START OF CHARLEY O'LEARY

Was Messenger Boy of 17 When He Broke Into Fast Company—Now With Indianapolis.

The release by Detroit of Charley O'Leary, who goes to Indianapolis, recalls an interesting story of his entry into professional baseball. From a messenger boy's uniform to that of a major league club all in one afternoon was the lightning change he made.

O'Leary had played ball around the lots in Chicago all his life and had distinguished himself as the star of the Mandel Bros. nine. One afternoon in 1900 he was sent out to the White Sox park when the South Side team was new in Chicago. It happened the shortstop, Shugart, had been injured and the club was not provided with a capable man to take his place. The Sox really were in desperate straits and hardly knew how they would fill in their line-up until somebody who knew O'Leary spied him and said: "There is a kid who can play the infield; give him a chance."

The manager asked O'Leary if he thought he could fill the bill and Dip, who was willing to take a chance on almost anything, replied that the job was made to order for him. They dug up a uniform for the boy, then but seventeen, and he doffed his messenger's toga.

He made good from the jump and might have finished the season with the Sox if he hadn't sustained a broken arm as a result of stopping one of "Rube" Waddell's wild ones with his person.

O'Leary went to Des Moines of the Western league the next season and

played with that club for several years, going to Detroit in 1904.

The White Sox won the pennant the year O'Leary was with them and his fine playing was responsible in a large manner for this success. DREYFUSS SEES THE PENNANT

Taft Is Re-Nominated

Roosevelt Withdraws Name From Convention Republican Party Facing Greatest Crisis In Its History

RESERVES MAY RELIEVE ATLANTIC FLEET HERE

Navy Dept. Wants to Recall
Warships From Cuba For
Summer Maneuvers

Washington, June 22.—While the navy department is striving to recall the warships of the Atlantic fleet from Cuba so that they may take part in the summer maneuvers, it is not expected that they will be with Cuba leaving the marines on guard duty in Cuba.

It has been suggested that the big battleships be withdrawn, substituting of the battleships Indiana, Iowa, Maine and Wisconsin and the armored cruisers Tennessee, Birmingham, Chester, Montana and Tacoma under the command of Rear Admiral Knight. This plan would allow the navy to leave the marines in Cuba.

The Cuban situation is regarded by the state department as much improved. Regarding the charges that the government of Cuba co-operated in the negro insurrection, it was stated today that the state department feels the best test of the accuracy of the rumors is the manner President Gomez and the Cuban army has dealt with the rebels.

Steps Taken by Roosevelt Delegates Last Night to Hold Mass Meeting for Purpose of Organizing Party

(EXCLUSIVE DISPATCHES TO THE JOURNAL)
CHICAGO, JUNE 23, 2 A. M.—WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT WAS RENOMINATED AS THE REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AT 9:15 O'CLOCK LAST NIGHT ON THE FIRST BALLOT, BY AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY.

VICE-PRESIDENT SHERMAN WAS ALSO RENOMINATED AND WILL AGAIN BE TAFT'S RUNNING MATE. THE NAME OF COLONEL ROOSEVELT WAS NOT PRESENTED, AND HIS DELEGATES SAT IN MUTE PROTEST AGAINST ALL PROCEEDINGS.

THE OFFICIAL RESULTS OF THE FIRST BALLOT GAVE TAFT 561; ROOSEVELT 107; LA FOLLETTE 41; CUMMINS 17; HUGHES 2; ABSENT 6; PRESENT BUT NOT VOTING 344. AS ROOSEVELT'S NAME WAS NOT PRESENTED, THE ONLY VOTE GIVEN HIM WERE FROM THE DELEGATES OF SUCH STATES AS ILLINOIS WHO WERE INSTRUCTED FOR ROOSEVELT BY DIRECT PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARIES.

ELIHU ROOT WAS APPOINTED CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE TO INFORM PRESIDENT TAFT OF HIS RENOMINATION, AND DINEEN OF OHIO WAS APPOINTED CHAIRMAN OF A COMMITTEE TO NOTIFY VICE PRESIDENT SHERMAN. THE CONVENTION ADJOURNED AT 10:30 P. M. AMID THE WILDEST SCENES OF DISORDER.

Chicago, June 23.—There was talk early last night among the Roosevelt delegates of a mass meeting to form temporary organization of a new party. It is the desire of leaders to take such a step before delegates separate that the work of forming a new party may begin at once. In every part of the country.

The "Progressive party" is the name which has been chosen. It is the announced purpose of the leaders to take over the machinery of the republican party in the states where the organizations are in control of Roosevelt men.

In such cases the republican candidates for state offices may be endorsed of they do not wish to go through the formality of bolting.

Chicago, June 23, 2:30 a. m.—After making preliminary arrangements for organization of a new party, Col. Roosevelt definitely severed his relations with the republican national convention. In a statement setting forth his position in this regard, he said that since the convention had declined to remove the delegates who he contends are fraudulent, he could not recognize its authority. He urged his delegates to refrain from voting in convention, although stating that in case they did vote he could not free them from the obligation to cast their ballots for him. It was decided definitely yesterday afternoon that before adjournment of the convention, or immediately after there would be held a meeting of Roosevelt delegates who wish to enlist in a new party.

Colonel Roosevelt at 12:30 this morning issued this statement: "A clear majority of delegates honestly elected to the convention were chosen by the people to nominate me. Under the direction and with the encouragement of Taft, the majority of the national committee, by so called 'steam roller' methods and with scandalous disregard of every principle of elementary honesty and decency, stole 80 or 90 delegates, putting on the temporary roll sufficient number of fraudulent delegates to defeat the legally expressed will of the people and to substitute a dishonest for an honest majority. The convention has declined to purge the roll of fraudulent delegates placed thereon by the defunct national committee, and the majority which thus endorsed the fraud was made a majority only because it included the fraudulent delegates themselves, who all sat as judges on one another's cases. "If these fraudulent votes had

not thus been cast and counted the convention would have been purged of their presence.

"This action makes the convention, in no proper sense, any longer a republican convention representing a real party. Therefore, I hope the men elected as Roosevelt delegates will now decline to vote on any matter before the convention. I do not release any delegate from his honorable obligation to vote for me, if he votes at all, but under actual conditions I hope that he will not vote at all.

"The convention, as now composed has no claim to represent voters of the party. It represents nothing but the successful fraud in over-riding the will of the rank and file of the party. Any man nominated by the convention as now constituted would be merely the beneficiary of a successful fraud. It would be deeply discreditable to any man to accept the convention's nomination under these circumstances, and any man thus accepting it would have no claim to support of any republican on party grounds, and would have forced rights to ask the support of any honest man of any party on moral grounds.

Chicago, June 22.—It was the hope of the party leaders as the fifth day of the fifteenth republican convention opened to conclude the convention late tonight. Leaders were inclined to think without wishing to be arbitrary that all necessary work of the convention could be accomplished in that time.

The leaders agreed upon a tentative plan which, however, will be the subject of possible sudden changes if there are unexpected developments on the floor of the convention. According to the program, there will be morning, afternoon and night sessions of the convention with the nomination of presidential and vice presidential candidates as the climax of the final session.

It was strongly indicated that Roosevelt's name would not be presented to the convention at all except without his consent. His instructions to his leaders were that his name must be withheld. It was pointed out, however, that Col. Roosevelt's expressed desire in regard to this phase might not control the delegates from the state where that Roosevelt instructions were given. There was much talk and conjecture in all quarters as to just what Roosevelt would do after the final adjournment of the convention. His plans for the organization of a new party were debated and commented upon by most of the men on both sides of the fight. In this third party, it was said that a convention would be called probably in August, at which time the progressive members of both the republican and democratic parties would be asked to participate.

HARVARD DEFEATS YALE IN BIG ROWING CONTEST

50,000 People Line Banks of
Thames And Witness
Yale's Defeat

New London, Conn., June 22.—Ideal weather brought out 50,000 persons to witness the Yale-Harvard annual regatta on the Thames today. Harvard won both the Freshman race and the Varsity race. The Yale colors were trailed six lengths behind in the big event.

The freshman race was the first on the program and was rowed upstream for two miles from the railroad bridge to the navy yard.

The eight-oared four-mile varsity race, the big event of the day, started at 5 o'clock this afternoon and was rowed down stream. The start was opposite Red Top and the finish at the bridge which marks the end of the four mile course.

Harvard was the favorite in the varsity race among unprejudiced observers of the oarsmen, but it was conceded that Yale had a better chance to win than in two or three years.

VOLUNTEERS HAVE BEEN ORDERED HOME

Regulars Finish What Remains of Revolution in
a Few Days

Santiago de Cuba, June 21.—One hundred and fifty rebels surrendered to the federal troops in various parts of Oriente province today, taking advantage of what was supposed to be the last day of grace allowed by the Montegudo amnesty. The general announced this morning, however, that the amnesty extended over the 23rd of June instead of ending on the midnight of June 21 as had been supposed. Therefore the rebels have until midnight Sunday morning to lay down their arms and receive immunity for their misdeeds against the republic. It is estimated that with the 150 who came in today 500 have already surrendered. The number of arms brought in has not been announced.

While it is believed that the situation is so well in hand that the services are no longer required, it is also certain that General Montegudo was also highly displeased by the action of the volunteers in failing to obey instructions to the letter and in other ways falling below the discipline of the regulars.

Most of the volunteers are from Havana and are from all walks of life. They enlisted for service in Oriente immediately after General Gomez's call for volunteers when the revolt appeared to need the services of more men than the regular forces could provide.

Lieutenant Dieps, was shot in the leg yesterday by Captain Jose Batista. The captain was examining a revolver when it went off accidentally. The wound while painful is not dangerous.

There was considerable excitement here today when it was reported that General Estenoz had surrendered to the American commander at Guantanamo. The report was not confirmed, but it was pointed out on the contrary that it was extremely unlikely that the American commander had any authority to receive the surrender of Estenoz nor was it likely that he would receive such a surrender if it was offered.

Documents of importance were found upon the body of the rebel general Zapata, who was killed in action on June 19. They consisted of general orders giving some of the plans of the rebels. They were signed by General Paradas and directed to General Zapata.

The orders instructed Zapata to take all the kerosene he could from the country stores and to apply it freely to all properties except those owned by Cubans. Cuban owned coffee plantations were ordered respected.

The order instructed General Zapata to join his force with that of General Rosario and destroy the railroad between Palma Soriano and Santiago de Cuba. Women and children were ordered respected but men who were captured after they had resisted, were ordered killed.

When an attack was to be made the rebels were instructed to ride into it without hats so as to be able to distinguish themselves from the government troops.

The opinion is still expressed here in some circles that the government is trying to buy off Estenoz and Yvonnet. The reason for this opinion is said to be the inactivity of the troops during the last few days and General Montegudo's assurance that the revolt would be over within a week.

Despite the fact that there are numerous hands still under arms, Alberto Gonzales who is said to be a special envoy of President Gomez left here for Songo today. It is intimated that he is going into the woods to see the leaders.

Several skirmishes were reported in various places by the government troops. Several negroes were reported killed. The forces of Colonel Valiente are said to be still closely pursuing General Antomarchi, the negro leader accredited with the threat to hang every white man he finds.

That there are still large bands of rebels out was indicated by a report received from Captain Monzon of the guerrillas. He says that his command fought a group of 100 negroes for a half hour this morning, and finally dislodged the enemy. Several horses were taken but there were no known casualties on either side. Steps Taken by Roosevelt Delegates
Last Night to Hold Mass Meeting
for Purpose of Organizing Party

(EXCLUSIVE DISPATCHES TO THE JOURNAL)
CHICAGO, JUNE 23, 2 A. M.—WILLIAM HOWARD TAFT WAS RENOMINATED AS THE REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE FOR THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES AT 9:15 O'CLOCK LAST NIGHT ON THE FIRST BALLOT, BY AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY.

ELIHU ROOT WAS APPOINTED CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMITTEE TO INFORM PRESIDENT TAFT OF HIS RENOMINATION, AND TO NOTIFY VICE PRESIDENT SEERMAN. THE CONVENTION ADJOURNED AT 10:30 P. M. AMID THE WILDEST SCENES OF DISORDER.

Chicago, June 23.—There was talk early last night among the Roosevelt delegates of a mass meeting to form temporary organization of a new party. It is the desire of leaders to take such a step before delegates separate that the work of forming a new party may begin at once. In every part of the country.

Chicago, June 23, 2:30 a. m.—After making preliminary arrangements for organization of a new party, Col. Roosevelt definitely severed his relations with the republican national convention. In a statement setting forth his position in this regard, he said that since the convention had declined to remove the delegates who he contends are fraudulent, he could not recognize its authority. He urged his delegates to refrain from voting in convention, although stating that in case they did vote he could not free them from the obligation to cast their ballots for him. It was decided definitely yesterday afternoon that before adjournment of the convention, or immediately after there would be held a meeting of Roosevelt delegates who wish to enlist in a new party.

Colonel Roosevelt at 12:30 this morning issued this statement: "A clear majority of delegates honestly elected to the convention were chosen by the people to nominate me. Under the direction and with the encouragement of Taft, the majority of the national committee, by so called 'steam roller' methods and with scandalous disregard of every principle of elementary honesty and decency, stole 80 or 90 delegates, putting on the temporary roll sufficient number of fraudulent delegates to defeat the legally expressed will of the people and to substitute a dishonest for an honest majority."

"The convention has declined to purge the roll of fraudulent delegates placed thereon by the defunct national committee, and the majority which thus endorsed the fraud was made a majority only because it included the fraudulent delegates themselves, who all sat as judges on one another's cases."

HARVARD DEFEATS YALE
IN BIG ROWING CONTEST

50,000 People Line Banks of
Thames And Witness
Yale's Defeat

New London, Conn., June 22.—Ideal weather brought out 50,000 persons to witness the Yale-Harvard annual regatta on the Thames today. Harvard won both the Freshman race and the Varsity race. The Yale colors were trailed six lengths behind in the big event.

The freshman race was the first on the program and was rowed upstream for two miles from the railroad bridge to the navy yard.

The eight-oared four-mile varsity race, the big event of the day, started at 5 o'clock this afternoon and was rowed down stream. The start was opposite Red Top and the finish at the bridge which marks the end of the four mile course.

Harvard was the favorite in the varsity race among unprejudiced observers of the oarsmen, but it was conceded that Yale had a better chance to win than in two or three years.

Regulars Finish What Remains of Revolution in
a Few Days

Santiago de Cuba, June 21.—One hundred and fifty rebels surrendered to the federal troops in various parts of Oriente province today, taking advantage of what was supposed to be the last day of grace allowed by the Montecagudo amnesty. The general announced this morning, however, that the amnesty extended over the 23rd of June instead of ending on the midnight of June 21 as had been supposed. Therefore the rebels have until midnight Sunday morning to lay down their arms and receive immunity for their misdeeds against the republic. It is estimated that with the 150 who came in today 500 have already surrendered. The number of arms brought in has not been announced.

While it is believed that the situation is so well in hand that the services are not longer required, it is also certain that General Montecagudo was also highly displeased by the action of the volunteers in failing to obey instructions to the letter and in other ways falling below the discipline of the regulars.

Most of the volunteers are from Havana and are from all walks of life. They enlisted for service in Oriente immediately after General Gomez's call for volunteers when the revolt appeared to need the services of more men than the regular forces could provide.

Lieutenant Diepa was shot in the leg yesterday by Captain Jose Batista. The captain was examining a revolver when it went off accidentally. The wound while painful is not dangerous.

There was considerable excitement here today when it was reported that General Estenoz had surrendered to the American commander at Guanatanamo. The report was not confirmed, but it was pointed out on the contrary that it was extremely unlikely that the American commander had any authority to receive the surrender of Estenoz nor was it likely that he would receive such a surrender if it was offered.

Documents of importance were found upon the body of the rebel general Zapata, who was killed in action on June 19. They consisted of general orders giving some of the plans of the rebels. They were signed by General Paradas and directed to General Zapata.

The orders instructed Zapata to take all the kerosene he could from the country stores and to apply it freely to all properties except those owned by Cubans. Cuban owned coffee plantations were ordered respected.

The order instructed General Zapata to join his force with that of General Rosario and destroy the railroad between Palma Soriano and Santiago de Cuba. Women and children were ordered respected but men who were captured after they had resisted, were ordered killed.

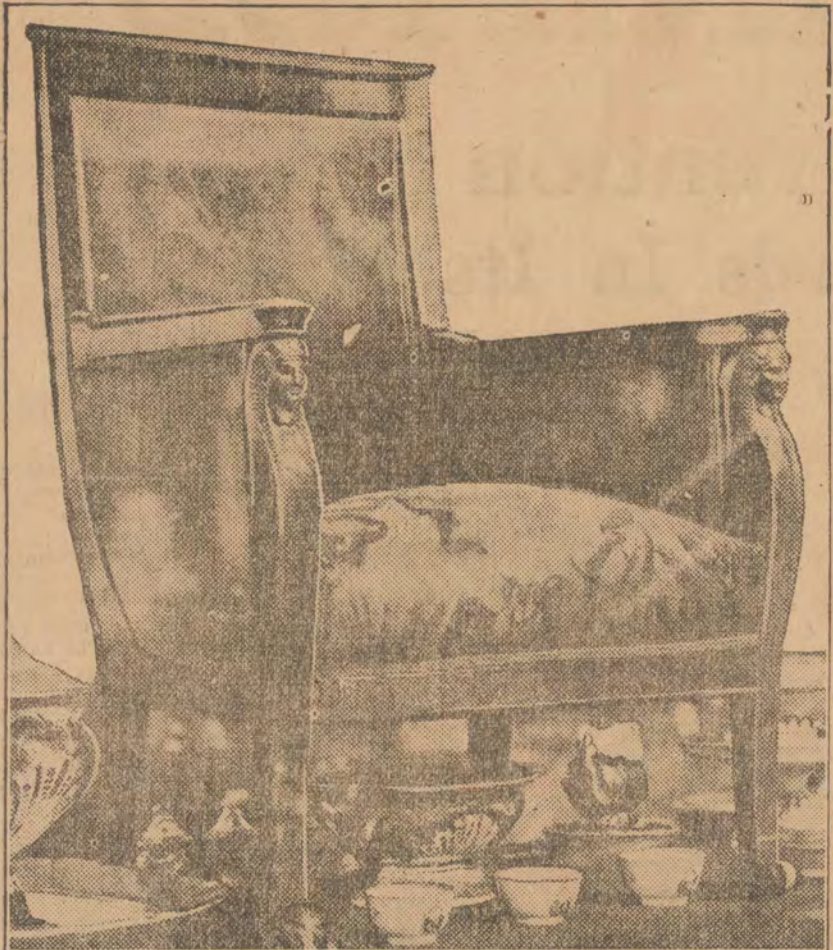
When an attack was to be made the rebels were instructed to ride into it without hats so as to be able to distinguish themselves from the government troops.

The opinion is still expressed here in some circles that the government is trying to buy off Estenoz and Yonnet. The reason for this opinion is said to be the inactivity of the troops during the last few days and General Montecagudo's assurance that the rebels would be over within a week despite the fact that there are numerous bands still under arms. Alberto Gonzales who is said to be a special envoy of President Gomez left here for Songo today. It is intimated that he is going into the woods to see the leaders.

Several skirmishes were reported in various places by the government troops. Several negroes were reported killed. The forces of Colonel Valiente are said to be still closely pursuing General Antomarchi, the negro leader accredited with the threat to hang every white man he finds.

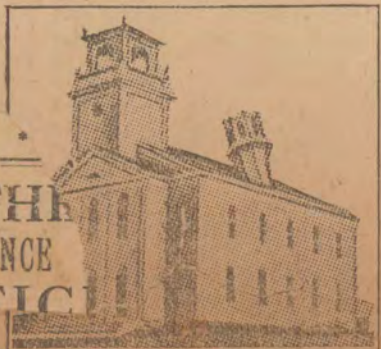
That there are still large bands of rebels out was indicated by a report received from Captain Monzon of the guerrillas. He says that his command fought a group of 100 negroes for a half hour this morning, and finally dislodged the enemy. Several horses were taken but there were no known casualties on either side. The rebels are reported to have left a trail of blood behind them.

Armchair of Lafayette



Marquis Arconati Visconti of Paris has presented to the United States National Museum the armchair of the Marquis de Lafayette. It is in excellent condition and has not been repaired. The frame is of plain unpolished mahogany and it is upholstered in green silk and worsted cloth interwoven with a floral design resembling tulips. After Lafayette died in 1834 the chair became the property of his son, Edmond de Lafayette, who presented it to the Marquis Visconti.

STABBED WITH ITS SPIRE



An unusual freak of the wind is illustrated in the accompanying picture. "Town Hill Church Suicide" was the headline displayed in a newspaper of the vicinity, but it looked more like a case of murder. For during a heavy windstorm the tall spire of the church was blown off and falling, pierced the roof in the manner shown. The church has stood for nearly a hundred years on Town Hill, New Hartford, Conn.

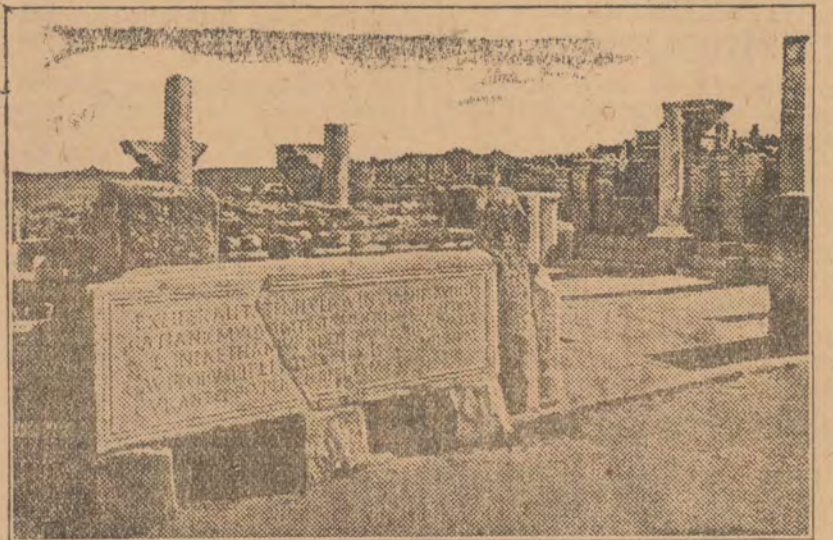
HOUSES MADE OF COTTON

Houses are now made abroad of green Egyptian cotton. The debris of the fields, the sweepings of factories, in fact, everything that was formerly rejected as waste, is mixed into a paste, and in a short time becomes as hard as stone. The soft mixture is placed in plates and fired. It is then coated with a water-proof varnish. A house constructed of this cotton concrete is fireproof, perfectly solid, and costs about one-third the amount of buildings made of brick. Experiments with the new materials are most convincing.

MONEY MAKES SHOE PINCH

After complaining that a shoe which he had borrowed pinched his toe, Carl Blakeley of Muncie, Ind., examined it and found \$120 in bills. Blakeley and a young woman, while riding in an automobile in the country, were thrown from the machine when the steering gear broke, and were hurled into a puddle of water, but not seriously hurt. Explorers in the ruins of the ancient city of Timgad, in Algeria, have unearthed the remains of a public library erected by a Roman Carnegie. The full inscription on the walls is to the following effect: "Out of funds bequeathed by Marcus Julius Quintianus Flavus Rogatianus, of senatorial memory, by his will, to the colony of Thamagudi, his mother city, the erection of a library has been completed at a cost of 400,000 sesterces, under the direction

GHOSTS OF THE CAPITOL

When the body of President Garfield lay in state in the capitol, an old engineer who was employed in the basement, and who ridiculed the idea of ghosts, decided to be revenged upon the watchmen and policemen who remained in the building through the night. He procured two large English walnuts and securely tied the half shells to the four feet of a pet cat and carefully turned her loose in Statuary hall. The noise of those shells on the marble floor at midnight, in the semi-darkness as the distracted cat scampered about trying to get rid of her new shoes, gave the watchers the fright of their lives. This incident, though a harmless joke, gave rise to the story of the spectral footsteps which follow all those who have to cross the rotunda in Statuary hall after the building is closed for the night.

The rotunda has its own especial haunt. The prevailing belief in regard to this particular haunt is that on certain days, presumably anniversaries, the bent and huddled up figure of a workman with his tools may be seen flitting through the section. The foundation for this idea doubtless arose from the account of the death of a workman which occurred there during the early days of the construction of the capitol. He lost his footing upon a scaffold and was killed by the fall to the floor.

The wraith of John Quincy Adams, from all narratives on the subject, seems to be the one most often encountered. At times it is alleged that he may be seen in Statuary hall, formerly the old house of representatives and the scene of his death, accompanied by the whole congress of 1840, gathered in ghostly convocation. He is also credited with roaming about all parts of the capitol and may be seen at almost any time.

There is also the story of Gen. Logan, who returns, it is said, to observe the doings of the committee on military affairs of which he was so long the chairman. Those who claim to have encountered the general, say that he always wears a black slouch hat and remains either in the committee room or in the corridor adjoining. Vice-President Wilson, who died in his room in the senate wing, is also recorded as a constant wanderer about the scene of his death.

The demon cat legend has been repeated for the last 50 years as the animal apparition which returns at irregular periods. The story does not vary much, being merely that of an ordinary Tabby at first sight, but which grows to a gigantic horror before the eyes of the frightened observer. Suddenly this demon cat emits a fierce yowl and with eyes ablaze and mouth open leaps toward the spectator, but invariably leaps quite over his head.

FORTUNE FOR A PET DOG

A lawsuit in which the parties are angry heirs deprived of their inheritance, and a handsome griffon dog which has deprived them of it, is to be heard in the Paris courts. Mme. Stella Bela Czebo, a well-known Hungarian resident in Paris, died recently, leaving her house, horses, carriage, and an income of \$2,000 a year for the maintenance of one small griffon. She was very fond of dogs; and the little griffon was her favorite. But she leaves relatives behind her, and they are taking action for the disinheritance of the four-legged pet.

"SOLITARY ROCK" OF WASE



This solid pillar of basalt, the "Gobron Duts" or "Solitary Rock" stands near the Fulani city of Wase, in British East Africa. It is more than a thousand feet high and is reputed unclimbable. The natives say there is a river on the top of it and that there are people there, but that if anyone ever did manage to go up to them he never would return, or would return demented. So far as can be seen, the only inhabitants of the rock are pelicans, marabout storks and huge baboons.

TWELVE ONE-EYED MEN DINE

Twelve men with 12 good eyes and 12 glass eyes attended a dinner served by one of their number at a hotel in Muncie, Ind., the other day. The host was particular that every man present should wear a glass eye. When dinner was over 12 glass eyes were removed, wrapped in a neat package and sent to the proprietor of the hotel with the request that he inspect and return them. He opened the package in the presence of the telephone girl, and she fainted.

HOBBLE IS HARD ON SHOES

It is estimated that the hobble skirt has doubled the number of women's shoes sold in the world. They have to take two steps now where they took one before, and that means the shoes wear out twice as fast.

WORLD'S GREATEST CANDLE

A giant candle, made in Harlem, N. Y., and destined for St. Peter's, at Rome, was blessed before the altar of St. Biagio by the Pope and will burn without drip for six long years. Standing over 11 feet high, weighing over 200 pounds, and costing nearly \$1,000, the candle is made of sweet-smelling beeswax, dipped with 200 dippings about a marvelous wick. From within a foot of the top to a foot of the bottom it is embossed in gold. The centerpiece, of cunningly wrought gold and delicately carved wax, shows hills of the valley and a lovely sacred picture. The manufacturer will not tell the name of the person who ordered the candle, saying:

"When one has prayed long and ceaselessly to the saints for health he does not parade his generous attitude. He lays what he has upon the altar and goes silently on his way."

St. Biagio is the patron saint of those who suffer from disease of the throat. It is the tradition that he miraculously cured a little girl of throat disease while on his way to martyrdom in the early days of the church.

GIANTS OF THE FOREST

Australia lays claim to growing the tallest trees in the world, whilst California trees are noted for their girth and diameter. The tallest Californian forest giant discovered was found by actual measurement to be 340 feet high. But Australia's record gum tree beats this by 140 feet. Baron Mueller, who was formerly government botanist in Victoria, said that the Australian gum trees attained a height of 500 feet, but the tallest that the baron ever measured was a prostrate one on the Black Spur, ten miles from Healesville, which was 480 feet high. This tree was 81 feet in girth near its root. In 1889 a civil engineer, journeying from Gippsland to Mount Bore, measured a tree 471 feet in height, though the same tree had previously been estimated at not less than 500 feet.

EARNS LIVING EVERYWHERE



Cecil M. Hargreaves, here depicted, is spending a part of his life in demonstrating that it is possible for a man to earn his living in any part of the globe. He started from London eight years ago and so far has been through thirty-two countries, covering nearly 180,000 miles. He still has to do China and Japan.

KANSAS LEADS IN STUDENTS

Kansas boasts of having more college students per capita than any other state. Her next door neighbor, Missouri, has the fewest—only one in 381 inhabitants, and next to the foot comes Pennsylvania with one for every 308. The states at the head are all western, the first seven and the number of people for each college student being: Kansas, 112; Utah, 121; Nebraska, 135; Oregon, 150; Indiana, 162; Iowa, 184; Illinois, 199. The eighth is Massachusetts, with one student for every 209 people.

FISH FROM THE NORTH SEA

The North sea is Great Britain's most profitable fishing ground. Last year the value of the fish landed on the northeast coast was £2,740,614, over a third of the total value of the fish landed in the whole of England and Wales, and £400,000 worth more than was landed in the whole of Scotland and Ireland combined during the same year. The increase over 1910 was £178,584, and compared with 1891 the total value of fish landed in 1911 showed an increase of nearly £2,000,000.

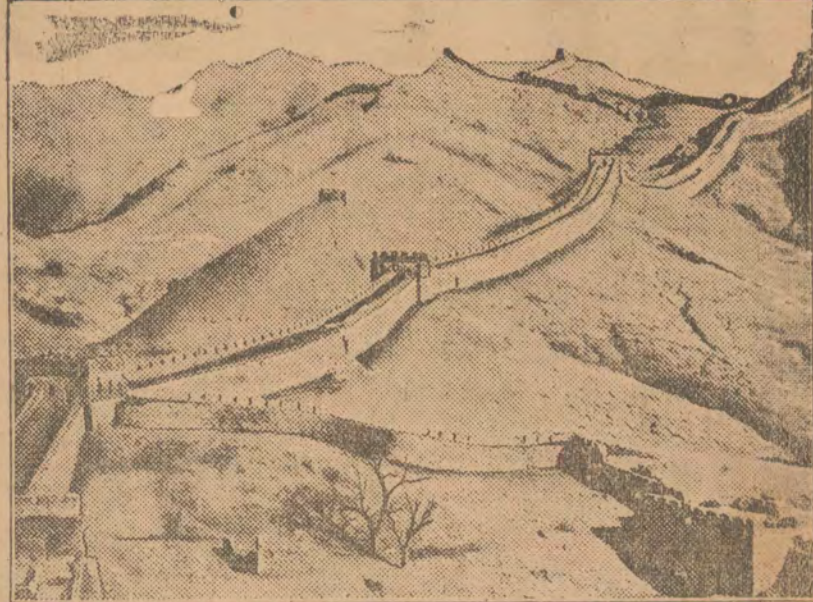
LONG AND SHORT NAMES

Elkhart, Ind., has within its borders two men who probably bear the distinction of having the longest and shortest names, respectively, in the United States. The first is the proprietor of a Greek candy kitchen. When time permits, his surname appears thus: Pappatheodorokokountamoutaourgetopolos. In a hurry he signs his name Speros Michaels. The man with the short name is Ed Ek.

CHINESE WOMEN DOCTORS

Forty young Chinese women are qualifying for the medical profession in American universities through the influence of Dr. Yamel Kin, the first woman doctor in China. Dr. Kin, as the head of the hospital for women in Tientsin, has also for the last ten years been training Chinese women for the nursing profession.

Great Wall of China



Recent investigations have revealed many new facts concerning the great Chinese wall, its construction and its purposes. This most gigantic defensive work in the world was once 1,250 miles long, extending between Mongolia and China proper from Suchau eastward to the gulf of Pecheli, with an extension northeastward to the Sungari river. It is 35 feet high, 21 feet thick, and is faced with granite blocks, with towers at frequent intervals. The wall dates from the latter part of the fourteenth century. After the accession of the Manchu dynasty in 1644 it was allowed to fall into decay except at a few points where it was maintained for customs purposes.

IS HOLY GRAIL IN GENOA?

A large green cup, hexagonal in shape, which according to popular belief was used by Christ and his apostles at the Last Supper, is treasured in the Church of St. Lawrence, at Genoa, Italy. Its history goes much further back than that event, as it is claimed that it was a present from the Queen of Sheba to King Solomon. It has been in Genoa since 1101, where it was brought by a knight from the Holy Land after the First Crusade. For centuries it was not touched, although many of the faithful wished to adorn it with precious stones. This was due not only to piety but to a fear on the part of citizens that should it be broken, pilgrims would cease to visit Genoa. It was thought at one time that it was cut from an enormous emerald. Napoleon took it with him to Paris, persuaded of its high intrinsic worth. Scientists confirmed the suspicion that it was made of glass, and Genoa got it back at pretty much their own figure.

SOME USES OF THE PIGTAIL

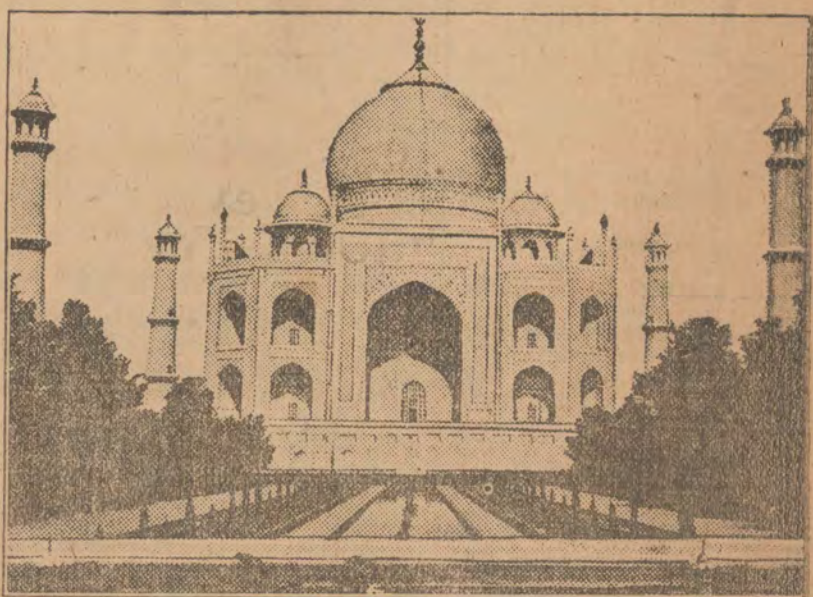
Although modern China has sacrificed the pigtail on the altar of liberty, many celestials still look upon the pigtail as an object of veneration. They find in it five advantages. It saves the ears; for, if two Chinese quarrel, they seize each other's pigtails, instead of their ears. It is a first aid to rescue; for if he falls into a river boatmen can fish him out by the pigtail with their boat hooks. It helps the police, who can tie two miscreants together by their pigtails, and thus save the necessity of handcuffs. It is a protection of respectable citizens; for, in a row, the police first arrest those who have been disgraced by losing their pigtails. Finally, it ensures peace in the house; for with it a husband may not be upbraided by his wife, while without it, she is at liberty to call him any name she pleases.

TO STOP SUFFRAGE BRICKS



As a result of the riotous demonstrations of the London militant suffragettes, most of the buildings in the vicinity of the houses of parliament have been fitted with strong wire netting over the windows to serve as protection against the bricks and cobble stones which are the favorite weapons of the rampaging women.

Most Beautiful Building



Admittedly the most beautiful building in the world, the Taj Mahal, one mile east of Agra, India, is visited yearly by many thousands of tourists. It is a white marble mausoleum built by Shah Jahan as a burial place for his favorite wife, who died in 1629. It is said to have occupied twenty-two years in building and its cost is variously stated at from \$9,000,000 to \$60,000,000. The building is octagonal, surmounted by a dome and flanked by four graceful minarets. In the central chamber, above a vault containing the bodies of the emperor and his wife, are two cenotaphs surrounded by a fine marble screen.

A PLAIN STATEMENT OF LAW.

Section nine, of the bill of rights, in the constitution of the state of Florida, provides that a person, accused of crime, shall be entitled to bail in all cases, EXCEPT CAPITAL CASES, WHERE THE PROOF OF GUILT IS EVIDENT, OR WHERE THE PRESUMPTION IS GREAT. A man, accused of such a crime, has a right to apply to the court, by petition for writ of habeas corpus, to have the court pass upon his case and decide whether or not he is entitled to bail.

There is no mistaking the language used here; the laws of the state, on the matter of granting bail to a man accused of murder, WHERE THE PROOF OF GUILT IS EVIDENT, OR WHERE THE PRESUMPTION IS GREAT, are so plain that even a child could interpret them. There is no bail for him. In case he applies to the court by petition for writ of habeas corpus, the court shall judge whether his guilt is EVIDENT, and if it is, there is still no bail for him.

THE GOOD THAT WE MAY DO.

Great men of different ages have said things that have made others great; others have let fall from their lips things that tended to elevate and make better the common race of men. That old sage who exhorted us to

"Count that day lost, whose low descending sun,
Views from thy hand no worthy action done."

Did a great thing for the human race when he let fall from his lips that couplet, for he was passing on to the men and women who were to come after him, a motto that will do good as long as men love the golden rule. We have not the remotest idea of the good we may do, if we but try; we have no conception of the many opportunities that present themselves for us to do good, unless we take notice of them. They are always with us, and we will grow by grasping them as they present themselves to us. It may be a kind word spoken when it is most needed, it may be a kindness that we may be able to do—there are hundreds of ways in which we may do good, if we will only pay attention to the little things as they come up.

THE LOAVES AND FISHES.

There was once an occasion when many thousands of people were gathered together, and upon that occasion there could be found only a very few loaves and fishes, with which to feed the great assemblage. The story tells us that the Christ took the loaves and fishes, blessed them, and fed the multitude. In like manner, we may, if we will cultivate the small spark of kindness with which our heart was endowed at birth, feed thousands of people from the fount of kindness welling up in every human heart. It costs nothing to be kind and courteous to every one, it matters not whether he be high or low born; and yet though it costs the giver nothing, the returns are great.

A MAN.

There was once a man who went about with a lantern, hunting for a MAN. He knows hundreds, of course, but he was looking for what he was pleased to term a MAN in every sense of the word. He died without finding him. The trouble with him was that he did not look in the right place, for there were of the word. The man with the lantern was too near sighted to recognize a MAN when he saw him. Often we overlook the obscure places in which MEN live, and look in the high places where we think they ought to be. 'Tis then we are disappointed, for too often we find only graft and corruption where righteousness ought to abound.

Keeping Canned Tomatoes.
When canning tomatoes add some hot lard (enough to cover well) to each can before sealing and they will not prove sour or bitter. The coating of lard prevents stray microbes that may enter through a poor rubber from causing damage to the tomatoes. Be sure and scald the jars and keep the lids on the stove in boiling water. The earliest tomatoes should be canned as they are less apt to be acid than when the vines are getting exhausted from bearing or are slightly frosted.

CARE OF THE FURNITURE

Prudent Housekeeper Will Shun Polish Recommended to "Cover All Defects."

The prudent housekeeper will be as wary of doctoring her furniture with polish that is recommended to "cover all defects" as she would be of a patent medicine which is guaranteed to cure every disease. The highly-polished surfaces of furniture have often been ruined by a too free use of a so-called polish which, not having been rubbed dry, has hardened and collects all of the dust before drying, has caused a dull film to appear over the polished surfaces. A simple and effective polish for clearing furniture and removing scratches is made of one-third linseed oil and two-thirds benzine. It should be applied with a paint brush which has very soft bristles and rubbed dry with an old soft piece of muslin or soft flannel. For polishing, fold it into a pad, sprinkle a few drops of alcohol over the surface of the pad and rub the furniture firmly and quickly. Rub only a small part at a time and be sure to rub until the surface is quite dry.

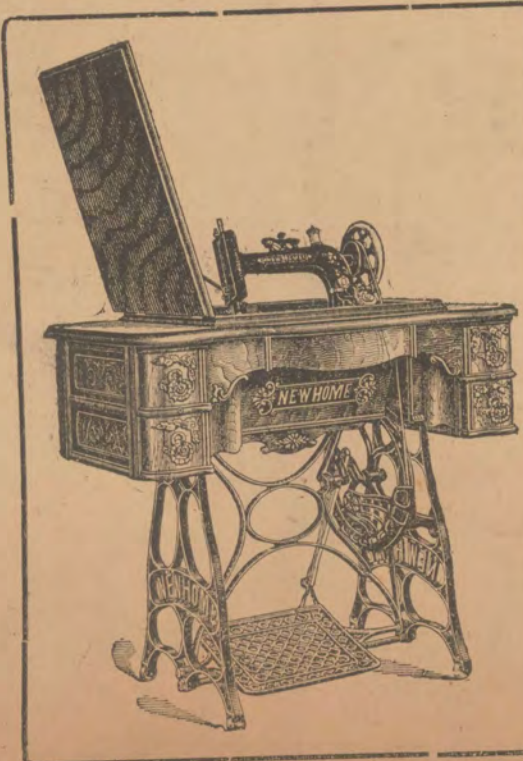

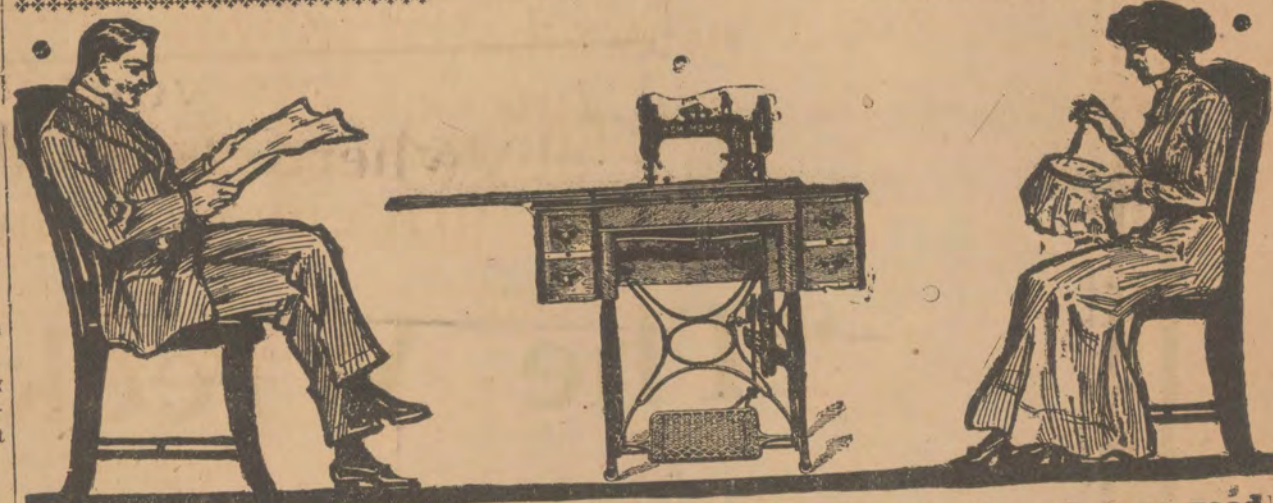

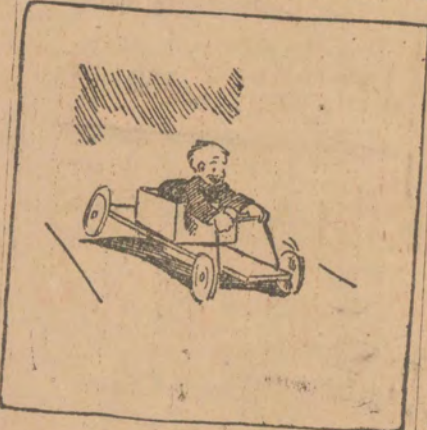
TRYING TO AVOID THE HURLY

The little carts come darting out of the side streets irrespective of the possible approach of a tram or motor car, and the result is to give the most careful driver a touch of nerves.

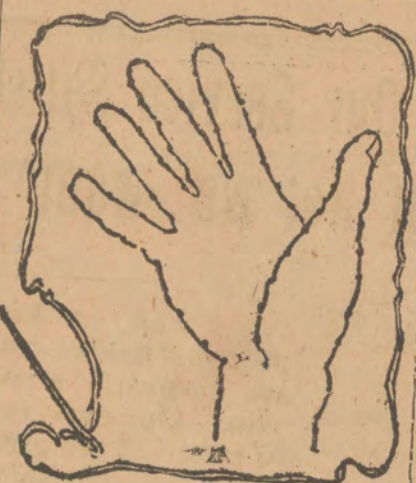

Another new fixture, which will be found useful in a small bathroom where it is impossible to have a stationary washstand, is a basin and soap holder of rather heavy wire, white enameled. This holder is made to span the bathtub from one side to the other by means of a heavy wire extending out on each side. Both ends of this wire are nickel-plated and made very strong where they clasp the sides of the tub. The whole arrangement has an extension feature which enables it to fit any width bathtub.

A white enameled manure table, with glass top over oak, will be found convenient for either dressing room or bathroom. This table is finished with nickel rims. At one end is a quarter-circle drawer in which may be kept the various manure instruments.

McGraw's Salary.

TOP SPINNING BY JAPANESE

Toys Are of Great Variety, Both in Size and Construction and Are Cleverly Handled.

Those deft and clever people, the Japanese, do almost everything they attempt well, and some things they do better than any other people in the world. Of the latter sort top spinning is one. The tops are of great variety, both in size and construction. The largest is more than a foot in diameter and proportionately heavy. Some are solid; others contain a flock of little ones that fly out when the top is lifted, and spin away by themselves. Others pull in a spiral or ladder of successive tops. One draws up into a lantern, and spins cheerily in that form.

The methods of spinning are almost beyond description. Even a very large top is sometimes thrown as the Australian casts the boomerang, so that while it appears to be going straight toward the head of the spectator it returns to the thrower and is caught on his palm. When it arrives thus the performer takes it by the spindle, apparently stops it, sets it down and it recommences. Turn it upside down and it proceeds just as merrily on its iron-spiked head. The spinners balance it on any kind of surface, round or flat, on the edge of a fan, the sharpest Japanese sword, along a thin cord, and after some moments of unconcerned spinning there it is tossed on the table, with apparent carelessness, when it goes on working, unexhausted and inexhaustible.

One of the most delicate performances consists in spinning a top in the left hand, up the left arm, round the edge of the lobe at the back of the neck and down the other arm into the palm of the right hand. Another is to toss it spinning into the air and catch it on the hem of the sleeve, whence it runs down into the hand. A third is to fling it up and catch it on the bowl of a pipe, pass it behind the back, toss it to the front and there catch it again.

A large, heavy top is sometimes set in motion by rolling the peg in the bight of a cord, one end being held in each hand, then flung ten or twenty feet in air and caught with the same cord, spinning always. This can be done ten times in succession. But the most wonderful display consists in sending a top spinning up a rope to the head of a mast, and then recalling it.

HAND CANNOT BE HELD STILL

Amusing Little Experiment Will Entertain Company When Other Things Begin to Lag.

Next time you are called upon to amuse the company try this little experiment. Borrow a quarter from some one, if they will trust you with

It—or use one of your own if necessary. Then take a piece of thread about 18 inches long and fasten one end of it to the coin with a little sealing wax or a piece of somebody's gum. Then get a friend to rest her arm on a foot rule or other stick about that long with the other end on the table. Have her hold the thread as shown, so that the coin will just reach into a glass on the table—and then see if she can keep the coin from hitting the glass. She will be unable to do it, for the coin will soon begin to sway back and forth like a pendulum and tinkle on the glass.

HOW TO LIFT SMALL PLATE

Clever Little Trick May Be Performed by the Use of a Heavy Piece of Blotting Paper.

Fill a glass full to overflowing of water. Place over it a piece of heavy blotting paper, and then a small plate or a saucer about the size of the paper. Carefully invert the whole, holding plate and glass firmly together, so no air is admitted. In a few moments,

when the blotting paper has become damp, you can lift the glass and the plate will hang tightly to it.

Try This One.

Take one of the largest corks you can find, the kind used in the long-necked green bottles, and in one end dig out a hole. Into this put a leaden bullet, or several large shot, and stop up the hole with putty. Round off the edges of the cork at this end and your dancer is ready to dance.

Around the top of the other end of the cork paste on a little blue hood of tissue paper; make a dress of the same and tie on a sash of ribbon.

On the cork make with ink the prettiest face you can, and then set the young lady a-dancing.

Health & Beauty Hints

By Katherine Morton

"Please write something about treatments for disfigured finger nails. Mine are very tender and ugly from a long course of housework, but now I've got some help I want to improve my hands."

"A COUNTRY READER."

The working housekeeper's hands have many injurious influences to encounter, but the very worst of them is the constant immersion in water which dishwashing and other cleaning up involve. Rapid changes from hot to cold water, and the reverse, are very hard on the hands, the changes of temperature making the nails brittle and scoring them with the ridges so often seen on much-used hands. The texture of the skin is also coarsened, while the soaps used in all forms of housework, being full of alkali, may so attack the delicate flesh about the nails as to loosen them. So a proper care of the nails certainly means a proper care of all the hands, and it is easy enough to protect them when doing some forms of coarse work. There are heavy white cotton gloves for sweeping and dusting which cost only ten cents a pair. Before putting these on, the palms and nails should be greased with olive oil or vaseline, either unguent rubbed well into the skin and all about the nail scarf. The gloves should also be regularly washed, for when they are grimed with dirt they are certainly useless for beautifying purposes.

With these gloves and a mop, dishes and cooking utensils may be washed without injury to the hands, or, if preferred, rubber gloves could be used for the dishwashing.

The first care of hands injured with housework begins with the cleansing bath, with soft water barely more than tepid, and the soap of a very good sort. If the water used is hard soften it with a teaspoonful of borax, and before using the soap shave it up and boil it down to a jelly. Get a cake of good old castle for the purpose, and after the soap is dissolved pour in about half a cup of benzoin, stirring it well into the jelly. Begin the bath by wetting the hands, and then rub the jelly on them, working the hands together in the usual way as when using soap. Wash off in one water and then rinse in another of the same temperature, drying the hands at once on a clean, soft towel.

Such a hand bath should be taken every night before going to bed, and when the hands are dry some unguent must be rubbed at once over and about the nails—either olive oil or vaseline, as hitherto stated.

As numerous baths, even with the best soap and softest water, are not always good for sensitive nails and delicate skin, it is wise to clean the hands several times during the day with olive oil or palm oil; if the hands are well rubbed with either of these, and then dusted with talcum powder, and wiped off with a coarse and yet soft towel, the soil will be entirely removed. Coarsened nails are much improved, too, by the wearing of loose old white kid gloves, both during the day and at night, while the regular gloves worn should also be fairly loose and of a soft leather such as chamois or doeskin.

Finger bowls are necessary when fruit is served or corn on the cob, and many hostesses have them brought in with the dessert service or after it. Each bowl rests on a glass plate to match or on a china plate on top of a fine finger bowl dolly. The salt spoon is used by the individual to put the salt on his plate. I cannot take the limited space to write out recipes unless for some very unusual dish that will be a novelty. What you wish will be found in any up-to-date cook book. Your cards should be engraved with your husband's full name. Door plates are seldom used now.

Will you kindly answer through the paper whether it is proper to bring a box of candy or chocolates when taking a lady to the theater? Also which side should a gentleman be on (right or left of lady) in escorting her across the ballroom floor, and on which side should he seat himself?—N. B. D.

But along with these severe lines are gay touches of color and strictly feminine adornments in the way of rosettes of ribbon, standing "rings" of fabric (as silk or ribbon), also the smart brush of silk which has such a vogue in millinery along with other Durbar ideas.

Flowered ribbon laid in plaits across the front of a black Milan shape and surmounted by a "paint brush" trim in black is one of the nobbiest hats so far produced.

Some shapes on this order have the

crown and upper brim overlaid with velvet in bright colors—such as red, royal blue, cerise and green. Not many all black hats are shown, but combinations of black with strong colors have such a vogue as never before, while black and white maintain their popularity always, in their new and proper environment.

The stiff standing "brushes" used for trimming are made of silk fibers of gaura and other feathers, and similar forms made of flowers and foliage are known as "stick-up" ornaments, for want of a better name. Some simple shapes are displayed without ornament other than a band and flat bow across the front made of a three-inch heavy ribbon.

SATIN AND TAFFETA MANTLES

Decided Vogue Is Apparent for These Tailor-Made and Attractive Garments.

To replace the tailor-made for afternoon and visiting wear, there will be a great vogue in long, soft satin and taffeta mantles. These are quite straight and for the most part unlined and, when not expressed in black, are carried out in strict harmony with the gowns.

Large square revers, allied to equally large square shaped collars, figure on an appreciable number of models. And by way of breaking the monotony of an all-black scheme the revers are oftentimes faced with some color, such as bishop's purple, peony or a Pekin silk is pretty. But always are these contrasts veiled in black chiffon. That seems for the moment to be a hard and fast decree.

Fringe also plays its part, and the mantles in their entirety are being regarded by a large fraternity of women as a veritable boon for filling the anxious hour pending the definite acceptance of the proposed fresh modes and styles.

The Waist Line.

An indication of present fashions is that the waist line will in many cases, be indicated by a narrow belt of the old-fashioned sort which one has ceased to associate in one's mind with smart dressing. In very many of the newest gowns the waist is emphasized and in its normal place.

As a rule, the belt corresponds with the other trimmings of the gown, but this is not insisted upon, and sometimes it has no connection with it at all, but belongs wholly to the must abused region of the fancy belt. Thus a striped gown has its narrow belt of folded brocade tissue, and an afternoon frock which was carried out in pompadour silk emphasized its possession of a waist by encircling it with a band of stiff, straight ribbon.

Broom Holder.

A drain pipe may be put to a rather novel purpose in the shape of a holder for brooms, garden tools, etc. Decorated drain pipes make excellent umbrellas and fern stands for the hall, but when used for the purpose shown need only be decorated in a very simple way, and a good plan of doing this is to entirely cover the exterior of the pipe with some remnant of any pretty wall paper, which may be very easily fastened round the sides with paste. It will then look by no means unsightly, and may be placed in the corner of the kitchen or in some other suitable spot.

Tennis Costume.

The white serge skirt in combination with one of the many types of loose-skirted blouses is much used for tennis. With it is worn a striped coat of blue and white, orange and white, red and white, or green and white. Combinations of the various college colors are also seen.

Dainty Glove Protector.

Among the frilly things that girls are making this season are tubes of white satin to slip inside the muff to protect white gloves from soiling.

Take a strip of satin or heavy mesaline, 15 inches long and 12 inches deep, fold it over and sew in a seam to make a six-inch tube. Sew in a French seam to avoid raveling. Finish the ends with a narrow hem and frills of chiffon or chiffon and creamy lace.

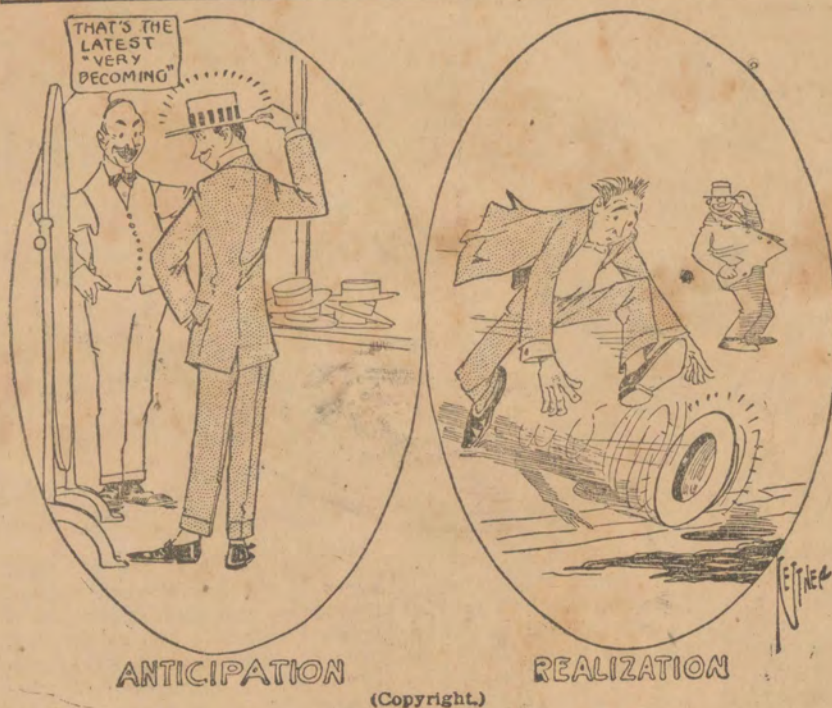
It is the work of a minute to slip this case inside the muff. The frilly ends improve the looks of the muff, while gloves last much longer so protected.

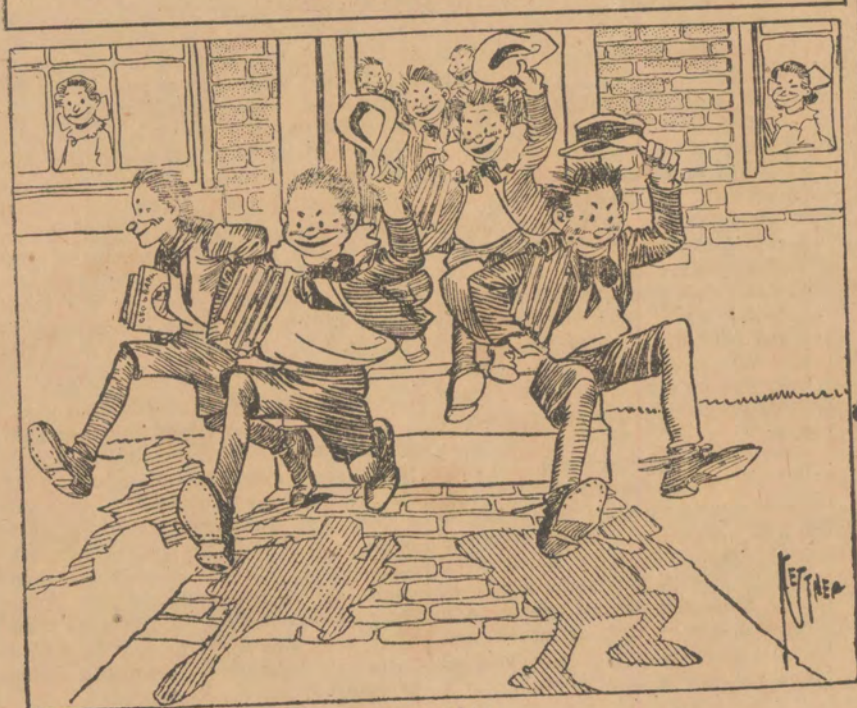
