KEY WEST MUST GIVE HUNT HARRIS A VOYE / SPONGE BUSINESS BETTER THAN EVER

HON. W. HUNT HARRIS WILL ENTER THE 2ND PRIMARY AS DELEGATE TO CONVENTION

Messrs. Harris and Hobbs Were Highmen—Will Run It Over

HARRIS FOR UNDERWOOD

Governor Albert W. Gilchrist and Frank Chase Elected Delegates at Large

Jacksonville, Fla., May 9, 4:50 p. m.—The State Democratic Executive Committee met today to canvass the vote polled in the first primary held on April 30. The four high candidates for delegates to the Democratic national convention from the first district of Florida are W. Hunt Harris who received 4,691 votes, Butler 3,656 votes, Hobbs 5,000 votes and A. P. Jordan 4,630 votes. These gentlemen will run in the second primary, the two high men being elected delegates to the national convention. Messrs. Harris and Jordan were pledged to Underwood, and Messrs. Hobbs and Butler were pledged to Wilson. The people of Florida expressed their preference for Oscar Underwood in the presidential preference primary on April 30, and the will of the majority is binding on the delegates, whether Wilson or Underwood delegates are elected from the first district.

Governor Albert W. Gilchrist and Hon. Frank Chase of Jacksonville were delegates at large from the state of Florida in the first primary. Both of these gentlemen were pledged for Underwood.

Four Underwood and four Wilson delegates from the state at large will run in the second primary. Regardless of which men are elected delegates from Florida, all of them will go to the national convention bound to support the candidacy of Oscar W. Underwood for president.

CLAUDE L'ENGLE HAS A VERY HANDSOME LEAD

His Lead Over W. M. Toomer Is Considerably Over 10,000 Votes

Claude L'Engle the leading candidate for congressman at large, received yesterday a large number of telegrams from counties which had failed to send in full returns of the primary of April 30, and with these added to those previously received, and with others to hear from Mr. L'Engle believes that his lead over Mr. Toomer will be between 13,000 and 14,000.

Has Handsome Lead. "Thirty-four counties," said Mr. L'Engle last night, "have made complete returns and my lead in these over Mr. Toomer is 9,223. In the partial returns from ten counties I lead Toomer 1,062, making my lead from all places heard from 10,385. Osceola, Dade, Walton and Washington counties are not included in any of the complete or incomplete counties and I will have a plurality in each of those, except Osceola, which I concede to Mr. Beacham.

"The incomplete counties are Columbia, DeSoto, Gadsden, Manatee, Madison, Monroe, Orange, St. Lucie, Sumter and Taylor. I will have a majority over all in Gadsden, Columbia, DeSoto, Madison, St. Lucie and Taylor and a handsome lead in the others with the exception of Orange. This gives me assurance of a lead over Mr. Toomer of approximately 14,000. I am lacking from all points heard from 5,576 from the combined vote of my five competitors and my lead over Toomer is more than 25 per cent of the entire vote Toomer received.

TITANIC PICTURES AT THE AIRDOME

Management of Local play House Secures Pictures for one Day Only

New York, May 9.—(Special to the Billboard).—Exactly one week from the time that the greatest vessel in the world, the Titanic, struck an iceberg, moving pictures showing the rescue boat Carpathia, survivors and incidental scenes were shown to tremendous crowds at Weber's theater on Broadway.

It was a remarkable achievement and opens a new thought of how records for future generations will be preserved.

The sales company's Animated Weekly, a compilation in moving pictures of the world's current events, was first on the scene with specially chartered tug boats and an extra relay of camera men.

The pictures were taken under the most difficult and trying circumstances, but the effort was more than worth while as was demonstrated at Weber's theater.

The first scene shows the laying of the Titanic's keel in Belfast, Ireland, then follows her launching—a noteworthy feature, one showing to excellent advantage the tremendous size in comparison with the workmen nearby.

The hero skipper is shown in realistic poses, then follows a series of views showing icebergs taken three days before the Titanic struck by one of the Animated Weekly men who was returning from Europe.

Then follows a number of other interesting views.

Then comes the Carpathia, "heroine of the sea," bearing 705 men and women who were saved from death. The Animated Weekly draws close to her side. The survivors are plainly seen on deck. There are scenes of Captain Rostrom of the Carpathia, Robert Hichens, quartermaster of the Titanic, who was at the wheel when the vessel struck. Many views of the survivors, of Signor Marconi, who invented the wireless; the lifeboats and life preservers; the Carpathia at lock and more.

All of which will live in memory as long as man exists. It is a truly wonderful film.—The Billboard.

The above pictures on a fifteen hundred foot reel will be shown at the Airdome Saturday. The Airdome company is to be congratulated on being the first to secure this great picture for Key West. GOV. OF SOUTH CAROLINA WILL WORK ON FARM

Judge Ira B. Jones Beat Him In South Carolina To A Finish

Columbia, S. C., May 9.—With all counties but one definitely heard from, the returns from yesterday's Democratic county conventions held yesterday all over South Carolina, gave no reasons for changes in the original estimates that the forces supporting Judge Ira B. Jones for governor against Governor Cole L. Blease would control the state convention by a two-third vote. The latest returns show Jones 223; Blease 36, unknown or uncommitted 63.

For the presidential preference there was a much less general expression. Only five counties instructing their delegates, all these being for Wilson. An estimate of the presidential preference of the delegates is about as follows: Wilson 100; Underwood 8; non committal or unknown 226.

NON-UNION MEN WILL BREAK FREIGHT STRIKE

Twenty-four Railroad Affected Have Strikebreakers Ready

Chicago, May 9.—Officials of the twenty-four railroads affected by the strike of 6,000 local freight handlers planned to resume the movement of freight today with the assistance of 1,000 non-union men. Patrolmen will guard railroad property.

President Flannery, of the freight handlers' union, declared that the strike would spread to other cities unless the railroads granted the demands of the men in Chicago.

The freight handlers ask a nine-hour working day, an increase of pay and a Saturday afternoon holiday.

LONE STAR STATE GIVES WILSON A BIG MAJORITY

Defeats Harmon By A Good Majority—Roosevelt Will Defeat 1st

Dallas, Tex., May 9.—Instructions given today by the Democratic county conventions to delegates chosen to the state convention assures a state delegation to the Baltimore convention instructed to cast the vote of Texas for the nomination of Gov. Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey, as the presidential nominee. Returns from 176 out of the 250 counties in the state give the New Jersey executive 328 5-6 instructed votes in the state meeting, sixteen in excess of the number necessary to control. Gov. Harmon thus far has 109 2-3 instructed votes. Speaker Clark has 39 1-2 whereas up to midnight no county had reported an instruction for Oscar Underwood.

Reports have been received from 153 counties that held Republican conventions. Former President Roosevelt is leading with 63 1-2 convention votes; Mr. Taft has 36 1-2 votes; 12 contesting delegations representing 12 convention votes will go to the convention and in seven counties that probably will be represented at the convention, no county conventions were held. Thirty-six counties are sending delegations un-instructed.

ALLENS HAD LAID DEEP PLOT AGAINST COURT

Plan Was "To Shoot Up The Court And Shoot Down Justice"

Witheville, Va., May 9.—At the trial of Floyd Allen, the commonwealth today continued its effort to show that the Allen gang had conspired to "shoot up the court and shoot down the law" at Hillsville last March. The prosecution placed on the stand M. C. White, a member of the jury who found Floyd Allen guilty in the Carroll county court. White declared he had seen Floyd and Claude Allen hold a whispered conversation just before the shooting occurred. When the firing began, White said he dropped to his hands and knees and crawled out of the courtroom.

Thoroughly terrified, White jumped into fireproof vault in the clerk's room and remained there until the firing had ceased. He declared he did not see the shooting.

New York, May 9.—Worn out by grief over his father's death and his efforts to cheer his youthful step-mother, young Vincent Astor, now head of the family in America, has turned to his "real" mother, Mrs. Ava Willing Astor, for solace.

After the funeral of John Jacob Astor Saturday, Vincent took Mrs. Madeline Force Astor home, then he hurried off to meet his mother. There was another meeting yesterday and mother and son were together again today.

Young Astor's sister, Alice Muriel, was at the family meetings. At no time during the funeral services for her father was she permitted to come in contact with her youthful step-mother.

It was stated by a friend of the family today that another heir to the Astor millions is not expected until late next autumn. This seems contrary to popular belief. The new Mrs. Astor now is in seclusion and she expects to remain at her Fifth avenue house for the coming few weeks. It is expected she will retire to one of the Astor summer places with the coming of hot weather.

CAUGHT 13 FOOT SAWFISH.

EXPENSE STATEMENTS WERE FILED YESTERDAY

Or If They Were Not The Candidates Are Not Qualified To Run

Jacksonville, May 9.—According to the laws governing the primaries, all of the candidates for office, county, state, or otherwise, must file their expense accounts not later than yesterday.

While all of those who are at present candidates filed their expense statements before the first primary, they must now file their expenses in this primary in order to be qualified.

Candidates for county offices will file their accounts with the clerk of the circuit court, while the candidate for state offices will file theirs with the secretary of state.

ANOTHER "COLD STORAGE" WARNING.

Between 60 and 70 persons were recently poisoned at Chicago from eating chicken. It was found on investigation that the chicken had been kept long in cold storage. It has recently been discovered that putrefaction is not altogether stopped by freezing, though the character of it is changed and that animal food that has been in cold storage spoils more readily than that which has not. This suggests the advisability of not using animal food that has been so preserved, especially as it is not necessary to use animal food at all to live well.

LAFAYETTE BRIDGE TO BE REBUILT IN TAMPA

Board Of Public Works Has Called For Bids On New Structure

Tampa, May 9.—Four bids for the construction of the Lafayette street bridge were opened by the board of public works yesterday, but no contract was let. A special adjourned meeting to award the contract over-ject the bids, depending upon the action of city council in adjusting the matter of the contribution of the Tampa Electric Company, will be held at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

The lowest bidder was the Edwards Construction Company of Tampa, the bid in lump sum being \$189,747. Careful inquiry was made by Engineer Hodgkiss, of New York, the consulting engineer of the board on the bridge proposition, regarding the kind of steel and concrete construction to be used. The answers were entirely satisfactory and there was no doubt expressed by any member of the board that the contract should go, if made, to this company.

Prosecutions are to be instituted against the phosphate mining companies which are emptying refuse into the Alafia river, according to action taken by the board of county commissioners Wednesday. The matter of the alleged shoaling of that stream, the alleged killing of fish and oysters by the chemical substances, etc., was, after a lapse of several months, again brought before the commissioners yesterday in the form of a petition signed by S. E. Mays and other residents of the Alafia river section.

BRAVING MOUTH OF A CANNON

Veteran of Oak Park, Ill., Tells of Terrible Fighting Experience at Spottsylvania.

A portion of the battle of Spottsylvania court house, which extended from May 8 to May 18, 1864, staying for a time the inevitable advance of Grant's army toward the end of all things at Appomattox, is remembered by F. M. Ellis, an Oak Park, Ill., architect, as one of the most terrible portions of the war that have come under his notice.

"It was about two o'clock in the afternoon of May 12," said Mr. Ellis, "when our battery was ordered to take its place on the line. We were near a turnpike road and advanced along this, but were soon halted for a wait of some minutes and sent into parking at the side of the road. We had been there probably not more than two minutes when a shell burst near by. The captain then gave orders to dismount, but just as the order came another shell burst directly over us. The fuse had been cut a little longer. A large fragment of the shell descended on us and tore the saddle from the swing or middle team of the gun I was on, killing one of the horses. Then we got out of the parking.

"The pike was filled with wounded men going to the rear like the crowd in a Chicago street, and there were strings of ambulances continually passing. We drove against the current to the place where our batteries of long range guns had been set up and waited there for a while. In order to be of service we must be nearer the enemy and in a short time we advanced beyond our battery line. We descended into a ravine and climbed the other side, unlimbering our four guns under the brow of the hill. Before us at the right there was open ground to a point half a mile distant, where the timber began. At the left the woods came almost to the ravine and here the Second Michigan infantry was stationed.

"Near the trees half a mile distant a little at our right were four Confederate regiments. This point was supposed to be one of the weak places in the Union line, and these regiments had been sent to make a breach. We shelled them, and they flanked into the woods at our left. We were depending on the Michigan men at the left to have pickets in the woods. Whether they did not or whether the pickets were unable to give the alarm, I do not know. I do know that suddenly the Confederates appeared at the edge of the woods within twenty feet of our guns.

"We had loaded with two charges of canister, and we fired the big twelve-inch guns in their faces. No one could have withstood such firing at so short a range. They fell back,

and we captured their colonel, who had led his men in the advance.

"Our men on the first gun had been nearly all killed or wounded in this charge of the Confederates; I saw a man of the Michigan regiment pull off his coat with a yell and heard him cry, 'Who says we're not artillery-men?' He grasped the sponge staff and rammed home a charge of canister. Out the enemy came again from the woods, and no braver men ever lived or died looking into the cannon's mouth. They had to form into heavy columns, pressing forward and walking over the dead to fill the broken ranks.

"To me, as I stood in partial cover holding the horses, it seemed an age, but in reality it must have been a short time indeed before the Confederates fell back again. There had been more of them killed before our battery than there were Americans killed on the firing line in all the Spanish-American war.

"We had received the full force of the fight. The Michigan infantry at our left had helped us, but they had not been fired on. I believe only one of them was lost and that was a man who had gone to draw one of our own wounded out of danger."

INFANT MORTALITY.

At the recent international congress for the consideration of means for lessening infantile mortality, Hon. Nathan Straus, the New York philanthropist, said that nearly half of the infants that die in America are the victims of improper feeding. If it be considered that resistance to disease, in infants as in adults, is dependent primarily upon proper nutrition, in which food is fundamental, the percentage of infantile deaths resulting from other causes than improper feeding, is seen to be comparatively small. If half the effort spent on so-called scientific cooking instruction were devoted to teaching the art of feeding adults and infants naturally the results would be infinitely better.

LIVED SEVEN YEARS ON MILK ONLY.

British medical men have been much interested in the case of Arthur Keene of Penarth, Glamorgan. The boy has lived on milk exclusively, nearly seven years, and was a remarkable example of physical development and normal health. His diet has been a little more than two quarts of milk daily. It is not to be assumed that a child after the first year would live very much better on milk than on any other food, but remarkable results would probably follow in every case the substitution of a simple diet for the ordinary mixture of fresh bread, mushes, flesh meat, tea and coffee and fruit indiscriminately mixed. It is important that experiments in feeding be instituted that would demonstrate systematically the benefits from scientific feeding.

MONODIET IN TREATING SKIN DISEASES.

The medical journals are reporting the success of Buckley in the treatment of inflammatory conditions of the skin by limiting the diet to rice and bread and water. I have frequently shown the application of the principle of the monodiet to the treatment of skin diseases in common with others, and particularly in eczema. Rice and bread, being cereals and therefore harmonious, must give the benefit of the monodiet in the treatment of any disease. The importance of the monodiet, both in health and in disease, is being gradually impressed upon both lay and professional men.

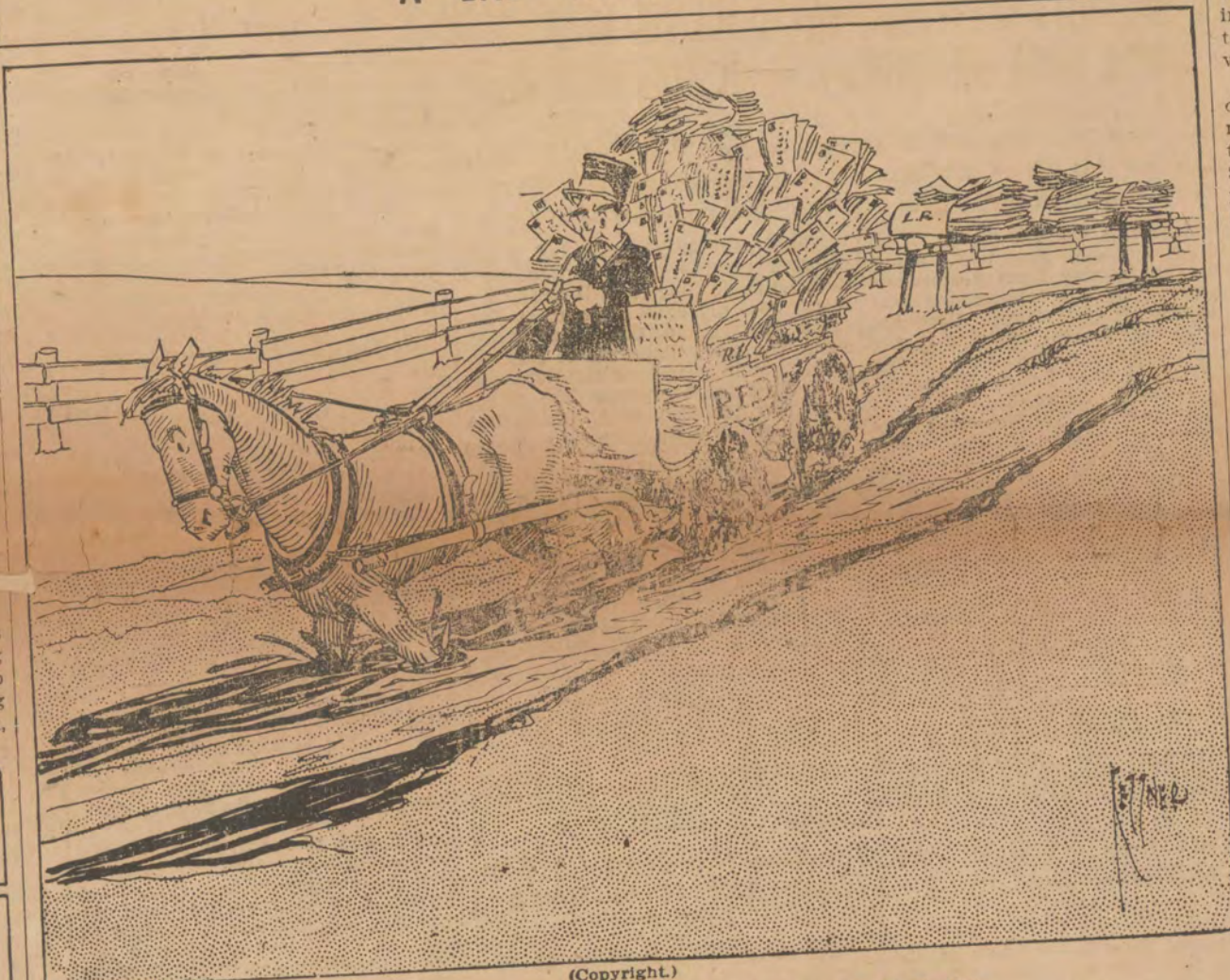

KEEPING MILK SWEET.

Milk will keep sweet indefinitely, sealed, immersed in water at a temperature of 50 degrees F. A bottle of milk was taken from a well at Sycamore, Ill., a few days ago, perfectly sweet, that was accidentally dropped six years ago. And the same conditions will preserve butter. If the milk is first raised to a temperature of 150, it will keep much better, this degree of heat being sufficient to secure the benefits of Pasteurization without the injurious effects that follow a temperature above 160, the coagulating point of albumen.

ICE CREAM FROM SOUR MILK.

This is superior to the ordinary ice cream not only in the same respects as buttermilk is superior to sweet milk, but because the select culture used in the development of buttermilk from the fresh whole milk prevents the development of inferior germs. Ice cream made from properly soured whole milk is in every way superior to the ordinary ice cream and far less likely to be contaminated.

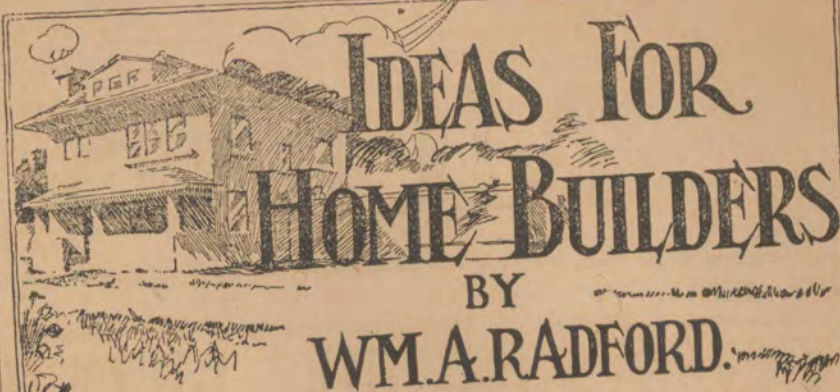
FOLLOWS HIS OWN ADVICE.

"A little house we've got, on a flower-bordered lot, in a hustling, breezy, busy little city; it's big enough for two, for our wants are very few, there's only just myself and little Kitty."

A simple little house like this is very much like going back to first principles, but it furnishes accommodation for two just as well as a more elaborate affair. We all have acquaintances, especially among our older friends, who commenced life as simply as this, and who are now enjoying the accumulations resulting from frugality and good management.

If a young couple form the habit of paying rent, they are very likely to pay rent as long as they live. We often hear the remark that it is cheaper to rent than to own our own property. There never was a more foolish or misleading statement. The man who lives in a rented house seldom gets ahead financially. This holds good whether he is working on a salary or is conducting a business on his own account. It would be difficult to say why, but it probably is because in the majority of cases a renter fails to give attention to the advancing value of real estate.

I knew a man, a clerk in a lubricating oil manufactory, who rented a new house on a pleasant street about twenty years ago. At first he paid \$20 per month, but in seven or eight years' time the rent was raised to \$25. He is still living in the same

very attractive by making a nice lawn and planting a few trees and flowers. The lawn is the most essential and the most difficult undertaking on the average town lot. The ground is often not very good; it is mixed with cellar earth and rubbish that is not well calculated for a good seed bed for grass. It is easy to put the ground in proper shape, however, if the job is started from the bottom. The ground must be plowed deep, and thoroughly worked, to get the objectionable grass roots out of it. The condition of the soil will determine whether to seed the first year or the second year. If there is no humus in the soil, it will pay to cover it thick with coarse manure, and plow it under. This, again, leads to complications in the moisture problem; but if you have a hose attachment, you can easily keep the ground moist. The top two or three inches of earth must be repeatedly worked with a disk harrow or some implement, every other day for a week or two, to kill the weeds as they sprout; then, if the top is well mixed with a good commercial fertilizer, the grass seed may be sown, and you have a lawn that will last as long as you want it, a lawn that will be green when others are parched with sun, a lawn that will look velvety and add ten or twenty per cent to the value of the property.

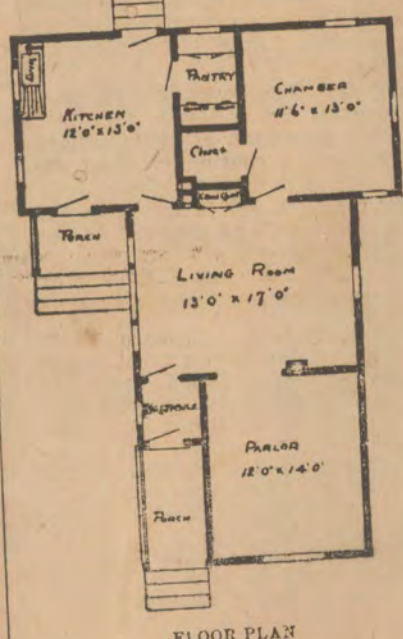
This is a secret that not many householders understand. It is not always the house itself that makes a home desirable. I have seen cheap little houses made so attractive that strangers passing would stop to admire.

A young man can build a house like this for \$700 or \$800, and the money that he would naturally pay out for rent will pay for it in a few years. He can grow fruit trees, and have fruit enough for home use, and some



house, and is now paying \$35 per month. The house has not improved with age, and he is continually looking about to better his condition, but can find no other property that suits him so well or that he can rent at a cheaper rate in proportion to the advantages he now has. He has paid enough rent to buy the house, to pay all street improvements, city taxes, insurance and repairs. He tells me he was offered the property years ago for \$2,500, which he thought was too much money. The lot itself is worth more than that today. This is only one of many similar instances that have come to my notice. It is not always that a neighborhood improves so rapidly and substantially; but, generally speaking, all property in American towns advances in value.

There is another very great advantage in owning a home, and that is the comfortable feeling you have of being a landed proprietor, and the fact that you are not obliged to have

your rent money ready promptly when the month comes around. You can plant a tree or a shrub or some flower bulbs without the permission of the landlord; you can make alterations in the house when it suits your convenience; and if the house or neighborhood is not to your liking, you can rent it and borrow the money to build another, and the rent from the old one will help pay for the new. A little house like this may be made

to sell, without going to much expense or spending a great deal of time in the garden. An hour or two at night for a few weeks, early in the season, will accomplish a good deal if the work is intelligently laid out. In building a house like this, don't forget the outside embellishments. The lawn and the garden will be the making of the property; at the same time, you will be setting a good example that is almost sure to benefit the neighborhood.

Another very important item is the painting. A little house sometimes is conspicuous just because it is small; and more attention is paid to it than to other houses in the neighborhood, especially if it is nicely painted and neatly kept. Always choose quiet colors for a small house; never attempt to make it showy. A drab with white trimmings always looks well. You may deviate from this without serious injury, possibly; but you cannot improve on a light drab with white trimmings for a small house, especially if it is partly hidden among the trees and screened with vines.

War's Glamour Gone.

There is no sane, economic reason why there should be wars. They are economically wasteful. They have ceased to be picturesque. The uniform of the soldier has changed from scarlet and gold to clay color. He lies on his stomach in a trench and shoots at an enemy half a mile or more away. Sea fighting has suffered the same decay in romance. The modern dreadnought looks more like a factory with a couple of derricks sticking out of the roof than a boat. Orders are communicated by telephone. It must be very trying to an officer in the skeleton mast during an engagement to call up the captain to deliver some important information and learn that the line is "busy." The men are not sailors in the old meaning of the word. They know little about the picturesque side of life at sea. A fine looking lot of young fellows, probably not more than half a dozen of them on any battleship could splice a rope.—American Magazine.

DARING ATTEMPT AT ESCAPE

Diary of John L. Ransom Records Effort to Flee From Belle Isle Prison, Near Richmond, Va.

Sufferings in Confederate prisons, such as Belle Isle at Richmond and Andersonville, Ga., are told of by many writers, but probably nowhere more vividly than in a diary, now long out of print, which was written day by day in these two prisons and afterward printed by the author, John L. Ransom of the Ninth Michigan cavalry. An attempt at escape from Belle Isle Mr. Ransom's diary relates as follows:

"January 28, 1862. The nights are dark and cloudy. Mustard and Hendryx both sleep outside now, and I must manage to. We are well rigged, have some food saved up to take along; in good health and determined to get away. Tonight we are to start. The guard will let us cross his beat and go to the water's edge. We all have rebel clothing, which we are to

wear. We take the quartermaster's boat. We row across the river, give the countersign to the guards, and, to quiet their suspicions, start up into the town. Out of sight, take a turn to the left and to the Richmond jail. We will then meet with a negro, who will guide us ten miles up the river and then leave us in charge of friendly blacks, who will keep us through the next day and at night pilot us farther along toward our lines.

"The big bell in Richmond strikes six, and we close our diary, hoping never to look upon it again until we return to free our fellow prisoners with the glorious army of the north. Now we leave our diary to finish preparations for the flight for freedom. May God aid us in this land of tyranny, where we have met nothing but suffering. Good-by, Belle Isle and prison! Hail, freedom, home, friends and the grand army of the old flag! What is in store for us in the future?"

"February 5.—Have been reading over the last few pages of my diary. It sounds well, but the rebel flag still floats over Belle Isle. Our escape was a grand fizzle and all hands have been punished in more ways than one in the last few days. Lieutenant Bossieux suspected something going on among us and had us secretly watched, and long before we had made a move toward fulfilling our projected plans we were thrown into a guardhouse; next morning taken out of it and underwent a severe cross questioning.

"The result has been that we were bucked and gagged twice a day for an hour each time and for food, each of us carried a big stick of wood up and down in front of the gate, a guard to prick us with his bayonet if we walked too slow to suit him. Then Hendryx has been strung up by the thumbs. Nights we have been thrown into a damp, cold guardhouse to shiver all night. Every day now for five days we have walked with our sticks of wood so many hours per day, and last night were turned inside with all the prisoners to stay, Bossieux says, till we rot; he can place no dependence in us."

To Make Them Stick.

Ever after the squabble between Pickett's and Pettigrew's men as to who got farthest at Gettysburg, the North Carolinians and Virginians were notoriously jealous of each other's valor. Once when a Virginian, a staff officer of General Wise, was riding through a rather forlorn part of North Carolina, he accosted a native home on furlough:

"How are you, North Carolina?"
"Fast rate. How are you, Virginia?"
"Not much sale for tar now?"
"Yes, indeed," was the response. "We sell all our tar to Jeff Davis."

"The thunder you do! What on earth does the president want with tar?"
"To put on the heels of you Virginians to make you stick on the battlefield."

CLAUDE L'ENGLE ANSWERS TOOMER

TO THE PEOPLE OF FLORIDA:

In a letter addressed to me dated May 6, which I received today and which was printed in the Times-Union yesterday (May 6), Colonel Toomer says that he never signed nor sent out the letter to the turpentine men which I, in my advertisement in Sunday's Times-Union (May 5), said that he sent out, and the Colonel calls on me to either admit that the letter I published was a forgery, prove it, or retire from the race. I do not have to prove the letter, because Colonel Toomer admits in his letter printed in the Times-Union in these words:

"You quoted an incomplete, unsigned, undelivered and stolen from of a letter which I dictated, intending to mail it to some of my friends."

Notice that Colonel Toomer does not deny that he sent out a revision of this same letter which he says he destroyed but one of which reached me.

In my advertisement in last Sunday's Times-Union (May 5) I defied Colonel Toomer to deny the authenticity of this letter. In the language quoted above Colonel Toomer has admitted it. Therefore, I do not have to prove it. If there was no impropriety in dictating this letter, why this sudden determination on the part of the Colonel not to send this letter out and why so much care in its destruction?

As to how I got the letter: Colonel Toomer says he did not send out any of these letters.

One surely did go out, because a person got it and gave it to me. I neither stole it, nor forged it, nor misrepresented it, but I got it in a perfectly fair, honorable, proper, open and above board way. For obvious reasons I will not at this time give the name of the person who gave it to me and expose that person to the attack of the full pocketbook, because I pledged myself not to do so, in order to get the use of it.

The people of Florida need no assurance from me that this letter is straight goods and that I got it in a proper manner. They heard charges like this made when I printed some copies of telegrams when I had my fight on with Peter Knight. I told at the proper time how I got the telegrams, and I will tell at the proper time how I got this letter.

It makes no difference right now how I got it, except that I got it in an honorable, proper, open and above board way. Colonel Toomer admits writing the letter, which admission proves his previous statements that he is the candidate for no particular business interests to be false.

If he did not send all of the letters out, it was not because he did not want to appeal to these people, but because he was afraid I would find it out, and the result showed that his fears were well placed, because I did find it out just like I find out a good many other things against the best interests of the people of Florida and people wonder how I do it.

In his Times-Union letter of Monday, May 6, the Colonel asks me to tell him of the public services that I talk so noisily about performing. My modesty does not permit me to answer this part of the Colonel's letter. I let the Legislature of the State of Florida answer for me. Here is the answer:

The Journal of the Florida House of Representatives, 1909, contains this resolution: House Resolution No. 144:

Whereas, Claude L'Engle has manifested a deep interest in all matters of legislation pertaining to the public welfare during the session of Legislature of 1909; and

Whereas, The said Claude L'Engle did, during the early part of the present session of the legislature, tender the use of the people's lobby to the members of the legislature, together with all data and information contained therein touching questions of public moment and importance; and

Whereas, The members of this house have accepted the use of said people's lobby during this session of the legislature; and

Whereas, The said Claude L'Engle has patriotically given his time and talents to the editing and publishing of "The Sun," which has redounded to the benefit of the people, now,

therefore, be it

Resolved, That the house of representatives, hereby express its thanks and appreciation of the courtesies extended and the service rendered by the said Claude L'Engle.

Mr. Richbourg moved adoption of the resolution. Which was agreed to.

In this same letter, Colonel Toomer also says that I held for a short time the office of State Printer and drew from the public treasury more than \$25,000 in excess of what my successor drew for the same services, covering a corresponding period. Colonel Toomer herein displays his ignorance about public matters in Florida. He should have known that the report of the State Comptroller contains the amount spent for public printing and that this report shows that in 1910, when my successor held the public printing, the State paid out upwards of \$2,000 more for public printing than it did in 1908 when I had the State printing contract, and that these years are corresponding periods, the increase paid to my successor being accounted for by the natural increase of the volume of the public printing.

In the same letter, Colonel Toomer said that my appointments as State Printer were given me by Governor Broward and being the ingrate that I am, I turned them in to him inexcusably and bit the hand of my benefactor. Again Colonel Toomer displays his gross ignorance of public matters. If he had been informed, he would have known that the State printing is not given out by the governor. It is let to the lowest bidder by the Board of State Institutions composed of seven men of which the governor is one.

He certainly was not numbered among Governor Broward's friends or he would have known that Governor Broward stated publicly that he owed his election to the United States Senate to the work that I did in that campaign. Governor Broward told me this himself three or four days after the second primary. Governor Broward's friends today are working for my election because they know this to be true. I never turned on my benefactor, because Broward had nothing to do with giving me the State printing contract or anything else. My relations with Governor Broward were simply these: When he thought that I was right, he stood behind me; when I thought he was right I stood behind him. When we differed, he expressed himself in opposition to me, and I did the same. We were friends for thirty years before he died, notwithstanding the few times that there was an honest difference of opinion between us about public matters, some times publicly expressed.

I do not know whether I have won out in the first primary over all my opponents or whether I will lack enough votes to make a second primary possible. I do know that Colonel Toomer and all those putting him up and putting up for him cannot beat me in the second primary, if his friends should give him enough money to make the contest.

I have been beating the full pocketbook for six years. I will beat it worse this time than ever, because I have got the people of Florida behind me now.

All I want my friends to do is to stand fast until they see that I will have to make a second race, and then to move forward and make this victory a crushing one that will put a dent into the full pocketbook that will take them years to recover from.

Now as to you, Mr. Toomer, I cannot afford to pay a dollar an inch for more Times-Union space to contend with you further; so, if there will be a second primary, I hereby challenge you to meet me on the public platform at such places that we can immediately name in an itinerary. We will then and there discuss records and platforms because we are widely at issue on all public policies and the people can then determine the truth. I want you to face the people with me in as many places as possible.

Advertising Talks.

BY THE AL. MAN.

DOES ADVERTISING PAY?

In more or less general way, most business men believe (provided they give the subject any thought) that advertising pays. They know it must pay or there would not be so much money spent year after year for advertising purposes. But when they bring the subject right down to their own place of business and begin to consider the matter from the viewpoint of their own business, they are not absolutely sure that it would pay them to advertise. I am speaking of the man who does not advertise. The progressive merchant or business man who carries an advertisement with the newspapers of his city from the beginning of the year to its close, and who renews his contract when it has expired, knows that it pays HIM to advertise.

WILL IT PAY ME TO ADVERTISE MY BUSINESS? That states the proposition which every man who contemplates taking a certain amount of newspaper space for advertising purposes is up against. If it will pay him, he wants to do it—it will be GOOD BUSINESS for him to, but if it will not, he does not feel like wasting the money which the space would cost him; it would be BAD BUSINESS to throw that much money away.

Now, as a matter of fact, ADVERTISING PAYS, when it is properly done. But the man who has never advertised most probably does not know that it will pay him to do so, and it is but perfectly natural for him to look at the matter in the following light: "If advertising pays, then there ought to be some specific examples of its having paid some of the advertisers who carry space in the newspapers of Key West." That is the logical way for him to look at it, and that question certainly is a pertinent one. If a man were to ask me that question, or rather state that proposition to me, I should certainly consider that he had gone about the matter in the right manner. He would have considered the matter from a purely business point of view, and that is the viewpoint from which it ought to be considered always. Unless we can cite some example of advertising having having paid some merchant of Key West, then we are up against it when we go to talk advertising to prospective patrons, and I should certainly dislike to hold my present position of advertising manager very much longer, did I not have the proof of the fact that advertising space in the newspapers of this city is valuable as a business builder.

Not so long ago a business man here in Key West planned an advertising campaign to last through a few days. He advertised his stock and the reductions which he had made through the columns of the two daily papers in the city. I was talking to him on the night of the third day after he had begun his campaign and he made the following statement, concerning the amount of business which he had done: "I said that I would be satisfied if I sold a thousand dollars worth of goods during the ten days for which I have advertised these reductions, but I have done much better than I expected to do. I counted my cash tonight and I have sold nine hundred and forty five dollars worth of goods in these three first days." Now, did it not pay that man to advertise? He thinks so, and while I have not his authority to give his name in the public prints, I shall be very glad to tell you who he is if you will call my telephone number—number 85. It is true that he has one of the most up-to-date stocks of goods in the city, but he would not have sold the amount which he did sell, had he not ADVERTISED his store and also line of goods.

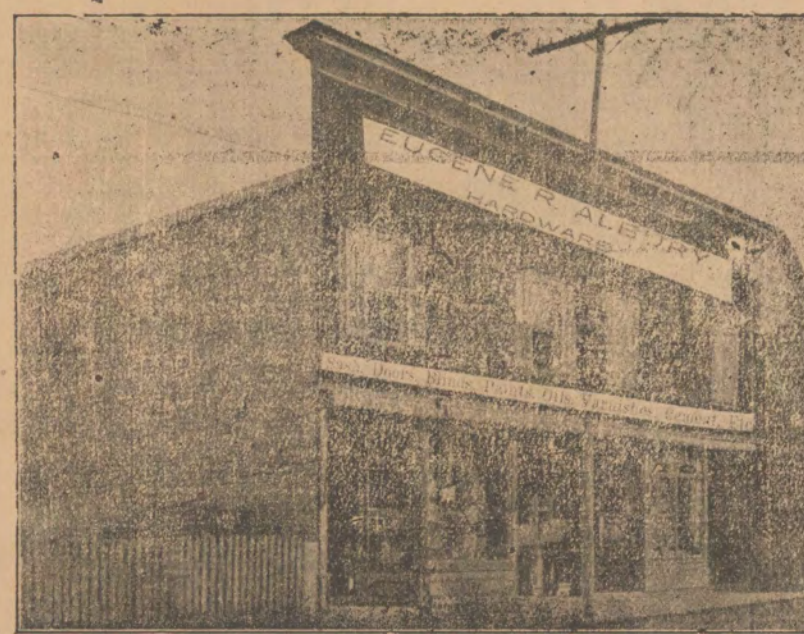

Titanic Pictures Coming

With the entire world agog at the terrible tidings of the Titanic wreck; thousands upon thousands of eager humanity thronging the bulletin boards in New York and with every newspaper and photographer frantic to be the first to reach the rescue ship, Carpathia, it remained for the "Animated Weekly" to score a tremendous scoop.

While others were delaying in order to get permission to board the incoming vessel as she steamed into New York, the "Animated Weekly" tug, with Jack Binn, world-famous wireless operator as one of the crew, quietly slipped out to sea on Wednesday morning and, within a few hours drew along side of the Carpathia.
