FORT LAUDERDALE PRACTICALLY CLEANED OFF OF MAP BY FLAMES

Office Buildings, Grocery Establishments, Newspaper Office, Postoffice, Bakery, Residents, all Completely Destroyed by Disastrous Conflagration

FIRE WAS DISCOVERED AFTER MIDNIGHT SATURDAY

Part of Miami Fire Department Rushed to Rescue but Could Not Save Town--Total Loss Amounts to \$150,000 With \$50,000 Insurance--Origin Not Known.

Miami, Fla., June 3.—(11.25 p. m.)—At about midnight Saturday night fire was discovered back of a drugstore in the Wheeler block at Fort Lauderdale and spread with great rapidity. A telephone message was sent this city and Chief Chase of the Miami Fire Department and a fire engine were dispatched. The fire was discovered at about midnight. The origin of the fire is not known but it is not thought to have been of incendiary origin. The total loss, figured approximately is One Hundred and Fifty Thousand dollars. There was Fifty Thousand dollars insurance carried on the buildings and stocks destroyed. No lives were lost and no one was injured.

A large amount of capital has been invested in Fort Lauderdale and it is probable that the effect of the fire will be a rebuilding of the town on more ambitious lines than ever.

SOME CLASS TO DARN PROMOTERS IN JAX

Organized a Corporation Capitalized One Thousand and Million Dollars

Jacksonville, Fla., June 3.—The case came up again Saturday morning for final testimony, United States District Attorney John M. Cheney making his argument in the morning and Attorney Purcell having the afternoon to address the jury. Judge Locke spoke at length to the jurors emphasizing that while there had been much testimony adduced, the question to be considered by the jury was whether the defendants had made false representations—knowing them to be false in any way—to obtain money then there should be a verdict of guilty.

The four negroes on trial are men of prominence in Jacksonville and who are highly respected by their race, the charge against them for the alleged use of the mails in the furtherance of scheme to defraud having attracted more than passing notice.

One particular interest was the fact that the company, of which the defendants were officers, the American Patent Manufacturing Company, was capitalized at a figure which ran up to a thousand million dollars, or the sum of one billion dollars.

"TERRIBLE TEDDY" MAPS OUT CAMPAIGN

Followed by His Forces When Convention Assembles in Chicago

Oyster, Bay, June 3.—Roosevelt's line of battle in the republican national convention was formed and at a "council of war" at Sagamore Hill there was mapped out a campaign which it is hoped will result in capturing the convention.

The first step is the organization of Roosevelt forces throughout the country. It is planned to send to Chicago a week or so in advance of the convention an executive committee from every state in which Roosevelt delegates have been elected, or in which there has been a contest. By this method it is expected that the organization will act as an unit on every matter coming before the convention.

Although Roosevelt is decided to oppose the selection of Root as temporary chairman, he indicated today that he would waive his objections if it seemed wiser for his supporters to reserve their fire for the more important contest.

Whether Roosevelt will go to Chicago and lead the fight in person, is now an open question. Men who conferred with Roosevelt today regarding his plans, said that Roosevelt wanted the hearings on the contested elections of delegates to be open to the press.

FLETCHER INTRODUCES BILL FOR RECLAMATION

Wants Government to Drain More Than 80,000,000 of Land

Washington, June 3.—Reclamation of all the swamp and overflowed land in the United States is requested in a petition presented to Congress Saturday by Senator Fletcher of Florida, president of the Southern Commercial Congress, which at its recent convention adopted a resolution asking that such a petition be made to congress.

A complete survey of all swamp and overflowed land to be followed by a plan for draining each individual project is asked for. There are more than 80,000,000 acres of such land, it is estimated, in the United States.

UP GOES BEER.

Chicago, Ill., June 3.—The wholesale price of beer will be raised fifty cents per barrel tomorrow, according to an announcement by the Brewers' association, the official organization. Increased price of barley and malt is responsible.

MACKENZIE WILL LEAVE AT DAYLIGHT

Torpedo Boat Manned by Members of Local Naval Militia to Miami

The U. S. Torpedo boat MacKenzie is scheduled to leave at daylight this morning for Miami. The little vessel will be manned by a detachment of the Florida Naval Militia and the trip is made for the purpose of giving the local naval militia an opportunity to try out the vessel which has been placed at their service by the government.

The MacKenzie will be under command of Lieut. Commander Geo. B. Graham, Ensign C. H. Lopez will be the navigator and executive officer. Ensign Chester Lowe will be engineering officer. Cyril C. Bush and Otis Johnson will be Chief machinist's mates. In addition to the officers there will be a crew of thirty-four men.

The MacKenzie will make three days cruise on her trial run in charge of the naval militia and is expected to return to Key West Thursday evening.

"No Compromise" Taft

Washington, June 3.—President Taft today sent a telegram to Arthur I. Vorys, Republican National Committeeman for Ohio, declaring that while he does not need that state's six delegates-at-large to secure the presidential nomination, he will not consider a compromise in the Ohio state convention.

FLORIDA LEADERS ARE LOYAL TO TAFT

Chubb Says It's Not Dislike for Roosevelt, but Personal Honor

Washington, D. C., June 3.—President Taft, through conference with representative republicans from southern states, is seeking to learn at first hand what ground there is for rumors that there will be defections to Roosevelt from delegations pledged or instructed for the president.

He talked with the leaders from Florida and Virginia. His luncheon guests were H. S. Chubb, national committeeman, and W. R. O'Neal and Henry W. Bishop, delegates from Florida. Representative C. B. Slomp, state chairman, and L. P. Summers, delegates from Virginia and Judge J. B. Gaston, delegate from Georgia. After luncheon Summers said Virginia's twenty-four votes would stand firm for the president.

Speaking for the Florida delegation's loyalty to Taft, Chubb said: "It is not a question of dislike for Roosevelt, but of personal honor and integrity; they come first."

THE PRESIDENTIAL SITUATION IN THE TWO GREAT PARTIES TODAY

Roosevelt Has the Largest Number on Instructed Delegates But Will Contest Many of the Delegations Which are Alleged to Have Been Instructed for Taft

HON. CHAMP CLARK HAS BIG LEAD OVER OPPONENTS

Some Interesting Facts Concerning the Various Candidates for President in Both the Democratic and Republican Parties--None of Them Rich Men.

Following is a statement of the instructed delegates on the presidential nomination, in both the Republican and Democratic parties up to yesterday:

It is interesting to know that even one of the seven candidates, even including Roosevelt, has been admitted to the bar, and five of them have had successful careers in the law, says the Baltimore Sun.

Two have been judges. Not one of them is a business man, and not one, save Mr. Harmon, has had any considerable experience with business affairs, either large or small.

Not one of them is a rich man, and, though several of them, by virtue of their high talents, have been able at times to earn large incomes, they have all been hard workers. Two or three of them have been relatively poor men devoting themselves unreservedly to public work.

All of the candidates, save Wilson, have had long experience in public office, and in dealing with public men and public questions.

All of the seven, save possibly Harmon, are at the very prime of life for national leadership. These are their ages:

Underwood	50 years old
Roosevelt	54 years old
Taft	55 years old
Wilson	56 years old
La Follette	57 years old
Clark	62 years old
Harmon	66 years old

It is also of curious rather than of important interest that most of the seven were born in the states which have long been fertile in the production of Presidents and presidential candidates. Wilson and born in Virginia; Clark and Underwood in Kentucky; Taft and Harmon in Ohio, and Roosevelt in New York. Only one candidate La Follette, comes from what may be called a new presidential state.

ROCKED ON MATCHES AND WIDOW BURNED TO DEATH

Woman was Asleep in Chair When Rocker Ignited Box of Matches

Chicago, June 3.—Mrs. John J. Dunn, a wealthy widow, was burned to death on the back porch of her South Side home last night when the rocker of the chair she occupied struck a box of matches and lighted them. The fire spread to a pile of newspapers near her and then to her clothing. The flames were extinguished by a small boy with a garden hose, but the woman died a short time afterwards.

EXPLOSION OF RATTLE KILLED INFANT CHILD

Detonating Caps in a Tin Can Was Given Child as a "Rattle"

Boston, June 3.—Edmund D. Dickey, the infant son of Thomas Dickey, of North Cambridge, met with this morning through the explosion of some detonating caps with which he was playing. The boy had been tossing the caps from one side to another, throwing them in the air and shaking them in a tin can. He rattled them so forcibly that one of them exploded and set off all the others. The child was so badly mangled about the hands, arms and face that he died soon afterward. The flat was previously occupied by an Italian family who left some things behind when they moved. Among them were the detonating caps, which the Dickey boy found a few days ago in a dish in a closet.

EDITOR JORDAN ELECTED.

Hon. A. P. Jordan, editor of the Punta Gorda Herald, who was a candidate for delegate to the national convention from this district on the Underwood ticket, wired Mrs. Jordan, in this city yesterday, that the practically complete count of the district vote gave him a lead of 1,300 votes over E. D. Hobbs, of this city, candidate on the Wilson ticket. Owing to the handsome vote Mr. Hobbs received in this county, there was some doubt whether or not Editor Jordan could overcome this lead.—Tampa Tribune.

NEW YORKER RISKED HIS LIFE TO SAVE SMALL BOY

Grasped Reins of Runaway Horse and was Dragged Considerable Distance

Springfield, Mass., June 3.—Robert Gregory of New York risked his life today to stop a runaway horse, and, incidentally saved the life of a five-year-old boy. In a high carriage, to which the horse was attached, the lad, Louis Small, desperately clung to his seat. Gregory jumped for the reins and was dragged twenty-five feet.

THE DEFEATED CANDIDATES.

There are many men who show their manhood most in the hour of defeat. There were a few men in the last primaries who fought a good fight and who left no stone unturned in their effort to attain victory. Some of them made great sacrifices to conduct their campaigns. Some of them even spent more money than they had in a last desperate effort to wrest victory from defeat. They took a gambler's chance—and they lost.

While The Journal feels a natural gratification that nearly all the candidates which it favored won out, far be it from us to gloat over the defeat of the men whom we opposed. Doubtless some good men were defeated in the primaries, but most of them were defeated by better men.

We use the word "better" in the sense of ability to fill an office. We trust that all defeated candidates will accept defeat as gracefully as they would have accepted victory; as gracefully, for example, as Albert Williamson accepted defeat in his race for Congressman at large in the first primary. Williamson was defeated, but we feel certain that he is stronger with the voters of Florida today than before his defeat.

The explanation is that he accepted defeat so philosophically, so gracefully, that many of those who voted against him felt a pang of regret when they learned the character of the man whom they had helped to defeat.

Any man can win gracefully; it takes a good man to lose gracefully.

The Florida Press Association will discuss "Cost" at their convention to be held in Palatka this month. We hope they will discover some means of reducing the "cost" of getting to Palatka from Key West.

Congressman Frank Clark is to be congratulated on his narrow escape from defeat in the second primary. Never before has the "mocking bird of the Kissimmee Valley" been forced to expend so much energy.

Monroe County has not yet escaped from the reign of politics. It is understood that there will be several independent candidates in the general election to be held in November. There is no rest for the weary.

While we respect the opinions of others, it makes us weary to read the "rot" in some of the state papers about the nomination of L'Engle being a practical joke carried too far. The voters of the state are not fools.

The Journal has asserted time and again for several years that Key West is the key to the situation South of us. The mobilization of the Atlantic fleet here seems to indicate that the government is of the same opinion.

When a newspaper "dares" to call attention to violations of the law they are promptly called upon to explain themselves. We don't notice such hysterical efforts made to apprehend flagrant violators of the law.

DIET AND HEALTH HINTS

HARDENING OF ARTERIES NOT DUE TO CEREALS.

Is it true, as many authorities contend, that bread and the cereals in general contain large percentages of mineral matter, particularly lime, which are deposited in the arteries, hardening them and thus acting as a "staff of death," instead of the staff of life, as bread has been called? Dr. Densmore, who has been the chief advocate of this theory in recent years, has died comparatively young. There is no satisfactory proof that the horse and other cereal eating animals are short-lived because they eat cereals largely. Men have lived longer on bread with buttermilk, which contains much lime, than on anything else, as the cases given by Metchnikoff in his "Prologation of Life" and the celebrated English case, "Old Parr," indicate. The lion is not long lived without cereals, nor the cow that lives on grass. The mental factor must be considered. The food of the eagle does not differ materially from that of many birds that live half as long. Heavy mineral water is probably a more efficient source of hardening of the arteries than food—and soft water of preventing it. No food is perfect, but it is probable that one could live longer on cereals and buttermilk than on any other food, considering the difficulty of getting a uniformly fresh supply of fruits, nuts and vegetables.

THE QUESTION OF ENDURANCE.

"The vegetable diet seems to be giving Warren Buffum a slight advantage over his brother, Jesse, who eats meat, in their hike across the continent," says a report from Kansas City on the walking contest under the direction of Prof. Sargent of Harvard University. In all the contests held in Germany, England and America, non-flesh-eaters have shown greater endurance. While the exclusion of flesh from the diet does not give an ideal system and while meat may under some circumstances be beneficial, it is now well determined that greater endurance in physical work can be maintained without it, and it is reasonable to suppose that the same is true of mental endurance. All physicians now agree that too much meat is eaten, and as the industrial conditions clearly indicate that the American people must learn to do with less flesh food it is well that such demonstrations should be made. Many sanitariums exclude flesh from their bill of fare.

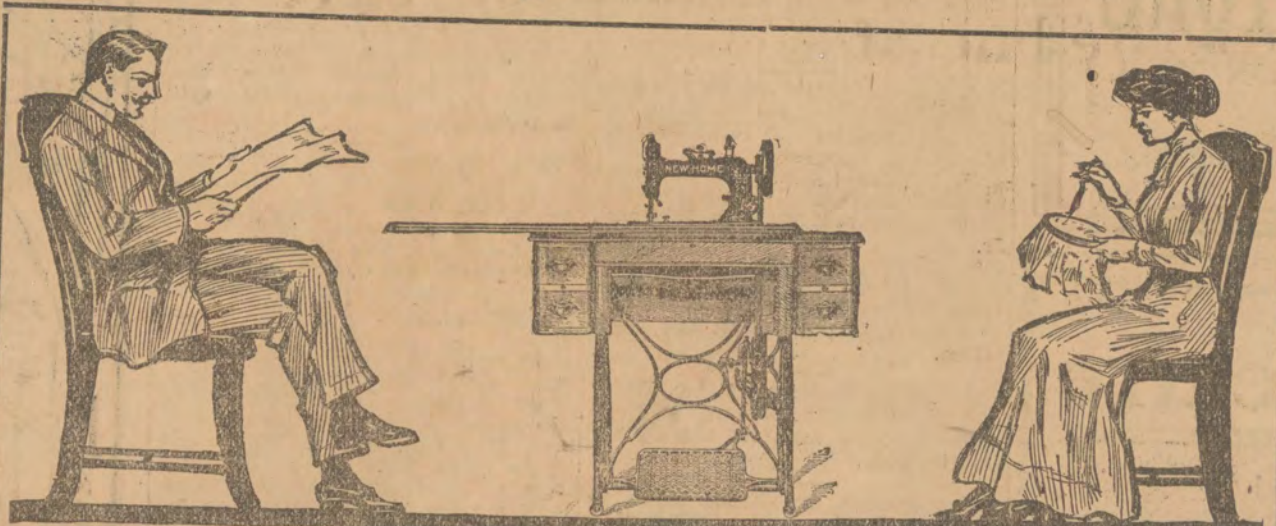

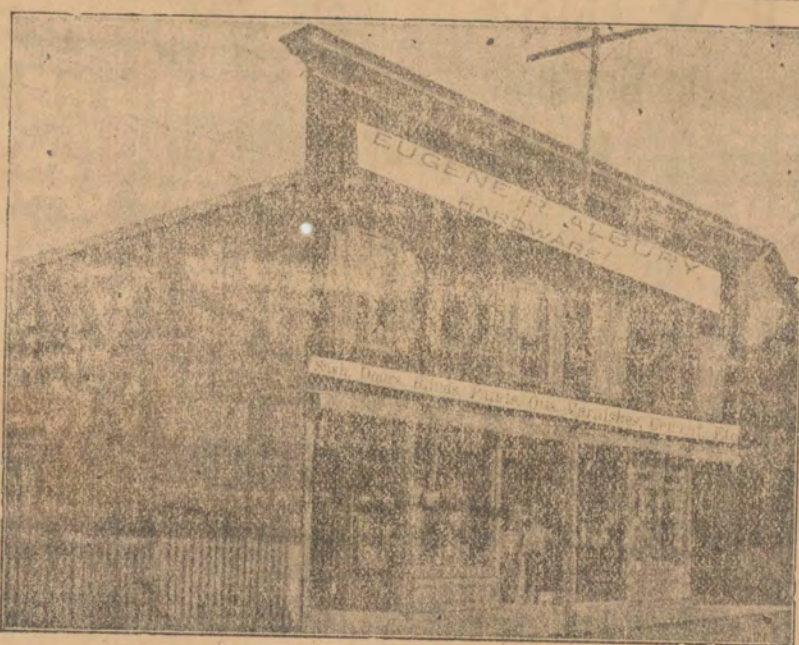

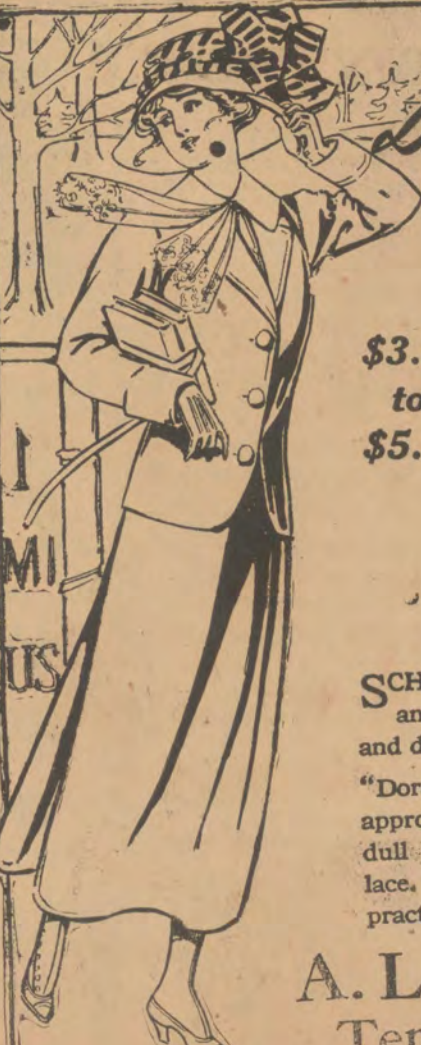
West Point Baseball Team Defeated The Midshipmen

Memphis, Tenn., June 3.—With the fight to subdue the Mississippi flood at end, save at Morgan City La., twenty miles from the Gulf coast effort to restore normal conditions in the now inundated and recently flooded area is the most serious problem this section of the South has had to face in a score of years.
