GOMEZ'S SON WILL HEAD VOLUNTEERS

Miguel Gomez Preparing
to Take the Field at Head
of 100 Volunteers

GENERAL CROWDER IS NAMED AS MEDIATOR

He Will Be Sent to Cuba in the
Near Future if Conditions
Are Not Changed

Havana, June 13.—Miguel Marti Gomez, son of President Gomez, is preparing to take the field in a few days at the head of 100 volunteers. These forces, which will be commanded by Gomez, Jr., and will not cost the state any money as the volunteers will be paid by President Gomez and his friends.

The Guines Party.
Advices reaching here yesterday from Guines de la Melena stated that the band of negroes which has appeared there is in command of Eugenio Villar, a \$65 a month employee of the department of public works. No act of violence has yet been reported.

No Negroes Found.
Reports from Santiago de las Vegas stated that negroes had appeared in force near the place owned by W. P. Ladd. Captain Arrencibia was sent out with a force of men to investigate the report, but could find no trace of any band or positive proof that any one had seen one.

Conspiracy in Pinar.
Reports reached the government yesterday of the discovery of a conspiracy among the negroes in Pinar del Rio and the arrest of many of the leaders. The advices, however, are not alarming.

Officers Come Ashore.
Havana spent another quiet day yesterday. The only report of any disturbance was the attack on the watchman of the Aldecoa hospital. In the other districts of the city there was no suggestion of trouble.

Stay on Ships.
The United States marines and Jackies stayed on the battleship Rhode Island and the cruiser Washington. Rear Admiral Osterhaus called at the legation during the day, finding an automobile awaiting him at the wharf. He returned to his ship at 6 o'clock last evening.

Mysterious Cablegram.
Secretary Sanguly, of the state department, received a cablegram from Washington yesterday containing 250 words. No intimation was given to the press regarding the contents of the message or who had sent it. Shortly after reading it Secretary Sanguly went to the palace and called on President Gomez. As the telegram was directed to the state department it is supposed that it was transmitted by the Cuban minister in Washington.

Crowder as Mediator.
In the statement of the state department it was stated that news had been received to the effect that the United States was considering the sending of a mediator to Cuba. Secretary Laredo Bru said that he understood General Knuch H. Crowder, former advocate of the United States army, was the one selected for the mission.

NEBRASKA'S DEFEAT KEELEY'S SLUGGERS

Local Team Proves No
Match for Sailors Who
Pile a Score of 8 to 1

In a game played at the ball park yesterday afternoon the crack team from the Nebraska proved their superiority by easily defeating Keeley's Sluggers, and winning the best two out of three games played. The Sluggers, who usually put up a hard fight whether defeated or, but generally not, failed to show up in their usual form, and were simply eaten up by the blood-thirsty blue jackets. Panther's curves were ineffective, while those of the Nebraska pitcher seemed to twist right away from the bat, only a few of the Sluggers being able to judge them. DEPT. AGRICULTURE WILL EXPOSE LAND SHARKS

Bulletins Will Be Issued Warning
Investors of Fraudulent
Propositions

Washington, June 13.—The department of agriculture has taken steps to expose land investment frauds and protect the people of the country against the swindling schemes.
Secretary Wilson today ordered the collection of data to place his department in position to aid such investors. Bulletins are to be issued warning against certain general propositions and specific information will be given by correspondence upon request. Thousands of city folk—and many others—Secretary Wilson declared today, were being encouraged to put savings into land selling, orchard growing and crop producing schemes, many of which are swindles.

"Many people with little or no knowledge of agriculture are being led to invest money in projects which by no reasonable chance can ever be made to pay the profits claimed for them," said the secretary.

GRAND JURY COMPLETED.

The entire day yesterday was spent by the circuit court in endeavoring to get the juries, who will try the cases during the present term. Several special venire were issued yesterday, but the petit jury was still incomplete when the court adjourned yesterday evening. The grand jury has been completed, and will meet this morning. It is very probable that Joe Knight's case will be the first case taken up.

MAN SEEKS REVENGE FACING EXECUTION

Attempted to Strangle His
Daughter Who Testified
Against Him in Trial

Washington, June 12.—Jan Ribarik, a murderer condemned to be hanged this morning tried to strangle his daughter to death when she came to his cell at an early hour to bid him a last farewell, and before he could be conquered the guards had to beat him unconscious with iron bars. An hour later he was executed without expressing any regret or sorrow. His enmity against his daughter was owing to her having appeared against him at the trial resulting in the death sentence.

Democrats Plan New Office

Baltimore, June 13.—Plans are being quietly formed by several members of the democratic national committee, it was learned here tonight, to create a new office to be known as chairman of the campaign committee. This new office of the campaign who will work with the national chairman, may or may not be a member of the national committee and his selection will be made by the presidential candidate after a conference with the campaign committee. The committee will continue in active charge of the campaign. The creation of the new office has been under consideration for some time and a movement to bring the office into being will be made when the national committee meets just after the democratic convention convenes. The committee will, in all likelihood elect their chairman at the first meeting and then adjourn until the presidential candidate can be conferred with.

MOVEMENT BEGUN TO MERGER CHURCHES

American Churchman go
to England to Confer
On Movement

New York, N. Y., June 13.—As the first move toward lining up the Old World in an effort to unite every Christian communion into one body, Rev. W. T. Manning, rector of Trinity church of this city, and three of the most prominent bishops of the American diocese, will leave today for England, to confer with officials of the Church of England, looking toward union between the mother church there and the daughter church in this country. This is to be the initial step toward merging all churches of the Christian religion.

RAIN FORCES TAMPA FACTORIES TO SUSPEND

Cigarmakers Unable to Work Tobacco on Account
of Extreme Dampness Caused by Tea Days Con-
tinual Down Pour--More Rain Predicted

BOATS SUBSTITUTE OTHER VEHICLES AT FORT MYERS

Train Service Between Ft. Myers and Punta Gorda Suspended
on Account of Floods--it is Necessary for Passengers
to be Transferred in Boats

Tampa, June 13.—On account of the extreme dampness resulting from the unusual rains, it has become a practical impossibility to work tobacco, and for that reason there is hardly a factory open in Tampa this morning. Many of the factories ceased operations the latter part of last week, or at least dismissed a large number of cigarmakers. Conditions are worse now than they were at that time.

Although tobacco can be kept stored away in a place which is moisture proof, when it is brought out to be worked it quickly gathers to itself abundant moisture from the atmosphere. The leaf must be dampened before it can be worked at all, and with the additional dampness derived from the air, much as salt will attract water, it is impossible to handle it. Only bunglesome work can be done and the cigarmaker is apt to get his cigars filled too tight to draw.

Proprietors of factories are anxious for the rains to let up, so that they can resume operations.

Rains Affect Roadbed.
Recent rains have affected the roadbed of the Tampa Electric Company in several places, besides causing trouble to the workings of the Peninsular Telephone company's system.

On the Ballast Point and Port Tampa division there are several places where uneven places can be noticed when cars ride over them. At one place near Ballast Point a small stream running under the car track has been swollen until it has widened its bed and washed away much ground. The tracks are said still to be safe at this point, but the washout caused one of the poles to descend eight feet, bringing the trolley wire so close to the ground that it had to be cut from the pole.

The rains have also affected the receipts on the Port Tampa run, in some instances cutting them down one half.

Weather Man Pessimistic.
More rainy weather, and lots of it was the opinion of Local Forecaster Wurtz yesterday evening. He could offer nothing encouraging in the way of a possible break in the present condition but felt positive that for the next thirty-six hours, at least, or until midnight tonight, there would be continued rains of the same class that Tampa and the entire southern part of Florida has suffered from during the last six days.

Reports came in from Galveston yesterday that it is experiencing increasing high tides, and that the sea is very rough. All along the Gulf coast, it appears there is trouble from the weather conditions.

The area of low pressure that has been hanging over the Gulf since Saturday last has scarcely changed its location. Its center has shifted backward and forward slightly, but the area remains practically the same. On Monday there was hope that it would work eastward out into the Atlantic ocean, but it shifted backward again, with its center immediately south of Louisiana. As long as this condition lasts it will rain in Tampa, and until the low pressure shows some signs of traveling either to the eastward or westward, the weather bureau will be unable to give out any encouraging news.

Boats Transfer Passengers.
Damage to South Florida by the rains which have continued for the past ten days grows as the days pass. Yesterday brought reports of greater damage in the Fort Myers section and in Manatee, with Pinellas reported to be hidden except in spots.

Advices received yesterday by Division Passenger Agent Kirkland, of the Atlantic Coast Line, state that passengers are taken off the trains at Punta Gorda and carried by boat from that point to Fort Myers. No tickets are sold for stations between the two towns named.

Visitors from Manatee yesterday stated that the Alafia and Little Manatee rivers are on the rampage and that train service is badly crippled on this branch of the Seaboard. Passengers coming up from Manatee county yesterday, intending to take northward trains, missed all connections and had to come to Tampa and spend the day.

"To the north of Tampa there is practically no damage reported."

JUDGE TO BE IMPEACHED FOR UNFAIR DECISIONS

Representative Berger Will
Present Resolution Impeach-
ing Judge Hanford

Washington, June 13.—An impeachment resolution similar to that in the Judge Swayne case is to be presented to the house by the judiciary committee against Judge Cornelius Hanford, of Seattle, Wash., under fire for his action in the Oleson Socialist citizenship case. A subcommittee will go to Seattle to hear the charges against Judge Hanford.

Chairman Clayton will bring in a resolution asking authority of the house to send the subcommittee out on the investigation.

The charges against Judge Hanford were reviewed to the committee today by Representative Berger, of Milwaukee, the Socialist member who started the investigation with the charge that Judge Hanford had cancelled the citizenship of Leonard Oleson because he was a Socialist.

Affidavits declaring that the judge was immoral and temperamentally unfit for the bench also were presented. Representative Norris, of Nebraska, presented charges which were sent to him from Seattle.

THAT BIG FISH.

Capt. Charles H. Thompson is having a two story building erected near the dock in front of the Seminoles Club, where he will exhibit the big fish he caught several days ago.

When the building is completed, Capt. Thompson will have the monster's skin mounted over a frame, and exhibit it. The remains of the big fish will undoubtedly be of great interest to winter visitors, during the coming season.—Miami Herald.

U. S. WILL GIVE GOMEZ MORE TIME

State Department Believes
Gomez is Honestly Try-
ing to Suppress Revolt

BATTLESHIPS WILL REMAIN AT HAVANA

To Protect Foreign Interests
Until Government Has Sup-
pressed Revolution

Washington, June 13.—The state department believes that President Gomez is honestly trying to suppress the Cuban rebellion and has determined to give him an opportunity to do so before even considering intervention.

Back to Routine Drills.

An indication of this purpose was shown today when the state department consented that the first division of the Atlantic fleet now at Hampton Roads should be ordered to return to the routine summer drills off the coast of Massachusetts.

Ships to Stay Here.

The warships and marines already in Cuba will stay there for the present for the protection of foreign property but no more will be sent unless the situation becomes aggravated.

No Osterhaus Report.

Inquiry at the state department tonight as to whether or not Admiral Osterhaus has submitted any report on the situation in Havana, which he was sent with the battleship Rhode Island and cruiser Washington to protect, elicited the information that no report had been received.

Dinner with Mr. Knox.

Secretary Knox has invited Dr. Orteses Ferrara, speaker of the Cuban house of representatives, Mrs. Ferrara, Martin Rivero, the Cuban minister to Washington, and Mrs. Rivero, to dine with the American secretary of state and Mrs. Knox at their home tomorrow.

To Investigate Conditions.

There was more talk today at the war department about the advisability of sending some army officer of high rank to Cuba to make an impartial investigation of the conditions there, and if possible to act as an intermediary in restoring peace between the factions. In addition to the name of Gen. Wood, which was first broached, yesterday, that of Judge Advocate General Enoch Crowder has been brought forward. He performed valuable services in Cuba while the island was under American occupation and practically renovated the entire judicial system. As it is, the common belief that if in the end, intervention in Cuba is a necessity there must be sweeping changes in the organic law of the republic to guard against the recurrence of the conditions which have made the present insurrection possible. For this reason Gen. Crowder's friends have urged that his legal ability would peculiarly fit him for the position of head of the temporary government of intervention.

CHINESE GOVERNMENT WANTS MONEY QUICK

Promised Loan of \$63,000,-
000 is too Slow Coming
to Suit the Chinks

Washington, June 13.—Premier Tang issued an ultimatum today to the financial group of the six treaty powers which is showing considerable reluctance in coming across with the funds provided for in the authorized loan to the new Chinese republic.

The purport of Tang's declaration is that the financiers must separate themselves from \$63,000,000 before the end of the present month or abandon their pretenses to the Chinese business. He asserted that unless the payment was made the government would consider itself free to borrow the money elsewhere. It is understood that a group of French and Belgian financiers is ready to advance as high as \$100,000,000.

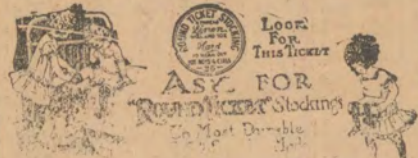

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THE REAL CONDITIONS IN CUBA.

There is much speculation just now, as to what the outcome of the Cuban situation will really be; and despite the fact that the published reports would seem to indicate that the situation is not so serious as at first reported, there must be some semblance of a well organized rebellion, or else the United States government would not have felt it necessary to send so many battle ships, loaded with marines, to Cuban waters. The government is not in the habit of making so big a demonstration on receipt of such vague rumors as have come from Cuba. There is something more serious behind all this than has yet come out, and the navy department knows something that the public does not as yet know.

It is known by some of those who are in touch with the situation as it really is in Cuba, that a much greater percent of the population of our little sister republic is in arms against the Cuban government than is commonly supposed. One man, quite prominent in railroad circles in Cuba, made the statement yesterday that fully half the population of Cuba is either in open rebellion or in sympathy with the movement; and that being the case, it is not going to be an easy job for the Cuban government to quiet it. Another important feature of the rebellion is that those who are now in open arms against Gomez and his government are the same ones who fought the Spanish government so long and so hard. So, looking at the situation as it really appears to those who are in touch with Cuban affairs, it looks very much as if the situation in Cuba is a serious one.

The Lighthouse Keeper

Every third month a broad-shouldered, squarely-built man promenaded along the quays of the little fishing village on the Island of Pelworm. He was dressed in a black Prince Albert coat, white vest and stovepipe hat when he walked along the quays, but when he disappeared he took up his vocation of attending the lighthouse on Bishop's rock.

Why he had entered this branch of the government service I have never been able to find out. Now, at the age of forty-nine, he was filled with a horror of the sea, and the Prince Albert coat, which he wore during his week off, he put on as a protest against his work. Nothing gave him more pleasure than to be taken for a drummer. Ziegler was his name.

"The sea is as smooth as a polished floor," he said to me one day when we were sitting together on the shore looking westward to where the lighthouse was dimly visible against the sky, "but the sea is treacherous."

"Around Bishop's rock there are undertows, currents and eddies which nobody knows. Fortunately I have only one more winter to spend there, though it would be just like my luck if the old tower should blow down this winter in a storm from northwest."

He voiced the general opinion of the islanders. The former lighthouse had been swept away by the waves, and, although the new one had been standing for several years, every one knew that a fog-horn situated sixty feet above the rock had been carried away by the foaming waves during a stormy night.

Ziegler trembled and stood up. "Thank the Lord, I have only one more winter to spend out there," he said.

"And then?" I queried.

"Then I am to be transferred to the North Foreland lighthouse and will be able to live ashore with my wife and boy. By the way, I wanted to speak to you about Leopold. He will soon finish school, and what are we to do with him then? Come along home with me and have a chat with my wife and the boy."

Frau Ziegler was a red-cheeked, buxom matron, whom no one would suspect of morbid ideas, but she, nevertheless, shared her husband's horror of the sea.

"It seems a miracle that it has not blown down," she said, "for it looks to me like a challenge to God."

Then we talked about the boy and his prospects.

"I hope to meet you next year," I said when I left. "I shall call on you for your new home, Ziegler."

"If the lighthouse does not topple over this winter," he replied.

The lighthouse did not topple over that winter, but Ziegler was not transferred to North Foreland light. Two years passed before I returned. But one day in spring I once more visited the island, and my first walk took me through the little cemetery. A new tablet in the wall caught my eye. I read the inscription. It said that Ziegler had died the year before on Christmas night. Of his death the inscription gave no information.

I walked slowly toward the little fishing village and involuntarily I turned my steps toward the signal house on the cliff. I was so filled with thoughts of Ziegler that I was not at all surprised to find his wife there, staring toward the lighthouse as of old.

"I had heard nothing about it," I said as I shook her hand.

Then she told me how her husband disappeared.

On Christmas eve the light was to have been lit at four o'clock, but the minutes passed and at half past the Bishop's rock was still dark. On the island people realized that something had happened and the cutter was

made clear.

Of the three men in the lighthouse only two were found. They said that Ziegler had taken the day watch while the other slept. He was to call them a little before four, but when they woke up it was dark and Ziegler was not about.

When they lit the light they saw that he had made an entry in the journal at 3:40 that a schooner was in sight. They looked everywhere, finally descending the spiral stairway. The lower door was open. From this a narrow iron ladder led down to the little landing.

There was only one explanation. Ziegler must have gone out on the iron ladder, then stumbled and fallen into the sea.

This is what Frau Ziegler told me and I wondered why she should want to go on living here.

She shaded her eyes with her hand and stared across the sea.

"There is the cutter from the lighthouse," she said. "Come down to the harbor with me and shake hands with Leopold. He is third man on the Bishop now."

"You are surprised," she went on as she looked at me. "Do you remember that the last entry that Frederick made was about a schooner? That schooner went ashore on the rocks at half past five that Christmas eve. One man lost his life, the rest were saved. That man was drowned because my husband had not lit the light in time and that is why I gave my son instead. If the Bishop's light goes down this coming winter it is only a life for a life."

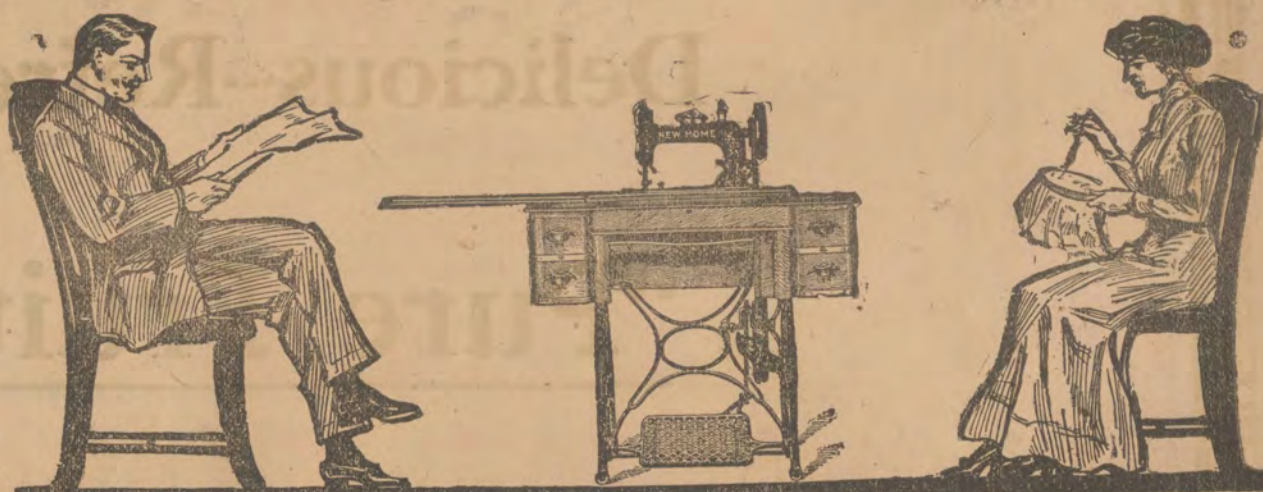

MODEL LANDLADY RETIRES — AFTER FIFTY YEARS

Boarders Who Had Been With Her for From
Fifteen to Forty-five Years, Give
Her Farewell Banquet

CHICAGO.—Miss Margaret Murray, Chicago's model boarding house keeper, has retired from business after conducting a boarding house for 50 years. She is eighty years old, and has as much money as she needs to keep her for the rest of her days.

Fourteen men gathered at the little farewell banquet she gave recently at her boarding house, at 122 South Green street, a dingy thoroughfare in the heart of a manufacturing district. Most of them were gray-haired and old, some were wealthy and all were well-to-do. They had been her boarders for terms ranging from 15 to 45 years.

On that occasion, these boarders toasted their retiring landlady in coffee of her own brew, and called her "the paragon of boarding house keepers," "the most wonderful boarding house keeper in the world," and "the best boarding house keeper in all history."

There are no statistics on boarding house keepers to test the exact truth of these encomiums. But the facts in the case would seem to prove beyond cavil that, even if Mrs. Murray were not the best boarding house keeper in history, she at least is to be numbered among the chosen few.

Boarders Seldom Left Her. One may best judge the hold she had upon her boarders by the term of years each one has been with her. Here is the list of her boarders and the number of years each stayed:

Case Stewart, official of the Chicago & Northwestern railway, who became a boarder with Miss Murray before the Chicago fire, 45 years.

Neil McIntyre, architect, 29 years.
Edward Cooney, policeman, 26 years.
John Cassidy of the Central Trust company of Illinois, 22 years.
Daniel O'Connor, broker, 20 years.
Timothy Daley, policeman, 18 years.
Michael Daley, his son, seventeen years old, 15 years.

Edward Reel, buyer for a department store, 15 years.
Dr. W. A. Quinn, 18 years.
Dr. William H. McCarthy, 16 years.
Frank Hoy, 15 years.
Samuel Wilson, 15 years.
Dr. Charles W. Imwall, 15 years.

One perhaps might wonder why there was no boarder who had been with her throughout the full 50 years she kept a boarding house. Miss Murray explained this at the banquet.

"Michael O'Flaherty," she remarked, feelingly, "was my first boarder. I never knew a man who liked good coffee so well or could eat so much boiled ham as O'Flaherty. He sat at my table three times a day for 30 years. It was through no fault of his own that he quit me. He died, poor man."

The food served at Miss Murray's table seems to have woven a sort of hypnotic spell about her boarders. Some of them went away—or tried to—and in every instance they came fluttering back like fascinated birds. Some of her boarders used to say that, once a boarder with Miss Murray, always her boarder.

Officer Daley's Experience.

There was Officer Timothy Daley, for instance. He began boarding with Miss Murray 15 years ago. He didn't want to leave her, but he fell in love. The big policeman knew that if he married he would have to leave the

boarding house because his bride had declared flatly that she would not marry him unless he set up house-keeping. For a long time Officer Daley debated with himself, matrimony pulling on one side and Miss Murray's cooking tugging on the other.

In this battle his heart finally won. He married and left Miss Murray's boarding house to live in a cozy flat of his own. A little son, Michael Daley, blessed his union. But in a few years his wife died. Right after the funeral Officer Daley took his baby and went back to Miss Murray. He has been there ever since, and so has his boy.

Then there was Inspector Wheeler. Several years ago the inspector's brother built himself a new house, and thought it would be fine to have the inspector live there with him. The inspector liked the idea of living with his own kin, but he put off going as long as possible.

Finally he packed his belongings and stole away to his new home.

Went Back to Miss Murray.

But he was ill at ease in his new quarters. His brother and his brother's wife and his gay young nieces and nephews wondered to see him sit in moody silence and to hear him pace the floor of his room until far into the night. Then one morning his room in his brother's luxurious home was found empty. The inspector had packed his things and gone back to Miss Murray's in the night.

As a model boarding house keeper, Miss Murray was no accident. She fitted herself by years of study, experiment and hard work. In her old age she is able to formulate certain rules which, she says, if lived up to rigidly will enable other boarding house keepers to achieve success. Here are some of the rules:

Give everybody plenty to eat. Make the food plain and good. Make the table and house homelike. Don't run too much to style. A man would rather have a thick, juicy beef-steak than cut glass and fancy silver.

Put everything on the table at once and let the boarders help themselves.

Try to Please Them.

Cater to individual appetites. If one wants his steak well done and another wants it rare, cook their steaks separately.

Do your own marketing and make marketing a study.

Make good coffee. Bad coffee has been responsible for more boarding house failures than any other one thing.

Have specialties in cooking—dishes that you cook differently from anybody else and that your boarders cannot get anywhere except at your own table.

Do your own cooking.

Have your table linen and dishes spotlessly clean.

Never serve any dish that is not as good as you know how to make it. If slightly burned or faulty in any respect, throw it away.

Have plenty of hot water in the house at all times.

Have a certain hour for meals, and serve them promptly on the hour.

Keep your rooms clean, and have plenty of bedclothes in cold weather.

Have all men as your boarders or all women. Never try to mix men and women. As boarders they won't mix. Men are preferable.

Mother your men. Darn their socks and sew their buttons on, keep their clothes in repair, and attend to their laundry.

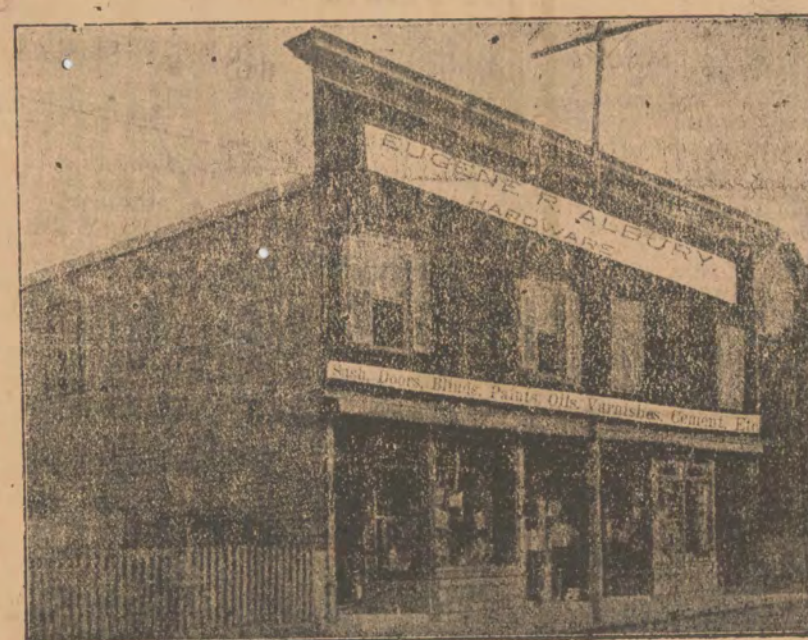

PROPOSED CHARTER OF KEY WEST WHARF & COAL COMPANY.
The undersigned and such other persons as may hereafter become associated with them as stockholders, do hereby associate themselves together for the purpose of becoming incorporated under the laws of Florida, in accordance with this proposed charter, and hereby adopt these articles of incorporation.

ARTICLE 1.
The name of this corporation shall be KEY WEST WHARF & COAL COMPANY, and its principal place of business shall be in the City of Key West, County of Monroe, State of Florida, but it may establish branches in other places in the United States, or foreign countries, whenever and wherever deemed necessary or expedient.

ARTICLE 2.
The general nature of the business or businesses to be transacted by said corporation shall be to buy, sell and convey, purchase, acquire, hold, charter, lease, mortgage, hypothecate, repair, remodel, rebuild and otherwise own, manage, and dispose of wharves and wharf property, warehouses, docks, tanks and storage facilities of every kind steamships, sailing vessels and other floating property and other real and personal property including chattels and choses in action; to dispatch, load, unload, disburse and act as agent for all kinds of vessels but not to use the said means of transportation for the purpose of doing the business of a common carrier, and to receive profits and tolls therefrom; to insure storage and warehouse receipts; to do a general sponge business in all its branches to conduct and carry on a general brokerage, shipping and commission business in and about any and all the matters and things herein, including a custom house brokerage business; to handle, care for, receive and dispose of consignments of vessels and any other personal property; to conduct a wholesale and retail coal, water, lumber, naval stores, and general merchandise business; to buy, sell, own, mortgage, lease, and pledge lands within the State of Florida or elsewhere; to advance and loan money upon securities of land, personal property, commercial paper, steamships,

sailing vessels, cargoes, materials from vessels and upon other floating property in the purchase, sale, management and disposition of real estate in the State of Florida and elsewhere; to take and hold real and personal estate in trust, to borrow money and secure the same and to secure moneys otherwise owing by mortgages, deeds, bonds, or other obligations therefor; to improve real estate by building, constructing thereon or removing thereto stores, residences, warehouses, docks, wharves, mills, factories or structures of any kind whatsoever; to have such improvements constructed by contract or to make and erect them otherwise and to purchase or manufacture all material therefor and market the surplus; to issue bonds or other obligations of the corporation in payment of property purchased or acquired by it or for any other lawful object in or about this business; to act as attorney in fact, agent, broker or factor for any person, firm or corporation in any part of the world and generally to do any or all acts and things which may be beneficial or profitable to the corporation or which may be necessary and expedient to accomplish the objects and purposes of the corporation and to do any and all things usual or incident to corporations organized under the laws of the State of Florida.

The amount of the capital stock of the corporation shall be two thousand five hundred dollars, divided into twenty five shares of the par value of one hundred dollars each. Ten per cent of the said capital stock may be paid for in property, labor or services and the remaining stock shall be paid for in United States currency.

ARTICLE 4.
The term for which the corporation shall exist shall be ninety-nine years.

ARTICLE 5.
The business of the corporation shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and Board of Directors to consist of not less than three nor more than five members, the number to be fixed by the by-laws of the corporation, and such officers, agents and servants as may from time to time be deemed advisable by the Board of Directors. The office of Secretary and Treasurer may be held by one person. The duties, functions and responsibilities of the officers shall be fixed by the by-laws, not inconsistent with the law.

The annual meeting for the election of officers by the stockholders shall be held on the first Monday in July of each year.

The date of the annual meeting may be changed by the by-laws. The first meeting of the stockholders shall be held on Monday the 1st day of July, 1912 for the purpose of

electing officers, adopting by-laws and the transaction of any other business that may come before the meeting and until the first meeting the following persons shall hold office and conduct the business of the corporation, E. M. Semple, President, J. L. Watrous, Vice-President, H. H. Taylor, Secretary and Treasurer and E. M. Semple, J. L. Watrous and H. H. Taylor, Directors.

ARTICLE 6.
The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the corporation can at any time subject itself shall be twice the amount of the capital stock.

Tegucigalpa, Honduras, June 13.—Brief details of the assassination of Frederick P. Shaw, the American lawyer, reached here today. Shaw was killed at Triona on the Black river by C. B. Vasmuller, said to be a German subject. Vasmuller was arrested and is now in jail charged with murder. Shaw was in Honduras as the representative of the federal court of appeals in pending litigation.

BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA NOT TO PARADE.

The leaders of the Boy Scouts of America do not wish the scouts to participate in street parades or demonstrations of other organizations. James E. West, chief scout executive of the organization has sent out a bulletin to the scoutmasters pointing out that it is unwise for the boys to participate in such demonstrations. He writes:

"Parades by boy scouts for show or self-glory, should not be encouraged. Even in connection with patriotic celebrations such as Decoration Day and the Fourth of July, it might be more helpful to have troops of scouts organize to render practical service by furnishing the marchers with water, or having the scouts organize for first aid work rather than to march in the parade itself. The scouts of old rarely made a show of themselves. If you try some such plan, in connection with the local celebration on Decoration Day, you will find that it would make a favorable impression upon the community."
