or killed.

Found No Negroes. The rural guards under Major Lunnes have arrived here after a march of eighteen days. They report only one engagement in that time, when they surprised and dispersed a camp of thirty rebels.

General Vargas has arrived here with thirty men and surrendered to Captain Quesada. Colonel Valiente took charge of the men and sent them to Santiago with others who had presented themselves to him.

The volunteers to whom General Vargas and his men surrendered complain of the act of Colonel Valiente in taking possession of their prisoners. It is supposed the volunteers wanted the glory of turning over the prisoners themselves.

Colonel Valiente has placed Lieutenant Leiva and sixteen volunteers under arrest for abandoning the town and going out to hunt rebels when they had been ordered to do guard duty.

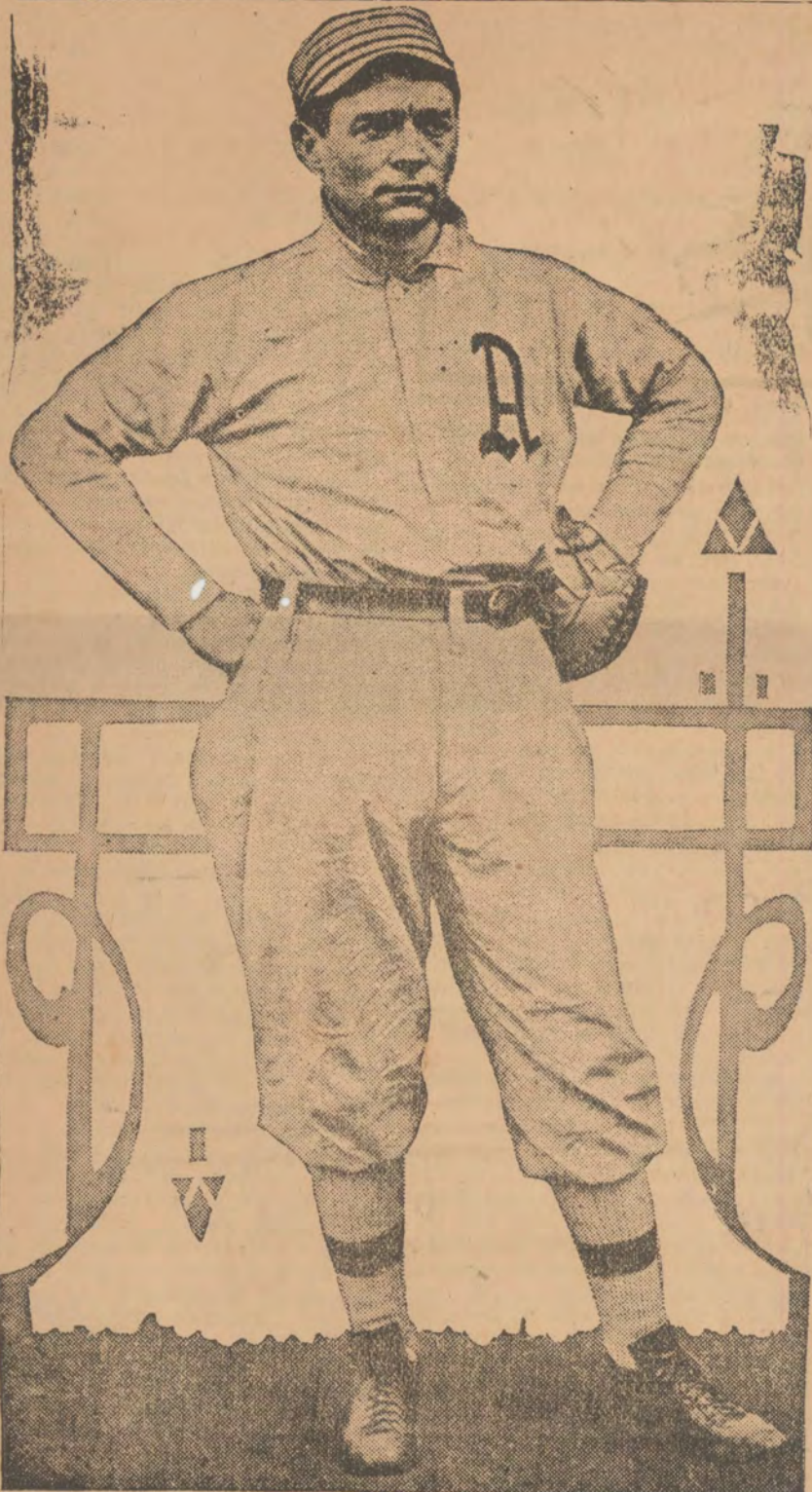

TO THE NATION'S SHAME.

The day Jeffries entered the ring with the black giant, Johnson, and went down in ignominious defeat at the hands of his opponent, the white race felt chagrined, and justly so. That Fourth of July fight was a disgrace, not only to the state in which it was held, but to the nation as well. But small was the disgrace attached to the Jeffries-Johnson fight, when compared with the undignified scramble for the republican nomination, now being waged in Chicago.

Three months ago, the idea of such a disgraceful scene being enacted as is now thrown upon the screen of our national life, for all to see, would have seemed an impossibility.

A prize fight is, on in Chicago, and it is one of gigantic proportions. The prize fighters are, on one side the president of the United States, and on the other, the only living ex-president of our country. It is not enough that the names of the two distinguished men should be placed before the republican convention; neither is it enough that each of them has made a country-wide campaign in the interests of his candidacy but now that the convention has met, these two men, honored above all others by their countrymen, clutch each other's throat and begin the death struggle that must eliminate one or the other, and perhaps both.

Things are all wrong, when the nation stands peacefully by and sees such a spectacle as now confronts it, without even a protest raised. Protest! Why, half the nation is applauding one of the contestants, while the other half applauds the other; and it matters not who may win out, nor by what methods the victory is gained, one half the nation will glory in the fact that its candidate has won! When the president of the United States is forced to step down from the pedestal upon which the nation has set him, and FIGHT for his renomination, as Taft has had to do, and is now having to do, it is a shame upon the people who claim the Star Spangled Banner as their own. Why all this racket—this slinging of mud upon the nation's chief executive, and back again upon the one living ex-president of our country? Taft has made a good president, as presidents go; so why all this fighting? It is because of the fire which the ambitious Roosevelt has stirred within the breasts of a restless and a radical wing of his party.

Roosevelt has twice been president of these United States, and the unwritten law of our sacred traditions says that he shall not be given a third term. But unwritten laws! Sacred traditions! What do traditions mean to a man of Roosevelt's type? They mean nothing. He neither cares for laws or traditions! And when he finds law and tradition standing in the pathway of a course he means to pursue, he boldly overrides them. Laws mean nothing to our one living ex-president; he is a law unto himself, and woe be unto the man or set of men who attempts to show him the error of his way. He has but one way always, and that is one which he blazes out for himself, wherever he finds himself, it matters not what he happens to be doing. But whether President Taft is re-nominated or Roosevelt is made the standard-bearer, the dignity of the office which the one holds, and which both seek again, has been lowered, and the conduct of both candidates in the contest now reaching its climax, should put the nation to shame.

TO STOP VOLCANIC ACTION

Scientist Believed He Would Be Able to "Chain Up" the Streams of Lava.

In 1767 Sir William Hamilton declared that were he to live long enough he might solve the problem of chaining up the lava streams in volcanoes. As it was, after studying the crater of an extinct volcano, he foretold with exactitude when an eruption might be expected. It has now been established by experiment that the earth grows warmer as the zone of volcanic activity is approached. Hence it is that a German who has made a great study of earthquake and volcanic phenomena advocates the establishing of volcanic stations for observation purposes, these to be located about the area chosen at certain distances from each other and connected with wires and a registering machine. First of all, the temperature of the soil and its average fluctuations are to be exhaustively studied, with a view to finding a means of dissipating the energy in the interior of the earth. The earth is to be sounded in the volcanic area and a system of wires and electric batteries introduced at a level which must necessarily be very deep. It is pointed out that a wire system under the earth connected with one above would make possible the study of volcanic action, as it is registered step by step on the recorder. When this shall be accomplished, attention can be directed to diverting the energy concentrated on a particular point before the volcano has a chance to get fairly started.

It is said that the Italian government has been approached in the matter and has considered proposals with reference to a study of Vesuvius.—Harper's Weekly.

Find Use for Waste Product.
In Wilmington, Del., a use is being found for the waste products of paper mills which have been accumulating for years and have been thought valueless. One factory has dumped over 100,000 tons of residuum from its rollers on the neighboring flats, covering about eight acres. This is now to be treated by a process for extracting the carbon for the market and the rest will be converted into fertilizer.

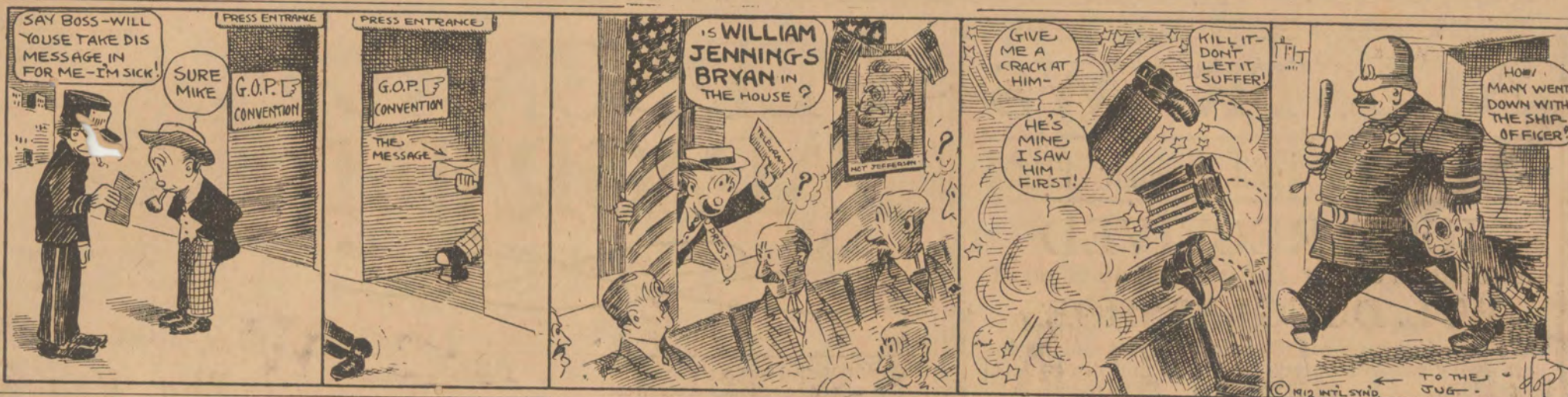
