TRIPLE HANGING IN
FLORIDA NEXT WEEK

Three Negroes Will Be
Hanged in St Augustine
for Murder of Silverstein

Eugene Baxter, alias Eugene Nelson, Tom White and Steve Johnson, negroes, will pay with their lives the penalty of the crime of murder, at the St. John's county jail on May 31st. Sheriff Perry this morning received the death warrants from Governor Gilchrist, setting the date for the hanging. Eugene Baxter and Tom White were convicted of the sensational Silverstein murder in Jacksonville at the St. Johns county term of circuit court on a charge of venue from Duval county. They will be hanged here. Johnson killed another negro in the country in this county. These are the first legal executions here in several years.—St. Augustine Record.

Sea Fighters Ordered Here to Pre-
pare for an Invasion of Cuba
if Found Necessary

(Special By Cable To The Journal.)

Washington, May 25.—(11.55 P. M.) in view of the revolutionary conditions in Cuba, the United States Government has ordered the South Atlantic fleet under Admiral Osterhaus to proceed to Key West and there prepare for an invasion of Cuba if such a step becomes necessary. The South Atlantic fleet is composed of the battleships Georgia, Rhode Island, New Jersey, Nebraska, Mississippi, Missouri and Ohio, and the cruisers Solace and Minneapolis. With the fleet will be the hospital ship Solace and a collier. This fleet of mighty fighting ships is scheduled to arrive in Key West on Wednesday, with the exception of the battleship Nebraska, which tonight is enroute from New Orleans and will be held up at Key West by wireless to await the arrival of the balance of the fleet there.

In addition to the fleet now speeding toward Key West, the United States Government has 15,000 men available for immediate service in Cuba should such a contingency arise.

In spite of the aggressive measures being taken by the government, the State department again asserted tonight that the concentration of the South Atlantic fleet at Key West was in no sense a move toward intervention in Cuba, but merely a precautionary measure in the interest of American lives and property.

Commander Mitchell commanding the gunboat Paducah, the first to arrive at Guantanamo has been told that he may supply guards for American property upon request without reference to Washington, if in his discretion he believes they are needed.

NOTE—Rear Admiral Lucien Young of the Key West naval station received orders yesterday evening to stop the battleship Nebraska at Key West. The Nebraska left New Orleans at 10.50 P. M. Friday night and will probably arrive in Key West some time today or tonight.

At no time since the Spanish-American war will such a mighty fighting squadron have assembled in the harbor of Key West as is the one which is now approaching as fast as their powerful engines will drive them. In fact, it is not likely that the fleet which assembled here in those troublesome times could even nearly compare with the present South Atlantic fleet in tonnage or otherwise. When this fleet drops anchor in the harbor of Key West, approximately eight thousand of Uncle Sam's blue jackets will be on board—eight thousand of the best fighting men in the world. At no time since the Spanish-American war has the great strategic importance of Key West as a naval base been so forcibly impressed on the navy department. Should conditions in Cuba warrant another intervention by this country, Key West will be the base of operations.

SITUATION IN CUBA GROWS MORE SERIOUS
AND GOVERNMENT CALLS FOR VOLUNTEERS

Veterans Leave Today for Active Service--General Montague May Command Forces in Person--
Sugar Mills Close Down--Several Arrests in Havana

Havana, May 25.—The intention of the government to suspend the constitutional guarantees and declare military law was rumored insistently last night, but was not confirmed. President Gomez is known to have prepared a message for congress, the contents of which have not been divulged. It is declared to be a request that congress suspend the guarantees.

Railroad Bridge Burned.

The mayor of La Maya telegraphed the government last night that no train had arrived there during the day from Guantanamo because the negroes had burned the bridge which spans the Niguabos river. The bridge is the property of the Cuba Railroad company, an English corporation.

Americans Called In.

Mr. Holladay, the American consul at Santiago, has notified all of the Americans in the province that they should take refuge in the city on account of the uprising.

Estenoz Seares Negroes.

Estenoz is reported now to have a large following. He is declared to be going through the country telling the negroes who form 50 per cent of the population, that the army behind him is killing every negro found. The result is that all negroes immediately join his ranks. At midnight he was reported in the Firmeza sugar mill property.

The report that Major Julio Sanguliv, nephew of the secretary of state, had been killed was officially denied last night.

Hasten To Enlist.

The Cuban government continues to make every preparation for the putting down of the negroes uprising. Recruiting stations were opened yesterday in several places with large placards inviting volunteers. Long lines of white men with an occasional negro were to be found at each place.

Veterans Go Today.

Several hundred veterans also plan to go to Oriente tomorrow in two steamers which will be chartered if government vessels are not available. General Emilio Nunez, president of the Association of Veterans, will be in command of the body while Lieutenant Colonel Collazo, of the Cuban army, will be his chief lieutenant.

Montague May Go.

General Montague, commander of the armed forces of Cuba, asked President Gomez, yesterday to allow him to go to Oriente and take personal charge of the Oriente campaign. The president up to a late hour had not given his consent, but Montague said after midnight this morning that if conditions continued serious he would go. He said that he would leave Colonel Avalos in command of the forces in Havana.

Negro Junta in Havana?

La Ultima Hora asserted last night that the center of the negroes movement was in Havana, and declared that there was a junta here directing the movement in all the island. La Prensa, the other evening newspaper, intimated the same. Rumors of a conspiracy to cause an uprising in Havana continue and several arrests of suspected negroes were made in the city and subways yesterday.

Sugar Mills Closing Down.

All sugar mills in Oriente province are reported to have stopped grinding on account of the negroes movement incurring enormous losses. The Chaparra mill, of which General Mario Menocal is the manager, shut down yesterday and General Menocal armed 500 men to protect the property. The government shipped him 500 rifles on last night's train to assist him in defending the \$10,000,000 estate. The Chaparra mill expected to grind all of this month and part of next.

Cuban Consul Accused.

Bernardino Rodriguez, Cuban consul at Gonaves, Haiti, has been accused of having assisted the Cuban negroes in their uprising. It is charged that he furnished arms and ammunition and landed them in schooners along the coasts of Oriente, and that he conspired with a former Haitian consul in Cuba. Rodriguez recently asked and obtained a leave of absence and the government is investigating his whereabouts and the charges against him. The accusation gives strength to the report published yesterday that Estenoz had assistance from Haiti and Santo Domingo.

MR. PHELPS ON TRAIN
HELD UP BY REBELS

Arrived Friday Night from
Havana and Talked of
Cuban Situation

Mr. E. E. Phelps who is one of the Terra Guana Fruit Company, which company is beginning a fruit business between Key West and Cuba arrived Friday night from Havana after a trip through Cuba in the interest of his company. Mr. Phelps was seen by a Journal representative yesterday and asked about the situation in Cuba at present.

Mr. Phelps stated that while coming through Santa Clara province on a train he heard shots and immediately afterward the train came to a stop and remained still for some little time. Not connecting the stopping of the train with the shots fired, he remained in the coach and did not investigate the trouble. Later they arrived at a city where he found a large force of rural guards lined up on the platform of the station. He then made inquiries and learned that the shots he had heard were fired by revolutionists, who fled immediately after the train stopped. Telegraphic communication between the city mentioned, whose name he does not remember, and the outside world was cut off as the rebels had cut all the telegraph wires.

Mr. Phelps stated that the situation did not appear to him to be so serious, but that it appeared that the rebels were being furnished arms and ammunition by parties who were interested in stirring up trouble.

The boys of Key West are not stupid, and if they see reputable citizens endorse by their votes Mr. L'Engle's doctrines, it will have a more potent influence on their characters, than all the moral teachings of our public or Sunday schools.

THE SITUATION IN OUR NEIGHBORING REPUBLIC.

Press dispatches received by The Journal last night indicate that the situation in Cuba is really becoming very serious. We assume this from the fact that our despatches show that the great South Atlantic fleet of the American navy is already enroute to Key West, and we are forced to the conclusion that our government would not take such determined steps did they not have authentic information regarding the seriousness of the situation in Cuba.

It appears to us, from the surface of matters, that the supposed uprising of negroes in Cuba is not a strictly negro uprising after all; but that dissatisfied parties have organized a revolt against the present Cuban government and are using the negro uprising as a veil to shield themselves. Unquestionably there is much discontent among the negroes of Cuba; but we believe that if the trouble was confined solely to restless and dissatisfied blacks, the Cuban government would have comparatively little trouble in suppressing the revolt. The fact that the negroes are plentifully supplied with arms and ammunition is abundant evidence that they are backed by some force which is not yet generally known. At any rate, the revolt in Cuba has assumed serious proportions and drastic action on the part of the Cuban government would seem to be immediately necessary.

The Journal sincerely trusts that intervention by the United States in Cuba will not be necessary, and that the Cuban government will be able to put down the present uprising and resume its place in the ranks of growing and progressive Republics.

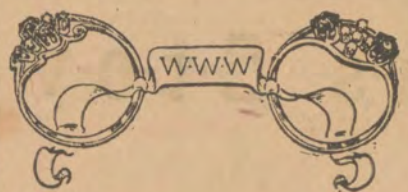
