## GULF REFINING CO. WORK PROGRESSING

### Extensive Work Is Going On On Land Leased From Consumers Ice Co.

One of the busiest spots in this city, but one which because of its location escapes general notice, is just opposite the Consumers Ice Co., where the Gulf Refining Co. have extensive improvements in course of erection. It will be remembered that some time ago this company applied to the City Council for permission to establish a supply station here, which permission was granted. They have now in course of construction some very large reinforced concrete tanks which will be used as storage tanks for oil and gasoline. These tanks are so constructed as to eliminate danger of bursting, or fire and every precaution has been taken to make this station as safe as would be any other supply station. This company is also building a concrete wharf which when completed will be 550 feet long and a model of its kind.

The action of the Gulf Refining Co. in securing a site here at this time is simply an indication of the course to be followed by other companies, who, appreciating what the completion of a railroad to Key West means, are anxious to get in on the ground floor.

## BOARD OF SURVEY ORDERS REPAIRS TO SCH. GLADYS

### Reported A Number Of Repairs Necessary To Safe Navigation

The Board of Survey ordered by U. S. Commissioner Julius Otto upon complaint of the majority of the seamen of the schooner Gladys was held yesterday. The Board was composed of Otto, and Messrs. Amick, S. S. Mas, Peter T. Knight. They reported a number of repairs to be made to the engine pumps and boiler, the life boat, and that she be provided with three additional men to take the place of those now in the Marine Hospital. Or in lieu of the repairs that she be towed to Havana, her port of destination, her cargo discharged and another survey held.

The Gladys was formerly the schooner Rhode Island. She was built in East Deerling, Me., in 1894, length 163.5 feet, breadth 35 feet, depth 17.3 feet, gross tonnage 726.

## THE INVASION OF PERSIA BY RUSSIA EXPECTED ANY MOMENT

Teheran, Nov. 22.—The immediate invasion of Persia is expected as a result of Russia's peremptory breaking off of diplomatic relations.

Russia has strong forces massed at several points on the frontier and orders for a simultaneous movement of troops into Persia are reported to have been dispatched from St. Petersburg. Persia has appealed to the British government for aid according to semi-official information.

## PRESIDENT OF SANTO DOMINGO

### SHOT AND KILLED AS HE LEFT HOUSE

Washington, Nov. 22.—President Caceres, of Santo Domingo, was shot as he left the house of Leoncio Yescuez, in Santo Domingo, country, and died a half hour later in the American legation, where he was taken.

The assassins are Luis Tejera and Jaime Mote, Jr., according to advices received at the State Department. The assassins fled to San Cristobal. The city is reported to be quiet.

## Holiday Season Brings Quantities of Freight

The near approach of the holiday season is plainly indicated by the congestion of freight in the warehouses of the transportation companies here. The mallory wharf last night was piled high with a general assortment among which was a lot of Christmas goods. The P. & O. Wharf is also filled up. In addition to this freight, the quantity of cigars going North is larger than usual.

## HUSTLING MIAMI IS TO HAVE A NEW BANK SOON

### J. N. Lummus, President Of Bank Of Bay Biscayne Heads Company

(From The Miami Metropolis)

Letters patent have been applied for by the Southern Bank and Trust Company, a new banking institution which will soon begin business in Miami.

It is stated that the capital stock of the company will be \$100,000 and the following well known gentlemen are the incorporators: J. F. Lummus, J. S. Morse, J. E. Lummus, C. L. Huddleston and T. W. Sands.

Mr. J. N. Lummus, who is the president of the Bay Biscayne Bank, will head the new company while F. S. Morse will be the vice president and C. L. Huddleston, secretary and treasurer.

Offices will be opened in the building which is at present occupied by the Dade County Title and Insurance Company about the middle of December or January 1st.

## COMPERS WILL AGAIN BE PRESIDENT OF A. F. OF L.

### Socialists Have Made A Strong Fight On Him In Convention

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 22.—The convention of the American Federation of Labor got down to business, as the committees are ready to report this week and action upon many important matters is expected.

The expression of a majority of the delegates give assurance that there will be no change in the officers of the federation despite the fight made upon Compers by the Socialists. The committee on laws reported favorably upon a recommendation to increase the per capita tax on members from one-half to two-thirds of a cent.

## CUBAN CONSUL IN TAMPA MAY ENTER RACE FOR CUBAN CONGRESS

Tampa, Nov. 22.—Cuban Consul R. M. Ybor is considering resigning from that office and entering the race for congress from the Havana district. Mr. Ybor has made an able consular officer and his friends here hope he will see fit to remain in that service rather than return to Cuba and break into politics.

## "I MUST GET AWAY FROM THOSE EYES"

### Body of Murdered Man Drifts Down River— Haunts Slayer

Escanaba, Mich., Nov. 22.—The body of Alvin Fogarty was washed along before a strong wind over Lake Michigan, drifted five miles and was cast up by the waves before the door of the man now held as his slayer. Frightened by the unexpected appearance of the corpse, Alvin Lindquist went to the sheriff and asked to be arrested on a charge of murder. He told of killing Fogarty on October 13 and said:

"Fogarty, thought dead, followed me five miles along the lake and I found him staring at my hut with accusing eyes when I went to fish today. It was too much for me. I want to confess and get away from those eyes."

Two men who were held on suspicion were released.

## FEW LOTS OF SPONGE WERE SOLD YESTERDAY

### When the Present "Norther" Is Over Offerings Will Be Larger

A few lots of sponge were offered in the sponge market yesterday and brought fairly good prices.

Geo. L. Bartlum bought wool to the amount of \$336 and yellow to the amount of \$1.48.

John Roberts bought wool to the amount of \$129.10 and yellow to the amount of \$13.54.

E. J. Arapian bought wool to the amount of \$7.23.

Total sales yesterday were \$484.35. Sponge fishermen are anticipating some large catches as soon as the present "Norther" is over. They say that be better able to locate sponge.

## SECRETARY MEYER WILL ADVOCATE HIGHER PAY FOR NAVY CLERKS

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—Secretary of the navy Meyer, in his annual report, will advocate increased pay for the government clerk, and age retirement.

Dealing with the employees in his own department he will show that while salaries in all private employment have advanced, the government salaries actually decreased, with a result that the Navy Department is losing many competent employees. While the navy establishment has increased 114 per cent in twelve years, the clerical force has increased only 33 per cent. The Navy Department ranks lowest in compensation among the governments departments.

## BANKER'S ASSOCIATION WILL ENDORSE MONETARY SYSTEM REFORM

New Orleans, La., Nov. 22.—The proposed plan for reform of the monetary system of the United States which is to be presented at the next session of Congress by the national monetary commission, will meet with a unanimous approval by the American Bankers' Association, in thirty-seventh annual convention here.

## OLD BARK IDA SOLD BY CURRY'S SONS CO.

### Will Be Towed To Tampico, Mex. And Used As An Oil Barge

The old bark Ida, owned by the Wm. Curry's Sons Co., which has been lying in the harbor for the past year or more has been sold to the Teche Transportation and Fuel Oil Co., of Texas, to be used by them as an oil barge. As soon as the weather moderates some, the tug Leroy will tow the Ida to New Orleans where she will be bailed out on a drydock and given a thorough overhauling, after which she will be towed to Tampico, Mexico, and placed in service as an oil barge for the company by whom she was purchased. The price paid by the Texas company is \$2,500.

The Ida was a Norwegian bark which was brought here after the hurricane of 1909. She was afterward put up at public sale and was purchased by the Wm. Curry's Sons Co.

## BANKER CUMMINS FOUND GUILTY OF STEALING \$140,000 FROM BNYK

New York, Nov. 22.—William Cummins, former Tennessee promoter, and a recent director of the great Carnegie Trust Co., was found guilty of thefts amounting to \$140,000 from the Ninth Ward Bank, by the jury before which he was tried, and was remanded to the tomb until Friday, when his counsel may present any motions desired before sentence is pronounced. Cummins seems stunned by the result.

## 15 GEORGIA CITIZENS ARE IN BAD WITH YOUR UNCLE SAMUEL

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 22.—Fifteen residents of Vidalia, Ga., will be brought here in a few days as a result of indictments, which became known and which were returned by the federal grand jury, charging them with obstructing and retarding the United States mails.

The indictments grew out of the strike of trainmen on the Georgia & Florida Ry., when trains carrying the mail were held up at Vidalia.

## Serafina C. Blown Off Course—Lost Some Sails

The schooner Serafina C. bound from Key West to Apalachicola for a load of lumber for the Wm. Curry's Sons Co. struck heavy weather this week and was blown off her course, losing both jibs and ruining both her mainsail and foresail. The crippled schooner was towed into Tampa by a tug where she will undergo the necessary repairs.

## PRINCETON IS CHAMPION VANDERBILT IN SOUTH

### Some Of Hardest Fought Games of Season To Be Played Saturday

New York, Nov. 22.—Princeton has won the championship of the so-called "Big Four" in the East.

The army and navy elevens, both unbeaten, remain to clash for supremacy at Philadelphia Saturday.

Harvard and Yale, through still among the topnotchers, must settle their ancient rivalry this weekend, each with the sting of two defeats.

Pennsylvania, four times beaten, have lost much support as a favorite in its annual clash with Cornell.

Dartmouth has ended its season, defeated by Princeton and Harvard in such close contests that it may easily lay claim to place among the leaders.

Pennsylvania State, still unbeaten, looms formidably for its last game with Pittsburgh and is regarded as a strong favorite.

The championship of the South is claimed by Vanderbilt through its defeat of Mississippi.

## PLANS ARE BEING MADE FOR TWO 30,000 TON BATTLESHIPS

Washington, Nov. 22.—Rough plans for two huge battleships will be laid before Congress when it convenes. The projected ships are to be of 30,000 tons displacement, armed with ten 16-inch guns each, and nearly long enough to carry them back and forth across the Atlantic.

## GUNBOAT WHEELING WILL LIKELY VISIT KEY WEST

### Will Soon Complete An Arduous Tour of Duty in Caribbean Sea

Washington, Nov. 22.—In the case of the gunboat Wheeling, due to complete an arduous duty in the Caribbean about the middle of next month, the navy department has decided to depart from the practice of bringing ships from the tropics to northern navy yards in winter in order that the crews may have rest and recreation on home soil. It has been concluded that the climatic change would be too great for health or safety and besides the crowded conditions prevailing at the navy yards makes it undesirable to send the gun boat to one of them at present. Therefore, it was stated at the department today, when relieved the Wheeling will cruise in the Gulf of Mexico.

## DUVAL ST. CURB LINE TOPIC LAST NIGHT

### All Buildings Encroaching On Sidewalks Will Have To Be Moved

A special meeting of the City Council was held last night at City Hall at which time the Board of Public Works was present. The purpose of the meeting was to settle on the curb line on Duval street, some little question having arisen in the matter. It seems that the old curb line established years ago by Messrs. Johnson and Fladd made a slight bow in Duval street, particularly between Caroline and Angela streets. The present resident engineer in laying out his lines straightened this street with the result that many of the property owners on Duval street find their buildings out on the sidewalk to a greater or less extent. The matter was fully discussed last night by members of the Council as well as by members of the Board of Public Works, and after a full and free discussion, it was decided to abide by the lines of the present resident engineer which makes Duval street straight. This means that all buildings which are encroaching on the sidewalk will have to be moved back in line.

### DOG IN A LONG HIKE

LOST MASTER IN MONTANA AND  
RETURNS TO WISCONSIN.

Remarkable Journey Covering Months  
Is an Example of Canine Instinct  
Which Seems Almost  
Incredible.

Durand, Wis.—Traveling more than a thousand miles, footsore, weary and so haggard that the neighbors hardly recognized him, a part shepherd dog that had been separated from his master, George Raethke, near Fowler, Mont., jumping from the train, arrived at the old farm home three miles west of Durand, after a journey lasting over three months. As an evidence of canine instinct it seems almost incredible, yet a rigid investigation appears to bear out the facts as stated. The dog is now being cared for by a next-door neighbor to the former Raethke home.

George Raethke and E. L. Warren left their homes west of this city to seek their fortunes amid the promising resources of the west, and accordingly purchased tickets for Fowler, Mont. While on the journey and about 150 miles this side of Fowler, the dog, which Mr. Raethke took with him, wandered from the train at a small station. After writing back home about the incident it was forgotten, and the dog had passed from memory until a strange, emaciated beast was seen at the deserted Raethke house. Judy Costy, the nearest neighbor, recognized in the strange, gaunt animal a dog familiar in the neighborhood. The reappearance of the dog after months of wandering is attributed purely to a sense of direction.

### KING'S FAMILY DEFECTIVE

Children of Alfonso of Spain Inherit  
Their Father's Weakness—One  
Has Mental Trouble.

Geneva, Switzerland.—News that Queen Victoria of Spain is coming to Switzerland to have her second son, Prince Jaime, operated on for a defect of speech, comes as the first definite confirmation of previous reports that any of the Spanish royal children are defective.

The truth is, according to apparently reliable information, that all of them are so, and there is good authority for the statement that in at least one case, the weakness is mental as well as physical.

The children's infirmities are attributed to Alfonso's condition at the time of his marriage. It is known that he, in turn, inherited serious troubles from his father and was kept alive during babyhood only by the most heroic treatment. Later, an outdoor life and constant exercise seemed to be working an improvement, but more recently his health has been breaking again.

### AN ANCIENT BAPTIST CHURCH

Building Erected by the Anti-Missionary Faction Early in the Nineteenth Century.

Lexington, Ky.—A few miles from Lexington, was built early in the nineteenth century, the Bryan Station Baptist church. This was an anti-missionary church. In time the missionary spirit arose, and finally separated the denomination into two divisions. The local church was about equally divided on the question. They at last agreed to divide the house and the time.

The missionary element were to hold services on the north side of the

house two Sundays in the month, while the anti-missionary element had the south side of the building on the other two Sundays. In a few years the church needed a new roof. The missionary side wished their anti-brath-ern to join in repair and ended its season. The anti-missionary side, however, refused to close out the "antis" and weaker in zeal, and would not help. The missionary branch then took care of their own half of the house. So the building stood for years. The sequel of the story is that the missionary brethren at last, in self-defense, repaired the whole house. The "antis" became weaker and weaker, the last number passing from earth a few years ago, while the missionary brethren have an active, growing congregation.

### A PIONEER HOOSIER SETTLER

Man Known as "Second Daniel Boone"  
Still Resides in Wilds of Indiana.

Marion, Ind.—About eighty-six years ago, H. A. Huff, known as the second "Daniel Boone," was born in Grant county, Maryland. Mr. Huff first lived along the river near this city. As game grew scarce in that locality he moved into the wilds of Van Buren township, where he still resides.

From where Huff lives to Marion it is twelve miles, and that was the distance to mill. The grain was all carried in two-bushel bags, thrown across a horse's back with a boy or two on top, or a heavy man. This was young Huff's delight when it came time to go to mill. When Huff was married he entered a piece of land in the woods and built a cabin thereon, into which he at once moved.

By hunting, trapping and fishing he made an excellent living until he could clear a few acres for corn and wheat. After a few heavy frosts the fur thickened and the hunting season was on. The game consisted of bear,

deer, turkey, mink, coon, muskrat and skunk. The Indian was here at that time, and Mr. Huff always wore an Indian costume. His memory still clings to his pioneer days. He has erected a wooden tepee in the rear of his lawn, which he keeps decorated in red men's style. ## NEAR A RIOT WHEN FILM IS CENSORED

Crowd Pays to See James Boys  
in Action and That's What  
They Want.

### PICTURES BLOTTED OUT

Censor Orders Action Taken, but  
When the Demonstration From a  
Disappointed Audience Grows Se-  
rious Official Arrests the Manager.

Wichita, Kan.—A practical and highly efficient method of striking censored pictures out of a motion film almost started a riot at a local theater the other night.

For some time the managers of the theater had been advertising on their bulletin boards a series of pictures showing the "exploits of the James boys, as reproduced by competent actors in the original settings." Youthful Wichita eagerly awaited the day.

Elder Wichita wasn't so sure about it. Elder Wichita has conscientious scruples against the reproduction of scenes of violence. Besides that, the James boys never have been extremely popular with the older citizens of Kansas. This is but natural, as the older citizens of Kansas never were extremely popular with the James boys.

After a conference over the matter, it was decided to have the pictures examined by a private censor. A private exhibition was arranged.

Much of the film was harmless enough. While some of the figures in the shifting scenes bestrode their horses or handled weapons in a manner that would have stricken the real James boys with astonishment, there

was nothing about that to offend the stainless minds of Wichita's youth.

But it was when members of the band were represented as walking into banks and extracting their treasures, incidentally making targets of their fellow citizens, that the censor balked. As the bandits were about some such diverting escapade, most of the time, the censor was kept busy telling the operator just which scenes must not be exhibited.

The news of this censorious activity got around and of course the house was packed the night for the first public exhibition of the film. Expectation became more intense as the spectators beheld the bandits preparing to do something real blood-and-thunder.

But just at a critical moment when Jesse James himself was peeping over his revolver's muzzle in an effort to find a satisfactory spot for his bullet in a Kansas patriot's torso, something happened. A cloud obscured the film and by the time it had passed the dark and dastardly deed had been done.

When a similar thing happened as Cole Younger was about to make a widow of the wife of a humble paying teller and again when Bob Ford was getting ready to supply the corpus delicti for a funeral service, it began to look strange.

Then somebody looked up and found the explanation.

The operator was carefully obliterating the censored scenes by putting his hand over his machine whenever one of them appeared.

The spectators felt that they had been cheated. They had paid their money to see somebody slaughtered in Jesse Jamesque style and they wanted the carnage to go on. What was the good of paying to see pictures of bandits who didn't bandit, who never slit a single bank into a murgue?

Simultaneously and with great unanimity of purpose, the spectators arose and started for the box office. The manager and his assistants retreated inside and barricaded themselves. From their retreat they breathed a firm refusal to give anybody his money back.

It began to look like real trouble for the manager and his men when Censor Reeves got an inspiration. Pulling out his marshal's star, dusting it and pinning it on his breast where everybody could see it, he placed Martling and his assistants under arrest.
